Supervisor Janoski: "Under unfinished business we have a special permit application for Halandia Associates for multiple housing at Doctors Path, which is still awaiting Town Board action.

Request for rate increase for Cablevision for thirty cents per month which is also awaiting action from the Town Board.

Special Permit application of Riverhead Airpark, Inc., for a general aviation airport which is before the Planning Board at the present time.

At this time, we have about five minutes left. I would recognize anyone who wishes to be heard, however, I would suggest Legislator Greg Blass stand up and say what he has to say."

Legislator Greg Blass, Jamesport: "Thank you Mr. Supervisor. Good evening members of the Town Board, ladies and gentlemen of the good town of Riverhead.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedLegislator Greg Blass continues:

I came to you tonight to talk to you briefly about another injustice and more shabby treatment which we have suffered on the east end, at the hands of Suffolk County. And I speak specifically about the situation of reapportionment which is involving the district lines in which the county legislature being changed as they are required to be changed by law to conform to population changes which occurs every ten years. And the reason that this redistricting is a problem is that the map that has been proposed which will be voted on by the county legislature either May 12 or May 25, we're still not certain yet. There is a map which is as far as the east is concerned in one word, appalling. They have cut the heart out of the Town of Riverhead. They have said that it only involves 5,000 people or a little more than that that we're talking about more than almost 25% of the population of the township. We're talking about the commercial district of the Town.

It also takes away from the alleged North fork district, the Town of Shelter Island, which is a north fork community. Now when we have a district like this, we have a district which is comprised of Southold Town, part of Riverhead Town on the north fork, part of it on the south fork. And a huge portion of Brookhaven Town which means that the decisions for the needs of the Towns of Riverhead and Southold on a County level will be determined by Brookhaven. We are dominated if this map goes through by the Town of Brookhaven.

Now some people say which should we be concerned with, the style we have right here. And I would urge all of you to take a good close look at the kind of process that the Town of Riverhead will be subjected to. The kind of injustice that the Town of Riverhead will be subjected to for the next ten years. This goes beyond me. This goes beyond anybody who happens to hold the legislative district seat. We live with this decision for the decade of the '80's. And I say that we won't be living as citizens of the County at all. We'll have second class citizenship. We'll have an orphan status. We've had enough of that already. We shouldn't be having it further and I would urge the Town Board and I understand you considered this already, to pass a resolution opposing this kind of a district plan that if we're going to have two districts on the east end which should have a north fork district and a south fork district because very many crucial decisions are going to be made here over the next ten years, effecting our future and our way of life. I realize the time limitation and I will cut it short. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mr. Legislator. I think that you will be happy to find that we are passing a resolution tonight, calling — expressing our opposition to the present proposal and also calling for a public hearing to be held at the Riverhead County Center. Originally, there was but one hearing as you all know, scheduled for May the 12th in Hauppauge and we

feel that the residents of the east end must be afforded an opportunity to express themselves with regard to this issue."

Legislator Greg Blass: "Absolutely."

Supervisor Janoski: "I am happy to say that I have asked for every member of this Town Board in a bi-partisan effort expressing our objections and finding that this proposal is unacceptable to the Town of Riverhead."

Legislator Greg Blass: "Absolutely. I thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski recessed the meeting to hold the public hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:45 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday, May 5, 1981 at 7:45 P.M. to hear all interested persons comment upon programing performance of past grants, as well as upon the present application of Small Cities.

The affidavits were ordered and placed on file.

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mrs. Pendzick. Rick, would you please come forward and speak from the Community Development Office."

Rick Hanley, Community Development Office; "Thank you. Members of the Town Board, ladies and gentlemen, there are some hand-outs out up front here if you'd like to pick one up and follow along what we're talking about tonight."

Supervisor Janoski: "If anyone's interested in what we are proposing tonight, the literature is available here on this table."

## PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Rick Hanley: "Tonight is the second of two public hearings concerning the Town of Riverhead's Community Development Small Cities Block Grant application. The information handed out at the first hearing concerned itself with the fact that the Town has been invited to submit a full application to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The facts that the Town's initial budget submitted with its pre-application was cut in the amount of about \$575,000 and it also provided a description of the housing assistance plan which the Town must submit to HUD as well as a performance report of passed Community Development spending. Tonight's hearing and the information provided concerns itself with a, first of all, a revised three-year budget that we are to submit to HUD on June 1st.

This three-year spending plan was an amalgamation of spending plans that were decided upon or the decision-making process involving these spending plans were a result of both the input of the last public hearing, the Community Development Office, the sub-committee of concerned citizens and the Town Board. It is pages 3, 4, and 5 of the hand-out and those are the draft — the draft that we propose tonight.

The second item is a draft of the housing assistance plan which is a requirement of the small cities funds and it includes a survey of housing conditions as they exist presently. A rendition of housing assistance needs of the Town for the next three years and housing goals for assisted housing in the Town of Riverhead. Some of these numbers I take issue with. I feel they're a suspect and we plan on working out the problems with these — with HUD tomorrow in the City.

As I said before, the application is due on June 1st and I invite all comments this evening on the information that's here. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Rick. Is there anyone present who wishes to address the question of small cities grant? Yes Sir."

Harold Smith, Chairman of the Vail-Leavitt Music Hall Council, Inc; "This is a proposal that the Town of Riverhead seek a grant under the "Small Cities" Program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for the purpose of the acquisition and disposition by the Town of the Historic Landmark, 1881 Vail-Leavitt Building and for the acquisition of adjoining property for clearance, and for improved access including handicap access to the aforesaid building.

Those overall objections of the Vail-Leavitt restoration which appear to come within the "Small Cities" criteria are as follows:

Restoration of the Vail-Leavitt Building for the purposes of (1) preservation of a noteworthy Riverhead Town Historic

Landmark; (2) establishment of a town-owned and operated facility offering recreation to the many small and middle income persons living in the area, and (3) offering economic opportunities to working artists, performers, technicians, and administrative and operating personnel, many of them local residents.

Objectives for which further funding will be sought elsewhere, but which are not included in this proposal, foresee the presentation of the theatrical, recreational and cultural events for all ethnic, political and social groups without regard to race, creed, color, sex, but with a special regard to the lower-to-middle income group.

The Vail-Leavitt Building, a registered Riverhead Historic Landmark, is in danger of possible demolition or alteration, should any new owner so elect after the closing, and imminent offering for sale, of the premises following liquidation of the Leavitt family store. To forestall such a development, interim assistance is urgently needed.

The Vail-Leavitt Building, opened in 1881 as Music Hall was the scene in 1914 of some of Edison's earliest experiments, in talking motion pictures. Mr. Edison is known to have spent several summers during this period in nearby Quogue, in still earlier times the Music Hall was Riverhead's most popular theatre and meeting place. It is one of the few examples of the American Victorian upstairs opera house still standing in the New York Metropolitan region. National Historic Landmark registration for the building is now being sought.

The Vail-Leavitt restoration was enthusiastically advocated by a large sample of the local population in a questionnaire developed in early 1980 by the Brannigan-Lorelli Associates of New York City, under a feasibility grant from the Architecture and Environmental Arts program of the New York State Council on the Arts.

In a demographic profile of potential beneficiaries of the Vail-Leavitt project, 32% of respondents answering the question on the Brannigan-Lorelli survey indicated that their income was under \$12,000 per year, while 29% reported an income of from \$12,000 to \$20,000. It is anticipated that persons of low or moderate income will constitute the greater part (51%) of the public benefited by the Vail-Leavitt project.

Historic preservation of this Local Landmark, with tourist interest generated thereby, is expected to aid the economic development of an area just now beginning to emerge from a depressed condition.

Acquisition of the Vail-Leavitt Building by the Town of Riverhead will also provide to the Vail-Leavitt Music Hall Committee of Riverhead Townscape, Inc., a private non-profit entity, in carrying out its master plan to secure ultimate complete restoration and operation. The Vail-Leavitt Committee, a voluntary group founded in 1978, will soon be superseded by an independent not-for-profit corporation, the Council for the Vail-Leavitt

Music Hall, Inc., which has already happened will carry on the project. Acquisition of the Town, by the Town, would create an atmosphere of greater security and thus aid impetus to the Vail-Leavitt project.

An itemized breakdown, documented by letters of intent from the property owners involved, follows:

We are cognizant, of course, of the cuts that have been made in HUD appropriations.

The Vail-Leavitt Building, declared an official Riverhead Town Landmark in October 1979, appears to fulfill the requirements of the "Small Cities" Program. While the 1881 building happens to have been a theatre, no portion of the "Small Cities" Grant would be used for theatrical, exhibition, expansion, conversion, or other disallowed uses.

Acquisition and disposition of the building by the Town of Riverhead are the sole purposes to which a grant from the "Small Cities" Program would be allocated, according to our proposal. Such acquisition 1) would provide urgently needed interim assistance to landmark preservation, facilities of clearance activities, fulfill a demonstrated community desire for eventual completion of the Vail-Leavitt restoration, provide activities for the handicapped, provide, in line with principles of equal opportunity and affirmative action, economic opportunities for working artists, performers, and technicians of the area, provide recreation for low-to-middle income groups, and to aid in Riverhead's economic and urban development as a means of improving the quality of life for residents in low to moderate income housing, providing a magnet here for tourism and a means for bringing more people to downtown Riverhead.

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Harold. I think that if you look at page three of the document that we have for you, you will see that line no. seven, historic preservation, the initial proposal was for \$40,000 and the revised proposal is for \$40,000. The Town of Riverhead and the Town Board believes that this is a unique site in our Town and we wish to avail you to the opportunity to preserve it. The burden at this particular time now is for you

to go out and purchase that property to raise the necessary funds, additional funds, which are necessary. We do recognize the absolutely, as I said unique situation that we have there.

Is there anyone else that wishes to be heard? I see a hand back there."

Barbara Scherzer, Hampton Bays; "Members of the Town Board, ladies and gentlemen, I live in Hampton Bays, but I live in the Riverhead Central School District and have children that are sent into Riverhead Schools and I find myself involved in the community of Riverhead. And tonight I'm here to speak towards the application of Hallockville for a part of this funding that is available under the "Small Cities" grant for historic restoration. I think it's important, at this time, to make the Board and the residents of Riverhead town aware of exactly what's entailed in the project. I don't have a prepared speech, but I'm speaking as an individual at this point, that this is simply not a request to restore an old house. This house which is, they are in negotiations with Lilco at the point from Miss Ella's house which is in the best condition at this time, would be used as a living museum. It would be step one in a major project which would also be a magnet for tourists.

This would be part of twelve buildings, twelve farm houses and farm buildings which are unique on Long Island for the simple reason that many of the other restorations such as Bethpage, Stirbridge, Williamsburg have brought buildings from other sites. These buildings are all on the original sites, were owned by all of the same original family. And as such can really be turned into a very feasible group, a living museum and a working farm. And this first grant that Hallockville has applied for would be toward the restoration of the house, enable someone to live there and start programs that would attract the tourists. This would be a long term project in terms of five or ten years, but this money would be the first step toward making this something that would be a viable project. And I think we're all aware of the fact that the east end, each year is becoming more and more of a tourist magnet. And more and more people from the city and from all of this island are coming out this way and this is something that could also be available year round that would draw a number of tourists and the accompanying of money with them into the Town of Riverhead. And I urge you to give serious consideration to this. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else? Way in the back there. I think that's Ernie Langhorn."

Ernest Langhorn, Housing Director for the EOC of Suffolk and Director of the Riverhead Local Action Center; "I'm

also a Riverhead Resident. I'm coming here to speak in support of the proposed Budget that has been approved by the Town at this point, I believe. I think that the budget reflects how the community block grant funds should be spent in terms of mainly benefiting low and moderate income people. I think that your housing and improving program does that. I think that your energy conservation program, your single-family acquisition rehabilitation program and economic development program speaks mainly to low and moderate income people. It will up-grade the housing, increase the sufficiency in terms of energy and also provide jobs for low and moderate income people.

I applaude the Town's effort in this area to provide low and moderate income people with these services. At the same time, I think that the concerned citizens group have played a very important part in it. In terms of your housing assistance plan, I think that like Rick said earlier, that some of the numbers are a little lower and we will discuss it in the concerned citizens group and we will also use a 895 mechanism to comment on how we think the housing assistance plan should actually reflect the needs of housing in Riverhead. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Ernie. Yes Sir. Dick."

Dick Benedict, Fanning Blvd; "I'm here to speak about the road improvement money. Now only private roads, but public roads also. I see that Year IV has been cut about 25%. Year V I can't find any unless this economic development somehow fits in there. And Year VI is down to 50,000. There's a lot of money here for the people of Riverhead. But I think the way it looks that most of it is going to special interest groups. I think the road conditions in Riverhead and a lot of the drainage problems we had, we were lucky this year. But I think that's a pretty big cut, total for roads comes to, I think, \$160,000 over three years. Total for administration for this program comes to 225,000. So I think the tax payers could get a better break. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Dick. Is there anyone else? Bill, hold up, we have to go to the next public hearing. Anyone wishing to speak on the Small Cities grant will be afforded the opportunity after we get through the other scheduled public hearings."

Supervisor Janoski recessed this public hearing to hold the next public hearing.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday, May 5, 1981 at 8:00 P.M. to hear all interested persons regarding the proposed expansion of Glenwood Mobile Home Park, Mill Road, Riverhead, N.Y.

The affidavits were ordered to be placed on file.

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone present representing Glenwood Mobile Park?"

Arthur DiPietro, McNulty, Gilmartin, DiPietro, Nesci & Haefeli; "I appear here and speak on behalf of this application. This is an application to expand Glenwood Village, a facility, a residential facility that has existed in this Town for over twenty years and to expand it by approximately thirteen acres of adjacent land (tape ended) (tape began) I believe because of the prior track record of this application, it's thorough review and analysis by the various appropriate agencies of this town, there is not much more to add to the record and to add to the application. However, I am here. Mr. Bruce Stark on behalf of the application is also here and if you or any member of the audience have any questions or any additional clarifications, we'd be more than happy to respond."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone present who wishes to address the issue of Glenwood Mobile Park expansion? Mr. Nohejl."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "I would like for the gentleman to give a full explanation as to how many residents on the thirteen acres, how many are existing, and how many more is contemplated? Thank you."

Arthur DiPietro: "Sometimes lawyers know the right words, but I will leave the specific facts to Mr. Stark. Will you come up here please?"

Bruce Stark: "Bill, we're asking for fifty-two spaces, I believe it is. We run a retirement mobile park. Basically, there are two persons per home so we're talking about one hundred and two people in the expansion. Does that answer your question? Okay?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mr. Stark. Is there anyone else who wishes to address themselves to this issue?"

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Unidentified Speaker from the audience was inaudible.

Supervisor Janoski: "You have to step up to the microphone Sir and identify yourself."

Martin Cooper, Aquebogue; "I'd just like to know what was the negative Environmental Impact Statement?"

Bruce Stark: "The Environmental Council, if I am correct, decided that the Environmental Impact that we would have is negative. So they did not ask for an Environmental Impact report."

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay."

Bruce Stark: "The County Health Department — we were approved by the County Health. Basically, when you go through their approvals, a lot of the Environmental is taken care of. There is on file with the Town Clerk, the Planning Board and I have a copy here for anyone that would choose to look at it, a copy of the site plan of the proposed building, further pursuant to the Code of the Town of Riverhead. showing the undership currently in Mr. William Hubbard Jr., and further as a matter of public record in this proceeding is a copy of the contract and option that is held by the corporate applicant.

I have submitted to the Town Clerk and may be in the room this evening and if they are not, samples of the various products that are manufactured by Suffolk Etched and will be manufactured, hopefully if the Town Board looks favorably upon this application on this particular site. The site is a five-acre parcel of real property. It is on the south side of Elton Street. It is to the east of the Saw Mill Brook, to the west of Kiev Cogan Potato Loading Station. The site sits in an industrial area. We applied pursuant to the provision of the code of the Town of Riverhead which permits in that industrial zone a non-nuisance industry. The non-nuisance industry we propose here is that of chemical milling.

I would suppose that the easiest way to demonstrate to the people present, the type of chemical milling that we propose to do is to select out of this book some of these decorations. They are — this is part of a decorative line. These are your Christmas ornaments that many of you may have seen in national catalogues which are being sold by this corporation. Of lesser interest is the commercial applications of chemical milling. These are very intricate parts of computers, machine tools and things of that nature. They aren't quite as pretty or graphic as the decorative line that Mr. Pufahl puts forth.

The building that is proposed, is nothing spectacular. It is a building of modest size, 20,000 square feet. It will be a steel building. For those persons who are present and interested, it is analogous in size and construction type II the steel building that the Town has at the Sanitary Landfill or the building that the Town built on Route 58 for the Town Garage opposite the State Armory. There will be landscaping appropriate to the area. It will add a number of jobs to our local economy. It is, this application is similarly subject to an application before the Industrial Development Agency of the Town of Riverhead and in this particular point in time, there has issued from the Industrial Development Agency an inducement resolution asking Mr. Pufahl and his corporation more appropriately to build this plant in the Town of Riverhead. financing in place for approximately a million dollars that this project would begin construction some time this summer, hopefully for occupancy before the building season is out. This Modification, dated this 5th day of May, 1981, to an Agreement made November 7, 1979, by and between HOLZMACHER, McLENDON AND MURRELL, PC./H2M CORP., with offices at 575 Broad Hollow Road, Melville, New York 11747, hereinafter called the "CONSULTANT" and the TOWN BOARD, TOWN OF RIVERHEAD, a Municipal

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Corporation of the State of New York, hereinafter called the "TOWN" with offices at 200 Howell Avenue, Riverhead, New York, 11901.

## W I T N E S S E T H :

WHEREAS, the TOWN has engaged the CONSULTANT on November 7, 1979 to perform engineering services in conjunction with a 201 Study of the Towns of Riverhead and Southampton, and

WHEREAS, the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and United States Environmental Protection Agency have approved the Facility Plan for Scavenger Waste, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Riverhead has applied for grants in aid and/or amendments to existing grants for the services described herein, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Riverhead is desirous of proceeding with the implementation of the recommendations of the Facility Plan and the CONSULTANT is desirous of performing the additional services, and

WHEREAS, the TOWN and the CONSULTANT are desirous of modifying the Agreement of November 7, 1979, to incorporate services required to implement the recommendations,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises it is mutually agreed between the parties as follows:

1. The Town Board, Town of Riverhead, as governing body of Town of Riverhead Scavenger Waste Improvement No. 1 is hereby substituted as the party to this agreement in place of the Town Board, Town of Riverhead and shall hereinafter be the "TOWN" in this agreement as modified.
2. The CONSULTANT shall prepared detailed plans and specifications for the Scavenger Waste Treatment Facilities as approved by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation in the Report entitled "ENGINEERING REPORT AND STUDY ON SCAVENGER WASTE IN RIVERHEAD AND SOUTHAMPTON", October 1980. These services shall be described in the contract dated November 7, 1979 SECTION III, E(2), (3), (4), (5), and (6). Separate contracts shall be prepared as a minimum for 1) Site Work and Landscaping; 2) General Construction and Mechanical; 3) Heating and Ventilating; 4) Plumbing; and 5) Electrical.
3. The CONSULTANT shall also perform the following additional services as specifically requested by the TOWN:
  - a. Assist the Town in meeting Federal and State administrative requirements.
  - b. Prepare payment requests and supporting documents for Federal and State reimbursement.

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- c. Prepare engineering data for permit applications (Tidal Wetlands, Corps of Engineers, Dewatering, etc.).
- d. Assist the TOWN as required in condemnation proceedings.
- e. Obtain detailed topographical data required for design and study.
- f. Attend meetings and hearings with Federal State, local regulatory agencies and Town officials.
- g. Obtain property survey and description.
- h. Soil investigations, including test borings, related analyses and recommendations.
- i. Perform a Historical and Archaeological, Phase IB survey of the Scavenger Waste Site.
- j. Assist the TOWN in preparing necessary budgets, rules, etc. for the Scavenger Waste District.
- k. Assist the TOWN in computing amounts to be used for User Charges.

4. SECTION IV, Paragraph C.3, of the Agreement dated November 7, 1979, is deleted and the following substitution made therefore;

"(3). Scavenger Waste Study. The CONSULTANT, shall be compensated for the Scavenger Waste Study as described in Section III, paragraph C., on the basis of cost plus a fixed profit of Thirteen Thousand Three Hundred and Five Dollars (\$13,305.00) The amount payable for cost plus profit shall not exceed One Hundred Two Thousand Dollars (\$102,000.00)".

This modification is made to the cost and profit on the Scavenger Waste Study for the reasons cited in Appendix "A". (which is filed in the Town Clerk's Office)

5. The CONSULTANT shall be remunerated for the services described in paragraphs 2 and 3 above on the basis of cost plus a fixed fee of Thirty Four Thousand One Hundred Seventy Dollars. This is estimated on the USEPA Form 5700-41 dated March 11, 1981 (filed), as Appendix "B".

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6. The Agreement of November 7, 1979 is further modified by the incorporation of the following clauses:

- A. GOVERNING LAW. This contract shall be governed by the law of the State of New York.
- B. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS. All drawings, specifications and other work produce of the CONSULTANT for the contract are instruments of services for this contract only and shall remain the property of the CONSULTANT and the TOWN whether the contract is completed or not. Reuse of any of the instruments of service by the TOWN on any other contract without the written permission of the CONSULTANT shall be at the TOWN'S risk. The TOWN agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the CONSULTANT from all claims, damages and expenses including attorneys' fees arising out of use or reuse of the CONSULTANTS instruments of service by the TOWN or by other acting with the permission of the TOWN, involving a modification of the original plans and specifications of the CONSULTANT.
- C. GENERAL.
  1. Neither party shall hold the other responsible for damages or delay in performance caused by acts of God, strikes, lockouts, accidents, or other events beyond the control of the other or the other's employees and agents.
  2. In the event any provisions of this contract shall be held to be invalid and unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall be valid and binding upon the parties.
  3. The CONSULTANT has not been retained or compensated to provide construction review services relating to the contractor's safety precautions or to means, methods, techniques, sequences, or procedures required for the contractor to perform his work, but not relating to the final or completed structure; omitted services include but are not limited to shoring, scaffolding, underpinning, temporary retainment of excavations and any erection methods and temporary bracing.
  4. The CONSULTANT intends to render their services under this agreement in accordance with generally

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accepted professional practices for the intended use of the project and makes no other warranty either express or implied.

5. Any opinion of the construction cost prepared by the CONSULTANT represents its judgment as a design professional and is supplied for the general guidance of the TOWN. Since the CONSULTANT has no control over the cost of labor and material, or over competitive bidding or market conditions, the CONSULTANT does not guarantee the accuracy of such opinions as compared to contractor bids or actual cost to the TOWN.

D. INDEMNITY AND LIABILITY.

1. CONTRACTORS INSURANCE: Prior to the commencement of the work, the TOWN shall require the contractor and any sub-contractors to submit evidence that he (they) have obtained for the period of the construction contract and guarantee period comprehensive general liability insurance coverage (including completed operations coverage). This coverage shall provide for bodily injury and property damage arising directly or indirectly out of, or in connection with, the performance of the work under the construction contract, and have a limit of not less than \$1,000,000 for all damages arising out of bodily injury, sickness or death of one person and an aggregate of \$3,000,000 for damages arising out of bodily injury, sickness and death of two or more persons in any one occurrence. The property damage portion will provide for a limit of not less than \$500,000 for all damages arising out of injury to or destruction of property of others arising directly or indirectly out of or in connection with the performance of the work under the construction contract and in any one occurrence including explosion, collapse and underground exposures. The comprehensive general liability insurance will include as additional names insureds: the TOWN, the CONSULTANT, and each of their officers, agents and employees.
2. INDEMNITY: The TOWN will require that any contractor or sub-contractors performing work in connection with drawings and specifications produced under this Agreement to hold harmless, indemnify and defend, the TOWN and the CONSULTANT, their consultants, and each of their officers,

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agents and employees from any and all liability claims, losses or damage arising out of or alleged to arise from the contractor's (or sub-contractor's) negligence in the performance of the work described in the construction contract documents, but not including liability that may be due to the sole negligence of the TOWN, the CONSULTANT, their consultants or their officers, agents and employees.

6. This Modification shall be subject to the issuance of a grant and/or amendment by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and United States Environmental Protection Agency.

7. All of the items and conditions of the Agreement dated November 7, 1979, and as subsequently modified, shall apply herewith as if written out in full.

The vote, Prusinowski, Yes, Regula, Yes, Lombardi, Yes, Menendez, Yes, and Janoski, Yes.

The resolution was thereupon declared duly adopted.

Supervisor Janoski: "I would recognize anyone who wishes to be heard at this time? Mr. Nohejl."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "I'm glad Frank Lescenski is still here. I wouldn't make these comments if he wasn't. I would like to ask, if I could ask Frank a question or do I have to come to you?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Ask your question."

Bill Nohejl: "I want to know if Frank has any idea of doing any honing of the roads this year? Gutters?"

Supervisor Janoski; "Thank you Bill. We'll address that question to the Highway Superintendent. Mr. Highway Superintendent?"

Frank Lescenski from the audience: "Yes we do Bill, and we have (the rest was inaudible)."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Bill Nohejl: "Well I notices that there hasn't been any done in the last three, four, five years and the water is collecting on the roads. And I was hoping that some of it would be done even if — just only in the low spots to get the water off the side of the roads instead of just going in with a front end loader, pouring it into the people's property. I remember from a kid on up, we always used to see a grader going along the road, dirt brought out about three or four, or five foot and a payloader coming along and putting it on and having drainage to the side of the road. Another — Frank answered my question, he said he's going to do it. I believe him.

I have another question. There was a little amusement in the back about the packer. It was said, why does the Town need the packer. And the comment back here was in case John Lombardi's down. No — I have a question on the packer. I made a comment to one of the Town Board members last night, coming down the road. I see grass clippings continuously in the street. And I understand that the Town Highway Department comes along and collects them and takes them to the dump or takes them off the highway. People mow the lawn and put them out in the street. Is this available to all the people of Riverhead Township or just the Village of Riverhead or what? I feel as though, personally this is my own comments. I feel as though the Highway Department should not be doing that. They're not sanitation men or water men. I feel as though they should be on the road, as I said the side of the road. The brush and — not doing personal work around the Town where people take and put their grass clippings out onto the road. I do not agree with it."

Supervisor Janoski: "That's your opinion."

Bill Nohejl: "But I'm paying for it. It's my opinion, too."

Supervisor Janoski: "Do you want an answer?"

Bill Nohejl: "Yes. I would like to have it discontinued if it's not for everyone and put the highway men where they belong. Because if I play the moot, I see people mowing the lawn, they drop it out in the sidewalk. It was done last night. It was cleaned up today. Now I see people tonight putting it out onto the street, into the gutters again. I feel it's not right. I feel as though there is men taking away from the highway of the whole township and doing chores here with the grass clippings. I understand hurricanes, acts of nature, fall with the leaves, when you come along with the — you suck them up. You put them into the truck. I understand that. But I donot understand this continuously week

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - contiuedBill Nohejl: continues:

after week after week picking up people's grass clippings. I feel it shouldn't be — I object to it."

Supervisor Janoski: "Well the only thing I can say is that the Town Board will take recognition of your comments and consider the situation."

Bill Nohejl: "I think I'll have to — if it doesn't, I think I'll have to get somebody else up here with me. I don't think it's fair. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill. Yes ma'am."

Elizabeth Richards, Ostrander Aveneu, Riverhead; "Mr. Janoski, I'd just like to ask you what is the standing of 414 East Main Street as of today?"

Supervisor Janoski: "As of the close of business today, my office is typing the list of violations which we found at 414. We have gotten to apartment seventeen at the close of the day today. There are twenty-seven apartments in that facility. Hopefully by tomorrow we will have the final report completed. At that point the building department will issue violations. Each that we've found existing which add, I guess a number around two hundred. I'm sure that by tomorrow we will have perhaps more and we will take the courses as each step, as time goes along.

One thing, I did call the County Executive yesterday when we came back from the inspection because of a mentally handicapped couple which reside at 414. The woman is very pregnant. About as pregnant as you can get, I guess. And I called the County Executive's Office and demanded that that couple be moved from that facility. I thought it was a crime that they had been placed there. I got a call back from the County Executive today saying that he agreed with me and they indeed would be removed.

The Town Board, of course, supports what we — the whole activity and the violations will be issued failing the improvements which are required. Summons will be issued. I intend to forward a copy of the report to Social Services Department of Suffolk County requesting which is a nice word that all housing allowance be stopped which is rent because I believe that they should be. The bottom line in this whole issue is that your money and my money, tax payers money is being used to finance the continued existance of 414 and that is reprehensible in my mind and should be stopped. Certainly, we hope that we will find the solution to the problem which exists."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Elizabeth Richards: "Well it's reprehensible that people live in these conditions because not all of them live there of their free will, as you really have pointed out. You say some of — if these, your violations are going to the landlord tomorrow."

Supervisor Janoski: "They should be sent out by tomorrow. There is a . . ."

Elizabeth Richards: "How long does he have to make corrections?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Enough time. Really there is no time limit. What we're trying to do is collate all the information because we have three people making the inspection yesterday. We do have a police officer who is a licensed plumber. A police officer who is a licensed electrician, and Mr. DeLucca of the Building Department who also made the inspection. Each was responsible with three pair of eyes to make observations and to collect information regarding violations which existed there.

And what we did was to just — apartment by apartment go through those three separate categories and the number of violations as such that it is taking us this long to put them together. Once they are collected violation notices will be sent out. There are different requirements with the amount of time a person has to bring the violations to repair them, depending on what kind they are. If they are not repaired in that amount of time, then summonses to appear in court will be issued."

Elizabeth Richards: "Can you get back in there to make certain, whether or not they're done."

Supervisor Janoski: "I believe once we now have gotten in the man inspections that we have the ability to go back in to make sure those violations have been repaired. I would have to check with, of course, the Town Attorney, if that is possible. I feel that it is. If not, we would ask for another search warrant to go back in and to check this."

Elizabeth Richards: "It seems to me it took three years to get the County Health Department in there. I don't think that's exaggeration."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "I'm not familiar with how long it took."

Elizabeth Richards: "Well you've been in office a year and a half and they haven't been in. And they've been requested. So it will not drop here though. It won't just stop."

Supervisor Janoski: "No. I think that we have the evidence that we've been seeking."

Elizabeth Richards: "Well as a neighbor, I thank you very much and I congratulate you. And anything that the rest of us can do to help in this, we are certainly willing to do."

Supervisor Janoski: "I would suggest that you write a letter to the County Executive."

Elizabeth Richards: "I called. But if you want, I'll write. Thank you."

Councilman Regula: "The neighbors too."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone else who wishes to be heard at this time? Jessie?"

Jessie Tomlinson: "Good evening gentlemen. Just a couple of comments. I'd first like to commend you on some of the appointments."

Councilman Regula: "Who are you?"

Jessie Tomlinson: "Excuse me."

Councilman Regula: "We don't know your name."

Jessie Tomlinson: "Jessie Tomlinson, Wading River, Irene."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Jessie Tomlinson: "I'd like to commend you on some of the appointments you made this evening. Particularly, Mrs. Tormey from the Board of Appeals. I don't know anyone who is a more and intelligent public servant and a better one. And I've enjoyed working with her. And I would also like to commend you on a first. The Board of Review, Rosanne Meyer, another one. And now you just need a woman up there and you'll be all set."

Councilman Prusinowski: "We had a woman up here."

Supervisor Janoski: "Who is it that you want to replace, Jessie?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "We had a woman up here Jessie."

Jessie Tomlinson: "I know. It didn't last long enough. I would also like to commend you on the resolution you passed concerning the reapportionment. I agree with you, it's the worst kind of gerrymandering, totally political. There is no justification in the world for splitting a town the size of Riverhead. It absolutely flies in the face of the reapportionment commissions, at least what they were supposed to be doing which was to keep within Town lines as much as possible which they managed to do on the west end and also to preserve the integrity of the east end. As it stands now, we will only have one and a half legislators simply because Brookhaven will dominate the north fork which also is quite interesting. If you realize, they have switched the numbers. In other words, they have made LD12 and LD21 which will compound the problems at the Board of Elections. You can't imagine what that means in just time and money in making these changes for really no valid reason. They've also attached Shelter Island to the south fork.

What their justification is for that, I'm really not too sure. It has something to do with the Supreme Court decision, but I think it's debatable either way. I would like to suggest that all of you speak at the public hearing. The only way this can be changed and frankly I'm not hopeful it will be, is by public pressure because if you have looked at the map, you will see that further west, certainly in the Islip area and Babylon, Huntington, etc., they did very well. Both sides, political sides are quite pleased and they did keep within the lines and what they also did was try to eliminate some of the legislators that they weren't interested in having — in running again and being elected. But, unfortunately, the problem was that the best thing to do was to start from the east end and work your way west or from the west end and work your way east. But what they did is

they started from the west and they started from the east and then they left Brookhaven in the middle. And it was if you baked a cake and put the two layers together and then decided to put the icing in the middle. Well it just doesn't work out that way and that's why we're having the tremendous problem with Brookhaven wanting 5LD's, not being satisfied with four.

I have one more thing to say on Wading River. Several months ago, I mentioned to you the fact that the historic corridor had not been made a reality and I had asked you to please look up the enabling legislation because I believe Mr. Janoski, you had mentioned that or at least the letter that I read said that there was enabling legislation that you could get from Albany, which would permit the historic corridor to be passed at the Town Board level. Is that correct?"

Supervisor Janoski: "That's my understanding."

Jessie Tomlinson: "Yes. Have you gotten anything like that?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Actually, I think I recall that particular meeting asking for a letter from your group so that we could take some action."

Jessie Tomlinson: "Well I thought you had some letters requesting — no. Well anyway I'll check on that. I would like to suggest to you that there is a lot of urgency considering the fact that the ferry is still not a dead issue. If you read Saturday's paper, the Governor is going to recommend that the two present sites be improved financially with, I don't know how many millions of dollars. Another suggestion is that a study be done on a third site and he has recommended Shoreham. Shoreham and Wading River are interchangeable for the purposes of this study and if that Sound Road was finally designated as a star corridor, it certainly would be an impediment to using that as the road leading down to the ferry terminal. So I will check with the Civic Association and see whether or not the letter has been prepared and I would also hope that within two weeks or so, you will have a copy of the enabling legislation, excuse me, from Albany. You don't need our letter right away to do that, do you?"

Supervisor Janoski: "The situation as I recall it, was that the state legislature was asked to designate the area



as a historic corridor and when I took office the information came back that it wasn't necessary for legislative action that already existed in law, that the Town Board could designated, make the designation."
