

Minutes of the Regular Town Board Meeting held by the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead, at Town Hall, Howell Avenue, Riverhead, New York, on Tuesday, June 3, 1997, at 7:00 p.m.

Supervisor Stark called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Pledge of Allegiance was led by Erica Sanders.

Supervisor Stark: "How would the proud parents like to come up here and stand next to this young lady? You know, as Town Supervisor, many times you have people who would like to move into our town and say our school system is not too hot. Well, I beg to differ with you. A prime example is this young lady that is sitting standing right next to me in front of the Board with her very, very proud parents. She has been selected as one of the first 20 somewhere in the top 20 of the first team students of the United States-- all USA academic-- for the year 1997. And with that, I would like you to give her a nice round of applause. Erica will be traveling up to the Charles River and Harvard University, it's a great town, it's a great institution. I hope you are in the top 10 up there when you finish. And maybe, Jim, if you would present this."

Councilman Lull: "Erica, this is the Town Seal; it's a very lovely presentation that we have for our very special guests. And this is to honor you as All USA High School Academic Team, First Team Member, 1997."

Erica Sanders: "Thank you very much."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Before we let her speak, maybe we just would like to hear a little bit from the parents who have had to kind of guide her through her career."

Mrs. Sanders: "I think I would actually like to address what the school district has done for Erica. Not to take away from the hard work and the motivation, perseverance, that she does have, but I think people need to be aware of what wonderful teachers we have in Riverhead School District. And I think that they can make these kids competent-- if that's a word-- thank you. Well, you did this to me last second. With many of the private schools in the nation, which I think Erica has learned from-- competitive, I like that-- anyway, I would like to thank the school district and there are many teachers up there that are willing to give their all and if you have a kid that comes to them and wants to pursue other opportunities, they're available and through them, through the teachers in the math and science department, in particular because of Erica's interest, she was able to compete on a national level and we're fortunate enough to receive many awards."

So I would like to just let people know that Riverhead School District has an awful lot to offer and I think that needs to be pointed out amongst all the negative things that you sometimes hear."

Mr. Sanders: "Well, I would just like to thank the Board for everything they have done for the community and the schools through their support. I'm very proud of Erica and we just as everyone else wishes her continued success. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Now it's your turn."

Erica Sanders: "Also, I would like to thank the Town Board here tonight and also I would like to thank the community, especially for example for passing the school budget this year and other very important things such as that which have all students at Riverhead High School succeed. I would also like to reiterate a lot of things my parents said that the right to not go to a high school which is extraordinary wealthy like a lot of the schools that exist on Long Island or for example some of the private schools and (inaudible) schools which exist elsewhere in the country."

That did not prevent me from succeeding and I don't think it will prevent other students from succeeding, though perhaps opportunities weren't spoon fed to me or handed to me on a silver platter, they existed when I went forth with motivation and initiative and I think that's a statement-- a very strong statement for the public high schools all across the nation.

When I went to the award ceremony for the USA Today All Academic Team, I met a lot of students who were from such schools and I was very proud to represent a school that perhaps wasn't one of those wealthy schools or wasn't one of the schools which have tons of opportunities for the student but a school where I had to work hard in order to achieve what I wanted and I think Riverhead basically is the perfect combination of that.

Like I said, though it's not spoon fed to you, if you have motivation it will come to you and I encourage all students to focus on their studies though it may seem not worthwhile right now, it is. And though society makes (inaudible) place such an emphasis on it, there are rewards for it, you just have to wait and they'll come to you."

Supervisor Stark: "Also, Erica, I think you will agree, that anybody going through our public school system has to have a good solid foundation and that one becomes family, mother and father. So a nice round of applause. Congratulations. Come back and visit us and bring us a lot of knowledge and we wish you all the best."

Erica Sanders: "Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Is there a motion, excuse me, to approve the minutes of the Regular Town Board Meeting of May 20th?"

Councilman Wittmeier: "So moved."

Councilman Kwasna: "Seconded."

Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?"

The Vote (Collective response: "Aye."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

Public Hearing opened: 7:17 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 7:17 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:05 p.m. on June 3, 1997, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding an amendment to Chapter 58 entitled Dogs, Section 58-4 Redemption of Impounded Dogs."

Councilman Lull: "The change is insignificant. The chapter at this point allows for the fee for impounded dogs of \$15 and \$10,

\$10 and \$15 combined. \$15 for shots and \$10 for the redemption. Since we're doing the shots for all the dogs at this particular point, we are changing that from \$15 and \$10 to simply \$25 because it's already paid for."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody who would like to make comment at this particular time on this particular Public Hearing? If not, I will declare the Public Hearing to be closed."

Public Hearing closed: 7:18 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "There are no other Public Hearings for this evening. Anybody who would like to address the Board of any given topic? Rolph. I recognize you now."

Rolph Kestling: "Rolph Kestling, Wading River. I just want to mention one thing first. The young lady that you just introduced, Erica. I never heard you mention her last name."

Supervisor Stark: "Sanders."

Rolph Kestling: "I thought it would be nice to know."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, that's a good point. The young lady who we just gave the award to is Erica Sanders."

Rolph Kestling: "Okay. I'm here-- about a month ago-- "

Supervisor Stark: "I've known her for quite a while so I just keep saying Erica. I'm sorry."

Rolph Kestling: "I was here about a month ago and I asked you about the project on Hulse Landing Road and you said you are going to go down tomorrow and take a look at it."

Supervisor Stark: "Yes. I went down with Kenny and Kenny assures me that some of those things are going to be cleaned up. It's just getting the contractor to bring in some topsoil and what have you."

Rolph Kestling: "Okay. Now, go a little further on that. I noticed on the last section, the part that goes down to the road, they opened up the middle-- made a trench-- opened up the asphalt, had a heavy ditch digger there. I don't know how deep down they went, but they dug down there. What happened?"

Supervisor Stark: "I believe it's kind of a drainage culvert."

Rolph Kestling: "And they are going to make it out of concrete?"

Supervisor Stark: "Yes, you know, that what bypasses your drainage will ultimately get into that and spill on the beach."

Rolph Kestling: "Okay."

Supervisor Stark: "You can only build-- normally they build drainage to cover two inches in one hour. I mean if we were to go higher than that, we would never be able to afford it. So, it's like a spill off."

Rolph Kestling: "I sort of figured that. It's like that state parkway, they have the concrete. Okay. Now the next thing. Some of the signs down there, Hulse Landing Road, Locust Road, Cedar Road, they are in pretty bad shape. They are bent, missing, etc. I think they should be replaced. And as long as I'm continuing, the pillar, on the Thursday when they unloaded the CCA lumber, the contractor, he knocked over the pillar on Locust Road, you know, and hey, I was there when that pillar was built back in 1939, '38. It's still laying there. I spoke to Mr. Testa about it. He says they were aware of it and the contractor is bonded, he's going to replace it. But meanwhile, it's still laying there."

Supervisor Stark: "I can check in with Kenny tomorrow and, Vic, if you would make note of this for Charlie Bloss on the highway street signs, I would appreciate it."

Rolph Kestling: "When they were working on this Hulse Landing project, was anybody from the Town Board going there supervising it, anything?"

Supervisor Stark: "Yes, Kenny Testa, and Eddie McCarthy."

Rolph Kestling: "Well, you know-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Plus Young & Young."

Rolph Kestling: "Well, a couple of times I called up a couple of things what I seen was going on there and mentioned it to them, but even so the job is-- I wouldn't call it perfect or near perfect or halfway perfect, how much did that job cost between the two of them? You know, the parking lot and the bulkhead, the-- "

Supervisor Stark: "I believe around \$175,000."

Rolph Kestling: "\$175,000. What happened with the rest of the money?"

Supervisor Stark: "Half of that, or roughly \$75,000- \$100,000 was a grant."

Rolph Kestling: "Well, you had a grant-- "

Supervisor Stark: "And don't hold me to that. It's just-- "

Rolph Kestling: "No, I'm not. But if I remember correctly, the grant for the parking lot was around \$174,000 and-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Rolph, you know-- "

Rolph Kestling: "And then you got from FEMA another \$90,000. So that adds up to quite a bit of money."

Supervisor Stark: "I would have to have Jack here in order to give you the answer."

Rolph Kestling: "Okay. But they are going to clean up the place and make it look a little halfway decent. The weeds are growing faster than the grass."

Supervisor Stark: "Absolutely. Well, that's because of all the rain we're having."

Rolph Kestling: "Okay. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else who would like to address the Board at this particular time? Steve."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. Number one item, the-- on the May 27th blood drive we had at the Ramada Inn, we were very successful-- got 60 pints. I thought that was a good blood drive. And the director, Nancy Mitzman, extends appreciation and thanks for all the cooperation for people at the Town Board that helped out. So so much for that one."

My next item, I'm mad at every one of you."

Supervisor Stark: "Join the crowd."

Steve Haizlip: "Because you pulled the rug out from under me Thursday. You pulled the rug out from under me."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Oh, there was no work session."

Steve Haizlip: "There was no work session. Gary Pendzick had informed me on May 29th, we would be taking up the water extension that I have been so diligently trying to pursue. I come down here-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Gary Pendzick, first, does not run the Town Board work sessions."

Steve Haizlip: "I understand that, Jim."

Supervisor Stark: "There was a-- "

Steve Haizlip: "I'll get my Irish up like you get your Irish up."

Supervisor Stark: "I'm going to get my Irish up a little bit, Steve."

Steve Haizlip: "We'll both get our Irish up."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, then you can get yourself right back to your seat and calm down and then you can come back up."

Steve Haizlip: "It was-- "

Supervisor Stark: "If you don't want to stand up there like a gentleman, don't stand up there."

Steve Haizlip: "Well, don't tell me that Gary don't-- "

Supervisor Stark: "He does not run the Town Board work sessions."

Steve Haizlip: "I know. You run it at random, whenever you feel like running it. You want to do it on a Wednesday, you do it on a Wednesday. I'm around here hollering and they are telling me, oh, well, people got a big-- and people got to do ice cream, and people-- "

Supervisor Stark: "We switched the work session to Wednesday. We notified the press-- "

Steve Haizlip: "The press had Thursday, the 29th, look at it. The press said Thursday. Ruth Jernick is sitting back there and she will agree to that."

Supervisor Stark: "Steve, we changed the work session last week."

Steve Haizlip: "Well, I didn't know from nothing."

Supervisor Stark: "Well-- "

Steve Haizlip: "Now, I thought it would be nice, you know, there's one thing I said before about Joe Janoski, I didn't agree with him all the time, everything he did, but when he said that work session is going to be on Thursday, at 2:00, it was at 2:00 on Thursday. And, you know, it's getting to the point where I can put no trust, faith, in any on you."

All right. The next thing that I would like to inquire about, I'm going along 58 and I see a big, huge sign saying (inaudible). You can't even know it was there unless you went into the toy store or in back of (inaudible) office and you come out and you have to see it. So what I want to know is, how can you get a temporary permit for a sign for something that hasn't even got a site plan approval and it's got words (inaudible). And nothing

is really happening. Is this for community support or is this wishful thinking or is it anticipated that you are going to give it to him and they want to-- I mean, I thought that you had to have something-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "He did. He got a permit."

Supervisor Stark: "As contract/vendee-- "

Steve Haizlip: "A temporary permit-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Well, if you would stop for a second, I'll answer your question. As contract/vendee on the property, he has all the right in the world to come down and apply for a sign, for which he applied for in the Building Department and was approved. He paid the fee and put the sign up."

Steve Haizlip: "Yeah, but it don't have a site permit from what I've been informed and he's putting down (inaudible). But if you take the American language, the way things stand, sometimes they say go back 30 months from the date-- but it's not from the date of enactment. So if you take the American language, it's common, but it could be 99 years from now, right?"

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment at this particular time?"

William Kasperovich: "I think I'll have to stand on the other side of the scale and make a balance here. I think it's worthy of the record to note and since this-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Steve-- Bill, would you pull that microphone closer to you. Thank you."

William Kasperovich: "My words go into the-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Can you hear in the back? Okay."

William Kasperovich: "My words go into the records and they stay there for perpetuity. I think this would be appropriate. When we see a job-- a good job done well, we've got to bring it to everybody's attention. A week ago last Monday, at the Calverton

National Cemetery, our Supervisor was the main guest speaker, did an exemplary job, worthy of note and praise. And I think everybody should be aware of that. There was a day in a place of serious thought where we could stand and say, that's our Supervisor. And I for one send my thanks. A good job well done."

Supervisor Stark: "I thank you, Bill, and it's not easy standing up in front of that hugh crowd that was up there and giving a speech, because it's quite intimidating, the whole surrounding."

William Kasperovich: "Come on, the intimidating crowd is six feet under."

Supervisor Stark: "You know what I mean."

William Kasperovich: "Yes. Since you have gotten some thinking of this project down at the Hulse Landing Road, at the beach, at the time that there was a public information meeting and items that were brought up and everybody nodded their heads yes, that's a good idea and that's soemthing we should have, I'd like to bring it to the forefront so that we don't forget it or make a little better effort to get it."

Councilman Prusinowski: "You know, Bill, the mike is off. Pull the switch up. I notice that-- there you go."

William Kasperovich: "How about this? Can you hear me now? Okay. You see when I'm not angry you can't hear me. If I get up here angry, I don't need the microphone."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, we had Steve there turn the mike off on you when he left."

William Kasperovich: "Steve does a good job. Let's keep him with us. One thing was mentioned, a fresh water supply for drinking and like washing the feet, which we need at the beach. Since we have water so close, I think the Town could pick that up and by the warmer weather have such a thing."

The second item, which is a little more involved, is that we only have one light on one pole out there and if that light goes

out, which it does periodically for whatever reason, it's pitch black, totally black out there, and this is not a good situation.

And there are a couple of minor items but I won't take your time here now but these two items I felt were of an import or good use of the beach.

I'll go back with a few words that had me quite upset last week and this deals with the function of the Building Department. The Building Department to bring in people that want to build a house and live here, I take one attitude. A man wants to spend the money to build himself a house to live in, help him all we can in all directions. On the other hand, a man that's in the business of erecting a residence and putting it up for sale before or after or during the construction, that's another situation. He's there to make a buck and when they're in the lower priced houses which is quite high today, they try to get away with every penny they can, sometimes improperly, illegally, and just by being pushy. And the (inaudible) that we go at is cumbersome in the paperwork but it doesn't get the attention on the specifics of items that whoever ends up with the house or the community surrounding the house are going to have to live with for the rest of their lives. And although we're in-- I'm aware that it takes time and government organizations to modify or change anything, I do think that definite changes of policy and coverage by the department be scrutinized and modified to today's needs.

I think-- I'm not going to go into any examples, but I've had to live with some of these situations and examples for many, many years, some of which are waiting for some remedial effort by the town, some people just got used to and are going to grit their teeth and bear it and but I do think we know enough about the things and the irritations and the problems that we have had but if we go to get any improvement we've got to make change. And that's what I'm asking for. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Bill. Is there anybody else who would like to address the Board at this particular time? Henry."

Henry Pfeiffer: "Henry Pfeiffer, Wading River. I would like to add my (inaudible) to the Mr. Stark for his speech at the Memorial Day services. Okay. I'm very proud of you. I would

like to get a copy of that speech. I might want to use it some-time. But what I would really like to do is to remind you that a week from this Thursday, you are going to be the host to the senior citizens at their picnic in Indian Island Park. And I think that Mr. Stark, if you wish, you can bring these young kids along with you as trainees and we will sneak them in. Come in and come there if you're hungry anytime between 10 and 4. Join in the festivities and, Barbara, I would like to see you there. You don't have to bring your-- . But we welcome you. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Henry. Anybody else who would like to address the Board at this particular time? Dean?"

Dean Terchunian: "Good evening. I'm Dean Terchunian from Bear Estates. I have some questions for you which I'll give you typed copies of now before I ask them."

Supervisor Stark: "Why don't you just hand them to the Clerk and she will distribute them and you can start asking questions."

Dean Terchunian: "Again, I'm going to start off with my item one, which is usually my first question when I speak to the Town Board. It's been five years since our flooding problem was brought to the front page of-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Would you like me to answer these questions as you prepared them to us?"

Dean Terchunian: "Well, I would like to say them first and-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Well, you stated them to us right here."

Dean Terchunian: "Right. But I would like to state my questions."

Steve Haizlip: "We don't know what they are."

Dean Terchunian: "Where does the bond stand on the development called Bear Estates?"

Supervisor Stark: "The bond has been called and we're in arbitration."

Dean Terchunian: "Is the arbitration going anywhere?"

Supervisor Stark: "We have instructed counsel to firm up the arbitration, move it on, or just drop out of it."

Dean Terchunian: "Firm it up, move on, or drop out."

Supervisor Stark: "That's right."

Dean Terchunian: "And who's desk is this sitting on? Sitting
on-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Who's desk is what sitting on?"

Dean Terchunian: "This arbitration. This whole issue."

Supervisor Stark: "Whatever the Judge's name is, whether it's Underwood or whoever it is over there. I don't know the judge right off hand."

Dean Terchunian: "Underwood is the judge that-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Whoever the arbitrator is."

Dean Terchunian: "-- three years ago instructed the town to-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Okay. It's on the arbitrator's desk."

Dean Terchunian: "It's been sitting on the arbitrator's desk for a long time, like three years."

Supervisor Stark: "Arbitrators take time."

Dean Terchunian: "Well, it's my understanding that the sides-- "

Supervisor Stark: "You asked the question, where it is. It's on the arbitrator's desk."

Dean Terchunian: "Okay."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay. And the next move is we've instructed counsel, Allan Smith, to bring the parties together and move on."

Dean Terchunian: "Okay. Question five, when are the residents of Bear Estates going to be informed of the progress as we were told by the Town Board?"

Supervisor Stark: "As soon as we're informed by counsel where they are."

Dean Terchunian: "Well, I mean, it's been three and a half years-- "

Supervisor Stark: "As soon as we are informed by counsel, we will inform those residents of Bear Estates who is affected."

Dean Terchunian: "That, to me, is an unsatisfactory answer."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, that's the best answer I can give you right now, Dean."

Dean Terchunian: "Well, it's unsatisfactory and-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Well, it's unsatisfactory. Let's move on to the next question."

Dean Terchunian: "Well, I'm going to elaborate on this."

Supervisor Stark: "No. You've said it's an unsatisfactory question; let's move on."

Dean Terchunian: "And I'm going to elaborate on it."

Supervisor Stark: "No. I'm going to ask you to move on to item two."

Dean Terchunian: "These are my questions and this is my time. I'd like you to be a gentleman-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Well, you have a lot of questions here and there may be other speakers and I'm not going to have you at the podium-- "

Dean Terchunian: "I didn't see anybody raise their hand and then I raised mine. As you see, there is not a very large crowd."

Supervisor Stark: "Dean, Dean, I'll ask you to move onto item two."

Dean Terchunian: "We were told by the Town Board four years ago that we would be involved in this. We have not had one thing in the last three and a half years from the Town Board to inform us of what's going on. And you're going to pass me off like that?"

Supervisor Stark: "Well, I don't have any more information to give you other than the fact that since the arbitrators and we've instructed counsel to bring it to a final conclusion. I don't know what more you want from me right now."

Dean Terchunian: "Well, did that instruction come in the last two months?"

Supervisor Stark: "That instruction came out of last Thursday's work session."

Dean Terchunian: "Well-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Wednesday, excuse me, Steve."

Dean Terchunian: "What happened-- what transpired in the last three and a half years?"

Supervisor Stark: "It's been with the arbitrator. Now can we move on-- "

Dean Terchunian: "It's been with the arbitrator."

Supervisor Stark: "Now, Dean, you can sit here and bleed this one all night long. I know what you're doing. I know the game you're playing. I told you your answer. Now you've got another question. Please go on to item two."

Dean Terchunian: "Again, I'll state you're skirting the issue."

Supervisor Stark: "I'm not skirting the issue whatsoever."

Dean Terchunian: "You're not giving us any facts. We're the ones concerned. You've seemed to be unconcerned about it showing

from your lack of action in the last three and a half years. I will go on now to item two."

Supervisor Stark: "I would hope so."

Dean Terchunian: "What has been done about the John Reeve situation that I brought up at a couple Town Boards ago, and what has transpired in the past work session and the previous one with his situation. And if you need me to enhance that or-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Yes. I would like you to enhance that one."

Dean Terchunian: "I came here and I questioned you why a department head who has no longer anyone underneath him, number one deserves such a salary, and number two, deserves a raise. And you said to me, well, he's really involved with things with the landfill and he's got to deal with all the carters and when people get their garbage not picked up, he's got to respond."

Supervisor Stark: "I believe the last time you were at the podium I gave you my answer and I still stand by my answer. If that doesn't satisfy you, you can come each Town Board meeting and give us the same question. I will stand by the same answer. John Reeve is an extremely talented town employee. We have a lot of things going on at the landfill that you may not be aware about. We are going to have to cap that. There are preparations being made; there are engineers we are talking to; there are a great deal of documents that we are going to have to prepare for the State DEC. He is in charge of the residential carters district; residential, not business and residential and there's a lot of things going on up there.

Now, if you want to disagree with it, that's your perfect right."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Jimmy, if I might add. In Brookhaven, they have like seven or eight John Reeves who supervise the solid waste district. John Reeve is our only field person. He goes out; he answers questions; follows up on complaints; posts warning stickers, education, there's a lot of things that happen on a day to day that we have to provide service for the garbage district. This is not uncommon. If you check with the other western towns.

We have one employee in the garbage district and it's John Reeve. We are the only town in Suffolk County that has privatized our garbage. I challenge you to find any other town that has the lowest-- lower cost of garbage disposal than the Town of Riverhead. I think it's a bargain. You go to Brookhaven, Islip, Smithtown, Huntington, go out to Southold. See how many employees they have out there. See what they are really paying per household. And we had an increase in the garbage district tax this year because we're paying off a fine that we all agreed to which, by the way, is Riverhead, Southold and East Hampton saved millions and millions of dollars-- taxpayers dollars, litigating the closure of the landfill. We thought the law was unjust and now it's being changed all over New York state anyhow.

So he does more than just get a big, fat salary. What he does is he supervises the garbage district collection, he follows up on complaints, he returns phone calls. We have calls coming in here and everything else that Jimmy says."

Dean Terchunian: "Okay, well, in response to what you just said to me, Mr. Prusinowski, it's hard to compare Riverhead to Brookhaven. If they have seven or eight people that do the job that he's doing, well, they are over 18 times the size of us so I can understand it."

Councilman Prusinowski: "No. There are seven or eight in the field. Okay. John does everything. They have other employees. They have 30, 40 employees working in the solid waste area. I'm talking just about the field supervisor. John does it. He's our only field supervisor."

Dean Terchunian: "Well, the point that I'm trying to make which obviously is not clear-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "The point of the Town Board is you want the job abolished and you don't think it's necessary."

Dean Terchunian: "That's not at all."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, that's what you're saying."

Dean Terchunian: "The point that I'm trying to make clear is

why. This is an employee; it's not a department head anymore. It's a department of one. It's like you being the solid waste committee of one."

Supervisor Stark: "All right. We are not going to argue this one very long-- much longer."

Dean Terchunian: "Well, this is important to all the residents of Riverhead. Why we are paying so much for a one person department."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, actually, the payroll costs of the sanitation has completely been eliminated except for one employee. So I'll put up our record in Riverhead against anybody else on Long Island and, Dean, we come out ahead. Because we're the only town on Long Island that has one employee in the garbage district. Everybody else has dozens or 30 or 40 or 50. There's no comparison. We privatized. Okay."

Dean Terchunian: "I understand."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay. Now, we're the only one that's privatized in Suffolk County. So, and that's the purpose of getting government out of it; let the private enterprise do that and we have a very low disposal cost. We have one employee."

Dean Terchunian: "I like that word employee instead of department head."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, he is a department head status because he is more than an employee. He's in charge of the solid waste district. That's the title we've agreed on."

Dean Terchunian: "And what I'm saying to you is I feel that a one person department, that person should be paid so much. So I'll go on to my next question."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay. Fine."

Supervisor Stark: "Let's skip along."

Dean Terchunian: "Item three. As I mentioned at the last Town Board meeting that I was at, why aren't the resolutions

available earlier in the day of the Town Board meetings to give the public the chance to review the resolutions and possibly ask questions and raise concerns?"

Supervisor Stark: "I'll give you the same answer I gave you two weeks or four weeks ago when you came here. This is a twenty million dollar corporation. Business is being done every day. There are resolutions that are generated. And when they are all compiled, during the course of Tuesday morning or late Monday afternoon, they are compiled and numbered and then they are delivered to the Town Clerk who then must make copies that you have out here and everywhere else."

Dean Terchunian: "And I will give you the same response that I gave you last time I spoke."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay. You have your answer."

Dean Terchunian: "Which is why don't we take direction from the Town of Southampton who has them in the Clerk's office on Friday to give the public a chance to read these things. Next question under item three. Why are we doing business with Jamaica Ash & Rubbish? Aren't they on the federal monitoring for connection to the Mafia?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "You know for a fact they are on the monitoring list for the Mafia?"

Dean Terchunian: "Yes."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay. How do you know that?"

Dean Terchunian: "Because it's in the news. And it has been in the news."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay. When have we done business with Jamaica Ash & Rubbish?"

Dean Terchunian: "The last time I spoke, I questioned Mr. Stark why Jamaica Ash & Rubbish is dumping glass at the landfill. He informed me they are dumping glass free of charge because we need it for capping."

Councilman Prusinowski: "That's absolutely correct. We haven't received any since December. We had a choice-- "

Dean Terchunian: "I beg to differ with you that on 4/23/1997, New York plate number TP7 943, an orange truck pulling a black trailer full of glass, 40 yards at least with the name Jamaica Ash & Rubbish, number 175, was parked and dumping glass in our landfill."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay. So we probably took a load then, so what's the point?"

Dean Terchunian: "It's my understanding that we're getting loads on a continuous basis since January 1st, the closing of the landfill."

Supervisor Stark: "Is that a fact or just an understanding?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, we accepted the-- I know this is a pressing issue for every resident in the Town of Riverhead, instead of using costly sand and fill on top of the landfill, we made a decision to use recycled glass which we got at no charge from Jet Sanitation who is a subsidiary of Jamaica Ash & Rubbish. And, also, and I'll be happy to have you meet with our engineers, if in the future we decide to mine the landfill, that material can be recycled and shipped out."

Dean Terchunian: "At a cost to the taxpayers."

Councilman Prusinowski: "No, actually, the way that the industry is changing all over New York state and around the country, mining these landfills now is the new hot thing and actually you go out to bid to continue to mine the landfill. That's why we fought so hard not to cap it because we believe there's a better way of doing it."

Dean Terchunian: "So you're saying to me that we still are continuing to get glass into the landfill at regular prices?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "I don't think on a regular basis, no. And I checked today and we have-- the last time I was told that we got a load was in December. We might have got one in April. She

might have called up and said, I have a load for you for nothing and we put it on top because the topsoil and sand make dust and the glass doesn't."

Dean Terchunian: "You told me that last year when I brought the subject up."

Councilman Prusinowski: "But what is the problem here? What is the problem? You're an expert in solid waste? You're an expert?"

Dean Terchunian: "No. But I've done some research into it. Number one, Mr. Prusinowski, we are receiving on a regular basis whether you know it or not. Maybe you should speak to John Reeve. Number two-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "We were receiving on a regular basis, but we're closed now."

Dean Terchunian: "We are now receiving it on a regular basis. I see them all the time. This time, I stopped and wrote the guy's plate number down to make a point to you."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay."

Dean Terchunian: "Number two-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "That's your opinion."

Dean Terchunian: "That's my-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "No. That's your opinion. That's your opinion. Okay."

Dean Terchunian: "Number two. The glass that we're receiving from Jamaica Ash & Rubbish, this is scrap from the recycling center they can do nothing with."

Councilman Prusinowski: "You know that for a fact? Actually it's a product. If you go to-- there was some local farmers who are using it right now. In fact, there was a farmstand that I stop at all the time, took some of it, it's perfectly fine, and they had to put the stone over it because people were afraid to park on

it, just a misunderstood product. I have Waste Management magazine and I get all the magazines from the industry; I'd be happy to give them to you. This is something that's going on around the country. These are recycled products. This is one of the things that they use. They used to make glass-asphalt with a lot of it. They have a lot of uses for these recycled materials. What's wrong with using recycled materials instead of using loam or sand that we have to, you know, we have to mine or pay for to put on top of the landfill to keep the dust down until we decide if we're going to mine the landfill or be forced to cap the landfill.

What's the problem here? We're not getting paid for it."

Dean Terchunian: "Maybe you should observe the amount of glass that's there; maybe you haven't been there in a while."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I was just there this Saturday. Okay."

Dean Terchunian: "Did you see it?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Yes. I've seen it. I know exactly how much glass we have up there."

Dean Terchunian: "Now, the other point I'm trying to make with Jamaica Ash & Rubbish is they should be paying you to put that stuff there because this is a byproduct of their recycling and not us letting them dump it for free. And if you don't believe me, you should check into it, Victor. We should be getting-- "

Supervisor Stark: "All right. Let's move on."

Dean Terchunian: "Item number four. What is being done with the Hamlet studies and a master plan for the Town of Riverhead? What are the plans?"

Supervisor Stark: "The plans are I have directed the Planning Director and the Chairperson of the Planning Board to devise or generate a RFP to go out for an update of the master plan. That RFP after being generated will probably come to us some time in July and once it is presented to the Town Board and they fully understand the generation of this RFP, then it will be sent out to

consulting firms. It will help us do an update-- show us how much it's going to cost and then the Board will have to elect whether they would like to do a master plan update or not."

Dean Terchunian: "And the hamlet studies?"

Supervisor Stark: "The hamlet studies will become an integral part of an update of the master plan."

Dean Terchunian: "Has the Board now-- what's the-- what kind of time frame are we looking at to get a master plan then? Because a couple years-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Sometimes a master plan can take one year, two years, three years. Depending upon how you want to accelerate and how much you want to pay for it, how quickly you want it."

Dean Terchunian: "And what are we looking at?"

Supervisor Stark: "I would hope that because of the work that's been previously done by the hamlet studies, that we probably could complete a master plan within a year, no later than a year and a half."

Dean Terchunian: "And is this going to-- "

Supervisor Stark: "And as we're updating, do things as we develop the master plan update."

Dean Terchunian: "Are we considering the companies that work for the Town of Southampton, Town of East Hampton?"

Supervisor Stark: "We haven't considered anybody yet because we haven't generated the RFP. Do you know what an RFP is?"

Dean Terchunian: "Yes."

Supervisor Stark: "Request for proposal."

Dean Terchunian: "I'm quite familiar."

Supervisor Stark: "Once we generate that, then we will send

out. It will be presented to the Board. They may have to add to it; they may want to detract from it. And then we will send it out to any consulting firm that has expertise in planning update for master plans."

Dean Terchunian: "Have you spoken to the Towns of Southampton and East Hampton on what they've done?"

Supervisor Stark: "Not as of yet, no."

Dean Terchunian: "Do you plan on doing that?"

Supervisor Stark: "We talk all the time about once a month."

Dean Terchunian: "Well, I mean you told me that you also talked to Mr. Gaffney-- "

Supervisor Stark: "We have-- "

Dean Terchunian: "-- about the welfare dumping in Riverhead but it doesn't seem to do much."

Supervisor Stark: "You're asking questions about master plan update. I've given you an answer. If you want to sit up there, I'm not asking you to stand, sit down, and we are going to move on. I'm not going to carry on this debate for 20 minutes to a half an hour."

Dean Terchunian: "That's nice. These are important questions to the residents of the town of Riverhead."

Supervisor Stark: "Absolutely. You've done-- you've asked all of your questions and we've given you our answers. Now if you're either satisfied or you're not satisfied."

Dean Terchunian: "Well, I'd like you to-- "

Supervisor Stark: "There's not much I can do about it."

Dean Terchunian: "I'd like you to look into what the towns of East Hampton and Southampton do, maybe, maybe, we could speed up the process and use some of the methods and information that

they have to expediate what happens with the master plan in Riverhead."

Supervisor Stark: "That certainly will happen at the proper time."

Dean Terchunian: "Because I'd like to see this happen in a year or a year and a half from now, not two to seven years from now."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay."

Dean Terchunian: "And-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "First of all, Dean, the Wading River, Aquebogue, Jamesport hamlets are done. That property has been rezoned. For example, Charlie Cuddy's-- I'm going to use that example again. Prior to the hamlet study, a Pathmark shopping center could have been built in Jamesport. That cannot happen anymore. The same with Aquebogue and the same with Wading River. Calverton has become more complex because of the Northrup Grumman property. The Riverhead hamlet study is underway. The only other question out there in all the hamlets is the general upzoning question of the farm acreage, outside of what is protected in the farm program. There are 50,000 acres in Riverhead, over 30,000 is either preserved, impacted or severely restricted for development. That's a fact."

The master plan is something that was put together in 1973; it's a nice document; it's completely out of date and probably has not been used by the town on a regular basis to make any type of planning decisions because the data in there is 30 years old. What is important is the maps that's on the wall behind you, the zoning map and the code book of the town of Riverhead and that's been changed from time to time for over the last-- since 1977 when Allen was Supervisor.

For example, an industrial property in Calverton that we used to allow homes to be built in there. That's no longer-- that cut the population growth potential from 140,000 down to 80,000. Future-- further changes to the zoning book has now got the potential population for the town down to 60,000. The question

what we're grappling with here is what should the right population be for the whole town of Riverhead. That's where a comprehensive plan could come in and tie it all together. I'm not opposed to a comprehensive plan and basically what you want to do is tie all the pieces together. The two things that have to be tied together is the question about the remaining 15 or 20,000 acres of open farmland that's left, the Calverton area which is mostly preserved outside the fence and the Riverhead hamlet area. And that's really what's left to be done."

Dean Terchunian: "So, Mr. Prusinowski, you're saying that you are behind a master plan for the town of Riverhead?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "I'm behind sensible comprehensive planning that makes sense, not political gimmicks. Okay. It's very simple to get up here and say political gimmicks when I went through this since I've been on the Town Board and the difference between a political gimmick and reality is without a lot of fanfare and Otto was on the hamlet study with me in Jamesport and Aquebogue and Wading River which we actually hired consultants. We did the work, we surveyed the people, we sent out surveys, we mailed to the residents-- not mailed to the residents, we actually did a survey, a poll, we mailed to all the business owners, we took that data, had public hearings, got the public input in each one of those hamlets, and we devised a plan that the people living in those hamlets wanted for the future growth of Riverhead."

We-- I don't want Jamesport, Aquebogue, and Wading River turning into Selden, Centereach. Nor do we want the rest of the town. And that's really what's reflected in those three hamlet studies. And the two hamlets that we have left, one is impacted by the future development of Northrup Grumman, and one is the central business area which is very complicated."

What you want to tie together is a planning group that would come in here and give us some ideas on should we upzone the farmland? I mean that impacts the school taxes. Should we, you know, should we do certain things? I think the foundation has been put there. And by all Town Boards. It's not just this Town Board. But Town Boards starting back in 1976."

Dean Terchunian: "So the word master plan is not going to

come out of your mouth?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "A comprehensive plan is a master plan, okay."

Dean Terchunian: "Okay."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay? You know, I know what you're doing. So it's great. And I'm good at this, too. I've been in politics for 20 years and it's a buzz word and I know what you're doing up here and that's fine. That's your job tonight. But the thing is that the reality and the facts have to match. I mean your statements have to match reality. The fact is when Joe and I took office here in 1980, the town of Riverhead potential build-- that was 140,000, okay, which we could never handle in this town. We would be Centereach and Selden. Today it's 60,000. The challenge is now should it be less than that? What can we afford as a community in the next 20, or 30 years? How can we, you know, can we-- how can we survive as a community, comprehend between what's good, rural, environment, quality of life issue, and what the population-- what type of population growth we can afford to have. And what sacrifices we might have to get to have 50,000, 40,000, because right now we're at about 24,000."

Dean Terchunian: "The main reason why I'm bringing all this master planning and hamlet studies up is because I was here for a public hearing for the Calverton place, I think it's called DEIS survey."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Right."

Dean Terchunian: "I think we're putting the cart before the horse here. We're doing all these changes in zoning, we've got this PPD thing, we've got all this development we want to do on Route 58, but what we need and as quickly as possible, is a comprehensive game plan for the town of Riverhead and not a pick and choose method. Now you can't do a study like you did for Calverton without including the rest of the town. And you're not doing that. You're picking and choosing at what you're doing. At least that's the way it appears to me. And I would like to see as expediently as possible a comprehensive master plan done for this township and not pick and choose as is being done now or it

appears to being done."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay, thank you very much."

Dean Terchunian: "And upon that dismissal from you, Mr. Stark, I will sit down."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Anybody else who would like to talk to the Board at this particular time? If not, let us take up the resolutions."

Resolution #468

Councilman Prusinowski: "468 which is to increase and improvement-- it's a Water District resolution to create a district. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Seconded."

Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?"

The Vote (Collective response): "Aye."

Supervisor Stark: "Opposed? Motion carried."

Resolution #469

Councilman Lull: "Which is a follow-up resolution authorizing the issuance of serial bonds for the Town of Riverhead to pay the cost of increase and improvement of the facilities of the Riverhead Water District. Same district. So moved."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Seconded."

Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?"

The Vote (Collective response): "Aye."

Supervisor Stark: "Opposed? Motion carried."

Resolution #470

Councilman Kwasna: "470 is a resolution calling for a public hearing on water main installation in the subdivision known as Ashley Homes. So moved."

Councilman Wittmeier: "And seconded."

Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?"

The Vote (Collective response): "Aye."

Supervisor Stark: "Opposed? Motion carried."

Resolution #471

Councilman Wittmeier: "Can I take 471, 472 and 473? They're in order we're calling for public hearing for Extension 41B, Riverhead Water District, Extension 50 to the Riverhead Water District, Extension 51 to the Riverhead Water District. So moved."
