Supervisor Janoski, "There are some five minutes remaining before the public hearing. I would recognize anyone who wishes to be heard on any matter not appearing on the agenda. Yes"

Dick Benedict, Fanning Blvd. Rhd., "I would just like to know, since the farming season is here again, if the town has done anything as far as setting up standards for migrant camps, or if they've got anything started. I think was last October. Is there anything in the planning stages to standardize migrant camps in the Town of Riverhead?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Planning is the correct word Dick, because it is before the Planning Board and we are awaiting the Planning Board's ideas and recommendations, as to ordinances or local laws that might be adopted by the town regarding labor camps."

Dick Benedict, "As far as their size and where they'll be located and where they'll be allowed. There is something in the works?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Yes there is. The whole gammon of questioning."

Dick Benedict, "Thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski, "Steve."

Steve Haizlip, "I would like to try to find out what do they mean by mansard roof? I've never heard of the term. Can anyone explain it?"

Supervisor Janoski, "I could try. A mansard roof is a 18th century type of architecture. It is a roof that, I have a picture of one in my office, if you would like to see it. It's flat on the top and it has sort of an incline on the side. We have an architect. Would you repeat that?"

Don Denis Architect, "It's a roof with a break in the side."

Supervisor Janoski, "All right."

Steve Haizlip, "The second item. On the approval of a, to paint the town facilities, what does that encompass? This building and the Highway."

Supervisor Janoski, "Well we would like to get this building done, but this particular bid that we had gone out for, was not for this building. It was for the Highway barns, salt barns, for the Benjamin Corwin house down on Main Street. There was three or four is a better term. We considered the highway barns as one, but there are a number of buildings there."

Steve Haizlip, "It will include a little more than just window trim then?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Absolutely. Two minutes remain. Does anyone wish to, Bill I was hoping it would be you."

William Kasperovich, "Maybe I'm improving, but this enforced me to talk less. It came to my attention all last week and I thought that in the area of; how we want the people in the County to think of Riverhead. This is in the area of the image of Riverhead. Now the court system has worked up a fairly large parking lot north of the Railroad and Griffing Avenue. So every morning and every afternoon, people traverse the distance from the court house to the parking lot. As soon as you leave the street that the court is on, where really very, very bad sidewalk condition. Then when you get to the other side of the track, there's no place to walk on except just dirt and then before we come to the entrance of the parking lot, there is a large puddle when it rains, that doesn't go away. Now, the people that come in from all over the county to serve on jury duty, traverse this path and I think we should leave a better impression on them than this particular stretch does. The court house fixed their granite steps and appearances are looking upward. Strictly appearances. However, since so many people from out of Riverhead use this continually, and new people come in practically every day, we should give it a hard look to see what we could do to improve this stretch. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Bill. You will note that on tonight's agenda that there is a resolution going out to bid for Railroad Avenue and the Town Board on considering the work to be done there, we will certainly take a look at the area that you point out." Let the record show that the hour of 7:46 has arrived and the Town Clerk will please read a notice of public hearing."

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:45 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held on Tuesday, June 7, 1983 at 7:45 P.M. at Riverhead Town Hall to hear all interested persons regarding the special permit application of Timothy Hill Children's Ranch to construct a second home on property located on Middle Road, Riverhead.

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Mrs. Pendzick. Is there anyone representing the applicant. Yes sir."

Jerry Hill, "Good evening. I'm Jerry Hill, representing the ranch. I am an architect. I have some of our people from the ranch. I'll be glad to answer any questions if I can."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. Are there any questions concerning the special permit application? Are there any, yes."

Dick Benedict, "I'd just like to ask Mr. Hill, if maybe he'd tell us what he has in mind for this second home, as far as, size set back and I don't think it would take to long for him to explain that."

Supervisor Janoski, "Jerry would you or do you want your architect."

Jerry Hill, "Donald would like to come up. He may be of some assistance. The second house, as I'm sure the Town Board is familiar with on the site plan, is set back about 300 feet further back in the woods from where the present house is. The present house is, the first house is 3100 square feet plus a full size basement. The second house will have about 4100 square feet. We found some areas, after living in this first house for some 2½ years, a little longer, that there are some areas where we're a little cramped and so we are building the second house a little larger than the first house. Donald, you want to add anything to that?"

Donald Denis, "No. I might add, just for the information of the people here, it's basically the same design of the original house, the first house. We repeated the architecture. It's just a bigger house."

Councilman Prusinowski, "And it's set further back?"

Donald Denis, "It's set further back yes. Further east and further back from the road."

Supervisor Janoski, "Dick had asked a question about size. Perhaps you can give us a square footage."

Jerry Hill, "4100. It's a single floor, full basement, wood frame. This is between the existing house and the two ponds in the back. It's towards the open field. As you look to the open field from Middle Road.....(inaudible)"

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "Jerry, Jerry we have, Dick should know better, because he's a constant fixture at these Town Board meetings, but this is actually a legal process that we're going through, so if you would get your statements on the tape so we will have them."

Jerry Hill, "Standing at Middle Road, facing our property, looking north from the present house, it is a little bit to the right, which would be east and to the north there is an old roadway that goes down that way. Those of you that may be familiar with the property and it's kind of facing that old roadway. The back of the house, way back up to the clearing that is behind the present house."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. Dick do you have any further questions?"

Dick Benedict, "Yes I do. When the, when this came before the Planning Board in October, I had met Mr. Hill in the hallway and he promised faithfully that he would oil the road going into the place. Now there's quite heavy traffic there and my father-in-law owns the adjoining property and it's very dusty, so he promised to oil it and I wonder with a second house, if we're going to use the same road and if there's going to be some oil put on that road to keep the dust down? Thank you."

Jerry Hill, "Since last August, in fact, right after we had our meeting, I checked with two or three contractors and they all told me that, to put oil down you had to put rock on top of it. It's kind of a form of black top. I didn't realize that. I thought that you could just spray some oil to keep the dust down and that's all you had to do. I talked to Mr. Bucholz at Riverhead Cement Block and he recommended that we use calcium chloride. Sprinkle it down and he felt that it would keep the dust down and that's what we've been doing. In fact, we just sprinkled some calcium chloride out there. My man Eugene Nettlebe, who's here tonight, my farm manager, told me that he didn't have quite enough to finish the job and he'd have to get some more, but that's the way we're trying to handle that situation. After the, when we met with the Zoning Board of Appeals last fall, I think we all agreed at that point, that before we try to do very much to the road, with heavy trucks going in and out of there during construction period, that it would tear up any road that was put in there, but we are very conscious of our road and we want to maintain a good road. In fact, we recently hired Riverhead Cement Block to come and bring a load of rock and to grade it because we want a good road in there too. We are committed to try to do what ever we can to make that a good strong road. A safe road and of course, to keep the dust down. We'll do what ever we can."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Councilman Artale , "Jerry you have a gravel road in there now don't you?"

Jerry Hill, "Yes. It's kind of a, I don't know what that kind of rock is called. It's a small gray rock."

Donald Denis, "Crushed blue-stone."

Jerry Hill, "Crushed blue-stone."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Jerry."

Dick Benedict, "I might suggest that if we're going to put up eight or ten of these homes and use that same road, it may be to everybody's advantage to black top the first 100 yards of that road and the problem would go away. I would suggest that may be we look into that. This is only the second home right now, but I understand that from the original plans that we seen, there's a total of some eight to ten homes planned for that site and I think it may be to everybody's advantage if we took care of that section of the road that adjoins my father-in-law's house, which is the entrance to Timothy Hill, that we would all be happier. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Dick. Is there anyone else present who has a statement? Steve."

Steve Haizlip, "I'd like to ask Mr. Hill that from what Dick says, there's going to be homes in the future. It looks like we're going to be starting a miniture boys town. When you do things like this for children, I'm for it because it brings them off the street. It helps them to get started in life and I know they're going to be asking for contributions because I already got them in the mail. What I would like to find out, does it have federal recognition? Can we take it off our income tax?"

Jerry Hill, "I'm always happy when somebody asks a question like that. That's very easy to answer. Yes we have our federal number and every contribution received is tax deductible. Could I say just a word about the number of houses, since this was brought up? When we first started our plans back many years ago. Before the first house was ever built, we came before the Town Board at that time, which I think John was the only member of the Town Board now that was a member of the Town Board then. You've been here a long time haven't you John?"

Councilman Lombardi, "Don't say it that way."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Jerry Hill, "No offense intended, but at that time we were talking in terms of about ten houses with six children in each house. Because of economics involved, we revised that after we talked to the State, they got involved, and encouraged us very strongly, that that would not be economically feasible for us. Even though that in some ways that might be an ideal situation from a social worker's view point. We then revised our plans to six houses at 10 in each house, which is the same number of children involved. Ten houses of six would be sixty, as you know, and six houses of ten would be sixty. Since then, the people in the state that's in charge of our license, have encouraged us to go ahead and build our second house and stop and wait awhile before we build any more. We would like to build an office and counselling center on our property in the future, but right now, this second house is pretty well what we plan to do at the present time besides our office and counselling center and as we're looking at 20 to 21 children there, instead of sixty that we originally talked about. The State could change their plans in years to come and we might need to come back to you to ask permission to do something else, but the pendulum is away from having a large number of children on campus. The pendulum has swung in the direction of having a small number of children. Have a quality program and really help change lives in a positive direction and we want what ever we do for the benefit of Riverhead as well as the benefit of the boys. To make this their home, we want it to be a quality program and we feel that one of the things that we're going to need in the future, is a counselling center which will help the boys and their families and maybe other families in the Riverhead or Eastern Long Island communities that might need that type of help. But at the present time, what we're asking for is permission to build a second house and we have indicated it to you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you everyone. Is there anyone else who has any statement or question? That being the case I declare the hearing closed. Reverend Hill if you would stay there for just a minute, because we are going to have a lottery drawing. That sounds bad. A lottery system for random selection drawing of applicants for some of our rehabilitated houses and I can't think of a better person to draw out that first name and of course, to indicate that it's all been done honestly and perhaps some of the children might help us out too. Eileen."

Eileen Drower, "Here we have the Riverhab drawing for the house at 529 Hallet Street, Riverhead to be drawn. We have four applicants."

Supervisor Janoski, "Eileen do you need some help as far as keeping record of this?"

Eileen Drower, "No. Who would you like to have?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "Why don't we have one of the kids."

Eileen Drower, "Who would like to be next?" Brian pulled Dominick Pantaleo. He is number 2."

Supervisor Janoski, "How about the next young fellow there."

Eileen Drower, "Michael pulled Peter Van Bommel, who is number three."

Irene Pendzick, "Would you spell that Eileen?"

Eileen Drower, "Yes, it's van capitol b, ommel. And Frank pulled the last one. It's for Kevin Zaneski and that is application number four."

Supervisor Janoski, "Ok. Just to recap and explain. The Town of Riverhead rehabilitates houses which we have aquired and then puts out, offers them out for sale, and we advertise the availability of this particular house. These people have applied for it and what we do by having this drawing is establish a hierarchy of who gets the first chance to go out in this market and get a mortgage. If the first person fails to do so, then the second person has the opportunity, but that's the way it's set up and I thank you for your help. Thank you. Councilman Prusinowski is back so we can continue. Before we move on to the resolutions, is there anyone present who has any comment on anything that's on the agenda? Bill Nohejl."

Bill Nohejl, "On the unfinished business, Synergy Gas Corp., I've had a very unpopular occasion with Pyrofax, which is now Synergy. Their creditability, I think is very low because I know you're not a collection agency, but I'm telling you what happened March of 1982 when my farm was sold to Moore. They came back and took the tank and the gas that was in there and issued a notice of a \$78 credit which was coming to me. I've been hounding them since. The night that they were up here for the public hearing, I went in the back hall, you remember when they left. I spoke to Mr. Russell. He said it would be taken care of immediately. That's been about two months ago and I feel as they, the lady in the office told me that there are numbers like me trying to get their money. If this is the kind of people that we're dealing with, beware. Be cautious and I have another thing. Today is June 7. I'm asking you gentlemen and I'm asking you Mr. Ziemacki. When is the cut off line. I see the stuff in the streets, as usual. Are we men or are we jelly fish? Which is it? I'm asking the both of you."

Supervisor Janoski, "What are you asking?"

Bill Nohejl, "When is the cut off line supposed to be?"

Councilman Artale, "June 15th isn't it?"

Bill Nohejl, "June 1st. If you have a bad memory it's June 1st."

Supervisor Janoski, "I guess that's the answer to the question. June 1st."

Bill Nohejl, "I'm asking the question, when is going to be cut?"

Supervisor Janoski, "If that's what we agreed to and that's what we advertised, it's June 1st."

Bill Nohejl, "It's June 7 now and it's still in the streets. I even hear rumors that it's going to go to a referendum at the November elections. Is that true?"

Supervisor Janoski, "I hope so."

Bill Nohejl, "Then everything should go to the referendum. We don't need you people. Let the people decide everything. I said are you men or are you jelly fish?"

Councilman Lombardi, "Jelly fish, Joe."

Bill Nohejl, "I believe it."

Councilman Lombardi, "We're going to go to a referendum."

Bill Nohejl, "On everything?"

Councilman Lombardi, "No."

Bill Nohejl, "If you go on this, you got to go on everything."

Councilman Lombardi, "No Bill. Let me put it this way to you. You know we've been sitting up here taking it from you. We've been trying to do a job on these leaves. Something that's been there for twenty years or twenty-five years and all of a sudden you come up and you start pushing on leaves."

Bill Nohejl, "I didn't push on leaves. I said grass clippings."

Councilman Lombardi, "No wait. Can I finish Bill?"

Bill Nohejl, "Yes."

Councilman Lombardi, "You and I get into an arguement. Let's have a little one."

Bill Nohejl, "Ok."

Councilman Lombardi, "This is something that's been going on for twenty-five, thirty years and all of a sudden you come up and tell the Town Board and the Highway Department, cut out picking up leaves."

Bill Nohejl, "I didn't say...."

Councilman Lombardi, "Wait Bill. You said put a stop to it."

Bill Nohejl, "I said grass clippings."

Councilman Lombardi, "Just cut out grass clippings?"

Bill Nohejl, "The summer collection. That's not neccssary."

Councilman Lombardi, "Bill you just said leaves and everything."

Bill Nohejl, "John you got a double tongue."

Councilman Lombardi, "You got a triple tongue."

Bill Nohejl, "You got a double tongue."

Councilman Lombardi, "You got a triple tongue, and you know we work on trying to get something worked up and every meeting you came to you kept jumping on the Town Board and the Highway Department. We worked on this and made a date of June 1st. Now if the Highway Department sees some leaves out there, are they supposed to just leave them out there. If they're bagged up, just leave them there? It's a hazard to the people on the road."

Bill Nohejl, "Go down the hall now and look at the grass clippings in the streets."

Councilman Lombardi, "Well Bill, I'll tell you something, as one member of this board, I'll go with a referendum. I'm not speaking for the rest of the board. Let the people make their decision. I think this Town Board and the Highway Department has worked hard to try to do something for this and your not giving us

a chance or anything. Every meeting you come to your hitting us Bill and I feel that we're trying."

Bill Nohejl, "Are you finished?"

Councilman Lombardi, "I'm finished. Now you go."

Bill Nohejl, "John, why do you make ordinances? To break them?"

Councilman Lombardi, "Bill this was not an ordinance. This was done twenty-five years ago by whoever was the Highway Superintendent and it was carried out and we're trying. You're asking a question and I'm telling you."

Bill Nohejl, "John there's refuge in the streets still and an ordinance....."

Councilman Lombardi, "Yes it's illegal Bill."

Bill Nohejl, "Right."

Councilman Lombardi, "Ok. Now you're calling leaves."

Supervisor Janoski, "Now once upon a time I saw you making a U-turn on Route 25. Is that illegal?"

Bill Nohejl, "Certainly. Yes. It's illegal."

Supervisor Janoski, "Is there some sort of difference here?"

Bill Nohejl, "Joe, I see you going down sixty miles an hour coming to the Town Hall ten minutes to nine. Is that illegal?"

Supervisor Janoski, "That's because I'm twenty minutes late Bill."

Bill Nohejl, "Yeah, why?"

Supervisor Janoski, "You don't understand my question."

Bill Nohejl, "Yeah. It's illegal."

Supervisor Janoski, "Absolutely."

Bill Nohejl, "That's right but you said June 1st and John, John, listen to me. I did not complain about leaves. I complained about branches and I complained about grass clippings. Period."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES, Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "I know leaves were included Bill."

Bill Nohejl, "I beg your pardon."

Councilman Lombardi, "Bill leaves were included because we have suggested about bagging these leaves and you said that's a good idea, instead of having them piled up and the Highway Department coming and picking them up by hand or with the blower."

Supervisor Janoski, "Bill."

Councilman Lombardi, "And this is what we've tried to do. We had the people try to bag them and I think we've got a lot of co-operation from the people."

Bill Nohejl, "John, I don't believe you."

Councilman Lombardi, "I don't believe you either Bill."

Bill Nohejl, "I'm sorry."

Supervisor Janoski, "These things, of course, are on record and what ever you've said at previous Town Board meetings are a matter of town record. Let me understand. Your objection is that you don't approve of the expenditure of public monies to provide this service?"

Bill Nohejl, "Not for personal pick up of grass clippings and branches on the street. No. I do not. It's not proper. It's not the Highway Department, it's not the town's obligation to do it. No other town does it. They pick up leaves in the fall and they pick them up in the spring at certain intervals. Not all during the season like this town."

Supervisor Janoski, "Suppose the grass clippings were off the road way, then would you object to it?"

Bill Nohejl, "You know Joe, the highways are in bad neglect. The sides of the roads need hoeing. The shrubbing, the grasses need cut back. These men doing this kind of work could be doing other work. Now if you wanted to take that dollar that are used, that are put to the men, I'm not saying lay these men off, every man has to live. They have to have a job, but if you want to take thirty, forty, fifty thousand dollars what is used with the truck and the men for the pick up of this. Do you realize how many miles of road you could oil? How much hoeing of the sides of the road you could do?"

Supervisor Janoski, "About a $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Bill Nohejl, "Do you realize that?"

Supervisor Janoski, "The point I'm trying to make....."

Bill Nohejl, "They're highway men. They're not personal sanitation men."

Supervisor Janoski, "Bill, you know, you're the only person who has ever come to this place."

Bill Nohejl, "Because you don't have enough guts for other people to get up and say what's on their minds, that's why."

Supervisor Janoski, "Bill you're the only person that's come to this building, stood up to that microphone, and as far as I know, called the councilmen and complained about this service being provided. However, I have many telephone calls asking that the service be continued. Now the question is....."

Bill Nohejl, INAUDIBLE.

Supervisor Janoski, "Bill. Excuse me. The question which will be on the bulletin, if the Town Board concurs is, until you approve the expenditure of public monies to provide this service to the people of the town. Now we intend, if they approve that, that bagging should continue and we do not intend that they should not place refuse or what ever. Not refuse, but clippings or leaves in the streets but,."

Councilman Artale, "And also that limbs will be bundled."

Supervisor Janoski, "And limbs will be bundled. But you know as John pointed out, this has been going on for twenty-five years and I'm sorry and I loathe the day that we sat down and really and seriously considered having a policy such as this without putting it to a referendum."

Bill Nohejl, "Vic, what do you have to say to this."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Well I'll tell you Bill. Yes it's been going on for twenty-five years. You know as well as I do. Management I taught me that when you start giving something to somebody for free, it's very tough to cut it off. I think that it probably will get completely out of hand for awhile, because they were picking up all kinds of stuff and I think if you observed the last two or three months, I think the situation has gotten 100% better because it takes time to educate the public. Now we could put ads in the paper. John did a good job. He put fliers out. He went around, he went door to door to tell people they had to bag them, when the cut off dates were and stuff like that. But I drive around and I see it too. People are still putting the bag clippings, I haven't seen the stumps, on the road."

Councilman Prusinowski Continued

I think most people have. Well I'll take a look down there because I saw them. We were cutting a tree down and I wanted to make sure it was what we're doing was because the tree was dead and was interfering with the lines and stuff which is highway work. It was not private property. But it's difficult to tell people who have been receiving something for X amount of years and now they can't receive it. Now that's the problem. Now we put this calendar in. I hope we can stick to it if it's possible, but if the Highway Department sees stuff on the side of the road, I guess it's a judgement call. Should they pick it up? Now if stuff is dumped there like garbage (Well I'm taking this down) I'm telling you that we extended it. We set up a schedule and if it can't be adhered to because you know it's easy to say cut it off but when people have been receiving it for twenty years Bill I don't personally use the service but the thing is, I guess there is a lot of people in the town that do."

Bill Nohejl, "Be honest with me. You know it's election year and you don't want to cut your nose off. Thank you."

Councilman Artale, "Want to hear what I think Bill?"

Bill Nohejl, "Beg your pardon."

Councilman Artale, "From the very beginning, I was against it. I was against stopping it because I felt that this is a service that has been instituted in this town for so long that it should continue. I was against it then and I'm against it now and I think it should continue all year long. But I do agree with you about one thing. If you do it for one part of the Town, you do it for everybody. I agree with that. I also have said as I have in the past and I still say now, you do it all year long and I will go to a referendum. Yes."

Councilman Boschetti, "Might as well get everybody right? Bill honestly, when you first made the point, I thought it had merit and I still do. I think that the service could not be conducted equitably throughout the entire town and I had some question as to whether public funds should be used in that regard. I feel that it should be a service that should be provided at some time throughout the year and this particular case we proved twice. I think for sixty days each. I thought that was fair, equitable for most of the citizens in Riverhead. However, if it can come up to a referendum, I think it should go that route and let the people decide what they actually believe as fair as how their money should be spent."

Councilman Prusinowski, "I just want to make it specific because it isn't specific enough for you. I'm not backing out on the two sixty day periods. I just went along. It's in the work session that we should not extend past June 1st. I would like to go to a public referendum. First we have advertised the set schedule. That's my position and then if the people want to extend it and spend extra tax money, then all of us collectively as tax payers have that right to vote yes or no. Now we do have a time period. I can understand John's problem, is that you still

have people out there that have to get use to the fact there is a cut off date that it's going to be picked up and in August and that's all I'm saying. We're in a small town Bill. Very easy to say stop, but they've been getting something for free for twenty years. It's very difficult to stop that. Having the people go and and actually stop doing it. That's what my position is."

Supervisor Janoski, "We're going to have a short recess. I think that we will. Yes."

Supervisor Janoski, "Well quite honestly, you've accomplished it. One of the things that we will discuss in our short recess is the possibility of bringing up a resolution approving your application this evening."

Supervisor Janoski, "Ok. Town Attorney tells me that it's a very complicated resolution but I am informed that we are expecting some paperwork from our bond council which will necessitate my calling a special board meeting on Friday. Perhaps on Friday we might approve it on Friday. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Jeff you missed the whole thing. I guess that wraps it up, unless anybody would like to address the Town Board on any subject what so ever. Steve."

Steve Haizlip, "Joe and the rest of you members there, I'm very proud of you, that you've taken this opposition to the Long Island rate increase. I have written plenty of letters to the chairman and to other members of that Public Service Commission. There is a little loophole in the Law and I want to make you aware of it. Now the answers always come back. They are allowed to make a profit. Now this takes in any bad planning, any bad investments, all go to the bulk of the situation and Mr. R. Fletcher made this statement in the County Center, that the John B. Hand Energy test matter. I know you were there, I seen you, but I don't know if you heard that part or not. He made the statement that if we make a mistake we want to recover that maoney. Well in my opinion, there's a lot of private enterprises in this country right now, that make an attempt to make investments and they lose. Now do they have anyone to go pick this up from? They don't. They move to absolve it the best way they can and I think that according to the Suffolk Life and the Newsday, the state they made of the planning of that building of all the things that took place, they can squander that money and when they go for the rate increase the Public Service Commission according to the law, are allowed to make a profit and they get it."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Steve, just one thing and I agree with you. When I was in college, I remember Con Ed had a lot of problems as far as financially, not related to their nuclear plant, but what they did at that time, they stopped paying dividends to their share holders for like two or three years and it's unfortunate that L.I.L.C.O. always finds the money to pay 17% dividends on their stock. When they ask for a 56% rate increase, I think that if they need the money to pay for the plant, the first thing they should do is stop paying the dividends to the share holders who take a risk by investing in the company and then they should all go to the stock holders meeting and demand why they can't pay. But you know they always build into their rate increases their payments to the share holders. They should be the first ones that should suffer and then everybody else come in line. Con Ed did it and they got out of problems and now they're paying dividends again."

Steve Haizlip, "Also on this resolution 323, that's a seal there, Mr. Janoski. I am glad to see that the designer did take and think of our court house and our county seat and get it pictured there which it was trying to slip away from us. Now it's in the eyes of everybody and especially the public officials that wanted to have it and it will be there and now this is our county seat and our court house and maybe they'll think about it."


