Supervisor Janoski: "Under unfinished business, we have a special permit application for general aviation airport from Riverhead Airpark. The Town Board is awaiting amendments to the Environmental Impactment Statement.

I would recognize anyone who wishes to be heard at this time? Mr. Nohejl."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "In reference to the bids, I noticed there was only one by Herb Obser Motors, it's a shame we can't get Chevrolet or Ford or some other outfit to make a bid, even Dodge. I know we like to keep the business in Riverhead."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes."

Bill Nohejl: "But in my estimation, I don't believe that the — certain model cars are appropriate for the Police Department. I was wondering if it would be feasible to put the bid out to other dealers."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Bill, the Town Board has not made a decision on this particular bid. I can assume you that everytime we got out to bid for vehicles, the purchasing agent sends a copy of the bid ad to all the dealers in the area so that they are aware that the bid is coming up, so that they have a fair chance on bidding on these vehicles. And in the past, we have bought a lot of police vehicles. In fact, to my knowledge since I've been on the Board, all the police vehicles have been purchased locally. Two of these bid specifications, unfortunately, the 1982 model line has expired. The plant — the Chrysler Corporation has stopped making the cars, so the Town Board has not made a decision on it."

Bill Nohejl: "Well I mean, I'm hoping you don't make a decision in that direction. Also —"

Supervisor Janoski: "Bill, if I could just add to that. Just to clarify what's happened, the Town Board went out to bid because we had heard that 1982 police vehicles were still available. They are not usually available at this time of year. There are Plymouths and Dodges available. They, however, are police vehicles but do not meet the specifications submitted by the Town of Riverhead."

Bill Nohejl: "Because I thought that the \$11,000 was quite a high price."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedSupervisor Janoski: "That's for a Volvo."

Bill Nohejl: "All right now one other thing on correspondence, Paul Marquardt repair of Michael's Lane in Wading River, I'm very familiar with that road and it's in a development that's not taken over by the Town yet — the roads. So it's one of the roads that we discussed in Wading River, a development. Do you know what I'm talking about? So that's where Michael's Lane is and I hope that no improvements by the Town be put in there until the builder completes his obligations under the barn. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill. Is there anyone else present who wishes to be recognized at this time? Let us proceed with the resolutions. Oh, I'm sorry Mr. Nohejl, I didn't see you had your hand up."

William Kasperovich: "My name is Kasperovich."

Supervisor Janoski: "What did I call him?"

Voices from the Town Board and Town Clerk: "Nohejl."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich: "That entitles me to an extra minute."

Supervisor Janoski: "Absolutely."

William Kasperovich: "I came here tonight — my name is William Kasperovich, I live on 15th Street in Wading River. I'm always available for any political discussion. I came here tonight to talk about drinking water, but I grabbed on to two or three other items that need some comment. Drinking water, after I read in the papers that a half a million dollars was put aside to study the flow of water from recharge basins in the county. I thought boy, we're not knocking on doors hard enough to get our share of money. Because we here in Wading River still have not had a water study. We were omitted when the Scavenger Waste Study was made. When they included us in the east portion of the Brookhaven Study, that's been laying dormant on the shelves since about last

October and we just have to knock harder to get the amount of money required — that is required for a water study. Granted it is not a disasterous need but certainly an urgent need. And every time I go to the faucet for a drink of water, I think of you five gentlemen and I plead with you to knock on some doors to get some money to get something done, cause it's an expensive kind of thing.

Now, the second item, I think should be brought before the others. In your resolution 354 establishing a Deputy Superintendent of Highways. I may have misread the books of requirements, but it seems to me an elected official has to be replaced within five days and certainly we need a head man, not a number two man. Painting the posts of the meters, for the meters it might be nice but damn it to hell, I've been riding around for two weeks looking for the lines at the stop signs and some of them are absolutely not there and some of them could hardly be seen and I don't see anybody attending to it. We need a number one man there. Frank did us a good job in his stay, unfortunately, we lost him in an most inopportune time to the Lord calling him, but still it's the need for a number one man there. And I think that he should be replaced for a period of time until you go through the legal replacement. And that's my opinion on that score. And I point one item of need which is a number one man would pay attention to, not the other people."

Supervisor Janoski: "Bill, if I might have some of your time to explain that where in the case, where a Highway Superintendent of the Town of Riverhead were removed from office for having committed something in the way of a crime, then the law provides that he be replaced in a specific number of days. It may be five, I don't remember that. Let me just say that the Highway Department has started the repainting and the striping and the road markings. With the heavy rain that we've experienced in the last couple of weeks, we're involved in other things which we feel have a higher priority than the repainting of the stripes on roads. Once those things are attended to . . ."

William Kasperovich: " — Mr. Supervisor, I specifically point out the lines at the stop signs, not the separating lines, not the middle of the road lines — the cross lines at the stop lines which are important legal markings and regardless of what time of the year it is, winter or summer, they have to be . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes Bill, but . . ."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

William Kasperovich: "In such condition that they are noticeable by the driver because of legal problems."

Supervisor Janoski: "Bill I understand what you're saying, but I want you to understand what I'm saying. We have a set of priorities and the flooding problems in the Town are more important from our point of view than putting stop lines on the street. Once that is tended to, once we have dealt with the drainage problem of the Town, the Highway Department will once again return to it's normal spring and summer work which is the painting of those stripes of which you speak."

William Kasperovich: "All right, thank you. I have not overlooked priorities in the Highway Department. Having some knowledge of municipal works, as a professional engineer, I'm well aware of needs and priorities of needs.

If I may continue, I'm still looking to see which was thrown in with the Scavenger Waste System a cesspool district. I've been noticing and trying to pay attention when this thing will come to life. I'm not going to ask for an answer now, in order not to consume time, but I think it's not a demanding nature, but it is a need in the western part of the township."

Supervisor Janoski: "The cesspool district is in existence Bill, it includes all the Town of Riverhead except that area which is in the sewer district. At the present time, we are in the process of working towards the construction of a Scavenger Waste Treatment Plant which is as you well know, treats the waste from cesspools. The basic work has been done for this to go on line. The only thing that we're waiting for now is for the federal government to in fact officially fund the project."

William Kasperovich: "Now the district I refer to is outside the Riverhead Sewer District and that would have some control over the domestic cesspools and basins in that sense not the scavenger waste project itself, but that which was attached to the scavenger project."

Supervisor Janoski: "It was attached."

William Kasperovich: "To cover the cesspools that exist."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES -- continued

Supervisor Janoski: "It's a legal kind of a question and I think maybe you're confusing two different things. One, we could not extract and that's a good word extract any revenue from any citizen of the Town of Riverhead who was in fact in the sewer district and paying that tax. So that every area of the Town of Riverhead which is outside the Sewer District is in the Scavenger Waste District which will when they utilize the Scavenger Waste Plant, will at that particular time through the charge on the gallon of the Scavenger Waste contribute to the operation and maintenance of that system separate from the Sewer District. That's the way it is."

William Kasperovich: "I'm aware of this. I'm aware of this. I'm well aware of this. I may not pursue this further because we're on a particular difference of thought within the Scavenger District."

Supervisor Janoski: "You're on your extra minute now Bill."

William Kasperovich: "All right. I felt it necessary since I became aware of the criteria and the needs of our Police Station and our Court and our Justices offices that when I read your article written by — in the Suffolk Life, the need for a new Police Headquarters. I think once again, we're going to the wrong end of the horse, the right end of the horse is the man in the patrol car, that is out protecting the life and limb of the residents of this township. He's not in an office where it's convenient for him or more pleasant or more amiable. The criteria that was established to put that headquarters where it was at, hasn't changed that much today. The criteria to establish this courtroom and the offices for the Judges and their clerks and the prisoners to be out of sight in the back and the rear door so that we wouldn't have to have handcuffed people come through the door, was all considered. It is my contention this might be — come to a head in three to five years so it's not that far away. But right now I think it's not the time to spend money in this direction. If we have any money we can reach for, we should put it out on the road where our police protection brings the man close to our home. We don't need fancy officers to get good police protection and this article that refers to two alternatives. I see there's a third alternative and that is right now do not move because there are a lot of expenses and a lot of costs that go along with a physical change of location that is above and beyond the building itself and I suspect by dwelling into sixty to eighty per cent of the cost of the shell of the structure and with that, I'll stop."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mr. Kasperovich. Would anyone else like to be recognized at this time? Then let us move onto the resolutions. Let us not move on."

Marie Hoff, Wildwood Hills; "I'd like to commend the Board for the manner in which they have approached the subject of investigating the problems the Town encounters because of juvenile activity that's inappropriate. The other reasoning, I heard Mr. Boschetti, Mr. Scheiner, conduct some matters with the School Board and I have to say to you that I believe the manner in which you're going about this and the place you're putting the emphasis is the way to get at the root cause of these things and probably bring some of the real things to light so that you can do something about it. You won't get answers immediately, but I think the approach was appropriate and I'd like to thank you for doing it that way.

Also, last year I mentioned that on Hulse Landing Road in our area, we had a lot of vandalism and the cast metal signs that are part of our community and identify it, four of them had been removed from the pillars. We are replacing them and we also want to thank the Highway Department for replacing the sign we requested. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Does anyone else wish to address the Town Board? Yes Sir."

Birdsey Youngs, Wading River; "I won't take up much of your time. I realize the Police are very busy, but I've noticed recently in our shopping center and I wonder if it isn't happening throughout the Town that every evening when you go in to pick something up from the Drug Store or the Deli that not only all the parking spaces close to the Deli are taken, but that also there are usually two cars or trucks or whatever parked on both sides of the entrance exit road to the shopping center while there are many many empty parking spaces throughout the whole parking lot. And when you pull up, as a joke in between these two cars and stop, they're quick — they're sitting in their cars quite often, they're quick to tell you, you can't park there that's a roadway. But it never occurs to them that they're also breaking the law. Maybe is someone from the Police Department happened to be wondering through Wading River they could get these peoples attention and let them know that they are breaking the law."

Supervisor Janoski: "We're at the present time looking at the parking problems that we have in shopping centers. Most specifically with the fire zones, but that what you speak is

also a problem and certainly we'll take a look at that."

Birdsey Youngs: "Yes it's bad enough that the Fire Zone is parked in. But when the access is partially blocked off so that makes it even worse for any fire or emergency vehicles to be able to get there."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you."

Birdsey Youngs: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Town Board? We have three minutes. Let's pass a resolution."

No one else wished to be heard at this time.

#330 AUTHORIZES TOWN CLERK TO PUBLISH LEGAL NOTICE

Councilman Boschetti offered the following resolution which was seconded by Councilman Artale.

WHEREAS, the Town of Riverhead has appropriated Federal funds for the acquisition and rehabilitation of the Vail-Leavitt Music Hall, and

WHEREAS, the Vail-Leavitt Building is within the 100 year flood plain, and

WHEREAS, according to Executive Order 11988, the expenditure of Federal funds within the flood plan requires notice of such action,

THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead authorize the Town Clerk to publish the following legal notice in the June 17, 1982 editions of both the News Review and the Traveler-Watchman.

LEGAL NOTICE

The Town of Riverhead has appropriated \$40,000.00 of Federal funds for use by the Council for the Vail-Leavitt Music Hall, Inc. to acquire the Vail-Leavitt building, Peconic Avenue, Riverhead, New York. The purpose of the project is to restore the Vail-Leavitt Building to its original condition and use. The Vail-Leavitt Building has been found to be eligible for the National Register of Historic Places.

RESOLUTIONS - continued

The project site has been determined to be within the boundaries of the flood plain as evidenced by the HUD National Flood Insurance Program Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM).

Alternatives to the subject activity include:

- (i) carrying out the proposed action at a location outside the flood plain;
- (ii) other means which accomplish the same purpose as the proposed action; and
- (iii) no action.

With respect to this particular activity, there exists no practical alternative (another building or site) which has equal social and historic value as the project site; that is, the rehabilitation of a significant historic site within the commercial business district of the Town of Riverhead. The alternative of no action would allow the market place to decide the fate of the identified historic site and would not serve to insure the preservation of the building's historic integrity.

The project activity is considered to be a rehabilitation of an existing structure and cannot be considered a new development. There is no open space near the project site, so no new development is expected. The design of the rehabilitation to take place on the Vail-Leavitt building will incorporate methods to minimize affects of flooding regarding natural moderation of floods, water quality, and groundwater recharge.

A second notice respecting this action will follow which will evaluate alternatives to the proposed project, identify the impacts of the proposed action, and describe ways in which the proposed action could be modified in order to minimize, restore and preserve the flood plain.

Jessie Tomlinson: "And is this going to be a permanent thing, or will this then end as of the first of the year when a new Highway Superintendent will hopefully be elected?"

Supervisor Janoski: "That would be up to the discretion of the elected Highway Superintendent."

Jessie Tomlinson: "And at the present time, there are four or five foremen at the Highway Department, is that correct? Is there really a need then for another person? Or are they not able to do the job or are you going to appoint somebody in this position and ignore the Highway Superintendent? I mean, I think we should have a little explanation because this has never happened before, to my knowledge."

Supervisor Janoski: "Well the — there are four foremen in the Highway Department. And it is the feeling of the Town Board that someone must be in charge and the Deputy Superintendent of Highway has the authority under law to assume the full power and authority of the Highway Superintendent in his absence. The Town Board has an obligation to fill the position of Superintendent of Highways which the Town Board at the present time is attempting to do. But in the meantime, we felt that it is not proper that the Highway Department go without an individual who is definitely and by law in charge."

Jessie Tomlinson: "So then you will appoint somebody as the Deputy, is that correct, in the near future?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes."

Jessie Tomlinson: "And then you will probably appoint somebody as the Highway Superintendent in the near future?"

Supervisor Janoski: "That is our obligation under law."

Jessie Tomlinson: "I see. Well the Deputy in most cases would be someone who was familiar with the operation. Is there somebody at the Highway Department then that's being considered at this time?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedSupervisor Janoski: "Yes."

Jessie Tomlinson: "In other words, it's not going to be somebody that comes from the Assessors office? Assessors as an example."

Supervisor Janoski: "No."

Jessie Tomlinson: "No. I see. The Highway Superintendent makes what twenty-two or twenty-four thousand dollars."

Supervisor Janoski: "I believe twenty-four thousand dollars."

Jessie Tomlinson: "So then the Deputy would have to make in the range of probably \$20,000, right?"

Supervisor Janoski: "We have not set a salary for that position."

Jessie Tomlinson: "Okay, well whatever it is, whether it be eighteen or sixteen or what, is the money in the budget for a position like that?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Well obviously, Jessie, it is not."

Jessie Tomlinson: "Oh, I see."

Supervisor Janoski: "And that would have to be taken care of. The money is existing in the budget, but not in the budget line for a Deputy Highway Superintendent because it never existed before."

Jessie Tomlinson: "I understand that, that's why I . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Then why are you asking the question?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Jessie Tomlinson: "Well that's why I would like to know where the money will come from then."

Supervisor Janoski: "Jessie, you sat up here. You know how things like that are dealt with."

Jessie Tomlinson: "We never appointed a Deputy while I was there, Mr. Janoski."

Supervisor Janoski: "You know how to transfer funds?"

Jessie Tomlinson: "You didn't live here at the time."

Supervisor Janoski: "Did you know how to transfer?"

Jessie Tomlinson: "Yeah, I knew how to transfer funds."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you."

Jessie Tomlinson: "But you didn't live here at the time. But we did not appoint a Deputy when I was there."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Jessie, excuse me one minute. I have to cut you off because you're getting way way off the track. Also when you were on the Town Board, you didn't have your Highway Superintendent pass away. I think the Town Board is acting in a very very responsible manner in which the people of the Town want us to respond to. We're not making anything political here. We're following a logical order — a promotion from within the Highway Department to lead to a logical conclusion. We're doing everything according to law. And it's up to the people in November to elect a new Highway Superintendent. It's not up to this Town Board."

Jessie Tomlinson: "I was not suggesting . . ."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay, okay. . ."

Jessie Tomlinson: "What you were doing was illegal. I was just asking why."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Jessie I would say that you're asking questions that you know the answer to already and I really kind of resent this weekly thing or bi-weekly . . ."

Jessie Tomlinson: "Oh really."

Supervisor Janoski: "You know quite honestly, we are doing and acting very responsibly and we will continue to do so under your scrutiny, I'm sure."


Jessie Tomlinson: "Well it's a pleasure to be here and see you every other week, Supervisor."
