

Minutes of a Regular Board Meeting held by the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead held in the Riverhead Town Hall, 200 Howell Avenue, Riverhead, New York, on Tuesday, May 17, 1994, at 7:00 p.m.

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Deputy Supervisor Stark called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "If I could ask you to remain standing for a moment. This past week, one of our former Supervisors, Bruno Zaloga, passed away. I would ask for a moment of silence in recognition. Thank you."

We have a few recognitions to give out tonight if you would bear with us. It seems that recently we have lost many, many good friends to the Town of Riverhead and to the senior citizens in the Town of Riverhead. We have tonight a Proclamation and I would ask Councilwoman Gilliam to present it in memory of Joe Sykora."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "Thank you, Councilman Stark."

Resolution 373, Riverhead Town Board, reads as follows:

WHEREAS, the Town Board recognizes that the residents of the Town of Riverhead are an invaluable resource; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board acknowledges the contributions the residents of the Town makes to enhance the quality of life and to advance efforts towards a strong and sound community; and

WHEREAS, Joseph Sykora was an invididual who gave unselfishly of his time and energy towards enhancing the quality of life for mobile home owners in the Town of Riverhead as well as throughout Suffolk County and New York State; and

WHEREAS, Joseph Sykora gave committed and dedicated service as former president of the Mobile Homeowners of Eastern Suffolk, Inc.; and

WHEREAS, Joseph Sykora was also a founder and president of the New York State Mobile Homeowners and Landleasers; and

WHEREAS, in these capacities, Joseph Sykora advocated on behalf of mobile home owners before the Suffolk County Legislature and the New York State Legislature in order to protect the rights of mobile home owners; and

WHEREAS, Joseph Sykora passed away on May 9, 1994, and the Town Board recognizes that his death is a loss to the Town, County, and State,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board, by this Resolution, honors the legacy of Joseph Sykora which exemplifies a true sense of public responsibility and commitment as an advocate on behalf of the mobile homeowners; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution shall be presented to Florence Sykora, Joseph's widow, as an expression of the Town's appreciation of Joseph Sykora's service to the community.

It is signed by Joseph Janoski, Supervisor, and all of the Town Board members. James Stark, Deputy Supervisor, Victor Prusinowski, Councilman, Frank Creighton, Councilman, and Harriet Gilliam, Councilwoman.

Florence Sykora: "I'd just like to say thank you. I've been taken aback by this; I didn't expect to have this tonight. So, I can't say

anything right now. Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "This week is also a particular national week and many times those of us in need will have to call upon our local volunteer ambulance group. I would like to ask Councilman Creighton to read the Proclamation which declares this EMS Week."

Councilman Creighton: "WHEREAS, it is proper and fitting that the Town of Riverhead acknowledge the dedication of organizations which provide a service to their fellow man; and

WHEREAS, the national Emergency Medical Service has served the community through scheduled events and (inaudible) residents, and more importantly the youth of our Town; and

WHEREAS, the National Emergency Medical Service (inaudible) where classes will be used to instruct our children in the proper use of such Emergency Services such as the 911, in a medical emergency;

NOW, THEREFORE, Joseph F. Janoski, Supervisor of the Town of Riverhead, hereby proclaims the week of May 15 through 21, 1994, as National Emergency Medical Service Week in the Town of Riverhead, in grateful appreciation for the services this organization performs for its residents.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "-- the heavy one is my son. It's his Birthday today, too, so wish him a Happy Birthday.

Also visiting with us tonight is, and I'd like to ask her to stand up, is Pat Lanetta from the Suffolk County Office of the Aging. And-- attest to the award that I would ask Councilman Prusinowski to hand that out."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Resolution #372.

WHEREAS, it is both fitting and proper that the Town of Riverhead recognize and honor the outstanding achievements of its residents; and

WHEREAS, Henry C. Pfeiffer, Jr. has devoted much of his time and energy to better services for his community, with the benefit of all of the members of the community, such as the upgrading of the Wading River Community Park, forming the Riverhead Town Senior Citizens Advisory Board, having the Town of Riverhead declare each and every May as Senior Citizen Month as well as scheduling events and programs for that purpose and is a strong advocate for the concerns of our senior citizens and urges all of our seniors to become involved in our community; and

WHEREAS, Henry C. Pfeiffer, Jr. has served his country through the Armed Services where he attained the rank of Colonel; and

WHEREAS, Henry C. Pfeiffer, Jr. has most recently been named Senior Citizen of the Year by New York State.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead acknowledges the accomplishments of Henry C. Pfeiffer, Jr. and expresses its heartfelt appreciation for the dedicated services he has performed for his community, in particular, for his fellow senior citizens of his home town.

And every member of the Board signed it. Congratulations, Henry, it is a real honor--."

Henry Pfeiffer, Jr. "Thank you for this great honor made even greater because it comes from those I've known and respected for a long time. In a larger sense, it recognizes the many mature residents of Riverhead dedicated to the betterment of our entire community. You need only look around you to see who they are. You see them in every productive endeavor. They are an intrinsic and inseparable part of our society, not simply receivers of (inaudible), but substantial contributors to the general good.

I am but one of them. I've been trying to help for most of my life. My greatest qualification for this particular award is that I'm old. I've been getting older for the last 80 years and I intend to keep on getting old until I get it right.

I accept this distinction as a very subtle hint that I continue my efforts. If the measurement of a society is the manner in which it cares for its most vulnerable, the very young, the infirmed, the very old, and I believe it is, the Town of Riverhead may justifiably be very proud

of its residents. Again, thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I would ask the Board for a motion on those three Resolutions to be adopted at this present time."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "So moved."

Councilman Prusinowski: "And seconded."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded."

I would ask the Board without objection, the Town Clerk will cast a yes vote for all. So moved.

Before we start the order of business tonight, I would remind you that the school budget vote goes on until 9:00 tonight. If anybody has not voted, please feel free to go up to the high school and vote on the school budget.

Is there a motion to approved the minutes-- those who would like not to attend the regular business, they may leave now and we will pause for a second.

Is there a motion to approve the minutes of the regular Town Board Meeting of May 3rd?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "So moved."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "And seconded."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded."

Public Hearing Opened: 7:16 P.M.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the hour of 7:16 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall at 7:10 P.M. on Tuesday, May 17, 1994, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the amendments to the zoning code to provide for bed and breakfast facilities."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "-- would you like to make any comment? Oh, excuse me, Rick. I didn't see you back there. I'm sorry."

Rick Hanley: "Good evening. The amendment tonight is a series of amendments to the zoning code of the Town of Riverhead to support the development of bed and breakfast facilities in the Town. The intent is to support the development of a tourist economy in the Town.

Tonight's ordinance or proposed amendments is an outgrowth of the Aquebogue Hamlet Study which recognized a couple of things when it was doing its work. It saw a need to provide overnight accommodations within the Town of Riverhead relative to our contemplated tourist economy. It recognizes that bed and breakfast facilities were compatible with the rural character of the Hamlet, and it recognized that there existed a housing stock within the Town that could support bed and breakfast facilities.

This is not one ordinance; it's a series of amendments to the existing code. I think the relevant and important parts of it for general consumption is that the intent of the Board here is to provide for bed and breakfast in existing residences and new residences, however, the residences would have to be owner occupied.

There are a number of other issues relative to Health Department considerations and a provision by the Town to have an annual permit review in order to enforce the ordinance itself.

I think that's all, and thank you very much."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Rick. Would you like to make any comment, Victor, on this?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Only that-- it's going to be allowed a Business "A", a Business "B", Residence "C", Agricultural "A", Business "CR", by special permit of the Town Board, which means that every one of those zoning classifications you would have to come into the Town Board and get-- fill out a special permit application which would require a Public Hearing.

The reason we want to do that is to make sure that the applicants and the community meet and that there is no misunderstanding as to the intention of this particular type of business.

We also, in this particular proposal, have-- put a maximum duration of one week, seven consecutive days, which could be amended in the future by future Town Boards just to see how things work out, and how the tourist business develops in Riverhead. It's not uncommon and I know up in Vermont where I go skiing, where sometimes you stay up to two weeks in a bed and breakfast, I don't think people stay longer than that because you really are staying in somebody's home so seven days is really not too restrictive right at the present time.

There is a parking requirement. We would amend the parking schedule. You would have to have a lot big enough to have one space per sleeping room so that if the neighborhood was too congested and you can not meet the parking requirements, instead of parking all over the street, you would not be allowed to do this.

So on that, I guess we'll hear from the public."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody wishing to comment on this particular Public Hearing? Yes, ma'am."

Anne Lowry: "Good evening. My name is Anne Lowry. I am the President of the North Fork Environmental Council. Speaking for the Council, I would like to support this change in the code, or these changes, which will establish bed and breakfast as an allowed use in several zones in the Town of Riverhead.

We, at NFEC, believe that permitting bed and breakfast is part of a larger effort Riverhead is making to create and promote sustainable economic development here. The creation of more and attractive places to stay overnight will certainly enhance the time that visitors spend here and will encourage more people to come and stay longer.

Such places are necessary to accommodate those tourists who come for instance to enjoy two major new in the works projects, Okeanos and the Outlets, as well as other pleasures of the Town of Riverhead. We are glad to see that you have considered a limitation in your definition of a week. We were going to make that point, too, so that the intent would be to keep it a bed and breakfast and not let it get into a rooming house or boarding house.

And, again, we do think this amendment is a very progressive move for the Town of Riverhead. Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else wishing to comment on this particular-- yes, sir."

Dave Macknee: "I only have one-- I'm Dave Macknee. I live up in-- I have some (inaudible) and I would be interested in operating a bed and breakfast."

The north shore, except for the Okeanos and Tanger, really doesn't have any draw for people to come out here as tourists. The Sound itself is pretty much, you know, not able to swim in it and because I live right there and I swim in it and you get sick if you swim in it a long time. But there is one thing I would like to say that they have-- from Orient Point to I forget exactly where, but the County has a Greenbelt that goes from Orient Point to, I guess it's in this way quite a way, it's 306 acres they just bought. The Town of Riverhead has done no planning whatsoever to have a Greenbelt for riding horses is one, for hiking, two, and for bicycling, three, which all are things that people-- and if they did it up along the north shore before all the development happened, they could have worked with the people that were developing Fox Hill and Malibu Beach Estates and if this golf course ever comes in, and they could have had a situation where they would have a Greenbelt where people would be, you know, renting bicycles, renting horses to ride along the north shore, and would be hiking.

At this point, it would make it a very viable thing to have a bed and breakfast. But other than that, I don't know how much Okeanos is going to bring in and I don't know how much-- people that go to Tanger aren't going to stay overnight. So I would think that the Board would, if they are really serious about tourist industry, really serious, they should think about going with the County and bringing this Greenbelt all the way to Wildwood State Park.

Now, if you brought it to Wildwood State Park, you could also have a bird sanctuary where people could sit down with binoculars and look at the birds. You might think that's not a big thing, but it's really a lot of people sit and watch the birds if they have, you know, an area where there are a cross section of birds.

And that's all I have to say."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Jimmy, I just want to say one thing. I just want to remind the public that in the Town of Riverhead, we have more open space preserved, permanently, than any other Town in Suffolk County. That's a fact. We have over 4,000 acres in the Suffolk County Farmland Program. We also have over 3,000 acres that I just read in the paper will be turned over to the federal government outside the fence from Grumman. We also have parks, State parks, County parks throughout the Town. It's a great idea. I don't know what the 308 acres are, whether it was the Farmland Preservation or a groundwater protection, that we would have to check into.

The Greenbelt is a fine idea, but it costs a lot of money. You have to float a bond to purchase the property, so, but the County taxpayers have purchased already over 4,000 acres in the Farm Program and there's more-- I just ran into Legislator Blass today and he told me that there is going to be another appropriation for the next round."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else-- "

Dave Macknee: "Can I add one thing to that?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I just want to see if there is anybody else who wants to speak first and then I'll call you back up. Anybody else who would like to speak on this particular Public Hearing? We have to go around once."

Paul Noonan: "Good evening. I have one problem with the-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Just state your name."

Paul Noonan: "Paul Noonan, from Aquebogue. I just have one problem with the bed and breakfast. My contention to the Town Board is to put yourself in the shoes of a tourist coming out here to spend a couple of nights at a B&B to explore the north fork. Imagine having breakfast on the deck of the B&B in the areas mentioned and suddenly a stench invades their eating area causing you to retreat inside on such a beautiful day.

The stench coming from the processing plant. This puts a damper on your day as well as your trip. If a tourist don't come to the B&B's because of the smell, they will not spend time here. If they don't spend time here, they don't spend time at the farmstands, at the restaurants, at the delis, wineries and so on. If tourists have a bad experience

like a smell ruining their trip, not only will they not come back, but most likely they will tell people not to come out here to Aquebogue. Then it affects all businesses in the area. People will not come back because of the smell.

Since we are focusing all our energies towards tourism on the north fork, Riverhead, Jamesport, Aquebogue in particular, the paddleboats, the wineries, Okeanos, etc., tourism is an income producing and prudent way to keep our rural character of the north fork intact if it's done correctly. The foresight or the lack of foresight in the planning of tourism today will dictate the development of our tourism industry in our area for years to come.

So in closing if the Town takes the Aquebogue Hamlet Study seriously they should also consider the foul odors coming from the processing plant and it's effect on tourism seriously. Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else wishing to speak on this particular topic? Bill."

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich from Wading River. I know this phrase, bed and breakfast, is fairly common to the United States, particularly the east coast. But I do feel that this is absolutely premature for Riverhead. This is like 50 years ago we had boarding houses. There is a man here, used to come here with his bodyguard who everybody noticed that he carried firearms and never paid much attention what he was trying to do. He tried to build a multi-story building here where seven days, what brought to mind was the seven day limit. People would come-- couples would come here and stay for seven days. And that was knocked down mainly because his building was too big, too tall, too big in scope.

All right, instead of going up in the air in a big scope, we are now spreading it over the entire Township. And you are opening Pandora's Box with this. Yes, there is a potential need for people to come here and stay overnight. Because as the years go on, it's becoming impossible to make a round trip from New York City to this area, from there and back, especially with children. Today's traffic makes it extremely difficult. Consequently, an overnight stay would be a marvelous thing.

But the way it is presented here, I say no way. You don't introduce the conditions that people would have to accept in order to have the

public come in and stay overnight. The building itself, the standards of facilities, the limitations as to the manner of running the business, male and female come in, there's no way to know whether this is husband and wife or whether somebody down the road set it up for a convenient overnight stay.

But you haven't closed enough serious concerns and opened up serious standards by which this would be run openly and controlled. You do not allow-specifically stipulate that the Town would be able to come into the house or that the police would be given an open policy to check the house out at any time, day or night, without a bond.

So, I say enough thought has not been given to this. At this point in time, and in this point and time I object to it. Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Bill."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Jim, I just want to make two points. The Planning Board, we referred this to the Planning Board and they did make recommendations to the Town Board, and I want to read to the public a couple of conditions we did put in here.

The guest rooms may not be used as legal residences in order to enroll children into a school district.

Number 7. That upon the issuance of a special permit for a bed and breakfast facility, the Town Board shall require an annual inspection and compliance permit for bed and breakfast for use upon real property. The Town Board shall either approve or deny the bed and breakfast use as a result of such inspection.

We are doing that because we want to make sure everybody follows the rules and it doesn't turn into something that we don't want. But the Planning Board did make some good recommendations to the Town Board and they have been incorporated into this ordinance.

But your comments are taken and we will take them under consideration absolutely. That's the purpose of a Public Hearing."

William Kasperovich: "Well, Councilman Prusinowski, this is exactly the thing that I am objecting to. Legal residents, long term stay. Annual inspection is 365 days apart and it's hardly adequate for overnight

staying."

Councilman Prusinowski: "All right. We'll take a look at making it more tight."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Bill. Is there anybody else who would like to make a comment. Allison?"

Councilman Creighton: "While she's coming up, I might interject that the Jamesport Hamlet Study is also favorably considering recommending in their final report the bed and breakfast, and so I believe it's safe to say that the Jamesport Hamlet Study also endorses what is brought forward from the Aquebogue Hamlet Study."

Allison Noonan: "My name is Allison Noonan and I am also a resident of Aquebogue. And I commend the Aquebogue Hamlet Study Task Force and the Town Board in the foresight that they have planning in regards to attracting tourism to the Aquebogue area.

By the same token, the putrid odors and the severe infestation of flies that we have in Aquebogue due to the duck processing plant is another issue that this Board needs to contend with for attracting tourists to the bed and breakfast. Because these two problems put the prospective tourists' general health and welfare in danger.

Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Allison. Is there anybody else that would like to make a comment on this particular topic tonight? Now I will recognize the gentleman that spoke earlier."

Dave Macknee: "First I'd like to address the fact that-- Mr. Prusinowski, that the County has a what they call the Panamoke (phonetic) Trail."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Oh, they have a trail?"

Dave Macknee: "Yes. They have the Panamoke Trail. Essentially right now, it goes from Wading River to Montauk. It's a hiking trail only. They want to put a bike trail in and they want to put a horse trail in."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Does this trail go across the property, is it all on public property?"

Dave Macknee: "Mostly Pine Barrens."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Oh, it's mostly in the Pine Barrens."

Dave Macknee: "Okay. So there's-- we're working on now is the thing for the horses and originally they said that it would be a big problem with the horses because they're not, you know, not environmentally sound. But let me tell you something. I have people come to my farm all the time trying to pick up all the horse manure they can get. So, I mean, how bad can it be? Flowers grow great with it. Okay. But, this Pine Barrens thing, I'm not knocking the Board here-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Sir, we're here discussing bed and breakfast. If you would like to come up at another time to discuss the amenities of having a camping trail, what have you, I'd be glad to entertain it, but let's stick to the subject of bed and breakfast."

Dave Macknee: "Okay. Just one more thing I'd like to answer Bill. I don't know his last name. But what is the difference if a woman and man come out and want to spend a week. Can they not be-- that they do it down here in a budget motel or anything else, why-- what would be the difference between them staying at a bed and breakfast or staying in a motel? I don't understand this morality, but that's all I have to say."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Okay, thank you. Is there anybody else who would like to make a comment on this particular Public Hearing tonight? If not, I'll declare the Hearing closed."

Public Hearing Closed: 7:38 P.M.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Since there is no other Public Hearings tonight, is there anybody wishing to address the Board on any subject? Doctor Grantham?"

Dr. Grantham: "I'm Dr. Caryl Grantham, 73A Sound Avenue, Riverhead. I come to speak on a subject that means a very great deal to me and I thought because I was so involved that I could look back and give you

some history to facts of going-- stretching back to maybe 15-20 years. I, that fall, moderated a League of Women Voters meeting at the high school, which is now the grade school on Roanoke Avenue. The auditorium was full. It was a meeting which had one thing on its mind, and that was that the trees on Main Street, which were then sycamores, had been cut down in the nighttime. And if you ever saw an audience really (inaudible), that was it.

Anyway, Mr. Alex Horton, who was running for Supervisor, re-election, the whole ire of that meeting descended on his head. And, of course, I'm very convinced and I'm sure others were too, that it was not his, he was following some orders. In any event, he did not-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I believe it was Teddy Zemko, who was the Superintendent of Highways when they were cut down, not Alex Horton."

Dr. Caryl Grantham: "Yes, but Alex Horton also was involved that night. Anyway-- "

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "He might have been the candidate for the Superintendent of Highways in the next election."

Dr. Caryl Grantham: "Anyway, when it was over, we citizens care deeply for this Town and turn to what to do in view of the fact that it was a denuded, really disaster so far so many of us who care for the Town so deeply. So some of us thought the best thing we could possibly do was to do some-- at least some of us did-- first of all research trees, it would be very appropriate over the long term for a (inaudible). Bob Brewster was one person that I worked with, considered an authority on the subject of trees, and I, myself, I still have some of my file among my research materials on the subject of what would be the best for this Town.

There had been a lot of complaints about birds and bird droppings and noise and buckling in the sidewalk, the sewer lines and water lines and other utilities, and trees that were very rapid growers. I had not been involved with the sycamores which were cut down. In any event, after much consultation and thought, we came to the arrival of a unanimous decision that it should be pin oaks (phonetic). Pin oaks are widely used in urban areas throughout the eastern seaboard. They are also widely used in Europe. They are a beautiful tree, both spring and summer and fall. They are not a fast growing tree, but they are, we felt, the tree

system, root system, most appropriate for urban plantings. Those trees were quite valuable. I did not, my responsibility was not in financing the cost. If I remember correctly, they were about \$100 apiece and in order to raise those funds we came on the possibility of dedicating those trees and some of you may know the dedications.

In any event, the trees were planted and it was a big effort, a very big effort. And I never expected in 15 years when they are just beginning to look really beautiful what has happened to them. Now, I came to the Board when they were discussing budgets, at least on three occasions and it might have been more, saying to them you cannot invest in any property, most of all shrubs and trees, unless you are willing to take some care of them through the years. I happen to have a beautiful place, I love trees, and I know very well, in any climate, you have to give them some care.

As far as I know, no money was ever put in the budget even though it could have been a small amount, but I insisted on expert care if it were given. The trees, as far as I'm concerned, are in very, very serious danger. I say in a facetious mood, we have come from pin oaks to pin-heads. I can't tell you the ambiance, the character, the joy, the appreciation of trees in a Town. Go up and down the eastern seaboard, go to Europe, they even have these trees on bike paths. It cannot be the question of not seeing a sign from the highways, which I understand is one of the complaints now. Those trees are amenable to proper pruning. It should have been done through the years. But when citizens care as much as we do, give as much effort as we do, 20 or 15 years to have this happen, there is absolutely no excuse and I will ask one rhetorical question. For God sakes, isn't this Town ever going to get its act together?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else who would like to speak to the Board on any particular given subject? Yes, sir, way in the back."

Steve Shackman: "Steve Shackman from Roll-In Park, Calverton. I have two things that I want to ask. Was anything done about the Cable-vision for the senior citizens?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "We are still in the process-- "

Unidentified: "We can't hear you."

Steve Shackman: "Was anything done for the senior citizens on the Cablevision which was taken away from us and we have heard no more about it after the elections were over. Question two, the one thing that distresses me when I go into the city, I see all the graffiti all over, it's just so universal and it's so degrading, and I notice a little of it is starting to creep into Riverhead. Is there any way that some signs or a law could be passed, anybody caught doing this, to have the nerve to deface someone's property?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "We have an anti-graffiti law. It's on the books and there is a fine."

Steve Shackman: "There doesn't seem to be anything around to tell these people that they are-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, we can publicize that. As far as the first question, we are getting close. Dick Ehlers who is handling this case for the Town Board, I spoke to him last week. Their attorneys from Cablevision are getting back with some language. They have agreed to a senior citizens discount. The details of that will be presented very shortly to the Town Board for our consideration."

Steve Shackman: "Well, the people that were under the plan have been dropped, so when they-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "I believe certain people are capped, certain people are not. The details-- we'll have to-- we've been negotiating right along. Some of their proposals were not acceptable to us."

Steve Shackman: "But if it was reapproved, then you would have to reapply?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, it's-- what I'm saying is they're going to make another proposal to the Town Board for us to consider."

Steve Shackman: "Would you be picked up if you were previously under it?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "I can't give you those details until I see what the plan is."

Steve Shackman: "Okay, thank you."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "I just want to make another point as well. In addition to the anti-graffiti statutes, there is a Penal Law statute which is criminal mischief. So if anyone is caught in the process of defacing a building, they face a class "A" misdemeanor if the value is below a certain amount, or if the value exceeds a certain amount, felony prosecution, so anyone who is caught is subject to prosecution in the Courts."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody else who would like to speak on any particular subject? Steve."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. First item that I would like to discuss, May 31st, 9:00 to 2:30, the Golden Doners are going to have a blood drive at the Holiday Inn. And Henry and myself are on the (inaudible) Committee and we welcome all the young kids from 50 to 75 to come on down and help us out."

Second thing I want to ask. On this here Helen Dris change of zone, it said that the application wasn't reviewed due to the fact that the information in Bulletin No. 8 of the Suffolk County Planning Commission. I don't want no one to get (inaudible) at me, as a Frenchman would say mad-- I want to ask this question. Was she first with that Bulletin No. 8 of Suffolk County Planning?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "We are certain that her attorney knew well about it."

Steve Haizlip: "Well, I don't think she got it. Okay."

The next thing I want to discuss, I feel that I will probably be putting my hands in a lion's mouth here tonight, but maybe we can ease it out without too many bites on it. Now, on Edwards Avenue, just over the railroad tracks, by the Albert Raynor house, I would think about two months now, there has been some garbage, well, rags, a mixture of stuff laying there in the gutter. But it was just south of the old house. I made an inquiry as to the Town Highway patrol if they could just stop and throw that on the truck because they do make highway patrols and they are riding past and figured they could do it. I was informed, now before I give you the answer as what I was informed on, Henry Ford once said that thinking is the hardest work in the world, because so few people engage

themselves in it. So when I inquired about the highway, I was informed -- oh the CEO, I think it stands for Code Enforcement Officer, has issued a summons to the lady of the house. I said, wait a minute. That lady is 50 miles away and I know this for a fact because I had to call her up to get permission to sign the water main that we anticipated getting on Edwards Avenue. And so-- and another thing. I know nobody has lived in that house since early October because I went there twice banging on the door before I contacted her trying to get an answer. And there was nobody there. And that garbage wasn't there then, but it appeared later there and just like a couple of months ago, just early spring.

Now, by the CEO issuing a summons, he's actually making an accusation or accusing people in that house which is non-existent and no residents there or no tenants putting it there. Now, I know for a fact that garbage is throwed out along the road quite often. I'm going to give you a place right now. Right across from Federal Express on Edwards Avenue, on the west side. There's lumber and some doors, scrap material, and so forth throwed off.

Now, would the CEO quickly run and give a summons to the man that owns that land or the lady that owns that land? The people don't know anything about it. And when it happened. So, I don't see how they can be held. And not only that, no one has got no proof. So, I think Henry Ford's philosophy applies here on the CEO.

Now, another item that is a problem is down at Kent Animal Shelter. The-- when you passed that ordinance that you couldn't leave this garbage out if it wasn't picked up, then you had to get it to the back of the house. All right. I notified the Director and the Clerk the next day about this because it was a hugh amount of leaves, because that place is entrenched with many, many oak trees. And they keep it beautiful and raked up. So, she informed me at the time and she also informed me the other day, she has more there to be cleaned. She pays the carter \$320 a month and she's been trying to ask this carter to take those bags of leaves to the landfill. You know what the carter is telling her? Hey lady, I just pick up the easy stuff. That's all I pick up.

Now, this woman is in a dilemma. And the other time that I talked with her, I got her some help, I got her to Joe and I'm sure the Highway come and picked it up. But I don't know if the Highway is obligated or not but this is informational info that I'm putting into you, Jim. Now, that's what I have at this time so I would like for you Town Board members

to pick this up, see what you could do."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Certainly you can go back to the Kent Animal Shelter as a non-profit organization as it is and if they have a vehicle, the landfill is open every Saturday for the balance of this month between the hours of 7:00 and 1:00 in the afternoon, where any private citizen who is trimming trees can bring yard waste to there at no charge. If you don't have a vehicle to get it there and you don't have the ability to borrow one, then you have to wait for our local carters and that has to be bundled and it has to be in four foot sections or leaves bagged, or grass."

Steve Haizlip: "These are all in bags."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "I'm sure that Kent Animal Shelter has a vehicle and they would be more than welcome up at the landfill for the remaining three Saturdays we have."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Or every day. We're open every day."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Or every day."

Steve Haizlip: "As far as I know, I don't think they have any truck and so therefore, what about the library? That's a public service to the Town. Do they have to pay for their garbage?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "They have a private carter."

Steve Haizlip: "Private carter?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Right. So does the Kent Animal Shelter. He has a private-- they are not in the Garbage District and really we're not the-- the Town does not pick up the yard waste for them. They would have to make arrangements to get a landscaper or somebody to take it up there. There's no charge for yard waste. We don't charge for yard waste."

Steve Haizlip: "I realize that. All right."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Steve. Bill?"

Bill Noehjl: "Bill Noehjl, Aquebogue. In reference to the garbage

that Steve has been talking about on Edwards Avenue. I picked that up yesterday. I put it into bags. I put it by the mailbox. That property I assume is paying taxes for garbage pickup. I will wait for a least a week to see if that is picked up. It is properly put in bags. There was a sign just as you get off the Expressway saying we're in Riverhead. Garbage. It was a poor thing. It griped me to see it there. And there's still some places around Town, really throwing out stuff that is terrible.

I must say there was quite professionalism here tonight with the Resolutions and plaques. It impressed me. But I feel as though it hasn't gone far enough. Vic, you know; Jim, you know; and Mr. Creighton, you know. Can you read my mind?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "I know what you are talking about."

Bill Noehjl: "All right, I wish you would take care of it."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay."

Bill Noehjl: "Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Bill. Is there anybody else wishing to-- sorry, Bill."

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich, from Wading River. Insofar as minutes are not kept for public record at the so called work shop sessions on Thursdays, nor the executive sessions conducted informally. I want it to be on public record that copies of the Town Board meeting of Tuesday, October 4, 1977, was distributed to all the Council-people by the Town Clerk, and I have a copy given to me.

This Resolution which by the way is page 749 in the Town record book, this Resolution was attended by the Supervisor Smith and all the Councilmen, Young, Menendez, Lombardi, and Tomlinson. It also records that Peter S. Danowski, Town Attorney, was present and Alex E. Horton, Superintendent of Highways, was present.

On page 793, the Resolution was offered by Councilman Lombardi, seconded by Councilwoman Tomlinson, and this Resolution without reading it in toto, just to bring forth to the public the following:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Town Board does hereby

accept for dedication of those roads shown, etc., etc.

Next paragraph,

FURTHER RESOLVED, that said roads are accepted, etc., etc.

Last sentence:

And said roads shall be maintained in the same manner as all other highways in the Town of Riverhead in the future.

This was passed unanimously and since 17 years have gone by and it could not be found-- this dedication could not be found anywhere except for this Resolution itself I take issue-- "

(inaudible)

William Kasperovich: "I beg your pardon, sir."

Councilman Prusinowski: "-- you read the Resolution. I happened to be present at that meeting in '77. I was working for the News-Review and they also did one on Timber Park. That Resolution was passed to allow the Highway Superintendent to go in there and grade the road-- "

William Kasperovich: "People that are interested can read it themselves."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Oh, to grade the roads and repair them."

William Kasperovich: "You don't tell them what-- don't tell the people what their intent was. Mr. Smith is still alive and functioning in this Town."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, then Charlie should go and fix the road."

William Kasperovich: "And Peter Danowski is well known in this Township."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, Bill, what I'm saying is the Superintendent of Highways should go fill your road."

William Kasperovich: "They can explain what the intent and what was in the minds of the people at that time."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, what I was saying, what was written there because I read the Resolution when the Town Clerk gave it to me and what it says was to go in and grade your roads and-- "

William Kasperovich: "Don't tell me what it says my friend."

Councilman Prusinowski: "But does it say that in there?"

William Kasperovich: "That's presumptive of you to say that."

Councilman Prusinowski: "But it says that in there."

William Kasperovich: "You want me to read the whole thing in total?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "No, no, please. We have no-- "

Unidentified: "No, no, no."

William Kasperovich: "All right. The Town accepted these roads. There were some questionable conditions but these have been Town roads, the people have been paying taxes for these roads as the roads-- as they were taxed the same way that I am and they are not getting the same service as all other roads in the Town of Riverhead. This is absolutely improper and illegal."

Councilman Prusinowski: "The Highway Superintendent should fix the roads then."

William Kasperovich: "Mr. Bloss apparently can't read certain words in the English language. Because once again, it crops up we have a Town road that the Highway Department knew nothing about. That's a very convenient cop-out for Mr. Bloss."

I wish you wouldn't mumble. If you've got anything to say, speak up."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I said the Resolution didn't follow Town law. Okay. That's the reason why the roads were never recorded into the book and I'll be happy to have the Town Attorney research this and we'll

get you an opinion from the Attorney General. Because the-- "

William Kasperovich: "Well, if you were doing things properly, you would have given the Town Attorney-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "I wasn't here in 1977. I wouldn't have voted for that Resolution."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Mr. Kasperovich, please. Lower the level a little bit."

William Kasperovich: "All right. Let me say-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "Stop shouting at us, okay. You are always shouting at us."

William Kasperovich: "Because when I get upset, I don't need these microphones. I shouldn't be here telling you your business."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Mr. Kasperovich-- "

William Kasperovich: "You did not give the Town Attorney a copy of this?"

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Mr. Kasperovich, please."

William Kasperovich: "All right. Back to being formal. The Town Attorney told me to my face an hour ago in the hallway that he did not receive a copy of this Resolution nor was he asked to pay any attention to it."

Councilman Prusinowski: "That's right. That's correct."

William Kasperovich: "Now, if this is correct, what do we have a Town Attorney for if you are presenting questionable issues on Resolutions, why doesn't the Town Attorney come into the scene?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Because we just got the information last week."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Gentlemen, I am not going to allow this argument to go any further. Please continue, Mr. Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich: "I think it is without question that people have been taxed for highway work that has not been received. And that the conduct of the Highway Superintendent is improper-- irregular, improper and illegal and since he is an elected official acting like he was a member of the Town Board, and we never see him in attendance at Public Hearings or at Town Board meetings, this is something that the voters should know when they come again to vote for a Highway Superintendent. He thinks he's above the Town Board and somebody someplace along the line if it boils down to the voter, that the Town Board runs this Town and not the Highway Superintendent.

Just because he is official-- he is an elected official, does not take him out from under the control of the Town Board. And to find that this Resolution could not be found in any other place other than the reproduction of the Resolution itself, is a total disgrace. Thank you."

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else wishing to address the Board? If not, let us take up the Resolutions."

Councilman Prusinowski: "It's eight by four. Oh, here it is here. I didn't give you the second one."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "Oh, okay."

Councilman Prusinowski: "And it's going to be up there. Then when the boat comes, they'll apply for a permit."

The Vote (Cont'd.): Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Stark, yes. Resolution is adopted.

Deputy Supervisor Stark: "Without objection, I declare this meeting closed."
