RESOLUTION
 #273 APPROVES AMENDMENT TO TOWN CODE RE: ALCOHOLIC
BEVERAGES

Councilman Prusinowski offered the following resolution which was seconded by Councilman Regula.

WHEREAS, the Town Clerk was authorized to publish and post for a public hearing, and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on the 5th day of August, 1980, wherein all persons wishing to be heard were heard,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board hereby amends the Riverhead Town Code, Chapter 46, Section 46-1 and Chapter 46, Section 46-2, to read as follows:

Section 46-1:

No person or persons shall consume alcoholic beverages from any container while operating any kind of vehicle or while a passenger in any kind of vehicle or a pedestrian on any Town or County highway within the Town of Riverhead. No person or persons shall possess or consume alcoholic beverages from any type of container while in a town-owned or-leased parking field or town-owned or-leased park or beach ~~with the exception of Steatsky Park and town beaches~~ unless by a special permit granted by the Town Board. This ordinance shall not apply within a town marina if consumed upon a boat ties up at its properly licensed space.

Section 46-2:

Any person who shall violate any provision of this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction therefor, shall be punishable by imprisonment in the county jail for a ~~term not to exceed six (6) months~~ mandatory sentence of five (5) days not to exceed six (6) months or by a ~~fine not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50.00)~~ minimum fine of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) to a maximum fine of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Said amendment to become effective as of June 14, 1981.

The vote, Prusinowski: "I am not naive to think that we can legislate morality. However, this resolution, I think will be an effective tool to the Police Department to give out a message to those disorderly people who think that they can abuse the rights of the majority in the Town of Riverhead. COMMUNICATIONS

Suffolk County Electrical Contractors Association, Inc.
5/21/81: Urging the Town of Riverhead to impose some form of restriction on the use of aluminum wiring, and requesting a statement of present policy of the Town, and notice of any changes in policy. Filed.

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Irene. Mr. Town Attorney would you give a brief explanation."

Kevin Duffy: "Briefly what we are attempting to do is to limit the use of aluminum wire. In Section 1, we are prohibiting the use of #4 and smaller wire. In Section 2, of the proposed ordinance we are allowing the use of #2 and larger wire. We are very fortunate tonight that someone's here from the consumer affairs department and I would ask him to kind of take over. Mr. John Laddeman, he will basically explain things."

Supervisor Janoski: "John would you give your name and what department you're from."

John Laddeman, Investigator with the Suffolk County Department of Consumer Affairs: "To get on with this aluminum wiring, back in 1974, the County started the investigation of aluminum wiring after a fire in Hampton Bays took the lives of two people. And in a two year investigation brought about that there were many fires in Suffolk County, not particularly out say in Riverhead, but up in the middle of the County. And in 1976 the County holds a ban on aluminum wiring as you see on these Boards banning the small sizes of wire. But in 1977, the County was overruled by Supreme Court Judge Lazer stating that it was up to the Towns to do this onto the State Building Code. So we have about eight of the Towns out of ten Towns have imposed some sort of restriction. Most have followed the same wording or practically the same wording that the County

PUBLIC HEARING - continuedJohn Laddeman continues:

has done. I'm here to answer some questions if I could. I got samples showing through our investigation some of the outlets that have come out of homes or circuit breakers and like I say, I don't know too much else. I'm here to answer questions."

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay, thank you John. I understand that there's maybe a representative from Suffolk County Electrical contractors. Is that you? Would you come forward now please."

Ted Kapela, Editor of the Newsletter "The Light"; "It's an issue published by the Suffolk County Electrical Contractors Association. And I basically support John's conditions on the restrictions on the aluminum wiring and the way you've written it in your, as I've seen it written in your code. And something that all the Towns basically have except maybe Smithtown. And it's something that we would like to see happen also. Any other questions?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Make yourself available, if anyone, in case anyone does have some questions. Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Town Board on this matter?"

Marie Hoff, Wading River; "I really don't know what you're proposing, but I would be curious to know, but I'm — I would be curious to know whether this effects all existing aluminum wiring in homes already constructed? Or is this in new construction?"

Supervisor Janoski: "New construction."

Marie Hoff: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone else present who wishes to speak at this time?"

Councilman Menendez: "Bill you have the floor."

William Kasperovich, Wading River; "At the last Town Meeting, last resolution that you people had, you appointed three men to a concerned citizens committee on the Scavenger Waste. I protest, not only this kind of conduct, but label it is disgraceful.

Howard Young is a consulting engineer that solicits business from the Town Hall, You cannot impose upon him a

conflict of interest. None of these three men agreed to be on the committee, prior to your appointment. You appoint a man and impose upon him a conflict of interest which is a no-no. And I'm surprised at you five men doing this.

Brother Scheiner downstairs works for the Town. How can you possibly put an employee into the concerned citizens committee? Ridiculous. I can't understand what you people are trying to or. Or is it that you gents are not doing anything? But it's disgraceful.

Brother Nohel was not informed of this appointment as he told me at the end of that meeting. That leaves you with just one citizen. It's beyond my comprehension how you can conduct city administration in such a manner.

My next time is your modification to your legal coverage of the condition of our sidewalks. To put all that effort in time and involvement to modify what existed and come up with what you did, is a farce and an insult to the Township. We are not a one-horse hick town. We are a modern city here, like it or not. Now on Roanoke Avenue, on Main Street, at the intersection of Roanoke Avenue, you have a designated cross walk on the north side, the curb is broken against the catch basin. A hazard. On the other side of the street, you have another broken curb, hazard. You go east to the next cross section which is between Archers and the alley way of the Congregational Church. On the south side you have broken curbs. One the north side you have enlarged cracks. You go a little further east, in front of the movie house, there was a repair job done this afternoon, thank God. But on the other side of the street a more and greater hazard, no concern. Now the patch work that was done on the north side of the street should be recognized as patch work. If that's the best we can do for permanent repair, it's a pretty sad situation. Now if there is a large project in the near future to involve curb corrections and repairs, fine certain temporary measures are acceptable for a few months at the most. But here I present it to you, three of the most active pedestrian traffic areas and you played a lot around with the papers, but you didn't get out here on the sidewalk and cause some repairs and modifications.

Now this is beyond my understanding. What are you five men up there trying to do in this Town? As far as I can see with regard to correcting these sort of things, which we are legally responsible for, I don't think he's doing anything. Because if you were out there and you saw, you designate where people should cross the streets. You undertake responsibility that the curbs are in decent condition. And yet you go through all the effort of a bunch of paper work to cover legal aspects, but you don't get out there to see that things are done so we have decent conditions. It shames me to have to come up here to talk to you gentlemen. But apparently if nobody gets on your back, you don't do anything."

Councilman Menendez: "Bill your time's almost up."

William Kasperovich: "All right, if I have a moment more? I would like to ask the Town Board to take into consideration in which ever matter that they can fit into their agenda to give consideration to make one-hour parking — the Town Board chooses to make it two hours, I wouldn't argue with it, but I would think one hour would be right, at all parking spots off the street that are adjacent to the sidewalks. The condition that comes up when you run into town for a few minutes, there are times when there is no place to park the car. And it's been my observation over an extended period that the parking spaces near the sidewalks are filled by employees and managers. People that have businesses in town and use it as an all day parking. Those immediate parking spaces, I feel should be for people that have to come in and out because we do not have enough curb parking. And so to extend the short period of parking, I would ask the Board to make a consideration in whenever it is proper to analyze this and possibly take action to extend short term parking in this manner. Thank you."

Councilman Menendez: "Thank you for your remarks Bill. We'll take note of them. Is there anyone else that would like to address the Board? Fran please?"

Fran Vitollo, Wading River: "Before the summer does start, I would like some help from you people as far as the parking on the beach at Hulse Landing Road. Last year it was very bad. The cars were speeding up that road, kicking sand onto carriages, babies in the carriages, getting hurt and the Police Department cannot do anything about it because there are no signs enforcing the people not to go further in the parking lot. You have two town parking lots there and the people in my community feel people do not have to ride down to the water to drop off people or sit in their cars or have five and six cars down there at a time. There is no enforcement and the police claim that they cannot do anything about it. So before we do have any problems this summer, I wish that you people would look into it and correct the situation."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Fran, the recreation committee of the Town Board is going to inspect the recreation facilities in the next few days. We'll make a note of that and when we go down there, we'll take a look at the situation."

Fran Vitollo: "Vic, years ago when they did put the parking lot in there, there was a strip of white chalk or a pink

or whatever that did specify no cars beyond this sign, and unless we have it, it's going to be real dangerous."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay."

Fran Vitollo: "Thank you."

Councilman Menendez; "Is there anyone else?"

No one else wished to be heard at this time.

There being no further business on motion and vote, the meeting adjourned at 8:25 P.M.
