

Minutes of a Regular Town Board Meeting held at the Riverhead Town Hall, Howell Avenue, Riverhead, New York, on Tuesday, May 7, 1996, at 7:00 p.m.

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Supervisor Stark called the meeting to order and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Henry Pfeiffer: "Ladies and gentlemen, please join with me in the Pledge of Allegiance."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. If the Board will join me down front."

Ladies and gentlemen, good evening, and welcome to our Regular Town Board Meeting. We have several proclamations. We have several important guests here tonight. This particular proclamation that we have here-- Ziggy, if you would come up. Ziggy is our local Postmaster and loyal friend. Ziggy--

WHEREAS, it is proper and fitting that the Town of Riverhead acknowledges deeds which are undertaken for the betterment of residents of the Town of Riverhead and all mankind;

WHEREAS, the Long Island Branch 6000 National Association of letter carriers working together with the United States Postal Service, Long Island United Way, Catholic Charities, Long Island

Federation of Labor, and Long Island Care Food Bank will sponsor Long Island's 1996 food drive;

WHEREAS, working together as labor and management team, the Association of Letter Carriers help to feed the men, women and children on Long Island who are less fortunate and feel the pain of hunger;

WHEREAS, Saturday, May 11th, 1996, has been declared National Food Drive Day across America and all post offices in our town will be participating in this event.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, James R. Stark, as Supervisor of the Town of Riverhead do hereby proclaim May 11th, 1996, to be Long Island Food Drive Day in Riverhead."

Ziggy Wilenski: "First of all, I'd like to thank Jim Stark and the Town Board for this proclamation today. On behalf of Tom Rosatti (phonetic) the Long Island District Manager and all employees of Long Island, especially those that are hungry. I want to thank everyone for giving us this proclamation.

Just to let some people know, last year the Long Island District collected 1.4 million pounds of food which served approximately people for six months. This year we got an ambitious goal of 1.7 million and hopefully it will be over six months that we feed the hungry here on Long Island. Food does stay on Long Island and we do feed the people on Long Island.

I'm also proud to say that there's a fellow here on the Town Board that works very hard for the hungry and it's great to have him behind me-- that's Jim Lull. Jim does a great job with his people and I have to recognize somebody from the Town Board that does feed the hungry here in Riverhead.

So I want to thank Jim at the Town Board, and thank you so much. Thank you, Jim."

Supervisor Stark: "Is Mary Brown here? Mary, would you come up? I was very fortunate today to be in Albany and I was at the Governor's mansion where also Henry Pfeiffer was up there, where the Governor signed the proclamation declaring Older Americans Month in the State

of New York. The Governor doesn't live there, he still lives down in Peekskill, I believe, but as I told Walter (inaudible) who is the Director of Aging now for the State of New York who is the local person, I said I'd take it for a residence; it's pretty nice.

But the Governor passed his wishes along and I think Henry confirmed that, that our older citizens are what we are all waiting to become. In about two weeks, I become one of those. So, Mary, we did this the other day down in the Senior Citizens and it is the proclamation which declares the month of May Older Citizens-- Older Americans Month in the Town of Riverhead. And if you would take that to the Senior Center and hang it on the wall I'd appreciate it. If you would like to say something, too."

Mary Brown: "Thank you, Mr. Stark. I really do appreciate this. You know I would like to thank the Board very much for this proclamation and just being the newly elected chairperson for the Senior Citizen Advisory Board, I do thank you very much. And I'd like to thank the Board also for the unanimous agreement for my position, and I certainly will hang this and I'll give this to the Board, we have a meeting coming up Thursday, and we certainly will appreciate this. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. I would also like to recognize -- I think we have a former Councilman, Tony (inaudible) out here in the audience, the former Town Clerk, Irene Pendzick. If you want to stand up and say hi. Harriet is here? I didn't see Harriet, I'm sorry. Former Town Councilwoman, Harriet Gilliam. I'm sorry, Harriet."

Every year the Senior Citizens Advisory Council selects the Senior of the Year, and this year we are very happy to honor Mary Hatcher and if Mary would come up, I certainly would like to read this proclamation on behalf of myself and the Board.

WHEREAS, it is proper and fitting that the Town of Riverhead acknowledge those senior citizens who have contributed to the quality of life of its residents; and

WHEREAS, Mary Hatcher is well known for her ability and willingness to assist not only the older residents of the Town of Riverhead but also its youth;

WHEREAS, Mary Hatcher has served as Secretary and Administrator of the First Baptist Church for 22 years, is President of the National Council for Negro Women Eastern Suffolk Section, and has instituted many summer programs and trips lending insight and education to seniors as well as our younger residents;

WHEREAS, it is because of her dedication and commitment to her community that Mary Hatcher has been designated as Senior of the Year 1996.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, James R. Stark as Supervisor in recognition of the many accomplishments and contributions to the Town of Riverhead do hereby proclaim-- we started a week ago, so May 1 was Mary Hatcher Day in the Town of Riverhead.

Also, I think this hangs up out in our hallway, doesn't it? You notice that your name is now on the official plaque that hangs in the hallway. So if you want to show that to everybody and give it back to us so we can hang it. Well, you can have it for a few days, but bring it back. You can't keep it at home."

Mary Hatcher: "To Supervisor James Stark and his committee, and the Town Board members and to the Advisory Council Board that I have been working with for I believe five, six years, that I enjoy so much, I am happy to receive the plaque, this proclamation from the Town of Riverhead and I want to say thank you to all of those who had anything to do with me receiving this honor. And I'm also happy to take the plaque home and keep it for a few days and bring it back to you and hang it in the Town Hall.

Thank you so much to all of you who are here tonight."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Mary. Keep up the good work. These flowers are also here, I believe your son gave them to so he wanted you to display them tonight. So we have some flowers in Town Hall for the evening.

Also, I'll let Russell do this one because he is the Director of Recreation of the Senior Citizens Program and he can actually explain to you what this particular young group does."

Russell Kratoville: "Is Mrs. Gerinski (phonetic) here? Sure,

bring the whole group up. As they are on their way up, we have the Town field which we reserve for very special people in groups in the Town and this year's senior citizen or community group of the year for senior citizens is the high school Interact group and if Mrs. Gevinski could maybe give a little brief summary of what the Interact Club has done and what-- your special event this year that you had that it was so well liked by our seniors."

Mrs. Gevinski: "The club here is doing a good job in the Town of showing that the Riverhead High School teenagers are doing wonderful things. The event that is enjoyed by the seniors is we put on a senior citizen prom each year, at which time they decorate the cafeteria, have entertainment, do some Broadway productions, jazz band, a nice dinner and it's a nice night of interracial-- not interracial-- well it is interracial-- it's a generational gathering so that teenagers think that senior citizens are great; the senior citizens think that they are great, too."

And they also during the year they do many other things. They work with the Rotary Club which sponsors them at the Riverhead Fair, and the Harvest Festival, at their spaghetti dinner, and just this past week they were building at the home in Central Islip of the Habitat for Humanity which they hope to do again in Riverhead this next year coming up.

So they are a very active group and there's a lot more than what you see up here of us but they are enjoy doing it for the Town of Riverhead. And we would like to thank you very much for this honor we did not expect."

Supervisor Stark: "It is certainly our pleasure and this is the Town seal and it says Interact Club. In appreciation for your dedication to the senior community. Because that's what you are striving to achieve, to become part of us. And you are going to get there some day and hopefully you will have high school students that will interact with you as well as you have with our senior community. I thank you and I believe Victor has got some certificates here."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I don't know-- is everybody here?"

Supervisor Stark: "No."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, we'll give you the-- we'll read the names. We'll just give them to you.

Howard Gasset, Jackie Smith, Carolyn Schmidt, Lauren Palodino, Patricia Gavinski, Catherine Burns, Rebecca Schwartz-- okay, Rebecca. We're going to read these names off. This is recognition for the club members whether they are here. Aaron Chichiken, Kevin Noehjl."

John Kramer, Brennan Zahler, John Hernandez, Michelle Atkins, and Sharon Viludis."

Councilman Prusinowski: "The artwork on the letters (inaudible). I, being Polish, it's hard for me to read it. On behalf of the Town Board of Riverhead and all the people are very proud of what you have done and congratulations and keep up the good work."

Supervisor Stark: "Anybody want to say anything? Come on."

Connie Gevinski: "On behalf of the entire Interact Club, I guess I would like to say thanks for the award for this Town seal. We didn't expect it. We have done a lot of good things as Mrs. Gevinski has said. That's basically it. Thank you very much for everything."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you and it's nice to see our community, our youth reacting. Thank you very much. Thank you."

When Jimmy came aboard we have an Anti-Bias Task Force in Town and I asked him to assume the liaison and the chairmanship on behalf of the Town Board and he accepted it and believe me he's doing one heck of a job. I'm getting a lot of good reports, so I appreciate all the work you've done. Thank you, Jim."

Councilman Lull: "The Anit-Bias Task Force has for its job basically two things. One is to be a group ready to react to situations that may exist within the Town. The second thing is to further the education of adults and children in terms of the evils of bias and prejudice. In serving this idea of educating our youth, we began a poster contest this year with the subject as cultural harmony and we have awards tonight to be given to the children whose-- some of whose posters are on the wall over there and we can be very proud of the people who participated. So before I go any further, I want to introduce the Chairman of the Anti-Bias Task Force, Gwen Branch."

Gwen Branch: "Thank you very much. I'm glad that as many children could come out and we're very thankful that each individual child that entered the poster contest. Our theme was cultural harmony in the Town of Riverhead and if you look at the top 13 awards over there, you can see the kids came up with some beautiful posters and some things that we are really considering using for T-shirts later on because we think they did a wonderful job. So I hope you all will support our children and all the efforts they made towards working together because they've done a tremendous job and to take clues from the kids.

From Phillips Avenue School, Ashley Breest. I hope I'm pronouncing these right. First place. These are first graders, too. Our second prize is to Kateria Alomena. Is she here? And our third prize winner from Phillips Avenue School is Tony Conair.

From Aquebogue School. First prize, Pat Flammia. Third grader from Aquebogue. Second prize is Alyissa Zulli, also from Aquebogue. Third prize, Allison Schumejda.

From Riley Avenue School. First prize, Ellen Dougherty. Second prize, Bryan Walsh. And our third prize, Donna Butler.

And from Pulaski Street School we have one winner, Charysse Upsher.

And from the Middle School, sixth grade, Ashley McCaffrey first prize. Congratulations. Second prize is Julie Scott. And we will make sure that Julie gets her prize. And our third winner is Lauren D'Angelo.

Congratulations to all of you. Maybe your parents might want to come up to get in the picture with them."

James Lull: "I have one thing to add and that is to let everybody know that everybody who participated in the contest will be getting a certificate and will be getting a prize as well and they will be delivered to their schools tomorrow. And I also urge everybody during our intermission or after, take a look at some of the messages that your children are sending."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Jim. Is the Labor/Management

Committee representatives here? Would you please come up. Ladies and gentlemen, this is the time of year that we recognize the Employee of the Quarter. This is a part of our opportunity to recognize those employees who have been outstanding in their jobs and dedication to the Town. Coming up is Assessor Madeline Sendlewski, Tax Receiver, Diane Stuke and Lt. Foote from the Riverhead Police Department. You are Chairman, I'll let you take over. Madam Chairman."

Madeline Sendlewski-Fedele: "Thank you, Mr. Stark. The Labor/Management Committee has the distinct honor of nominating Employees of the Quarter for outstanding service in their particular area. For the first quarter of 1996, we are very pleased to honor Officer Purik. And I'm going to call on Lt. Foote to maybe share a little bit of an experience that officer had recently and it's not the only reason why he's getting this award, but one of many reasons."

Lt. Foote: "Thank you very much. Officer Purik has been a police officer for a very short time yet he's been very professional in his duties. Chief Grattan, would you like to come up and say a few words about Mr. Purik? Chief Joseph Grattan."

Chief Grattan: "Thanks. What Lt. Foote did say, we are very proud of Mike. The Town Board honored him with a resolution honoring him last week and then-- three weeks ago, excuse me-- and now the Labor/Management Committee is recognizing him for the same act of what he did."

Five o'clock in the morning he got a call down in the Jamesport area, a woman was in labor. This woman was carrying a seven month fetus I believe. The baby was born in distress and to make a lengthy story very short, Mike performed infant CPR and the child is healthy and with us today and personally I can think of no greater feeling that Mike must have than to be able to find a baby that was born possibly dead and now the baby is with us today. Congratulations, Mike."

Diane Stuke: "I have the honors."

WHEREAS, it is both proper and fitting that the Town of Riverhead recognize the outstanding service of its employees; and

WHEREAS, in order to provide a mechanism to recognize these

employees and at the recommendation of the Labor/Management Committee the Employee of the Quarter program has been established; and

WHEREAS, Police Officer Michael Purik has dedicated himself to the service of this government and its citizens as a police officer with the Riverhead Police Department; and

WHEREAS, his service, courtesy and attitude has exemplified the highest ideals and the expression of public duty.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, James R. Stark, as Supervisor of the Town of Riverhead, do hereby proclaim May 7, 1996, to be Michael Purik Day in recognition of his being named Employee of the Quarter and I call upon my fellow citizens to join in acknowledging his service to the Town of Riverhead."

Supervisor Stark: "That doesn't mean you've got the day off. Mike, I think-- is this your wife and family? Would you like to call some of your family up? Come on. Here's his son. Mike, would you introduce your family?"

Michael Purik: "This is my wife, Kerri. My three year old, Kevin; my one year old, Christopher. I would like to say thank you very much for this. I really appreciate it. It's a great honor and I feel that any of my fellow officers that were in the situation I was in would do the same thing."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

Madeline Sendlewski-Fedele: "Officer Purik also receive a \$100 savings bond and a gift certificate for dinner. So congratulations and thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Officer. Also, honoring, we also have our PBA President, Vincent Palmer, out there. The former PBA President, Mike Zandruck (phonetic). And ladies and gentlemen, I think that concludes the festivities for the evening; now we can get back down to work. Wait a minute, I think, Jimmy, you've got one more Anti-Bias."

Councilman Lull: "If I can have Julie Scott come up. Julie Scott was one of the winners of the Anti-Bias poster contest and just

arrived. Congratulations."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay, now let us go down to work."

Is there a motion to approve the minutes of the Regular Town Board Meeting of April 16th and the Special Board Meeting of April 22nd?"

Councilman Lull: "So moved."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Seconded."

Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded. Any discussion? All in favor?"

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Barbara."

Public Hearing opened: 7:40 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 7:40 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:05 p.m. on Tuesday, May 7, 1996, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the consideration of the amendment to Chapter 48 Beaches and Recreation Centers of the Riverhead Town Code Parking and Parking Permits."

Supervisor Stark: "Yes, please. Thank you, Bob. First, let me explain to the audience that Councilman Lull is not with us tonight. His mother had an operation-- I mean Wittmeier, Otto Wittmeier, but he also had a car stolen out of the hospital parking lot. So he's trying to find transportation home tonight."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "The proposed amendment deals with the South Jamesport boat launch facility. In 1964 the Town had entered into a 30 year lease with the State; the lease expired in 1994 and as a result we added that beach area onto our list of recreational facilities and public beaches that required a permit which differentiated based upon residency, non-residency.

About a year later, we entered into some contract negotiations with the State once again. As a result, in the latter part-- I think

It was in the fall of 1995, we entered into an agreement with the State where in turn for receiving \$125,000 to use towards the improvement of the State boat ramp launching facility, we agreed that the facility would remain available for 15 years on equal access to non-residents and residents. There would not be a fee differentiation.

So the proposed resolution or public notice is to amend the code to now delete that area from the section of beaches that requires a residency permit for \$75-- non-residency permit for \$75 and residency permit for \$5."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Bobby. Is there anybody who would like to comment on this particular Public Hearing? If not, I declare the Hearing to be closed."

Public Hearing closed: 7:43 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 7:43 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the hour of 7:43 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held in Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:10 p.m., on Tuesday, May 7, 1996, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the special permit petition of Mary Lou Sargent to operate a day care facility on property located on Pennys Drive, Calverton."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Barbara. Is there anybody, Counsel?"

Charles Cuddy: "Charles Cuddy, good evening. I represent Mary Lou Sargent, the applicant. She's here with me. This is an application by special permit to permit a day care center in her home located on the east side of Pennys Drive in Calverton. She's been operating the day care center there for a number of years-- anybody get concerned as to why we are putting the cart before the house, that's because she's been authorized by the State of New York Department of Social

Services to do that and unfortunately as often happens with State agencies, they indicated to her that zoning was the consideration that she could just open. Fortunately, she opened in a place in Riverhead where you can have day care centers; she has been operating one successfully for the past half dozen years.

I have a copy of her license which I'll hand up at the end of tonight's discussion here. She has the right to have 10 children between the ages of six months to 12 years in her home and she also can have two additional school age children. So it's not a large enterprise that she has but she operates on a five day week basis from 7:30 to 5:30. She has assistants; she's there full time; she's also a mother, has her young children at home so that she's quite used to the (inaudible) of children and what they do and how to control them, how to take care of them. And as I say she's been licensed by the State and continues to be licensed by the State. She gives the children every day two snacks and lunch. The children are brought by their parents; they are picked up by their parents. Day care is something undoubtedly that in our time is a very needed commodity.

She has gone before the Planning Board. The Planning Board has recommended approval of the application. This Board found that there was no significant impact on the environment and I would ask the board considering all of these elements that they continue her approval, that they grant her the special permit in the C Residence District for a day care center. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody in the audience who would like to make comment on this particular Public Hearing?"

Charles Cuddy: "Before I leave, I just would like to hand up three items. One is a copy of her license, two is a floor plan of her house, and three are a number of letters in support of her neighbors."

Supervisor Stark: "If you would give that to Barbara, Charlie. Steve?"

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. I say if the lady has been doing such a fabulous job all these years and it's a matter of administrative change and some paperwork, let her keep going."

Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody else that would like to make comment? If nobody else would like to make comment, I will declare the Hearing to be closed."

Public Hearing closed: 7:45 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 7:47 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 7:47 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:15 p.m., on Tuesday, May 7, 1996, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the special permit petition from David McCarthy for the use of an existing 2,000 square foot building as a veterinarian office on property located on Route 25A, Wading River."

Supervisor Stark: "Charlie, you are handling this."

Charles Cuddy: "Charles Cuddy, the attorney for the applicant, David McCarthy, Dr. McCarthy, who is here tonight. He is a doctor of veterinary medicine and he seeks to operate at Wading River Square which is on the northeast corner of 25A and Wading River-Manorville road and it's the most easterly building. The building formerly housed a doctor and he simply wants to go in that building and operate a veterinary office for small animals."

He wouldn't be here tonight except that I think there's an oversight in the Town code. Doctors are permitted but there is nothing that talks about vets as medical doctors. There's nothing that talks about doctors of veterinary medicine in the CR District in which it is located. That refers to the (inaudible) District; that only talks about medical doctors.

He's gone before the Planning Board; the Planning Board has not yet had time I don't believe to send this Board its recommendation but I believe it will. I know of no reason that there would be a

problem with this operation at the site. He's going to operate during usual business hours. It's a small animal type facility. There are other type of stores at the site which are similar. There are pet stores there, there is a pet supply store in there and so on.

I, again, say to you that this not anything that should adversely impact. This Board has determined that it does not affect the environment adversely and Dr. McCarthy has gone before the Wading River Civic Association. Mr. Bail has indicated to me, who is also here tonight, that that Association has endorsed this particular use at this site. And I would ask the Board to, again, grant this special permit application to Dr. McCarthy."

Supervisor Stark: "Let me ask you a question. I do believe when we are referring to this, this is going to be an animal like a hospital?"

Charles Cuddy: "It's not as much a hospital as it would be an office. In other words, it's not a kennel; it's not something that he anticipates having a number of animals there for a long term. Occasionally there's going to be an animal overnight because that happens, but it's not-- "

Supervisor Stark: "There's not an outside storage-- "

Charles Cuddy: "No. No outside kennels, no areas where they would keep or store or have animals staying."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment on this particular Public Hearing? Rick, do you have anything that you might bring to the public via the Planning Board?"

Rick Hanley: "Rick Hanley, Planning Director. The Planning Board heard this Thursday night of last week. We haven't had time to get a written resolution to the Clerk, but the Planning Board has adopted a resolution to approve it, subject to no outdoor storage or outdoor kennels operate on the site."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay, thank you. Is there anybody else who would like to be heard on this particular subject? George."

George Schmelzer: "It's too bad when it has to engage in this

bureaucratic nonsense-- hearings. Just a waste of time. You should dispense with all this nonsense and you would be doing yourselves and the people a favor. Revise all that junk you've got written up."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay, thank you, George."

George Schmelzer: "-- all these bureaucrats running around falling over each other, bothering people. That's all."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, George. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment? Yes, Bill. Things haven't changed, Irene."

Bill Roberts: "Bill Roberts, Baiting Hollow. If you run a hospital, there will be boarding for animals that are ill enough and they need storage but then you have runs where the animals can go to relieve themselves and you would have barking and this does not impact (inaudible). I'm just bringing that up."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay. Maybe the doctor would like to make comment on that so that-- "

Dave McCarthy: "Hi. My name is Dave McCarthy-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Dave, you have got to speak in close, address the Board, tell them who you are and where you are from."

Dave McCarthy: "All right. Dave McCarthy. I'm living here in Riverhead. Practicing for about 11 years out here. The facility is going to be completely contained indoors. It will be very small. I'll have two runs that are going to be indoors and they are going to drain directly down into a septic tank. In the far northeast corner there is going to be a room which I'm going to have pretty much sound proofed, not only for the surrounding people but also for myself because I have to stay there all day. And there should not be very many animals. I don't intend on leaving animals in the hospital. There will be no boarding, okay, and so as far as any overnight stays, I can't get around it in cases of severe trauma cases such as animals that are hit by cars or with gastrointestinal disorders or post-operative, you know, cases and things of that nature that need further medical management. So there will be a few animals that will stay there but the room in which they are going to be contained will be

pretty much it's on the far northeast corner away from any of the other buildings. And there should be no problem about that."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Doctor. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment on this particular Public Hearing? If not, I will declare the Hearing to be closed."

Public Hearing closed: 7:53 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 7:53 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 7:53 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:20 p.m. on Tuesday, May 7, 1996, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the consideration of amending Section 58-4A (Dogs), 58-4 Redemption of Impounded Dogs."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "I wasn't really prepared to speak on this one. It's fairly straightforward amendment. We're bringing our code into compliance with what the State Ag and Markets Law says as far as the time period for adoption of certain animals, certain dogs. Where the dog is an unidentified dog, we're going to change the time period from 10 days to five days. This was done as the result of on-going conversations between the Dog Control Officers, Councilman Jim Hall, and the RSVP Group."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Bob. Is there anybody in the audience who would like to make comment on this particular Public Hearing? Please identify yourself and where you are from."

Jeannie Levins: "Jeannie Levins. If the dogs that are only being held half as long-- "

Supervisor Stark: "And where are you from, Jeannie?"

Jeannie Levins: "Manorville. The dogs are being held half as

long, does it cost half as much? Is the budget going to be slashed?"

Supervisor Stark: "Good question. We'll have to take a look at it for next year's budget. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment on this particular Public Hearing? If not, I will close the Public Hearing."

Public Hearing closed: 7:55 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 7:55 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 7:55 has arrived. Will the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York at 7:25 p.m. on Tuesday, May 7, 1996, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the consideration of property located on 63 Bell Avenue, Aquebogue to be considered to be in an unsafe condition as described in Chapter 54 of the Code, Unsafe Buildings and Collapsed Structures, to be repaired or be secured or demolished and removed."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "While Sharon approaches, I would just like the record to note that an inspection report was done, it was on file with the Town Clerk's Office and just for the record that that be made part of the record of this hearing."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

Sharon Kloss: "I have reason-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Sharon, just tell them who you are, where you-- "

Sharon Kloss: "Sharon Kloss, Buildings Coordinator, Town of Riverhead. I had three occasions to visit the property in question. The first few times were approximately a year ago, the last time was more recently within the past few months. On the first visit, the property was in severely dilapidated condition. On visual inspection

one could determine that the building was falling to the rear, I would say approximately six inches off center in danger of collapse. The winter did not do it very much better. The building was abandoned I would say within six to eight weeks of my first visit. On my second visit, it was already not occupied. I had checked the second time to determine whether or not it was, in fact, occupied, which it was not. On the third and last visit, I determined the building to be in such condition that it was beyond rehabilitation. And that's when the report for the unsafe structure was filed.

Does anyone have any questions concerning-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody in the audience who would like to make comment on this particular Public Hearing? Steve?"

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. Apparently somebody owns this structure that's on 63 Bell Avenue. Now, was there an attempt to locate the owner in order to establish on this building whether to fix it, tear it down? The owner should be here to speak for himself."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "I believe the owner has been located and that he is-- we've currently-- "

Supervisor Stark: "He or she."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "It's a he, at least according to the records it is, and he's currently residing at the Hotel Perkins. He's been at the Town Building Department and, in fact, I don't believe he's opposed to the application. He understands that the building will have to be raised and because of its deteriorated condition be raised and knocked down."

Supervisor Stark: "And it will be put on the tax bill."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "For the record, it would be added on to the tax bill, whatever expenses there are."

Steve Haizlip: "In other words, he will bear the expense on his next tax bill?"

Supervisor Stark: "Absolutely."

Steve Haizlip: "All right. And now when this property is destroyed, taken away, put into the dump, and leave a blank spot, then there is going to be no more tax and we'll pick up the extra tax that you are used to having. Right?"

Supervisor Stark: "Well, if you want to look at it in that vein, yes. But that's much better than having some child or some innocent person killed because a building falls down."

Is there anybody else who would like to make public comment on this? Go ahead, George. George, you've been recognized, George. You have been recognized, George. Would you please go to the podium? Hold on, Sharon."

George Schmelzer: "Was this so called worthless building, useless building, assessed?"

Supervisor Stark: "It certainly was, George."

George Schmelzer: "You are paying tax on a building that's built and falling down? What kind of a tax system do you have? I didn't say the land, I said the building."

Supervisor Stark: "I'm assuming that there was some kind of tax assessment on the property and the building."

George Schmelzer: "I mean the building inself."

Supervisor Stark: "George, I don't have the records right here in front of me but-- "

George Schmelzer: "Well-- "

Supervisor Stark: "If you would like to have that information, I certainly can obtain it for you tomorrow morning."

George Schmelzer: "It should be here. He ought to get his tax money back then if you are going to charge him for taking the building down. The poor guy lives in a hotel, he's probably not in good health, that's why he's there. Where is this place anyway?"

Supervisor Stark: "Off of Hubbard Avenue."

George Schmelzer: "Hubbard Avenue? Across from where the duck farm was?"

Supervisor Stark: "Yes. Okay?"

George Schmelzer: "Maybe somebody would need that to get out of the rain."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, George. All right. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment at this particular time? If not, I will declare the Hearing to be closed."

Public Hearing closed: 8:01 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 8:01 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 8:01 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:30 p.m., on Tuesday, May 7, 1996, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the consideration of an amendment to the Zoning Use District Map to provide for the Residence at the intersection of Fresh Pond Avenue and South Path in Calverton."

Supervisor Stark: "Is Rick around? Is Rick out there?"

Rick Hanley: "This is a motion of the Town Board to provide for the Residential A Zoning Use District in conformance with the zoning ordinance and to the exclusion of the Residential C Zoning Use District which exists on South Path or in the vicinity of South Path in Calverton. This motion of the Board is in response to recommendations of both Calverton Hamlet Study and the Planning Department. The reasons for this particular change had to do with existing Article 6 regulations which regulate the area of lots within this

vicinity. The present zoning provides for 20,000 square foot lots whereas the Health Department requires 40,000. The area involves about 20 vacant parcels of real property, all of which would conform to the area (inaudible) of the new zoning."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Rick. Is there anybody who would like to make comment on this particular change. What we are basically doing is bringing this up to code according to the Board of Health. Thank you. Anyone who would like to make comment on this particular-- if not, I will declare the Hearing-- George, what do you want? Do you want to get on TV every Public Hearing? Okay. Go ahead, George. As long as you put it that way."

George Schmelzer: "I don't quite understand what this is all about. You should explain it better."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, he can try it again for you."

George Schmelzer: "He doesn't understand it either."

Supervisor Stark: "And if you don't understand it after that one, you certainly can come see him out in the hallway and he'll give you a more fine tuned one."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Jimmy, Jimmy. George. Basically the way the property is zoned now, you cannot develop it according to the Health Department regulations. So we're changing the zone so the Health Department regulations and the Town zone that we're changing it to conforms so the guy can do something with the property. That's basically what we're doing."

George Schmelzer: "Well, that's the Health Department's problem. Why do we have to-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, no, it's everybody's problem because the Health Department regulates all the lands."

George Schmelzer: "Well, they might change it and the guy could be stuck. I mean the guy has a half acre lot, he can't use it?"

Rick Hanley: "Jim, could I just-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Yes. George, listen very carefully this time. George, you can have a seat, please."

Rick Hanley: "The area in question is on South Path and as Victor said and as Jim said the Suffolk County Health Department requires a 40,000 square foot area for each lot. Our zoning mandates 20,000 square feet presently. All of the lots within the area, these are areas just north and south of South Path in Calverton-- each one of the subdivided lots already conforms to the Health Department requirements such that there is not a non-conforming lot created by this action of the Board. There was a subdivision that was approved by the Planning Board in Residential C or 40,000 square foot lots."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay. Thank you, Rick. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment on this particular Public Hearing? If not, I declare the Hearing closed."

Public Hearing closed: 8:05 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "That finished up the Public Hearings for this evening. I will now recognize anybody in the audience who would like to address the Board on any given subject. Yes, ma'am. I'm not going to call on George for a while. I'm going to get rid of his audience first. Yes, ma'am."

Kathy Long: "Okay, my name is Kathy Long. I live in Sun Up Estates in Aquebogue. I'm sure you guys are pretty familiar with the area being that we are having a lot of trouble and difficulties with (inaudible) and Richard Mohring for letting the bond expire. Myself and members of my community have come down here to ask the Town to please come in and pave the potholes that are in this road-- on these roads. The roads are horrendous down there."

While we appreciate the fact that the Town Highway Department coming in and plowing the neighborhood and doing a great job that they did in and out of the neighborhood, in doing so they have torn up the roads tremendously that we feel unsafe for us to drive on, unsafe for us to walk on and for the children to even play on. We know that the Town is in a legal bind right now with Richard Mohring. And we understand it's going to take you guys some time to get over

the legal (inaudible) of it all but we're waiting patiently for this whole problem to be solved but in doing so we would like you to come down and fill the potholes and we were down at Mesta Vista a couple of days ago, I spoke with a woman over there who represents their group and she told me that the Town was in there, filling the potholes in there and we feel if they can go in there and do it there they can go and do it in our neighborhood. We feel that we're getting shafted a little bit because the Town is getting quite a large tax base-- property tax base from that development because there are 60 houses in there. We only have 15 in our neighborhood currently. We also have a load of garbage that people just keep coming in, dumping. We have trees, we have debris, we have sheetrock, we have sliding glass doors, we have peat buckets, we have cement. We would like to know if we could be afforded the same opportunity that the residents of Mill Brook Gables were afforded and see if we can get a dumpster or two down into our neighborhood so we can have a community cleanup day also."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

Kathy Long: "Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "I'll ask Charlie to-- "

Kathy Long: "Well, I would like to give-- "

Supervisor Stark: "That's fine."

Kathy Long: "If you could ever take a ride out there you would know what it's like. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else who would like to address the Board on this particular-- or on any given subject? Yes, ma'am."

Wendy LoGrande: "Hi. My name is Wendy LoGrande. I'm also representing Sun Up Estates. I'm one of the residents over there. I just want you to know this is a safety issue with us. There are over 17 young children under the age of 13 in the neighborhood, mostly are toddlers and this has to be a first priority-- with us it is-- and we hope that it is with you. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Yes. It is. Thank you. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment? Yes, ma'am."

Brenda Booker: "Hi. I'm Brenda Booker and I live at Millbrook Gables. And I just want to know what's going to happen with the development. Are you going to redevelop it-- "

Supervisor Stark: "There are two outfits that are studying it right now that will probably be coming to us with some ideas on how to make it much like they did the one in Islip-- Carleton Park. Both of them are due in momentarily. And then I was going to get a hold of Gwen and Mac and Charlie-- I can't remember Charlie's last name. Ramsey-- and we would have a, you know, kind of an informational meeting. But we are working on it.

Is there anybody else who would like to make comment to the Board? Yes, ma'am."

Claire LaToure: "Good evening. I'm Claire LaToure, President of Polish Town Civic Association, an organization of volunteers-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Claire, just bend that microphone down. Yes, that's it. Good."

Claire LaToure: "-- dedicated to the improvement of Riverhead in general, and to Polish Town in particular. For 20 years our organization has painted, raked, cleaned, built, bought land, created special attractions and publicized our Town. Two years ago, we were told that curbs and gutters would be installed around (inaudible) Park. We asked again last year and they are yet to be installed. Is there any chance that the curbs and gutters will be installed by August of this year? Our fair is coming up.

Number two, two years ago we were told that an application for grant money to improve the parking lot on Pulaski Street had been approved. Last year we were told that the County was holding up the granting of the funds. Are there plans to complete the job this summer? We fear the loss of the funds if they are not used and when will it be done? We hope to utilize this parking area during the street fair and will have to make other arrangements if it is under construction.

Number three is the lamp posts. We understood, excuse me, I'm nervous."

Supervisor Stark: "Don't be nervous, Claire."

Claire LaToure: "That there were sufficient funds for two more lamp posts to be placed in front of St. Isidore's Church. If this is so, could they be installed and finished?"

This may sound like a long list, but it really covers over two years and we think Polish Town has been patient. We would appreciate your attention to these matters and solutions as quickly as possible. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Stark: "No problem. If you think you are nervous here, wait until you get up front of 50,000 people because you are going to have to address opening day, won't she?"

Claire LaToure: "Yes, but my feet will be tapping to the music."

Supervisor Stark: "That is true. I think-- we won't lose the money. I think the last time that your group was in front of us that we were waiting for the contract. Sometimes a contract takes almost a year for it to be signed. Those contracts have been signed and I do believe that they are on the work schedule for Kenny Testa. I can find out tomorrow morning, Claire."

Claire LaToure: "I asked Ken about a month ago."

Councilman Prusinowski: "The curbs and gutters Charlie is doing."

Supervisor Stark: "Charlie is doing the curbs and gutters."

Claire LaToure: "But I did ask him about the lamp posts two months ago and he said he knew nothing about them."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, that comes out of the Community Development Agency. He wouldn't know it until he gets the work order to purchase them."

Claire LaToure: "Well, I did promise the good Lord above that I wanted two lamp posts in front of the church so that it wouldn't rain

fairly."

Supervisor Stark: "Good."

Claire LaToure: "Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "I'll give you a call, Claire. I'll look into it tomorrow morning."

Claire LaToure: "Okay. Thanks."

Supervisor Stark: "No problem. Yes, ma'am."

Toni Litka: "Toni Litka. I'm a resident at Mesta Vista. Could somebody please fill us in on what's going on? We don't know what's going on. Promises, promises and rumors and rumors."

Supervisor Stark: "Steve. I'll run the show, all right. Just don't shout at him, Steve. Steve."

Toni Litka: "We've been patiently waiting. With Sun Up's problems, we're one step ahead of them. Our potholes were filled. We thanked the Town for it. I don't know whose responsibility that was but now rumors are I guess this or next week we're supposed to get our roads paved. And how are we doing with Mr. Mohring?"

Supervisor Stark: "Bobby, do you want to bring her up on that?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "As you know, Mr. Mohring, which is actually Mohring Enterprises, Inc., the corporation, was brought into Court by the Town. We had initiated a summons and complaint involving both subdivisions, the Sun Up and Mesta Vista. Approximately three weeks back, four weeks back, counsel for Mohring Enterprises, Inc., Mr. Mohring, myself, the Board was aware of it, had met. He has proposed a stipulation which would entail him to finish the roads at Mesta Vista not later than August 1. The stipulation in accordance with our conversations was sent to him. I'm waiting a response back from counsel in that regard. And I think that's the best I can tell you at this point in time."

I'll certainly give legal counsel a call tomorrow about the status of that stipulation and if you wish I can give you a call at

that time."

Toni Litka: "I would appreciate it because I've called myself a few times. I've spoken to different Board members and my calls were never returned."

Mark Kwasna: "You can't say they were never returned."

Toni Litka: "But we have high hopes that the roads are being completed."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "He has orally agreed to the terms of the stipulation. We might be fighting over the legalese of the interpretation, but-- or the stipulation-- but I think we're close to working out the terms. As I indicated, he has a time element built-- or I put a time element in to the stipulation which provides that he will do the same not later than August 1. If he should default, he's agreeing to give the Town a confession of judgment for the amount of the improvements, at which time the Town can file the confession of judgment and hopefully proceed in that basis."

Toni Litka: "He will pay for it, not us?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "Well, that's the concept of the stipulation. Yes."

Toni Litka: "Did Richard-- did he turn up at that meeting? Or did he just send his-- "

Robert Kozakiewicz: "No. He was present with counsel."

Toni Litka: "He did?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "Yes. He was there."

Toni Litka: "Oh, he's getting good. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Yes, ma'am."

Mary Cholodenki: "Hi. My name is Mary Cholodenko. I'm from Sun Up Estates. I'm wondering with what you were just talking about, do we have anything saying about when Sun Up will be paved?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "Yes. Sun Up actually will be a little longer. It will be next summer. I know you don't want to hear that. There's reasons for that which I would be more than willing to discuss with you a little bit later or right now if you want to go outside and discuss it now. It involves some of the legal aspects of the case and I don't want to divulge that unless I know I have a stipulation worked out with them."

Mary Cholodenko: "Okay. I just want to say there was a three year old child that fell into a hole that's right by the drainage-- I'm not sure what you call it-- a drainage area, and the road collapsed and he fell in past his knees and it's luck he wasn't hurt. I have two young children who I want them to be able to play on the street, ride bikes and rollerblade. I moved out here to be in the country and now I have to keep my children off the streets because of the danger."

Supervisor Stark: "Really what we are trying to achieve is a stipulation of settlement that's legally binding, locked up. Once that is done, then I believe you will see the Board probably bond and do the job and then get it paid back. So these dates that you're hearing once Bobby achieves what he wants to do in the stipulation, and he appraises the Board, this Board will certainly turn around and bond that and then we've got Mr. Mohring where we want him. Okay?"

Mary Cholodenko: "Okay. All right. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment at this particular time? George."

George Schmelzer: "Have to put my glasses on."

Supervisor Stark: "Do you want mine?"

George Schmelzer: "Maybe they will fit, you never know. (inaudible) has the same glasses as I do. A week or two ago I stopped in a place in Brentwood where they sell concrete reinforcing mats. I see some there, the heaviest ones, five feet wide, ten feet long, (inaudible) six by six, welded, steel, the gauge is 00. Now I think that's about a third of an inch. I know double 0 buckshot is a third of an inch and anyway between a third of an inch and three-eighths. \$21.50 each. I was thinking if you had 30 of them, the 10 foot length

end to end, it would be 100 feet and three wide would be 15 feet, or overlap one-- one square, that would be 14 feet for boat ramps on the sound or the bay or anywhere, they would take (inaudible); the storm wouldn't push them out of the way and would cost less than \$700 plus what you would have to tie them together with. I'd suggest cable clamps. I can discuss it with somebody at Town Board because you spend big money all the time putting boat ramps up and dredging and so what and there's no end to it. So-- "

Supervisor Stark: "You have the name of that company?"

George Schmelzer: "I'll bring it over to you. I don't have it offhand."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay. Thank you. George is not done yet. Thanks, George."

George Schmelzer: "I guess you've been served in that suit, haven't you? The Pine Barrens suit."

Supervisor Stark: "Not yet."

George Schmelzer: "Not yet?"

Supervisor Stark: "No."

George Schmelzer: "Have you been ducking them or something?"

Supervisor Stark: "I was in Albany yesterday-- today-- yesterday and today and as of this morning at 11:00, nobody has been served yet."

George Schmelzer: "They know you don't come to the Pine Barrens area."

Supervisor Stark: "Oh yes I do, George."

George Schmelzer: "I don't see you there."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, you leave early."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, well, I have got a final copy that explains what's going on. I'll give it to the Board, give it to you

now, okay?"

Supervisor Stark: "Okay."

George Schmelzer: "Because you might be-- you could get-- you might be put some money aside because if you lose this case, it might cost somebody some money because you (inaudible)."

Supervisor Stark: "There's some still around. No problem, George. Just give it to Barbara. Thank you, George. Is there anybody else who would like to speak? Steve?"

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. Jim I feel bad that you hollered at me but I was-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Steve, Steve, I happen to be the Chairman of this meeting here tonight. I saw the hands up. I don't need people shouting. I can see them. I can ask her. You don't have to shout at somebody."

Steve Haizlip: "I guess you were going to say it at the same time I spoke up. All right. Since we're both (inaudible) I guess we get a little mad at each other."

Supervisor Stark: "No. I got a little German in me."

Steve Haizlip: "Well, you get a little-- otherwise (inaudible) said you don't like my attitude. I have a letter that I wrote to one of the local newspapers. Now, this letter is dated February the 5th and when I wrote it to the local newspaper a Mr. William (inaudible) had criticized the community and the town and he entitled his letter, Living in No-Man's Land. Now, he had put this letter once before in another local newspaper and I responded and the editor published the letter. But this time I can't get the editor to publish the letter. So the letter is to the editor requesting equal voice prior noted and documented subject."

Information in the letter that appeared in Suffolk Life written by William (inaudible), June the 31st, 1995, entitled Living in No-Man's Land. The conditions addressed about Calverton was also reported by the Greater Calverton Civic Association to the Riverhead Town Board, 6th of June, 1995, by documentation and verbal input by

this writer which is on record and by tape. The Town Board under Supervisor James Stark, is aware and I believe is taking steps within the allowed law to correct the condition as the law allows. Mr. Hill (phonetic) be patient, the government and the law I think will proceed in (inaudible) the condition as a resolution in the near future of the Calverton area within its jurisdiction and directions of the law allowed under Mr. Stark. Steven Haizlip, Calverton Civic Association, Trustee.

Thank you for allowing me to read that letter."

Supervisor Stark: "No problem."

Steve Haizlip: "The only way to-- I could get it recognized is here by the Town Board which is by television and the citizens of the Town will now know that I have tried and I have counteracted the letter of Mr. Hill.

I would like to continue on a couple of other subjects right quick. Vic, I would like to say that you are looking in better spirits this meeting than you did the last meeting. You kind of had the impression that you didn't want to be here. And I'm going to bring up my subject again about the Montauk Bus. Now, I noticed at the work session that everybody that was doing anything wrong and wasn't living up to what they said they were going to do, they were being called in on the carpet and they were being asked to correct these violations and wrongdoings. So when a man stands up here and says what he's going to do, park and ride, and he hasn't ended up doing it, then I think some action should be taken and if he would have said that night here that he wanted to develop a school bus ground, I don't believe there would have been any argument and he could have went forward. But when he stands up and says I'm going to develop a park and ride for 70 cars and by the way the bus I see turned out to be a dud. All it was was a bus with the back end part and it was red and white and made it look like that. So I say I've got no objections with the man operating it but let's get a site plan a revision and say we are going to operate school buses. And we have an intention of operating park and rides and tour buses to these airports as we previously stood up here and said we were going to do.

Now, if-- when George spoke-- I don't know his last name, the fellow that's in the wheelchair-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Richardson."

Steve Haizlip: "I know his first name."

Supervisor Stark: "Richardson."

Steve Haizlip: "George Richardson. When he spoke about we have insufficient handicap areas, we do. Over by Caldors and different places around here and Waldbaums, we just don't have enough handicap parking areas. And I would like to see some more provided. There's a lot of heart attacks and heart condition people, because they are all living better through chemistry and they're able to walk a short distance but not way out in the field. So I would like to see a little help on that, please."

And, you may not like to hear my next subject, but the truth is the truth. In these fire zone spots, I have noticed that the bicycle patrol would go up to a fire zone spot and a guy will be parked or a lady, and maybe they are waiting for somebody to come out of the drug store or what have you, and they will write them up. But yet the armored truck could be parked over there by Waldbaums and a construction truck could be parked over here and everything is fine. So I mean shouldn't the bill fit everybody? All right. Thank you for your time, Jim, that's all I have to say."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Steve. Yes, ma'am."

Jeannie Levin: "May I ask-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Would you please identify yourself for the record, please?"

Jeannie Levin: "Jeannie Levin, Manorville."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

Jeannie Levin: "May I ask why Riverhead has no animal rescue facility, only a dog control place? And from what I've read, heard and smelled of that place, it sounds like it's pretty bad."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, I think you've read some old newspapers. Maybe the newspapers will bring you up to date."

Jeannie Levin: "Anyway is it a-- "

Supervisor Stark: "We just spent a lot of money up there that-- as a matter of fact, I'll let Jimmy Lull answer this because he has more first hand knowledge."

Councilman Lull: "In talking about why we have simply a pound, you have to realize that the State inspectors that come around from the State to look at the dog pounds and other shelters each year and they do evaluate our pound, have never had any problem with the pound in terms of State law. But they tell us that the biggest movement they see across New York State is that communities are moving away from it completely. Are simply saying if somebody calls with a dog problem, to simply give them an SPCA number and have them call wherever they may be New York City or wherever it is."

There is nothing that says that any municipality needs to keep such a facility. Over the years, Riverhead has kept its dog control program and has kept the dog pound active and as I said active in a way that it meets minimum requirements. Over the last three months or so significant improvements have been made at the dog pound, significant movements which will make-- which have made the dog pound a more humane place. I know where of I speak; I adopted an animal out of there last week.

And changes which have made or will make-- we're passing a law tonight which will make adoption from such a facility a better possibility, making it much more user friendly. As a matter of fact, members of the shelter volunteer group are up there tonight and will be up there Thursday night keeping the pound open two nights a week for adoption purposes which is the primary reason for that.

Anyway, that's the-- "

Jennie Levin: "Well (inaudible) telling me that Riverhead isn't doing much for dogs or anything (inaudible) in your opinion."

Councilman Lull: "No, you didn't listen to what I said."

Jeannie Levin: "I listened very carefully."

Councilman Lull: "No, you didn't. Riverhead does not do any-

thing for cats. We do not have a cat, we do not have an animal control system. Okay? We do not have the facility. We don't have-- "

Jeannie Levin: "Why?"

Supervisor Stark: "Because we don't have one."

Councilman Lull: "We don't have the money. There is-- you would be very hard pressed to find many any municipalities that do provide animal facilities-- do provide cat protection or protection from cats. Sure we do. If somebody calls my office, I put them in touch with a humane society volunteer or a humane society inspector if that's what's necessary. Those things are taken care of."

Jeannie Levin: "Brookhaven and I think Islip does it. Is Riverhead so far from those places?"

Supervisor Stark: "You know Brookhaven does it?"

Jeannie Levin: "Takes cats. I know they did. I know very well that they did in '76 when they took my cat."

Supervisor Stark: "You live in Brookhaven?"

Jeannie Levin: "Yes."

Councilman Lull: "Brookhaven is in a position where they are about to move away from the Town facility. We are not in a position of wanting to move away from the Town facility. Southold has done that and they have not had the most effective plan. Our plan right now has been to take what we have and make it more effective, which we have done. We have adopted more animals out of there in the last three months than what we probably adopted all of last year. So the idea of being humane to the animals is something which is very important to those of us here, to the volunteers who work there."

Jeannie Levin: "Well, doesn't-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Ma'am, I'm going to close this. There are other people who would like to speak here tonight. Thank you for coming to the microphone. Yes, ma'am?"

Pat Murphy: I'm Pat Murphy from Aquebogue. I'm here in regard to the Iron Pier Town beach in Jamesport which is a disgrace to the Town. I want to know if the parking area will be cleared of sand and water as it is impassable now. Also it is too dangerous to sit on the beach on a Sunday afternoon because of the bikes racing back and forth. Is this allowed on the Town beach?

I have been going to this beach since I was a child and I've never seen it so bad. What is going to be done there? Can't some funds be spent there instead of all the other beaches for a change?"

Supervisor Stark: "You want an answer right now?"

Pat Murphy: "Yes."

Supervisor Stark: "They can (inaudible) the beach and if a police officer does see them, they will-- the bikes will be confiscated-- I believe they can be confiscated and they would be written a ticket. We are in a process with the DEC trying to get permits to-- and I believe we've been in that process now for four years, the beach-- the parking lot will be cleaned. The beach will be cleaned as we get closer to Memorial Day. And once the DEC gives us permits, I believe this Board and the previous Board was committed to improving the beach. I, too, grew up on that beach. We took swimming lessons, if you remember."

Pat Murphy: "Right."

Supervisor Stark: "In the cold water. Is there anybody else who would like to make comment? Yes, ma'am."

Ann Miloski: "Ann Miloski and Pat just cleared the field for me so I'll also talk about Iron Pier. We went down there today and we are ready to put our boat in the water and it would be totally impossible. We are also requesting the Town Board to please get that boat ramp fixed so we can down to the beach."

Supervisor Stark: "We're waiting for the material to come in, Ann, and once it comes in-- Harriet. And then we're going to take up the resolutions."

Harriet Gilliam: "Harriet Gilliam, Riverhead. I have a couple

of questions for the Board. The first one is has the Town Board in your capacity as the Community Development Agency Board taken any steps to establish any type of management oversight with regards to the operations and finances at Okeanos Center?"

Supervisor Stark: "Give me that one again. I was reading also at the same time."

Harriet Gilliam: "Okay. Has the Town Board in its capacity as the Community Development Agency Board taken any action to establish any sort of a management oversight with regard to the finances and operations of the Okeanos Preview Center?"

Supervisor Stark: "We have (inaudible) and we have two members of our staff as you well know that are on that Board."

Harriet Gilliam: "Well, I think the concern is that there has been some recent press indicating some difficulties-- financial difficulties with the center and I believe when I was a member of the Town Board we had talked about a process whereby there could be a management team placed there to oversee the finances and operation to ensure the investment that had been made by the Town. Has that taken place?"

Supervisor Stark: "I believe that's what-- you answered your own question really that the previous Board-- that's why we have two staff members that are on that Board. Also, when-- being from the previous Board, you also know that Okeanos did come to us and we all knew well that they were in some kind of a financial trouble at the time. But that's where our management oversight or reporting comes from."

Councilman Prusinowski: "If I may, just more specifically, Harriet, Jack Hansen who is on the Finance Committee, who is on the board, we have the books downstairs and we're administrating the book-work so the tax-- in other words the oversight is in this building now. Okay?"

Harriet Gilliam: "Okay, all right, and my second question is I had recently in one of the papers that the Town was going to provide payment for the payroll of Okeanos. Is that so?"

Supervisor Stark: "We lent them back some money, yes."

Harriet Gilliam: "Okay."

Supervisor Stark: "Under a legal document agreement."

Harriet Gilliam: "All right. Could I just ask what was the source of that money and this was a loan agreement?"

Supervisor Stark: "Yes."

Harriet Gilliam: "And from what source did the money come?"

Supervisor Stark: "The source came from the rent that they had paid us. We actually lent them back the same rent."


