Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone wishing to be heard?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES

Maureen Perrella, 420 East Main Street, Riverhead;
"The first thing I'd like to say is that this first communication from the Suffolk County Health Department leaves my heart cold, gentlemen. I mean it really does. If Riverhead's worst slum is fit for human habitation, I don't know what kind of standards the Health Department is using, but what I'm basically here for is to find out what it going on at 414. I understand that rents are being withheld, but is the landlord making any moves to comply and how many units are operating at 414?"

Supervisor Janoski: "This position we're in right now, one that we're in litigation kind of stance. Summonses have been prepared. They are rather thick and they will be served on the owner of 414 this Friday and beyond that there's not much I can say."

Maureen Perrella: "Maybe this is the wrong forum for this question, but as far as the Suffolk County Legislature is concerned, everything was very well publicized at the beginning of the year in December and January about the pre-rental inspection. There were several plans from several of the legislatures. All of a sudden, everything seemed to have dropped. What is the status there?"

Supervisor Janoski: "The proposal for pre-rental inspection which grew out of my resolution before the Association of Supervisors was tabled by the Suffolk County Legislature. I understood that Mr. Prospect was coming forth with a different version of pre-rental inspection. As far as that, the movement of that legislation, I have heard little as a matter of fact, I don't think it has moved at all."

Maureen Perrella: "Has the Suffolk County Executive had had any more — anything more to say about this problem. Have you personally had input from him? I know he comes to Riverhead every Wednesday and it's a short hop from his office to East Main Street."

Supervisor Janoski: "I had a letter from him last week indicating he would keep the Health Department monitoring the 414 situation with the expressed desire that it should not continue in operation."

Maureen Perrella: "So as far as the litigation is concerned, there is no way of knowing how long that's going to be. Okay, thank you."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Menendez: "Maureen, before you sit down, quite some time ago, this board wrote a letter to the Attorney General of the State asking him to investigate the Health Department. Why they didn't do their job — we got back a letter after several weeks of waiting which was the biggest garb of white wash I've ever seen. They passed the buck to Suffolk County itself, and in other words they just refused to investigate it. So what are you going to do. It's a white wash."

Maureen Perrella: "Does the board have any recourse as far as that is concerned or is that where it stays."

Councilman Menendez: "That's where it stays, I guess."

Maureen Perrella: "Okay, thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Maureen. Yes Sir. Now wait a minute. We have — we'll get you next."

Tony Leanza, 216 Court Street, Riverhead; "I'm not here today on my functions as an attorney or as a member of the Vail-Leavitt Music Hall, but I'd like bring some very pressing matter to your attention. I'd been here before and spoke to you about the Vail-Leavitt Music Hall. I also attended several conferences with the Town Board on this with the other members of the Council. We're very much concerned that we've reached a point where the Vail-Leavitt Music Hall may not ever be in being because of the fact that we have not taken the right action towards it.

Right in the beginning, well let's start about a hundred years ago, a group of men got together, put up this building and had a theater there which in those days was the run in the mill thing, was not that important town function. A hundred years later, three men talked about it, decided that this was something that was laying dormant for many years. Now that some building is about to be sold. We have \$40,000 of HUD funds, as you gentlemen know, ready to buy this building. You offered it to us, we appreciate it and we have given you our gratitude for allowing us to use this money for the purchase of this building. But we can't buy an empty building and the committee has no money, no funds. The committee may be able to make funds, but it takes time and we're faced with an immediate situation where if we either buy it or we don't. Either we take that \$40,000, we buy that building and we end up with a tax bill and a big repair bill and a lot of work to be done.

This is why we went to the people of the Town and asked them, point blank how they felt whether we should loose it or

whether we should urge the Town to buy it and to maintain it and to renovate it. I mean that literally, every bit of it is on the Town Board's shoulders, not on the committee. The Town Board must decide whether to do it or not.

Now I know that many of you have looked upon this as this is a possibility that you're doing the council a favor. You're giving them a little building to play with. That's not what we're looking for. We don't want to play with a building. We don't want to play with \$40,000. We could take it and run, but we don't want that. We know that this is the start of something cultural for the Town of Riverhead.

We think the Town Board must consider it that way. It must consider an important element of the revitalization of the Town of Riverhead. I'm using your very words, Mr. Janoski in the letter to Mr. Smith, Harold Smith, you said you felt that this was an important element that a revitalization of Riverhead and it is and I think that unless the Town Board acts now and decides whether it will take the Hall of Wax and use that building for the purposes that somehow nature history left to us. We can't abandon it. We've got to use it and we've got to do something about it.

Now we all know the proprietor said I have no further use for the building, unless somebody takes it off my hands. I'm going to try and sell it. It would be a tragedy, I think. We must, therefore, decide what are we going to do. I know that each of you gentlemen feels that you have a question — decision to make on your shoulders, what are you going to do with the money, the tax money that the people of Riverhead gave you. Are you going to use for this building or not and maybe some of you have hesitated, but I think the point has come now where we can no longer hesitate. We're not just want — we don't just want HUD money to buy a building and play around with it. We're saving something that is so important for Riverhead that's not only going to give Riverhead a better name. It's going to bring a better element into Riverhead. It's going to bring money into Riverhead because people are going to come for that cultural center that it may one day be. We say don't let's just use it for a cultural center a point from which we can build what Riverhead might mean in the future.

No we just went through the hard reality of 421. Is that what we want in Riverhead or do we want something a little bit more, let's say soul lifting if we can. And we can save it now or we lose it forever and I think that the Town Board cannot hesitate any longer, you can't do it.

Now each one of the members of the Council has talked about this a million different ways. We all want to put our own money into it, if possibly necessary to do it. But don't you see, it's not something that has to be done by a private or small group of people. It has to be done by the Town. It's the only way we can do it. I think the Town must look into this as a matter for the benefit of the Town generally enough that it might even incorporate this as a part of it, one of its

municipalities or such a thing, it's that important and I ask you gentlemen please consider it as much as you can in that light and act on it quickly because I'm afraid we might lose it. Thank you so much."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Tony. "

Supervisor Janoski recessed the meeting to hold the public hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:45 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday, July 21, 1981 at 7:45 P.M. to hear all interested persons regarding the proposed amendment to the Town Code that vehicles may only collect refuse between the hours of 6:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M.

The affidavits were ordered to be placed on file.

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Irene. Will the Town Attorney please read or make us aware of the purpose?"

Kevin Duffy: "Basically the purpose of what we're attempting to do is limit the hours of refuse collection. Those vehicles which are defined in accordance with Section 103 of the Town Code, those basically are those who are engaging in that for commercial purpose."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone present — Yes Sir, who wishes to address this issue?"

Edward Carey, 412 Hamilton Avenue; "I've been having trouble with the Riverhead Sanitation Department for many moons as quite a few on the Board know about it and I tried to settle it peaceably. They were coming at 4:00 or 4:30, between 4:00 and 4:30 and I requested them to come after 6:00. So finally after a few letters and little help from the Town Board, they ceased coming before 7:00, but now they're coming around 7:30 and parking in front of my yard four or five times in the morning and I'm getting a lot of harassment. Now I'm trying to do what I'm told and do it peaceably, but if something's not done, I'm

going to take action myself. They come and park in front of the house four or five times, rev the motor, park in my driveway just for harassment. Now, I hope you can consider that because I don't want to get in any trouble unless I have to. Can I get any type of answer or . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "No, this is a public hearing for you to give us information and as far as the other problems you're having, really they're removed from the purpose of this public hearing and perhaps you should, oh give me or one of the Councilmen a call about it."

Edward Carey: "I think I called about three times already to the Councilmen."

Councilman Regula: "Toad, I think the Supervisor is trying to say this public hearing is strictly for anyone in the audience to be heard and we're not here to give our views at this point. What you and everyone else in the crowd tonight tells us about this and the Board will sit on it and decide whether this new ordinance will go into effect and the ordinance calls for changing the hours of 6 a.m. to 6 p.m., no earlier than 6 a.m. and no later than 6 p.m. So this is strictly just a hearing to hear everyone that has something to say."

Edward Carey: "Okay. I hope you don't sit on it too long. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. If Tony — Mr. Fioto."

Henry Fioto, 642 Northville Tpke; "I'd like to address the Board as, is there any basic reason why all of a sudden we're putting restrictions — is there complaints to the hours or a reason why they're doing this? I mean, you know, if they start restricting hours for this, next thing we restrict the hours of what time you come home at night and restrict the hours or something else. I mean if there is a reason behind it, I'd like the Town Board to let the citizens know as well why we picked 6 a.m., why not 6:30 or 5:45 or 4:45?"

Supervisor Janoski: "The purpose of this hearing, Mr. Fioto, is, of course, is to get that kind of information. If

you feel that 6:00 a.m. is not a good time, that it maybe should be 6:30 a.m., that's what we want to hear from the members of the community. This is a proposal that we're looking at with the hours set as far as the proposed amendment of 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. The reason for a public hearing is for you to tell us how you feel about that proposal."

Henry Fioto: "Well, do we have an ordinance now that says we can pick up any other time than this?"

Supervisor Janoski: "No."

Henry Fioto: "Then has the Board received complaints and that's why this is going into effect?"

Supervisor Janoski: "It's not going into effect."

Henry Fioto: "Why I'm saying — why we have the hearing, I mean do they have numerous amounts of complaints or you know, you have one or two people who decide this is what they want. That's what I'd like to find out."

Supervisor Janoski: "Well there have been complaints and this is one idea as an addressing of those complaints."

Henry Fioto: "Are they complaining because it was 6:00 or like he says 4:00, 3:00 in the morning? I would like — all I'm interested in, I want to try determine, not that I'm opposing one way or the other, all I want to know is how do they determine the hours? The basic . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "All right."

Councilman Menendez: "Hank, this hearing is a direct result of complaints that have come in about people who can't sleep in the morning when they would like to, to sleep maybe until 6:00 when they get up. When they start raming around at 4:30 in the morning, slamming these big dumpsters down and shaking the whole place up. We have calls, you wouldn't believe coming in. So this is the change to get the people up and say their peace. Now, there is nothing going to come from this unless the people want it."

Henry Fioto: "That's what I want to hear. That's basically what I wanted to hear. In other words, somebody didn't decide we're going to oppose this. If you have complaints, sure then it's a good idea. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone else who wishes to be heard on this issue? "

No one else wishing to be heard and no communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Janoski declared the hearing closed at 7:54 P.M.

Supervisor Janoski: "This is still some five minutes, six minutes left before the next public hearing. Let us move onto the resolutions."

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday, July 21, 1981 at 8:00 P.M. to hear all interested persons regarding the proposed local law providing a four year term of office for the Town Clerk, subject to a mandatory referendum if adopted.

The affidavits were ordered to be placed on file.

Supervisor Janoski: "I would recognize anyone who wishes to be heard, but I would offer it to the former Town Clerk the opportunity to speak first."

Helene M. Block: "Good evening Honorable Council, Board Members. I'm going to ask, I hope you give me more than five minutes, because I speak slowly now. I first want to say. . ."

Councilman Regula: "What is your name?"

Helene M. Block: "I first want to say . . ."

Irene J. Pendzick: "Can I have your name and address please?"

Supervisor Janoski: "You should know that."

Helene M. Block: "Oh, I'm sorry. My name is Helene Block, and I live at 526 Raynor Avenue. I'm very sorry.

I want to say this, that I am definitely, but definitely in favor of the proposed changes from two years to four years, and I have a few little notes here that I want to comment on so that, just to prove to you we should — we should absolutely have this four year term.

In 1934, I came to work for Milton Burns. As a Supervisor, he had just stepped down. (the tape ended) (the tape began) I made out the checks for the welfare and I did all the town bookkeeping for the Supervisor. I made out checks for everyone and then Mr. Kratoville came over to me and he asked me to come and help him. All this I did for \$950 and I did come over because I did have time to do this. We only had six policemen and about eleven people on the highway. Six, seven, or eight, eleven people on the highways. Is my five minutes up? Please don't say so, cause I'm going to still continue.

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Helene M. Block continues:

Anyhow, Mr. Kratoville and I, we didn't know anything, anything at all about any of the forms. We didn't know how old a young man should be when he got a hunting license, and then we found out later that he had to be sixteen. If he went with his folks, it was fourteen, fourteen years. And we didn't know anything about marriages because there was certain — certain divorce cases that you could not accept in New York City. We didn't know anything. We would ask Mr. Burns because he came out and he knew all the answers, but we then had a Board of Supervisors and he was on the Board of Supervisors and he was a very popular one and they gave him a lot of committees and he was always out on committees so we called the Town of Southampton most of the time. So we have those two to thank for.

I want to remind people here that about — this is very important, about, what is it? It's the death certificates. We usually file for our local people in the vicinity of 360-361 people and we file those on record, but I understand this year, the girls got 18,000 to be filed in alphabetical order from the Calverton Memorial Hosp — Cemetery. Now, that's a lot of work, and you should be a Notary Republic. You have to be, the — you have to know your information. You have to be a Public Information officer. You just have to do everything and each girl has about seven or eight or nine or ten jobs, really. They try to keep in touch with each other, so that in the event of a sickness or a vacation, they take each others jobs over and I always want to remind you too, also, that every, and it never failed, but in every February during the twenty years that Mr. Kratoville was Town Clerk he had laryngitis, and he never appeared to work. He could not, because he could not speak and I want to tell you about a — I think you'll find this amusing.

A marriage license and in 1933, we lost our farm in Calverton, and we moved in Manorville right directly across from Woolworth Donahue and we became quite acquainted because he was always around. He didn't do any work. He fished and he played golf, not golf, but tennis once in a while. He had all the leading stars of tv and all the tennis stars down, so we knew each other. So one day, Mary, the girl that he was going to marry, she was a circus — tight-rope walker, she called up and said, Helene, Woolie and I are getting married. We have a date with Otis Pike. He's going to marry us tomorrow, but you will have to come and issue the license, and I said well you get your divorce papers in order and get eight of Mr. Woolworth's divorce papers, he had eight of them, I swear he did. So she said he can't do it because you know the way he is. So I knew that she meant that he was intoxicated. So when he sent his car down for me, his chauffer and I came down, he couldn't even talk. So I went to the telephone and I said Otis, I understand you're going to marry Mary and Wooley tomorrow, and I said I'm here to issue the license. And I swear he doesn't even know what he's doing and he says well Mary knows all the answers

as long as he can sign it. He says and go ahead. He said he'll be drunker tomorrow than he is today."

Supervisor Janoski: "Miss Block, I'm afraid that I'm going to have to interrupt you now. I think you've made an admirable case for whatever position you're taking. But I think you . . ."

Helene M. Block: "But, please . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Miss Block. . ."

Helene M. Block: "But, please give this proposition your consideration because they really need it. You cannot learn that work in two years time. I know that."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Helene."

Helene M. Block: "You're welcome."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Smith, did you want to address the Town Board regarding this issue?"

Allen Smith, Jacobs Place, Aquebogue: "The — what we're talking about here deals with the individual who through the political process would decide to run for office in our town. And realizing the things that Miss Block has put before you and the change of the office and the responsibilities of the office and the work to be done by the clerk, I wouldn't dwell on those at all. She is absolutely correct, although she probably left out that I lessened her load a little bit by taking away her license to practice law when I came in."

Helene M. Block from the audience: "You certainly did. You were a gestapo."

Allen Smith: "She didn't mention that."

Helene M. Block from the audience: "He took the, all the law books. He just came and took them all away from me."

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Allen Smith: "But I would say, with reference to the type of person that we might get to run for office and be part of the governing bodies of our town is what I would submit to you that this legislation is about. I would submit to you that the two year term for the town clerk by definition makes the person whether it is Mrs. Pendzick or any of the other people, good people who propose to be of service to the town. It makes them by the nature of the term of the office that they hold pre-occupied with partisan politics. And I emphasize the word partisan politics. It means that you have to have a party affiliation, whether it is conservative, democratic or republican. It means that you must raise money. I don't know what Vic charges for a full page in Suffolk Life this week, but its probably \$1,000 a page round figures. About right? Less than that \$800. Okay, about \$10 less than that. You either have to go spend your own money for that purpose or you have to be beholdng to a party organization.

You have the time to campaign. When does the campaign start? I would submit to you that in a two year term, you're campaigning all the time. And you have in partisan politics probably the roughest part of the entire thing which is mud slinging, name calling and all of the things that are associated with an election campaign, right down to threats against Dakota Smith, or slanders against the Pendzick family or whatever, that comes with an election process. That's partisan politics and I would say to you that partisan politics does not necessarily equate with public service.

I think the functions of the Town Clerk is performing a very real service to the community whether it is the happy occasion of the issuance of a marriage license or the sad occasion of issuance of a death certificate does not have a great deal to do with partisan politics. It shouldn't have a great deal to do whether or not the person applying for the marriage license is a democrat, or republican, a Hindu, an independant or whatever. I think that what public service, what we're looking for in the Town is for good, talented, hard-working people to come in to the — this family of public service for the town and that anything that this Board does to lessen the pre-occupation with partisan politics for that particular post, I may say something else if it were another post, but what that particular post, would be a service. I think that Mrs. Pendzick, if she were fortunate enough to remain in the job, would do a better job with a longer term and that if she were unseated that her successors whoever they are would probably do a better job because you take some of that partisan out of the politics end of the equation. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Allen. Mr. Fioto."

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Hank Fioto: "It's very rarely that I agree with Smith, but this is one time I do agree with him. I honestly feel that when a person runs for that thing is that really a policy making decision and it takes time for a new person to become adjusted to the position. I would say possibly six months. They have the next six months to do the job. Then the following year, they're worrying about running again, if they're going to get the job again. The only basic part, I diversify from it is an elected position and I feel that it should be left to the people to decide if they want to leave it as a four year term. I feel that the Town Board should recommend that it be placed to a referendum and have the people decide on it. This is basically how I feel."

Supervisor Janoksi: "Tony there's a mandatory referendum."

Hank Fioto: "But that's — I am, I am going on record in favor of it for that purpose because like I say, it is really non-policy making decision and I think it will take a lot of burden off the person who is the Town Clerk."

Supervisor Janoski: "It certainly wasn't the case of Helene Block's case."

Hank Fioto: "There was only one Helene Block."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes, but what I'm saying, Henry, is that even, no matter what the Town Board does, the law indicates that a mandatory referendum must be held in November so that the people would have the decisive say in whether this should be a four year term."

Hank Fioto: "I agree with Mr. Smith. I said very rarely, but I think he's right. It should be a four year term, as long as you let the people decide on it. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Henry. Bill?"

Bill Nohejl, Wading River: "I agree with Allen Smith to a certain extent. Very rarely, right Allen about the political partisan? Ah, yes two candidates. One republican, one democrat are usually presented to the people chosen by the political party. Ah, maybe the credentials might be good, maybe the

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Bill Nohejl continues:

credentials are not, could be political to a certain extent.

I hate like hell to see someone come in that does not have the credentials for a four year period. Now getting back to Helene Block, she had done a wonderful job and she had no problem being elected year after year after year and Irene has done a wonderful job, not taking anything away from her, but someone else could do it too. But I don't like to see a feather-bed for four years. If a person is doing his job, they're going to have the opportunity to be elected by the people. Ah, if this was not presented by the Republican or Democrat, these two candidates, if it was put out to the general public and not to present the credentials and I say it \$400 a week, is roughly what \$20,000 a year is what the Town Clerk gets. Am I right, it's \$20,000. I say that you would be swamped with applicants, swamped, and with credentials for that job, but we the devoting public have only two choices. Whoever the political party choses, as I said from anyone who would be elected, but I'm definitely against a four year term if the credentials are right, the people who are in there now, do the right job, I feel as though they will continue and unless something else comes up politically to overturn, like the assessors, I was against it. Next thing is going to be the Highway Department. Next thing is going to be you and next years it's going to be raises. Come on boys, we got to do some — taking this away from the voting public. We count too. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Town Board on this issue? Wickham?"

Wickham Tyte, 992 East Main Street; "And I would like to comment on this. To start with, this has to some degree, we have gone into some — number one, I don't contradict the value of the Town Clerk of this town or any other town is a very important job and needs high caliber people and we know the problems they have. It is very hard to speak after all these eloquent speakers like Mrs. Block, Miss Block, that is, I apologize and ex-Supervisor Allen Smith and other good speakers. But you have said at the beginning of this and all the things, you're having this meeting tonight so that the public can let you know how they feel and I'm up here to let you know how I feel.

A few days ago, I was contacted, was talking to a politician cause it's hard to find politicians. Most people are non-politicians, but I was talking to a politician and he asked me what my attitude was to a four year term and I said I'm absolutely against it and he said well suppose the candidate that you have spout for to get it would that be okay and I said I wouldn't care if it

PUBLIC HEARING - continuedWickham Tyte continues:

were my own brother running for it, I'm against it because it's the wrong principle. You might want to know why it's the wrong principle. It is what you might call a democratic erosion. In other words, when our country was set up, Thomas Jefferson said among things outside of the Declaration of Independence, that we were not to trust man too much. We were to bind him down from mischief with the Constitution and I think he might be a little cynical, but he had a lot of truth there. Now I have nothing to say against the present encumber or former encumbrantor the rivals for this job.

It has nothing to do with the merits of what they want. They might be such fine people that they would serve a good purpose for four years and we don't have to worry about them, but by the law of averages, sooner or later you're going to get someone in there that isn't such a good guy or such a good gal and they're not doing such a good job. You're stuck with them and you want to get them out. I would concur with the former speaker that we don't want to have to suffer with them for four years to get them out. Two years is enough. On the other hand, I say this. Assuming the person who gets elected is doing a crack up job and is notorious that the encumbrant always has the edge on them and usually gets put in if they're doing an A one job, and I do believe that when you have to report to the people, this is in a sense, this is where a person in office is proving their stewardship, how good a job they do. Every two years or every four years or whatever length their office is, they come back to the people and if they've been doing a good job and they shape-up good, their returned to office. If they're not, it gives the people a change to get them out.

Now there's many times the government has kingdoms and dictatorship democracies. Many times democracy isn't the fastest and maybe the best, but it is the safest, because if you get somebody in who should be put out after a certain length of time you can vote them out. And I would say anything that goes against its principles should be fought again. There was a time they want to and probably will try it again, to abolish the Highway Superintendent and make it elected. I mean make it appointed. This would be taking away a Democratic job. We should be against it on general principles. There are those who would like to change the Supervisor to be like a Town Manager, a Government Manager and not be elected, but be appointed. All these things erode our freedom that we fought for and this same thing coming up tonight is in that particular bundle of items.

I would say that we don't have to worry about keeping good ones in and hopefully you'll never have any bad ones to get out, but it's a handy thing to have this two year thing that if the times come when somebody needs to be replaced, we can do it in a relatively short time. Thank you for the chance to speak."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Wickham. Walter Kowalsick?"

Walter Kowalsick, 543 Howell Court, Riverhead; "I've heard these gentlemen, Mr. Smith, Miss Block and Mr. Nohejl and I guess Mr. Tyte, I would like to know that the Town Board come up with this idea of four years or how's this derived? We've all spoke against or for it, but how did we arrive to change to two to four years? This has been going on for, I don't know, Miss Block, you can probably tell me, maybe a hundred years, as a Town Clerk two year position?"

Helene M. Block from the audience: "No some states have four years."

Walter Kowalsick: "I'm not saying some states, I'm saying Riverhead."

Helene M. Block from the audience: "Oh, no. We did try it one time, however, for most of our officials for a four year term and it was knocked down."

Walter Kowalsick: "All right, but anyway I still would like to find out why we're going from two years to four and who proposed this?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Irene, are you familiar with the genesis of this program."

Irene J. Pendzick: "There are bills in Committee in the Senate and in the Assembly right now in Albany changing the Town Clerk term office from two years to four years. They're still in committee though. There's a Suffolk County Town Clerk's Association that didn't know about it and it's made up of the ten Town Clerks of Suffolk County. Those Town Clerks, which is myself and the other nine Towns of Suffolk County, when we found out about the bills in Committee, thought that it would be better if that was going to be brought up to the changing the terms two years to four years, that the people should vote whether they wanted it done, not the way it was done in the Tax Receiver's Office two years ago. You didn't vote on that. That was done. You didn't get a chance to . . ."

Walter Kowalsick: "I'm not asking about the Tax Receiver . . ."

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PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Irene J. Pendzick: "I know you're not, but I'm trying to answer your question."

Walter Kowalsick: "I'm inquiring about this position going from two to four years, and who proposed it?"

Irene J. Pendzick: "That's what I'm saying the Suffolk County Town Clerk's Association . . ."

Walter Kowalsick: "They are the ones who notified this Board to change it from two to four."

Irene J. Pendzick: "No, they didn't."

Walter Kowalsick: "Are you in agreement?"

Irene J. Pendzick: "They didn't notify them to change it. They asked them to adopt local laws for the people to have a choice to change it."

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay."

Walter Kowalsick: "Who on the Board, then, is bringing up this resolution?"

Supervisor Janoski: "No one on the Board is bringing up this resolution. The Board being aware that the ten Towns of Suffolk County were considering this change elected to have a public hearing which we're having right now so that we could receive input from the citizens as to their feelings."

Walter Kowalsick: "Someone on the Board must be behind this or they wouldn't even bring it up and I agree with Mr. Nohejl. I haven't agreed with a lot of things he's been here at some of the meetings, he's been at. But I feel like Miss Block was here prior to this, she ran on a two year term. She got the backing of Democrats and Republicans, her predecessor had the same thing and I feel two years is enough. If you're doing your job and I'm not saying our present Town Clerk is not doing her job, but I think it shows in her past and in their past

Walter Kowalsick continues:

that they had the backing of two parties and if that is the case, why worry about four years. Go two years and if you're doing it, the next two years comes with ease. You don't have to worry about it. You'll be there and like he says, now you're going into the Highway Department. Then you're going to get into this guy, then you're going into the Councilmen. Then you're going into this one and when you're all through, we're going to have ten year terms here and we can't go on the way we are. But that's up to you people, but I feel that two years is plenty in any position really and if you want to run you will run and if you don't want to run, I'm sure there is going to be someone right in back of you to take up your place. Now somebody mentioned about amount of money to go through this thing here. There's people here that have spent hardly any money on a campaign. They got in, there's others that spent maybe ten times as much trying to unseed them, but they didn't make it. So I don't think the money question comes into effect. If you want to run, you run for it. If you can't afford it, you stay out of it. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Walter, Miss Block, now you know you're out of order, as the former Town Clerk. Is there anyone — would you like to take the microphone? You know I once . . ."

Helene M. Block: "If I were to mention that when I was in office there were one hundred and seventy four separate duties of the Town Clerk to do and I now understand about ten more have been added. I didn't mention . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Helene."

Helene M. Block from the audience; "Birth certificates."

Supervisor Janoski: "You've gotten beyond one sentence and I'm not going to allow you to continue. If you want to come back. . . ."

Helene M. Block from the audience: "All right, That's the one sentence all right. If I continued, all the licenses that you'd have to make out, you would . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Please."

Helene M. Block from the audience: "Realize that it is necessary to have a four year term in order to learn your work."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Helene."

Helene M. Block from the audience: "And Allen, do you remember this?"

Supervisor Janoski: "You know I once made a statement and I'm not going to repeat it, but I think Helene remembers what it is concerning. I thank God for something."

Helene M. Block from the audience: "I remember."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone else who wishes to speak or address the Town Board on this issue? Yes Sir."

Bart Morrison, Wading River; "That's my feeling that we must work to satisfy the community's need to find and elect the most confident individual and after that's done, whether it be two of four years wouldn't make any difference. The continuing chaos created by the unending campaigning for office is detrimental to the Town Government and the peoples business which is the most important thing. It seems like we're no more than getting one balloon launched and it's time to launch another. The cost to the candidates and the taxpayers make it ridiculous, ridiculous to continue as we are. Is it any wonder that some people are reluctant to run for public office when they consider the personal cost to themselves and their families. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Burt. Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Town Board on this issue? Yes Sir."

Ed Cronin, Wading River; "I think the idea that we have in the Congress, the House of Representatives, people that serve a two year term, then have to run for election again. This

PUBLIC HEARING - continuedEd Cronin continues:

is a very difficult position and yet they're asked to do this every two years to come back to the people and I think the people really only exercise their control over the government during those election years. I think everybody in the room probably understands that during an election year like this one, many issues are settled or many things that undertaken during these elections, that wouldn't normally happen at that rate — pace. I think it is having a two year term is a way that people can express their ideas. They can make sure they have the people they want in office, in that office. I'm also sure with Mrs. Pendzick, she'll have no problem getting re-elected. She's showing the capabilities and stuff. She's demonstrated in the past. I think it doesn't make any sense to go for four years. And the people obviously would express their desires of two and keep those people in there, that they want. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Ed. Robert Pike, is that you back there?"

Robert Pike, Pine Avenue, Aquebogue, Riverhead; "It would seem to me fairly clear that those are good arguments to be made on both sides of this particular controversy and if those who support it are willing to continue to do so in the future and to speak their peace and support the proposition and if those who oppose it are willing to do the same, how than can anyone object to allowing the democratic process to work in this process. If it stops now, you have stopped the Democratic process. It's is relatively clear to me too, that there is a strong element to be made and I think if the people who have opposed this idea on the merits are given the opportunity to express those in the form of a referendum than you will truly get the democratic (the tape ended) (the tape began) . . and on that basis, I would support the idea, clearly understanding that it's part of a mandatory referendum. Let the people decide."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bob. Is there anyone else present wishes to address themselves to this issue?"

Unidentified Speaker from the audience: "Can I just ask a question?"

Supervisor Janoski: "You can."

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Wickham Tyte: "Where we talk about referendums — a permissive referendum as I recall it — I've kind of enforced them once in a while — in order to get a permissive referendum, you have to circulate a petition and get a certain number of people if you're talking about a normal one. If this goes on the voting thing and that takes the place, does that take — in other words, if you put it on the ballot, does that fulfill the thing of being a referendum?"

Supervisor Janoski: "There's a mandatory referendum attached to this particular issue Wickham. Should the Town Board vote in favor of the change, it automatically goes on the ballot in November. And only then, will the issue be decided after the November election."

Wickham Tyte: "Right. Well the point — in other words, it would be mandatory, but the referendum would actually take place on the day of election. So you won't have extra expenses setting up old — and so that is one point because of a person sincerely believes that it is erosion of our form of government in the sense that we're getting further and further away from the people having contact. As I understand it, in a democracy, if you could have a true democracy, all the people in Town come together and we vote on every law and that would be it. A little tough in a big community. We have what we call a republic where on a democratic process we elect representatives who theoretically represent us and, of course, we have a chance to check them out every time an election comes up. But the further the elections come between it, the further we get away from true democracy and get into the thing where we have less and less representation."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Wickham. Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Town Board on this matter?"

No one else wishing to be heard and no communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Janoski declared the hearing closed at 8:35 P.M.

Supervisor Janoski recessed the meeting for ten minutes after which the meeting resumed at 8:47 P.M.

At this time, Supervisor Janoski left to attend another meeting.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE, that a public hearing will be held on the 4th day of August, 1981 at 7:45 o'clock in the evening to hear all interested persons with regard to adding Chapter 49 of the Riverhead Town Code therein creating a bicycle ordinance. Said ordinance shall read as follows:

BICYCLE ORDINANCE

§49-1 Definitions

A. For the purpose of this ordinance, the terms used herein are defined as follows:

BICYCLE - Any vehicle consisting of an arrangement or combination of two (2) wheels, one following the other,

RESOLUTIONS - continued

supported by a frame, with solid or pneumatic tires, having a steering bar or wheel and a saddle seat, and propelled by human power.

OPERATE - The work "operate" or any form or tense thereof shall mean and refer to the use, putting action or causing to function of a bicycle by a person counted thereon.

B. In addition to the above definitions, any applicable definitions of the Traffic Ordinance shall be deemed to be included herein.

§49-2 Rules for riding and operating.

Every rider and operator shall comply with the following rules and regulations:

A. Riding abreast. When more than two (2) persons in a group are operating bicycles on a roadway, they shall ride single file.

B. Extra passenger. No person operating a bicycle shall carry another person on the handlebars of said bicycle.

C. Emerging from alleys, driveways, and garages. The operator of a bicycle emerging from an alley, driveway, garage, or private sidewalk shall stop the bicycle immediately prior to driving onto or across a public sidewalk, or onto or across a public sidewalk line projected across an alley, and shall exercise extreme care in making such movements.

D. Clinging to vehicles. No person operating a bicycle shall cling or attach himself, or the bicycle, to any other moving vehicle.

E. Intoxication, drugs, or physical inability. No person shall operate a bicycle while under the influence of liquor or drugs or while physically or mentally unfit to safely operate the same.

F. Lights. No bicycle shall be operated within the period from sunset to sunrise without having a properly lighted headlight attached to the front of the bicycle, visible under normal atmospheric conditions from the front thereof a distance of not less than three hundred (300) feet, nor without having a red light or a reflector attached to the rear of the bicycle, which is clearly visible in the headlight beam of a motor vehicle for a distance of not less than two hundred (200) feet to the rear of the bicycle.

RESOLUTIONS - continued

G. Mechanical condition. No person shall operate a bicycle which is not in such mechanical condition so that it can be safely operated.

H. Any person operating a bicycle shall refrain from any trick riding and shall operate said bicycle with both hands on the handlebars.

I. Every person operating a bicycle shall obey all stop signs and traffic control signals, and comply with all traffic regulations of the Town.

J. Riding on sidewalks. No person shall ride a bicycle upon a sidewalk within the central or downtown business area. This area includes: From Osborne Avenue to Ostrander Avenue; north to 2nd Street; south the Town line. No person shall stand, stop or park such bicycle in such a way as to prohibit pedestrian traffic.

K. Speed. No bicycle shall be operated at any time faster than is reasonable or proper, and every bicycle shall be operated with reasonable regard to the safety of the rider and of other persons and property.

L. Traffic regulations. Every person operating a bicycle shall strictly observe all traffic signs and signals and all other traffic rules and regulations applicable thereto, and shall obey the orders and directions of every office of the town authorized to direct or regulate traffic.

§49-3 Bicycle without serial number.

It shall be unlawful for any person residing in the town, or any dealer in bicycles operating in the town, to purchase, receive in trade or otherwise acquire any bicycle from which the serial number on the frame has been removed, destroyed, mutilated, or altered, without first reporting the same to the Riverhead Police.

§49-4 Enforcement.

The Police Department shall enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

§49-5 Impounding.

In addition to any remedies that may be applicable to the Vehicle and Traffic Law, the Police Department is hereby authorized to impound any bicycle which is not being properly operated on the streets of this Town. Such bicycle will be returned to the owner thereof upon the payment to the Police Department of an impounding fee of one dollar (\$1.00) per day. Before impounding said bicycle, the officer shall issue a notice of violation to the individual involved.

§49-6 Sale of Impounded, Lost, or Stolen Bicycles.

Any bicycle that has been impounded pursuant to

RESOLUTIONS - continued

the provisions of this ordinance, or has been lost or stolen and has been in the possession of the Police Department for more than one (1) year, may be sold at public sale under the direction of the Town Supervisor. Notice of such public sale shall be given at least once a week for three (3) weeks prior to the date of said sale in the Official Newspaper of the Town. Such notice shall state the number of bicycles to be sold and shall set forth the time and place of sale and the terms thereof. The Town Supervisor shall report the results of the public sale to the Town Board at its next meeting. All funds arising from the sale of said bicycles shall be deposited in the general funds of the Town.

§49-7 When effective.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately and is subject to publication as required by law.

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on July 7, 1981 where all wishing to be heard were heard,

RESOLVED, that Section 108-60F as currently written be replaced as follows:

Section 108-60F. An individual may apply to the Building Department to use a substitute mix. Said permission, which will be for two (2) years, will be granted by the Building Department.

Except for single-family and two-family dwellings, all open parking areas shall be properly drained with the premises. Minimum acceptable paving requirements are as follows:

1. for retail businesses, a home occupation, or a home professional office with a total business area not exceeding 600 square feet: four (4) inches of crushed stone of a stable base. Each parking space shall have wheel or bumper guards.

2. for a business building with a total building area not exceeding 1,800 square feet: two (2) inches of stone blend on a stable base with a wearing course of two (2) inches, after compaction of New York State mix Type 1A. Each parking space shall have wheel or bumper guards.

3. All other buildings: two (2) inches of bituminous plant mix, after compaction, with wearing course of two (2) inches, after compaction, of New York State mix, Type 1A, or four (4) inches of reinforced concrete surface. Each parking space shall have wheel or bumper guards. When the parking area is in use during periods of darkness, it shall be properly illuminated. When said parking area is surfaced with asphalt or concrete, the parking spaces shall be clearly marked, and the Town Clerk is hereby authorized to publish and post a notice of adoption.

Before the vote, Councilman Prusinowski stated: "This is a resolution from John's Code Review Committee and we have a few of them tonight which loosens up some of the regulations and we're all for it."

Dick Benedict, Fanning Blvd; "I'd just like to say on this Vail Leavitt Music Hall, that I think they've done very well in getting the \$40,000, HUD money and I, as a taxpayer, don't want to pay for the next twenty years of maintenance or any renovation for a small interest group of about four hundred people. I think the elected officials should look after the taxpayers first. There's a lot of other things we need in Town other than a cultural center and I think they did very well by getting the \$40,000 and they ought to be very happy. Thank you."

Councilman Menendez: "Thank you Dick."

Steven Haizlip, Edwards Avenue, Calverton; "Come August, it will be about a year ago, I came up here asking about

the Veterans Tax Exemption of Real Estate. Eddie Harris and I, we fought. We finally got Local Law #3 through for the Veterans. I found out now that it's only extended for '81. I would like to know, is any member, especially Veterans, on this Board have any knowledge or any current status as to where this tax stands — this Veterans exemption? Is it going to be carried over? Is it extended? Or will it be cut off? And if so, I wrote to Mr. Behan, I wrote to Mr. LaValle, I wrote to Mr. Fink and Mr. Anderson and they all responded except Mr. Anderson. Now they all say we're going to induce legislation or we're currently thinking about it, or it's in committee. But nothing ever comes through definite and concrete. I would like to put the Town Board on notice and I know there's Veterans up there and maybe help fight with me on this and see where we stand and if it's going to stay in tact and if it isn't, we can get some more letters going and this time I want some help. Thank you very much."

Councilman Menendez: "There seems to be an awful lot of confusion on that point. We can't seem to get a clear picture of what we're supposed to do on this thing. We will work with you on trying to dig something out of the legislature. Thank you Hank?"

Hank Fioto, Northville Turnpike: "Recently Eddie Purcell and myself were up in Albany when the Supervisor notified us there was a group of Veterans, the American Legion, DAV, and the VFW. Approximately I would say one hundred fifty, one hundred seventy-five Veterans from Riverhead, and Islip went to Albany as a basic group with different Councilmen and so forth on this resolution. He's talking about the situation that they had, the old section had more or less expired at a certain date. And there was a certain amount of different parts of this bill that they couldn't really get together. So the legislators felt the easiest way was to add a thirty day extension to the present unit which meant that they could more or less would pass the tax program which would automatically be put into next year and they felt they would give themselves more time. But there's two or four different bills they're trying to package together. If the gentleman wants to get in touch with — when this thing is over with, I can give him some more information on it, but that's where it stands right now. It was extended thirty days, more or less just to get it into next year.

If they were to — if the different sides were to try to fight it at that time, it would just die and that would be the end of it. We would have gotten nothing. So like I say, there was roughly between one hundred and one hundred fifty Veterans who went up there and the Veterans organization were

all up there. And the Supervisor notified the American Legion and the DAV about this and we did go up there and that's where it stands right now. It's into next year. In other words, there's nothing they can do now, it just lays dormant until next year, but they're working on two or three different proposals trying to put it back together."

Councilman Menendez: "Thank you Hank. Mr. Haizlip."

Steven Haizlip, Calverton; "Do I have to repeat the name again?"

Councilman Menendez: "No."

Steven Haizlip: "I would like all the Board Members and especially Veterans, contact Mr. Janoski. He has a copy of the letters that I wrote to all of the gentlemen that I mentioned and you can get all the contents from out of there and all the research I did on it."

Kevin Duffy: "No for the park, for the mobile home park he has a temporary permit and he's attempting through this application to have a permanent mobile home park permit."

Bill Nohejl: "That park has existed there for twenty years and has only been on a temporary basis?"

Kevin Duffy: "It's renewable every year."

Irene J. Pendzick: "If there's — he has to renew it ever year."

Bill Nohejl: "Have to renew it every year and once it gets to be a permanent one, he doesn't have to renew it. But does he change the lot sizes and the amount of . . ."

Kevin Duffy: "Well he will be coming in with an application which he will be setting forth various criteria for the Town Board to consider."
