Councilman Prusinowski: "Thank you very much. The time for the first Public Hearing has not arrived, so I'll entertain anybody from the audience who has anything to say to the Town Board. George?"

George Schmelzer: "Two items. I remember a couple of years ago when Dr. Flores was within a few feet of the half mile limit-- inside

it-- that the DEC imposed upon us through our good Senator LaValle, took him almost two years to put a ramp for the disabled people. Now we got a hornet's nest of lawyers down here at the corner of Griffing Avenue and Second-- they put up a big building in short time and no trouble at all-- very strange. Well, lawyers, what do you expect? And they said it was an addition-- well the tail is bigger than the dog. Now it took almost two years for the doctor to do it, but these guys down here are very short. That's all I got to say. I don't say they should be denied, but why the difference in treatment?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, because subsequent to the doctor with the handicap ramp, the boundary was moved and right now, that particular part of Town where Twomey, Latham & Shea are putting on their extension is no longer in the Rivers Act."

George Schmelzer: "Down here?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Right."

George Schmelzer: "Who took it out?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, we, the Town of Riverhead, fought and to have those boundaries changed. The Senator was here on Friday and the Board members have asked him to consider our Planning Department's recommendations to alter the Scenic Rivers and Wildlife Act even further."

George Schmelzer: "How far down?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, we have some ideas on the boundary and we also want to change some of the development regulations, George, because it took, for example, Danowski's Fish Market, almost a year and half to move across the street."

George Schmelzer: "Well, they should put some of the dead fish in LaValle's back yard, maybe. So, how about Calverton?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "The-- most of the 2900 acres inside the fence is not part of the Scenic Rivers and Wildlife-- "

George Schmelzer: "No, I mean part of that crazy deal with the fence, I mean where the fish and wildlife preservation so called. Then

that affected Dr. Flores. You said you backed it down a way."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, that was the Scenic Rivers and Wildlife Act."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, whatever you call it, yeah. How far back you want to propose to back that down?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "I have to look at the map. It's only, you know, I don't know off hand, I don't remember. But it's quite significant."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, you don't know-- it probably doesn't touch Calverton at all."

Councilman Prusinowski: "George, I-- "

George Schmelzer: "That's not important enough, only around here, I guess."

Councilman Prusinowski: "No. That's not what we're saying. We didn't pass the law, if you remember, the State did."

George Schmelzer: "Well, we got another problem which is dangerous to me. We got environmental arsonists now, part of this Pine Barren deal. They recommend to burn the woods off to keep them (inaudible) so they won't become oak. Now, maybe they should have their heads examined, maybe they have mental problems."

Councilman Prusinowski: "George-- "

George Schmelzer: "I got copies of it I'll pass out to you."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I understand. We're going to have a public information meeting in the next several weeks. We have-- we're going to authorize the Clerk tonight to publish an ad, but we're not going to set the day yet. We're waiting from some information from our State Senator whether or not there's going to be an extension on this and whether or not our March 14th deadline is going to actually be the deadline we have to vote. And at that hearing, or at that public information meeting, the members of the Pine Barrens staff who put this thing together will be here and you will have plenty of opportunity then,

George, to tell them what you think of the plan."

George Schmelzer: "Well, I can tell you now what I think of it."

Councilman Prusinowski: "But I know what-- how you think of it. I know how we think of it and we want you to say it again for the record when we have the-- "

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, I'll give you copies of these so you can -- about these environmental arsonists."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay. Good. Henry?"

George Schmelzer: "Do you want five copies or three?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Yeah, five. We only have three-- we have four members left, there's three of them here tonight, so-- "

George Schmelzer: "That's right-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "I'll take whatever you got."

George Schmelzer: "I don't have any-- enough for retired ones here."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Jimmy is still on vacation. He'll be back on Thursday."

George Schmelzer: "Don't got too many."

Henry Pfeiffer: "Henry Pfeiffer, Wading River. I've just got two questions that you might want to clarify for me. I was driving east on Main Street and it occurred to me that I've seen no activity regarding the Suffolk Theatre. I think it's almost about a year and a half ago it was approved to have it refurbished and I've seen no activity in that regard."

And the second thing was a few weeks ago we discussed the parking meter set up and have we decided whether or not the fees are going to be increased or are we going to get rid of the parking meters totally? Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski: "As far as both issues, the first issue is the repair of the roof is ongoing with the Suffolk Theatre. And the outside facade. So there's work still going on in that particular phase. The Town Board has not yet met with the consultants who did the report for the East End Arts and we haven't decided yet as a Board what we're going to authorize for the interior renovations, because we want to get a direction for the-- for what the Theatre is actually going to be used for. And that was part of that study that it was widely reported that we're going to spend \$300,000 a year or something, which the Town Board has not approved and has not-- we haven't even discussed it yet.

As far as the parking meters, I'll defer that to Frank and Harriet because that's their-- "

Councilman Creighton: "On Wednesday night, the first of March, the owners of 134 properties in the Parking District and the tenants numbering another 150 or so in the Parking District, are invited to a meeting here at 7:00 p.m. where the subject which was approved by the Town Board to look at ways to increase the control of the Parking District by the members, the people who support it, will meet and the Town Attorney will present the results of his research on that subject. And with the idea of increasing the participation and control over the District and what happens in it by the members of the District.

I believe that sometime after that new organization or board is formed and the members are satisfied that they're adequately represented in deciding how their taxes are used, that we will have the issue of whether or not and when and what to do about the parking meters decided, and it will be decided probably by that group, not by any individual on this Town Board."

Henry Pfeiffer: "Thank you."

Public Hearing Opened 7:10 p.m.

Councilman Prusinowski: "I'll ask the Town Attorney-- I'm sorry. I'll ask the Clerk to read the notice for the 7:10 Public Hearing."

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of

Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:10 p.m., on Tuesday, February 21, 1995, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the proposed Local Law to delete and repeal the existing Chapter 65 (Flood Damage Prevention) replacing it with a new Chapter 65 of the Riverhead Town Code (Flood Damage).

Robert Kozakiewicz: "This amendment comes as a result of periodic amendments to the Flood Insurance Program, an update of the map that describes the flood area, flood study area, for the Town of Riverhead. We were put on notice from the DEC that in order to remain eligible for Flood insurance or to remain within the Flood Insurance Program, we would have to update our current statute that deals with the flood control.

The number of changes were so extensive that rather than trying to do it section by section, we are repealing the existing Chapter 65 and replacing it with an updated, modified, Chapter 65 which will make reference to the updated study maps and some of the other matters that were asked for by the DEC. So that's the purpose of today's meeting, to discuss this particular Public Hearing."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay. Is there anyone in the audience who would like to address the Town Board on this particular matter? Broge?"

George Schmelzer: "How do you propose to control floods on Conic Avenue in the parking lot? I don't think you can."

Councilman Creighton: "I don't think that's the subject of the-- "

Robert Kozakiewicz: "This hearing is not to determine how to control flooding. This hearing is to modify our current Chapter 65 in order to remain eligible for flood insurance monies. That's the purpose of the hearing."

George Schmelzer: "Then I don't know what all that gobbleygook means. What do you do?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "Well, the bottom is in order to remain in the Flood Insurance Program, we have to stay current with what they ask us to do."

George Schmelzer: "What do they ask you?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "They're asking for additional amendments to the present code which incorporates their most recent study area map for areas that are prone to flooding."

George Schmelzer: "Please explain that."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "It doesn't address the issue of how do you control flooding. This is simply a matter of incorporating that updated map which defines certain flood plain areas in certain flood zones."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I'll explain to you, George. When I bought my house on Pine Avenue in Aquebogue, Young and Young had to provide the bank with the topography and one of the topographies of the flood plain, it designated the level of which my house on Peconic Bay, is I in the 30 year flood zone, the 20 year flood zone? And based on that topography, the bank then asked me to buy flood insurance from the federal government. And I think that's what we're doing here, is updating the maps so that our insurance carriers will know what type of insurance is required for what municipal buildings in Town."

George Schmelzer: "You can't change the topography. You can't change the land so unless the surveyor fixes it up, I don't understand all this. It just requires a lot of nonsense. They have to abide by it, huh?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "I would imagine so."

George Schmelzer: "It wouldn't affect anything on freshwater though, would it?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "No. This is only for municipal properties."

George Schmelzer: "You mean the stuff that-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "That taxpayers own, Town Hall, Police Department."

George Schmelzer: "You own the land on your house, don't you?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "I know. But this has nothing to do with house. This has to do with the Town facilities. I'm just giving you an example. This is the maps that we have to file with the insurance carriers."

George Schmelzer: "Oh. I guess it's all right even though I don't know what it's all about. You have to ask Noah, maybe he knows more about floods."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I think he would."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah. All right. Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Thanks, George. Is there anybody else out there who would like to address the Town Board on this subject? That being the case, with no objection from the other Board members, the hearing is closed."

Public Hearing closed: 7:15 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 7:15 p.m.

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:15 p.m., on Tuesday, February 21, 1995, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the amending Chapter 108 Zoning of the Riverhead Town Code by adding Section 108-51.2 entitled, Setbacks of Wood Decks."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Mr. Town Attorney."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "The proposed Public Hearing is to amend that section as indicated by the Town Clerk, Section 108-51.2 which deals with wood decks, where the wood decks are less than 18 inches above grade. In looking at the particular Section and comparing it to the present schedule that sets forth rear yard setbacks, side yard setbacks, it became apparent that this Section, Section 108-51.2, provided greater relief for rear yards, but no relief or in some cases less relief for side yards. My understanding of the purpose of the legislation when it was heard for Public Hearing in 1992 and adopted thereafter, was that

would provide a greater relief to an applicant where the deck is less than 18 inches, therefore, not requiring to go to the ZBA.

The amendment simply deletes the references to the side yards since there is no greater relief providing in once instance the (inaudible) one, it provided less restriction-- or more restrictions. So that's the purpose of today's hearing."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay. George, you want to comment on this Hearing, too?"

George Schmelzer: "Well, I don't know-- when you get through with lawyer, you know less than when they started. You are making it less restrictive or more?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "It's going to-- the side yards will conform to what's presently on the zoning schedule."

George Schmelzer: "Well, is that less or more restrictive?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "It will be the same."

George Schmelzer: "The same?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "And the rear yards will be less restrictive. In other words, you could put your deck closer to the rear yard where it's less than 18 inches above-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "Without going to the Zoning Board of Appeals."

George Schmelzer: "Well, why not cut the thing out altogether. If you want to put a deck, do it, without all this nonsense. The lawyers wouldn't like that, they'd have less work."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "It's not-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "George, if you are going to-- you've got to speak to the microphone. Second of all, I'm not in favor of that. I live in a neighborhood where we have a lot of decks and we have narrow lots and you should have some type of regulations because sometimes you can build a deck up to somebody's bedroom, which happens in my neighbor-

wood, and in the summertime when they're out there on the deck at 2:00 in the morning playing music, then they call the police and we have a problem. So-- Steve?"

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. I want to see if I can get the definition of setback understood. Is this setback-- is that from the side of the house or is it from the line boundary. In other words, you can only be-- here's the boundary and I can just come 18 inches from the boundary, or what? I don't understand the setback."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "Well, first and foremost, the 18 inches is describing the grade or the elevation of the deck."

Steve Haizlip: "Oh."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "And this deals solely with wood decks and solely with wood decks where they are less than 18 inches above grade. When we're talking about the 18 inches in the statute. The side yard setback or the rear yard setback is defined as the distance from the side property line or the rear property line, not the side of the house or the rear of the house."

Steve Haizlip: "So when you mention grade, that's 18 inches setback of the grade. You talk about grade, and 18 inches decline. I really don't understand this really setback. George is right, you know. When you lawyers write up something-- I mean we get confused with the language."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Steve, I'll tell you-- it's simply-- well, Steve, let me tell you what it is. Too often in our Building Department they have an automatic answer, go to the ZBA."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Which means the homeowner has to pay a fee, he's got to delay his construction of his deck for six weeks."

Steve Haizlip: "Yeah."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Some of these ordinance changes come as a result of the public complaining to us and then they go to the ZBA and they are sent back to the Building Department. And this is one of those

angles we're trying to untangle. To actually make it easier for a person to put a deck on their house. Okay? That's where this comes from. Because we're trying to clarify the code so that when you go to put a deck on your house, it's easier. Without going to the Zoning Board of Appeals, and paying a fee. I don't even know what the fee is now we're charging, \$50 or something or \$75-- \$60, and then the homeowner has to delay it for another six weeks and wait for two meetings--."

Steve Haizlip: "Well, the way I see it and the way it's explained if I suddenly decide to put a deck, which I don't think I have any intentions of doing, I'd have to come down here and fight with those people over at the Building Department anyhow and get it all explained and then let them dictate to me what to do, right? I mean I guess that's what about the size of it."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay. Anybody else wishing to address the Town Board on this Hearing? That being the case, with no objection, declare the Hearing closed."

Public Hearing closed: 7:21 p.m.

Councilman Prusinowski: "The Town Attorney, I think, wants to open up a previous hearing that we had and read something into the record. Is that correct, Bob?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "It's not actually a previous hearing. It's notice of an unsafe structure which had been posted back in December on property in Calverton near the location of Fresh Pond Road. It's property that's owned by Parvis Farahzad. What I'd like to do at this point in time is just put into the record the copy of-- or the original of the inspection report that was done by Edward R. Kukla from the Building Department, which sets forth his findings as to the current status of the structures. And furthermore, his publication or notice which went to Barbara Grattan as proof of the posting of the property."

I would ask if the Town Board would be kind enough to keep this matter open for two weeks. I received a call from Mr. Farahzad this morning. He indicated that he was under the impression the matter had been resolved by prior boarding up of the structures. I indicated that it had not been done sufficiently. The boards had been removed and he

promised that what he would do is go back out to the site and board them in accordance with HUD standards or in his words so that they were secure as they would be in New York City.

He also related that it's his understanding that the option or the contract vendee should be closing on his parcel within a period of about 30 days and that some of these structures are part of the site plan and he was fearful of being caught in a Catch-22 of removing structures which were part of his contract. So, I want to put that all in the record at this time."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay. Now we will resume to the part of the program. Is there anybody else that wishes to address the Town Board on any issue? Steve?"

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. Okay, we got 7:24 and a half here and I'm allowed five minutes, so I'll try to get it done. If I can't I'll ask for permission to get back."

The-- remember I addressed the Town Board about Route 25 in front of Calverton Deli. All them big deep mud holes, sloppy holes, and potholes. Well, at the Calverton Civic Association, I was nominated to write a letter to them, which I did. So they come up and responded about what they done. They have (inaudible) this New York State Highway Department. Deniable, defiable and all that stuff. All they did was come up there, grade a little bit, take steel poles and put them along, showed the road restricted the amount that a truck could pull in-- tractor trailer and get off the road safely. But they still leave their wheels within inside of the white line. So I don't call that fixing up the road shoulder from a place of business and where it's very busy and in particular where they collect a high amount of sales tax for the state and the county. So I say they botched it. They don't intend to serve the public. Yet, if you go by the government code, for the people, by the people, forget it, it's for the politicians. They do what they want to, but not to help you out.

Now, I have a feeling I'm going to get a voice here sort of like squealing like a stuck pig. Let's see how I do. I have been informed by a highly prominent businessman of the community that Omni has paid an \$100,000 fee to be granted a 60 day extension. Am I on track or not?"

Councilman Creighton: "No."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay. I won't go no further, Frank. That's all I want to know. If I'm not on track, and Omni hasn't paid an \$80,000 fee."

Councilman Prusinowski: "No. They-- there's a 60 day extension of the enforcement period of a contract provision which we negotiated a 30 day extension and that they lowered our charge up at the tipping station down to \$57 a ton. We got a reduction in our tipping for that extension."

Steve Haizlip: "All right. So, no \$80,000 is forthcoming."

Councilman Prusinowski: "So, if you take the amount of garbage that we do over-- it will probably be \$10,000 or \$15,000 for that two month deduction. But it's less money we have to pay out."

Steve Haizlip: "All right. Let me revise that. In other words, there's no \$80,000 cash money or by check coming to this Town. It's through negotiation of garbage dumping fees."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Exactly."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay. I'm satisfied with that."

Now, our first Assembly person sent me a letter that she has been nominated to a task force of the Long Island Lighting Company by Gov. Pataki. This don't make sense to me. I don't know if it makes sense to anybody else, but you don't need to be nominated on a task force of the Long Island Lighting Company. You need to be nominated on a task force of the Public Service Commission which is giving away the (inaudible) to the Long Island Lighting Company.

Okay. Now, at the last meeting I tried to tell you about a State official, how they think and work, and how sometimes how shrewd they are and how the female secretary comes and rescues them and she's the one that's carrying them. There was a public official in the State of Virginia. You remember you asked me was this a State official, but you didn't ask me what state. And you cut me off a little too quick."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay."

Steve Haizlip: "Right. So now-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "We were all here Friday with Ken LaValle and I was waiting for you because I wanted you to-- "

Steve Haizlip: "Well, I tell you. I had wrote Ken LaValle a letter since we had talked."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay."

Steve Haizlip: "And I've been disgusted."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay."

Steve Haizlip: "And I'll tell you what Ken LaValle thinks of me. I'm ignored and I'm an outcast. He hasn't responded. And I don't expect him to respond but, boy, when it comes election time, this guy isn't going to respond."

Now, in reading the newspaper the other day, I was reading about Gov. Pataki is going to after the DEC. He wants to reorganize it and to get them to do their job a little more respectable and don't be Mussolini and a Hitler and so forth. So there was one guy that put his name in the paper, Enka, I think his name is. And I'll tell you, his memory is short lived. He says, I don't know of one business that we have done anything or caused to leave the state. I says boy, that guy's memory is short. He ran (inaudible) right out of here, 150 jobs went down near Wilmington, North Carolina, down there. So I thought I could bring you up to date on that, Vic."

Councilman Prusinowski: "That's right."

Steve Haizlip: "Now, you remember about two years ago, we went after that diner up in Calverton. It was poor taste, just exhibiting itself there."

Councilman Prusinowski: "It used to be called the Trio Lounge."

Steve Haizlip: "Trio Lounge, yeah. Well, it was in bad taste just exhibiting itself there on the main drag as Bill Noejhl would say, it's on the main drag and this is where people come into town. So, boy, it got torn down. Now, in Calverton right in front of the post

office, there's a farm stand there I think that thing has been up there at least 75 years. It's all deteriorated. Roof and everything is all gone. It's just there. It can be a good place to-- people to gather and have a little smoke some night, a little beer drink and so forth. I think that thing should really come down and dress up our area a little bit. So I want to-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "We'll send Richie out there to take a look at it."

Steve Haizlip: "Good enough."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay. Kim will write that down. We'll send Richie out there to take a look at it."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay. Well, I think I've got it all covered. Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski: "And you only took eight minutes. That's pretty good."

Steve Haizlip: "Well, it was nice for you to give me the extension."

Councilman Prusinowski: "No problem. Anybody else wants to address the Board on any subject? Okay. So now we'll go to the resolutions."

Resolution #128

Councilman Prusinowski: "Resolution calling for a Public Hearing regarding construction of a sewer-- of a lateral sewer main. So moved."

Councilman Creighton: "Seconded."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Moved and seconded."


