Supervisor Janoski: "Under unfinished business, we have the application of Riverhead Airpark which is still waiting approval of the Environmental Impact Statement.

Riverhead Flagg Corp, change of zone and special permit for condominiums. We have the Environmental Impact Statement and will move to approve or disapprove in the very near future.

From Ngen Ock Lee special permit for type 6 labor camp on Main Road, Calverton, that is before the Planning Board.

Marine Technical Service, site plan for premises on Main Road, in Jamesport is the subject of a resolution this evening, approving it.

I would, at this time, recognize anyone who wishes to be heard?"

"Gentlemen, Frank Farina, Hubbard Avenue, Riverhead. I have two items that I would like to discuss with the Town Board tonight. The first is crime along Main Street. I'm pleased the Town Board is trying to resolve the problems along our business district. But what about our homes? Tonight, I bring to the attention of the Town Board another area, food for the sake of argument, I'll call it 'Thieves Highway', or the Long Island Railroad, as it is known. Over the past six to eight months, I've had to call the Riverhead Police on three different occasions. Twice for vandalism, once for burglary. Mr. Joe Celic, Mr. Prusinowski's grandfather has had the police at his house twice. The trailer park on Hubbard Avenue has had it's share of burglaries and so has Mr. Ray Hubbard. These are only the instances I personally know of. How many additional ones, only the police blotter can tell. A simple deduction can lead to one possible cause, 'thieves highway'.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedFrank Farina continues:

The pedestrian traffic on the railroad is similar to Main Street on a busy Saturday afternoon. Easy access to many backyards because there's no lighting like on Hubbard Avenue. It's desolation is an open invitation. I have contacted the Long Island Railroad police to find that it is not public domain, but private property. I believe that this law should be enforced to protect the property or maybe some day a life. I'm hoping, you, the members of the Town Board, look into this situation and enforce a no trespassing law to protect your citizens rights.

The second item that I have tonight is, well I was told if I said this, it might possible be financial suicide. But I'm going to say it anyway. It's the appointment of Commander Roth and Mr. Loughlin, both of which are well-qualified men, to assume the duties for which they were chosen. The disappointment I find is in the lack of communciation with the Democratic Party. Mr. Roth was an independent trying to be coaxed by the Democratic Party, but registered Republican. Switched Democrat — I'm sorry, Mr. Loughlin, a former Republican, switched Democrat and back to Republican leads me to believe that the Democratic leadership has lost fine men. I agree with Mr. Dave Wilmott's article a few weeks back stating that the Democratic Party leads a lot to be desired in leadership. There has been a lot of talk about Mr. Reyer's ability as Republican Town leader. I think his ability is superior as a leader, unfortunately, I see no competition coming from the Democratic side. Good government is based on a two-party system. The only way, the American way.

In closing, and with a little levity I was wondering if Mr. Reyer might like to take a vacation and help the Democratic Party for a year or two. Gentlemen, thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Would anyone else wish to be heard at this time? Bill I am — Bill Nohejl, I'm not going to open the meeting again, so if you have anything to throw in here, now is the time to do it. Bill Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich, 15th Street, Wading River; "I would like to pass this by, but I think you have to recognize a point in time. When there was an article in the Suffolk Life on the back page some where, some weeks back, about the Police Department being housed in new facilities, I got up here and talked about it. Today that has grown to a front page article which I assume you people have read or has been brought to your attention and it's some how has the earmarks of somebody's trying to sell the public or get the sympathy of the public to do this. Now when it approaches the million

dollar expenditure they talk about \$750,000, but I think they're just trying to get a round figure. The premise in my attitude is that whenever you spend a large sum of money, for whatever it may be, that some minuscule part is to the good and the benefit of the people in the Township. I don't care how small a piece, but directly to their benefit.

Now our men in blue got their raise in pay, got their fringe benefits, they happen to be in tight quarters right now, so what. They earn their pay out in the community. They earn their pay out in the patrol car. And I think you've given them good equipment and good maintenance on these vehicles. No, we have a piece of ground in the back and it seems like a natural way to turn. But there are no arguments that are different to move into their present location. And I contend that the community at this particular point in time, will not profit by their moving in the backyard of Town Hall. I think that we should take the time now to upgrade the department in itself. We should upgrade the function of the departments. We have the men, we have to live with the men that we have. I say we should make better use of them in the community, not in their comfort in a new built building. It's for comfort to people that are not out in the community. The administrative — the file clerks, the justices, what have you. I say the prime and first person to be concerned with is the residents of the Township. And if there is no — no matter how small a part that goes to their benefit, that we should take a very hard look at the expenditure. Because the people that live here should come first and foremost. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill. Is there anyone else that wishes to be heard at this time? Yes Sir."

Antonio DeGrasse, 8 Legend Lane, Riverhead; "I didn't get a chance to get warmed up yet. I just walked in and I heard that gentleman speaking, and I have to discuss something in the same vein that concerns the Police Department. I certainly appreciate his comments relative to the community. It should come first and that the police officers should be out in the community and I assume that's what he's talking about. Am I right, the Police Department? The new building? I want to make sure someone's awake. There are two people that I admire. I read a lot, Shakespeare and Machiavelli. One deals with tragedy and the other one deals with, I guess being clever or politics or whatever. So I thought I would start out with a quote. 'We are gathered here today to bury Office Donald Green, not to praise him.' Now it's been brought to my attention, and I could be wrong that there is a Sergeants list, it's been around for a long time and that Donald Green and another officer, actually three are on the list. I believe Donald is second.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedAntonio DeGrasse continues:

There's another officer who's first. And for a year now, I've been sort of just asking quietly what was going to happen in terms of making a decision and I found out that it's not without precedent and I believe it was Sergeant Seaman who was a neighbor of mine, Peconic Bay Blvd. was appointed Sergeant based on experience even though the person in front of him had a higher grade, it was a few points. So, therefore, the precedent has indeed been set and I didn't check into if this had occurred prior to that time, but it has been set. So, did a little checking on Officer Green who I'm concerned about because I've had contact with him, needless to say, during the year that he's been on the Police Department for almost ten years now, it was nine years in May, and he has over ninety credits from Hofstra University in Business Administration.

I know he's well liked by his men because they told me that many times. He is respected in the community and unique. He lives in the community which I believe in and he's got excellent performance ratings. Therefore, I was somewhat puzzled as to why a decision wasn't made. So I check a little further and was able to determine that there was a training Sergeant that was put with the unit and that actually now what hired seven more men and there may be four more which is eleven. The training Sergeant, I understand some people think he should be back. I know that from the process that the Chief can only recommend — Chief Palmer, I know that Captain Grattan also would make a recommendation but the buck stops right here. You're the ones that'll have to make a determination. And I sort of feel that on the basis of — in fact, my name is Antonio, and I feel like Mark Antony. Rather than I stand around when I say we are gathered here to bury Officer Green, I would rather say, now that we are gathered here today to praise Officer Green, not to bury him.

And I thought that I would close by indicating that as Mary Antony said as honorable men that if this is the group that makes the decision that you will do what is correct. Machiavelli once indicated other than his political things that it is most certainly a great thing to consider how blind men are to things in which they sit and watch our persecutors, they are of the vices they do not have. I could bring up things in Green or Latin if we were given instances at home and recent were not enough and what I'm saying gentlemen, is I hope that at the time that you make the decision that you do make the decision on the basis of merit.

In fact, the President of the United States, the current President of the United States advocates that people work hard that we have thrift and people do everything they can, make it, based on merit and in this particular case with Officer Donald Green there isn't, at this point anyway one shred of evidence that he doesn't deserve serious consideration, and in fact, that you should follow the precedent that has been set, that the man with the most seniority and impeccable credentials get the appointment. Now my question and I'm finished . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "I'm afraid we're not going to have time for too much more . . ."

Antonio DeGrasse: "I have no more, but my question is, is it being considered and what is your intention? Are you aware of what I'm talking about?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Absolutely. I understand that — that the correct thing to do is to create a new Sergeant for the position and to appoint Donald Green to that position in your opinion."

Antonio DeGrasse: "No, not just my opinion. I'm saving the rest for later — next time, okay. Yes."

Supervisor Janoski: "The Town Board has at the present time decided against the creation of a new Sergeant's position and we do have a Sergeant in charge of that squad who you correctly point out is the training Sergeant. Our belief is that each squad Sergeant should be responsible for the training of his individual squad. We hear some pros and we hear some cons. But mostly we hear pros as far as that system goes."

Antonio DeGrasse: "Okay. Well there was one last thing. I saw pictures of some of you walking . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Tony, I have to cut you off. I have a public hearing at 9 — 8:45 and you've reached your . . ."

Antonio DeGrasse: "I hope that when you make the move, you make the correct one. I'll be back."

Supervisor Janoski: "In your opinion."

Antonio DeGrasse: "In the people's opinion. Believe me, you'll know at the polls."

Supervisor Janoski: "I got to leave that one alone. The hour of 7:45 has arrived. The Town Clerk will please read a notice of public hearing."

Supervisor Janoski recessed the meeting to hold the public hearing.
