Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mrs. Pendzick."

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Riverhead Airpark-special permit for general aviation airport.

Supervisor Janoski: "Under Unfinished Business, we have Riverhead Airpark, that is presently under consideration by the Town Board."

Supervisor Janoski: "I would recognize at this time anyone who wishes to be heard. Yes."

Mike Esposito, Riverhead: "I'm a resident of the Town of Riverhead. I've been a downtown businessman for twenty-five some odd years. I wish to comment of the adoption of a game room clause in the Town Code. I had heard about this previous to the issuance of this but until brought to our attention by the local police coming in to count games in the local rooms, I had no idea that it wasn't cleared adult establishments in the Town of Riverhead. The original understanding that we were given that it was out to control these games by use of minors, Seven-Eleven Supermarkets, Drug Stores, wherever and that the adult entertainment portion of this would not come under the supervision of the town. We feel and I represent the Suffolk County Restaurant Association as chairman of the Board and we would have been strongly opposed to this. We would have made our feelings felt very strongly had we been advised of the fact we would fall into the same category as the other people. We don't feel that Town Government should be interfering in adults activities in adult establishments. We do not cater to children, we do not cater to minors, we run a legitimate business licensed by the State of New York. We are supervised by every town policeman, town Board of Health, counties, state and we feel we have enough supervision. We have enough taxes, we have enough of almost every kind of surveillance you could consider. We know our responsibilities to the public and we feel that we are being assessed further by the town and we feel it's totally unfair and that we will, we have a meeting tomorrow of my directors and that we are considering, I am at this time in consultation with our attorneys that we are thinking of taking a class action suit to prevent enforcement of this law. We feel that it's unjust, we feel that it's more of a burden of our people throughout this town and we feel that we weren't rightly appraised of how big a scope you would encompass with this new ordinance and that we would like you to know at this point about this pleasure, of our intent to take action against the Town to prohibit enforcement of this code and as a citizen, I would further like to know who is going to enforce this code. Do we have to hire additional people, with more benefits, more salaries and more equipment with which to enforce this law. I think the intent was good. I think that it's gone beyond the point of monitoring and controlling the actions of the young people of this

community and I think that you're once more forcing government into the lives with adults and adult entertainment products and I don't think that it was really proper, it's improper. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mike."

Councilman Boschetti: "Mr. Chairman,"

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes, Sir."

Councilman Boschetti: "May I ask a question? Mr. Esposito, just what aspect of the law are you addressing yourself to without going over the whole general discussion?"

Mike Esposito: "First off, I object to having to pay \$50.00 per machine for machines that I have had in my place for years. There was no need for these assessments previous to this point. I see no reason why I should have to pay you or anybody else for something that's been in my store doing business for years and years. I can't imagine someone from the Building Department, the Police Department coming in and monitoring my business any further than we're already monitored simply because you feel that you want to either raise more money or just come into my place and have more control over what I do and I think that I have more than enough control with the Police and Board of Health and the Tax Department. I don't need you people. I don't need any more people interfering in my daily routine business at all and I think it's a gross misjustice, miscarriage of justice because you people have the authority and the power to come in and do these things. We would have opposed this with vigor and with numbers of people who are members of our association in this Community and let you know about this displeasure had we been properly informed that you intended to enclose, encompass our business as in with this we felt it, monitoring the actions of minors in these establishments at all hours of the day and night were certainly proper because we have children, we're concerned about what they do and where they spend their money and where they hang out and we would never oppose anything like, but when you come into an adult establishment and tell adults that because they play games in my business or in other businesses that you have the right to make us pay an additional \$50.00 per machine, I think it's wrong and I don't think you should have the power to do these things because we certainly are taxed enough by every stage of government."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mike, there is just one other thing that I would like to add because a couple of times you've said that we acted, proceeded improperly and that there wasn't enough information to the public. I want to say this consideration of game room ordinances took place over a very long period of time, adequately written about in the public newspapers as stories and of course published in legal notices as we are required to by law in full so that we have done our part and media has done their part. There was certainly enough coverage of what we were doing for anyone to know what was under consideration."

Mike Esposito: "You may have followed the letter of the law, but we are in contact with you people on a regular basis, you're local fellows and so are we. We participate in government where we can, we like to be informed and we like to keep in touch, we like to co-operate in any way we can. We as I say, you had no understanding that the adult area of these game rooms would fall into this category. We would have opposed vigorously and like I say it would have taken, I see you regularly, I see all the guys regularly. I would have taken nothing, you know, when we do this ordinance, it's going to enclose encompass your business as well. We had no idea that this was going to happen to us. None or you would have certainly been appraised of our feelings in this matter."

Supervisor Janoski: "But, I would only repeat that not only have we followed the letter of law, but that there have been adequate newspaper reports, for example on the subject of Game Room Ordinances. In fact, it is gotten more coverage in other towns, there have been T.V. programs on it. Certainly, if any businessman of the town who has game rooms in his establishment and knew that we were considering a game room ordinance or some sort of regulation you could have come in to say or give me a call."

Mike Esposito: "I will in the future, count on it."

Supervisor Janoski: "We have three minutes before the first Public Hearing. Would anyone like to, Bill Nohejl."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River: "First of all, I rode up on Osborne Avenue, I looked at that sump. I think it's a very nice job that you've done up there. I hope it works."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill, I hope."

Bill Nohejl: "Second item, in reference, this pertains to the Town Board and the Highway Department. The town has been cleaned up very nicely here, some streets two or three times. Recently, I see Christmas trees and I see debris out in the streets again cleaned up. When is this ridiculous matter going to be resolved. Did I see in the back two highway laborers to be hired. Vic, while Mr. Janoski was on vacation, you said that some action was going to be taken.?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, it's my understanding it is resolved Bill, and the new policy will go into effect in the spring and it's my understanding that we're not going around providing private sanitation service. If that is not the case, I will take up with the Superintendent of Highways,

Bill Nohejl: "The Superintendent of Highways is here, ask him if he is doing it."

Councilman Prusinowski: "John."

Supervisor Janoski: "Bill, you can certainly put the question to the Superintendent. John, do you want to?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "That's specifically what you're alluding to right, okay."

Bill Nohejl: "Yes. The question is, the Highway Department at present is still picking up debris from the certain streets of Riverhead after the town clean up has been accomplished, I see Christmas trees out there, I see little heaps of debris. I see them one day, next day they're gone. The town is still doing this for the people?"

John Ziemacki, Highway Superintendent: "I must still admit that we are still doing it. I feel it is a hazard to leave anything out in the streets because of any accidents or what not. I was sort of waiting for the Town Board to make a definite decision we could then pin point a date, so we haven't had a chance to get together on it, but I hope we're going to do something soon."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, we will resolve it tomorrow, because we did pin-point the situation and we will put the policy into effect immediately, speaking for myself and I'll discuss with the other members of the board, because I did make that statement and we will follow through."

Bill Nohejl: "I have one other question, I know it's past the time, but this also refers to Mr. Ziemacki and the town board. Coming tonight on Route 58 on to Pulaski, there is a new stop sign, a gigantic stop sign. Did the Highway Department put that up or the County put it up? Have you noticed it John?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes, the County put that up, Bill."

Bill Nohejl: "I almost got rammed in the --- tonight, coming off of there. I stopped and the guy just swerved around me. I think it's ridiculous, within a hundred feet of coming off of Route 58 that stop sign, no warning. I think it's really ridiculous."

Councilman Prusinowski: "They don't have it painted on the road, yet."

Supervisor Janoski: "Well, I didn't take notice,"

Bill Nohejl: "No, it's a big big sign about three or four times a normal sign and you're coming off of Route 58, at thirty-five miles an hour, and you come to Pulaski Street, Mill Road it's at the intersection, Mill Road and where Pulaski Street starts off of Route 58, it's a matter of one hundred feet, no previous warning. Someone's going to get killed."

Supervisor Janoski: "We'll check into that Bill, I have noticed it, I usually come Route 58 into town, but I didn't come that way this -----."

Bill Nohejl: "Well I got surprised tonight, really surprised!"

Supervisor Janoski: "Well it must have."

Councilman Lombardi: "I saw it yesterday."

Bill Nohejl: "And it really really shook me up when the guy almost clobbered me in the rear because people from out of town coming that road is not going to see it."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you, thank you John. Let the records show that the hour of 7:47 P.M. has arrived. The Town Clerk will read, please read a Notice of Public Hearing."

Supervisor Janoski recessed the meeting at 7:47 P.M. to hold the public hearing scheduled for 7:45 P.M.

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:45 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday, January 4, 1983 at 7:45 P.M. to hear all interested persons regarding the special permit application of Joseph & Linda Sullivan for a mobile home park.

The affidavits were ordered to be placed on file.

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mrs. Pendzick. Is there anyone present representing the applicant?. I should add that we are proceeding with this Public Hearing under order from the court to develop, I guess what we can call more complete record of this proceeding."

Joel Markowitz, Attorney representing Sullivan- "As you know, because I have appeared before you in this very matter on a prior occasion and Mr. Sullivan is here. Frankly, my interpretations of what the court ordered was the making of findings and conclusions. I'm not entirely sure that what the court intended was that this matter be opened up to a new Public Hearing and I'm somewhat curious as to what the purpose of this Public Hearing is at this time. Perhaps you can enlighten me before I can say something else.

Richard Ehlers, Town Attorney: "It's just to give you, give you an opportunity to say anything you want to say about the application. If there is any part of the record that you feel that's incomplete.

PUBLIC HEARING Continues -

Joel Markowitz: "It's that informal."

Richard Ehlers: "Incomplete to the prejudice of your client or in the previous hearing. You can complete the record as you see fit at this time. You can add any date, you get any information that you wish."

Joel Markowitz: "Alright, let me, may I just have a moment to consult with Mr. Sullivan and see whether or not there is something that we desire to say at this point."

Supervisor Janoski: "Certainly, I will recess the hearing."

Supervisor Janoski recessed the Public Hearing at 7:50 P.M. for Markowitz to talk to client Sullivan.

Supervisor Janoski: "While we're waiting for the Attorney to confer with his client. I think we will try to pass a few of these resolutions."

Let me just add that we will be passing fixing salaries of all town employees. Copies of these resolutions are available for your perusal if you should desire.

RESOLUTIONS#2 HYDRANT RENTAL CONTRACT WITH FIRE DISTRICT

Councilman Artale offered the following resolution, which was seconded by Councilman Boschetti.

RESOLVED, that the Town Board, acting as the governing body of the Riverhead Water District, enter into a Hydrant Rental Contract with the Riverhead Fire District for a term of one year commencing on the 1st day of January, 1983, and ending December 31, 1983, for the rental of 451 hydrants at an annual rental of \$50.00 per hydrant or at a total cost of \$22,550.00; payable one-half of said sum on or before May 1, 1983, and the balance of said sum, on or before November 1, 1983.

The vote, Boschetti, Yes, Artale, Yes, Prusinowski, Yes, Lombardi, Yes, and Janoski, Yes.

The resolution was thereupon declared duly adopted.

PUBLIC HEARING Continues -

Supervisor Janoski: "Are you ready to proceed Sir? I declare the hearing back in order."

Joel Markowitz: "Thank you for the short recess. As I indicated I have appeared before you before and I have submitted various written letter memos and I think that we have made our position clear as we possibly can and I certainly don't think that you want to listen to all of the explanations of that position all over again. I don't think that is the purpose of this hearing.

There is something though that I would like to add at this point.

First of all, I think that you should understand that the proposals that we have made and are now part of the record, we still maintain, we are as a matter of law entitled to have approved. In particular, proposals Number One, which provides for six new units. Now the position I think was explained in a memorandum that was submitted to the Supreme Court. We believe and I believe that it is a matter of law, the Sullivan's are entitled to approval of that proposal because it complies in every possible respect with the standards set forth in the town's own mobile home park ordinance. That having been said, let me say this as well, that we have heard from the Planning Board and while we disagree, diametrically, with the findings of the Planning Board with their conclusions and we disagree with their finding that the facts as they enumerate them are even relevant to the proponent inquiry in this matter. We do appreciate the fact that the Planning Board as all Public Agencies have the public benefit in mind and with that you, I can say that my clients, the Sullivans would like to, if at all possible, and I think we've expressed this in the past accomodate people of good will and toward that end in that spirits, let me suggest to you other possibilities other than the ones that are contained in those initial proposals. Now, by doing this, I do not in any respect waive those proposals, waive that application or withdraw it in any way what so ever. I still believe that we are entitled to the all of the relief that we're seeking in the original application. Nevertheless there are, I believe, half way points of comprises that the Board may want to consider as an alternative to either out right grant of the application or an out right rejection of the application. I'm not saying that we're giving up the original application for these other proposals, we are not doing so but we're offering them for the Board's consideration.

In respect to Scheme Number One, which I believe the Board has before it or certainly has had ample opportunity to look at it, as I say, that original proposal provides six new units, four in the north end, two toward the southern end. As an alternative, the Board might want to consider reducing or conditioning the grant of a permit upon the reduction of those six units to four units. The four units could under those circumstances be located at the northern end of the mobile home park, fronting on the interior roadway. The two units that were proposed at the southern

end could be eliminated and the configuration of that southern end could be left as it presently exists. In other words, dual excess to the interior roadway could be maintained. I know at some prior hearing, some member of the public expressed some reservation about the removal of one of the means of excess to the center of the mobile home park. The ordinance requires only one means of excess, nevertheless, if the board feels that two are preferable, this alternative, this modification, could preserve that dual access. In addition, the elimination of the second unit at the southern end would allow for an extension of the parking area which would now be moved from the north to the south of approximately one thousand seven hundred or more square feet and in fact the total available parking in that community parking area could be almost twice what the area is that currently exists at the north end. So in fact, you would have more parking than you now have and if the parking is increased by almost a one hundred per cent, the number of units would be increased by four or approximately eighteen per cent, so proportionately you'd have a better parking situation than you now have.

In addition to that, there would be no requirements of any additional driveways, individual driveways emanating from a unit onto Wading River Manor Road, Manorville Road, which was also a point that was raised by the Planning Board. Certainly that would be even preferable to the condition that now presently exists and in addition to that would allow for the use of an area at the south, a rather large area that is presently unused because of the shape.

As to Scheme Number Two, if the Board so chooses, the Board, I think would be able to condition approval of Scheme Two upon the reduction of the four units proposed in that Scheme to two units. Those two units could be placed in the same location as the four proposed units namely at the south end. They could be turned and placed in such a manner that they would not come near the property line of the Boy Scouts, as the plan now exists. They would come within the fifteen feet setback line and we've requested a variance for that purpose. The reduction of the number of units from four to two would not require a variance, we would certainly clear the fifteen feet setback line, the Boy Scouts would no longer have any plausible objection and we would be going from a high of six additional units to a low of two additional units, a very minimal increase. Now once again, I'm not suggesting to the Board that we're waiving or giving up the original application, we believe that it is a valid one and we ask the Board to consider it favorably. What we are doing though is giving the Board some suggestions as to what it can do, in fact, it believes in good faith that the application should not be granted in total were denied in total and this is an alternatives that the Board may consider. I would point out one other thing, we've heard in the past from people who object to the existing, apparently object to the existence to the Park as it now exists and they would probably object to the existence of any mobile home park. I think

that there are many people who do not want mobile home parks in their neighborhood, just as there are people who object to multiple dwellings in their neighborhood and it's understandable. The fact of the matter is however, that the people who live in this particular mobile home park, and I believe in general in mobile home parks, are generally elderly people, retired people, people who are on fixed incomes, social security and the like, pensions and who cannot afford housing were it not for the existence of mobile home parks and in fact there is a need for increased mobile home units as I see it in this community and in certainly in regard to this particular mobile home park, there are many people who would like to move into it and were presently unable to because of the fact that there is a limited number of units. I think that should be taken into consideration, the fact that mobile home parks are a permitted use in this town. Results from the fact that there is a need for mobile home parks in the community and I think that should be taken into consideration when the Board is deciding whether or not to allow two, three, four, five or six more people to find that type of housing in this community. Thank you, I have nothing further to say."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. We must recess this Public Hearing and start the next one. Let the records show that the hour of 8:06 P.M. has arrived, the Town Clerk will please read a notice of public hearing."

Supervisor Janoski recessed the meeting to hold the public hearing scheduled for 8:00 P.M.

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mrs. Pendzick. Is there anyone present representing the applicant, Mr. Tooker?"

Robert Tooker, Atty, 3 Waterview Court, Riverhead: "I'm here tonight on behalf of Thurm's Mobile Home Estates which is a mobile home park on Fresh Pond Avenue in Baiting Hollow, I have here some pictures of the existing mobile home park, entrance and some of the units that are there. This application was submitted to the Town Board in November and was referred to the Planning Board and the Planning Board has acted on it and made a favorable recommendation to the Town Board. The application is for a Special Permit to add one hundred twenty-eight mobile homes to an existing park of two hundred fifty units on Fresh Pond Avenue. The area included

is sixty four acres of which thirty-two acres are proposed to be left in open space, agricultural purposes and the remaining thirty-two acres dedicated to the park. The total density of the project would be two units per acre. The roads would be constructed by the applicant, the lighting put in by the applicant, the private water supply system by the applicant and the sewerage disposal facilities by the applicant.

The road system proposed gives one entrance off of Fresh Pond Avenue and the purpose of that is to assure the security of the park.

The recreation facilities are adequate in the existing park to accommodate the additional units.

At the current prices the proposed dwellings will cost in the range of thirty-five to fifty thousand dollars. They will add an additional tax revenue to the Town of approximately one hundred thousand dollars in addition to the some one hundred sixteen thousand dollars that are being paid today in taxes to the Town.

The requirements of the park that everyone be over fifty years old, there are no children permitted under the age of eighteen. The community itself contained, it's an attractive park as you can tell from the pictures there. The proposal is to develop it over the next eight to ten years, getting a few units each year. The matter has been considered by the Health Department who have given it consideration. They indicated their approval of an expansion of the density that's proposed, they've given some suggestions as to the Water Distribution System and how they feel that should be constructed and they suggested that we complete our application with the Town before we go back to them. As I said, the Planning Board is considering it and they have recommended the approval of the Special Permit to the Town. If you have any questions, I'd be pleased to answer them or any questions from the people in the audience.

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Town Board on this application? Hank."

Henry Fioto, 642 Northville Turnpike, Riverhead: "It was my understanding awhile back that the Town passed a moratorium on Trailer Parks."

Supervisor Janoski: "That was on new applications. This was one that has been -----."

PUBLIC HEARING Continues -

Henry Fioto - "The only thing I am the situation I understand we're having, this goes into, I know Mr. Thurm's Park is laid out nice and all kept up. The only thing I'm concerned about really is the water situation in that area, in other words, water and drainage, you're talking three hundred and some odd, you'll wind up with close to four hundred units in that, showed up in that area are home. That's my main primary concern."

Supervisor Janoski: "I'm sure Mr. Tooker will answer that for you. Mr. Tooker, if you would just so we could get it as part of the record?"

Robert Tooker: "I understand by water, you mean the road drainage."

Henry Fioto: "We had trouble there was trouble awhile back with the drainage there as well as drinking water and toilet facilities, the cesspool, the sewer system."

Robert Tooker: "So far as the road drainage is concerned, the mobile home park now accommodates the run off for Fresh Pond Avenue, there's no town sump there and the water runs off the Thurm's property is accommodated by them.

In the proposal for the expansion, that road run off would also be accommodated within the three recharge basins that are planned for the Park itself so that there would be no additional road run off problem, in fact, we're solving the town's problem making it unnecessary to put in a recharge basin there.

So far as the water quality is concerned, it's been excellent. There are two wells there now, the Health Department suggested that it might be necessary to put a pressure tank in to assure good pressure for fire protection. They also suggested that with the additional units it might be necessary to put in auxiliary power to assure those people would get water in times of black out."

Henry Fioto: "I basically have no objections, we're expanding the parks in this area and like I say, Mr. Thurm does put a nice park, he has a beautiful park, it's well kept to me it's one of the best kept parks in the Riverhead area and I mainly, I was concerned with drainage problem. I knew they had down there a few years back and the water, as long as the Town will have control over that, I have no objections, thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone present who wishes to address the Town Board on this application? That being the case, I declare this Hearing closed."

Supervisor Janoski: "We will re-open the former hearing which is the Special Permit application of Joseph and Linda Sullivan. Is there anyone present who wishes to address the Town Board on that case? Cathy Casey."

Cathy Casey, Wading River: "First of all, unfortunately I'm back, gentlemen, to repeat myself with statements that have been made to this Board and the Planning Board on at least three or four other occasions. However, at this time, I have some pictures with me to substantiate many of the statements that I have made in the past and before I proceed with them,"

Supervisor Janoski: "Are they going to become part of the record?"

Cathy Casey: "Yes, I will gladly give them to you. Before I proceed with my statements and describing these pictures, I would like to thank Mr. Sullivan's learned counselor for motivating me to doing this as a result of our last encounter at the Planning Board meeting.

First, I have stated cars parked along Wading River Manor Road, I have pictures here substantiating on October 24.

Supervisor Janoski: "Are those photographs numbered?"

Cathy Casey: "Well, they're not numbered but I did write the date and that I took them and so forth on the back."

Supervisor Janoski: "Just so that we could have some way of identifying the actual photograph that you're talking about."

Cathy Casey: "Well, it says three cars parked on Wading River Manor Road opposite the Oak Park. Is that clear enough?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Vic, would you have a pen, if you could just as you introduce each photograph write a number on the back so that it will correspond with the record that is generated from this hearing."

Cathy Casey: "Okay, fair enough. Okay the first one, oh wait a minute, I did number some of them, didn't I. Oh, son-of-a-gun I did, they are out of order, but I did number some of them. Alright, at any rate, the first one is of three cars that were parked on the western side of Wading River Manor Road as I was driving north. Although it is somewhat difficult to tell because it's an instamatic camera. The next picture is a picture, a closer shot of one of those automobiles and again, it is difficult for anyone to just look at the picture and say well how do we know this is actually on Wading River Manor Road. Well it just so happens that my side view mirror is in the picture and if you look in the side view mirror you will see, this was by sheer accident I want you to know that you can see the large trailer and guard rail in the background at the southern end of the Oak Trailer Park so two of them will definitely, you can very definitely tell that cars are parked on the western side of Wading River Manor Road as a result of the distant picture of the southern, the trailer at the southern end of the park.

I also have a picture here of a, I believe it's a Pontiac Firebird, it's a red one, that I took approximately three days later and that is parked on the east side of Wading River Manor Road and I might add this car was also there on Sunday afternoon, January 2, 1983, at approximately 3:30 o'clock in the afternoon. Okay, so you're aware that that one has been there and I've seen it on numerous other occasions.

I have here three shots of that truck, one of which shows the license plate number. Okay, to substantiate as to what I am saying and you can see other trailers in the background to help substantiate that this truck, again, I might add also was in ; this park on Sunday afternoon in just about the same location. I might add so that nobody has to wonder, I took these pictures either from Wading River Manor Road in my automobile or from the Boy Scout Camp property. I sneaked into the woods, Okay, I was trying to do this discreetly which I had myself a nervous wreck. Anyway, I'm sorry, I'm numbering the picture.

Okay, the large trailer at the southern end, I have mentioned it also. It has been there to the best of my recollection well over one year. There in my opinion has been, nothing has been done to make it attractive, it's just, not that the trailer itself is deteriorate but for example, it is on the ends, it's up on, it's a large trailer, I don't know if it's common procedure for it to have cement blocks also in the middle, but as a result of my taking these pictures, in two of them, you have to look a little closely at it. You can see that the tires are sitting on the ground. I don't know if that's normal for a trailer this side, if it is not, then obviously, there is a possibility of for a lack of a better word off the top of my head, a possible violation of this trailer. Again, I repeat, it is somewhat unsightly, nothing

has been done to make it attractive, especially since it has been there the length of time that it has been there. It's not something that moved in weeks ago it's been there well over a year. There has been no effort put in, in my opinion to make it appealing as is the case with Thurm's Trailer Park. All of his trailers and his property is very well kept and I have friends that live in the Thurm's Trailer Park and I know he has rules and regulations that his rules and regulations that his residents have to take care of their trailers as well as their property, their surrounding property. Therefore, it is a credit to the community of Wading River and the Town of Riverhead. I do not see that with the Oak Trailer Park. I have another picture of a trailer inside the trailer park that was taken on October 27th and although this happens to be a nice neat looking little trailer, I wonder if it meets the size requirements. I don't know but this is one of the reasons I put this one in here. I think what one of the key problems here is and I would like to emphasize on my own part and on behalf of my neighbors, it is not that we want the Oak Trailer Park closed nor that we don't want any trailer parks in our community, what we are looking for is one that the park be maintained properly. I have been through there myself, there are trailers in there although you may not see them directly from the street, they are falling apart, The decks are not well maintained. Your little building in which I guess, it's your laundry, I personally did not go into it but my neighbor went in it today, the door on the outside of it, which that I have observed needs a painting. The maintenance is not there. It seems to have very little caring done by some of the residents, I will not say all and I think that has to come from the owner of the trailer park.

As far again as the cars parked on Wading River Manor Road, yes, I do think that southern end should be used to provide the proper parking facilities."

Supervisor Janoski, "Cathy, please try to address the board."

Cathy Casey: "Oh, okay, sorry. We are concerned about any expansion because of what we feel and again if anyone here has really looked at this park, it's unsightly. You don't take care of it and this is where our concern comes in, along with the fact that prior to all this litigation and it's bouncing back and forth with the courts, Mr. Sullivan was made aware by myself as well as others of many of the things that I'm talking about right here, it must be six, ten months ago and little if anything have I seen whereby he has shown interest to correct the situation and therefore I know for one I do not want this trailer park enlarged because I feel in time, it's going to affect logically my property values, and all my neighbor's property values because it's not being properly taken care of, in particular, by the owner. I do not think the owner stating let the police give those that are parked along

Wading River Manor Road if illegally tickets. I feel that if he cared, he would talk to his residents and he would provide proper parking facilities as does Thurms and if that particular park has room to add trailers and then I certainly think the first priority should be room to provide proper parking facilities for all the residents, so they do not have to park along Wading River Manor Road and to also care for or see to it that the residents care for their mobile homes and make it a credit to this community. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: Thank you Cathy. Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Town Board on this application. Yes, Sir."

Arthur Knoble, Camping and Properties Director of Nassau County Counselor of Boy Scouts of America,

The Nassau County Council has taken no position pro or con in regards to the request for the expansion of the capacity of the trailer park in question. We have in the past had some problem with the approachment over the line dumping things like that, for the most part it has been cleaned up recently. We do feel however, that if such an expansion is granted, it would create more of impact on our property line there and we think it might be justified to request that the Town Board consider at the time of granting that expansion if that's the Town Board's decision, to perhaps require that the property line be fenced so as to present intrusions as in the past.

I would also like to point out, however, that if any requests for variance in regards to the setback from the property line is to be made to the Nassau County Boy Scouts, we will take acceptance of any such request. I don't know if, I have heard that referred to in Plan 1 and Plan 2, that Plan 1 and 2 has not made available to us, so I don't know if either one of those require variances in regards to set back. I have no background in law, so I'm unaware as to what the variance requires for set back for out buildings. Perhaps you could share that with me.

Richard Ehlers, Town Attorney: "I believe it goes by a site plan in the mobile home park. If you're just talking about the little out buildings."

Arthur Knoble: "I'm talking about sheds."

Richard Ehlers: "Normally it would be ten feet."

Arthur Knoble: "From the property line?"

PUBLIC HEARING Continues -

Richard Ehlers: "That's right, as I recall, we have the expert in the back there. We would have to check the book, first, which we would be happy to do."

Arthur Knoble: "Well, one of the points that I would make is there are several out buildings which are right up to, if not, on over our property line, but I have not seen the Site Plan on it, so I cannot comment on it.

I did, I would however, like to call the Town's attention to what I think is a potentially hazardous condition as it relates to the safety of our campers, the electrical service in the trailer park in question is mounted on steel poles, in several instances the insulators that hold those electrical service off the poles have broken and the wire is now taped to the pole. In the event of a short circuit there, I believe, you might be an electrical charge carried on to the ground, and there are camping areas. Perhaps, you could look into that, but. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you, Bill,"

William Nohejl: "I've been a resident around Wading River for quite a few years. I remember that park there, been there before I came there. Mr. Schmidt, the previous owner did somewhat the same as Mr. Sullivan, put trailers all over. It was against the law then, Mr. Sullivan bought it, he knew the condition that exists, that they weren't allowed to put them on these certain spots but at certain times, he just went ahead and did it on his own. There were workers in there from the Shoreham Plant, they were not steady people who were going to live there all the time, like some of the old residents there. I believe that the old residents are very, should not be messed with, because they have been there a long time and they have been very good people, but to see transient people coming in there and shove trailers, five, six of them where they weren't suppose to be, Mr. Sullivan knew they weren't suppose to be there, he did it against the law and I do not have to feel sorry for him.

I, now as putting the parking lot on the south end, south end would be right on a curve, cars parking, backing out into that Wading River Manor Road would be suicide. I disagree with it, parking should be up in the north end where it is off the road, Mrs. Casey says there is cars out on the opposite side of the road, there are cars parked the opposite way, that Firebird, that she is referring to, opposite way on Wading River Manor Road. In other words, facing south, on the east side of the road. They are parked practically all day. I feel as though the application should be denied. Thank you."

PUBLIC HEARING Continues -

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill. Is there anyone else present who wishes to, Jessie?"

Jessie Tomlinson, Wading River: "About a month or so ago, when Mr. Sullivan appeared before the Planning Board on the second hearing, at the time, I was a member of the Planning Board and I asked him publicly if he would object to my touring the site and he said no, that he would not and that he would welcome any of us to come at any time and I took him up on his invitation and I went there one afternoon with Mrs. Casey on one of her picture taking expeditions and I would just like to verify that everything she said was absolutely true and I frankly was quite disappointed because I thought that since he knew that perhaps we might visit, he would make an attempt to spruce up the place like people do when they expect company but there was to my, nothing that I could see, anything had been done. The place was in very poor condition, no planning at all as far as the placement of the units that I could see. Most of the units are in need of repair and there is just no, it's just not attractive and I think having it on the agenda the same night we're discussing Mr. Thurm's Park is almost ludicrous. The Thurm's Park is as neat, well planned a park you can have, even though most people know that I object to any more expansions, I certainly would not put his in the same category as I would Mr. Sullivan's and I do hope that you deny this permit, he is not entitled to increase that park because he doesn't even take care of the units that are presently there. Now maybe in a year or so, if he proves that he does have the interest of the Town at heart and will fix the place up, maybe he should come back then, but at this time, he has done nothing to give him any kind of expansion as far as I can see and I do not live as close to his park as Mrs. Casey, she unfortunately, has to see it every day, but I do live a couple of miles away and it is an unattractive site to pass, going back and forth to work and shopping. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Town Board on the matter of Joseph and Linda Sullivan's application? Now let's just make sure that no body else wants to speak. If that's the case, I will once again recognize Cathy Casey."

Cathy Casey: "One, I submitted a letter from Mr. and Mrs. Jacobs to the secretary so that you know and that's on the record, that there is a letter pertaining to the Oak Trailer Park on Mr. Sullivan's request.

Also with regards to what Mrs. Tomlinson said, we did take additional pictures but many unfortunately didn't come out and some of them, the manufacture calls them travel trailers, unfortunately as I said they did not come out and however, the manufacture has it labeled travel trailer.

"For your own information, if you should care to walk through, presuming Mr. Sullivan's invitation is still open. . . Also, with regards to denying the permit at this time, however, perhaps, excuse me, in a years time, changing it, I frankly, personally have reservations about that because that was a suggestion that I made, my God, it must be eight months ago that we gave him time to straighten out his violations and correct, beautify the Oak Trailer Park and the like and nothings been done other than to remove some of the transients from the southern end which it took us quite awhile to get those removed, then they replaced and those were removed in the fairness to him there haven't been any transients that I have noticed down at the southern end at any rate. However, and the garbage that I personally brought to the attention of the Town Board or was it the Planning Board, I don't remember which, at any rate, that was cleaned beyond that the man has done nothing. I personally at this point, I would have to feel at least five years before and that is presuming this man really gets that park straightened out, does see to it that it is cared for before we even consider this type of a request by Mr. Sullivan. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you, Is there any other person who wishes to address the Town Board? That being the case, I declare this hearing closed."

No one else wishing to be heard and no communications having been received thereto, the Supervisor declared the hearing closed at 8:45 P.M.

Councilman Lombardi: "We have discussed it Henry and . . ."


