Deputy Supervisor Stark: "The time for the first Public
hearing has not arisen. If there is anybody in the audience that
would like to address the Board on any particular subject? George?"

George Schmelzer: "I'm sorry, I've got a kink in my back. It's
not your fault though. Nothing to do with Town Board. Maybe it does,
I don't know.

A year ago I discussed privately with some of the Board members
about having a referendum this past election for an opinion of the
Townpeople-- the whole Town, what do to with Grumman. Should it be
an airport or not. I got the answer, you would do it, but you didn't
do it. Still don't know. And this Town Board still doesn't know
what to do with it. Spend a third of a million and ask somebody else
what to do with it. And the rest of the land owned by the Navy and
Riverhead Town I believe should be granted to Riverhead and Riverhead
take title to it. You can use it for pumping water. Do what you
want to with it. If the DEC wants to run it, let them run it the way
Riverhead wants. You know what happened to Wildwood Lake. The DEC
wanted to run that, the trustee let them do it, they weren't
satisfied, they threw the DEC out. Can do the same thing. But if the
DEC owns it, you are stuck forever. And if this New York State owns
it, there's nothing to stop them from pumping that water out from
Massau County."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "They can hear you."

George Schmelzer: "I want to make sure you can hear me."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Okay."

George Schmelzer: "And-- or Queens. So I believe this Town should do all it can to get title to that Navy land outside the fence as well as inside the fence. That's it. I hope you do. Are you going to think about it or just forget it?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "We'll think about it, George."

George Schmelzer: "Huh?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "We'll think about it."

George Schmelzer: "Are you going to think about it, really?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Yes."

George Schmelzer: "Well, I was going to say something else, but I guess I won't."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "It's the holiday season."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, well, that's why I want to holler about it, see, it's the holiday season."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Okay."

George Schmelzer: "Okay."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody else who would like to address the Board on any given subject right now?"

Councilman Creighton: "Can I comment on what George said?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Sure."

Councilman Creighton: "It's probably a good point in time to announce that on Tuesday night, the 12th, at 7:00 p.m., here at the

Town Hall. There will be a public meeting and exchange of information with the consultants who are working for the Town on determining what the best plan should be for the use of the Calverton facility. And are those times correct, 7:00 on Tuesday night, the 12th, here at Town Hall."

Barbara Grattan: "Yes."

Councilman Creighton: "So people who want to hear the direction that's being recommended for the Town to go in and have some input to that process, that's a good meeting to do it at. Tuesday night, the 12th, at 7:00 p.m. here."

Steve Haizlip: "Is that this coming Tuesday night, Frank?"

Councilman Creighton: "Yes, the 12th of December."

Steve Haizlip: "Thank you. Steve Haizlip of Calverton. On Resolution 788, is there a typo there? I can't believe that our Highway Department would be bidding on a truck that's almost 30 years old. Don't they want a 1996, new and up to date?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "I'm sure it's a typo."

Steve Haizlip: "A 1966 they are going to buy? It's all rusted out probably by now."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "To the best of my understanding, Steve, it is a heavy duty, one of these big wreckers, that Charlie feels is in good enough condition to go out and pull in our larger vehicles in the Highway Department that should break down, whether it be in a snow storm or a regular storm or what have you."

Steve Haizlip: "All right, so it is a 19-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I can't tell you that's not a typo but he has discussed it with the Board and we are giving him authorization to go out to bid on a particular wrecker rather than go out and contract with a local wrecker."

Steve Haizlip: "Well, not to be-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "It's a real heavy duty one, almost would pull a tractor and trailer."

Steve Haizlip: "Yeah, well, not to be continued controversy on it, but I would think a truck almost 30 years old, the engine is practically worn out and using an awful lot of oil by now. Well, okay. I doubt it was under wraps."

You know the (inaudible) two houses on Route 25 by Manor Lane, they're right down to the ground level. So there was some immigrants working there and I asked the guy, I says, what are you doing? They were putting up a fence in front. You know, that guy he said he couldn't speak English. But I tell you one thing. I bet you he speaks English pretty good, he was just told to say that he couldn't speak English.

So I had a person to make a contact, found out a lawyer owns it. The lawyer's external reasoning is he doesn't want to leave it there because transits might live in there. But internally his real thinking which he's not letting out, but I know what he's doing, he wants to get a tax reduction now because those two houses are not on that land. Well, if he gets it, then that means you are going to charge me more to keep the Town operating. So I just want to know about that."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Are you talking about Manor Lane in Jamesport?"

Steve Haizlip: "No, I said up in Calverton, the (inaudible) house, Henry (inaudible) old house, and it's by Manor Lane and that's in Calverton."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Oh, you mean the bypass road that goes around."

Steve Haizlip: "Yeah, right, that's Manor Lane. The bypass that goes-- it goes into Splish Splash. It's right on the corner of Splish Splash. So I have a feeling that you're going to be getting -- requesting to reduce the taxes on that property because they tore them houses right down level and put a fence up."

Now, at the last meeting, I mentioned about this guy, (inaudible)

Silvers, he's Assemblyman Speaker from Manhattan. And-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Speaker of the Assembly."

Steve Haizlip: "Yeah, he discriminated against Patchogue because they sent a Republican up to Albany, they won't give no-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "He's in Irene's group."

Steve Haizlip: "Now, here's the thing I would like to know. If he's a Democrat and he discriminated because they sent a Republican to Albany, how did Joe Janoski get on the LIPA Board? Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "It was an appointment of the Governor."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Dean, you've got a couple of minutes before we go into the Public Hearing."

Dean Terchunian: "Good evening. I'm Dean Terchunian, from Bear Estates, Riverhead. On January 1st our new Town Board will be taking over and there will be a seat vacated by Jim Stark, one of the Council seats as you are taking over the Supervisor regular-- and I'd like to see the new Town Board on January 1st appoint John Ofrias as the new Town Councilman. There's lots of reasons but I'd like to point out two reasons why. One is John got a third amount of votes in the election, and number two is he even got more votes than you did, Jim. So I think those are valid reasons and I think that he will also balance the Board which is needed. Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

Public Hearing opened: 7:15 p.m.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the hour of 7:15 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:15 p.m. on Tuesday, December 5, 1995, to hear all

interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the special permit petition of William Tintle for the use of a portion of an existing building as an automobile repair facility."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody here on behalf of the petitioner?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "I'll make some brief comments."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "All right. Jimmy are you going to comment?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Go ahead, Bobby."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "This is a special permit application to utilize approximately 3,239 square feet of an existing 16,194 square foot building on Kroemer Avenue. It's bordered on the west by Kroemer Avenue, the south by the State Road 25, the north by Long Island Rail Road and the west by LILCO right of way. It's a special permit application to utilize that portion of the building for motor vehicle repair and it was filed sometime back. The zoning on the site is Industrial "A"."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Go ahead, Jim. If you want to make any comment, then we'll see if there is anybody has any-- "

James DeLuca: "No, that pretty well covers it."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Okay. Is there anybody in the audience who would like to make comment on this particular-- George, Steve."

George Schmelzer: "Why do you have this nonsense so somebody has to get a permit to use a building? Do they have to get a permit to eat in there-- eat his lunch or something? All this bureaucracy, we didn't have that nonsense before. It's getting worse every year. Why don't you eliminate some of this crap? Why should anybody need a permit to repair cars in a building for? What's the reason for that?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Are you for or against it, George?"

George Schmelzer: "Leave people alone, why don't you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "The question here is are you for this petition or are you against this petition?"

George Schmelzer: "Why should he even have to do that? It's just to feed the lawyers and the bureaucrats in Town I guess. Keep their jobs intact, maybe. That's what it is."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I would gather from your conversation that you are for this."

George Schmelzer: "Yes."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Okay. Good."

George Schmelzer: "Why not? It's his building."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Steve?"

George Schmelzer: "What are you copying from? Stalin and Hitler, all this nonsense. It looks like it."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. My question is, I think he's-- the building that he wants to go into is an old lumber storage building, along Route 25 and also adjacent of the tracks. Okay. And (inaudible) I hope it will be used for what he's saying here and not what happened up in Calverton. Put in one thing and they are doing something else. Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else who would like to be heard on this particular petition? If not, I declare the Hearing to be closed."

Hearing closed: 7:18 p.m.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Well, we have a couple more minutes. Is there anybody else who wants to address the Board of any particular given subject? Henry, maybe you can fill up a couple of minutes for me. I'm going with Henry."

Henry Pfeiffer: "Henry Pfeiffer, Wading River. Last meeting I mentioned the fact that there was certain activities or recommendations on the part of a higher echelon governmental agency that would adversely affect the welfare of this particular community, and I suggested at that time to your other Supervisor, (inaudible) Mr. Mullen (phonetic), that you might want to establish committees including one that would keep their eye on the governmental agencies at every echelon that are taking actions that might affect-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I'm trying to figure out who Mr. Mullen was. Mr. Mueller (phonetic) was the Supervisor of the Day."

Henry Pfeiffer: "Mr. Mullen?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Mr. Mueller. Muller, Muller, excuse me."

Henry Pfeiffer: "Muller?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Muller."

Henry Pfeiffer: "Muller. Okay. I've been wrong before."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "That's all right."

Henry Pfeiffer: "-- I think. In any case, what I would like you to do is to have somebody to keep their eye on what the other governmental agencies are doing, at whatever echelon and whenever it is deemed that they are adverse to the community, to take such actions as are proper to rectify or to change these and to protect the people in the community. Okay.

One other thing that I might mention, each of you have been affected and perhaps participants in the Golden Donors blood drive which we have several times each year. There will be one taking place on the 2nd of January and we will have a new person handling the one at the location, the Ramada Inn. The previous person that was delegated from the Office for the Aging has passed on. Irene Schoenfeld (phonetic) two weeks ago. And we will now have a lady by the name of Nancy Renazzo (phonetic) who will be in touch with members of the Board here and seek a continuation of the cooperation that you have shown in the past. Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Henry."

Public Hearing opened: 7:22 p.m.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the hour of 7:22 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:20 p.m., on Tuesday, December 5, 1995, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the amendment of a Local Law Section 103-40 (8) entitled "Solid Waste Management Law" to provide for the continued issuance of business permits until December 31, 1996."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Councilman Prusinowski?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "In the original Solid Waste Law, we planned on terminating business permits about three or four years ago but we've been extending it on an annual basis because the Youngs Avenue transfer station is still open and it also gives businesses the opportunity to bring their own recyclables and other materials to the landfill."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody who would like to make comment on this in the audience? If not, I declare the Hearing closed."

Public Hearing closed: 7:23 p.m.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Being no other Public Hearings for the evening, if there is anybody who would like to be recognized in the audience on any topic? Bill?"

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich from Wading River. Usually I talk loud enough to be heard without a microphone."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Especially if you get your Irish up."

William Kasperovich: "Yes, this is true. And unfortunately there are so many things in Riverhead Township to get your Irish up about that begin to wonder what is happening to a small Town in America.

I have always been in favor and looked for open government. I always feel whether the public takes interest or not, all expenditures and projects should be so displayed that it is noticeable and the residents are informed. Not too long ago, I brought up the parking lot change and the expenditures of \$300,000, and everybody I talked to had no idea that such a drawing was compiled, that so much technical effort was expended and put onto paper.

Now, this sort of thing leads people to believe that there are personnel within the Town Hall that like to act, and I say act, like they know it all. That they are experienced and fully qualified. And it's just an act. Some of the knowledge that people have to acquire in Riverhead Township means that they have to live here for 20 or 30 years to know what's going on.

I would like the outgoing Councilman be kind enough to list what he feels are hanging fire or have been shelved for future consideration and such that the incoming people will know what has yet to be decided and concluded or what has to be changed and they just never got around to it.

In recent years we have acquired a new man with the title of Town Engineer. I always thought that when a person qualified for that position comes into the Town Hall, he will affect the thinking of the Town Board by his background, same as a Town Attorney, as consultant, as recommendor, as a suggestor, and I don't find this to be the case. Excuse me. But deceptive concealment is on the top of my list of things to fight against in government. This is not the American way.

We do things sometimes unknowingly, put aside information that gets lost by the amount of paper that's shuffled or by time. I thought before the year was out, I would bring such a situation to the forefront. One evening I had to listen to a man talk about a public garage in Riverhead Township in conjunction with the aquarium or the growth in the Township with the aquarium and I didn't quite

agree with him. But since I didn't have any research on it, I figured I would hold off. So I did research on it. It consumed the better part of a week for me. I must have hounded a dozen people for information and when I asked to be permitted to address the Town Board at a public-- at a special meeting, I didn't bring my tape recorder because I figured a special Town Board meeting, it would be on public record. But it was not put on public record. And so all this research and information on my part was for naught. And yet I can't say that I'm always 100% right, but if I'm at least 60% right, I have a couple of good recommendations and good thoughts.

Now when this public garage comes to the forefront, if it ever will, it will be sometime in the future and this is lost. It's this that I call deceptive concealment. Let the public know right, wrong or indifferent. They live here. The people who will live here in the future will have their opportunity to address the Town Board. But those that are here today are the people that should be recognized and their efforts into civic affairs be acknowledged and considered because you might be just passing by an excellent suggestion for the good of the Township. Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Bill. Is there anybody else who would like to address the Town Board? Yes, Larry."

Larry Oxman: "Hi, good evening, Larry Oxman. I'm with Riverhead Real Estate. Just a general comment. I think due to the Board's efforts, and their good efforts over the past several years with the beautification of the waterfront, picking up the theatre, the work there at the Rimland Building and all sorts of other investments that the Town has made, I'm just seeing a lot of more activity. Recently I'm dealing with some people who would like to locate a restaurant-- two different restaurants coming to the downtown area. I have someone that would like to establish an art gallery, and I really, you know, I think that this is much to your credit that people are now looking to invest here. And thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Steve? When do you have your ribbon cutting, Larry? Tomorrow?"

Larry Oxman: "Tomorrow, between three to six-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Good. Thank you."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip, of Calverton. I just want to ask you. Did I hear you right when you said that Gov. Pataki is the one that appointed Joe to the LIPA Board?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Yes, sir."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay, Jim. I'm going to check that out. Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "You are welcome, sir. Through the recommendation of Sen. LaValle. Yes, sir?"

Sandy Zajek: "Good evening. Sandy Zajek, Calverton. I was just wondering. What happened to maybe our suit that we are going to have with the County about the welfare cases coming into Riverhead. Has anything been done about that?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "There has been no action taken by the County. To this date I had somebody over there today, to the legislature, to see if it had been, in fact, put in the budget for the transfer. They have not done a SEQRA process and we will start litigation on that basis. I should know something in the next couple of days."

Sandy Zajek: "I see. And you will be notifying-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "If they haven't done it properly, we will certainly go to Court and then we will certainly go to Court after that on other basis. There has to be, I think you put it, Bobby, a determination made somewhere."

Sandy Zajek: "Right, well, it's very important because of the school taxes and everything else-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Oh, very much so. Is there anybody else who would like to-- George, one shot and then we are going to take up the Resolutions. One shot."

George Schmelzer: "Have you settled that issue of the PSR's yet?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "TDR's?"

George Schmelzer: "TSR's, you had the salamanders around there -- transfer those salamanders, did you have to do it?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "You mean over on the Tanger property?"

George Schmelzer: "Yeah."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Rick, are you here? Do you want to make comment on George's question? I've never seen a tiger salamander to be very honest. I've seen pictures, but I've never seen one. George, if you will back up and just give him a little room, I would appreciate it. Thank you."

Rick Hanley: "I think the question has to do with salamanders on the Tanger property. Is that-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I believe that's what George is asking."

Rick Hanley: "The Town Board had submitted to the DEC a petition for amendment to the line as part of that was all the scientific research on that particular site in terms of the number of salamanders that existed on the property and some of their behaviors and habits. And the DEC has had that and we are to sit down next week with the DEC and go through their conclusions on both the zoning as well as the protected species. So I guess we can give an update at the next meeting."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Does that answer your question, George?"

George Schmelzer: "Well, it just makes me ask more questions. Salamander habits, do you have a book describing the salamander habits, how they live and everything? I didn't bring that up, he did. See. You must have a booklet on that explaining a salamander's living habits now."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Probably does."

George Schmelzer: "Well, are you going to get Amper to come out to pick them up and bring them someplace else?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Why don't you give him a call?"

George Schmelzer: "Well, it's your job. You're on the Pine Barrens Commission. Now they are going to screw the people that transferred their money from the Pine Barrens to the budget deficit, was that your idea?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "No, sir."

George Schmelzer: "You know what you are going to do about it?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I don't believe I can do a hell of a lot about it now. It's already been voted on by the legislature."

George Schmelzer: "I mean, but you are on the Pine Barrens Commission, you should squawk. Who do you stick up with? The land-owners or who, or anybody, or yourself? What is it? Would you please give me an answer. I'm puzzled."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I stick up for the people in Riverhead."

George Schmelzer: "Well, damn, you should do something then. If you stuck up for them you wouldn't have voted for the damn thing."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Okay."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah. (inaudible) you proved yourself you didn't stick up for them when you did that. The whole Board did that. So when you saluted the flag you-- it should have been at half mast that day, it would have been proper. Okay."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, George."

George Schmelzer: "This airport though, I still believe you should leave it as an airport, 12 months employment as an airport. A race track is only a few weeks and you have a jam of people from when you have a race and the next day there is nothing. If you had an airport, especially freight, 12 months of the year you would have big warehouses around Town. Really. The people in Wading River, they don't want anything anyway. I don't know if they even want themselves."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, George."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, you are very welcome."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Let's take up the Resolutions."

Resolution #779

Councilman Prusinowski: "Authorize the Town Clerk to publish and post public notice to change time of regular Town Board meeting. So moved."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Seconded."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Stark.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "And also, make a note, the December 19th meeting will be an afternoon meeting at 2:00, December 19th, for the press, so they show up. Gary, it's an afternoon meeting."

The Vote (Cont'd.): Stark, yes. The Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #780

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Calling for a Public Hearing for the increase and improvements of the Water District. So moved."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Seconded."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Stark, yes. The Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #781

Councilman Creighton: "Authorizes the Supervisor to execute and submit a grant application to the Suffolk County for Community Development Bloc Grant Funds. So moved."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "And seconded."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded."


