Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

Public Hearing opened: 2:10 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 2:10 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing."

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 2:05 p.m. on June 17, 1997, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the consideration of a water lateral main regarding the petition of Ashley Homes."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Gary, you-- or is Bob going to-- Rick would you see Bob here on a home rule message?"

Robert Scheiner: "My name is Robert Scheiner with the firm of H2M Group, engineers for the Riverhead Water District. Mr. Supervisor, members of the Town Board.

H2M has been authorized to evaluate the proposal of extending the lateral water mains to the proposed subdivision of Ashley Homes located off Sound Road in Wading River. The developer has petitioned the Town of Riverhead Water District to serve this sub-

division. Public water could service the eight lot subdivision by installing a total of 585 feet of eight inch water main. We estimate the cost of the water installation at \$31,700. The entire cost to be paid by the developer.

In addition, the developer will need to pay key money costs of \$2,500 per unit for a total of \$20,000. We estimate the water usage of the subdivision at approximately 3,400 gallons per day with a maximum daily usage of 15,360 gallons per day.

The map of the extension, of the lateral extension, is in front of you."

Supervisor Stark: "So what you're basically saying is that the developer will absorb the cost of the water main and there will be no tax."

Robert Scheiner: "Correct."

Supervisor Stark: "-- indebtedness to the residents-- "

Robert Scheiner: "Correct. And they will pay also the engineering fees, the inspection fees, and so forth."

Supervisor Stark: "Gary, you have anything you want to add to that?"

Gary Pendzick: "No."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay. Is there anybody who would like to make comment at this particular time on this particular Public Hearing? Yes, sir."

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich from Wading River. The only comment is a good comment. When Mr. Scheiner comes in with a project, we can rest easy it's going to be a good project."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. We taught him well here originally. We knew him when he was poor, Bill. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment at this particular time? Henry, I'm sorry, I didn't see your hand."

Henry Pfeiffer: "Henry Pfeiffer, Wading River. I would like to mention the tremendous asset it was and what a blessing it was to receive public water some years ago after that-- in Wading River-- after that storm blew out all the electric things and my private pump wouldn't work and so forth and so on. It's a wonderful thing."

The only question I have here, do we have sufficient backup services, pumps, tanks, etc., or do we have to build some more for this and the subsequent hearing?"

Supervisor Stark: "All right, the question being, do we have sufficient backup for the extra usage of water, tanks, etc., either one?"

Gary Pendzick: "My name is Gary Pendzick, Superintendent of Riverhead Water District. Yes, we are in the process of building new storage and wells at this moment and part of our job in the Water District, along with H2M's, is to see to it that we always have enough storage and wells to supply the public of Riverhead, including expansions of this nature."

Supervisor Stark: "Henry, at the work session last Thursday, H2M in cooperation with Gary, Superintendent, presented to us what you would call a master plan that takes us I believe to 2002, 2003, something like that?"

Gary Pendzick: "2007."

Supervisor Stark: "2007. And in anticipation, they have as best of their ability, recognized the new requirements or the new demands. Certain aspects where we may lose some demand, will give us ample time to start preparing for that. So, one of the things that many read in the papers about the State audit was the large fund balance that we have there. Well, we tried to build up the fund balance simply because we're going to have to do expansion; we have wells that go down. It's like saving money for a rainy day. And in the Water District, that rainy day could be a very, very big day. So, we are in that process and through the efforts of H2M, who is our consultant, I think we will be in good shape. They gave an excellent report to us Thursday. Is there anybody else who

would like to make comment at this particular time? If not, I will declare the Hearing to be closed."

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 2:15 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing."

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 2:10 p.m., on June 17, 1997, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the proposed Water Extension No. 41B-Northside Estates, Calverton."

Supervisor Stark: "You want to flip the map? There we go."

Robert Scheiner: "Sorry, I'm taking Gary's job."

Supervisor Stark: "That was supposed to be Gary's job."

Robert Scheiner: "I'm sorry. Bob Scheiner, H2M. H2M has been authorized to evaluate the extension of the Riverhead Water District to include the proposed subdivision of Northside Estates. The proposed extension will include 27 single family homes on 31.7 acres. The subdivision is located on the west side of Twomey Ave., approximately 1600 feet south of Youngs Avenue.

In order to bring water to this extension, approximately 2300 feet of 12 inch water main will be installed on Twomey Avenue and tied into the existing main on Youngs Avenue. An eight inch main will be installed throughout the subdivision and tie into the existing eight inch main on Jake's Lane. The cost of the extension is estimated at \$175,000, including construction costs, engineering, inspection and contingencies. All costs are to be paid by the developer. The developer will also be required to pay key money costs of \$2,500 per unit for a total of \$67,500. The estimated

water usage from this extension is 14,364 gallons per day, with a maximum total daily usage of 57,456 gallons per day."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. The difference there, Bob, would probably be in the main line that's out on Twomey Ave?"

Robert Scheiner: "Right."

Supervisor Stark: "A 12 inch versus an eight inch."

Robert Scheiner: "Right."

Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody that would like to make comment at this particular time on this particular Public Hearing? If not, I will declare the Hearing to be closed."

Public Hearing closed: 2:17 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 2:17 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 2:17 p.m. has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing."

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 2:15 p.m., on June 17, 1997, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the special permit petition of P.C. Richard & Sons, Inc. to allow the construction of a 4,320 square foot addition with a 2,400 square foot basement for installation of car audio systems and stock storage for existing retail use."

Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody representing P.C. Richards here?"

Gerald Anderus: "Yes. Gerald Anderus, Block and Weber Architects (phonetic). All right. As the Board may be aware, we recently went through a major renovation of the facade of this facility. And at present what we're here for is we are looking to

an addition on the rear that would be solely for storage and the installation of car audio, radio, that kind of thing. There would be no vehicle repair.

We've gone through the whole process; we've gone through planning; we were here before previously. We would still be short on the parking. The addition would require 108 spaces but we would only be providing 86. But I would like to note that this is an increase of 11 spaces over what is there now. And even the parking which we now have, we really don't have any need for that. We would probably request that some of this parking be landbanked.

And at present the coverage of the piece of property is 21% and this addition in the rear would come out to be a total of 26%. That's about it. It's a pretty simple and straightforward application."

Supervisor Stark: "No problem. Is there anybody who would like to make comment at this particular time? Steve?"

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Would somebody go and find Rick for me, please?"

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. My concern in this particular proposal, have all the safety features been worked out? Now when you put cars into a garage, I don't know how many cars they're proposing to put in a garage under ground, but when you put those cars in in the wintertime, you've got to have those doors closed and you are working in there with electricity and sparks are flying from guys accidentally making connection or hit something, or a wrench cross, I know, I've been through it. Is any provisions made here for safety? Any overhead sprinklers? Any exhaust fan? Any car exhaust outlet tubes and so forth? That's my concern on this."

Gerald Anderus: "Those are some very good points; I would like to address those. First of all, the car audio installation will be on ground level. It will not be underground. The basement will be for storage only and there will be no basement below the car audio installation. Secondly-- "

Supervisor Stark: "It's kind of a misleading statement, Steve."

Gerald Anderus: "The building will be sprinkled; the cars will be-- "

Supervisor Stark: "You're controlled by the Department of Labor, Department of Health on all the safety features that would have to be put into the audio portion that you-- "

Gerald Anderus: "Right. Also, that area would have to be lower in case there was a gas leak-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Before they could get a building permit for this, Steve, they would have to go through the Building Department who is well aware of those requirements."

Is there anybody else who would like to make comment at this particular time? If not, I will declare the Hearing to be closed."

Public Hearing closed: 2:22 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "The time for the next Public Hearing has not arrived and if there is anybody that would like to make comment."

Barbara Grattan: "Yes, it has, Jim. It's 2:20 the next Public Hearing."

Supervisor Stark: "Oh, it is. I'm sorry. I skipped that one."

Public Hearing opened: 2:23 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 2:23 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing."

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 2:20 p.m., on June 17, 1997, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the consideration of a Local Law for the amendment of Chapter 101 Vehicles and Traffic Section 101-3 Stop and Yield Intersections; railroad crossings, parking fields. The intersection is Farm Road South, stop sign on Farm Road East, and the entrance from north and south."

Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody-- Captain, do you have any comment on this? I know it's been inspected by your Department and the Highway Department, and it wouldn't come to this unless there was some recommendations for this coming out of the Police Department and the Highway Department. And it has been requested by residents in that particular area and it has been determined that this would help the vehicle traffic flow and safety of our highways. So with that-- yes, we had a formal request-- is there anybody in the audience that would like to make comment at this particular time on this particular Public Hearing? Steve."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. Even though I've lived in this town for 40 years and visited off and on for approximately five, I don't know all these locations. So my question is going to be, about this Farm Road South and Farm Road East, and north and south. I take it that the rest of it here is railroad crossings up and down the east and west corridor-- "

Supervisor Stark: "No, that just happens to be in that section of the Code. It covers all of the multitude of sins, Steve. We're actually talking Vehicles and Traffic Law Section 101, stop and yield intersections. There are other descriptions that are covered in this Code. And what we're talking about is the intersection of Farm Road South, Farm Road East, and entrance from north and south. I do believe it goes all the way up to-- would it be North Wading River Road, Captain? So that you could go from North Wading River Road, let's say where Little Flower, that road."

Steve Haizlip: "Oh, oh."

Supervisor Stark: "You could come all the way back down to Old Country Road, I guess it would be. It's not right? Doesn't go all the way through."

Steve Haizlip: "So it's in the vicinity of Little Flower?"

Supervisor Stark: "Yes. Well, if you go Sound Avenue and come up to 25 and make a kind of a right angle turn, that would be -- what is the name of that road, Captain? North Country Road."

Steve Haizlip: "All right. I've got you."

Supervisor Stark: "And then down a little bit there is Farm Road East, Farm Road South. There are a lot of roads there, all called Farm Road."

Steve Haizlip: "Yeah, okay, nothing wrong with the proposal. It's just that I wanted to get the location. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "No problem. Is there anybody else that would like to make comment at this particular time? If not, I will declare the Hearing to be closed."

Public Hearing closed: 2:25 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 2:25 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 2:25 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing."

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 2:25 p.m., on June 17, 1997, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the special permit of Corey D. Hallock for the construction of a 3,500 square foot addition to an existing concrete block structure used for metal fabrication."

Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody who would like to make comment on this particular Public Hearing at this particular-- yes."

John Gunning: "My name is John Gunning, an associate with Gordon (inaudible), engineers in Jamesport. And I'll be here to answer any questions."

Supervisor Stark: "Why don't you give the location of this-- the general location of this-- "

John Gunning: "It's on the corner of Doctor's Path and-- let's see-- Northville Turnpike."

Supervisor Stark: "This would be the northeast corner?"

John Gunning: "Yes."

Supervisor Stark: "Is that a yes or a no?"

John Gunning: "Yes. And the expansion project here is a 1,500 square foot addition to an existing 8,346 square foot building. The application meets all setbacks and lot percentages for the Ag A Zoning. Basically the reason for the expansion is to implement the input of new equipment that fits the business that he has now, because things have changed over the years. He has been in business there since the '50's.

The business does require more storage of metal stock to stay competitive to keep-- so he can buy more stock to get lower prices. And also he needs to streamline the operation and make the work stations a little bit more safe. So basically most of the area of the building expansion is for storage. And that's basically the application as said."

Supervisor Stark: "This is what we call Hallock conveyor, right?"

John Gunning: "Or a metal fabrication now. And along with the building, of course, he'll be adding the appropriate parking, lighting, landscaping to meet the Planning Board's recommendations for site plan approval. If there is any questions."

Supervisor Stark: "Yes, let's scan the audience and see if there is anybody that has any comment on this particular Public Hearing. I knew you were in the area for some reason. When I looked down, I said, I know. Former Councilwoman Harriet Gilliam."

Harriet Gilliam: "Harriet Gilliam, Riverhead. Good afternoon, gentlemen. I just have a question. You touched upon it in your

presentation but just to be sure that the expansion is going to be used for a use that is consistent with the existing use of the business because there's always a concern when you're granting a special permit for a use that for an area that's zoned in this particular case, Agricultural, that the use that's going to be intended for this expansion is consistent with and comparable to what's already there. It doesn't adversely affect or impact the property. So, I would just like to address that, that the use that's proposed is consistent with an expansion of what the existing use is and something that's compatible with the area."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

John Gunning: "Yes, I can answer that. Basically, nothing is changing as far as the operation that's there. It has always been metal fabrication. It will remain so. There's no employee expansion here. It's just a matter of reorganizing work stations and creating more storage space. The actual business is the same it has always been."

Supervisor Stark: "Primarily Bucky-- as I know him from Hallock Conveyor-- he was not 100% for fabrication for agricultural use, but he was very creative and designed a lot of products out of there, that were commercial and for agricultural."

John Gunning: "It's-- the agricultural end of it has slowed down over the years, but they still do do that work along with other metal fabrication."

Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody else who would like to make comment at this particular time? Harriet, does that answer your question?"

Harriet Gilliam: "Yes."

Supervisor Stark: "Anybody else who would like to make comment at this particular time? If not, I will declare the hearing to be closed."

Public Hearing closed: 2:30 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 2:30 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 2:30 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 2:30 p.m. on June 17, 1997, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the proposed water extension No. 50, Wendelken Subdivision."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Gary, you want to switch with maps there for us, please? That's why you get the big bucks."

Robert Scheiner: "Bob Scheiner, H2M. H2M has been authorized to prepare an engineering report to evaluate the proposal of the extension of the Riverhead Water District to provide public water to the proposed Wendelken Subdivision. The subdivision is located on the east side of Horton Avenue, approximately 3,100 feet south of Reeves Avenue. The 2.76 acre lot is being subdivided into a three single-- into three single family homes.

The estimated water use for this extension is 1,592 gallons per day with a maximum daily demand of 6,384. To provide water to the subdivision the existing eight inch main-- water main on Horton Avenue will need to be extended 495 feet. The estimated cost of the water main extension is \$18,700, all costs to be born by the developer, including engineering and inspection."

Supervisor Stark: "Where that-- the terminus of that water main is to the end of it, any residences in between that on Osborne Avenue would not be required for any indebtedness of the extension?"

Robert Scheiner: "Correct."

Supervisor Stark: "But would have the ability to hook into it?"

Robert Scheiner: "Correct."

Supervisor Stark: "So you're really basically creating more of a district all the way down from Silver Linings all the way up. All right. Does anybody have any comment on this particular Hearing at this particular time? Steve."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. I am just a little curious by seeing the name Wendelken here. If this is by any chance associated with or named after Wendy Wendelken. That's all I want to know."

Shep Scheinberg: "I can answer that. Shep Scheinberg, Riverhead, New York. Hi, Jim. I'm one of the petitioners. The Wendelken referred here is Sharon Wendelken."

Supervisor Stark: "Sharon or Sherry?"

Shep Scheinberg: "Well, her real name is Sharon."

Supervisor Stark: "Oh, okay."

Shep Scheinberg: "And-- "

Supervisor Stark: "We all know her as Sherry."

Shep Scheinberg: "Right. At the time that the minor subdivision was approved, which was some years ago by the Town of Riverhead, she was Sharon Wendelken. That's why it's called the Wendelken Subdivision. Many years have gone by, the Suffolk County Health Department had not given its approval for the subdivision. That's why it's required to bring public water to this minor subdivision. It's Sharon Wendelken Patterson. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Anybody else who would like to make comment at this particular time? Steve, you raised your hand?"

Steve Haizlip: "That's okay."

Supervisor Stark: "Oh, okay. Anybody else? It does benefit the District, I believe, because there are several homes between the two that can take advantage of it at no cost to them and who have asked us to bring that water up further, but the assessed valuation would have killed them. Correct? Any other comments on this particular Public Hearing? If not, I will declare the Public Hearing to be closed."

Public Hearing closed: 2:35 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 2:35 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 2:35 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing."

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 2:35 p.m., on June 17, 1997, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the consideration of the establishment of a proposed extension to the Water District to be known as Extension No. 51, Manorville."

Robert Scheiner: "Bob Scheiner, H2M Group. This hearing is being held to discuss the proposal of creating an extension of the Riverhead Water District to include 16 properties on Schultz Road in Manorville. The U.S. Department of Energy and Brookhaven National Lab has proposed to pay for the extension of public water to these 16 properties within the Town of Riverhead due to the potential contamination of the private on site wells."

The Dept. of Energy and the Brookhaven National Lab are also extending public water to approximately 1,300 homes in Brookhaven. Of the 16 lots, 14 are single family homes. One is developed as a business, Sportsman Kennels. And one lot is vacant. The nearest Riverhead Water District Main is approximately one mile away. Suffolk County Water Authority has a main that's approximately 1,000 feet away. Therefore, the Dept. of Energy has requested that the Suffolk County Water Authority main be extended to supply the 16 properties in Riverhead.

The Riverhead Water District and Suffolk County Water Authority have worked out an agreement that will pay for and repay for water. Basically buying water from Suffolk County Water Authority and the residents will-- "

Supervisor Stark: "It will become part of our District."

Robert Scheiner: "Correct."

Supervisor Stark: "The water will be supplied by the Suffolk County Water Authority. The Suffolk County Water Authority will

construct the District and we will charge them for the water used."

Robert Scheiner: "Correct. I think it's a dollar-- "

Supervisor Stark: "A dollar twenty-five per thousand."

Robert Scheiner: "Per thousand."

Gary Pendzick: "Based on the cost of what we purchase from the Suffolk County Water Authority."

Supervisor Stark: "Absolutely. In other words, we're just being a kind of a middleman here with no profit, which we don't intend to be. But it's being paid by the federal-- "

Robert Scheiner: "Dept. of Energy."

Supervisor Stark: "Dept. of Energy. Is there anybody who would like to make comment at this particular time on this particular Public Hearing?"

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. Number one, I want to clear up Mr. Scheiner's word about potential poisoning or contamination. Does that mean that it is in conflict with what Senator Amato and Congressman Forbes have come up with and they said this tritium is dangerous and leaking into the groundwater or is it okay to use it now and what they're doing with these pipes is a precaution and my last comment is we're acting as a conduit there for to carry the water from Suffolk County Water Authority to the 16 homes."

Supervisor Stark: "A conduit only on building purposes, Steve. There is concern by the federal government that because of the tritium leak at Brookhaven National Labs, that (inaudible) process it could come that way and I think what they're doing is easing the minds and bringing in good fresh water via the Suffolk County Water Authority."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay. That covers the word potential. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else who

would like to make comment at this particular time? If not, I will declare the Hearing to be closed."

Public Hearing closed: 2:40 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "I'm going to take a recess here for five minutes. We're going to be right here at the podium. There is a home rule message that I want Rick Hanley-- if somebody would get Rick for me-- and Bobby to explain to the Board. It came to our attention today and I want them to explain it to the Board so that later on-- and actually the public can hear it-- so that we understand, because this particular Resolution, the home rule message, will come off the floor. So, Rick, you want to come up? It pertains to the Greenway legislation that Senator LaValle is proposing for West Main Street to open up the vista and, Rick, you know all about it, so why don't you explain it?"

Rick Hanley: "Yes. Rick Hanley, Planning Director. The Town Board-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Well, I tell you what. We'll not take this in recess; we'll take it in open session."

Rick Hanley: "The Town Board over a year ago made a petition to the New York State DEC for a boundary amendment to the WSR line which had been established by the DEC about seven years ago. And the intent was to make for a better arrangement in terms of where the boundary was, in terms of real property development."

Councilman Lull: "Rick, WSR, for everybody."

Rick Hanley: "Wild Scenic and Recreational Rivers Act. The area is scenic and the regulations are wild. So with that submission was an idea that the now regulated area and the area to be regulated which is south of the highway, should, over time, essentially be a greenway. A linear park that would run from around the Tanger development all the way-- "

Supervisor Stark: "River Road."

Rick Hanley: "River Road, all the way to downtown Riverhead. It was our intent as a Town Board to provide for an amendment to the zoning ordinance to allow owners that own property on the south side of the river to transfer the development rights to other areas within the town, with a long term goal of having that a green area.

And there is a local development corporation also that's embraced this idea and I think has already begun looking at individual properties to purchase that are improved with derelict buildings and try to create this. So this legislation essentially, I assume is legislation that provides funds for this kind of development and acquisition of property and probably requires a home rule message from the Town in order to support it."

Supervisor Stark: "Absolutely. You want to explain to them what a home rule message is? Or maybe Bobby does in legal terms. I can explain to you in a layman's term but not necessarily going to give it to you legally."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "I don't profess to know it exactly either. I have to be quite honest. What has been done is based upon the request made by the Town Board. Senator LaValle did, in fact, introduce legislation up in Albany, a Senate bill, that because of the particular provision, the State constitution requires a message, a home rule message from the municipality or local governmental agency, i.e., the Town of Riverhead, asking that-- or sending a message to the state Senate that we, in fact, also are in agreement with the establishment of this greenway and the particular proposed resolution is asking the state Senate to take that into consideration and is authorizing the Town Supervisor and the Town Clerk to execute whatever paperwork procedure is required to be filed with the state Senate, and the state Assembly in this case as a matter of fact.

Although it's only one bill being proposed at this point by the state Senate, both Houses receive a copy of the request from the Town of Riverhead."

Supervisor Stark: "Any other comments? Any questions by the board?"

Rick Hanley: "Just one aspect about home rule. This law was

established about 30 years ago and the intent is to restrict the state legislature from passing laws that affect local communities without the community having some input."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. With that, we will adjourn-- recess the Regular Town Board Meeting for a few minutes here. We are going to have a Riverhead Development Corporation members meeting. The Town Board is the members-- are the members defined in the corporate papers for the purpose of election of the records."

Meeting adjourned: 2:45 p.m.

Meeting reopened 2:47 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "I will-- let the record show that the time of 2:47 has arrived. We will reconvene the Regular Town Board meeting of June 17th. There are no further Public Hearings for today, I will recognize anybody in the audience who would like to talk to the Board on any given subject. Steve."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. Sometime back I mentioned about by the Calverton Deli all those rough holes where those trucks had to park and they go across the street to get a little lunch and coffee and you reported to me later, Jim, that you had talked to, I believe, Mr. Schwartz, of the-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Mr. Petrone."

Steve Haizlip: "Mr. Petrone, all right."

Steve Haizlip: "He's the-- I guess, the Commissioner for DOT for Long Island."

Steve Haizlip: "All right. Well, I notice-- "

Supervisor Stark: "That's a state highway. Mr. Hayduck was Commissioner for Suffolk County, but that's a state highway."

Steve Haizlip: "Yeah, all right. I know there's a Mr. Schwartz up there in that building. I didn't know if it was him. All right. So you went higher than that."

Supervisor Stark: "You happen to be in my office so I took advantage of the situation. Whether he's done anything or not, I don't know. Nothing is done yet. It sounds like it."

Steve Haizlip: "Nothing's done yet. All right. I would like to inquire about the status of Northrup Grumman (inaudible) case. I know there is a lawsuit. I believe the Town is either a friend of the court or a party to it, however you want to use legal term, and being a concerned citizen of this community, and I hate to have Bob Gaffney come and bear down on me to get more money out of my pocket and the rest of the citizens of our good town on this and you have a copy of the letter where I did my best to try to promote this to get him to pay and it's been kind of quiet, I haven't been hearing anything so I would like to ask either you or our legal beagle here, as to what is happening."

Supervisor Stark: "The point of controversy is, Steve, that Grumman said that they no longer had to pay taxes because they had vacated the site. But they had not vacated the site as of March 1, which was taxable status day. And we have the legal right to send them a tax bill. They didn't really exit the property until sometime in August. And as a result of not paying their taxes, we forwarded-- we sent them a tax bill. They didn't pay it. We have sent it to the county and the county will, if they haven't already, will be very soon, beginning litigation against Northrup Grumman and we are a part and parcel of making sure that that litigation is running properly and that we are-- returned to us the amount of monies that they owe us."

Specifically, word is up in the County Attorney's office, I can find out and I can give you an answer better tomorrow or the next day."

Steve Haizlip: "All right. About 10 years ago, as I recall the time-- I think it was 10 years ago, there was affordable housing drawing here and I know myself a big benefit was involved in the drawings-- (inaudible). I know at least one of these homes have now been abandoned and the couples have split and it's all (inaudible). Is the town on these mortgages or were they put over to the bank and the bank now has to worry about it?"

Supervisor Stark: "What location was these affordable housing?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "These are one of the four houses-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Do you know what he's talking about, Andrew? I don't either."

Steve Haizlip: "Well, the one that I am referring to, I believe is Elton Street, the one that comes down by St. John's cemetery off of Roanoke and it comes down to that deli and that gas station."

Supervisor Stark: "Continues all the way to East Main Street."

Steve Haizlip: "Yeah, that's the one I am referring about."

Supervisor Stark: "There was an affordable housing project."

Steve Haizlip: "It was in the affordable housing project."

Supervisor Stark: "Not to my recollection in the last seven or eight years."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Not that house."

Steve Haizlip: "Well, I don't know if the town put up the money to rebuild it and to renovate it, and then gave lots of people that met certain eligibility and their income, and I was just curious if-- "

Supervisor Stark: "No. Under the affordable housing, you can make application-- if you qualify, your information is accurate, and no fraudulent moves or anything else like that and we can determine that to the best of our ability, you get some assistance by virtue of affordable house and you take over the mortgage that you qualify for at a fairly attractive interest rate. So I mean actually, the town may waive the water hookup to you, things like that, but for the most part, they don't put up-- "

Steve Haizlip: "The question I'm asking, Jim, is a lot of these houses are in the state of dispair, they had to be renovated, then they were renovated-- "

Supervisor Stark: "If you're talking about down-- as you start to go down the hill past Millbrook Commons, there were-- "

Steve Haizlip: "I only know of one."

Supervisor Stark: "-- that I think a private contractor, in fact, renovated, or even built. I don't recall in my tenure, maybe you do, Victor, that-- "

Steve Haizlip: "Well, the drawing was here. That's all-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "Steve, look, we must look into it. Obviously you're confused about it. We had four separate-- we had four, five houses in another program called the Riverhead Program, which we did have lotteries for and the bank takes over the mortgage. There's a 10 year schedule where every year if there's a penalty if you want to get out of the mortgage or you sell your house, you have to pay one-tenth, two-tenths, three-tenths, let's take a look at it. I don't believe that house was in any of our programs. It could be somebody else."

Steve Haizlip: "Well, the house I'm speaking of is in the program."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, let's-- "

Steve Haizlip: "I believe I drew the name that night. It's all right. You answered the question. The bank holding the mortgage. That's all I wanted to know. All right."

Now, I would like to go to resolution 543 and I remember standing up here requesting that resolution 516 be rescinded. I believe it was in the neighborhood about six, eight months ago so to speak, and at that time the Town Attorney answered me that things were in litigation, couldn't be rescinded, and now it is being rescinded by 543 so this resolution deals with OMNI. Does that mean it's kaput now? (inaudible)

Councilman Lull: "You must be thinking of another one, Steve, because resolution 516 we just adopted on June 3rd. At our last meeting."

Steve Haizlip: "28th of June of '96, of '95-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "This is a resolution to correct resolution 516 which was appointing Alice (inaudible) as our temporary Town Board Coordinator. It had to be reworded. It has nothing to do with the-- "

Steve Haizlip: "I think I've got to go back through the record, Jim."

Councilman Prusinowski: "We-- I'm telling you, Steve, we just passed this at the last meeting. The Accounting Department did not like the way it was written-- or it was written incorrectly, I shouldn't say that. The resolution had to be corrected so we're rescinding 516 and we're doing the corrected resolution."

As far as what we did with OMNI, we rescinded the contract. Nothing has happened as far as litigation that I know of. Even though they have according to the newspaper, a site plan approval to build whatever they want to build, they don't have any customers."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay, Vic. I'm cleared up here. I see what's taken place. You have resolutions by the year; you start out at the beginning of the year-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "Right, right."

Steve Haizlip: "And what I'm referring to, I think, is '96 and this year is '97. All right. Okay. I've got it clear now."

Now, my last comment is computers and newspapers. They only print what they put into them. But then sometimes when you see the errors, then you know it don't pertain and when you read the paper that it was pertains to yourself and you don't like the comments of the (inaudible), then you don't care for what's in the newspaper."

Supervisor Stark: "We solve that by letters to the editor. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment to the Town Board at this particular time? Bill."

William Kasperovch: "William Kasperovich from Riverhead"

township. Someplace on the west side. I don't know at which point I have to give up or at which point I don't have to persist so that some attention is paid. A reputable outfit comes in with a good man as you mentioned-- as I mentioned here a little while ago, and yet nobody in the public has seen these documents. You people have seen it; people in the Town Hall have seen it and discussed it, I'm sure, on many occasions, but the public doesn't know this.

Now, I've asked time and time again, let the documents that are going to be presented at a public hearing be displayed to the public. Now, this approach doesn't seem to be held up by the Town Board. I'm not asking for a strict set in concrete rule, but at the same time, I'm somewhat annoyed that in the early part of the day these documents couldn't have been out in the corridor for the public to see. I consider myself one of the public. And these items that were discussed are not small trivia. They are major concerns. And yet there is absolutely no effort to reveal them to the public prior to the public hearing.

Now, how does somebody in the public go about trying to convince you people that this would be a good and orderly procedure? And I'll leave you with that to ponder on and we will pick it up at a future time at a future meeting. But you all know that the public has an avenue of recourse to push you to do this. Or invalidate the public hearing. And we don't want that to happen. So I think the Town Board has to lean in the direction of the public in displaying information prior to the public hearing. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Bill. Anybody else at this particular time that would like to-- Henry. I'm working towards you, Dean, relax. I know you got your hand up. I'll save you for the finale. George is not here."

Henry Pfeiffer: "Henry Pfeiffer. While we are most apt to find fault with the things that are lacking in the administration here, sometimes we find it difficult to find them, we seldom show our appreciation for the good things that you've been doing. I point out for example the strong support you've shown for the Golden Blood Donors Drive over the years. The support that you've showed us in fighting to continue the health program in the county and particularly in the Riverhead sector. And I would like to point

out and on behalf of the higher type resident of Riverhead, the senior citizen, we are entirely grateful for your support and acting as hosts for the Riverhead Town picnic at Indian Island Park last Thursday. We had some of you elected officials come down and pay your respects down there and I doubt if you got anything to eat. I hope you did. And I hope that you were able to participate in some of the activities, the golf putting, the horseshoe pitching, the attempt to put that basketball in that little round thing up on the pole, and of course we would have liked it greatly had you been around for the line dancing where we had some 34, 40 of our local Rockettes and they were keeping time more or less to the music. But they participated.

And then you missed the most stellar performance you ever seen. We wound up with two (inaudible), who were a tribute to geriatrics, to the sustainment of physical development and-- "

Supervisor Stark: "This is completely new for me."

Henry Pfeiffer: "-- of that rubber or synthetic girdles. It was tremendous. They were terrific and what we've decided next year is incorporate the striptease with the line dances, we can have 30 or 40 stripteasers out there at the same time. But it was thoroughly enjoyable and the thing that made it work best was that these hundreds of, I don't know, what you call them, quintessence evolution through the millenia-- you know evolution that scientific theory that the advanced forms evolved from rudimentary forms, but we had a lot of the advanced forms out there participating and they enjoyed themselves-- I enjoyed them and they asked me to express their gratitude for you people at being close to us. We look forward to seeing you there next year and we look forward to -- say hoping that you provide us with the same effort and we'll get you seats up front for the stripteasers."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Henry. And I apologize. I wasn't able to make it this year because I never did get out of the office. I was in here very busy. But I hope the weather was as fine as the picnic we had out here on the sidewalk."

Henry Pfeiffer: "I don't know how you do it, but every year you manage to come out from behind the clouds and shine on us."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, it's great days for common interest and common entertainment amongst good friends. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment-- Dean."

Dean Terchunian: "Good afternoon. My name is Dean Terchunian and I'm from Riverhead. I would like to make a comment about this time that the public has to address the Town Board. This is a privilege that we have as citizens of the United States of America, and it's a chance for us to get up in public and give our thoughts to not only the public that's attending, but to the Town Board so they hear how some people feel in this Town about some subjects.

I was here two weeks ago speaking on several items, and after reviewing the show on Channel 27, while I was up here I knew that I was constantly being interrupted by Mr. Stark and Mr. Prusinowski, but when I watched the show I really realized how rude both of you were to me. I don't appreciate it and if you're that way to other people I'm sure they don't appreciate it."

Supervisor Stark: "That might go vice versa, too."

Dean Terchunian: "Well, I tried to address subjects and this is the time of the meeting for that. I was unable to complete sentences at times at the last meeting. This is not the way you should treat people who get up here to speak. And I'd like to address the other three members of the Board to ask them if they notice this happening, to please try to correct the situation. It's not fair to the people who get up here and speak."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Dean, Dean, I've been here for 16 years and I can tell you that I've treated people very fairly when I come up the microphone. Now, if the News Review is here taking pictures because apparently this is some set up story for the politics. But the bottom line is that you were rude in some response because you made conclusions and I would be happy to have a nice debate with you like I've had in the past, so I don't accept your demeanor that I've been rude to you. So if you have some points today, let's get on with it."

Dean Terchunian: "What you just did, Mr. Prusinowski, is an example of what I'm speaking about."

Councilman Prusinowski: "That's your opinion. Well, I don't need for you to correct my demeanor as a public official up here because I have a track record for 16 years and I'm very accommodating, I speak to the people, I enjoy speaking to the people, but if you have something that you want to generally talk to us about, we would be happy to have an intelligent dialogue. What your doing is editorializing and playing politics. Okay. This has everything to do with politics and nothing to do with public policy. And I know the difference because I've been in politics for 20 years. There's good government and there's politics. What you're doing is politics. Okay. And that's the bottom line. So let's get on with it."

Dean Terchunian: "That might be your opinion, Mr. Prusinowski, that I'm up here-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "That's right. And we're entitled to our opinion. I'm going to interrupt you again. That's my opinion. Your opinion is that you're a statesman and you're up here doing your statesman thing. That's okay. We have a difference of opinion."

Dean Terchunian: "Let me inform you that I'm up here as a citizen of Riverhead."

Councilman Prusinowski: "That's correct."

Dean Terchunian: "And whatever you read into it is your opinion."

Councilman Prusinowski: "That's right."

Dean Terchunian: "This is not a political move by me."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay."

Dean Terchunian: "And if you need me to state that before I ask my questions, I will."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay."

Dean Terchunian: "Now, that was the first item that I wanted

to talk about. The reason why I didn't type these up for you this week is because I didn't appreciate the way I was rushed through my questions at the last meeting. So I'll submit my written questions to you tomorrow.

Are there any other resolutions that aren't listed in our agenda for today?"

Supervisor Stark: "We're going to have a resolution on the home message rule."

Dean Terchunian: "Besides that one?"

Barbara Grattan: "Food."

Councilman Wittmeier: "We're rebidding on a food bid."

Dean Terchunian: "Okay."

Councilman Prusinowski: "And I have one that was pulled off the agenda for some reason awarding a bid, for Meetinghouse Creek."

Dean Terchunian: "Thank you. The next item is something I read in the paper in the News Review last week. It talked about a transfer station on Kroemer Avenue and that the Riverhead Town Board wants to be lead agency in that endeavor. Is that correct what was stated in the paper and the Town resolution that was passed on that?"

Supervisor Stark: "I haven't seen a resolution."

Dean Terchunian: "Okay. Well, I just read it over in the Town Clerk's office earlier today."

Councilman Prusinowski: "What we did was we neg dec'd the application. In this particular case, Dean, the Part 60 regulations that are required by the State of New York, the facility is far more reaching than SEQRA, the book is about this thick, and the Planning Department staff has recommended to the Town Board that we use that as a basis for the review for the site plan. In fact, the Planning Board Chairman I believe is also quoted in that story. I said identically the same thing."

Dean Terchunian: "So what I'm addressing you on is this possibility of a transfer station at Kroemer Avenue. To me, it doesn't make sense and I'll state a few reasons why. One is it's within 1,000 feet of our river, Peconic River. Number two is, it's within 1,000 feet of Glenwood Village where a lot of senior citizens live and number three, it's within 1,000 feet of Tanger Mall. Now there was a statement in that article by some representative of George's Sanitation or whatever company you want to call it now, that says that this will be an enclosed building and there will be no smell.

Now, unless I was born yesterday, I can't understand how anybody can make a statement that there won't be any smell from garbage. But that's what the person made and that's what I read in the paper. I'm voicing my objection right now to any further continuance on a transfer station on Kroemer Avenue. This is where we have our gateway into Riverhead. We have our gold crown of Tanger Mall there and we're going to put a transfer station for garbage that close to all that. That doesn't make sense. So I would like to consider that in any future research into this transfer station.

Now, you might want to consider using our existing Town landfill as a transfer station and sell that property to George's Sanitation or whoever-- whatever company that they call themselves at this point in time. But, I, myself, will voice very strong objections, and I don't even live near it. It just doesn't make any sense.

The last item I want to talk about, so you know that I'm coming to a conclusion, is I noticed over the years that the Town did as much as it could to assist Tanger in putting in the Tanger Mall and the salaries there are probably not very high except for maybe managers, probably five to eight dollars an hour would be a pretty good estimate. I would like to know why the Town Board did not make any effort as far as the public and myself from what I've read in the papers and heard, any effort to keep AMP Circuits which paid jobs of ten, to fifteen to twenty dollars an hour, where we lost over 400 jobs in the Town of Riverhead, the type of jobs that support families, not McDonald's type of jobs such as Tanger gives us. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment at this particular time? Steve."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. Thanks for letting me back. I overlooked one of my little scribbles here. This here particular subject you may think more of me but I hope you don't think less of me. The president of the Calverton Civic Association and myself the other day was talking that with all these developments that's coming into this town and all these water mains that you want to lay, these roads have got to be rebuilt. They are getting to be (inaudible) and especially Edwards Avenue going north and River Road. I know it's a (inaudible)-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "Steve, didn't you forget that the Town Board authorized a three million-- was it two million-- two million dollar road bond?"

Steve Haizlip: "I thought that was down there."

Councilman Prusinowski: "No, no, no. That's all over Town. And Edwards Avenue is scheduled to be repaved."

Steve Haizlip: "Going north."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Yes."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay, Vic."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Yes, in fact, I have a schedule on my desk I would be happy to give you to take back to the Association. Charlie gave me a schedule of all the roads we are going to put (inaudible) seal on or grit and mostly asphalt. I would be happy to give you those schedules."

Steve Haizlip: "All right."

Councilman Prusinowski: "It affects all the roads that he deemed necessary to be repaved according to what you said throughout the entire town. From Wading River to Laurel."

Steve Haizlip: "All right. Taking up on what Dean said there, I had advance notice a long time ago about this George's transfer

station and I believe-- and I mentioned it one day before a Town Board member and at that time it didn't sound like it was going to fly. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else? If not, let us take up the resolutions."

Resolution #517

Supervisor Stark: "Before we-- Rick, we're going to be coming to Resolution #532. Rick, would you make comment on this for the pleasure of the Board?"

Rick Hanley: "Yes. Rick Hanley, Planning Director."

Supervisor Stark: "532."

Rick Hanley: "#532 approves or proposed approval of a site plan of Nicola. That's the parcel that's on the east side of Kroemer Avenue that we spoke about in the work session and we discussed the language in the ordinance relative to this Board being able-- after a site plan review, to approve a different paving material than our specifications require asphalt. Apparently this-- what Peter said at the work session, the developer is also in the business of creating these pavers and the idea is that these pavers could be used for parking areas on the site and sidewalks as long as Mr. Bloss is happy with it.

Unfortunately when I prepared the Resolution we did not consciously recognize what the Board thought at the meeting and we are sending them off to the Board of Appeals. So I would like to try to amend that to-- rather than send it to the Board of Appeals it just provides the specifications are satisfactory with the Highway Superintendent."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay. Well, we don't have to amend it. We can amend it before it gets to a motion. So if you would take Vic's resolution and if you write that in there then we can go from there. 532 Vic. Let us take up the Resolutions."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Approves application of the Long

Island Antique Power Association. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Second."

Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?"

The Vote (Collective response): "Aye."

Supervisor Stark: "Opposed? Motion carried."

Resolution #518

Councilman Lull: "Adopts an amendment to Chapter 48 entitled Beaches and Recreation Center of the Riverhead Town Code. So moved."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Seconded."

Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?"

The Vote (Collective response): "Aye."

Supervisor Stark: "Opposed? Motion carried."

Resolution #519

Councilman Kwasna: "Awards bid for street lighting and traffic signal maintenance repair and parts. So moved."

Councilman Wittmeier: "Seconded."

Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?"

The Vote (Collective response): "Aye."

Supervisor Stark: "Opposed? Motion carried."

Resolution #520

Councilman Wittmeier: "520 accepts Suffolk County National
bank letter of credit of Ashley Homes. So moved."

Councilman Kwasna: "Seconded."

Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded. Any discussion? All
in favor?"

The Vote (Collective response): "Aye."

Supervisor Stark: "Opposed? Motion carried."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Amends application of American
Diabetes Association. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Seconded."

Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded. Any discussion? All
in favor?"

The Vote (Collective response): "Aye."
