

Minutes of a Regular Town Board Meeting held by the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead, held in the Town Hall, 200 Howell Avenue, Riverhead, New York, on Tuesday, December 7, 1994, at 7:00 p.m.

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Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. There are more seats up here if everybody would like to take a seat especially our staff. Tonight we have with us the Riverhead High School Varsity Cheerleaders. Prior to the start of the meeting, I would like to ask them to come up and maybe they would lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance so we can start this meeting, and then we'll proceed with our show.

The flag is behind you to the right.

Riverhead High School Cheerleaders: The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "We have asked the high school varsity cheerleaders if you will just stay up here with us, girls. As a matter of fact, if you will move kind of back in here by the Council-people, we'll get you on TV. The TV is to your right, always keep yourself facing to the right.

Also with us tonight we have the District Superintendent, Dr. Bob Holmes. I also see with us here tonight Joe (inaudible) and the high school principal, and also with us tonight is Susan Ries, the

varsity cheerleader coach, and Janet MacKnee (phonetic), the assistant coach.

This group of young ladies that you see presently in front of you travelled to Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania and competed in a regional competition for cheerleading. They were 139 teams, I believe, am I correct? Something like that. The top four teams as they were rated will go to the nationals at Disneyworld in Orlando, Florida. Riverhead High School came in second place; lost first place by one vote or one point, and I believe 320 to 319, something like that. Well, I think that's a great accomplishment and shows, again, what our educational system is doing in Riverhead.

They also will have to raise a lot of money between now and February. So, keep those dollars come rolling in when they come out into the community to sell chances, cookies, whatever they're going to do. Please support them. I think it's a great accomplishment and we're very proud as the elected officials in the Town of Riverhead to know that we have young ladies with great dedication such as you.

Now, we have a proclamation here and maybe because we skipped Frank the last meeting, Frank if you would read the proclamation."

Councilman Creighton: "WHEREAS, it is proper and fitting that the Town of Riverhead acknowledge the accomplishments of its youth and encourage athletic competition; and

WHEREAS, the Riverhead High School cheerleaders have been an inspiration to the Riverhead Blue Waves and their schoolmates in cheering the teams to victory; and

WHEREAS, the Riverhead High School cheerleaders exhibited their team spirit by competing in the 1994 Northeast Regional Cheerleading Competition in placing second out of 134 teams in that competition.

WHEREAS, the Riverhead High School cheerleaders have accepted a bid to compete in the National Cheerleading Championship at Disneyworld for Febraury 17, 1995, through February 21, 1995.

NOW, THEREFORE, Joseph F. Janoski, as Supervisor of the Riverhead Town Board do hereby proclaim February 17th through February 21st, 1995, as Riverhead High School Cheerleader Day in the Town of River-

head and ask that the residents of the Town of Riverhead join me in recognizing the achievements of the Riverhead High School cheerleaders for their boundless energy exhibited in encouraging healthy athletic competition.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Also, Councilman Prusinowski has a presentation."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Just so you always remember where you are in Florida, I know you're going to be going to Disneyworld, we're going to give you a copy-- an official Town flag so wherever you're competing, hang it up, take the flag with you, hang it, be proud, and bring back the championship. Good luck."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Now, maybe we can get them to just to say one little cheer for us."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "Before they do that, Jim, I'd just like to say congratulations-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I'm sorry, Harriet."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "That's okay. Congratulations girls, and good luck to you in Florida and continue to exhibit the fine spirit of sportsmanship and healthy competition that will carry a long way in life, and we expect to hear great things from you when you go down to Florida in February."

Cheerleaders: "Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "And don't end up like Harriet because she's on crutches."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "Right."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "-- all be there to do it together. Ms. Ries, would you like to-- "

Susan Ries: "They're wonderful. I'm real proud of them and I know how hard they work and how dedicated they are and we want Riverhead and our community to be real proud of them. They do a real fine job. They're excellent students. They show sportsmanship at all times, and when we do-- our courts or our field, we do represent Riverhead with our pride and spirit and I'm real proud. I know the parents are real proud of them and when we do go to Florida, we will be representing Riverhead and we will give it a hundred and how many per cent girls-- and ten per cent. As I always tell them, always give 110 percent. So I know, God willing, that we'll be safe, and we'll do a real fine job there. Thanks."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. I can't let this opportunity go by because many of you may have not met Dr. Holmes yet, and maybe he would like to say something as the new incoming District Superintendent. They're champions already and you haven't been here that long."

Dr. Holmes: "I'd like to take this opportunity to thank the Town Council for extending this kindness to these young ladies and to the Riverhead Central School District. This really means a lot to us and I know it means a lot to them. And I'd like to add my congratulations as well for your achievement. I know it represents hundreds and hundreds of hours of work and that cheerleading in and of itself is fun and it's a good, positive physical activity. But it's just so nice to see hard work rewarded like this."

And, finally, I would just like to extend my thanks to all the adults who have been involved in this project. We have teachers, administrators, community members. We have parents who I'm sure have rescheduled dinners and family activities to allow these young ladies to practice. We've had community members to support them in the past and I know we will in the future and it's just so gratifying for me as the Superintendent to see what good things can be accomplished when the entire school community comes together to support kids. So, thank you all. The best of luck in Orlando."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Now, it's show time. Would you like to come out front or would you like us to move these tables just a

little bit here for you? He's the strongest of us all."

(Cheerleaders performed cheer.)

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you girls and, again, good luck and let me remind the public because we are on TV tonight that you will be out in the community seeking funds to help defray the cost of going to Florida. So, we wish you all the luck in the world."

Cheerleaders: "Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

Also out in the audience tonight we have a kind of a reunion. Two or three years ago we were privileged to have a student-- a law student from Germany who came and visited and spent three months with us who studied with our Town Clerk on a intern basis, who then returned to Germany, got married, had a child, but also finished her law degree. I would like her to stand up, Andrea Mellas (phonetic) who is back visiting with us for this week. It takes a lot longer to become a lawyer in Germany.

Okay. Is there a motion to approve the minutes of the November 15th meeting?

Councilman Prusinowski: "So moved."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Seconded."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

Public Hearing opened: 7:23 p.m.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 7:23 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:05 p.m. on Tuesday, December 6, 1994, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the consideration of amending Chapter 81-5 l. Noise Control of the Riverhead Town Code Prohibited Acts."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody here who would like to speak on this particular subject of this Public Hearing? Yes, sir?"

Stanley Krupski: "Is there a copy of this thing available?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "We're just doing a slight amendment to

it. Maybe Bobby could explain it for us."

Stanley Krupski: "He has explained it to me already."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "I showed it to him prior to the meeting. What we're doing is taking Section 81-5 Subpart i which deals with standing motor vehicles, and eliminating or deleting from that provision the following language: For a period longer than 10 minutes in any hour while the vehicle is stationary. The idea was to eliminate or bring this-- come about to eliminate a loophole that had been confronting us with respect to vehicles that we loading and unloading or coupling and uncoupling boxes, and they were able to do it in less than 10 minutes. However, the noise level was such that it was disturbing the residential neighborhoods adjoining these operations. So the concept was to amend the code in this fashion."

Stanley Krupski: "Do I have to introduce myself?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Sure. Would you just identify yourself for the record, please?"

Stanley Krupski: "I'm Stanley Krupski, Calverton. I'm against this amendment. If something should happen to my vehicle that I'd have to repair it at home, I can't have it idling for 10 minutes? Also, you have some-- a new inspection stations that are going to be proposed by New York State. You are going to have a big line of traffic and cars. They can't have their motors running for air-conditioning or heat in the winter?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "This is not a 24 hour prohibition. This is from the hours of 8:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. And presently the code prohibits the running of engines for any 10 minute period, not a continuous 10 minute period, but for any 10 minute period of any given hour. This just eliminates that 10 minute period so that it's an absolute prohibition from 9:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m."

Stanley Krupski: "I also work for the State Highway Department. I'm out all hours of the night during the winter plowing snow, dispatching trucks."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "They're exempt."

Stanley Krupski: "I know they're exempt. I read that. But, after I get off work, I usually go to my parents house, plow out their driveway. It usually entails jumping a tractor with a dead battery which is going to take probably a lot more than 10 minutes, getting the tractor ready, letting it warm up so it operates properly. I think there's a lot of homework that's got to be done before you decide to enact this here change."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Very good. Thank you."

Stanley Krupski: "Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Steve? Steve, you just want to shut that door for us? Evidently some people out in the hallway there. Thank you."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip from Calverton. Stanley more or less covered what I had in mind and the questions I had in mind, so at this time all I can say is that I second what he has to say on it with the exception of one thing I would like to add. The restriction hours is 9:00, Mr. Attorney, until 7:00 in the morning?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "No. It's from 8:00 p.m. until seven."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay. The only question that I have left that if some of these here garages who operate late hours and they've got -- they're working overtime. They're not in a regular agency where there's an eight hour day. They're in shops of their own, but authorized shops. Like there's one over, I think, in the old Agway building and different places around and the one on 58 there. So if they want to do a tune-up and use the computer, you know, it takes longer than 10 minutes to get a car warmed up. And if they're in their own shop you can't dictate to them what hours to work and they should be allowed to catch up their backlog. So, in a tune-up, you're going to restrict them on this? And they do, you know, a lot of tune-ups."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "The law is not intended to restrict that. The Section (inaudible) that it's noise that is audible within 300 feet of a residential property. So if someone is out in the boon docks and there's no one around, there's not a problem."

Steve Haizlip: "All right."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Steve. Anybody else who would like to make comment on this particular Public Hearing? Bill?"

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich from Wading River. This is not a comment, it's in form of a question. How does this change in the law cover equipment that's pulled as a trailer? A vehicle pulls an air compressor or a generator or what have you. It's not the vehicle, but it's a piece of equipment that the vehicle becomes a part of. And so if you-- your vehicle might be fine, but that which you're dragging behind you could be-- and air compressors and generators are noisy pieces of equipment. And, this is not the ordinary thing that you are intending to cover, but at the same time, if we are going to cover things standing for 10 minutes, vehicles do drag in behind them and stand with noisy equipment. And I think this would be the appropriate place if it could be included in it. Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Bill. Is there anybody else at this particular time? George? Steve, I've got to go around the room first. George? Stanley, I mean. Too many Krupskis in-- I can't keep them all straight."

George Schmelzer: "On trucks now, how about a garbage truck that comes along the street, stops and makes noise. Are they supposed to shut the engine off every time they put stuff in the truck and start it up again?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "They're supposed-- not supposed to come around until after 7:00 in the morning, George."

George Schmelzer: "Well, suppose they don't?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Well, they're in violation of their own contract."

George Schmelzer: (inaudible)

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Okay."

George Schmelzer: "And leave people alone, be better off."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "You're probably absolutely correct there. Thank you, George. Stanley?"

Stanley Krupski: "Stanley Krupski, Calverton. You said it's all right to idle your engines out in the boon docks but not in Town. What-- these same people paying same taxes, I mean, why should they be put into a different category. Oh, you live out in the boon docks, you can run your motors."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "One of the areas that we're really trying to address-- what we're doing here right now will be taken under consideration by the Board and discussed. But, the main area that we're trying to relate ourselves to and you may appreciate this, is what is it? Aid Auto? The old Harrows?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "King Kullen."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "You have (inaudible) Street up there. You've got the King Kullen, Caldor, and you're surrounded by residents. Waldbaums receives many deliveries at night time. They sit out there and run their engines waiting for them to open. You know how reefer units run all night."

Stanley Krupski: "Question."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Let me just finish my explanation."

Stanley Krupski: "Sure."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Sometimes they will bring out a loaded trailer, drop it, hook it up to another trailer, and then go on. We have experienced a great deal of discomfort by the residents in that particular area-- those areas. We will probably experience in other-- we're really trying to focus in on a commercial area which is adjacent to a residential area. I hope you can appreciate the direction we're trying to head. We may not be there yet, Stanley."

Stanley Krupski: "Right,-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "But we're trying to get somewhere close to that so we can let somebody sleep rather than 2:00 in the morning and I shipped a lot of potatoes over the years, you know, 44,

48 footers come in and when they drop and then hook up, there's some loud clanging and noise."

Stanley Krupski: "Can't you regulate these shopping centers?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I think the points that you have brought up here tonight certainly I can see that George is absolutely correct. We're getting-- but those are the areas we're trying to deal with and certainly I think that we have some further discussion on this, and-- before we make-- take any action on it."

Stanley Krupski: "These same people though, they like to go to the shopping store, buy the produce nice fresh, crisp without these refrigerator units going, it's impossible."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Many times I've loaded trailers in the evening as we were bringing potatoes, you know, we worked until eight or 9:00 at night. Around Christmas time, make hay while the sun shines. So there are areas I think that we have to deal with. Those-- this is specifically what we are trying to deal with whether we're at that point with this, I don't believe we're at that point right now with this description and we're trying. So I think that we're going to have to reshuffle a little bit and move on."

Stanley Krupski: "Right, I think you really should make-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Especially being in an agricultural community such as we have here right now."

Stanley Krupski: "Yes. And I think you should make your intentions known to the people before, you know, just coming out and saying, well, we're going to change this code. Let the people know who it's actually being addressed to or what."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Yes."

Stanley Krupski: "Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Many farmers get up, start planting at five, five-thirty in the morning."

Stanley Krupski: "Irrigation pumps running all night, too."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "That's right. Agriculture is exempt anyway, but, okay. Is there anybody else who would like to make a comment at this particular time? If not, I-- yes, George?"

George Schmelzer: "These refrigerated boxes have to run all night otherwise the stuff will spoil. They would have to stay in back of Waldbaum all night next to a residential house, maybe during the night they could stay out in the front in the parking lot until maybe an hour or two before they unload. Then go back."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "That's certainly what the direction or the results that we would like to achieve. Yes."

George Schmelzer: "Okay."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, George."

George Schmelzer: "Yes."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Anybody else? If not, I will declare the Hearing closed."

Public Hearing closed: 7:37 p.m.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "There are no more Public Hearings, are there Barbara?"

Barbara Grattan: "No, there isn't."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Then for this evening-- okay, I would now entertain anybody who would like to speak on any particular given topic. Is there anybody who would like to? Steve? Why don't you get it started, Steve."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. I was told once not to apologize because it would show a sign of weakness. But I don't look at it that way. On the 21st of June, about 2:00 in the afternoon, there was a hearing in this Town Hall. There was a code 52.9, was brought up at that time for the hearing. And then later, there was another hearing brought up on code 52.81, I think is the

last digit. Now, what had happened is Henry Ford said thinking is the hardest work in the world because so few people engage themselves in it. So when this 52.8 came out I don't guess I started thinking like I should, and I thought that the vote had been taken on 52.9, which is-- deals with flooding. And if I recall, I believe I left a memo on your desk stating that I didn't-- it did cover flooding, but I didn't hear anything about it, so I still was under misapprehension and I know I brought it up at the Jamesport meeting.

So, later on in talking with the Town Coordinator on the phone, that's where I picked up my clue that I was wrong, that that was brought out on the 21st of June and as of today, if I'm correct, it hasn't been voted into law yet.

Now, I'm going to apologize for the misapprehension and bringing it to the stage where I did before. And at the same time, going to thank Frank for asking me to come in. And we went over it and that's where we got it cleared up, and I think that was commendable of him inviting me to do that.

Now, at this time, as I said it hasn't been put into law that I know of, and if I'm wrong, I'll stand and be corrected right now. But I think it should be put into law as soon as possible because as Mr. Kasperovich once said here, these people are going to come in and they are going to do whatever they please and they are going to hurry up and (inaudible) and what have you and get the heck out of here, just like they did on the old (inaudible) house before they got caught. Well, they got caught later down the line.

All right, so, again, I say get it voted into law as quickly as you can.

Vic, at the last meeting I talked to you about the deep drains on 25 and you said you was going to get with Mrs. Acampora. I don't know if you did or not, but in case you didn't, I've been inspecting Route 58 by Mill Road. You got four there just as bad, and I don't know how good a friend you are to Mr. Hodack (phonetic) is that his name, of the county public works, I believe that takes care of roads. I'd appreciate it if you would write a letter to both of these people pointing this out. I realize it's on the shoulder, but when you get that close to an intersection where these things are located, some of the drivers that we have in New York, in a way I'm condemning them

but in another way, I know I'm right. They will not wait for you at the light; they will not (inaudible) up in line like they should, and boom, boom, boom, they're gone, you know. Because they'll be tearing up their car, but if they don't control it, they could very well pull off and get someone else, throw them out. It's been known to happen.

So, since you're on the Highway Committee, I would appreciate your taking care of that. Even though they're state and they're town, but we let you people to run this town for us and if the county can send a bill over here every year and say give me so many taxes and they want \$17 more this year from us residents, then that money as far as I'm concerned is being collected for maintenance and general fund and maintenance along that line. I certainly appreciate you taking care of it."

Councilman Prusinowski: "The Route 58 job is not done, they still have striping to do and they have some incidental work and I believe some of that is the (inaudible) on the drains. Because they put new asphalt on it and everytime you raise the asphalt, the inserts you have to put on the drains."

Steve Haizlip: "What are you going to do? Give them a certain amount of time?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, no. I spoke to the guy doing the work because he's a friend of Corazzini, the asphalt guy from Southold town, because I was asking him about the new process they have with that machine going down that was taking up the old asphalt, I was curious about it, you know, from the standpoint of the town, and he was telling me that some of the work is not going to be finished until the spring."

Steve Haizlip: "Yes. Right. Okay."

On Resolution 849, I'd like to get a little direction where you're going. Appointing an employee for transportation coordinator. What is this? What are you trying to say here? He's going to be a dispatcher?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "No. That's simply a title that we have to do in order to be in compliance with the Clean Air Act. A member of the staff of the town which I believe is Jack Hansen, will

act as the transportation coordinator where by law we are required when we have a facility or site that employs over 100 persons, we have to make effort to have those people travel to work in a pool car situation. So that we're not putting too much carbon monoxide and all that bad stuff out in the air.

Unfortunately, the federal government does not understand we're out in the country and I was glad to see over the weekend that some of our new elected officials are going to address some of the facets of the Clean Air bill which was passed and we now have to be in compliance with it. We have a schedule and Jack will act as that coordinator. We will make an effort, but, frankly, I think it's a waste of time."

Steve Haizlip: "You know-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "So that's exactly what that is."

Steve Haizlip: "All right. This is pointing in a direction-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "He's not getting any more money for that."

Steve Haizlip: "No. This is pointing in the direction Mr. Schmelzer keeps talking about. We're being regimentated every day more in our lives. We could pay, buy a car, pay all these big taxes, but we can't use it for going back and forth to work which is the purpose of it."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Well, we're also glad to see that in the contract down there that says it's going to deregulate a lot of the mandates that they send down. So, hopefully, some of this will happen, if they stay off our backs and let us live normal lives."

Steve Haizlip: "Well, I don't want to keep draggin this on, but-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Yes, because I have to ask you to sum up."

Steve Haizlip: "I'm going to sum up."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

Steve Haizlip: "They want a (inaudible) in this country and they keep making cars and keep selling, but if they are going to take them away from people, you can't let them drive, then what the heck good is it?"

George Schmelzer: "Yes, otherwise they can't want people buying cars. I was very saddened to find out that our Governor elect, Mr. Pataki, went and appointed former Governor Carey to his transition team. That guy isn't to be trusted. He sold us out once, and he'll sell us out again. He sold us out on November the 4th, 1976, on the Safe Driving Act. And as far as I'm concerned, he's lazy. He never did nothing in Congress and he tried to take claim that he got us the F-14 contract through a college paper in Stony Brook. He didn't do nothing, and if George wants him to sit around, he's got the right man."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Steve, I truly have to-- I see some other people out here that want to speak."

Steve Haizlip: "I'm finished, Jim."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Okay, thank you, sir."

Steve Haizlip: "Right."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Anybody else who would like to speak at this particular moment on any particular subject? George?"

George Schmelzer: "I heard a rumor that that trade treaty was (inaudible) in Mexico, specifies that there will be no hindrance, exchange of agricultural stuff anywheres. I heard it's going to louse up some of these farmstand ordinances. Did you hear about that?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "No, I haven't, George."

George Schmelzer: "Not a bit?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "No."

George Schmelzer: "I heard about it in Southampton. Well, anyway--"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Well, there are some ordinances over

in Southampton that actually, I think, deteriorate the farm economy over there, so, I don't believe that we're willing to address that factor here in Riverhead. We like our farmers over here."

George Schmelzer: "Yes, otherwise they don't want people having a sign up in a farm stand saying we grow what we sell and they have bananas hanging up there. That wouldn't be quite right. I hear that the Town wants to buy six acres from Donohue in Calverton for a sump. Is that true?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I believe there has been discussions with Mr. Donohue on the possibility of the sale of land and the purchase of land for the purpose of drainage from-- for the Town of Riverhead. Yes."

George Schmelzer: "Way back when they built 25 in 1922 I believe, there's a big culvert on the road in Zays (phonetic) yard. It lines up with Lake Avenue. About four feet high, eight feet wide. And I guess used to be a drain across the yard there. If you have to, get an easement, put the water through there (inaudible). By the time it gets to the lake, it will be (inaudible) the ground again. You'll have nothing to dig out, no problems, no land to buy, nothing to maintain. Think about it."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "You're absolutely correct and we have attempted to strike up conversation with Mrs. Zay and as you well know and I know, that's been unfruitful to this point."

George Schmelzer: "Well, you can-- if you can force Donohue to sell you six acres-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "We're not trying to force Mr.-- "

George Schmelzer: "No, I mean, if you can do one, you can do the other, and this would be cheaper and people tell me there used to be a pipe across their yard, so I don't know if there's any rights to the Town remaining or not. If you look from the aerial picture, you'll see that Canoe Lake Avenue lines up with Riley Avenue. Maybe one time it went right through there. It must have been, because why would the state have that big culvert there for the water to go through? Not for nothing."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, George."

George Schmelzer: "Okay. You're welcome."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody else at this particular time? If not, let us take up the Resolutions."

Resolution #827

Councilman Prusinowski: "Authorizes the Town Clerk to publish and post notice. So moved."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Stark, yes. The Resolutions are adopted.

Resolution #854

Councilwoman Gilliam: "Meetinghouse Creek bulkheading capital project budget adoption. So moved."

Councilman Creighton: "And seconded."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Yes. I want to point out this is a project that-- it came to fruition from Townscape, the Recreation Department and the Town of Riverhead. This is a joint project. I know there was a letter in the newspaper a couple of weeks ago criticizing us. The long term plan for this project is to make a mini park at this particular location for the enjoyment of the

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Go ahead and do your Resolution and then I will discuss it with the Board."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Resolution #861 authorizes-- "

Barbara Grattan: "Sixty-two."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Whatever it is-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "862."

Councilman Prusinowski: "862, authorizes the Supervisor to execute any amendment-- an amendment to the June 8, 1994, contract between the Town of Riverhead and McGuire Group, (inaudible) capping and closure of landfill. We signed a stipulation of agreement with the DEC. We're on a timetable. Part of that is the arrangement we

made with them, is we must submit applications to the DEC and to the State of New York to receive-- to get on a list to receive grants and low interest loans in this project. Also, the engineering fees in this particular phase will be partially paid for by the quarter per cent sales tax law that was passed by a referendum in 1987 which some of the monies goes to acquisition of lands within each town and the other portion of the money goes to this particular expense. So most of these legal fees will be paid for by the quarter per cent sales tax.

The legal fees in this phase range from anywhere from \$100,000 to \$400,000 on the life of this project, which is the absolute end of when we must cap the landfill or the Board might consider another option which is to investigate the possibility of mining the landfill which is reclaiming it completely, recycling it, and then forever ridding the Town of the obligation to maintain the cap. So this is an option that's picking up steam around the country.

I move Resolution #862."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Seconded."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Stark, yes. The Resolution is adopted.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I will put the meeting into recess for five minutes so that the Board may discuss a possible additional Resolution. So, with that--."

Recess - 5 minutes

Meeting resumed - 8:10 p.m.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 8:10 p.m. has arrived and we'll come back at a recess. Councilman Creighton will bring a Resolution off the floor. Kim would you kind of write this down and we'll generate this one in the morning, if it's all right with the Board. Calling for an appraisal."

Councilman Creighton: "I make a motion that-- as you know, a

year ago, in fact, it may be a year ago this week if not tonight, tomorrow, the Town Board authorized a bond to acquire the properties that the (inaudible) and Corwin houses on East Main Street where the East End Arts Council reside and where numerous functions take place over the course of time. That's been kind of a dead issue for a few months, and now there's an interest in going forward. There's some activity in the commercial market, interest in it, because of Okeanos and that sort of thing.

So the Town has been presented with a number which is almost 75 per cent higher than it was a year ago as to the value of the property. And we still have an interest in preserving it for the use of the East End Arts Council and other functions. They're in the process of discussing this, we found that there's some issues associated with it. There was a question of whether the two houses on the Main Street were, in fact, preserved by the Landmarks Commission. We just found out today not only are those two preserved, but the three other buildings on the property, all five buildings, are encumbered by our local Landmarks Commission, so that this, in fact, was not known in this building very well, let alone in the commercial market. So, this is bound to have a significant on the actual value of the property.

So, if anything, there's a good reason that the value is not gone up in the last year, but with this additional information may, in fact, be going down. The bottom line is that we would like to know what a fair market value of that property is so that the Town can adjust its bonding authorization which we did last year, up to \$185,000, if necessary. So what I move is that we go forward with an appraisal for the Town so that we have a professional evaluation of what that property is really worth so that we can guide our bonding action in the future. So moved."


Councilwoman Gilliam: "And seconded."

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
