Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mrs. Pendzick. Is there anyone present representing Suffolk Garden Restaurant? Would you step forward please."

Rick Mighdoll, 21 Fire Blvd., Smithtown."

Irene J. Pendzick: "May I have the spelling of your last name please?"

Rick Mighdoll: "M-I-G-H-D-O-L-L. We requested live music. And the type of music we're going to have or hope to have is country western. We're going to strictly stay away from the so-called adult entertainment music and I understand there's going to be a permit. At a prior meeting, someone mentioned as opposed to it, they're opening a pandoras box. The idea of this permit as I understand is, naturally if we do not

apply with the rules and regulations of it, that it can be taken away. So it's not a question of opening up a pandoras box as some people mention before. That will have to stay open, it can't be closed. And we would have the entertainment on the weekends."

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay, thank you very much. Is there anyone else present who wishes to address themselves to this issue? Mr. Wallace."

Robert Wallace, Timber Park, Calverton: "I wish that you would be more specific in telling me which Suffolk Garden's Restaurant we are speaking about. Are we speaking about Joe Foresto's Suffolk Gardens? Are we speaking about Trio Lounge Suffolk Garden?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Trio Lounge."

Robert Wallace: "Now, the Trio Lounge happens to be approximately 250 to 300 feet from my living room. I understand there had been many complaints to you by myself and my neighbors concerning the noise that comes from the Trio Lounge now.

I want to give you a little back ground music here.

At this time, Robert Wallace played a tape recording of music.

Very annoying. How would you like it from 11:00 o'clock at night till four in the morning. That's what I get from the Trio Lounge. I've made the complaint. I've made it before. I do not want to stop this man from having a permit. But I want the noise regulated and if you can't regulate it, then I do not want them to have a live permit and I guarantee you, I know where each and everyone of you live. If you don't regulate it, you too, will hear it exactly like I do. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mr. Wallace. Did I see your hand up Hank?"

Henry Fioto, 622 Northville Turnpike, Riverhead; "I understand a while back, this ordinance was passed in regards to restaurants have to apply for special permits. Now I had spoke to Mr. (incomprehensible) because as most of the Board knows, I had this place at one time. And I had the same problems

to how (the part of this sentence was incomprehensible) at that time we didn't need a permit. From what I understand, originally, the original application of this restaurant when it was closed that the original application when applied for was a diner, not a restaurant. And the original owner had applied to the Building for a permit for a diner that he had a chance to sell the premises, if he could get a permit for a diner. And from what I understand that that was what was granted him for a diner. All of a sudden it went from a diner to a restaurant. Now people, other people have come to me, like I said I have nothing to do with this place any longer. They say well what kind of a place is it? I don't know. I haven't been in the place I would say in at least four years. But to me, if a permit is granted for a diner and they were getting around the law, the guy don't serve any food.

I said to them if this is the situation as far as I'm concerned that state liquor authority should be involved. The owner is here now. The permit is being given under the Suffolk Garden Restaurant or Suffolk Restaurant. Yet the sign outside says Trio Lounge, it doesn't say Suffolk Garden Restaurant. I'd like to know is the license under Suffolk Garden or is Trio Lounge? Is there a permit? You know, we're passing basic regulations and then we're turning around we're going around it by having different signs on the premises. I'd like to know if the license, if for the Trio Lounge or it's for the Suffolk Garden Restaurant?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Well I'm sure he'll answer that question Hank."

Rick Mighdoll: "The license is Suffolk Garden Restaurant doing business as the Trio Lounge and on the sign outside the premises it does say restaurant and while I'm here in answer to this gentleman about that music, I don't know where you got that recording from, but people have complained about the noise and police officers have come and they've stood behind the place while the juke box was on at the volume that it usually is on and they were not able to hear any noise at all. Now how in this weather would you hear it at your house 200 yards away with all the windows closed and everything like that, unless you keep your windows open which is all right too. There's been complaints, the officers came and have not heard the noise outside behind the restaurant. Now where you got this recording from is beyond me."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Hank, you got the floor."

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Henry Fioto: "Well basically I'm saying if we — if the person has a restaurant license . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Wiwczar are you back there somewhere. Is there any difference in our code between a diner and a restaurant or are they considered the same thing?"

Raymond Wiwczar from the audience: "No originally it was a diner, but it was closed for over a year. So it loses its non-conforming use because it's in a residential district."

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay, but as far as the definition of a restaurant is diner and restaurant — the same thing or are they . . ."

Raymond Wiwczar: "Very similar."

Henry Fioto: "But was the permit issued for a diner or was it issued for a restaurant."

Raymond Wiwczar: "Years ago, it was a diner."

Henry Fioto: "No when the person came to the building department and applied for a permit to re-open the diner was the application applied for to re-open the diner or was it to re-open a restaurant? That's what I'm trying to find and I just can't find out."

Raymond Wiwczar from the audience was inaudible.

Henry Fioto: "I'm not talking about that. I'm asking on the permit, does he specifically ask for a permit to open a diner or on the permit does he ask permission to open a restaurant?"

Raymond Wiwczar from the audience: "Restaurant."

Henry Fioto: "It says restaurant. Well like I say, this is the ordinance I would say basically as long as the man

is willing or prove that he's maintained under the state liquor authority, percentages of food which he's required to do then, he's entitled to his permit. But if he's not I would ask the Town Board also to stipulate in the special permit that you're going to grant him that at any time the Town Board finds that he's no longer serving food, that the permit be lifted and that he should be made to understand that he's no longer serving food. That's what's going to be done. So there's no confusion later on."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Hank. I have to go to anybody in the room who wants to speak. Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Town Board on this issue? If you want the microphone, you can have it now."

Rick Mighdoll: "In answer to this gentleman's question, in order for the state liquor authority, we have to serve food and we do serve food at all times. So we are complying with the regulations there."

Supervisor Janoski: "Bob, did you wish the floor again?"

Robert Wallace: "I'd like to clarify the fact that the gentleman said three or four hundred yards. We are less than one hundred yards. And yes, I do have my windows open. Not on these cold nights, but during the summer months my windows are open and during the summer months the noise is very loud. One of the other things at 4:00 in the morning when the place closes, where which he has no control, where you have no control and which I have no control, it sounds like a speed raceway out there when the cars come out and start the cars up and run them and gun them and run upstreet. And I tell you it's very noisy and like I said, you give him the permit when I'm woken up at night, you will be too."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Town Board on this issue?"

No one else wishing to be heard and no communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Janoski declared the hearing closed at 7:55 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday, January 19, 1982 at 8:00 P.M. to hear all interested persons regarding the special permit application of Joseph and Linda Sullivan for a mobile home park.

The affidavits were ordered to be placed on file.

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mrs. Pendzick. Is there anyone present representing Mr. & Mrs. Sullivan?"

Joel Markowitz: "Yes, I'm the attorney for Joseph and Linda Sullivan. I'm here in a representative capacity. I believe that by now you've seen letters that we've submitted to both the Planning Board and the Town Board in regard to our proposals. The proposals relate to the Oak Park Trailer Court and we've presented two alternative proposals. I realize that it may be difficult to see what we prepared from this distance, but perhaps I can give you a general idea of what our proposals are all about. This proposal is designated as Scheme I. It involves the proposed addition of six units to the existing twenty-one units that are set forth in the latest filed map which was filed on or about December 22, 1978. The proposed units are shaded in (the tape ended) (the tape began) is presently on file.

First and most significant is the proposal for the utilization of the area at the southern end of the mobile home park. On the existing filed map the — there is an area of approximately 6800 square feet that is not being utilized for any purpose whatsoever. Our proposal is that that area be utilized primarily for parking with the addition of one unit to the north of that segment. The second change would involve the central roadway. At the present time, there are two separate entrances to the roadway. However, the town ordinance requires only one entrance, except for mobile home parks or travel trailer parks of ten acres or more or one hundred fifty units or more. This is a far smaller park requiring only one entrance way.

The area that is now covered by the southern entrance now be utilized for one additional unit. The third change would involve the conversion of the existing parking area to an area in which four units could be placed. Again, the parking area would be shifted to the southern end and it would be an equal amount of parking at the southern end as there presently is at the northern end. The first proposal would, I believe, in every respect meet the set back and requirements of the ordinance as well as the requirements for the distance between units and the requirements for set back from public highways and I believe in every other respect we meet the requirements of the zoning ordinance.

The second proposal is somewhat different and the second proposal would leave the park more in the situation that it can presently be found. For example, the parking that is presently at the north end would remain at the north end. In addition to that, there would be two access ways to the central roadway as presently exists. The only difference would be that instead of the area at the south end of the mobile home park being utilized as it presently — as it is on the filed map, it would be utilized for the placement of four units.

PUBLIC HEARING - continuedJoel Markowitz continues:

Now the problem that we're confronting with this proposal is that we could not because of the unusual shape of the southern end of the mobile home park meet each and every requirement in regard to set back. We would be able to retain the twenty foot distance between units and the public highway which is required by the ordinance. However, we would not be able to maintain the fifteen foot set back from the property line at the other side of the mobile home park and that would be the only respect in which we would not be able to comply with the letter of the ordinance. We would be asking if this proposal were adopted for the Town Board to relieve us from the strict compliance with that aspect of the ordinance. However, in respect of that, I would point out that there is, there still would be a minimum of five foot distance between any one of these proposed units and the adjoining property line.

I would point out that the adjoining property is the property of the Nassau County Council Boy Scouts of America and it is totally undeveloped land and is not likely to be utilized. This proposal would also have the advantage of fewer units than the first proposal and so there would be a lesser population density and in addition to that there would as I said before, be two means of access to the mobile home park although only one is required, certainly two would be preferable for the purposes of safety and access by fire vehicles, etc. Frankly, the second proposal is preferable to the applicants although it would involve fewer units because it would also involve less of a disruption of the mobile home park and less work and expense. This would be our first preference in the event that the Board does not deem this to be an appropriate proposal. I would ask that Scheme I be adopted by the Board."

Supervisor Janoski: "Do you have site plans available for the use of the Town Board?"

Joel Markowitz: "Well I presented eight copies, about approximately a week ago and I believe you have them at your disposal. May I ask if there are any questions?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay, thank you Mr. Markowitz."

Joel Markowitz: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone present who wishes to address themselves to this issue? Mr. Nohejl."

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "I'm a neighbor of this mobile home. It's been there a long time. Listening to the gentlemen speak about one access to that park would be a fire trap. The garbage men cannot turn around, get in there or even the Fire Department. As it is with the two entrances, I think it's very necessary. It should not be alleviated. I — when I came to Wading River, that mobile home park was there. Mr. Schmidt owned this prior to the present owner and I believe at that time, Mr. Schmidt wanted to enlarge it and he was told to pull back until the new owner took over. And at that time, I think there was six or seven illegal trailers put in there and I understand that he had ninety days to clear it up. Is that true?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes."

Bill Nohejl: "All right. I do not wish to place any handicap on these people where are in the trailer park at present because they are good people, they are elderly people and it is their home. I do not go for a floor trailer park extension, maybe one or two, I might agree to, but four no. And about that entrance and both entrances, I definitely say that they should stay cause the garbage man going through there, he cannot turn his big truck around to or either back into it would be very dangerous. And to put four or six more trailers onto that park area, which I believe is a very small area already. I think it would be over-burdening. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill. Is there anyone — oh Cathy."

Cathy Casey, Wading River; "I too, am a neighbor of this trailer park and I would like to ask a couple of questions before I make a personal statement. The violations that the Oak Trailer Park received, are they out of litigation whereby they can or cannot be discussed? They're out of litigation, okay. What I would like to know is from whom were they received? What were the violations and what was the result of the litigation?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Off hand, I don't remember, except to say that there were too many trailers in the park. There was a question about the motor homes, the travel trailers and beyond that I don't remember. Okay, just a minute. Cathy would you give up the floor so that Mr. Markowitz. . ."

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Joel Markowitz: "As far as the litigation is concerned, we have agreed with the Town that within ninety days and I believe of January 8th, I think that that's the date that the stipulation was fully executed. That within ninety days of that date, we would remove all units that don't appear on the file map. We did indicate to the Town Attorney that we would proceed with this application in the hope of obtaining the approval of the Town Board for the placement of additional units, but in the interim we're going to live by that stipulation."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mr. Markowitz. Cathy, you . . ."

Cathy Casey: "Well that answers part of my question, but I believe and if I'm wrong, please correct me, that the Health Department also got involved in some form or fashion which . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "They are always . . ."

Cathy Casey: Okay, but there was a violation or two issued by . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "I wouldn't be aware of that."

Cathy Casey: "Okay, all right. The number of trailers or mobile homes whatever, or pieces that he is allowed to have in there, under his current permit is twenty-four. Is that correct?"

Supervisor Janoski: "I believe so, yes."

Cathy Casey: "As a neighbor, I do not feel that enlarging this trailer park is a good idea or would be condusive to the area because of the previous trailers that were there, although in violation, because of the crowding that it caused, they had to park on the other side of Wading River-Manor Road. And frankly, it just added to a less appealing looking area. It took away from it because it was so overcrowded and it just isn't necessary for this to happen and, therefore, the area subjected to something even more less attractive and frankly the trailer park is right now. It is nothing — it's not really

taken care of. In addition to that, my own personal opinion is that this — neither this nor any other Board should consider any request for a change in permit for the Oaks Trailer park by Mr. and Mrs. Sullivan because they have already violated their permit. They are still in violation of that permit and, therefore, until they correct those violations and they do so for a probationary period for at least six months, I do not think that the time should be wasted, in my opinion to even consider them till they prove themselves to be willing shall be, say to stay within the law and therefore consider the rest of the community and the taxpayers. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mrs. Casey. Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Town Board on this matter? Hank?"

Henry Fioto, 622 Northville Turnpike, Riverhead; "I've got one minute. You know it amazes me sometimes. I ride through Riverhead and I see some of these parks that have expanded twenty units, thirty units and they just keep on going, creeping larger and larger and larger in the Town. Here's a little area the guy's trying to do something with it and he wants six, but he's willing to comply with four or something else and people are opposed to this. You know it's amazing, I've been enadvocated against zoning and all these other things over here. We have, in all the ordinances that I've conceded this Town, we have — we can build a sewer department, you can build a waste station, you can build this. But in no place — I would like to understand where they allow people to build a mobile park. There was actually no permitted use no place.

In no ordinances, I've asked this question when you people were running for office, I said show me where we have Industrial, Industrial A, Industrial B, Commercial, Commercial A, Commercial B, Business, Business A, Residential A, Residential B. But there's no place that allows anybody, anybody to build a mobile home or mobile home park. There is no wheres allowed in any one of these ordinances any place that we have and if I'm wrong, I'd like to have the Building Department or Town Board tell me. I can't see where we have less anything. So what we have here now is if somebody has a lot of money can turn around according to what I understand the ordinance is, he can increase the size of his park 50% over what he has. That is if he has one hundred units, he can improve to one hundred fifty. And if he gets to one hundred fifty, he can add seventy-five more. This guy's asking for 50%. From what I understand, basically is the overall thing. Maybe I'm wrong."

Supervisor Jnaoski: "Thank you Hank.

And apparently they were there illegally, having it put there very shortly after we enacted here in the Town of Riverhead, our zoning ordinance. And the Town Fathers for whatever reason, and I still fail to see what the reasons are, said prove the part, and they said you can have it there, but it's going to be non-transferable, in case you die, in case you want to sell the property and it has to be occupied by members of your family. I think it's just present owners family — well present owners family have either died or moved away, divorced and whatever and we're left with three mobile homes and nothing to do with them except rent them illegally which is what's been going on for quite some time. That basically states the position of my client.

We just want to remove conditions two or three. We, I think you can see from the application and the survey that was submitted in compliance with the Board of Health or there was

compliance with the Board of Health when they were installed. They're not in really violation of anything at this point other than those two conditions. It was just like them, removed."

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead believes it to be in the best interest to establish a Bicycle Ordinance in the Town of Riverhead, and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on the 4th day of August, 1981, wherein all those wishing to be heard were heard,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town of Riverhead hereby adopts the following Bicycle Ordinance wherein said ordinance shall be added to the Riverhead Town Code.

BICYCLE ORDINANCE

Pursuant to the authority of §180 of the Municipal Law, the Town of Riverhead hereby adopts the following Bicycle Ordinance:

RESOLUTIONS - continuedDefinitions.

A. For the purpose of this ordinance, the terms used herein are defined as follows:

BICYCLE: Every device propelled by the feet acting upon pedals, having wheels any one of which are more than twenty inches in diameter.

DOWNTOWN AREA: The downtown area shall encompass the area bounded by the following streets and shall include the sidewalks apurtenant thereto: Beginning at the corner of Griffing Avenue and West Main Street, east on West Main Street to the corner of Peconic Avenue and West Main Street; thence south on Peconic Avenue to the Town line; thence east along the Town line to the intersection of McDermott Avenue and the Town line; thence north on McDermott Avenue to the intersection of McDermott Avenue and East Main Street; thence east on East Main Street to the intersection of East Main Street and Ostrander Avenue; thence north on Ostrander Avenue to the intersection of Ostrander Avenue and Second Street; thence west on Second Street to the intersection of Griffing Avenue and Second Street; thence south on Griffing Avenue to the point or place of beginning. The downtown area shall also include the following designated portion of West Main Street, beginning at the intersection of Griffing Avenue and West Main Street, west on West Main Street to the intersection of Osborne Avenue and West Main Street.

OPERATOR: Any person who operates a bicycle on any public highway or sidewalk.

SIDEWALK: That portion of a street between the curb lines, or the lateral lines of a roadway, and the adjacent property lines, intended for the use of pedestrians.

B. In addition to the above definitions, any applicable definitions of the Traffic Ordinance and the Vehicle and Traffic Law shall be deemed to be included herein.

Rules for riding and operating.

Every rider and operator shall comply with the following rules and regulations:

A. Riding abreast. When two or more persons in a group are operating bicycles on a roadway, they shall ride single file.

RESOLUTIONS - continued

B. Extra passenger. No person operating a bicycle shall carry another person except upon a seat specifically provided for such passenger.

C. Emerging from alleys, driveways, and garages. The operator of a bicycle emerging from an alley, driveway, garage, or private sidewalk shall stop the bicycle immediately prior to driving onto or across a public sidewalk, or onto or across a public sidewalk line projected across an alley and shall exercise extreme care in making such movements.

D. Clinging to vehicles. No person operating a bicycle shall cling or attach himself, or the bicycle, to any other moving vehicle.

E. Intoxication. No person shall operate a bicycle while in an intoxicated condition.

F. Drugs. No person shall operate a bicycle while his ability to operate such a bicycle is impaired by the use of a drug as defined in the Vehicle and Traffic Law, Section 1792.4.

G. Lights. No bicycle shall be operated within the period from sunset to sunrise without having a properly lighted headlight attached to the front of the bicycle, visible under normal atmospheric conditions from the front thereof a distance of not less than three hundred (300) feet, nor without having a red light or a reflector attached to the rear of the bicycle, which is clearly visible in the headlight beam of a motor vehicle for a distance of not less than two (200) feet to the rear of the bicycle.

H. Mechanical condition. No person shall operate a bicycle which is not in such mechanical condition so that it can be safely operated.

I. Any person operating a bicycle shall refrain from any trick riding and shall operate said bicycle at least one hand on the handlebars.

J. Every person operating a bicycle shall obey all stop signs and traffic control signals, and comply with all traffic regulations of the Town.

K. Sidewalks Restricted. No person shall operate, park, abandon, or keep motionless a bicycle on any sidewalk within the downtown area as hereinabove described. However, the walking of bicycles in an orderly manner on such sidewalks and the parking of bicycles in an upright position on the sidewalks at curbside parallel to the road shall be permitted.

RESOLUTIONS - continued

L. Speed. No person shall operate a bicycle at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions and having regard to the actual and potential hazards then existing.

M. Traffic regulations. Every person operating a bicycle shall strictly observe all traffic signs and signals and all other traffic rules and regulations applicable thereto, and shall obey the orders and directions of every office of the Town authorized to direct or regulate traffic.

Bicycle without a serial number.

It shall be a violation for any person to possess or any dealer in bicycles operating in the Town, to purchase, receive in trade or otherwise acquire any bicycle from which the serial number on the frame has been removed, destroyed, mutilated, or altered, without first reporting the same to the Riverhead Police.

Authority to impound bicycles.

A. When any bicycle is operated, parked, abandoned, or kept motionless on any sidewalk within the downtown area, not in accordance with Section K hereinabove described, said bicycle may be removed by the Riverhead Town Police.

B. When any bicycle is found unattended on any public highway in the Town of Riverhead where such bicycle constitutes an obstruction of traffic, such bicycle may be removed by the Riverhead Town Police.

C. When any bicycle is parked or abandoned within the Town of Riverhead where parking, stopping or standing is prohibited or said bicycle is parked upon private property without the consent of the owner of such property, such bicycle may be removed by the Riverhead Town Police.

D. Any bicycle operated or possessed in violation of this ordinance may be removed by the Riverhead Town Police.

Procedure, storage, and charges.

Prior to releasing any bicycle removed by the Riverhead Town Police under the authority of the preceding sections, the alleged owner of the bicycle shall execute a sworn affidavit, under penalty or perjury, describing the bicycle and alleging ownership of the bicycle by the affiant. Such sworn statements shall be a record kept and maintained by the Riverhead Police Department.

The owner of the impounded bicycle shall also be required to pay an impound charge for the removal and a storage fee for every day after removed, such fee to be paid to the desk sergeant before release of the bicycle. Such charges and fees shall be determined annually by the Town Board.

An impound form shall be used by the Police for each removal.

Disposition of unclaimed bicycles.

The disposition of unclaimed bicycles shall be governed by Article 7-B of the Personal Property Law.

Enforcement.

The Riverhead Police Department shall enforce the provisions of this ordinance by the issuance of a summons returnable in the Riverhead Justice Court.

Marking of Prohibited Areas.

The Superintendent of Highways is directed to mark the corner curbs/sidewalk areas in the downtown area stating, "Bicycles Prohibited".

Penalty.

A violation of this Bicycle Ordinance shall be punishable by imprisonment of up to 15 days and/or a fine of up to \$250.00.
