Minutes of a Regular Meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead, held in the Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, on Tuesday, January 20, 1987 at 7:30 p.m.

Supervisor Janoski called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

BILLS

Bills submitted on abstract dated January 20, 1987 as follows:

Councilman Boschetti offered the following resolution which was seconded by Councilman Pike.

RESOLVED, that subject to complete audit, the following bills be approved for payment.

The vote, Boschetti, yes, Pike, yes, Prusinowski, absent, Lombardi, yes, Janoski, yes.

The resolution was thereupon duly declared adopted.

Supervisor Janoski, "Ladies and gentlemen, we are honored and privileged to have the County Executive of Suffolk County, Mike LoGrande, present with us this evening for a first town meeting which he is scheduling through the various towns of Suffolk County. We will dispense with the normal procedure of Town Board Meeting and the reading of Reports, Correspondence, etc. There are three scheduled public hearings this evening and we will just call them when the County Executive is finished. It's my pleasure to introduce to you Mike LoGrande, County Executive of Suffolk County."

Michael LoGrande, County Executive, "Thank you very much. First I want to thank Supervisor Janoski and certainly the members of the Board for affording me this opportunity to have one of these first town meetings. We intend to go around the County and get some of the reaction and some of the concerns of our citizens about Suffolk County and its future direction. We chose Riverhead, by the way, because this is the seat of the county government. And even though Marty Lang will always tell me that right now the main offices are on the south side of the river in the Town of Southampton, the fact remains that the historic seat of county government was the Town of Riverhead and we were very happy to join you here on this occasion for us. I was here this morning about 8:15. I've been up since 5 o'clock. So if I doze off during a meeting which that won't happen by the way, but you all do too. Ok. We have a train strike that I'm sure you're all aware of. We're trying as much as possible to accommodate our commuters, 37 thousand of them who commute on a daily basis on the Long Island Railroad. We tried as much as possible to provide them with alternative transportation for them. It looks like we are going to be doing it again tomorrow. So if you could bear with us a little bit, we're going to see if we can open this up at the appropriate time and take some suggestions. I have staff members who are here who will take some notes. Those of you who have specific questions which I may not be able to answer right off the bat, if you'll give us your name and address and phone number, we will make every effort to get back to you and answer your question. A staff member will probably get back to you tomorrow. I will personally get back to you when the opportunity affords it. In the County of Suffolk there have been some dramatic changes that have taken place in the past ten years. More so in the past twenty years, it happens that either tomorrow or the day after tomorrow was the first day that I came to work for Suffolk County twenty years ago and so I'll be celebrating my twentieth anniversary of such. When I first got to Suffolk County my first assignment was in the County Planning Agency to also work with East End communities and I had an opportunity to view first-hand East End towns of Suffolk County. And I think it was then that, like everyone else although I had been here and passed through it many many times, I think that as I got to see it and got to study it, a strange thing happens. You fall in love with the East End of Suffolk County and there's no question that it's probably one of the most beautiful areas in the world and it's also not only good for potential and good for preservation purposes, but it's also a good place to live. The answer is how do we keep it this way and how do we preserve it and how do we make sure that future generations, our children and our grandchildren and their children; how will they have an opportunity

to enjoy this; as Ruth Oliver says, this little piece of heaven. There are many things that are going on and we've made many mistakes in Suffolk County in the western part of it. And often times we tell our East End community leaders that we just hope those mistakes are not repeated in the East End of Suffolk County. As a County, we don't have that many extensive powers. Most of the leaders' powers are reserved to towns. And when they are used and used properly, that is probably the best way you can get, I think the closest to home results that you would want. County governments certainly incorporated villages, those governments that are closest to the people are the ones that we believe should strengthen and I think that whenever higher levels of governments come in and say that they can do it better, I don't believe it. And even though I'm in the county now, I did come from the town very recently, the Town of Islip. We saw many errors and mistakes that were made over the past years. We hope that they are not duplicated anywhere. We tried as much as possible to make our town a good place for people to live. To keep it a very stable town and a good place to work as well. So we have things that we can do. And I view the role of Suffolk County as one in support of local governments. Most people would like to abolish a portion of the county and I can understand that. There are some county people who think we should abolish towns. Everyone is willing to abolish everyone else. But I believe the county's function as it has been traditionally by the way, has been a support function and that the county's function should stay in support of local governments. To do this and to give you an example of this, we had in the previous administration some legislation that was proposed to create a County Housing Authority. I can remember when John Klein was County Executive. He made some great strides in preserving large portions of the County. One of his biggest pet peeves has always been the fact that there is so much duplication in government that taxpayers are paying twice for the same thing. In most cases not even getting the services from either one that they expected to get the services from and I think he's absolutely right. When I walked into Suffolk County, I noticed that they had a constitutional amendment up in Albany that they were trying to put through in order to provide for counties to have a County Housing Authority. Now each of the towns in Suffolk County can either form a housing authority or has one already in operation. What they don't have are the funds and the monies that used to be supplied to housing authorities by the federal government and under certain circumstances, by the State of New York. But most of the funds came from the federal government. So when people say what happened to housing programs that are desperately needed in some cases, what happened to those programs. The answer isn't to throw or create another agency. The answer is that there are no more funds available to do that. I have since, redirected and I know that Supervisor Janoski as well as Marty Lang and Frank Murphy and even Judith Hope are pretty much in agreement that what they don't want is a County Housing Authority going around telling people that we can show you how we can do it better. Give them the opportunity and they can resolve housing problems

as they need them and at least you would have local control as to what happens to housing programs. So I've redirected that housing effort and I'm seeking as much as possible to have a housing bond issues as well as some forms of tax abatement certainly for senior citizen housing while it's in a construction phase if it's to be done by a turn key operator and other systems of support for local governments. Local governments are the best ones to resolve this and that's where you have the greatest amount of control as citizens in your community is through the mechanism of local government. I'm just using that as an example because we have some other things. Someone said (well) you're trying to get the county of the County Housing Authority business and yet you're trying to get the county into the solid waste business. And those who pointed that out were slightly incorrect. I've stated publicly that towns in Suffolk County are facing a very very desperate crisis and that is with respect to the disposal of solid waste. And that's why I don't want to get the county involved in the disposal of solid waste, I don't think that we can sit by any more and watch our towns squirm as state levels of government have put increasing pressures on local governments and tried to force them to do things and in a lot of cases, that didn't make any sense. We have towns in Nassau County as well as the western part of Suffolk County that are now shipping garbage off Long Island to places in Pennsylvania on a handshake in Pennsylvania which means if the landfill outside of Scranton called the Keystone Landfill decides tomorrow morning not to accept any more trucks from Islip, there's going to be somewhere around 500 tons of garbage in Islip that's going to be moving along the Jersey Turnpike and into Pennsylvania finding out the doors were closed on them. This is something that the State has suggested which is totally irresponsible and something that we can not leave our towns as victims of this kind of thinking all along. What I'd like to do, and again, Supervisor Janoski and Marty Lang and Henrietta Acampora of Brookhaven Pat Vecchio in the Town of Smithtown have been in a bipartisan effort where I've made a pledge to them that in any way that we can help to assist in the garbage problem, we want to do that. We think there are some things we can do from a coordinating standpoint that which maybe the towns cannot do and in those areas we would like to help the town. So this is two examples of where I think we should redirect our forces. Not compete with towns but support them. They are the closest government to the people and I would like to see that continue. With that, perhaps I've talked too much. I would like to take this opportunity to hear from citizens certainly out here in Riverhead as to what your feelings are and what questions I may be either answer directly or get you answers to later on. I would like to keep them rather on specific questions is to keep them more on the philosophical aspects of county government and how we support people rather than the pothole that you may have in front of your door which I would look into too but I would rather keep it on more of a philosophical note if we can and that gentleman was first back there. Yes sir."

Supervisor Janoski, "Henry this is not a regular Town Board Meeting so we don't keep a record of this so you can just stay by your seat."

Henry Pfeiffer, Wading River, "Thank you. I'm Henry Pfeiffer from Wading River. I'm a generic senior citizen typical of the species frail elderly whose incomes are based on pre-1970 salaries but whose outgo is paid to the accumulative inflationary prices. Consequently, we seniors watch our pennies carefully and scrutinize the dollars spent by our public officials with reactions ranging from the amusement to cold rage. We are profoundly conscious of our county's deep seated problems with transportation, water, solid waste, energy and housing. We're intrigued by your proclaimed attention to reduce county cost but we contemplate with unrestrained opposition the proposed wasteful expenditure of 500 to 800 thousand dollars of our tax monies for unnecessary interim election of a Suffolk County Executive. These dollars can be better used to provide services such as: affordable health care to the people of Suffolk County. We find renewed hope and manifestation of your increased attention to the East End and hope that you have sustained attention span. I commend your judgment in nominating Riverhead Town Supervisor Joseph Janoski as your Deputy. He's abundantly qualified to advise you on the East End and its problems. However, an alternative Deputy might be proposed such as Rudyard Kipling who remarked; at the end of a fight is a tombstone light with the name of the late deceased and the epitaph clear; a fool lies here who tried to hustle the east. I believe he had Long Island's East End in mind. And I hope that you will retain a continued interest in the East End and listen to the advice of those who live out here, work out here and I hope that you will continue to support Riverhead as the county center, as a seat here as sovereignty as persistantly and consistantly being challenged. I know you knew all this stuff and all I can do is to congratulate you and wish you the very best in your administration."

Michael LoGrande, "Thank you so much." It was pretty conclusive. I don't know if I can respond to any of that. I can tell you one thing. That I'm both an East Ender and a West Ender. I'm building a house in Cutchogue in the Town of Southold. We've been at it for the last four and a half years. You probably heard about my falling down a ladder and dislocating my shoulder and getting 22 stitches in my forehead. That all took place in the beautiful East End of Suffolk County when I was painting my home in Cutchogue. We do have a renewed feeling. Obviously you know the bulk of the population is in the western part. Thank God as some of the people might say. And obviously a great deal of the problems that have to be paid attention to are also in the western part of Suffolk County. But there are two things. One; the active resolution of past problems and the prevention of problems that we can do in the East End and I think that that's the best thing that we can do. As far as the special election is concerned, I think you know who is calling for a special election for County Executive. The ones who would like to have a crack at me. I guess if they did, they would have a crack at me three times in one year. So I will be the most (that's if I survive by the way) County Executive in the history of Suffolk County and I really have no opinion one way or

another. That's the County Legislature's call. Yes it's going to cost money. It may cost as much as 1.8 million dollars in this one year. 17% of the people come out who normal vote only 17% come out at a special election and there's not too much democracy when the Republicans will hand pick their candidate and the Democrats will hand pick their candidate. I'm not sure that that's the great democracy that we're looking for. But there is the other thing and that is my title is acting and I have members of the County Legislature who remind me of that every day and it is tough to try to get your teeth into problems when you haven't got your feet firmly planted on the ground and those of you from the East End really know what that means. So I somehow welcome a special election. If it should come, if it could save the dollars and you could wait patiently with me, I can wait until November as well. But thank you very much. Those were excellent comments. Anyone else? I'm sorry. Yes."

June Robertson, "I'm from Suffolk Independant Living Organization. We work with disabled people. And in spite of your previous comments that you say you don't want to see a housing authority, I do hope that housing becomes a priority. When you talk about housing in Suffolk County, for all people it's a problem. But when you talk about affordable excessible housing for people who are employed, young, up and coming people, not all disabled people are on a benefits program. Many youger people are also looking for homes, apartments, condos. So I hope that you, in your administration whether it's long or short, keep this as a priority. If it's not a housing authority, I think that there's going to have to be a great deal of attention paid to this issue because they are new populations that you have to consider and there are going to be housing deficits."

Michael LoGrande, "Thank you. Those are good comments. I'd like to add to that that you know there is a provision in the federal law that allows people even who are handicapped to live (regardless of age) in senior citizen complexes by the way. In the Town of Islip, we constructed some where over 600 units of senior citizen housing. Many of those units are occupied by handicapped people today and they work out very fine. In addition to that, we've had other programs to take care of those of our citizens who need that kind of care. There is a housing problem. I just want to address that for a minute. That I don't mean to suggest that the county getting out of housing authority business turns its back on the housing need. And oddly enough, years ago we use to talk about housing and we looked at it. Whenever there was some kind of subsidized housing program, it always meant that this was an invitation for people to come from long distances, New York City to move out to the suburbs and occupy public housing. Today we're finding out that we have a population which is maturing very very rapidly. Some of the early suburbanites, their children have grown up. They want to start families and they're not finding homes that they can even purchase, buy or even rent as people normally do when they first get married. They would rent the unit and when the kids start coming along, they would start to look for the

American dream; the single-family home. There is no question that today when we talk about housing needs, we're talking about our children. We're talking about either our parents. Also we are talking about our own children who are looking for housing. One of the mistakes we made (I think) in the past, that we built an infrastructure in Suffolk County that was designed for a stereo typical family. It was a family that was supposed to be young with a couple of kids that would never grow old. And even our schools were built so that kids would stay there forever static and that's not true. As we sit here now, we realize that those families are growing older. They have changing needs and also our young kids are now growing up and wanting to start families and they have needs. But somehow we have to address that from a housing standpoint and we have to produce some housing and it's not going to be done privately anymore. The economics of it right now is that we could either build single-family homes and fancy condominiums for the very wealthy but we can't do for anyone else essentially in Suffolk County. I think that the day and age of the single-family home is pretty much over and we're going to end up building smaller units in and around downtown areas as we began doing in Bayshore and some other areas and that's another way we could preserve open space and at the same time satisfy our housing needs so people can walk to the train station, walk to the library, walk down to the bank. This can be done and there's marvelous examples of very fine architecture throughout the country like Alexandria, Virginia, Washington, southwest, even Kingston New York. There are some beautiful examples as how it can be done sensibly and we can satisfy the housing problem and take care of our families now which is what the housing problem is all about. So thank you for the comment. Anyone else? Yes sir."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River, "Good evening. Recently the county appropriated money for open space by Swan Lake and that. I pleaded with the Town of Riverhead for years to secure beaches. We have the L.I.L.C.O. site up here in Northville which the town is unable to afford and you said for the welfare of the people of the future generations, this I believe the county secure this property for people for beaches."

Michael LoGrande, "This property is where now? Northville."

Bill Nohejl, "The L.I.L.C.O. site."

Michael LoGrande, "The Jamesport site. I see. What ever happened to that? I know there was some discussion that the county was interested in possibly acquiring it and then it was dropped. Well they could fight us. Then Supervisor Janoski reminded me that someone has suggested it for an ashfill site. I guess that was number one here which is terrific. And the other is that apparently the assessed valuation is rather high or it's gotten up there fairly high. If we were to condemn, we would obviously have to pay the going price of the fair market value. But maybe we don't need all of the site. Maybe what you're talking

about or suggesting is that we secure the marine edge and secure the beach area with some back up. I would be willing to take a look at that again and see if I can convince members of the legislature to do something along those lines. I don't think there's any question about that..."

Bill Nohejl, "Once that kind of property is gone too long... We have the open space otherwise. We have the people and no place to enjoy our facilities or the beaches. I feel as though it's at the verge of losing everything."

Michael LoGrande, "No. I agree with you. Also you know there's another point which we've never used. I notice that in the county it's either put up today or buy immediately. There are other ways in which you could secure the land by holding off and preserving it for the future and write it off. I mean John Klein's farm preservation program was one means of doing this but there are other ways of buying development rights and giving tax abatements, securing it for the future. And at some point, purchasing it and then using it at that point. I will look into that and I'm sure Carolyn has a note on that one already. We will look into that. That's an excellent suggestion."

Bill Nohejl, "Not too long."

Michael LoGrande, "What's that?"

Bill Nohejl, "Don't wait too long."

Michael LoGrande, "No. You're right. I know that the pressure is on. Thanks. Anyone else? Yes ma'am."

Alise Thomas, First Baptist Church, "I'm speaking on behalf, I'm the president of Missionary Society of the First Baptist Church and our main concern is we go around and we help the needy. And I have been in quite a few homes and there's quite a few homeless people in Riverhead. I also work for the aid and development and my main concern is that people who have been homeless for 8 or 9 months and they have found housing. But the reason they can't get the housing is because Social Services only has a set amount of rent that they are willing to pay. There are no houses in Riverhead or anywhere else that I know of today for 338 dollars a month rent. I think that something should be done about the amount of rent that is allowed to be paid. I know a lady that was evicted from her home because she was paying 400 dollars a month rent and the landlord said he could get 800 dollars. So she was evicted for this reason. So if Social Service's amount of rent that they are going to give the people is going to be so low, then we're going to have more homeless people then we already have. But yet they can still afford to pay 15 hundred dollars a month for a hotel room. So how is this state saving money. I'm very concerned about this."

Michael LoGrande, "That's a good question. And I know that the atrocities and the stories that I've heard and you've heard too about people being put up in motels. That's generally considered crisis housing. And that in terms of crisis housing, they've been able to exceed the normal payments. I do know for a fact and we found this out in Islip town as well that the county has dramatically cut back on that. They have been working on a couple of programs. One, where there are county properties available, they have been working with local municipalities to turn over homes and local properties. Again working with local municipalities to offer them these houses that are off the tax rolls and in the ownership of Suffolk County so at least to provide for temporary housing and emergency housing. In the Town of Islip we're taking advantage of that under a couple of circumstances. And as soon as we can work that problem, we're going to do more of them. As far as the amount of monies that are allowed for housing allowances, we don't control that at the County Legislature. These are funds that are specified by law. Where ever they involve the state, the state sets these figures. And most of what the Social Services Department does in Suffolk County is guided by mandates that come from the State of New York and in many cases, federal mandates where there is federal money involved. So it's very difficult for us to say hey. Go back and see if you can boost those things to give more monies for people to afford some decent housing. It is a problem and it's one that I know that we're not going to be able to solve too quickly. And we have often asked, years ago one of the best ways to solve a lot of these problems has been through organizations such as yours where charitable institutions and churches have extended themselves. We've had them in Islip too where they have extended themselves and assisted people as best they can and I think we're going to have to rely on a little bit more of that while we go about getting the necessary regulations and reimbursements. It's a problem county wide. It's not just in Riverhead. It's a bigger problem in Islip, Babylon. A big problem in Brookhaven. And certainly the biggest problem of them all is in New York City and those people are subject to the same state laws. We will look into that. I'm sorry I couldn't give you an absolutely firm answer that we can do something about it but it's something that we may even be able to solve the housing problem but just getting a few dollars into the system so they can afford their own which would be a better system. Thank you for the comment. Anyone else? I don't want to take up too much time on the Town Board. Is there anyone else that wishes to comment? If not... Yes ma'am."

Christine Moore, "I'm curious. You just said that they had a similar problem in Islip and other affiliated counties. But our main goal is (seems to me) right here in the county seat. Like you said, we have people who don't have proper housing. And if they are able to find it, they can't afford it. But yet we can ride around all over Flanders going toward the northfork area and you see how it's boarded up. If they can't afford the rent, I'm quite sure those people were put out for nonpayment of rent. And you said you were going to look into it. Now if you look into it and you find that the monies are there, how would we know because I've seen these houses boarded up for the last five years."

Michael LoGrande, "I can tell you now that the monies are not there. That if there is... If they had to raise the amount of monies that are allowed for housing allowances under Social Security provisions for example, that has to be done by law and those monies are not budgeted anywhere. Whenever they do that, that requires additional appropriation."

Christine Moore, "I assume but maybe I'm wrong. I assume that there was a certain amount put aside for subsidizing housing and what not."

Michael LoGrande, "No there isn't and that's one of the biggest problems that we have. I think you know that the federal government has pretty much gotten out of the housing business. There are all kinds of housing programs around. In Islip we practically took advantage of every one of them. Homesteading, the New Horizon program that allows people to take over defaulted homes, the public housing program, section 8 housing program, moderate rehab programs. We've done almost every one of them. In Islip we have somewhere around two thousand units of subsidized housing much of which is section 8 admittably where apartments where people get vouchers and they're assisted in paying their rents so they're not spending a quarter of their salaries in rents."

Christine Moore, "That's not the problem."

Michael LoGrande, "I know that but the trouble has been that those programs are virtually non-existent now. They've been cut out. I somehow think, and we're working on this right now, but I somehow think that if we could give tax abatement in the production of special housing, and that's not just housing for the poor by the way, because are finding it difficult to find... Our kids who work for 12 or 15 thousand dollars or families earning 20 thousand dollars are finding it very very difficult to find housing suitable for their family. So it's not just a probable poverty but it extends that line of poverty that extends up into all of our children just about. So that if we could provide tax abatement for housing, we could provide either a state wide or a county wide bond issue for housing to provide low interest incentives to build housing and give it to the town housing authorities and also to provide for tax abatement for new housing for particularly seniors where they don't impact the school districts and that kind of thing. That if we could do that, we could also free up some of the other homes. Right now the reason real estate is skyrocketing is that we're not making any more of it and because of such competition for housing that a house is worth an awful lot of money because to produce a new one is very very expensive. But if you could produce a solid number of smaller units, you may be able to start freeing up the larger units of houses which are families can also move into at some point. That one I admit is not an instant answer to your question and that's what I told Ms. Thomas in the back so that we're not able to resolve that problem that easy but we should at least work in the direction of solving the problem and not creating another county agency which meant more county jobs. We

want to try to see if we can get the money and the tax abatement and give it to the towns to solve the problem. They're already set up to do that. Yes ma'am."

Bernice Mack, "What I'd like to know is like the money that is being paid for the hotel. Now they say that that money comes from the federal government. It seems there is some kind of way that that money could be given to maybe some organization so they could buy land because I'm quite sure those motels probably get 50 to 100 dollars a month over off of those apartments for the families in there and they're paying like a thousand or 12 hundred dollars a month for this one room where there's a whole big family with 4 or 5 kids in one room. It seems to me that that money could be given to some organization, the town or something to buy a piece of land and put houses up for families."

Michael LoGrande, "You make a good point. Maybe not just buy a piece of land or build houses or maybe even have what may be available from charitable organizations if they can find even in their own facilities to provide for crisis housing on their own properties or work with charitable organizations and churches that have land holdings already. I think that's a good suggestion and I will look into that. Again, from my understanding of it and the briefing of it that I received and from my understanding from Islip as well, has been that that kind of thing where the absorbant monies have been paid out on a monthly basis to hotels and motels that that is down to a minimum. They have successfully wound that down too. Thank you. Yes sir."

Steve Haizlip, "Shall I continue or do you want me to stop?"

Michael LoGrande, "No, no, no. I just didn't know if I was stepping on any toes in their meeting but go ahead."

Steve Haizlip, "According to the papers that I've been reading, Mr. Janoski and Mr. Lang from Southampton Town was supposed to be studying the East End problems of taxes. Now getting on the subject of the southwest sewer district. I won't say that the Suffolk County government was corrupt or what have you and run us into debt. In other words, they did get into debt but they come to the people and say; you're going to be taxed to pay for it. Now, what my point is that Mr. Cohalan, he brow beat a couple of those legislatures over there and they forced this tax on us out here on the East End when we didn't use and we don't even hear. Now as an assignment, I hope that Mr. Janoski and Mr. Lang will get to the stage to repeal that tax."

Supervisor Janoski, "I've already suggested in our transition team meetings that we repeal the entirety of the Suffolk County sales tax because it is no longer tax deductible on your income tax forms in that if we're going to finance the government, we ought to do it through a way that at least it's deductible."

Michael LoGrande, "Maybe I can just make one comment because I come from a town of a third of which was in the southwest sewer district. And while I can't defend it and I know that that was one way in which they could bail out of a very terrible project. And my families in Islip that live not only with the high taxes they were paying for sewer service, they also got hit with the installation and disruption of their lives of all the sewer mains that went in in this horrendous project. They're now living with the roads failing and caving in all over the place. I mean it's just a real terrible catastrophe that hit this county. But I just want to tell you one thing. In defense of the sales tax, by the way I think it was a quarter of a cent, we do give a quarter of a penny to support the MTA in New York City. That by the way, expires (I believe) in 1988 next year sometime. Those monies in my own personal belief, must be returned to the people. We're hoping that no one in Albany decides again to impose that and simply take that without anyone even knowing about it but you did know about the quarter of a cent that went into help the people in the southwest sewer district. Let me tell you exactly what happened. Mr. Janoski, Mr. Lang, Judy Hope, Frank Murphy, Henrietta and all the Supervisors of Suffolk County go out on bond issues. If we did have a failure of the southwest sewer district which is the way it was going (by the way) that there was going to be some kind of a default on a whole bunch of things. If you had that failure, it would show up in another way. It would actually show up in your own bond ratings because we have gone to bond rating firms and they have often looked at those projects that are in your immediate jurisdictional area in the same taxing districts. And we have found if they are in trouble, our bond rates reflected the same thing. When the UDC and the State of New York and the City of New York were all running into financial debt, every municipality in New York State just about took a wrap because of other governments. We managed our town. We thought very well but we took a wrap in an increase or I should say in a decrease in our bond rating and an increase in our corresponding rates that we were paying for money that we borrowed. So no matter how you look at it, even though it's only a quarter of a cent and I admit and I know how you feel on the east end that this was not your project and it was not your "booboo" and certainly was government that messed up in that whole thing. At the same time, I can assure you that you probably would have paid that quarter of a cent anyway only it would have been reflected in debt services that you pay in your local taxes including school districts as well. So that's the kind of thing that I'm sure you're concerned about. We have to look at all sides of this thing. Hopefully when we can do without that sales tax portion of it, we can return it to the people in the form of local projects and I want to do that with the MTA's monies by the way."

Steve Haizlip, "One final comment sir."

Michael LoGrande, "Supervisor Janoski pointed out that apparently 100 thousand dollars of the sales tax does go to the Riverhead Sewer District. There are a lot of sewer districts outside the southwest sewer district that got monies from the sales tax because they were also going out of sight. They are

scattered throughout the Town of Brookhaven and the northern towns as well. So they receive some compensation but the bulk of it (no question about it) went to the southwest sewer district. Sixty thousand homes total, two thirds of which were in Babylon and one third in Islip. You're right."

Steve Haizlip, "I have a habit of what I say and how I feel and what I think about something. Now Mr. Caruso, he voted for this tax thing and so did Mr. Behan. So Mr. Caruso knew he was going to lose when it come election and so did Mr. Heaney. But now what bugs me with this L.I.L.C.O. deal is he continued to stay on a county salary and yet work another job and never showed. If in the future something like this comes up, I would like to see you start some kind of legislative act so that somebody gets a job somewhere else, he gets his vacation time and that's it period and he don't stay on until the end of the term."

Michael LoGrande, "I understand and I know what you're saying. Thank you very much. Anyone else? Yes ma'am."

Nora Brewer, "I would like to make a suggestion. Instead of spending the money that is proposed to be spent for special election coming up now, couldn't that money be better spent to help people like these young ladies that spoke from the Baptist Church? I think that should be one of the main things to do."

Michael LoGrande, "We'll take that back. Apparently polls are showing that the overwhelming number of people when they realize what they're going to pay for a special election are generally opposed to it. But that doesn't stop the pressure on me or the fact that I was appointed and so I have to live with that little thing. So you know I go by the will of the people. I told our county legislatures; do me a favor. Poll your own people and if they want a special election, by god let's go and if they don't, then let's hold off until November and that's the time to kick me out then kick me out. But in the meantime, I'm going to continue to work and do the best I possibly can. But that's a good comment. That's a good way to go. Anyone else? Perhaps I should say then in closing, that I want to thank Supervisor Janoski, members of the Board in Riverhead. I never sat up here before. This is an interesting thing for me. I would like to come back at some point. We would also like to hear from you and if you have comments and if you didn't want to get up and mention them this evening, certainly if you could send me a letter and I know there's some of you who will, we'll do the best we can to try to satisfy you. It's a county of 1.4 million people. And the burden on the County Executive and even members of the legislature and others is not small anymore. It's a huge responsibility but we want to try and we're not always going to be successful and I know that. But we want to try as much as possible to see if we can satisfy the needs of our families and more importantly, we should also have an eye on the future to make sure that our future generations will enjoy their life in Suffolk County as well. So with that, I want to thank you all again for listening to me and we'd be happy to stick around a little bit if you want to give us your name and address and send us a note. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. Mr. Town Attorney."

Richard Ehlers, "This section concerns parking as it relates to town beaches. The proposal is to require that non-residents; that is people who are not residents of the Town of Riverhead, pay an annual fee in the amount of \$100 if they wish to use the town beaches or a daily fee in the amount of \$10. Also in recognition of the fact that motel users may wish to use beach areas and the property owner of the motel is paying taxes which go to assisting in improving the beaches but yet these are out of town people and would be difficult to regulate. There is also a proposal that a \$10 per motel unit fee be charged to the owner of the motel for a permit which may be transferred upon the transfer of the occupancy of the motel room."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. Is there anyone present who wishes to address the Board on the matter of the proposed fees? Yes sir."

Bill Roberts, Baiting Hollow, "The purpose of my addressing the Board is..."

Supervisor Janoski, "Move that microphone stand a little forward, Bill so that you will be able to..."

Bill Roberts, "The purpose of my addressing this Board is two-fold. One is the fact that certain streets that never have been included in the Town Code and beaches are now designated as unprotected beaches. And my concern and that of other people that live in the area is that once something gets into the Town Code it will be very difficult to change it or remove it. Particular efforts here is to three streets; Washington Avenue. Another one is Roanoke Avenue which are distant from use. I'm mainly concerned with Edwards Avenue. Edwards Avenue until about 16 years ago had no restrictions whatsoever on parking. Anybody could come. There was no such thing as... Yes there was beach permits at that time. However, anybody could come from any town from any state, park on Edwards Avenue. Edwards Avenue terminates at the Sound. All of the property east and west of Edwards Avenue is privately owned. The privately owned property constitutes the front yards of the people who own the houses on the cliff. People are allowed to bathe and use the beach below the average mean high water mark. However, people seldom sit below the average mean high water mark because that means they sit in moist sand. So they normally sit on the property which is privately owned. In fact, they are trespassing. My concern however, is Edwards Avenue parking was restricted parking by permit only. There are only 19 parking stalls allowed on Edwards Avenue. In those 15 years, we've seen Heatherwoods which is now Calverton Hills that has 236 condominiums. The salesmen used to come down there, chaeuffer the respective purchasers down and invite them to look at the beautiful beaches. The beaches were private property and they still are below the average mean high water mark but no salesman will tell that to anybody. Fresh Pond Landing, when that went in, 37 homes. We heard the salesmen bring the people down, look at all the unlimited beautiful beach you have but nobody said you can only sit below the average mean high water mark and there's 19 parking spaces. And Silver Beaches has 23 people. Absolutely no access to beach whatsoever but yet they come down to look at the beautiful beaches. And if this Mr. Dunleavy gets to build his 450 or 60 houses, where will he be taking his prospects to show them the beautiful beaches. Nineteen parking stalls or a Village on the Green gets built, 117 houses, they will invite them to look at the beautiful beach. 19 parking stalls. I can go on forever. The fact is that the Town of Riverhead (as Bill mentioned) does not have sufficient recreation facilities, waterfront and beaches. But it looks like in our case, Edwards Avenue, we may be getting dumped on. Come on everybody, come down to Edwards Avenue, unprotected beach, 19 parking stalls for the people that live there, residents year around as well as those who come from anywhere else they want within the Town of Sibatel. So I mention that as the first part of my ob-

jection. The second is the matter of permits. The wording in the newspaper does not mention how the issuance of permits will be controlled. Will it be only at Stotsky Park by the Riverhead Recreation Department or will it continue to be at Stotsky Park and at Iron Pier and at Reeves Beach and at Wading River by an attendant who may be on duty there. Because right now under the present system, which this is trying to correct, an owner can give a letter to a rentor and that rentor will go down there and he will get a parking permit. The new system tries to eliminate that. Presently, presentation of a L.I.L.C.O. or of a telephone bill will enable anybody to get a parking permit and they're considered a resident parker. The proposed Town Ordinance says; you can get a permanent sticker number one; if you have a receipted tax bill or if you own a vehicle that is at an address which is located within the Town of Riverhead. However, this is also one other thing it says and that is that at the discretion of the... Such other proof of residence as is satisfactory in the Riverhead Recreation Department. Now, if you're not going to go by tax bill, if you're not going to go by motor vehicle registration, what other proof will a Riverhead Recreation Department accept? Right now I know people under the present system, that have gone to the attendants in the various parking fields and they paid for permits. They get one. They're entitled to one. I know one family where a child lives in another county and another child lives in another state. Both of those children have Town of Riverhead parking permits. Will that continue under the present system."

Supervisor Janoski, "Certainly any system is beatable Bill. What we're talking about here is an increase in fees for non-residents. How do you feel about that?"

Bill Roberts, "I don't object to that one bit."

Supervisor Janoski, "Well that's actually what I want to get on the record here. Is what you feel about the proposed increase in fees."

Bill Roberts, "I don't object to that. However, I do object to the fact that there is a lot of abuse of the present system and it may continue under the proposed system unless the issuance of those stickers is controlled at Stotsky Park. Here, I've got 2 stickers, same vehicle license plate number. I could go down there in January. I could go down there in February and another person is at the desk, I could go there in March. I can keep on getting one of these every single time I go down there. I take alcohol or some other solvent, I wipe out that magic marker and put my own license plate number."

Supervisor Janoski, "Well Bill it would probably be very helpful if you didn't teach people how to beat the system."

Bill Roberts, "They taught me."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "Sir, any man-made system can be beaten. If your recommendation is that we tighten up the controls, we'll certainly take a look at that. Absolutely. What we're trying to do here in the increase in fees (quite honestly) is to some extent discourage the use of our beaches by out of town residents."

Bill Roberts, "And maybe with the developers contributing to it maybe we can get some additional recreational facilities. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Bill. Is there anyone else who wishes to make comment? Mr. Grodski."

Stanley Grodski, Supt. Rec. Dept., "On these proposals for non-residents where we have beach attendants, I think if the non-residents get a sticker and pay \$10 or \$100 a year, where we have beach attendants like Reeves Beach, Wading River Beach, Iron Pier and South Jamesport Beach, they should be allowed to park at those beaches. Not at the boat ramp and Creek Road in Wading River because of the parking. Where we have beach attendants where the parking is available, I think that the non-residents can purchase a sticker, they should be allowed to park at these beaches because we are making resident stickers very difficult to get. In the past if you were a tenant in a motel, you could get a sticker for a whole year. If you stayed in a motel for two weeks, you could get it. Now two-portion resident parking permit, you have to show a validated tax receipt and the name has to be the same that's on car. Also a valid New York State Motor Vehicle Registration license has to be the same as the person applying for the permit. So with that in mind, we're going to be that stringent and we're going to charge \$10 or \$100 for non-residents and they should be able to park at the beaches where we have beach attendants. I'm not saying park at the boat ramp in Wading River. I'm not saying to park at Edwards Avenue or Washington Avenue because we do not have attendants on duty at that time. That's all I wish to say. Thank you."

Councilman Pike, "Is that any different from what is proposed in the ordinance?"

Stanley Grodski, "Yes."

Councilman Pike, "That out-of-towners are restricted to the attendant beaches."

Stanley Grodski, "That's our feeling in the Recreation Department. I'm asking that the Town Board give further consideration to that point."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Stanley. Yes sir."

Bob Skinner, Wading River, "I am basically in favor of this ordinance. You gentlemen know we've had a lot of problems with the parking for the non-residents at the boat ramp, etc. etc. And I think overall it's a good concept. The only thing that bothered me and kind of reminded me with this gentleman talking about Edwards Avenue. I don't recall seeing either Edwards Ave-

nue or Hulse Landing Road mentioned in the ordinance. Now I may be wrong but I didn't see that there. Does that mean that permitted parking for residents will still be allowed at these two facilities?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Yes."

Bob Skinner, "Ok. Then I'm 100% in favor of this."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Board on the matter of these fees? Stanley you want to come back again? Sure."

Stanley Grodski, "One point. I'm unprotected because.... The part that says unprotected means that we do not have life-guards there. That's what that means."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you, Stanley. Did I see someone? Yes sir."

John Mickaliger, Manor Lane, "I'm just kind of curious. I don't know if I just understood what Mr. Grodski was saying. I didn't understand exactly what Mr. Grodski said. I have to show up at Stotsky Park with a tax receipt and identification of motor vehicle and all of this? Is that what it means?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Well what we have here is a proposal to raise the fees for permits for non-residents and to put in place those restrictions. But as far as the resident which you are, you get year-long beach permit from Stotsky Park for free."

John Mickaliger, "Ok. But I do have to show up at Stotsky Park?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Yes. That's the Recreation Department."

John Mickaliger, "Will it be available at the beaches on the weekends or like that? The only thing is that I get up, I leave this town at 5 in the morning. I come back at 6 o'clock at night. The Town Hall is not open. Stotsky Park is not open. Nobody's open. I have to take a day off to do things like this."

Supervisor Janoski, "Stanley, are resident stickers available at the beaches?"

Stanley Grodski, "When the beach attendant is on duty."

Supervisor Janoski, "Yes. When the beach attendant is on duty."

Stanley Grodski, "As long as the registration has a River-head address. That's all you need."

John Mickaliger, "Well the only thing is that not one of these beach attendants go on duty, after school is closed. So technically I can't be on that beach until I get the permit. As of January 1st I need a new ticket. Technically you can get the parking ticket for parking without a permit and it has happened and I don't want this to happen again. So, is there going to be any provisions?"

Supervisor Janoski, "We can fix anything. I don't know that the Town Board is going to open the Recreation Department up on Saturday but that's a possibility based on what you're saying."

John Mickaliger, "What about the Town Hall?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Town Hall doesn't issue those permits. Stotsky Park does. It would be easier to open up the Recreation Department rather than open up the entirety of Town Hall. WHEREAS, all conditions precedent to the financing of the capital project hereinafter described, including compliance with the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act, have been performed; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to authorize the financing of such capital project;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York as follows:

RESOLUTIONS Continued

Section 1. For the specific object or purpose of paying the cost of the realignment of approximately 1500 feet of Schultz Road in and for the Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, there are hereby authorized to be issued 285,000 Serial Bonds and \$15,000 Capital Notes of said Town pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 2. It is hereby determined that the maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$300,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

- a) By the issuance of the \$285,00 serial bonds of said Town, authorized to be issued pursuant to this bond resolution; and
- b) By the issuance of the \$15,000 capital notes of said Town authorized to be issued pursuant to this bond resolution. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale and all further powers in connection with the details and the sale thereof are hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer, in accordance with the Local Finance Law. Pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, the proceeds from the sale of such capital notes will be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds herein authorized or bond anticipation notes. Said capital notes shall constitute the down payment required by Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probably usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is fifteen years, pursuant to subdivision 20(c) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 5. The faith and credit of said Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of an interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds, capital notes and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- 1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication or.

- 3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in The News-Review, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 8. This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum in accordance with Section 35.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Councilman Boschetti, "Before I move this, I just want to make a brief statement. That this particular ordinance has been something I and the Town Attorney, have lived with I think from about the first day we both took office. It regards the Bay bottoms and the jurisdiction of them particularly those that lie within the boundaries of the Town of Riverhead. And this Bay Bottom Ordinance although we've had a lot of input on it and we have done a tremendous amount of historical research on it, probably doesn't address every single concern of everyone but the thing it does do and the intent we had in drafting it, was that it does set down a mechanism through which we can make the claim for jurisdiction of the Bay Bottoms. Something that the Town of Riverhead has been trying to do for many many years. And so I'm very pleased to offer this today because of the years of effort on the part of the Town and I also want to thank the Town Attorney for his unflagging efforts to get this particular ordinance written and to assist me in the research on it. So I'm happy to move #78.

WHEREAS, the Town Clerk was authorized to publish and post a notice for a Public Hearing to be held on the 6th day of May, 1986, at 7:45 p.m. at the Town Hall for purposes of hearing all interested persons with regard to the addition of an ordinance, Chapter 47, Bay & Creek Ordinance, to the Riverhead Town Code; and

WHEREAS, all persons wishing to be heard were heard on said date and at said time and place specified and for said purpose stated in said public notice.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that Chapter 47, Bay & Creek Ordinance, be and is hereby adopted as follows:

CHAPTER 47
BAY & CREEK ORDINANCE

ARTICLE I

Definitions

In this ordinance, unless the context requires otherwise, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

ABANDON - A vessel which is not used or useful.

COMMERCIAL PURPOSE - The taking of shellfish for any use or purpose or other than for food consumption by the person so taking or by such person's immediate family or household.

ENFORCEMENT OFFICER - A peace officer designated by the Town Board to enforce this ordinance including the Riverhead Police.

RESIDENT - A person who is domiciled within the Town of Riverhead. Domiciled shall include children of those domiciled while such children live temporarily elsewhere pursuing education or are serving in the armed forces.

SHELLFISH - Includes oysters, escallops, hard clams, soft clams, razor clams, crabs, shrimp, all kinds of mussells, skimmer or surf clams, periwinkles and conch.

TAKING - The actual taking or catching, and all lesser acts such as disturbing, or using any implement or device commonly used to take shellfish or other products of the waters, whether the result is taking or not, and includes every attempt to take.

TAXPAYER - A person who owns real property as shown on the assessment rolls of the Town of Riverhead, but is not a resident as defined herein.

TEMPORARY RESIDENT:- A person who is temporarily visiting and occupying living quarters within the Town of Riverhead.

RESOLUTIONS Continued

TOWN WATERS - Includes all waters and lands below the mean high water mark in any harbor, bay, pond, lake, creek or river in the Town of Riverhead, as shown on the Bay Bottoms Map on file with the Town Clerk.

ARTICLE IIShellfish

Purpose.

The regulations for and control of the taking of shellfish from the waters and lands under waters in the Town of Riverhead are deemed necessary to protect the propagation of such shellfish, to preserve public peace and good order and to protect the public health and welfare.

Taking of shellfish restricted; permits and fees.

No person shall take shellfish from town waters unless such person:

A. If a resident or taxpayer, as defined herein and has obtained a permit as prescribed by this ordinance.

B. Shellfish may be taken by a resident or taxpayer upon first applying for and obtaining a shellfish permit from the Town Clerk of the Town of Riverhead. There shall be no fee for such permit, and such permit shall expire on the last day of the third year after the date of issue.

C. Shellfish may be taken by a temporary resident upon first applying for and obtaining a temporary resident permit from the Town Clerk of the Town of Riverhead. The fee for such permit shall be five dollars (\$5.) for up to fifteen (15) days, ten dollars (\$10.) for up to thirty days, twenty dollars (\$20.) for up to sixty (60) days, or forty dollars (\$40.) for up to ninety (90) days. Permits shall expire on the date marked thereof.

D. Shellfish may be taken for commercial purposes by a resident or taxpayer over the age of sixteen (16) years upon first applying for and obtaining a commercial permit from the Town Clerk of the Town of Riverhead. The fee for such permit shall be twenty dollars (\$20) and shall expire on the 31st day of December in the year of issue. A resident or taxpayer under the age of sixteen (16) years may obtain a commercial permit with parental consent.

E. Shellfish may be taken without obtaining a permit hereunder by a guest of a permittee if accompanied by such permittee or by a child under the age of sixteen (16) years who is a member of the immediate family or a resident or taxpayer. A guest shall be deemed to be one (1) person with the permittee for all purposes hereunder. This subsection shall not apply to a commercial permittee.

RESOLUTIONS Continued.

F. No person shall take shellfish of any kind from the waters of the Town of Riverhead by means of, or with the aid of, any device or implement commonly used in the art or practice of scuba diving or by means of or with the aid of, any device designed to permit submergence beneath the surface of the water beyond normal human capacity.

Permit application.

A. Any person qualified as set forth may obtain a permit for taking shellfish from the waters or lands under the waters of the Town of Riverhead by making an application therefor and paying the fee as set forth above.

B. Such application shall be made in duplicate, in writing, in the form prescribed by the Town Clerk and shall state:

- (1) The applicant's name.
- (2) The applicant's residence with street and number, if any.
- (3) The length of the applicant's resident in the Town of Riverhead.
- (4) The applicant's age, sex, height and color of eyes and hair.
- (5) The applicant's domicile outside the Town of Riverhead with street and number, if any.
- (6) The applicant's real property owned in the Town of Riverhead with street and number, if any.
- (7) Any permits issued hereunder shall become void if the holder ceases to be a resident, temporary resident, or taxpayer.

(C) Permits shall be in the form prescribed by the Town Clerk and contain the matters set forth upon the application. The original application shall be filed in the Town Clerk's Office, and a duplicate application in the office of the Riverhead Town Police and a duplicate application in the office of the Town Supervisor. Permits shall not be transferable, and any person engaged in taking shellfish from the waters and lands under waters of the Town of Riverhead shall be obligated to disclose his name, address and current permit number to any enforcement officer. Failure to do so shall be presumptive evidence that such person has not obtained such permit.

Clams - Hard.

A. No clams shall be taken from town waters between the hours of sunset and sunrise.

B. Hard clams measuring less than one (1) inch in thickness shall be returned immediately to the waters of the place where taken.

C. No hard clams shall be taken from the bottom of the waters of the Town of Riverhead by any tool, instrument or device except the common rake and tongs used and operated by hand alone.

RESOLUTIONS Continued

D. No hard clams shall be uncovered or located by any mechanically operated or power-driven propeller or by any other mechanically operated or power-driven device or means, and no cover, whether plant life or bottom material shall be removed by any such mechanically operated or power-driven propeller or by any such other mechanically operated or power driven device or means.

Clams - Soft.

A. No clams shall be taken from town waters between the hours of sunset and sunrise.

B. Soft clams measuring less than one and one-half ($1\frac{1}{2}$) inches in length shall be returned immediately to the waters of the place where taken, except for propagation purposes in town waters, and this may be done only after a written permit therefor has been granted by the Town Board upon written application therefor, subject to the supervision of the Town Board for a committee thereof.

Conch Pots.

Conch pots shall not interfere with designated channels of navigation.

Crabs.

No person shall take female crabs bearing eggs visible thereon from town waters, nor offer for sale or possess same within the Town of Riverhead.

Escallops.

A. Escallops may be taken with a dredge or scape, having an opening at the mouth not to exceed thirty-six (36) inches in width, when towed by a boat operated by mechanical power or other means, provided that such dredge or scape is brought aboard by hand power without the use of a mechanical device, only from the bottom of the following described waters within the Town of Riverhead. No escallops shall be taken from town waters by any device when towed by a boat operated by mechanical power.

B. No escallops shall be taken from town waters between the hours of sunset and sunrise.

C. Escallops may be taken from the town waters of the Town of Riverhead during the period from the third Monday in September to March 31, both inclusive, in each year. Bay escallops shall not be taken on Sundays by use of a dredge or other device operated by power.

D. Only bay escallops having an annual growth line or measuring not less than two and one-fourth ($2\frac{1}{4}$) inches from the middle of the hinge to the middle of the bill may be taken. Bay escallops which do not meet the requirements of this section shall be returned immediately to the water where taken.

RESOLUTIONS Continued

Oysters.

A. No oysters shall be taken from the bottom of the waters of the Town of Riverhead by any dredge or mechanical device operated or powered either by sail or by an engine or motor.

B. No oysters shall be taken from the bottom or from any object affixed or appended to the bottom of the waters of the Town of Riverhead between the hours of sunset and sunrise.

Shellfish predators.

Starfish, drills, drum fish and moonsnails, when taken, shall not be returned alive to the waters of the Town of Riverhead.

Shrimp.

No shrimp shall be taken from the waters of the Town of Riverhead by the use of any dredge, except by the light shrimp dredge and except by the minnow seine.

Special Authority.

A. The Town Board is hereby authorized from time to time to modify, amend or change the method of equipment used in taking shellfish whenever in their discretion they deem it necessary to protect shellfish propagation, or if shellfish are in short supply or their existence in town waters is endangered, upon given ten (10) days notice in the several newspapers in the Town of Riverhead.

B. The Town Board is hereby authorized from time to time to increase or decrease the limits on shellfish to be taken in one (1) day whenever in their discretion they deem it necessary for the protection of shellfish in town waters, upon given ten (10) days notice in the several newspapers in the Town of Riverhead.

Limits.

A. Escallops.

(1) Commercial permittees may take ten (10) bushels per day. Two (2) or more such persons occupying the same boat while taking escallops may take in the aggregate not more than twenty (20) bushels in one (1) day.

(2) All other permittees may take individually one (1) bushel per day.

B. All other shellfish as defined herein, except escallops.

(1) Commercial permittees: no limit.

(2) All other permittees: may take individually one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) bushel.

RESOLUTIONS Continued

Enforcement; severability.

A. This ordinance shall be enforced by any duly constituted law enforcement agency having jurisdiction within the Town of Riverhead.

B. The provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable. If any section, sentence, clause or phrase thereof shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections, sentences, clauses and phrases of this ordinance, but they shall remain in effect, it being the legislative intent that this ordinance shall stand notwithstanding the invalidity of any part.

ARTICLE IIIGeneral Provisions

Pounds; gill nets, fykes.

A. No person shall set, draw or cast any nets or seines in any of the freshwater ponds or streams within the Town of Riverhead.

B. No person shall cast, draw or set any net, seine or other device for the purpose of taking fish from the waters as shown on the official map filed with the Town Clerk.

C. No dock, mooring, pile, structure, fish pond or fyke shall be placed in the waters of the Town of Riverhead unless duly authorized by written permit of the Town Board.

D. No net, seine or other device shall be placed in any channel in the waters of the Town of Riverhead.

E. No fish traps or pounds shall be placed in the waters of the Town of Riverhead at any time, with the exception of fykes which may be set in any season, all such fykes shall conform to the following requirements:

(1) Hoops shall be not over five (5) in number or more than approximately three (3) feet in diameter.

(2) Wings shall be straight and not more than twelve (12) feet in length, each.

(3) Leaders shall be not over twenty (20) fathoms in length.

(4) Stakes shall be not over five (5) in number.

F. The number of fykes which may be set by any one (1) person between May 1 and September 30, both inclusive, in each year, shall be no more than two (2), and each fyke shall bear the name of the owner thereof.

Otter trawls (beam trawls).

RESOLUTIONS Continued

A. No person shall, by the use of any trawl, scoop, net or similar device, while the same is attached or fastened in any manner to any boat, float or device, pull, drag, shove or move in any manner so as to disturb, scrape or move any lands or the surface of any lands under any of the waters of the Town of Riverhead. This regulation shall apply whether or not any mechanical power is actually employed to move any such trawl, scoop or net.

B. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply to a bona fide dredging service while engaged in any work duly authorized by permit from the Town Board, to any bona fide haul seine not in excess of one thousand two hundred fifty (1,250) feet in length or to the taking of eels by a mechanically operated eel spear.

C. No person shall pull, drag, shove or move any device in such manner so as to disturb any lands and the surface thereof under the waters of the Town of Riverhead.

Eel dredges.

No eels, fluke, flounders or fish shall be taken from the bottom of or caught from the waters as shown on the official map as filed with the Town Clerk by the so-called eel dredge, or by any mechanical device operated either by sail or power gas engine or electric motor between April 1 and November 15, both inclusive in each year, with the exception of any manually-operated apparatus.

Derelicts.

A. No person shall abandon any vessel in any of the waters of the Town of Riverhead.

B. Any abandoned vessel shall be removed by the Town Board at the expense of the owners and shall be destroyed or sold to defray any expenses in connection with the removal or salvage of any abandoned vessel.

C. Any deteriorated docks bulkheading or spilings shall be removed by the Town Board at the expense of the owners.

D. The term "vessel" as used herein shall mean any boat or floating structure, whether seaworthy or wrecked, which shall be left anchored or unattended in the waters of the Town of Riverhead for a period of ninety (90) days.

E. Notice of intention to remove or dispose of any abandoned vessel or dock shall be given by mail to any known or reputed owner at the last known address of said owner and by publishing a notice of intention to remove and dispose of any abandoned vessel in at least one (1) newspaper published in the Town of Riverhead at least ten (10) days in advance of such removal and disposition.

Bays and ponds.

RESOLUTIONS Continued

No person shall dam, open up or drain in any manner whatsoever any of the bays, ponds or streams within the boundaries of the Town of Riverhead unless duly authorized by written permit, after application and public hearing thereon, of the Town Board.

Docks, basins and ramps.

A. No dock, basin or ramp owned, controlled or operated by the Conservation Advisory Council shall be used by persons other than residents of the Town of Riverhead.

B. No person shall place any obstructions or place, pile or store any nets, boxes, bait cars or fishing equipment or gear whatsoever upon any dock, wharf or pier or highway owned, controlled or operated by the Conservation Advisory Council.

Leases.

No leases shall be granted for any bay bottom lands underwater except upon special permit as provided in Chapter 108 of the Riverhead Town Code granted by the Riverhead Town Board. In addition to the special permit requirements of Chapter 108, the Town Board shall refer each lease application to the Riverhead Conservation Advisory Council for their review and recommendations.

Permits and applications.

A. No person shall dig, dredge, or change the bottom of any of the waters in the Town of Riverhead, nor drive or place therein any bulkheading, dock, mooring or obstruction, nor deposit any material whatsoever nor empty any drain or sewage in said waters, nor dig any boat channel or basin in any upland to afford access to any of said waters, nor cause same to be done unless authorized by a permit issued by the Riverhead Conservation Advisory Council.

B. No permit shall be issued by the Riverhead Conservation Advisory Council for any of the purposes described in subsection A hereof, except upon a written application in the following general form:

INSTRUCTIONS: No application will be considered unless accompanied by maps or sketches acceptable to the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead showing exact location and size of property in Riverhead Town at the waterfront and adjoining neighbors as required by the rules of said Town Board.

This application shall be signed by the owner of the property to be benefitted, improved or in any manner served by the project for which a permit is sought, or by the person, firm or corporation by whom the work is to be performed acting as agent for the owner of the land.

Unless the application is for the purpose of obtaining a permit to dredge, the last paragraph of this application is inapplicable. Applicants are advised that while the permit of this

Board to dredge, erect a dock or bulkhead is necessary, a permit must be obtained from the Department of the Army, New York District Corps of Engineers, if in navigable or channel waters. A permit may also have to be obtained from the building department of the local municipality having jurisdiction.

The undersigned further agrees to promptly place and maintain any signs required by said Town Board's rules and upon failure to do so, authorizes said trustees, their employees or agents to obtain, place and maintain same with the right to recover the cost of making, placing and maintaining such signs.

Bill Nohejl, "What is the necessity of renovation of the bathrooms?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Federal law requires the handicapped access ability and that's not the only changes that will take place. One of these doors will be made an automatic opening door, one of the doors to this room. The outside entry doors will be made automatic opening doors. These are to comply with the handicap rules."

Bill Nohejl, "You mean you just push...."

Supervisor Janoski, "No. It will have an electric eye, I believe, that will open the doors. And also we are going to make some renovations to the stairway in the rear of the building over here."

Bill Nohejl, "Because ordinarily I would say there is no necessity but if..."

Supervisor Janoski, "Not only this building but we are having plans done for all town facilities to make them handicap accessible, the restrooms, the parks and the beaches. Any facility which has public access would have to comply over a period of time."

Bill Nohejl, "Being that you explained it to me, I would think that it be only proper when you read the resolution to state just why the resolution is being passed."

Supervisor Janoski, "You're right and I thought about it as it was being offered but of course you don't have that. I turned the page and looked at what was on the accompanying resolution explaining it but you didn't get to read that."

Bill Nohejl, "But things of that type I think you should read."

Supervisor Janoski, "I have the plans by the way on my desk if you'd like to take a look at them."

Bill Nohejl, "That's not necessary."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Bill. Steve. Certainly we couldn't end the meeting without adding a comment."

Steve Haizlip, "I think the anyone wishing to speak was interrupted by Mr. LoGrande. So I guess that will let me come up now. Oh. You want me to come to the mike. I thought I talked loud enough. I want to bring up a point that I read in the paper about Sgt. Major Shelby Clark stating about the handicap spaces that people take when they are plainly marked. Well maybe in some area that he visited they may be plainly marked. But I believe if you check the Harrow shopping center, I don't think you're going to find that they will be plainly marked because when the weather and the rain comes in, they are kind of

obliterated and only the policeman knows they're there. And in the case of my son, he pulled up there one night. The man was right on top of him and yet it wasn't plainly marked and he didn't know that it was there."

Supervisor Janoski, "Harrows and its owner are not the most cooperative individuals that we have in the town. Is that going to get us in trouble Mr. Attorney, my saying that?"

Councilman Lombardi, "I just sent him a letter Mr. Attorney."

Steve Haizlip, "Point number two. Mr. LoGrande when he spoke about maybe I didn't know that a quarter of a cent went to the MTA. I would like to go and tell him that I'm well versed in this subject. As a matter of fact, I have letters right now in to Governor Cuomo and I don't think I'll get an answer and I have just come right out and said to him that he's swindling the people and so forth. The last time I was up here I forgot to include that the MTA swindled probably millions of dollars by taking our buses off the road and I found out on November the 12th and I spoke right with John Berwit directly and no other city in this country and no other state anywhere has initiated any lawsuit but New York City. So the point is that they swindled all this money and then they want us citizens and poor workers coming around and giving them a quarter of a cent in sales taxes to bail them out. So when you see Mr. LoGrande, tell him I'm well versed on that. Thank you gentlemen."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Steve. Yes sir."

George Dalecki, Wading River, "Just a simple question. I am a little confused about the two resolutions posted here regarding the hiring of a clerk typist for the town. Resolution 73 authorizes the clerk to publish an ad for that position and then resolution 82 appoints that person."

Supervisor Janoski, "I can understand where that could be confusing. What we are doing is filling temporary. The appointment is a temporary appointment filling the need of the Town Clerk because of the leave of absence of one of her employees. I will put a person there until we can go through the process of the ad being in the paper, inviting the people in for an interview, having the interview. And with the advice of the Town Clerk, selecting a person to be permanently appointed."

George Dalecki, "Ok. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski, "You're welcome. I was wondering what was wrong with you Bill. Come on up here. You wouldn't speak when the County Executive was here though would you."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

William Kasperovich, "Well, I'm absolutely sure he would not want to hear what I have to say, what was going through my mind. So I figured I'd better sit there and be quiet. Because if it's not constructive, there's no point in saying anything. In your explanation Mr. Supervisor with regard to the federal requirements for this Town Hall, may I ask how they apply to the new police house?"

Supervisor Janoski, "They apply equally as well."

William Kasperovich, "And yet the hold backs and the difficulties are much more severe and much more, just much more difficult in the newly constructed building and here we have a structure that's been up for a number of years and grade level and all kinds of people (lay people) available to assist. There it's strictly uniformed people and the entry way and the pitch of the pavement and the handrails, you name it; certainly didn't have the disabled in mind. Yet I think some...."

Supervisor Janoski, "Can I answer that part?"

William Kasperovich, "Until that's resolved, I think some specific interim assist should be established."

Supervisor Janoski, "Bill, that building was built to be handicapped accessible. If you will walk around to the rear of the building, you will find that it has a ramp leading to a door in the back of the building specifically to make it handicap accessible. All of the restrooms in the building have been designed according the latest specifications for the handicapped and it is in compliance with the federal law. Now the reason that it has popped up of course as you well know being that...."

William Kasperovich, "I might suggest that you put yourself in a wheelchair (this is an experiment) at the parking lot and go try to do this as a stranger or as a person requiring police assistance. And where he would find the man on duty, the man in charge, how he would know that the ramp is in the back of the building when the parking lot is in the front of the building. All these little things need attention."

Supervisor Janoski, "There's parking in the rear of the building."

William Kasperovich, "No less than when you call up the Town Hall and they see there's no Supervisor here. There's no Councilmen here, I suggest you call the police. Well switch me over to the police building. No. We can't switch you over. You have to put another quarter in the meter and call them up once again. Here again, the tie of the two buildings and the needs for people that could be here. You come to this building in a wheelchair and you want to talk to the police, they can't connect you unless you go into somebody's private office. There's no way to talk to the police on a phone without putting a quarter in the meter, the phone box. These kind of things

all indicate that that building and this building were just ignored for the disabled. And I think the needs are a lot more serious over there than they are here. Maybe we've got called down for it over here but somebody will sure as h--- catch up to us at that front entrance to that police house. Ok. The gentleman preceding me, brought up some interesting points that were introducing parking in existing areas. When are we going to catch up to the areas that have been marked and demarked and what have you and never put in the Town Code? We have areas in our township that have been marked handicapped. They are not spelled out in the Town Code. There are many other areas that the town has taken it upon themselves through the Highway Department to put restrictions on vehicular movement but have not caught up to putting them in the Town Code. And I think before we move into these other areas, we should bring ourselves up to date. Now, I'm no more pleased to be here this evening than you are to have me here Mr. Supervisor. But since I can't reach you in your office, this is the only place that I can reach you. I got a lot of static about the manner and the words that I use in bringing the Board a highway problem in Wading River that you pass everyday and nothing has been done. Even to today, this morning, we have a new catch basin with a new grade and yet there's a big puddle in front of it, a long puddle behind it. When it freezes over in weather like this, it's a skating pond. We have two street lights out in my neck of the woods. I thought last year I got the procedure where everybody heard about it and knew what was to be done when there's a street light out. Who was responsible. So then in a matter of a week or two, they'd catch up to it. Apparently I didn't make much of an impression because they forgot all about it."

Supervisor Janoski, "Did you give them a pole number?"

William Kasperovich, "We've had two or three lights that have been out for a month and there's no report about them being out. These are not specifically bad lights or situations but the procedure is not working. That's what I'm bringing to light. That the procedure is not working. And somehow we have to get a better procedure. You don't have to be a highway engineer."

TAPE ENDED

William Kasperovich, "... eight and ten years and I'm getting to be one of these old men here that are weakening. I can't yap about it anymore because it's beginning to look futile. And what I don't like about it is that all this reflects on the quality of our township. You ride through a good town, you ride through nice good roads. And Riverhead as soon as you get off the County or State roads, you get into all kinds of things especially out of the business district and even in the business district. And you can reach out to get the money from the County or the State or where ever besides the taxpayer. We do need upgrading of existing conditions. We don't need new conditions. We have to fix

what we have and I don't see any point in my getting up here and bringing it. I brought up pleasantly, humorously, shouting, usually calling names and I get no place. I leave no impression on you gentlemen. But the impression that I hope to get across and that you'll move by your own motivation. Not because Kasperovich got up here Tuesday night and was running off at the mouth. Now five guys drive through the township and bring one item on the road to the list, by the end of the year, we've certainly would have a well inspected network of roads and certainly could juggle it around to what priorities come and should be on top of the list. And you don't have to be a highway engineer to see where the bad spots are. But if you drive by it and ignore it, eventually you accept it as being a state of affairs. And our present Highway Superintendent is not to be blamed. He has done a wonderful job. I can't speak... I've got to make sure this is not taken as criticism of the Highway Department Superintendent. He's done better for this township than any other superintendent we've had in the last 30 years. I'll vote for him in that sense."

Supervisor Janoski, "I will too."

William Kasperovich, "But we have had before he got to us, we have let our roads go into disrepair. We have let our annual and our semi-annual maintenance programs go to pot. And so the job is a very large job and it's not a one-year project. It's just that we've got to get into it and keep after it such that we can shuffle the items around and rearrange things as they come and go. In that way, we can in a short few years, bring the roads up to where they should be. I think I've talked enough. I didn't even plan to say this much."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you very much Bill."

William Kasperovich, "I hope that we don't have to tackle the kind of problems that the gentleman tackled in Islip and I hope and pray to god that we never have to approach the solutions to these problems in the manner that Islip did. Because I don't know as if I'd want to live here and I'm sure Mr. LoGrande would not want to hear that. But if nothing else, I respect the podium in Riverhead enough to come up here and address it regardless of everything else. And for that, I thank you gentlemen."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Bill. Is there anyone else who wishes to be heard on any subject? Then that being the case, there is one more thing if Monique is still awake and here. It is my intention to appoint her Deputy and to swear her in in my office immediately following the meeting. Outside of that, without objection, adjourned."

There being no further business on motion or vote, the meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.
