Supervisor Janoski, "I would at this time recognize anyone who wishes to be heard. Yes sir."

Thomas A. Ganetis, 4 Locust Street Riverhead, "In reference to what?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Anything. You have to come up to the microphone and give your name and address. Would you check to see if that microphone is on."

Thoman Ganetis, "Name is Thomas, middle initial, A, Ganetis. I reside at 4 Locust Street, Riverhead, New York, 11901. We're present here this evening, many of us from our particular neck of woods because of this problem of flooding of the road on Peconic Bay Boulevard. Flooding, the sewer is there. A drainage sewer does not work. Apparently the pipe underneath has been broken and we get flooding into our development and into our homes and particularly on our roads which are highly impassable during heavy rainstorms. That's both Willow Street and Locust Street. Most of us are neighbors here and whoever wants to get up, has the right to get up and try to let you people understand what we're going through there. These roads have now deteriorated to such an extent and it's about time we've built them properly. They've been built and rebuilt over the many years that I've been a summer resident and a retired resident for the last four years. Unless we get proper drainage on these roads, we're wasting our time. We have to bring in an engineering firm to determine what type of drainage should be put in there and then build the roads as they should be done properly. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. The Town Board has hired an engineering firm and I will let the two members to my left address that because they did come up to your neighborhood to investigate and did recommend that the Town Board enter into an agreement with H2M to conduct the necessary surveys and investigate the matter to see what has to be done."

Councilman Lombardi, "Well we have been up there. We checked out the main road on Peconic Bay Boulevard and we looked at the area and all that. We have gotten in touch with H2M which has been doing a survey up there. Now, you do have a problem up there with vector control, the mosquito control and that's the pipe you might be talking about. That used to go, well there is a mosquito control pipe in there and it has been stuffed up. The County will not do anything to remedy it. So this is why we've got H2M up there to take a look to see what we can do to work with the County, see which way we can put drainage. We can't just go ahead and put drainage into the Sound or to the Bay. We have to find another way to do it and H2M is going to be coming back to us with a solution. Now that may not solve your problem in your roads but it will help quite a bit on Peconic Bay Boulevard and it may stop some of the water from going into your area."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Councilman Prusinowski, "Did anybody receive a letter from us back around April? You did, ok. That's when we informed you we hired the engineering firm. I talked to H2M today at the sewer waste project. We had a ceremony down there. They said that they'll be getting back to us in two weeks with their recommendations in permanently solving that problem in that area. At that time we'll get, we have your petition and we have your addresses and at that time we will notify and if you'd like to come in, you could take a look at the report with us and see what the engineers have come up with. They've already been working on it since you've gotten that letter which should have been about a month or two ago. May 9th ok, about a month ago. Two months now."

Supervisor Janoski, "Steve do you have, I see your finger up there."

Steve Haizlip, Edwards Ave., Calverton, "As long as you've got the engineer looking into this road situation out there in Jamesport, I believe it is, let's have that engineer come up to Edwards Avenue, on the curve just right below Mr. Jermysyk's house. Now just this afternoon there was an injury there due to the rain. Now, the Superintendent has done all he can do but this is with the case where the State came in a few years ago and they left us a problem. So they made the curve go out instead of tilting it to the left. So now you take these cars, like the little Chevette, that has the little narrow tires and they come down and they pick the edge where they added the extension on and the pavement and the tar and get in there and it flip and it rolls the car right over."

Supervisor Janoski, "Steve, are you talking about the intersection of 25 and 25A?"

Steve Haizlip, "Nope. This is the curve right just below Joe Jermysyk's house and my house on the right there."

Supervisor Janoski, "The State of New York Department of Transportation will be here tomorrow, at our request, to discuss exactly this kind of problem. We wrote to them, some weeks ago, requesting representatives from the D.O.T. to meet with the Town Board so that we can go out together and show them the state road ways which are in need of repair and other items which are in need of repair."

Steve Haizlip, "I want to add, I believe this is the sixth run off at that curve. Two or three of them have rolled over and I believe the report has went into somebody. I was informed this afternoon. Whether it was the Highway or the State or who have you. It's beginning to get pretty serious every time it rains there."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Steve. Yes mam."

Mrs. Joseph, Ock-a-Bok Assoc., "My name is Mrs. Joseph and I am also a member of the Ock-a-Bok Association. I have a couple of things I would like to say. Depending upon the results of the engineer's report, suppose they say it's a holy wreck, let's do it. How long can we anticipate that it will take before anything gets done?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "What we normally do in these matters, is we get the engineer's report and they discuss with us how much it will cost. Then the Town Board has to make a decision. Do we want to spend the money? I'll tell you. We will spend the money if we did make a decision to do it. The money will be spent on the Town road area. In other words, on the corner there. That's where the problem is. Apparently the engineers were telling me there's a marsh that use to empty out right through your houses there. There's a pipe under there or something. If that is...."

Mrs. Joseph, "Just east of us."

Councilman Prusinowski, "East of you. Right. It's up to the Town Board and then we have to decide is there any drainage money available, bonding. We have to take a look at the budget. Could be a year by the time they go out to bid. Get the construction companies to come in and bid. To go out get the necessary bonding and so forth and as you know, you have to have a Public Hearing."

Mrs. Joseph, "As far as the funds becoming available, I can suggest a good source of funds. There are a number of us in that community who are summer residents and the school tax is a full one half of our tax and we have no access to these schools. Our children can not use them. There are no activities during the summer for which we are eligible and I think if you just take the summer residents and put their school taxes to work on the roads, I think you would have a nice little source of funds there."

Supervisor Janoski, "We certainly would. Unfortunately, we can't do that."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We are not allowed to."

Mrs. Joseph, "Well I think then perhaps you should take some sort of action to make it available."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "I'm sorry mam. We can't do that. The School Board...."

Mrs. Joseph, "The School Board is not about to give it to us."

Supervisor Janoski, "There's no action that the Town of Riverhead can take to deny the School Board and the School District of it's revenues."

Mrs. Joseph, "They're denying us the schools."

Supervisor Janoski, "Not really. If you wanted to send your children there, you could."

Mrs. Joseph, "Not during the summer you couldn't. Not when you're a summer resident."

Supervisor Janoski, "That's your choice."

Mrs. Joseph, "No it isn't. No it isn't."

Supervisor Janoski, "Well certainly you live where you want to live."

Mrs. Joseph, "You mean it's our choice if we live here during the summer. We bring a heck of a lot of money into this Town and don't you forget it."

Supervisor Janoski, "I understand that but what I'm saying is; that the way the system works, is that if you own property within the taxing jurisdiction, you pay these taxes whether you avail yourself to the service or not."

Mrs. Joseph, "We are not complaining about the taxes. What we are saying is; that we pay a lot of taxes and get virtually nothing for them and therefore, we feel we are entitled to something. Our taxes, this may have been as close to you that you've forgotten it but just a couple of years ago, Riverhead went gung-ho on full assessment value. They doubled our taxes. Didn't cut the millage. Just doubled our assessed, doubled and tripled our assessed evaluation. Doubled our taxes and then had the colossal nerve to raise them again the next year. We have to take all this, simply because we want to stay here for the summer but we feel that simply because we are not entitled to vote, that our wishes should not be totally ignored."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "That has absolutely no bearing whether you vote or not. You're citizens and you own property in the community. We have gone out at your request and hired an engineering company."

Mrs. Joseph, "No, no, no."

Supervisor Janoski, "Let me finish. It's our intention to try and solve your problem. The other issue you raised, is quite honestly, it's just not something that we can even discuss. I understand..."

Mrs. Joseph, "You say it's part of the system. Well let's change the system."

Supervisor Janoski, "I'm sorry mam."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Mam, if I live out here but own an apartment in New York City, if I own a Co-op, or if I own a house in Jamaica Queens, where I used to go to school, St. Johns and I only go there eight months out of the year. and I came back out here. Now, should I go up to the City Council and say; because I'm out and Riverhead is my full time resident and I'm only here to go to college. I don't want to pay for certain services that's provided to me there. Like the school systems and stuff like that."

Mrs. Joseph, "We've never said we wouldn't pay."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. The thing is, that where ever you go in this country, if you own a second home, you have to pay the taxes of that State. You go to Vermont, you own an A-frame up there, ok. What we are saying is there are monies available for drainage work. That is a very crucial road down there because of the way it's set up. I pass there every day. It was a mess when it was flooded. If you notice, we had the Highway Department pumping it out trying to get the water level down because it was flooding everything. I think the best thing to do is, wait for the engineering report. We have been doing three specific projects in town and let's take a look at what they have to say. We are looking for a permanent solution, not something that's going to band-aid."

Supervisor Janoski, "You use the word, millage which makes me think you are probably a resident of what could be called the New York City area. Is that true?"

Mrs. Joseph, "I am from New York City, yes."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "Because one of the things that is true in New York City, which is not true in Riverhead or any other Suffolk County community, is that the City government in New York, runs the School District. In Riverhead Town the Town Board has absolutely nothing to do with the School District. We don't levy these taxes. We don't set their budget. They are a distinct and separate government."

Mrs. Joseph, "I see. May I just say one last thing? In view of the fact that this flooding has been going on so long, may I ask, on behalf of the people who are dreadfully effected by that flooding and its run off, to try and get your engineers working as quickly as possible."

Supervisor Janoski, "That's our intention."

Mrs. Joseph, "Not just the engineers. The guys with the hose. The guys who actually do the work."

Supervisor Janoski, "The construction engineers."

Mrs. Joseph, "Never mind the engineer. Just get the other fellows going."

Councilman Prusinowski, "One of the reasons why, by the way, we got the engineering firm, was because we met with the Vector Control, Superintendent of Highways, John Ziemacki and the Highway committee and we thought we could do a temporary quick fix down there. However, every option that we had, involved the State of New York because of the run off into the creeks. There are laws and we can't just put pipes down the road like we thought. Put the water, because you have to get permits. You have to have Environmental Impact Statements. The engineering firm knows how to get the things accomplished, following a procedure, so we don't waste time. In other words, we could do things and all of a sudden, the State guys come in and stop us. You waste the six months where you should have been filing permits six months ago to get to the point where you can get the job finished properly."

Mrs. Joseph, "There's no possibility of putting in something like a dry well in the deepest area. Just as a temporary."

Councilman Lombardi, "They're going to be looking at that too, mam."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Councilman Prusinowski, "Don told me that they do have a solution that they feel is not too costly that will accomplish. That's what he told me the other day when I talked to him. But he says, until he finishes his report, he doesn't want to say too much."

Councilman Lombardi, "We have to wait for the report."

Mrs. Joseph, "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. Dick Benedict."

Dick Benedict, Fanning Blvd, "This subject, I have been up here many times about and I just want to make sure the priorities are set because H2M done a study a few years, about thirty priorities areas which haven't been fixed to this date. That's a lot of them. It's still on file that there was money paid for the study. There's a lot of places to be looked at yet from the original study. I know I've been here for eight years trying to get Middle Road and Fanning Boulevard fixed so I don't see where any quick fixes are coming for Peconic Bay. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "In the middle of the back there."

Anne Hattorff, "I'm Mrs. Anne Hattorff of Reeves Park and I'm coming up tonight to the Town Board Meeting. I came up last Tuesday night thinking there was a meeting and Mr. Janoski was kind enough to see me in his office. I stated my opinion privately. I have now come up to state it publicly. I think Mr. Janoski's priorities are totally mixed up. When you can look for federal funds for a Police Station and you can't look for federal funds or doing anything immediately to relieve our water situation up in Reeves Park. I have a son that is eight thousand miles away in Korea and he is drinking and bathing in pure water and I'm saying thanks be to God that he's over there and not being contaminated be water that we have. This is ridiculous. You also, last Tuesday, asked me a question. You said that back in January, you had stated that water is a big problem in the Town of Riverhead and I didn't have an answer for you but I do tonight. We were not notified of the situation in our community until April, after we got our water bill. We then got another letter from Mr. and Mrs. Gremler and the Gremler Water Works saying; please bear with us until something is done. Now I would like to know that with the weather we've been having, and you had some figures on your desk last Tuesday night. Have we come up anywhere near a solution as far as filters or anything else?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "Your wells, as I understand, in Reeves Park, are checked on a weekly basis. The results of the last testing showed that the combination of temik and carbo-furan was of a level, I believe, is 4 and 7 which the fractions add up to more than 1, would put the two companies in a position of having to provide a filter. We have been in contact with them as soon as we got that reading."

Anne Hattorff, "As of this week?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Yes."

Anne Hattorff, "And what's going to happen?"

Richard Ehlers, Town Attorney, "The County sets these standards and the standards that were set are previously determined by the State of New York and the Federal government and the numbers of; 7 parts per billion for the aldo-carb and 15 parts per billion for the carbo-furan, are the currently accepted limits that the County has imposed. The County has been advocating an adding formula where you add the two fractions. The parts of 7 and the parts of 15 and if the total is greater than 1, you shouldn't drink the water. They have refused them...The County has refused to actually show a ruling to that effect. So when I talked to the Chemical Companies and say that the County says it's above the limits, they say; will the County put the limit in writing and then we'll do something. Then the County won't put the limit in writing because they don't have any scientific data to prove that the additive formula that they are suggesting is in fact a correct add formula. I think there was a letter sent to the Gremlers recently which should have been sent to you or some notification should have been made to you regarding the quality of the water and whether or not it was in fact safe to drink at this time. It was hoped by those of us in the Town, that that letter would address this adding question but it did not. So we're sort of caught in between. The County is saying it's unsafe but at the same time they won't put that down in a formal written statement that we can then say to the Chemical Companies; now it is in fact the position of the Department of Health Suffolk County that they do, in fact, add. We've sort of been caught."

Anne Hattorff, "Ok. If we are caught in the middle and you gentlemen are our representatives and there is a community of 250 homes up there on both sides of the park. Don't you people have to do something to look out for the welfare of the people of Riverhead because not only do we have a problem. You have a problem in Wading River and I'm sure there are other problems that are going on in Riverhead that we don't even know about. We as a community, do not know about. So where does that leave you? What are you doing?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Richard Ehlers, "There's a resolution this evening for the Town Board to consider, for a study to extend the Water District from the corner of Osborn and Sound into your area."

Anne Hattorff, "That's not going to happen until next year."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Excuse me Dick. You made a statement that I just can't let go by. Our priorities are not mixed up because about 4 or 5 years ago, the previous administration even started a water quality study of the Town of Riverhead long before we started having problems. It's not that easy to run pipes all over Town. It cost millions of millions of dollars. My question, Union Carbide was in today, at the Suffolk Life. We're the Editorial Board. I happen to be walking in and they invited me in, with your water company and I asked the question. Why doesn't your water company go out and borrow the money and put the filter in now? Their job is to supply you with drinkable water. You pay your bills and if they did not notify you before, in other words, if they sent the bills out and they had the test results, then there's something wrong with your water company. Remember it's a private company who makes a profit selling you a product. Now that's number 1 responsibility. Number 2. The Health Department, whose job it is to monitor the wells, should be doing a little bit more too. The Town of Riverhead, the only obligation we have and responsibility is to, if we can, provide you with one of the services that we have which is our Water District. We are trying to get that pipe up there as soon as possible, for not only the people of Sound Avenue. We made a deal with the Flagg Country Club. Had them foot \$480,000 of the bill which you would have had to pay for the \$480,000. Because when they extended water where my Grandparents live, on Hubbard Avenue, they had to pay for the pipe to be extended. Not the rest of the tax payers or a wealthy developer. So at least we're getting the pipe to Sound Avenue which was our first priority. Now, as far as the filters, the argument is, it's really not an argument. It's a legal one. The County was wishy-washy on this thing. They'll call us up at the bar and say you've got to do this, this, this. We're going to call you in for a hearing and then give us a \$1,000 fine. I talked to the Health Department today on another matter and when it comes to small businessmen, they harangue you to death. When it comes to a problem like this, they're wishy-washy. Now its Union Carbide admitted to me today because they have a legal limit they set. They made a deal with the County, 7 parts per billion and quite frankly, I guess their legal department feels that they don't want to issue filters unless it meets the New York State standard because that's their

company policy of which our Editorial Department was haranguing them on this particular thing about, it's your obligation. Your moral obligation of the corporation. So the Town of Riverhead is trying to provide you with water and the Town Attorney and the Supervisor are trying to get these filters installed and I think the Health Department and your water company should be doing a little bit more too."

Anne Hattorff, "I agree with all that but when I'm driving home from work and I hear over the radio, that Mr. Janoski is seeking public funds for a Police Station and we're not able to drink our water in various parts of the Town of Riverhead, I think I can question each of you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Because there are different funds available for different projects. There's a thousand things going on in Municipal Government at the same time. We did get some federal funds for some water extensions in low and modern income areas which are available. This particular case, the Community Development office is looking for possible. We have a full time staff that, all they do is go through the Congretional record and look for every type of grant that is available which we have profitted immensely in the Town of Riverhead. If there's money available, believe me, we would use it to put the pipe up there. Don't you think that if there was federal funds available, grants available, that we would apply for them?"

Anne Hattorff, "I would like some assurance and somebody, Mr. Scheiner, who we hear wonderful things about, is actively looking for some funds to help us."

Supervisor Janoski, "When you came in last Tuesday night, you know we've had this conversation. I explained to you that there are different things that we applied for. Tonight we're going to do something with the with the Railroad Avenue project which has monies, \$130,000. We are going to go on with that. It's money for..."

Anne Hattorff, "And my main purpose Mr. Janoski, is that you were kind enough to receive me in your office, which you really didn't have to do and I appreciate that but I also would like to make a public statement and the same questions I asked you then I want it on public record, which it is now."

Supervisor Janoski, "It certainly is."

Anne Hattorff, "And I certainly hope that this Water District and our water problems can be resolved because I'm sure that the people who vote in Reeves Park, will certainly remember the names come November. thank you."

Unidentified from audience, INAUDIBLE.

Supervisor Janoski, "Excuse me sir."

Unidentified speaker, "That he and the hit men from the East End Murder Incorporated and go help ourselves and not get any help from them."

Supervisor Janoski, "Sir would you like to come up to the microphone? I think the gentleman way in the back there."

Henry Silverman, Sound Shore Road, "The Zoning Board has denied me and just so the names are straight, Mr. Wells did abstain from that vote. Mr. Thurms voted no. Mrs. Wendelken voted no. Koblyenski voted no and Mrs. Tormey voted no. Obviously they voted against a windmill. My biggest gripe is; there's no good reason to vote no. Today I got back the notice that I was denied and I would like to go over the reasons with you and there are no good reasons. The appeal was denied for the following reasons: A windmill can be considered an incidental use in residence C. What ever that means. There are, in the Town of Riverhead, windmills in residence C. Number 2. The height of the proposed structure is more than twice the allowed by the ordinance. Let me just interject that the ordinance of 35 feet was so designed so that the fire trucks could put out a fire in a building. That was the reasoning for the 35 feet. So they've stretched it. Obviously if there's a fire on my windmill, per se, you could not squirt water on it because there would be more of a problem. You can't put water on an electrical fire. So obviously that's not a good reason. To finish the quoting from this denial, a variance of over 100% would be needed. Number 3. The drawings submitted are for a tower 58 feet in height, while the applicant is asking for 68 feet plus a 7 foot windmill. I'm interjecting that diameter of the blade had to be added in for the tower. Usually when you go before the Zoning Board, you don't even have to submit plans. I had to submit plans and I didn't realize that they were going to take that against me. It should have been, I was just applying for the height and it's the Building Department's job to go over my plans. I don't know if anyone on the Zoning Board has an engineering degree to criticize my plans. On the other end of it, I don't believe I need an engineering degree to do my own plans because there are other windmills in Riverhead

that the Zoning Board has given permission for that were homemade towers. Number 4. Changes have been made on the drawings. No technical information has been submitted to insure that the changes are safe. Obviously, if I'm putting up a tower on my land, I want it to be safe. I'm putting a \$48,000 wind machine that I have a grant from the Town of Riverhead to put up, on top of this tower and obviously I don't want to lose it. I know I want it there for years to come. Number 5. The drawing is not identical, identified as to the manufacturer or the source of the tower. Basically the tower was originally a LILCO tower and structurally sound and I'd like to know; it's kind of ironic, has a windmill on it. Number 6. On the denial, the Town of Riverhead, (inaudible) New York State Building Code and it is not normally necessary for the Board of Appeals to concern itself with the safety of a structure. However, the building code does not deal with windmills. So in this instance, the Board must be aware of the lack of engineering and the technical material submitted as part of this application. All of a sudden, the Zoning Board has decided that since the code doesn't deal with it, it's their job. It isn't. It's still the Building Department's job. We pay taxes. We have a qualified Building Department, and one of which has an engineering degree. So it's his job. Number 7. The property is 140 feet wide at that point of the tower with which the wind machine will be set, needs a falling area of 150 feet. If you had reviewed the plans, I haven't yet figured out how my tower would jump over the line and even though they've made a point that the windmill would not fall on my land. There are other variances have been given where the windmill tower is 15 feet from the persons line and in my case, the windmill, through the trees, would jump onto the property next to me. I haven't figured that out yet. Basically, my variance is denied. Unfortunately I'd rather have, see if you could work out something with the Zoning Board because I believe I won't be the last one complaining on this issue. Essentially, if, next week when LILCO has the hearing and I know in the back of my mind, that 52% rate increase sounds kind of great to me."

Councilman Prusinowski, "56."

Henry Silverman, "56, sorry. So I would like to get up my machine. I feel I've kind of gotten the short change here on this issue. The Town does need a good set of guidelines for windmills. But since there isn't a set yet, I don't feel they can turn me down just because they haven't done their homework. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. Yes sir."

Bill Dugan, Reeves Park, "Just another Reeves Park tax payer for 41 years and for 41 years I have received, and people there as long as I have been, have received absolutely nothing from the Town of Riverhead for our taxes. You made a statement to the young lady that spoke before. That it's available for you and if you don't take advantage of it, it's your fault. Well, we would like the water to be made available to us. I have not been satisfied with the answers that have been given here about the filter may come in. It may not come in. This has been going on for quite a while now and what we have been asking, also, if you would give us a time schedule and a bottom line on what the cost would be to get the water from where it is to where we want it. Now, we've been waiting for that. We've been sort of horsed around. I would say that we're getting alot of talk about these filters and we're fighting with the chemical company. All this bit means nothing to us because we are not getting anywhere. We have no answers even to look for long range answers. If you would tell us what the cost would be and you're talking about it would be millions of dollars. Then maybe we can fight with the State and fight with the Government outside of Riverhead to make up the difference that we can afford and this should not leave the Chemical Company off the hook. They should also pay their share of what we want. We have to get the water because of this reason that the water is contaminated. Has been. We've been put through a lot of trouble. A lot of people have been losing money. The taxes out there are high. We've been doubled, like the lady said, in her area also. Our taxes have doubled and we received no more for them. I understand how you work the taxes out. You figure out what the services cost. You divide it among the tax payers, the residents, the owners. Now, this is fair, perhaps, when these people are getting their roads cleaned. They're getting water. They're getting all the facilities that should be given to a Town, to people that are paying taxes. We receive none of them. It seems, only last week I was amazed. After 41 years, a truck came up there. A street cleaning truck. I couldn't believe it, really. I stopped the driver. I said, "Were you told to clean the roads up here?" He said, "Yes". Well he didn't even know there was roads up there until I explained it to him. I think he went through, cleaned one road and his truck broke down because these roads are almost uncleanable. They're in such bad shape. We, the people in here, pay to have their roads paved. They pay. I've been running down to your Sanitation Department. Whatever it is down there. The Road

Department. I've been carrying home piles of black top which they have been very magnanimously giving to me. Black top, I lay it. I had enough put down to fill a hole as deep as the well here. They were nice enough to give it to me but I put it down myself and a few other. We got together and that's hard work and we still pay our taxes. We don't tell you, well we do not use this and we shouldn't pay the taxes. We're using the things on our own. With our own work but we're not getting the services that other people are getting in your Town here. Police, in the 41 years, it's only within the last 7 years that the Police have went through there once in a while. When we had a party years ago, we had a little shin-dig down at the Hotel Perkins. We had to request that the Police please come through our area while we're away so that our children will have a certain amount of guardianship. Now, that had to be requested. This is not a service that we've been getting. We had to request all these services. Now, how can we get the cost of this and some kind of a time schedule so that we will know what to do next year or the year after because this has just been hanging higher for years now."

Supervisor Janoski, "Actually it's not sir. When your group first came down here, the Town Board started immediate action. Quite honestly, the Town Board has been addressing the question of water since the first of the year. There are many things happening in this Town because we recognize what the problems are. As soon as you came down, we started the process going. Tonight we're going to hire H2M to provide the answers to the questions which you have raised. They are going to draw the boundaries of the District. They are going to comply the assessed value information. They are going to do the preliminary design of the water system and from that all, they are going to provide the estimated cost and then we will be able to tell you what it's going to cost an individual property owner in Reeves Park and then that will all be compiled in the form of a petition which will be distributed amongst yourselves and you will decide whether you want the public water based on the information that's provided."

Bill Dugan, "As the State Legislature said at a meeting down there the other day, they move very slowly as to where politics or anything else is involved."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "Sir, that has nothing to do with it. He can call the Murder Inc. You can say whatever you want to say, but this Town Board is moving to solve the problem. I know of no other way of going about the process of hiring a company, letting them do their work and provide the information to the citizens who have to make the decision."

Bill Dugan, "You have no power over the chemical company that you can say let's put a suit against them of some kind and force them into something?"

Supervisor Janoski, "I understand that Legislature Blass was in a meeting with some Reeves Park residents and when his office informed me that he wanted to hurry us along. I suggested to him that perhaps, the County, which has the health responsibility throughout the 10 towns, might want to come up with the 15, the \$30,000. I'm sorry. Put in the filter and then have the County pay the two chemical companies. We are doing our job. We're moving towards the Riverhead Water District extension. The filter thing is something that is basically out of our hands, as far as the jurisdiction. We have been attempting and have contacted the two companies on numerous occasions. We almost had it at one point. Almost had it until the new readings came in which showed a drop in the levels. The County, quite honestly, is the level of government with the jurisdiction over this matter and I said he's the community chairman of the Health Committee of the Suffolk County Legislature. They must have some money to address problems like this. We're talking about \$30,000. Perhaps, they should put the filter in and turn around and sue. You know, it may be something the Town may want to consider. I don't know where we'd get the \$30,000 though, but it is properly in their area to take this kind of action. While the Town government is the Governing Body of the Water District, we're moving towards providing you with the Water District extension. The one thing you have to understand is that we're not moving towards the extension up to Sound Avenue. That's going to take a period of time. While that is going on, we're going through this other process of compiling all the information that you need."

Bill Dugan, "And this will only be an interim thing? In other words if we get the filter right."

Supervisor Janoski, "A filter is an interim solution."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Bill Dugan, "Now, someone suggested that we make this water man, the man that owns, the Water District man there, make him put the filter in. He's not going to put that in without getting the money from us and we're paying more than we should be now and if we get the Town water, our prices should go lower. Because I went to one place. It's a sand and gravel place. It surely must use a lot more water than each individual in that park uses and he pays \$80 a year. Well, I'm willing to pay \$100 a year. So that's \$20 more and everyone in that park would be willing to pay too. Even to \$150 a year just for the Town water. So there's some of the money there that the Town would be making. You could actually make a profit on your water if you included us into your plans which you are doing."

Supervisor Janoski, "We can't make a profit."

Bill Dugan, "But we still can not know when we're going to get this and this is what bothers me. Bothers all the people because people are losing money and they're getting ready to sell. The next thing you know, there's going to be a development come in there and buy that whole place up and make another Southampton on the north shore out of it because it's prime area. We know that and they're saying it now. They're starting that place down there at the Flagg Country Club. I was down there today. It's going to be a beautiful place for the rich. Not for people like us. Down there, 4 years ago you were just about able to scrape together enough to pay for a bungalow."

Supervisor Janoski, "Those people are paying for your Water District. I don't know if this is a credit to you people here but you're going to have a Water District extension. In large parts, due to the developers of the Baiting Hollow Condominiums paying for that extension. Without that, what we're talking about, as far as an extension, would not be possible. So I just want you to understand. I see two hands. I think we'll call the one to the left first."

Pat Panchak, "My name is Pat Panchak and I'm from Reeves Park also and I do appreciate what you have been doing for us. What I'm concerned with now is, that we have this tap that we drink water from. A lot of these summer residents will go home and they love it because they can drink the water when they go home. In the winter time when it freezes, I have no place to go. When I spend all my money on my water then I have no money to pay my taxes. I mean I really think my kids, I have four kids. I use 5, 6 gallons of water a day. I'm very concerned."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "I understand that. I don't know what other step you want us to take."

Pat Panchak, "I want you to try and hurry. That's what I really want you to try to do."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Mrs. Panchak, we are concerned. We've spent the money. We're going to spend more money. We have made the developers pay the money to run the Water District to Sound Avenue. The Town Attorney and the Supervisor are trying to badger the companies. I'll tell you. Today, Union Carbide told the Editorial Board of Suffolk Life, point blank, that unless that level is 7, they are not putting in a filter, which is my question to your water company. You have to go the Public Service Commission. Just granted them an huge increase. You put all your money up front which I think is wrong. They did not give you the information after. Remember you're dealing with a private company. If this was that Town of Riverhead doing this to you, we should all be hung and thrown in jail. We're trying to get the thing solved. What would you like us to do?"

Pat Panchak, "I would like you to hurry. My kids went to the beach this morning. 7:45, my three girls, 10, 11 years old. They had to put out a fire on the beach. I thought there was going to be Police down there to protect my kids. My kids can't walk to the candy center across the way and home at night because of what's down in that parking lot."

Councilman Prusinowski, "The fence has been ordered and they're coming down next week to put up the fence."

Pat Panchak, "Isn't there supposed to be a Policeman on duty there tonight or something? Make sure all the kids leave."

Supervisor Janoski, "They're supposed to check it."

Pat Panchak, "I don't want my 11 year old kid at the beach and I don't expect it. I think they should be able to go at 8:00 in the morning and not have to run into a fire at the beach at 8:00 in the morning."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Well that's why we're putting up the security gate."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Pat Panchak, "I don't feel like I'm getting, like they said, I don't feel like I'm getting anything. The only thing I get from my taxes is the school and I happen to think it's well worth the money because I think my kids get a good education. I want them to go to Riverhead and I want them to love Riverhead because we love Riverhead. I don't want to have to move because my kids can't drink the water. They can't walk down the block."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Well they will be."

Supervisor Janoski, "I know of no community in the United States of America where some sort of problem does not exist."

Pat Panchak, "Why does everything seem to be situated in Reeves Park? My kids can't do anything."

Supervisor Janoski, "Come on."

Pat Panchak, "Really. My kids can't go out once it gets dark. Now obviously they can't go out in the morning either, without me being there."

Supervisor Janoski, "All right, fine. There was another hand in the back there when Mrs. Panchak, yes."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Mrs. O'Hare."

Supervisor Janoski, "We have, by the way, an Eagle Scout with the new Eagle Scout, Keith Zay, who has seen first hand, Democracy in action. Later on the Town Board will award to him a certificate of merit for his achievement of rank of Eagle Scout."

Dorothy O'Hare, "Dorothy O'Hare, Reeves Park also. Mr. Prusinowski, you said, why doesn't the water company put in the filter. I mean, I don't care who puts in the filter. But the filter will not solve our problems. We have three..."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We know that."

Dorothy O'Hare, "Let me finish. We have 3 separate chemicals and we also have nitrates. We need 2 \$30,000 filters because of the way the system is set up. So we spend \$60,000 on filters and still not be able to drink the water because of the high nitrate concentrate. That comes directly from the Suffolk County Board of Health."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Councilman Prusinowski, "Mrs. O'Hare we agree with you 100%. We agree with you 100%. That's why we're trying to extend the Water District to Reeves Park so you can hook up to public water so you can solve your water problem permanently. Sam McLendon indicted to me that he estimated the amount of money that you're now paying to your water company. It shouldn't be much more. He estimated what the cost of the construction and stuff with just the bonding. On your water bill, Joe met last night. Rolling Woods Association came down here and they were introduced to try to get into the Water District which is to your benefit and hopefully Dolphin Way. John Lombardi and I clocked the pipe which I want to get on the record tonight, from the extra. Somebody said last time, should you run the pipe up Roanoke Avenue. It's 1.7 miles more from Riverhead Cement Block right to you first well. Then it would just go from Osborn Avenue to Park Drive. So it's actually shorter to run the pipe the way we're doing it. Plus the developers are paying for it."

Dorothy O'Hare, "Will we need another pump station?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Excuse me."

Dorothy O'Hare, "Will we need another pump station?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "I'm sure you probably will. That's the engineers. That's what we're hiring them tonight to do. The permanent solution is public water."

Supervisor Janoski, "The Riverhead Water District must provide a certain level of pressure. What ever, it takes to get it, the pump station, the booster station, it will be done."

Dorothy O'Hare, "There were a couple of remarks, not from here, that people in Reeves Park are trying to get something for nothing and that is something I would like to put a stop to because it's a lie. We've paid for what we've gotten over the years. Why should we stop."

Supervisor Janoski, "I haven't heard."

Dorothy O'Hare, "The problem is and you have explained it to me. That if you figure out our assessed evaluation, if Albany feels it's too much, then we can't get it. Whether we need it or not. We can't get it. That's where the federal grants will come in. We are more than willing to pay our fair share and more than that. So we are not trying to get something for nothing and I do have to make one more point. I was at that County Legislature Meeting and I was talking to the president of Union Carbide, Mr. Olford. He said to me, quote unquote, if the reading goes up to 4, you'll get your filter. Now, I'm going to call him and hold him to it."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Richard Ehlers, "I've been talking to the guy and he's always on a plane."

Dorothy O'Hare, "You didn't get a hold of him?"

Richard Ehlers, "You get him on the plane. You talk to him on a plane. I've never talked to anyone on a plane before. It's a very frustrating thing to do. These guys from the State of New York have a level of 7."

Dorothy O'Hare, "I understand all that. It's 7 over 14 and 4 over 7 and it comes out to more than 1, we've got our filter."

Richard Ehlers, "But his legal staff tells me that it would incur too much money to give Reeves Park a filter when it's under 7. The bad guys from the Department won't let them."

Dorothy O'Hare, "So they reneged again then."

Richard Ehlers, "What the Board is trying to tell them, it's so frustrating. Our plans are for an extension and they're hiring the engineers tonight to prepare for that plan, which is required by State law for the government and city requirements. That's basically what we're doing tonight."

Dorothy O'Hare, "So now with the resolution tonight, they will only need the one petition. We will not need two."

Supervisor Janoski, "And I want you also to know, that there have been approached made to the Town Board from the Park residents that want public water."

Dorothy O'Hare, "This a democracy. 51%."

Supervisor Janoski, "The other thing is, that I have been approached....."

Dorothy O'Hare, "Now, by extending it to Dolphin Way and whatever, that makes it twice as hard. Would you say those people are agreeable or not?"

Supervisor Janoski, "They are agreeable to have us proceed with the work that we're going to have conducted by H2M, so that we can present to them the same information that you will get."

Dorothy O'Hare, "We will have no trouble getting 51%?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "Well, that's the hope, I think the first time you were down here I explained to you that you're going to have to do, is get the residents of that community to support the public water so that we in fact can go ahead. Because if they don't want it, we can't put it in."

Dorothy O'Hare, "If it's too expensive, then the State won't let us."

Supervisor Janoski, "Yes?"

Edward Joseph, "My name is Ed Joseph. 5 Walker Street. One of the solutions proposed for the Peconic Bay Boulevard the flooding, was to install dry wells. If we did install them, won't that automatically increase the water level of that area? So what have you accomplished?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "I wouldn't make that statement because the engineers are coming in with their report. I don't think that's their solution."

Edward Joseph, "No dry wells?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "One of the problems..."

Edward Joseph, "The comment was made, possibly, that might be the solution."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Excellent point because one of the problems in that area is a high water table. Dry wells won't do it."

Councilman Lombardi, "Dry wells won't take it off."

Edward Joseph, "I'm wondering. I'm referring now to Ock-a-Bok. What the chances are of getting our roads fixed. We don't have street lights. We don't have water. We don't have garbage. We don't have road maintenance and we are paying terrific taxes. Is there any possibility of getting our roads fixed? Even filling up the pot-holes would help it an awful lot."

Supervisor Janoski, "The Town Highway Department has been doing, for reasons of safety and access, what I will describe as, minor work on private roads."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Edward Joseph, "We would appreciate that very much."

Supervisor Janoski, "We have been addressing a section of private roads on a yearly basis and if that is the request of that area, we will certainly try to do some work on your area next year."

Edward Joseph, "Would you want a letter from the president of the association?"

Supervisor Janoski, "It certainly would be helpful."

Edward Joseph, "Thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski, "Yes sir."

Steve Pantek, "My name is Steve Pantek and I'm at 28 Willow, Ock-a-Bok Community Association. I just want to keep adding to just about what everybody has been saying. First of all, we've been paying excessive taxes and we never receive anything. Second place, even if we were to fix the roads ourselves, your condition on Peconic Bay Boulevard prevents us from doing so. Now you people say H2M, or whatever the engineering company. The other gentleman says he's been through this procedure for years. So that leaves us where? In the lurch. Now you put yourself in my position. After you get over 50% increase and you can't even get to your place unless you got a pair of galoshes. Some people have been forced to spend hundreds and hundreds of dollars to elevate their driveways to even get in but that doesn't say when your car goes slushing through all that water that you're doing your car any good. That's more money. Supposing you want to sell that place and you got stanchions there on Peconic Bay Boulevard. Flood Area. Flood Area. What do you think? It's going to entice a buyer or something? Or do you think it's going to entice them to come and look at your place? Now when I came down here in the very early spring, I had to put 3 2 by 12s in my crawl space which was loaded with water from up above there on Peconic Bay, to even flood myself in to shut two valves off even before I could put my water on. Supposing any of you lads were plumbers. Would you want to go into my crawl space? With what? A bathing suit? Supposing you were electricians. Would you gamble fixing my electricity in my crawl space with all that water there? Now, we hear about temik. Years ago I heard about temik. It will take years before the temik gets down to your water level. There's been so much water it's got to sink the temik down into the water level. I don't know exactly. I don't like to be angry. I said to my wife, maybe we should move out there. My wife says what. We move out here, I'd need a row boat. I think

we should get some sort of date where we can come back here again and find out what the story is, as far as this H2M. Now you people talk about money, as long as I've been around here. For example, I'm walking along Railroad Street with a pair of boots on. Finally, I get up to 58. With all the rains and everything, the road that you fixed, some of the mud got off to the side. You people cleaned that up in a hurry. But Willow Street, the heck with Willow Street, Bay Avenue, and the rest of them."

Supervisor Janoski, "You know, I don't understand the attitude that seems to prevail here this evening."

Steve Pantak, "Well what has been passed on this?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Excuse me sir. The five guys sitting up here tonight. Have we done something to you sir? Please let me explain."

Steve Pantak, "I can answer you. Everything is getting fixed and we are not getting anything but the taxes are getting raised."

Supervisor Janoski, "Do you live on a private road?"

Steve Pantak, "Yes."

Supervisor Janoski, "We are not allowed to do what you are asking for. It is not legal. Now I want to ask a question because it's been on my mind all evening. What were your taxes before we had the reassessment?"

Steve Pantak, "That I honestly don't know. It's been going up continually."

Supervisor Janoski, "Could you tell me what your current tax bill would be? What is it?"

Lady from Audience, Stated the dollar amount. Inaudible.

Councilman Prusinowski, "Mam, do you live on the water?"

Unidentified Lady, "Yes."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok, that's why. Now wait a minute. I live on the water too and my taxes went up just as much as yours did. Because we can get more for our property."

Steve Pantak, "I'm away from the water and mine doubled."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Unidentified Lady, "They still doubled."

Supervisor Janoski, "Absolutely Mam."

Steve Pantak, "Now the young lady here said, at least I get school taxes out of it, like Mrs. Joseph said. We don't even get the school benefit out of it."

Supervisor Janoski, "Sir, now if I could have...."

Steve Pantak, "Go right ahead."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. I've heard figures like 500, 600. Of course at that particular time, 60% of that was for the School District. So the Town, you're paying about \$200 a year, maybe 300 a year and of course now you say they have doubled."

Steve Pantak, "Right."

Supervisor Janoski, "Now I want you to understand, that concurrently, at the same time, a group of residents in the Town of Riverhead, their taxes went this way because somewhere there's a thing called equalization and so forth."

Steve Pantak, "How large is that group where their taxes went down?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Exactly the same."

Steve Pantak, "Three or four?"

Supervisor Janoski, "No. You know, I can, if you want to play that roll, it's fine, but I've got the numbers. It is about equal. About one third went up and one third went down and about one third stayed the same."

Steve Pantak, "As many people as I know, nobody told me their taxes went down. Everybody told me that they went up and everybody was complaining just the same as I'm complaining now."

Supervisor Janoski, "In your neighborhood."

Steve Pantak, "No, no, no. In South Jamesport, in Jamesport, on Sound Avenue and every part of Riverhead."

Supervisor Janoski, "Ok, You've got your tax bill with you. What is the assessed value of your home?"

Unidentified Lady, "Before or after?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Before would be nice."

Unidentified Lady, "Before, \$3,050."

Supervisor Janoski, "Ok and what is the present assessed valuation?"

Unidentified Lady, "\$55,000."

Steve Pantak, "Oh boy."

Councilman Artale, "3000 was on quarterly."

Supervisor Janoski, "No that was on a fractional."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Mam."

Supervisor Janoski, "So that was about, your original assessment was about \$30,000. Now it's \$55,000, did you say?"

Unidentified Lady, "55. It was 3,000."

Supervisor Janoski, "I know, but that's fractional but that equals \$30,000."

Audience, "Oh no. Don't bring that up. We hear the same story all the time."

Supervisor Janoski, "How do you think the property tax system works?"

Mrs. Joseph, "One thing I was curious about is why was Riverhead so gung-ho on the full value?"

Supervisor Janoski, "I don't know. I wasn't around then."

Mrs. Joseph, "The State wasn't. Islip and Riverhead."

Supervisor Janoski, "I wasn't here then."

Councilman Artale, "That was another Town Board."

Unidentified Man, "Would the Town of Riverhead buy my house for this assessed valuation with the contaminated water?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Would you sell it to me for what you want it to be assessed for?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Unidentified Man, "Pardon. What I'm telling you is what you got it assessed for. Will you buy it?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Joe, I want to ask..."

Unidentified Man, "Do you want to buy it? I'll sell it to you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Sir, you're out of order. You have to come up to the microphone."

Steve Pantak, "Just one other point I want to make. When you get all these floods, your bathrooms don't work properly either and that to me is a health hazzard. Now if somebody says you can't drain this off on account of the E.P.A., let's call the E.P.A. and the Health Department in and condemn the place. Let's get our money back."

Councilman Lombardi, "Sir, can I just say one thing please? Last year we had 42 inches of rain for the whole year. This year, at the end of May, we already had 44 inches of rain and there is a problem there with your water table all over the Town. Now that was last year, 42 inches. Already we have had over 42 inches. So we do have a water problem."

Steve Pantak, "Yes, but our condition is that much worse. Excuse me. If you get that much water and you haven't got the drain off, then we are in a paralysis situation then."

Councilman Lombardi, "We understand that and this is what we are trying to solve and we are working on it sir."

Councilman Prusinowski, "When we get the report, we will notify your Association so you can take a look at it and see what the engineers have proposed."

Steve Pantak, "Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "When I said they told us, specifically, it would be no sooner then two weeks. They've been working on the report for two months. So we haven't just this tonight. In other words, you show up tonight and Oh my God, we didn't do anything. It's been over two months. They've been working on it. When you're designing drainage systems, they're being extra careful because we have had some problems in the past and we want to make sure these drainage areas are constructed properly and they solve they problem. Throwing money down the drain by installing things that don't work causes all of us more money in the long run. That's what we're trying to avoid. It's better to go a little bit slower and do it the right way because it....."

Mrs. Joseph, "Are they already designing the system or are they merely surveying it?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "What they're doing is they're preparing a preliminary report."

Mrs. Joseph, "Then they haven't started yet."

Councilman Prusinowski, "No. You have to find out what they propose as a solution so you know how much it's going to cost before we go out and do drawings and stuff."

Supervisor Janoski, "Ok. Henry did you have your hand up? Yes sir."

Thomas Ganetis, "I would like..."

Supervisor Janoski, "You have to come up to the microphone."

Thomas Ganetis, "I feel...."

Supervisor Janoski, "Please state your name and address."

Thomas Ganetis, "#4 Locust Street. I feel that we should get some type...."

Irene Pendzick, "Excuse me. Could I get the spelling."

Thomas Ganetis, "G-a-n-e-t-i-s Thomas, middle initial A. I feel that we should get some kind of temporary repair on our big ruts because some of our drivers, whether they're children, women or whatever it is, have had problems in these ruts. If these take control of the car and some damage happens, then we've got a bigger thing on our hands than what we have now. So maybe something should be put down there. At least a temporary patch of some kind to help us so until you people and your engineers and so forth can get in there and do something."

Supervisor Janoski, "Does anyone else wish to address the Town Board? Yes sir. Way in the back. Could you come up to the microphone?"

Unidentified Man, "I have a quick solution to your drainage problem."

Supervisor Janoski, "Come on up. State your name and address and give us your solution."

Unidentified Man, (Name Inaudible) from Reeves Park. (Inaudible) It's probably better than the water we're drinking now."

What it boils down to is; this fellow Mr. Schrab got his permit from the Town Board. Now these permits..."

Can't there be some prior communications, liason and finalize so people don't get harassed about this any more? Thank you. I'm going to turn this into Mrs. Pendzick."

Supervisor Janoski, "Is there anyone else wishing to address the Town Board on this or any other matter? That being the case I would like to first of all, and the members of the Town Board to present to Keith a certificate of merit from the Town of Riverhead for his outstanding achievement of obtaining the rank of Eagle Scout. I know it use to be a very small percentage of people, of boys, in the country that even obtained that rank. It use to be 1 or 2%. I think it's gone up a little. 
