Supervisor Janoski: "Under unfinished business, we have a special permit application from J. & W. Stark for expansion of their mobile home park and that is before the Planning Board.

A special permit application of Alan Cardinale for a gasoline Station in Jamesport is addressed in resolution #178 this evening.

The special permit application of Halandia Associates for a multiple housing on Doctors Path is still awaiting Town Board action.

We have five minutes before the first public hearing. I would open the meeting to anyone who wishes to be heard on any subject."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "In reference to the New York State Mental Retardation advising of the potential community site in Wading River, could I have further information on that?"

Supervisor Janoski: "The New York State Office of Mental Retardation has informed us that they would like to place in Little Flower housing for retarded children. They are proposing two sites. One, on the Little Flower Property itself which is to house, I believe, ten, I don't recall the number and then right across the street from the entrance to Wading River, er Little Flower. They own that house, that little structure and they'd like to use that also as housing. They point out that the residents would be children who are non-ambulatory which means they can't move around on their own. And that's what the proposition is."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Bill Nohejl: "Do you have the letter there Irene? Could I read it? May I have it?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Here."

Bill Nohejl: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mary Beth?"

Mary Beth Andresen, Church Lane, Aquebogue; "You know I came here this evening and I was expecting to see something under resolutions that would er brighten my week. Once again, we're coming to another meeting and nothing has been done on the proposed amendment that was taking place a month ago. One of the amendments made it to resolutions this evening, referring to #155, agricultural production. The other one, obviously is still being shelved. You know I'm a little bit concerned. As we brought it up that night and I guess there's no need to re-hash it. Most of the people are well aware of how the people in this Town feel. I think what's happening is the people in this Town are losing faith in the Councilmen. We came through with 670 signatures that evening in a very short period of time to show you how the people in this Town felt towards the proposed amendment. We demanded that night a vote be taken. According to Mr. Duffy, that couldn't be done at that time. We were hoping that something would take place in the near future.

Now I guess I have to keep looking in the newspaper and coming to Town Board Meetings instead of sitting home, or bugging you when we go out for cocktails and go out to dancing, which I really don't want to do because I don't think that's the place for my harrassment. I really hope that there were a couple of people that were going to be here this evening and assumed not showed up, but are very very interested in finding some sort of an answer and having it shelved under the premise that it won't come up under this administration or what have you, is not really the answer they're looking for."

Councilman Lombardi: "Mary Beth you got a minute, two minutes. If we start voting on every public hearing, we're going to have to start a precedent of voting on every one of them and this here right now is dead. The resolution you're talking about the public hearing, so why should we vote on it. You brought in your petitions, and the Board just let it die. It's not saying that it never will come up again, in a different way, but you want us to kill it all together. Myself, I cannot see bringing this up and voting on it and everything that comes up at a public hearing that we have to vote on it immediately like you want."

Councilman Lombardi continues:  
Myself, I will not vote on it immediately."

Mary Beth Andresen: "The only other thing I would like to bring up is obviously the time, I'm hurrying, I'll hurry. I'll go fast. Obviously the time that it takes up to bring up amendments, every three years or every two years or every three months, takes time, takes money. Takes a lot of hard work by a lot of people. Maybe people in this Town don't want to see the money brought up again."

Councilman Lombardi: "Mary Beth, these resolutions or public hearings that we've been bringing up has been brought up by the revised committee of going through the Town Code. I got involved in this because what was good twenty years ago is not good today. It was like the sheds. People had to come in, pay seventy-five dollars for a survey, fifty dollars to go in front of the Zoning Board, fifteen dollars for a permit and I thought it was ridiculous. So I got involved with the Code Review Board and this is what we're going to do.

Now on this code that we brought up, if the people don't want it we're looking at it. And the Town Board is looking at it. But if you want us to vote on every public hearing, it's going to be pretty hard and because we're going to have to be voting on everyone that comes up and they're going to be quite a few being brought up."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mary Beth, you can come back later. You want to say something?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Mary Beth sit down one second. This Town Board can vote this thing tonight. I'm sure it would go down no problem. Unfortunately the way the democracy works a new Town Board would be elected in January. That Town Board has the privilege of bringing this up again. That Town Board votes it down again. Next Town Board can bring it up again. That's the way it works."

Mary Beth Andresen: "I realize that."

Councilman Prusinowski: "As long as you understand."

Mary Beth Andresen: "I understand that. But I think that's what the people said that night."

Councilman Prusinowski: "They just don't know what our position was."

Mary Beth Andresen: "We realize that it could be shelved for this administration and we realize that three days after the new administration took place regardless if it's the same group that's sitting here tonight, somebody else could bring it up again. That's right. But I think they just wanted you guys to show faith in that. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mary Beth. Let the record show that the hour of 7:47 p.m. has arrived."

Supervisor Janoski recessed the meeting to hold a public hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:45 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday, April 7, 1981 to hear all interested persons concerning the request made by Cablevision for a rate increase of \$.30.

The affidavits were ordered to be placed on file.

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone present representing Cablevision? Mr. Tuthill."

Richard Tuthill, Representative of Cablevision; "I have also brought along a couple of people I'd like to introduce tonight and one is the General Manager, Joy Askins, she's out in the audience. She's officially the General Manager. I'm only taking care of this tonight because I'm more familiar with it than she is and the other person is from our corporate headquarters, his name is Gary Golding. So they'll both, along with myself, be glad to answer any questions when we're done.

Long Island Cablevision Corporation respectfully requests new rates for Cable television Service within the Town of Riverhead as follows. Service for residential first outlet \$8.15 per month. Long Island Cablevision respectfully requests that the deletion of Sections 13 in the franchise which refers to the underground cablevision of Main Street downtown Riverhead. It has been two years and nine months since our last rate increase and as you are well aware the cost of doing business has increased greatly in that time. We are asking for a thirty cent increase in our basic rate which equates to only a 45% increase in two and

a half years, far below the rising prices around us. In the past two years, we've continually strive to improve our service and to look at new areas for expansion.

We have recently replaced all our head in equipment with Modern State of the Art of Electronics and the new equipment is much more stable and benefits subscribers with less interruptions of service. We have added personnel to answer our telephones from eight in the morning till twelve at midnight, seven days a week. We realize our subscribers have a problem getting through to us after normal working hours. We took steps to correct that situation. We have also received some complaints from the subscribers concerning our bills and because of those complaints, we redesigned them, make it easier to understand and less complicated.

In the past two and one half years we have built and our serviced Roanoke Garden Apartments, Peconic Bay Estates, Mill Brook Apartments, Aquebogue Mobile Home Park, we've extended service into MacLeods Mobile Home Park and Thurms Estates. We have rebuilt our main lines feeding Wading River, portions of Fresh Pond Mobile Home Park. We are presently — build North Country Road and looking at the feasibility of building other areas in the Town of Riverhead. Our present rate of return on investment is only 6%, which compared to most businesses who earn anywhere from 15 to 20% return on investment is quite low. Because of our slow growth in Riverhead, our — of the past two and one half years or we feel we need the increase from \$7.85 to \$8.15 to offset our expenses to keep our growth going. I'd be happy to answer any questions from anybody."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else present who wishes to be heard? Yes Sir."

Tom Garritty, Thurms Estates; "We've had this problem with Long Island Cablevision with proper — for having poor service. We've complained time and time again. We've finally got to meet Mr. Tuthill. His engineers met us at Thurms for a meeting and at that time they described what the problem was, why we were without service at certain times because the lines were underwater and they were changing all these. And things were going to improve. And after that meeting we wrote them another letter and asked them to write so we could make a report to our club regarding what they intended to do. At that time, they told us that each subscriber was entitled for a bill of rights. And they were supposed to be sent whenever you started service. And they were going to make it a point, the first of the month when they send out the bill, we get the Bill of Rights. That was three months ago. No one has gotten the Bill of Rights. And we've also written to the regional director up in Hartford twice and he didn't even have the courtesy to reply to us. One

of the big reasons Cablevision complains about poor service is because of Lilco. Now I want to know if Lilco causes a black out, how come we don't lose power in the house? If our lights all went out, I could appreciate it. But our lights don't go out, but our tv does.

Another thing I'd like to complain about is when we call about poor service, we get a busy signal. You just keep calling and calling, busy signal until you can't even report. Now with all this, they're asking for an increase. We can't see it."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else who wishes to speak? Yes ma'am."

Ann Hatosky, MacLeods Mobile Home Park; "I don't belong to any group as these people do, but I find the service that I've been receiving is not very good either and I also found that every time I tried to call — I work so I'm not home from nine to five. But every time I tried to reach them, there's a busy signal. If you finally do get through, they say I will connect you with a technician and then the technician says we're working on it. But they never really explain what the problem is. Now for several months I had this problem and they don't bother to reply to any letters that you write when you're sending in your payment. So the situation got to the point where I couldn't even watch my tv at night because of these lines, that keep going across the screen moving up. As a matter of fact, they're still going on. And they never bothered to acknowledge any letter that you send.

I finally deducted \$5.00 from my bill so now I have a little reminder that a balance of my other bill is still due. But nobody has ever even done anything. Once I came home and found a little note saying that I had reported something wrong. Evidently that was a reply to a letter that I had written several months before when I had paid the bill. But I'm not objecting particularly to the increase. That in itself seems quite small. But I think that they're spending a lot of money on their advertising for their extra facilities that they want you to join. And rather than trying to improve the service for the people there, even tonight when I had the tv on before I came out, there's a dark line and there's a white line and then it looks like a frame possibly from — I don't know, I don't have any technical knowledge. But it just is very aggravating when you pay for this and you write and you never receive any acknowledgment from them so I think that they should do something about clearing up the problems that they have before they do ahead with their expansion program that they're speaking about. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else that wishes to speak to this issue? Yes Sir."

Hank Arnold, Riverhead; "I'd just like to find out what this expansion program is actually going to be. I seem to call up Cablevision. I am a subscriber to Showtime also, which the service is very very poor most of the time and I call up Cablevision and they say well we're working on this. You know they give the usual questions and answer bit, the same as myself. But what I'd like to know what is the actual evolution is going to be now? What are they going to give us for the money we're paying? That's my question."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else who wishes to speak?"

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "There is, in reference to a — I'd like some information through you people. My son lives in Aquabogue. He told me to ask. This is second hand now. He lives on the head of Reeves Creek about eight hundred foot, if you want to say south or east of Bay Woods, and services are not brought down there. They're told if he wanted service he'd have to develop his property. He doesn't want to develop his property and bring in more houses. Now is there any way that services can be brought to them at a charge for installation, or things of that type? That's what I'd like to ask you? First time charge?"

Supervisor Janoski: "I'm sure Mr. Tuthill when he comes up again, will have an answer for that. Is there anyone else that wishes to speak? Yes Sir."

Ward Freese, Suffolk County Department of Affairs; "Mr. Ryer had expected to be here tonight, has met with an accident and could not make it. He asked me to attend in his place, although I don't know what's going on previously to this discussion because I am not a resident of Riverhead. I would like to let it be known that we are available for consumers if they have any problems with any consumer complaints including cable tv. And that for use, I would like to leave a pad of these forms up here and if any of you would like to take one either for now or either in conjunction with this hearing or for future reference with some other consumer problem please be my guest. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else present that wishes to speak to this subject?"

No one else wished to be heard at this time.

Supervisor Janoski recessed this public hearing to hold the next public hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:00 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday, April 7, 1981 at 8:00 P.M. to hear all interested persons regarding the proposed amendment to the Rules and Regulations for the Police Department of the Town of Riverhead.

The affidavits were ordered to be placed on file.

Supervisor Janoski: "Article no. 36, maintain an up to date memo book which will consist of but not be limited to the following information: date, tour of duty, weather, road conditions, sector, unit fleet number, Duty Sergeant, beginning mileage, ending mileage. All police activity or investigation will be by time of incident. All central complaint numbers and persons names relating to said incident will be recorded. Any other information the reporting officer feels will aid him in his normal course of police duties.

Article IV - Duties of supervisory personnel, what is being deleted is at established intervals inspect personnel, vehicles and equipment. That is being struck. What is being added periodically inspect personnel, memo books, vehicles, and equipment.

Is there anyone present who wishes to address this issue?"

No one wishing to be heard and no communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Janoski declared the hearing closed at 8:02 P.M.

Supervisor Janoski re-opened the Cablevision public hearing.

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Tuthill, you can come back up."

Richard Tuthill: "The first thing I'd like to address was the first person that came up from Thurms, I believe, there might be a little bit misunderstanding on the Bill of Rights. I told them that they would get a Bill of Rights this year. I didn't mean to say that it was the first of the month. They've just come back from the printers and they'll be going out probably either next month or the month after in the bills.

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Richard Tuthill continues:

The second part of the questions was on power outages."

Unidentified speaker from audience was inaudible.

Supervisor Janoski: "Sir, sir . . ."

Richard Tuthill: "The second question was on Lilco and power outages. It's very difficult for a person to understand why, when the cable goes out and we tell them yes. Lilco's having a problem with some power outages, and they say jeeze my lights are on. That could very well happen. We feed all the way out to Wading River from our Riverhead head end. If anywhere in that line one of the parcel ties goes down for whatever reason, whether it be a Lilco outage, whether the power fails, whether the power supply fails, just because it fails, faulty equipment for whatever reason that interrupts that service going all the way out to Wading River. That a person in Wading River may not have Cable television, but will have power and lights. But it's still a power outage as far as we're concerned. All our equipment's runs on electricity of which we receive from Lilco to power the amplifiers. And if one fails, they're out. It's very difficult to understand that you could have your lights and your telephone works, but the tv doesn't.

The thirty cents increase we're asking for is to maintain our present level of service. Anybody can, I would hope would understand that 4% increase over a 5.6% increase over two and one half years to three years of service is not very much. I don't think they could get a better deal than that in Town in any store they go in. So certainly that thirty cents is to maintain what we have and we hope we can do a little bit more with it.

As far as the person from Aquebogue, Bay Woods, we do have a line extension formula and it is in the franchise. It's a formula where if there are not enough homes for us to go in and build at our cost, the subscribers or the potential subscribers can get together and depending on how many they can have — they can aid in the cost of the construction and there's also a pay back period they may pay the initial amount. But if a new person comes on after it's initially built, they in turn pay whatever that amount agreed upon and that gets rebated back to the initial group and they now become one of the initial group. So there is that possibility. And, of course, there are areas where it's just not feasible to do that also. There has to be a certain number of homes to make it profitable for us to go in and build Cable television. That's what we're in business for. I think I — I think that was all questions there were but I'd be sure — oh one quick point. The man from Consumer Affairs was here for — if any of our subscribers have complaints they may also complain to

PUBLIC HEARING - continuedRichard Tuthill continues:

the New York State Department of Cable Television Commission. There's also an 800 toll free number. We certainly don't try to hide anything. If they can't resolve the complaint with us we welcome them going to the commission, the Consumer Affairs. We would certainly hope that they would try and do it to us through the Town first. We're not in the business to alienate anybody. Certainly we'll try to resolve the complaints on a local level first. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mr. Tuthill. Gentleman from Thurms."

Tom Garritty: "I'd like to straighten out the record in regard to Mr. Tuthill on that Bill of Rights. We brought this up at the meeting here at that time we were surprised that we hadn't all received the Bill of Rights and he said we should have. And at the next time we got our bill he was going to personally see to it that we had all received a Bill of Rights. Now within a year, but the next bill. And like I've said, there's been several bills since that time without it."

Now this idea of blaming Lilco is a great alibi. I can appreciate when we have a heavy storm or there are heavy winds when we suddenly loose power, but there are days when they're perfectly calm, clear whether that we've lost power without any explanation. These are the things that we complain about. There are a lot of senior citizens in our area and these people, this is their only means of entertainment and that's why we're concerned and we're fighting for them."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else present that wishes to — yes Sir."

Hank Arnold: "Mr. Supervisor, the Board, again they're avoiding the question. I would like to know what the services of Cablevision would be? For instance, I called up one of the girls and she says well Showtime's going to either be Spotlight or it's going to do this. They're not going to have thirty-six channels, or whatever — you know different sorts of questions. I'm trying to find out what the actual premium network is going to be. You can't find out. They say big surprise. Right now — we started with what did we start with, thirteen channels? Now they've already taken channel 2 away and if they're going to put in another premium channel, they're going to have to take another channel away or they're going to go to a mid range — super range channel you know the A through J channel. So, you know again they just keep avoiding the question. I would like to know what they're going to do?"

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else present that wishes to address this issue? Mr. Tuthill."

Richard Tuthill: "I'd like to apologize. I overlooked you on my list. Yes, May 1st, we're going to Spotlight. We've gone from HBO to Showtime and we're now going to Spotlight. I have a plug here and I'll try to keep it short. One of the reasons — one point I want to make is, one of the reasons we're going Spotlight is because of the interface between our subscribers and to pay television premium service. If you now have complaints or you don't like movies or something you can talk to us, where before you could talk to us but we had to pass them on to Showtime. We are a 12 channel classic cable system. I'm not going to take away anything else I'm going to take away Showtime and replace it with Spotlight. We have preliminary plans and I'd like to stress that that they are just preliminary of re-building out system which will enable us to offer and I have no idea any where from 20 some channels all the way up to 50 some channels. That decision hasn't been made yet. But that's in the very near future and I suspect probably will happen the beginning of next year. Right now it's a 12 channel classic cable system and Spotlight is going to be replacing Showtime on the same channel as Showtime."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else present who wishes to speak?"

No one else wishing to be heard and no communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Janoski declared the hearing closed at 8:10 P.M.

Supervisor Janoski recessed the meeting for ten minutes after which the meeting re-convened at 8:22 P.M.

Supervisor Janoski: "Let's do the resolutions."

William Kasperovich from the audience was inaudible.

Supervisor Janoski: "I will open up the meeting for public comment after we do the resolutions."

William Kasperovich from the audience: "I have reason to ask to be able to speak before."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay, meeting is now open to public comment?"

William Kasperovich, Wading River; "Tonight I'm going to read so that I can have copies distributed and be no questions, semantics or words.

WHEREAS, the Town Clerk's Office has no papers or documents to indicate the review and study of present conditions that exist in the entire Township.

WHEREAS, verbal and written requests in compliance with the Riverhead Town Rules for requests allowed by the Freedom of Information Act have not revealed any such papers, it is assumed that they do not exist.

In so far as the entire Township will be burdened for payment the scope of all efforts from an intermediate position, is not in the best interest of the residents and taxpayers.

THEREFORE, it is concluded that basic fundamentals for individual collection and disposal units for sewerage has not been studied in the Riverhead Township. The studies appear to start at the Town Dump and resolved in a temporary interim solution with a three and a half million dollar secondary treatment plant.

WHEREAS, the questions that were raised at the public hearing in August, 1980 have not been publicly answered.

Questions:

What alternatives other than a central collection point were considered in the engineering studies?

What are the proportions of quantity vs cost with Riverhead vs Southampton?

WHEREAS, information was not available or public at the Town Clerk's Office.

WHEREAS, misleading information and increase incorrect terminology was used in the detailed newspaper article were never corrected or rewritten referring to the News-Review, February 19th.

WHEREAS, the reports from the H2M Corp. contain many questionable numbers.

In so far as concealments and deception have been brought to the attention of the Town Board at Town Hall Meetings and no effort was made — no effort was taken to make concise clarifications to the public prior to the Bond Resolution.

It is therefore concluded that there are no intentions to inform the public before the fact.

WHEREAS, the consulting engineering firm H2M Corp. has based their reports on unilateral criteria without embracing the origin or conception of the problem of human waste within the entire Township.

WHEREAS, the H2M Corp. used bloated figures to arrive at demand and capacities.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued  
William Kasperovich continues:

Examples:

No distinction between laundry waste vs human waste.

No tolerance allowed for flooded cesspools vs failed cesspools.

Unreal time frequency to anticipate future cesspool pumping.

No allowance for excess dumping due to FREE use of the Town Dump by truckers (6 in all) (only annual permit cost \$150.)

WHEREAS, the H2M Corp. made no allowances — their reports for the extension of Sewer Districts as proposed by H2M which would reduce the scavenger waste quantity significantly.

It is therefore concluded that the H2M Corporation figures and their cost estimates are excessive and not realistic.

WHEREAS, there are no agencies or bureaus that claim jurisdiction over the control of existing cesspools, septic tanks, or other vessels for the collection and/or retaining of human waste within Riverhead Township (excluding existing Sewer Districts).

WHEREAS, the present and past Riverhead Town Administrators have shown no evidence to indicate any proposals to modify existing conditions in any manner.

WHEREAS, existing cesspools etc. and existing private domestic water wells are interrelated in residential areas.

WHEREAS, the H2M Corp. includes in their reports the formation of a Cesspool Septic Management Program with the construction of the new facilities.

In so far as the introduction of jurisdiction over cesspools is part of the proposal for the three and a half million dollar facility.

It is therefore concluded that the existing cesspools will continue to function as they are with no improvement of condition after spending three and a half million dollars.

Pursuant to the laws of New York State and the Town Laws of the Town of Riverhead, I William Kasperovich, resident and taxpayer in the Township — in the Riverhead Township, Suffolk County, State of New York, by the reading of this document on this day, April 7, 1981, before the entire Town Board present, at a duly formed and constituted Town Meeting, do hereby challenge and contest the validity and legal propriety of Bond Resolution dated March 17, 1981, Authorizing the Acquisition of Land and the Construction thereon of a Scavenger Waste Treatment Facility.

Maureen Perrella, 420 East Main Street; "Good evening everybody. I'll be brief. First of all I would like to preface my remarks by saying that I have absolutely no reservations regarding the mentally retarded living in community hostiles. But, and I haven't been able to confirm this, this is only a rumor that I've heard from a tenant who lives at 414 East Main Street, that a mentally retarded couple who are expecting a child were recently placed at 414 East Main Street. As I say, this is just a rumor. I don't really know if it's true, but if it is true, anyone who knows the situation, reads the papers, sees the police blotter, realizes that this would be like throwing the lamb into the lions den. My first question is who, if anybody, monitors the department of social services' placement in the communities?"

Supervisor Janoski: "That's really what the whole fight that we're in is about, that no one monitors them. Our question regarding placement in the community are never answered and it's the crux of the battle."

Maureen Perrella: "Well my second question then is, Mr. Janoski is the Association of Supervisor's still supporting Legislative Blass' Bill for pre-rental inspection?"

Supervisor Janoski: "We are in record of supporting it. We have also — support the state legislation that's pending and we intend to pursue with the common legislature this idea of pre-rental inspection. You know that it is unbelievable to us that the ten towns that endorse this idea along with the villages of Suffolk County and yet the Suffolk County Legislature refuses to implement this plan. They are not responsive to the problems. I have invited the Human Services Committee of the Suffolk County Legislature to convene a meeting in Riverhead at the site of 414 so that they could see first hand the problems that we here in the Town of Riverhead are facing. I have also spoken with the County Executive and have an agreement from him that he will in person make an onsite inspection of facilities in the Town. I have also requested of him that a Health Department inspection be made for 414 in conjunction with his visit. I am trying to nail down a date for that to take place and I certainly hope that the County Executive is going to follow through on what he said that he would do."

Maureen Perrella: "I certainly hope so. He's certainly is welcome to inspect . . ."

Supervisor Janoski; "I also informed him that I would like to have people in the Community who live around there to be present too, so that they might be able to speak with him."

Maureen Perrella: "We'd be more than happy to do that. Thank you."
