PUBLIC HEARING - 7:45 p.m.

I have affidavits of publication and posting that a public hearing will be held on Tuesday, January 6, 1987 at 7:45 p.m. to hear all interested persons regarding: The Proposed Amendment to the Town Code, Section 103-11(c) "Garbage Haulers".

Supervisor Janoski, "Mr. Town Attorney."

Richard Ehlers, "Thank you. The proposal before the Board this evening is to raise the fee that is charged to garbage haulers. Those are the collectors of garbage in the town who deposit the garbage at the town landfill. We charge by a cubic yard charge. It's currently \$1.25 and the proposal is to raise it to \$2.00 to recognize the fact that we will have to close the landfill by 1990 and have in place alternatives."

Supervisor Janoski, "Could you give us some relative fees for other towns?"

Richard Ehlers, "We're in the ballpark with the other towns. We're below Brookhaven as I understand it. The Town Attorney from Southampton called me the other day and asked what our fees were. They were going to adopt a similiar structure. All of the towns have such a fee. There is no proposal at this time to raise the

fee for the individuals who bring their own garbage by car or truck. Those remain the same. This fee will only effect garbage haulers and those bringing in small amounts of land clearing debris."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Mr. Town Attorney. Is there anyone present who wishes to address the Board on this approval? Yes. Mr. Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich, Wading River, "I find it nothing to laugh about to get up here Mr. Supervisor."

Supervisor Janoski, "I do but it has nothing to do with you Bill."

William Kasperovich, "Well you ought to look in the mirror in the morning and you'll have a good laugh. Regularly you keep upping the price..."

Irene Pendzick, "Excuse me Bill. You know the rules. Your name and address please."

William Kasperovich, "The name is William Kasperovich. I live on 15th Street in Wading River which is still in this township. So you tell us how much the raises are going to be and you tell us which department it's going to be and you tell us what it is compared to the other people but you don't tell us what the h--- for. What are you going to do with this money? You tell us they are going to shut the landfill down. So what do you need the money for? How much have you spent to date on this problem of the landfill being shut down? And how much do you need to further study it to possibly come up with an answer or cover the cost of sending personnel to other parts of the county so that they could be knowledgeable and participate with other possible solutions. You don't tell us what the money is for. Once again I say, you're not looking after the constituents of your township but you're playing political games with us. So my question is, what do you need this money for? Do you have an answer this evening."

William Kasperovich, "Bill the Town Board went through a very lengthy process of formulating a budget. Part of the budget includes revenue. This is part of the revenue that was incorporated into the budget. You were present at (I believe) most of the hearings and procedure on the budget. And quite honestly for someone who is involved as you are, I would expect that you know the answer already. But if you also read the papers...."

William Kasperovich, "But I can't stand up here and talk to the people."

Supervisor Janoski, "You're not supposed to."

William Kasperovich, "You can. So if I feel the public should know, I have to get up here and ask the question that I know the answer to but the answer has to come from the podium. Not from because what I've got to say falls on deaf ears on the podium and there are few little enough people in the township that pay attention."

Supervisor Janoski, "Are you in favor or opposed to this fee increase?"

William Kasperovich, "Since you don't tell us what you're going to do with the money, I'm opposed to it."

Supervisor Janoski, "Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Board on the matter of the proposed increase in fees charged for carters at the Riverhead landfill? That being the case and without objection, I declare the hearing closed. The next scheduled hearing is at 7:55. Let us proceed with the resolutions."

I have affidavits of publication and posting that a public hearing will be held on Tuesday, January 6, 1987 at 7:55 p.m. to hear all interested persons regarding: The Special Permit Application of George Chekijian to operate a facility for the processing canning, bottling and warehousing of cleaning products located at Raynor Avenue.

CORRESPONDENCE:

Frank C. Praete, Jr., Attorney for George Pionko - 12/12/86  
Advising that Mr. Pionko is out of state on the date of this hearing and requests that his opposition to the application be read into the record.

Supervisor Janoski, "Mr. Chekijian are you representing yourself? Ok. Would you step forward and give a brief statement on behalf of your application."

George Chekijian, Roanoke Avenue, "I live on Roanoke Avenue in Riverhead and I've lived there since 1971. I have a small manufacturing operation that has been in the Calverton area since about 1963 or '64. It's a small business. It averages 3 employees and is a non-nuisance manufacturing of cleaning compounds. DIF Hand Cleaner is one of the products which we can. We have also a bowling agent that we make that is sold industrially. That is a very mild sudsing detergent and we make a dishwashing liquid and a few other different products. Most of the products are sold either to the government or to institutional and commercial markets. But they are quite similiar and much the same as ordinary household cleaners. To name a few that are similiar; there is joy, there is tide, your Mr. Clean, fantastik and 409. These are essentially the same formulations as what we manufacture in a generic fashion. And these are all commercial and institutional not-for household use except for the DIF Hand Cleaner which we manufacture for another company and that is sold in some of the supermarkets. The process is a batch process and does not have any effluent. The raw materials are essentially based on vegetable materials such as; coconut oil, soy bean oil, tallo, some white oils such as baby oil and emulsifiers. They are based on vegetables also. We do not have toxic poisonous materials. The materials that we have are all known to the D.E.C., to the Department of Health. The establishment has been observed by them and inspected by them on numerous occasion since it is there.

PUBLIC HEARING ContinuedGEORGE CHEKIJIAN, Continued

They are familiar with the equipment, the floor plan and with all of the raw materials on the premises. The operation is a canning and bottling of a bottle such as this or such as this. It is what we put up. This is a bottling line although it's not bottling or canning of foods, it is a mild detergent product. This is a canning, product that is canned. The seam is put on after filling and it is seamed. This is a canning operation. I'd like to add that we have no effluent. We are in the sewer district on this property and there would be no effluent pipe because of the batch process. All the materials go into the batch. When the batch is finished, that particular dedicated tank or mixing tank is used for the same product and the same product is again mixed into that tank. So we don't have to change tanks and wash them and discharge the material into the sewer. All drums and containers are rinsed into the batch and they are stored outside in a small area. At this time we have quite a few drums. By the way we have been waiting for Mr. Bloss to pick up about 50 of these. We were donating to the Highway Department. They apparently needed drums and we do have quite a few in the back but these drums are either refilled and sold after they're painted and stenciled and marked as the product or they are very often shipped back to the company from which we purchased the chemicals on a deposit basis. These drums are all cleaned. We don't have any pesticides. We don't have any bopyl type poisonous products. They're quite innocuous. Some of them sometimes say corrosive but I guarantee you I can wipe them all over my face and it would not do anything but possibly irritate it a little bit. But this is not what we consider toxic. As far as this goes, there is no noise, no dust, no effluent, no stream of toxic waste running out of the side of the building. The industrial zoning, industrial "A" includes bottling, canning, warehousing, trucking and I feel it would be in harmony and character with the area. And on the left there is a trucking company. On the right there is a body and fender repair shop. There is also a potato grading and washing facility with trucking and loading. Across the road within about 500 feet and slightly to the north, there is a fertilizer mixing and blending plant which I understand mixes dry materials and so on and this is to be expected in an industrial area. Next to that there is an oil company with large oil tanks. And so I feel that this is an industrial area. It's truly an industrial area. The area was purchased as industrial "A" and I think that the entire operation is within the character of the area except for a few houses that are across the street that happen to be in the industrial area but I can assure there will be nuisance from this particular company. I have an artist's rendering if you'd like to see it."

Supervisor Janoski, "George, I would like to have those products be submitted as part of the record."

George Chekijian, "That's a few of them. I can submit more."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "No just what you have there. The minutes will reflect that you held up various products and I'd like to have those as part of the record and you never know. We might have to do something."

APPLICANT GEORGE CHEKIJIAN SUBMITTED VARIOUS SAMPLES OF BOTTLED AND CANNED PRODUCTS MANUFACTURED BY HIS COMPANY.

Supervisor Janoski, "Just give them to the Town Clerk. Now if you would like to show us a rendering of the proposed building. Are you... Can we keep this as part of the record."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Well he'll have to come back for site plan."

George Chekijian, "It's preliminary."

Supervisor Janoski, "How many square feet is this?"

George Chekijian, "6,000 square feet. It's 4,000 warehousing, 2,000 for manufacturing and office space."

Supervisor Janoski, "Let the record show that the applicant has submitted an elevation drawing for the proposed building and is to become part of the record and it also be noted that he must submit application for site plan approval which will take place."

APPLICANT GEORGE CHEKIJIAN SUBMITTED AN ARTIST'S DRAWING OF PROPOSED BUILDING.

George Chekijian, "One of the other reasons that I would like to point out that we would like to move to a new building is because the current facility is not adequate. It's very difficult to maintain. It doesn't have designated areas for various things. The building is not properly laid out. It's a building that is very difficult to work with. It's very difficult to keep neat. Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "George, I just have one question. What is the hours of operation that you would be?"

George Chekijian, "It actually operates from 7:30 to 4, sometimes 4:30 or 5. I'm sometimes there later but the few workers I have go home at 4 o'clock. So that's the extent of it. As far as loading and unloading, we do get a few trucks a week, rarely more than one or two a day. They're generally small trucks or once in a while we get a trailer in and we have to ship from coast to coast. And it is as I said, run with about 3 people on the average. Sometimes 4, sometimes 2 with one or 2 part timers we get up to 4. And I feel that it is also a little bit more convenient to the labor market when I do need some part time and so on, possibly highschool students and so on. Any other questions?"

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Councilman Boschetti, "You say you have outdoor storage of containers. Approximately how many and what size?"

George Chekijian, "Well I keep 55 gallon drums outside. At one time I was keeping them inside and it got a little bit too tight for room. The reason I was keeping them inside was so they wouldn't rust. Once in a while and I would say about once a month, we have an order for 10 or 12 drums of a product. Not bottles or cans but in drums and we have to ship and it's nice to have drums that you know what was in those drums. These are materials that are in that product and you can use them and very easily there's no contamination and so on. Rather than to have to buy drums from outside. But at this time, I'll bet you there are about 100 drums outside but they are in the back in the yard and they are facing away from the road. They're facing actually the sod farms and Grumman air strip. So it's not an un-slightly thing from the road. It would be better in a caged in area with a small picket fence perhaps 20 or 30 drums outside. These are empty. They have been washed and cleaned and the products have gone into the batch. It's not a toxic waste site."

Councilman Boschetti, "Well that's what I'm getting to. Now what happens to..."

TAPE ENDED

Councilman Boschetti, "...to fence in or..."

George Chekijian, "Just for empties, deposit drums and so on, yes. I would like to keep maybe 10 or 20 or 30 outside. And when there's enough to send back or if we have to use them, we would have them of course in the back where they wouldn't show from the road. But I mean if drums are an issue, I'm certain we can do something."

Councilman Boschetti, "No. I'm just trying to understand the application. Ok. Thank you."

Councilman Pike, "George, how long have you been at your current operation?"

George Chekijian, "I've been manufacturing since actually 1959."

Councilman Pike, "In this location?"

George Chekijian, "No. In this location, I've been there since 1977."

Councilman Pike, "And when you rented that particular pre-mise, what were the facilities like in terms of spill control? Was there just a flat floor with no containment or is there a central drain?"

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

George Chekijian, "There is a flat floor. There is no spill containment. However, the storage of chemicals and materials is all indoors and the floor is sloped back. So when it rains, the rain comes in under the door and creates a problem. And the D.E.C is aware of the materials we have and out of the 20 or 30 materials we have, they cited 2 that they said they would like to have bermed. Now one of those is a detergent that is one of the main components of Joy dishwashing detergent. But if they want that particular tank bermed, I will berm it. They suggested that since I was looking at relocating into the town and the sewer district, that it would be better to do it there. And they even said that our little bits of hand washing and utensil washings which count as domestic waste, would be very much better in the sewer district."

Councilman Pike, "What are the 2 ingredients which the D.E.C. wanted bermed?"

George Chekijian, "One is a nonionic detergent which is an ingredient of Joy and the other one is a licaether which is an ingredient of 409. It has the characteristic smell. It is called davonall DPM. It's a material you can rub all over yourself and you will not end up with any problems but they said those two of all the things could be bermed."

Councilman Pike, "Now in your new facility, have you made any design provision for containment of spills if there were to be any?"

George Chekijian, "Not as yet. The D.E.C. suggests waiting until we had approval and then getting their advice for this particular thing."

Councilman Pike, "And it's your understanding that the D.E.C. will basically require that you build a containment facility?"

George Chekijian, "For the two items."

Councilman Pike, "And that any spill that would occur of those two items would be collected and not put into the sewer system?"

George Chekijian, "That's correct. It would be too expensive to put into the sewer system. Number one; we're looking at a costly item. And number two; if it would go into the sewer system (let's say) in trace amounts, it would make no difference but certainly one wouldn't want to discharge the whole thing into the sewer."

Councilman Pike, "So that basically you have to create a containment system that has no outflow out of the building either into the sewer system or into the ground."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

George Chekijian, "Yes that's correct. But you're only looking at about a 6 or 8 square foot area."

Councilman Pike, "I understand. I just want to understand that clearly. That is not currently in your plans?"

George Chekijian, "No it is not."

Councilman Pike, "So you wouldn't mind it if we required it as part of the approval?"

George Chekijian, "I would welcome it."

Councilman Pike, "Are you telling us that absolutely every raw ingredient that you use in the manufacturing process is known to the D.E.C. and disclosed in writing?"

George Chekijian, "They have, I think a few years ago we had to submit not only a floor plan of every mixing tank and storage tank but we listed every single raw material ingredient we have on the floor. Even those in 5 gallon pails and they have a list of those. They have a safety data sheet and full specifications on every one of those items."

Councilman Pike, "Just as an item of information, this really isn't directly related to what we have control over. But I noticed in the products that none of the ones that you've shown us list their ingredients. Is that.... Are they complying with federal regulations?"

George Chekijian, "Yes. They don't have to. These are not drugs. They are not cosmetics. The DIF wallpaper stripper which Mr. Ehlers just handled, has a clean bill of health. It's absolutely nonpolluting. It's the wallpaper stripper. The company I make that for is over 140 years old."

Councilman Pike, "This is really just for my information. If I had a small child and he were clever enough to open this and swallow half of it."

George Chekijian, "It wouldn't hurt him. It might make him a little nauseous and he might not do it again. Actually I did."

Councilman Pike, "So basically what you're saying the federal government treats this stuff as so safe that they don't even require to disclose it or to put safety regulations about treatment if you swallow this stuff."

George Chekijian, "That's correct. In fact, I have done some research into the hand cleaner. I was a little bit concerned because it has 1 or 2 petroleum products and they said due to the fact that they're emulsified, if a child should eat some of this, at worst it would make them throw up."

Councilman Pike, "I have no further questions."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Councilman Boschetti, Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Now we offer to the audience the opportunity to comment on this application. Is there anyone present who wishes to comment on the application of Mr. Chekijian? Mr. Haizlip."

Steve Haizlip, Calverton, "The Town Clerk, Mrs. Pendzick, read at the beginning the attorney can not be here and there was correspondence to his opposition to be read and put into the record. I would like to hear it read so I can rebutt it if I can or if there's any part in there that I want to rebutt."

Irene Pendzick, "It's addressed to me as the Town Clerk. Please be advised that I'm the attorney for Mr. George Pionko, a resident of Riverhead who had received a notice of public hearing with regard to resolution #685 which refers to a special permit application of George Chekijian. Please be advised that Mr. Pionko will be out of state on the date of the hearing and I, therefore, request that his opposition to the said application be noted and read into for the record. Thanking you for all you courtesy in this regard, I am, very truly yours, Frank C. Praete, Jr."

Supervisor Janoski, "That's it Steve. I understand what you're saying. You interpreted that to be there was a long statement of opposition. That's simply the letter. Did you wish to be recognized sir?"

Steve Haizlip, "Coming back up after I had the letter read. From what I can understand here and what Mr. Chekijian is saying and has presented, it's like that guy that has the tapes up there. A pretty tough name to announce. From what I understand here, the safety of this product is no worse than what's going on right now in any community. Not only in this town, any community. For example; Steve Jennings washing of engines, detergents put into water, heated up, put on the engines, come out, go down in the sewer ground. All the car washes, the same thing. And all the residences of dishwashing and hand cleaning there and rinsing off which all industrial establishments have like in sugar products, washing so forth. So I don't see any harm here or any problem and I'm for it."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Steve. The lady that had her hand up before."

Patricia Borrelli, Bethpage, "Thank you for the opportunity to address the Board this evening. As a taxpayer and adjacent property owner and concerned citizen I am protesting the building of this non-toxic mild safe chemical factory because of the following reasons: concern for the safety and purity of our drinking water. The homeowners in this long established and I repeat long established residential area depend on well water for their drinking needs. In addition, the town wells are located nearby. How will these factory products affect these same wells in both the short and long term? What happens to the waste byproducts? What happens when the tanks are cleaned? Where is the waste going? What

will be affected? Do we know? In order to allay natural fears and concerns, I am demanding that an independent firm be hired to investigate the same facility now operational in Calverton. This firm should go in unannounced in the facility to test both water and soil samples. Only after their findings are examined and brought forward to those residents most affected, can any decision be made. If this Board is truly committed to serving the best interests of the residents in the community it must approach this request with caution. Until it can clearly be shown that this factory will not in any way disturb alter or impair the area or its resources. I had come earlier to this meeting tonight in order to see the long form called the environmental assessment form. I have not been able to see that. In addition I wanted to see the copy of the sewer district report which I did not see and a list of critical environment areas designated by the town to see if this same area is a fragile area. I have not been able to access that."

Supervisor Janoski, "Let me just say that this application has been here for months and your attempt this evening to see those documents, certainly does not mean that...."

Patricia Borrelli, "The environmental long form was not present at the last meeting sir."

Supervisor Janoski, "I understand that ma'am. But a whole number of weeks have gone by between then and now. And the reason that we're having this hearing...."

Patricia Borrelli, "We were told at the last meeting..."

Supervisor Janoski, "Ma'am. Wait a minute. I listened to you. Now it's your turn to listen to me. That is the reason we are having this public hearing is because we had the long form but it was not recorded as part of the documents that are on file. Now what the Town Board has done is hold another public hearing specifically for that reason. Now we have one on file. Is that not the case? It is on the file and this Town Hall is open from that Town Board meeting to this one every day from 8:30 to 4:30. And if you'd like to see it, we will make sure that you see it. But please don't intimate that we have some how obstructed your ability to see those documents."

Patricia Borrelli, "I would like to see them as a matter of record."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Board on the matter of this application. Mr. Chekijian, certain questions were asked here. Would you like to add anything to your testimony?"

George Chekijian, "Based on Mrs. Borrelli."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "You have to come to the microphone once again and identify yourself for the record."

George Chekijian, "Only on the subject of the sensitive environmental area. I think everything at least in a 50 mile radius around us is in a sensitive environmental area as far as the groundwater is concerned. We have no intention of polluting the groundwater. There is a sewer district. There is town water there and of course we're not enormous users of water. There's no possibility of polluting any of the groundwater here. I don't see the particular..."

Councilman Prusinowski, "George I want to ask a question for the record. Do you intend to discharge any wastewater into the ground?"

George Chekijian, "We don't intend to discharge any wastewater into the ground or into the sewer. We will have wastewater from washing of the hands and the few utensils we wash. Yes that will go into the sewer district which is a small amount. This is considered domestic sewage. It is nothing different than in household in any of Suffolk County or any place in the whole country."

Councilman Prusinowski, "But you're going to be hooked into the sewer district or to a dry well?"

George Chekijian, "Into the sewer district. No dry wells."

Councilman Prusinowski, "No cesspools, no septic tanks?"

George Chekijian, "No cesspools, no septic tanks."

Councilman Prusinowski, "And you said to Mr. Pike's question that if we required you certain things in the containment in the building that you would welcome it."

George Chekijian, "Yes. That's correct."

Councilman Prusinowski, "I think that should get a yes or no answer."

George Chekijian, "That's in case there's vandalism or a tank is ruptured or something like that or an earthquake occurs, for those reasons it's a good idea."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Would you mind if we inspected your facility?"

George Chekijian, "I would not mind at all."

Councilman Prusinowski, "With an independent agent if we choose."

George Chekijian, "That's perfectly acceptable to me. The D.E.C. has come in. They've come in unannounced. They come and say what's in this drum and what's in that drum."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "Ok. Thank you George. Is there anyone who wishes to add anything as far as input? Steve."

Steve Haizlip, "Mrs. Borrelli from Bethpage speaks of having an independent agent unannounced to go in. From my understanding of the D.E.C. and attending hearings here and the way these people control these swimming pools, lakes and fisheries, lands and coastal zones and so forth, I don't think you can get any tighter agency than the D.E.C. myself."

Supervisor Janoski, "I'm not going to comment on the D.E.C. Is there anyone else who wishes to add anything? Yes ma'am. In the back."

Pat Klodaski, Riverhead, "I live on Gregory Place. The street right behind Raynor Avenue. I don't know how you pronounce your last name but you mentioned something about burning."

Supervisor Janoski, "Berming, berming. It means the creation of...."

Pat Klodaski, "I thought he was talking about burning. That drums would have to be burned and I was going to say that I thought there was an ordinance where we could not burn in Riverhead."

Supervisor Janoski, "Except the D.E.C. is going to tell us we're going to have to burn garbage. I'm sorry. I didn't mean to say that."

Pat Klodaski, "Well I think that's becoming a necessity."

Councilman Pike, "Basically berming is to build walls around floor areas so that if anything is spilled on the floor it can't go anywhere. It stays contained."

Pat Klodaski, "Ok. I'm sorry. I misunderstood. I thought that was what he was referring to."

Supervisor Janoski, "Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Board on the matter of the application? Mr. Nohejl passes? That being the case and without objection, I declare the hearing closed. Let's keep right on going with the resolutions."

- (7) Parking area at Washington Avenue Fishing Point (unprotected beach).
- (8) Parking area at Wading River Boat Launch.
- (9) Parking area at Stotzky Park.
- (10) Parking area at Wading River Community Park.

Delete B. Permits, as is currently written and replace with following:

B. PERMITS

The Recreation Department is hereby authorized to issue a parking permit for use at any public bathing beach or recreation center. Parking permits for parking vehicles in the designated parking areas shall be issued as follows:

1. RESIDENT PARKING PERMIT

(a) A resident parking permit shall be issued to all persons who are qualified residents of the Town of Riverhead. Persons applying for a resident parking permit will be requested to submit for inspection and one (1) of the following as proof of residence:

(d) Parking by non-residents is strictly prohibited at the following locations:

- (i) Reeves Beach.
- (ii) Wading River Beach and Boat Ramp at Creek Road.

(e) There will be no cost for a resident parking permit.

C. NON-RESIDENT PARKING PERMIT

(1) A non-resident parking permit shall be issued by the Riverhead Recreation Department to all persons who do not qualify as residents as defined in 48-13 A hereof.

(2) The fee for the issuance of a non-resident parking permit shall be one hundred dollars (\$100.00) annually or ten dollars (\$10.00) daily.

(3) Daily non-resident parking permits may be issued for the parking of vehicles at all Town Beaches to any person by the attendant on duty at such parking areas.

D. HOTEL-MOTEL PARKING PERMITS

So I would ask that the resolutions come before the public hearings if possible because usually they're special interest groups. They fill the room and they stay 9, 10 and the resolutions could be done in a half hour."

Supervisor Janoski, "With resolutions, you can't tell from one meeting to the next how long that part of the agenda is going to be. It could be a lengthy one like this evening, it could be short. So to schedule a public hearing, we would be scheduling something for after this indeterminate amount of time. It becomes very difficult. We'll certainly think about

it, look at it and see what can be done."

Dick Benedict, "Like I say, for the people who come here all the time who want to follow the resolutions, public interest groups (you know) have their say and rightfully so but they do run quite late at times. And I've talked to several of the other regulars, I would like to be considered again this year. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Was Bill Nohejl involved in this? Mr. Kasperovich. Well you're one of the regulars. You're a regular guy. Who's right? I never pick on my mother. I know she's out of order. Mr. Kasperovich would you like to? You certainly may."

Mr. Kasperovich, "The five minute limit for speaking is a joke. And year after year you continue it. You allow some people to stand up here and talk for 20 minutes. If a shyster gets up here, you give him all the time he wants."

Supervisor Janoski, "He's talking about lawyers."

Mr. Kasperovich, "See he recognizes who a shyster is. He's familiar with that area of work. And so once again you start the the same rigamaroll. If a man has something to say, he should be allowed enough time to say it. If it's unfortunate for you or to you (which ever way you want to put it) that he's a slow speaker or can't be quick about it, it's not his fault. The people in the township should be thankful that he has enough concern to get up here and talk at all. So this business of introducing this five minutes once again rubs me the wrong way because you people don't apy particular attention to it. Secondly, since Mr. Janoski you pass this corner at least once a day, I'd like to know what the town is doing about repairing the bad trench work in laying the water pipe at the intersection of Route 25A and Wading River Manorville Road."

Supervisor Janoski, "I asked the Highway Superintendent about that just yesterday."

Mr. Kasperovich, "Well this has been getting progressively worse for about three or four weeks not just yesterday."

Supervisor Janoski, "His response was that it is taken care of."

Mr. Kasperovich, "But it is something that was done by a private contractor that was engaged by the Shorewood Water Supply Company not the highway department. Either way the highway department has got no fault about this. This was something that was done."

Supervisor Janoski, "Do you want an answer or did you just want to..."

Mr. Kasperovich, "Well you introduced the highway department. They have got nothing to do with it. What are you as the Town Board doing about it?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Bill, the streets and highways of the Town of Riverhead are under the authority of the Highway Superintendent who is elected by the people. We have no jurisdiction over them."

Mr. Kasperovich, "Well I would suggest you talk to your Town Attorney and find where your jurisdiction starts and ends. This is a public road that was, a hazard was created by a private contractor and it's up to the Town Board to act."

Supervisor Janoski, "You are absolutely wrong Mr. Kasperovich and I've waited seven years to tell you that."

Mr. Kasperovich, "Well I'm glad that's the only kind of mistake I make is once every seven years. I must be doing pretty good."

Supervisor Janoski, "I've controlled myself before."

Mr. Kasperovich, "No you didn't. Ever since you threw me out of here by force with the police, then you did not restrain yourself."

Supervisor Janoski, "I have to say this to you Bill that the five minute resolution is known as the Bill Kasperovich resolution in the Town Hall. The simple answer to your question is that I talked to the Highway Superintendent concerning that intersection, pointed out that the roadway was deteriorating where they had done that trench work. And his answer to me was that, and I quote, it is being taken care of. Now I don't know what else I can tell you."

Mr. Kasperovich, "Well that's a pretty vague answer. If the man is doing something, he certainly should tell the Supervisor what he's doing."

Supervisor Janoski, "I certainly don't expect that we're going to have to wait all winter either which is why I asked about it yesterday."

Supervisor Janoski, "I've got a suggestion for you."

Mr. Kasperovich, "And if it isn't, then we'll have to take other avenues of recourse in order to get it attended to because our Supervisor isn't taking care of it."

Supervisor Janoski, "Bill you know you drive around and I see you around here an awful lot. Why don't you take a ride up to the highway garage. I'm sure they'd be happy to see you and talk to Charlie directly. I mean the guy is up there. He's got an office. Thank god he's not here tonight. He'd kill me for this. Why don't you go up and see him?"

William Kasperovich, "I work for free for the highway department on a regular basis. You have no idea how many times I am there at the highway department assisting them and advising them. So don't get this bologna about telling me where they're located."

Supervisor Janoski, "Alright. Thank you Bill. Happy New Year."

William Kasperovich, "Every year since you've been in office, I asked the good lord for (russian word) devine wisdom and he hasn't listened to me. So we may as well be happy about it because he certainly isn't giving us help with the men on the podium."

Supervisor Janoski, "Well Happy New Year anyhow."

Ed Powers, Aquebogue, "I just want to tell Bill the reason why things don't get down on the highways in the winter time, the asphalt plants close down as of Christmas time. They don't open up again until spring. So there's no way of getting asphalt Bill."

Supervisor Janoski, "you can get asphalt. I swear that you can. He's right. They do close down but if you.... Does anyone else have anything to add to this? Then without objection, this meeting is adjourned."
