Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Wiwczar did we get a site plan on Woolco? If that one's in we'll work on it later on in the evening.

Sergeant Grossman would you note that one about the State Office for the Disabled and make sure that's on the day pad of the evening of the 16th such that it would block off space for that thing to go in. There's some correspondence on that one."

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Site Plan Application - Robert Mance - (truck repair, Pulaski Street & Route 58).

Supervisor Smith: "We have referred that particular site plan to the Polish Town Civic Association. There is a letter that is coming to us on that one. That brings us to that portion of the agenda where we'll recognize anyone choosing to address the Town Board on any matter. If you are here to address the application of Mr. Picone for a non-nuisance industry in Calverton or you are here to address the Town Board with reference to the proposed Arby's on Roanoke Avenue and 58, we would ask that you hold your comments until such time as Mrs. Pendzick calls those hearings to order. If, however, you

not here to speak on either of those two matters, we'll listen to you at this time. I ask you please come forward and use the microphone."

Marty Rothberg, owner of Martin's Drugs, Route 58; "My drug store is, unfortunately, located behind the Neptune Diner and completely invisible from the main road, Route 58. The Town originally saw fit to allow a sign there for the entire shopping center located being, the diner and, therefore, hidden from sight.

My first notification of the Town going to take down my sign, I assume, was in the newspaper. Most of the local businessmen were not consulted to my knowledge of the Town Beautification Ordinance, I believe it is. However, I believe that with business as hard pressed as it is in the entire Town, anything that is going to financially hurt any of the businesses should not be forced upon these businesses.

In my particular case, it's a particular hardship because my store and the other stores are completely hidden. In many other cases, it's a financial hardship inflicting costs of some expensive signs and ripping down. Financial conditions being what they are in this Town, I think it's more important to try and feed the economy before we try to beautify the Town."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Rothberg in part in anticipation of your stopping by and knowing that possibly some others would stop by, this is what you see here on the board, is approximately one fifth of our catalog of signs as of January of 1976 in the Town. I think maybe to explain to you as I tried to on the phone the other day, I can read you a statement I prepared which we'll put in the local papers so that everybody gets the benefit of it and for other people that quite possibly wish to address this particular issue this evening and maybe that gives everybody some back ground which we can work.

In recent weeks, there have been several newspaper articles about the Town Board and its position on business signs in the Town of Riverhead. The reason these articles appear is a deadline which is approaching. This deadline was established by the Town board almost three years ago. In that many things have happened during that time, it is well to review the history of Riverhead's sign laws.

The history of restrictive sign ordinances in the East End probably began in Easthampton in 1960. At that time, the Easthampton Town Board enacted an ordinance providing for the phasing out of wood signs in five years and metal ones in ten years. In the mid-1960's, the Easthampton

Town Board was sued and the litigation continued into the early 1970's when the metal signs came down.

In 1971 and 1972, the Towns of Southold and Southampton enacted restrictive sign ordinances. The Easthampton and Southold ordinances were upheld in the New York Courts. The Southampton ordinance was upheld in the State Courts and recently in the United States Supreme Court. In 1975, in part, because of our neighboring Towns' actions, there was increased sign activity in Riverhead. Faced with this reality, a citizens group, called "The Committee" began to turn its attention to signs. In February, 1975, the Town Board held a Hearing on an Easthampton-type ordinance. As a result of sign-interest complaints, the Town Board held a second hearing in September 1975, to consider a Southampton-type ordinance, which was less restrictive than the ordinance previously proposed. In the Fall of 1975, it was suggested by the citizens group that the firm of Visions, Inc., be hired to advise the Town on signs and related problems. (In September 1976, the citizens advisory committee officially became Riverhead Townscape.) At the second sign hearing, the sign interests again appeared, again complained and asked for additional time to make suggestions to the Town Board about what would be "reasonable". Instead of making suggestions, however, during the months from September 1975, to January 1976, the billboard people ran around Riverhead putting up new billboards. In January 1976, it was obvious to the Town Board that the sign interests were only stalling so that they could erect as many signs as they could in Riverhead before our ordinance went into effect. As a result, the Town Board adopted the Southampton-type ordinance which, essentially, banned all new signs and provided for phasing out of the old ones.

The adoption by the Riverhead Town Board of a sign ordinance on January 20, 1976, was not the end of the Town Board's work on signs. Shortly after this ordinance enactment, the Town Board was sued by the billboard interests and this suit, including the costs thereof, continues today, even though the billboard interests have lost their suit on the similar Southampton ordinance all the way to the United States Supreme Court. In the spring of 1976, the Town Board instituted a new and unique meeting of the Planning, Zoning, and Town Boards, Conservation Advisory Council, members of the Building Department and others, which we call the Joint Board. This Joint Board meets monthly to discuss the zoning and planning problems that face Riverhead. From the first meeting of the Joint Board to its latest meetings, signs and their attendant problems have been on the agenda. On several occasions, sign interest representatives have attended and have made suggestions. Where and when these

suggestions have been reasonable, the Town Board has called Public Hearings on the suggestions. Some of those suggestions have been amended into our sign ordinance. Such a suggestion that has found its way into the ordinance was the 32 square foot requirement for on-premises business signs, i. e., the Yamaha sign on Route 58. Changes in the ordinance have come about because of the hard work of the members of the Joint Board, without suggestions from the sign interests, such as the pending changes on roof signs suggested by Zoning Board member, John Kobylenski. Further changes in the sign ordinance are possible and probably, such as changes to permit multiple wall signs where a business has multiple wall exposures because it fronts on more than one street or public access. A sub-committee of the Chamber of Commerce has been formed to make such suggestions. The Town Board believes that it should get (and wants) these suggestions to know what the business sector needs before the Town Board starts holding further Hearings. To help this Committee of the Chamber, the Town Board is again bringing representatives of Visions, Inc., to Riverhead to make a presentation aimed at business signs.

From 1975 to today, the Riverhead Town Board has worked hard on the issues caused by signs. It has helped form citizen advisory committees. It has paid for consultants. It has held public and private meetings to discuss the issues. It has defended lawsuits. Members of the Town Board, Planning Board, Zoning Board, Building Department, etc., have worked with anyone from McDonald's to roadside stands who wished to discuss these issues rationally and intelligently. There is, however, a point where such discussions break down. It is unfortunate that the point where such discussions break down often become the news of the week (remember the "Green Thumb" case). The Town Board is willing to define for you, the reader, the breaking point that it has established and is willing to let you judge whether the Town Board has acted wisely in what it has done since 1975.

The "breaking point" is not hard to define. Anyone who has a car can find it. The Town Board asks you to make two trips in your car. First, we ask you to drive Route 27 (Montauk Highway) from Bridgehampton to Montauk Point. Next, we ask you to drive from Nicholls Road, in either direction along Route 25 (Old Country Road). There are two extremes between which a line can be drawn along which we will find the breaking point. We begin at the Easthampton end of the line and we head towards the other end. The Town Board's amendments to the sign ordinance prove we don't break down close to the Easthampton end. Our defense of the billboard lawsuit shows we break well before we get to Route 25, Middle Island. In short, we don't want Riverhead to ever look like

that mess. The Town Board has permitted off-premise directional signs, but has not permitted lighted flashing signs. The Town Board's breaking point is somewhere in the middle along the line. We feel it is reasonable point arrived at after three years of hard work. We hope that you agree.

Now that sort of review of where we've been and we'd listen to anybody that wants to pick on us."

Bruce Ross, PDF Furniture, Route 58; "I'm in the same shopping center that Marty is in and we have a unique problem and the unique problem is we are set back off the road, behind the Neptune Diner. We're lost. Without the road signs, we're going to lose business."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Ross we've written into the ordinance in part as a result of one of the meetings we had with some of the business interests, what we call a shopping center sign. It provides for a large identification type sign on top and strip signs underneath with each and every owners sign therein."

Bruce Ross: "Can I say something about that?"

Supervisor Smith: "Yes."

Bruce Ross: "There's ten stores - twelve stores throughout that shopping center. At 55 miles an hour, you're not going to see it."

Supervisor Smith: "You go 55 on that road, you're going to be in a hell of an auto accident."

Bruce Ross: "Whatever speed, they go right by it. I got a sign up there that 3 by 10. People have missed that too."

Supervisor Smith: "So there's twelve stores in there. Each one by your theory is entitled to one 3 by 10 sign?"

Bruce Ross: "No I'm not saying that's true, but according to the permit that Martin Rothberg got when he

put up the sign was that he could have a set of poles and whoever was in at that time, put up their signs and no more signs were permitted after that. I'm not saying that we should cut everybody else down. I'm not trying to keep anybody out. But I don't want to lose whatever my sign has done for me in the last six years and it's done an awful lot."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Ross, you see that's the problem with what you proposed. There has to be some rational, reasonable way to distinguish your 3 by 10 sign from every other one of the twelve shop owners in the Neptune Shopping Center. What you're telling us, as a point of discussion, is why should you have one and the guy next door to you not have one . . . "

Bruce Ross: "As far as I'm concerned, they can have all they want. I'm not stopping them."

Supervisor Smith: "So your position is then that we could put up in front of the Neptune Diner on Route 58, twelve 3 by 10 signs?"

Bruce Ross: "I didn't suggest that. All I'm suggesting to you is that the people that are on the poles now, and that have been on the poles since they went up, if you take those signs down, those people are going to hurt. It's a special case because it is behind the Neptune Diner. Most businesses in a shopping center have nothing blocking them and they can be seen from the road. We can't."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Ross, in your particular instance, of course, you are entitled to amortize your existing signs, to recover whatever you have invested in that sign. Now you may keep that sign up for five years, you may keep it up for six."

Bruce Ross: "How do I go about doing that?"

Supervisor Smith: "There's a form that will be adopted this evening providing for a schedule of amortization, the things you must show us, and we'll do that. We have already done that with the McDonald's Corporation, and I am told that the Burger King Corp., is ready to come in voluntarily to comply with the ordinance."

Paul Smith, Zdunko Lane, Riverhead; "Would it be fair to ask Alex Horton or one of his aids, to give us his view points on this road, or am I jumping the gun?"

Supervisor Smith: "I think you're jumping the gun. A) because I don't think he's here, and B) I think he'll want to go out there and look. We've been sued on in case you haven't been reading the papers in the last two years on private roads repeatedly, and the process that's been established in one of those lawsuits calls for us to get the petition from you, to give it to Mr. Horton, for Mr. Horton to reply in writing, then we pass a resolution and then we get sued.

Is there anybody else either on signs or roads?"

Richard Spanburg, Union Avenue, Aquebogue; "Since then, Mr. Horton came up, I thought this would be a good opportunity to bring up a point that I discussed with the Town Board at the last Town Board Meeting with regards to asking the members of the Town Board or Councilman or Councilmen to please go down to Union Avenue in Aquebogue, and to check out the situation that I brought to the attention of the Town Board at the last meeting and I was wondering if any of the members of the Town Board have gone down, if they have inspected the area involved, and I've spoken to Mr. Horton concerning his procedures involved with the clearance and what the results of that particular inspection by the Town Board members may have disposed."

Councilman Young: "I think we all — everyone of us went down and looked at it. I know I spoke to Alex about it and I spoke to the man who actually did the work. I happened to run into him in a diner and I think mainly the problem is one of the handling of the thing. It wasn't done in a diplomatic way. I don't think that Alex did anything that was illegal. All of the cutting was done in front of the telephone poles between the poles and the road which is Town property and which should be kept clear for traffic purposes, if nothing else. But I think Alex realized and was told that it wasn't done very diplomatically and I know the man that spoke to me realizes that it wasn't done diplomatically."

Richard Spanburg: "Well I realize that it wasn't done diplomatically. At this point, I'm not upset about the fact of the diplomacy involved. I mean that was a fact that happened and it can't be retracted when set. But I was wondering about the aftermath of the damage that Mr. Horton's crew has caused. I mean they came in, they did their job, which you said they were entitled to do and I think you're correct in saying that Mr. Young. I wonder is it also right for them to leave the garbage and the beer cans and everything else that they've managed to unearth in this clearing process right exactly where they found it or do they feel that they could at least bring a truck along to pick up that garbage and did they feel that it was also right that when they were clearing this land that each one of us had to go out and clean up our driveways because of the mess that was left by the crew."

Councilman Young: "I'll tell him to go back and clean it up."

Richard Spanburg: "My point would have to be though, I came down, I took the initiative to come down and present this to the Town Board. I'm just curious about how many people have to put up with the imposition such as this without at least airing their views in front of the Town Board.

I mean why should it be every time we want something done, that you must come down to the Town Board to have this work accomplished and a lot of the problems could have been avoided if a little public relations was executed by the Highway Department. Now if they created a mess, I shouldn't have to ask them twice then to come down and clear the property. The request was made the first time to Mr. Horton directly. It was made to the Town Board at the last Town Board Meeting and now it's made again tonight. I feel that there should be some type of Advisory Committee to the Highway Department and working out the problems that the number of the citizens of this Town seem to have with that Department."

Councilman Young: "I'll speak to Alex if you want me to and he'll probably come down and do it. But I can't promise because he's elected by you people and you people are his boss, not the Town Board, and he's the type of a person that doesn't take orders from the Town Board."

Richard Spanburg: "I appreciate that Mr. Young."

Councilman Regula: "Mr. Spanburg if I may say a few words. I know, I went down, inspected the thing, and I'm sure every other Town Board Member did and I've also spoken to Mr. Horton and as George said, he was within his rights, however, there's always that fine line. I know there was something about the Newsday box and according to him, he didn't think his employee did that. So there was only at one point, I believe, I know I spoke to Councilman Lombardi and there was only at one point, we felt that they might have gone in too far or what, but on picking up that garbage, it seems — I know, I get calls and I'm the new member here, I get calls quite often where they just have to request these things because of whatever the highway department's doing, whether leaves or private roads or what. I think we sometimes have to follow through a little more to get some of these things done, but I don't feel after speaking to Mr. Horton that he was doing it for any other reason, as I understand it, at the last meeting, then to just get his job done. If they went in a little too far on the property, they probably would apologize."

Richard Spanburg: "I think I'm executing extreme patience in my dealings with Mr. Horton. But I would just like to add as a post script to your comments, that if the job is done sufficient except in one place, where it may have seemed somewhat disturbed, that job is only done sufficiently because, we, as citizens went out there and implored Mr. Horton to realize what his men were doing to the property before he had a chance to do it to every home in the area because if it was left to the employee of the department, I think the whole block would have suffered from it and so it seems like the citizens of the Town have to go out and tell the Town employees how they should operate their job. But I appreciate the Town Board for going down there."

Councilman Menendez: "I went down there also, walked up and down there and took a good look. Granted it's kind of a sloppy job, that part can be rectified. But the part that hasn't been rectified as far as I know, when the employee came out and cussed at your sister-in-law. Now to me there was absolutely no excuse for that."

Richard Spanburg: "I noticed I didn't bring that up tonight."

Councilman Menendez: "Well I'll bring it up because it bothers me. Have you ever had an apology for that?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Richard Spanburg: "No not that I know of, Mr. Menendez."

Councilman Menendez: "Well I think you're due one."

Richard Spanburg: "Well I would have thought that would have been done without having to publicly ask for it."

Councilman Menendez: "Right. It should have been done."

Richard Spanburg: "I thank you."

Supervisor Smith: "Thank you Richard."

Supervisor Smith recessed the meeting to hold a public hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:00 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of public notice that a Public Hearing will be held on November 8, 1978 at 8:00 P.M. at Riverhead Town Hall, to hear all interested persons in the request of Joseph Picone to allow the manufacture of precast concrete products as a non-nuisance industry, located in Calverton, N.Y.

The affidavits were ordered to be placed on file.

Supervisor Smith: "The property that is subject to this particular hearing is on the south side of 25, a little bit west to Milligan, a little bit to the east of the Grumman fence. The proposed use is precast concrete. Is there somebody here to speak on behalf of the applicant?"

Gordon Ahlers, represents applicant; "The produce that's to be made is the concrete envelopes for Veterans Coffins for the National Cemetery. The applicant will abide by the Department of Health. We already have that approval and (illegible) when the business is set up we'll come down and inspect the plant."

Supervisor Smith: "Again Gordon similar to the

applications all inside on this?"

Gordon Ahlers: "Yes."

Supervisor Smith: "No."

Gordon Ahlers: "The only thing outside possibly
might be some storage . . ."

Supervisor Smith: "How much storage do you need?"

Gordon Ahlers: "I believe it was 100 by 300. And
the aisles will be paved between the drying parts and fork
lifts will be used. Incidentally, the applicant is bringing
employment to the local area in the amount of 22 people,
half of which will be at the cemetery and the other half
will be at the plant."

Supervisor Smith: "Anything particular about this
one? Any noise? Any dust? Any light?"

Gordon Ahlers: "No."

Supervisor Smith: "It can all be inside?"

Gordon Ahlers: "This is all inside, yes."

Supervisor Smith: "Is there anyone else who is
present that wishes to testify either for or against the
application of Mr. Picone for the manufacture of concrete
vaults in Calverton?"

No one else wishing to be heard and no communications
having been received thereto, Supervisor Smith declared the
hearing closed at 8:08 P.M.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES

Supervisor Smith: "Is there anyone wishing to be heard on any subject not the subject of a public hearing? The next public hearing we have is that of Mr. Bartasi."

Joe Lopez, Riverhead: "I'd like to ask a question with regard to amortization of signs and whether they're applicable to on-premise and off-premises as well?"

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Lopez, your question is relative to the amortization of on-premises and off-premises signs? The amortization provision applies to any sign that is non-conforming."

Joe Lopez: "Is it non-conforming?"

Supervisor Smith: "Yes. So most off-premise signs will be non-conforming. Some on-premises signs will be non-conforming. There are possibly some on-premises signs that because of unique circumstances such as Mr. Rothberg will be subject to a variance."

Joe Lopez: "I understand that. I ask the question because you mentioned that you were going to consider a formula for amortization of signs this evening? Am I correct?"

Supervisor Smith: "No. What we're going to consider is a form or the substance of a form with reference to what would be required in an application such that the Town Board could make a reasonable judgment on an amortization schedule."

Joe Lopez: "You haven't come to this decision yet? You're still debating this and trying to arrive at a formula for amortization."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Danowski will be happy to give you a copy of what we propose to do."

Joe Lopez: "No that's okay. In other words, you've already formulated a proposal for amortization for non-conforming signs?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedSupervisor Smith: "Yes Sir."Joe Lopez: "Okay. Can I ask you what the formula is at this time?"Supervisor Smith: "It's not a formula Sir. It's what we need to know."Joe Lopez: "What is it that you need to know for a non-conforming sign?"Supervisor Smith: "The source of this, Mr. Lopez, is out of the protracted litigation in the Township of Southampton, the sign interests have been represented rather thoroughly there. There is a companion lawsuit that has been in existence since 1976 in the Town of Riverhead and as a result of that litigation, the discussion that has gone on there, the following criteria or information is requested by the Town Board in the establishment of an amortization schedule. 1) The actual construction cost of your sign. 2) The date your sign was erected. 3) The size and composition (type of material of construction) of your sign. 4) The location of your sign (a sketch or map should be annexed. 5) The cost basis of your sign as of January 20, 1978 and as of January 20, 1979 (construction cost less depreciation) - show the income tax depreciation with respect to your sign from the date of construction to the present. 6) If any expenditures were made for capital improvements to your sign, the dates and amounts thereof. 7) If any expenditures were made for repairs to or maintenance of your sign, the dates and amounts thereof. 8) If you receive income from advertises who place advertisements on your sign, the amount of such income in each year from the date of construction to the present. 9) The amount you have paid the owner of the property on which the sign is erected for the right to locate your sign thereon - specify for each year."Joe Lopez: "Has any consideration been made for signs that may have been accelerated for tax purposes as far as depreciation is concerned or an accountant may advise his client that he can rapidly depreciate a sign because it may be favorable for his tax position. Assuming that a sign can be accelerated and depreciation might take five or six years to do so, whereas a life span of the sign might be 10 or 15 years."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Smith: "What you're asking us to do is consider residual value. We would consider residual value. You must understand, however, Mr. Lopez, that the reason for an amortization provision with any non-conforming use is to see that we do not run afoul of the due process requirements of the Federal Constitution. If, sir, you have an accelerated depreciation, you have recaptured your investment and there is some question of whether or not you're being deprived of property."

Joe Lopez: "Yes, but you're dealing with people that are in business with the community. You have to think in terms of equity forgetting about the term of income taxes and one thing or another. But if a sign is fully depreciated, and still has an existing life span which the government permits you to do of another ten years, I assume you'll take that into consideration?"

Supervisor Smith: "We'll take it into consideration, but we do recognize that you have for your income tax purposes recaptured the entire cost of the improvement."

Joe Lopez: "I understand that, but the impression I have is that you would not consider . . ."

Supervisor Smith: "We're going to consider anything and everything that you wish to include. But we're not so stupid as to believe that the due process thing isn't wiped out because you've used an accelerated depreciation schedule."

Joe Lopez: "No you see that's what I'm afraid of. That's an implication that a person thought premeditatively. That it was premeditating in accelerating his depreciation so he can have his cake and eat it too. This is not the case. There are some people that were advised by their accountants or their attorneys, whoever it may be to do so in all good faith. And if the thing is depreciated completely, and it so has a life span of ten years. . ."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Lopez, what property right are you deprived of if you have with reference to one governmental action paid less income tax sir, when the rest of us are paying our income tax because of your accelerated depreciation."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Joe Lopez: "You can shrug it off lightly, but in reality, if a person has a sign in existence, it has value to him even if he had permission to write it off, and that's what I'm asking you if you'll consider that."

Supervisor Smith: "We'll consider that, yes."

Supervisor Smith recessed the meeting to hold a public hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:15 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of public notice that a Public Hearing will be held on November 8, 1978 at 8:15 P.M. at Riverhead Town Hall, to hear all persons interested in the application of Joseph Bartasi for a special permit to construct and operate a drive-in restaurant (Arby's) in a Business C Use District, at Route 58, east of Roanoke Avenue.

The affidavits were ordered to be placed on file.

Supervisor Smith: "Does anyone want to talk on Arby's? This is on the south side of County Road 58. It was previously on before the Town Board, previously sent to the Planning Board. The recommendation of the Planning Board was to move the Arby's from where it was proposed to the east one lot, that is what Mr. Arby and the developer wish to do. Does anyone want to talk to us about Arby's?"

Mike Esposito, Riverhead; "This is a complete surprise to me. I came down on an entirely different matter. I had no idea Joe Bartasi was still around. I see you up there working Joe. I definitely want to speak against an Arby's at that second location. My understanding was that Arby's was going as far east as Row Bow Wash with a little bit of room in between for office buildings and the like — that they want to construct restaurant after restaurant on that one location directly opposite the same hospital that was in existence that brought forth all my objections originally. Now I have no objections to an Arby's or a Pizza Hut or a Long John's Silvers or anybody. They're going to come to this Town and my objection before has always been that they are directly opposite the only hospital facility within a twenty-mile radius. Now to construct two of them directly opposite the same hospital that I opposed the single operation on, to me seems crazy. I just can't believe that they would come

PUBLIC HEARING - continuedMike Esposito continues:

forth with a second restaurant which has all the same objections, I put forth on the first time that they congregate late at night. They attempt to attract a noisier crowd and that you're talking about the only hospital facility that the people in this community and the surrounding communities depend upon.

I watched the building going up on 58 and I've seen the plans and I've noted there are no south bound turns allowed on Roanoke Avenue and there are no west turns allowed off of 58. Yet I have seen the abutments constructed and I've seen the tar-laying trucks make a left-hand turn on 58 and I've seen Mapes come out of that development with the same abutment there and make a left-hand turn on Roanoke Avenue. Now I don't think that those things have been put in big enough. I think that we're going to have to station a policeman at there at all times to direct traffic and we're going to pay for the mistakes that you guys are letting them make right now. And this is what I have to say. And letting them put in a second restaurant up there and thumb their nose at us, I think we're a bunch of damn fools."

Supervisor Smith: "Thank you Mr. Esposito. We will make your comments from the prior hearings part of this one. There was some question of whether or not we should have a second hearing in that we had the prior one. The reason that we hold it is so that you had the opportunity to address this tonight and we'll take your comments into consideration as we did in the prior occasion and specifically if what is needed is a larger curb and a steeper angular turn, the application that we previously approved remain subject to the Town Board and we'll have Mr. Bartasi tear up the concrete and put some more down with a sharper turn out closer to the curb line. Anyone else with reference to the application for Arby's?"

Mr. Esposito appeared before the Town Board in opposition of the special permits of Mr. Bartasi re Long John Silvers, Pizza Hut, and Arby's. See Minutes of March 21, 1978, July 18, 1978, and August 1, 1978.

Shirley Smith, Riverhead; "I did not expect to speak to this matter this evening, however, we're here with regard to signs and if the gentleman who is seeking to be heard on this permit tonight, would kindly take into consideration the matter of signs, I would implore him as Co-Chairman of Townscape to consider specifically that we do have a problem with signs, and I don't know how far ranging Arby's appears up and down

PUBLIC HEARING - continuedShirley Smith continues:

the countryside, but it has been specifically noted and it's historically documented in other areas of the country that fast-food shops do not need signs 50 feet high, flashing on and off, so that it would be kind to the town, to the community residents, to the sign ordinance, and those of us who have concerned ourselves with the view, the visibility, and the look of this Town for Mr. Bartasi to talk with the Townscape people and we would invite him to take some suggestions that local artisans have put forth as to suggestions for signs of this type for fast-food stores."

Supervisor Smith: "Mrs. Smith, we have assembled for the purposes of the anticipated discussion this evening of signs, a Lincoln Mercury Dealer Sign, a McDonald's Sign, a Kentucky Fried Chicken Sign, a Dodge Sign, a Sunocco Sign, an Arby's Sign, Toyota, Good Year, and Manufacturer's Hanover that all comply with 32 square feet and come here and look at the Arby's sign that they want to put up and see if they make you happy. It's Smithtown. Take them with you, I have copies. Is there anybody else on Arby's?"

No one else wishing to be heard and no communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Smith declared the hearing closed at 8:24 P.M.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES

Francis O'Dowd, 14 Wildwood Trail, Riverhead: "I want to congratulate you on the lovely pictorial, the example of the signs and if you give them a careful study, you see how really beautiful they are. They ought to be in the hall where the public can view them. A sign is in the eye of the beholder and the fathers that founded this community organized certain districts for commerce, signs were part of it. Now there's no reason why perhaps 200 years later that suddenly aesthetics should overcome better judgment and destroy commerce, which is responsible for the founding of Towns. Now this is a copy of the Traveler Watchman, October 26, 1978. It refers to Supervisor Smith. When asked how the law in Riverhead would be enforced, he said simply with chain saws and acetylene torches. Now we see addressed in the media frequently the arrogance of power and I find it hard to believe that you, Allen, would use that language, particularly a man devoted to the law. That sounds like something from Propaganda Administer Gobels when I was back there in Dirchland in 1943."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES

Supervisor Smith: "Okay Mr. O'Dowd I've been at signs in my private practice in the Town for many years. I was one of the attorney's hired in East Hampton. I was one of the attorney's hired in Southold. I was one of the attorney's hired in Riverhead, and other jurisdictions where sign ordinances come into existence. And in truth, in both East Hampton and Southold, it came down to chain saws and acteylene torches. What we tried to do in the Town of Riverhead through Townscape Committee to the history that I recite there, is to have some discussions, legitimate discussions between the business community and the Town Board about what's acceptable for the Town of Riverhead. That opportunity remains open. We invite your active participation with the Chamber of Commerce in making suggestions that are reasonable, and if there are reasonable suggestions, you may be assured that this Town Board will hold them out for a public hearing and let the public determine what should happen. If put to it, I think the Town Board has resolved to go the route that has gone with reference to East Hampton and Southold."

Francis O'Dowd: "I spoke to 25 businessmen on Route 58 a week ago and the last couple of days I walked Main Street in Riverhead, another 25. They were unanimous in the opposition to this Towns banning these signs. It's the life of commerce against government interference."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. O'Dowd, where have you been for three years?"

Francis O'Dowd: "Right here in Riverhead Sir."

Supervisor Smith: "Then you haven't been paying attention to your business, have you, if these are so critical to your enterprise?"

Francis O'Dowd: "Allen I attended a meeting with you in the Howard Johnson's — Eastern Businessmen's Association, and I recall you mentioning at the time, it was arrogant then so I thought and I was rather suprised. You said I'm a counselor and I don't have a sign out. Well traditionally lawyers never did, as far as I know. Perhaps a small little one, but now the Bar Association has permitted them to advertize and broadcast in newspapers all over our country. Thank you Sir."

Supervisor Smith: "Thank you Mr. O'Dowd. I would put a caviat in your theory of signing that every business in

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedSupervisor Smith continues:

Montauk should be broke and I don't see anybody throwing themselves into the sea out there and they haven't had signs for a long while."

Peter Jacks, North Fort Sign Co.,; "I've been coming to a couple of meetings. The Riverhead Townscape made a beautiful sign, a beautiful picture for Star Confectionary and it was going to replace the old rusty sign, if you're familiar with it. We couldn't get a permit for that. It seems it's illegal. The old rusty sign can remain until it falls on somebody's head. This doesn't make sense to me."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Jacks, again, if you will take advantage, I know you have in the past, you were at one of those prior meetings where we selected the 32 square feet and make whatever suggestion you wish to make with reference to that sign or any other sign, we will be more than happy to put it up for public hearing."

Peter Jacks: "Can I make some suggestions now?"

Supervisor Smith: "You most certainly may. You can put them on the record or discuss them with Mr. Danowski as other sign interests did this morning."

Peter Jacks: "What if an important business with a lot of frontage on the main highway should have more than 32 square foot of frontage? The Yamaha sign, I put that up, that's 60 square foot, that's not a large sign. You said 32 square foot. That's 4 by 15. If I'm wrong, we'll measure it up and then it doesn't comply — a 4 by 8 is no bigger than this table, and you cannot read the message going down the road. It might be good in Town."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Jacks, weren't you at the meeting where that was discussed?"

Peter Jacks: "I was to the meetings. This was discussed."

Supervisor Smith: "And wasn't the consensus of your industry that the 4 by 8 sign is what you wanted?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Peter Jacks: "Look I might get a lot of work taking all these signs down and putting up smaller ones, which I don't mind a bit, but the businessmen need large signs if they're in a major business."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Jacks, we sat with you in this room."

Peter Jacks: "All right, but while the signs are still up, these signs are doing a job. They are bringing business into Riverhead. Riverhead is a business community. It's not like East Hampton."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Jacks in my opinion, Riverhead is as good or better than any place around it."

Peter Jacks: "I'm not knocking Riverhead."

Supervisor Smith: "Well some other people begin that routine when discussing signs and somehow were tainted or whorish in Riverhead. I don't see it that way."

Peter Jacks: "No, but I can knock the visual impact of signs."

Supervisor Smith: "You can Sir?"

Peter Jacks: "I would think we might have an Architectural Review Board or something to get them to conform instead of having one sign in front of the other."

Supervisor Smith: "That's a good suggestion."

Peter Jacks: "I don't want to see Riverhead look like back west. You have these signs. I don't see any reason to — they were put up with a permit and now they're illegal. Now they're going to have to come down."

Supervisor Smith: "No Sir. We provide for amortization."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Peter Jacks: "Suppose I wanted to open a car dealership or something and compete with the business that's already here. I would have a 32 square foot sign."

Supervisor Smith: "You would Sir."

Peter Jacks: "And nobody would see it."

Supervisor Smith: "Well you know I've gone around and around on this for four years and let's deal with the car dealership. Under that theory, a guy gets in his car and he drives down 58 and he drives passed the Ford Dealership and he says to his wife let's go buy a car and he pulls into the Ford place. I mean is that really how cars are sold or in fact do people read Suffolk Life, the Traveler, Newsday, etc., etc., shop around for cars, etc., etc., and what their driving up and down 58 for us to find J.J. Hart that they know is in on 58."

Peter Jacks: "Evidently Kinney Chevrolet must of spent \$50,000 for those signs. They light up the whole place. They attract business. I think they look good, they're over-sized, they're coming down in five years, you say?"

Supervisor Smith: "They will come down in whatever period of time he gives us the amortization for."

Peter Jacks: "I think they would last 50 years."

Supervisor Smith: "That's quite possible."

Peter Jacks: "I don't think I've gotten any place."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Jacks, you've heard me give this example before with reference to Kinney Chevrolet. What happens to our community, if now the Goodale Estate which is immediately next door to Kinney Chevrolet and fronts on 105 was taken over by another car dealership? Wouldn't Mr. Kinney complain that nobody could see his signs because the guy next to him had put up 20 signs. You're the sign guy. Could you read 40 signs in 200 and some feet?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Peter Jacks: "Signs have to be regulated. They have to be spaced. They have to be maintained."

Supervisor Smith: "You agree with me, so let's find the point at which it's reasonable and the point that it's unreasonable."

Councilman Young: "I don't think that there's too much to fight about. I think that we all realize that we've got to have signs to have business. This Town Board realizes that. It's just a matter of regulating the signs and we want to regulate them somewhere between the way they're regulated in Selden, which is, no regulation and the way they're regulated in East Hampton, which is too strict and we're having these hearings in order to figure out the best way and we appreciate the input from people like you, who are in the business and who should be able to tell us what kind of signs are most aesthetically pleasing and what kind are the most efficient to get business in and how we compromise to get the Town, the whole Town in the best possible shape that we can."

Peter Jacks: "But it's not easy to request a study. Big books are written on it."

Councilman Young: "We realize this, but you have to start somewhere and here's where we're starting."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Jacks we hired a firm that spent two years here on signs."

Peter Jacks: "It's Townscape?"

Supervisor Smith: "Vision Incorporated. They will be back here next Thursday night at 7:30 either in this room or in the basement."

Peter Jacks: "How can they design signs when there's a moratorium on signs?"

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Jacks I think the document accurately explains why the Town Board did what it did. In

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedSupervisor Smith continues:

1975, the Town Board, I think, was acting reasonably and they said okay we won't act on this ordinance because you guys say there's something wrong with it, but what happened, Mr. Jacks, you were here then?"

Peter Jacks: "I'm here now. I'm talking."

Supervisor Smith: "I know. What happened to our chums with the billboards? They got their 20 or 30 up in three months — they bought with the stall . . ."

Peter Jacks: "I didn't have any rush of work at that time."

Supervisor Smith: "Some people did. That's why we enacted the moratorium."

Peter Jacks: "There's only one thing I would like if you make the law, I would like to see it enforced."

Supervisor Smith: "Yes Sir."

Peter Jacks: "It confuses me to death when I can't get a permit for a sign, but the sign goes up and stays up."

Supervisor Smith: "We will enforce it Sir, January, 1979. Mr. Jacks, one of the things, please talk to Mr. Danowski, make your suggestions. You're one of the fellows that make sense and we'll work with you. Is there anybody else on any matter?"

Allen Cohen, Attorney for Pergaments; "It would seem to me hearing the discussions and not being privy to some of the discussions that had taken place in prior years that as a matter of practicalities, the stores down Main Street as necessity, do not require quite as large a size sign as would a store that's somewhat on the outskirts of Town or in a shopping center.

If you take a store with a 15 foot frontage and you have an 8 foot by 4 foot sign that might be overpowering, but taking that same sign in comparison to a store that is not

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedAllen Cohen continues:

quite as congested and is considerably larger in area to store dwarfs to sign. So I would make this suggestion to you that perhaps the 8 by 4 sign might be satisfactory in the business area, but perhaps this body could work out a rational formula based upon the square frontage of a particular store as to the maximum size of the sign to allow slightly larger signs for stores that are not in the heart of Town that may need a little bit more visibility rather than consumer identification."

Supervisor Smith: "Mr. Cohen, we have suggested on Joint Board Meetings ad nauseam that somebody suggest to us a formula for frontage. In Smithtown, for instance, there is a shopping center type size for car dealerships where he gets his one above sign and then further on down the road if he's got 150 feet, he gets to have another one. Fine, we'll listen to that. Your problem in Pergament is you got a landlord that is a tough guy to deal with, I mean we got problems with him on the site plan. We got problems with him on maintenance. We sit down with the guy and we say this is what the ordinance permits in the way of a shopping center sign and if you do this, you can put Pergament, you can put Guardian and you can put all the rest of it — the guy doesn't cooperate. I hope you have better luck with him than we do. He's had it explained to him twenty times. You got a lease with the guy. Why don't you tell him to pick up the paper. There's plenty of garbage men in Town that will pick it up once he's got it in one place."

Allen Cohen: "I know, in fact, a cement guy will fix his shoes from him too. I know all about that. I just wish that perhaps if we're interested in seeing if we could resolve this to a degree where it may be somewhat more equitable outside the immediate limits of the Town, my people would be more than willing to sit down and meet with whomever from the Town that they feel appropriate to see if we could work up some mathematical guidelines."

Supervisor Smith: "One of your problems in your particular place is your landlord. Don't come without him. Because your solution would be — you know the solution where you end up with 12 signs all 10 by 3 outside the side of the road. That one isn't going to cut it. Let's talk about something — shopping center identification sign, footage formulas and things like that. Those we'll listen to.

Is there anyone else on any topic?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "In one of the communications Mrs. Pendzick read about Brookhaven with the heavy industry. How does that affect Riverhead?"

Supervisor Smith: "Bill we get these things all the times."

Bill Nohejl: "I mean is it on the border or anything of that . . ."

Supervisor Smith: "Bill one of them defines farmers markets as any building or buildings, structure, structures, or premises used by four (4) more transients part-time independent vendors for the sale at retail of produce, goods, wares or merchandise."

Bill Nohejl: "What I'm concerned about if it's on the borderline of Riverhead?"

Mrs. Pendzick: "As I recall, there wasn't any site mentioned, not geographical. It was an amendment and it's required by law that adjoining Towns be notified. We do the same thing to them."

Supervisor Smith: "They're redefining acetylene and junk yards on the second one."

Bill Nohejl: "When is the budget going to be adopted?"

Supervisor Smith: "Tonight I hope."

Bill Nohejl: "I was going to screen through this budget page by page and on quite a bit of the different departments I see a big raise in their expenditures. Is that mostly for wages?"

Supervisor Smith: "Again as I explained Bill in the budget message, which you may not have in front of you, a large portion of it is the fringe benefits."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Bill Nohejl: "No. In personnel, will that be the fringe benefit?"

Supervisor Smith: "Yes. Anyone of the items that are coded 001."

Bill Nohejl: "Let me make it an example. Planning Board, \$10,000 difference."

Supervisor Smith: "That's consultants and engineers in that one, I believe. If you want to take them one at a time, can I suggest this. We take a five minute break, let me get my budget folder in front of me and then you call them out by numbers and I'll try to tell you which ones are which."

Supervisor Smith recessed the meeting for five minutes after which the meeting resumed.

Supervisor Smith: "We left off with certain concerns of Mr. Nohejl and in the break, we picked out some pages that concern him. For instance, on page 32 - Planning Board, is that the one you want?"

Bill Nohejl: "No. First I want to ask you about the \$10,000 difference in the Planning Board Personnel."

Supervisor Smith: "Yes all right."

Bill Nohejl: "That's not page 32."

Supervisor Smith: "I'm talking about account code 8020.100. In that particular account code is the salary for Mr. Hanley who is a Planning Aide in the Community Development Office. Among other things, he is responsible for the Environmental Impact Statements on the Federal Grants that we are obtaining, and also additionally included in there is some portion of the salaries of the Interns, Planning Interns, we have on Board such as Mr. John Brown

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedSupervisor Smith continues:

from Yale who put this together for us.

In the following pages, we come upon the Environmental — page 34, this is account code 8090.400 as you look at it Bill. The account code after the decimal point 100 salaries, 400 contractual expenses, and 800 is fringe benefits. The 400 code goes to \$34,000 as you have noted. That is open space and wetlands inventory with reference to the freshwater wetlands, we have two choices. We either complete the wetlands inventory in house or the great State of New York in its infinite wisdom will regulate and control through its offices as Stony Brook, all activities relative to Freshwater Wetlands in the Town of Riverhead. The Town Board has made the choice at prior meetings to do it ourselves. We have contracted through Cooperative Extension of Suffolk County with Cornell University to do it ourselves. In the revenue pages there will be a state aid item. We get reimbursed for, I believe on this particular program, half of that \$34,470 and change."

Bill Nohejl: "That's what handicapped — you don't know what the code means and when you see figures from a very small amount go up about \$30,000 in one jump, it's hard to follow something without asking about it."

Supervisor Smith: "That's right. I don't mind people asking. I prefer you do it when I got my accountant in the room."

Bill Nohejl: "In general, the total debt or the total taxes for the Town is going to rise I estimate around \$500,000. Am I correct?"

Supervisor Smith: "I don't know."

Bill Nohejl: "Without the salaries included yet."

Supervisor Smith: "I don't know the increase off the top of my head. General fund — let me see if I got it in my budget message. General Fund is approximately \$300,000."

Bill Nohejl: "Yes, but there are a lot of holes that aren't filled in there yet."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Smith: "You know anyone of these total — the total general town ought to be approximately — it goes from \$2,968,429 to \$3,238,000 so that's about \$270,000. But that's now taxes. General Town is up to \$70,000. Highway is up to \$171,000. Lighting \$64,000. Public Parking \$188,000. Road Improvement \$47,000. Sewer \$23,977. Water \$42,000 down. Water Arrears \$347,000 up. The others are special districts and do not apply."

Bill Nohejl: "So what's the total there? What's the total up?"

Supervisor Smith: "\$400,000."

Bill Nohejl: "So the time the holes are filled in, it will be over \$500,000. There's holes that aren't filled in here yet. Your salaries and other things."

Supervisor Smith: "No."

Bill Nohejl: "No."

Supervisor Smith: "If we adopted this tonight, this is the budget that's adopted and which will be raised by taxes. Salaries for Police, Councilmen, and Civil Service Employees are not set at this particular point in time."

Bill Nohejl: "And may I ask what other salary increases have been granted in Riverhead and department heads, besides what you're planning with the Planning Board?"

Supervisor Smith: "We have not negotiated with department heads for the year 1979. We have not finished negotiations with CSEA."

Bill Nohejl: "Let me take like the Building Department, Assessors and things of that type. They're not Civil Service."

Supervisor Smith: "They most certainly are."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedBill Nohejl: "They are?"Supervisor Smith: "Yes Sir. Assessors are elected. We have not awarded any salaries to them at this point."Bill Nohejl: "May I ask what did you gentlemen conclude with your salaries — the Board Members?"Supervisor Smith: "I don't know that anybody's concluded yet."Bill Nohejl: "Then how are you going to adopt the budget if you don't know what it's going to be."Supervisor Smith: "We're going to adopt the budget and if the settlements either with police or with . . ."Bill Nohejl: "I'm talking about Board Members."Supervisor Smith: "Bill I'm trying to explain it. The Budget is not segregated as such. This is an outline. What gets adopted is a total package. I still fight against some of the previous thinking that somebody has a particular budget that is there. If you are in the general town, you are in the general town. If the settlements come in high with Police or with CSEA or whatever, what happens is, the program gets sacrificed for salaries and I don't put a specific figure in, I put a figure in which was my last offer in the negotiations, and that's what I put in, and if the settlements come in higher than the last offer, obviously, program suffers, or capital improvement suffer, or the obvious thing is there's lay-offs."Bill Nohejl: "Well you're not satisfying me."Supervisor Smith: "I don't know how to explain it to you any other way Bill."Bill Nohejl: "Well if someone is going to ask me what I want to do with such and such and such a thing, I say well it's going to cost X amount. If my salaries

are due so much, such and such and such a thing then this is it."

Supervisor Smith: "Yes, but that isn't how government works. I don't like it, but there's some guy from Nassau County, let's face it, that's going to decide how much Police will get paid in the Town of Riverhead next year."

Bill Nohejl: "That doesn't have to do with Board Members."

Supervisor Smith: "That is true."

Bill Nohejl: "That's what I'm asking."

Supervisor Smith: "You can ask them."

Bill Nohejl: "I'm asking."

Councilman Lombardi: "Well Bill, I'll take \$11,000. You want me to be truthful?"

Bill Nohejl: "Yes."

Councilman Lombardi: "That's it."

Bill Nohejl: "You want to take \$11,000?"

Councilman Lombardi: "Yes."

Bill Nohejl: "How about you Mr. Regula?"

Councilman Regula: "Well we had a discussion on this and I think I've made my thoughts known to the Board Members and I voted against the raise."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedBill Nohejl: "Mr. Menendez?"Councilman Menendez: "Bill I think maybe we should get as much as the dog catchers get, don't you think?"Bill Nohejl: "Well I'm not saying that. I'm just asking you and I'll tell you what the feelings around Town are. You feel you're worth as much as the dog catchers. Okay George."Councilman Young: "I feel I'm worth \$11,000."Bill Nohejl: "You know, you read exerpts in the paper about this Town getting so much and that Town getting so much you want to bring it up to the same level. It's true to a certain extent. That's why everybody else comes along and says well we want to come up to the same level as the next guy and there's no end to it. Now I'm not — wait Doc — hold on."Councilman Menendez: "Go ahead, finish."Bill Nohejl: "Now I'm going to say, now if I had a part-time job, if I was able to be on the Town Board and I was able to be on the Town Board and I was able to make \$210 per week, besides my other job, I'd feel as though I'd be flying high on the moon. If it was just a job that I was going to just take it and not have any other income, then I would hollar like hell. I feel as though, personally, you're going too much of a jump at a time. If you were to come along and take it half a loaf instead of wanting a full loaf, I don't think you'd have any problems."Councilman Menendez: "Bill may I inform you, the Councilman in Southampton are getting \$15,000. We do fully as much work as they do, if not more, because they've got Town Trustees in every little village to do their dirty work for them. We, the Councilmen here have been remissed probably in the last four or five years and they haven't taken any raise. We sat here and raised everybody else but ourselves, which was wrong. We probably should have raised ourselves too."Bill Nohejl: "That's right. In stages."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Menendez: "It would have been to a point where it was equitable and then perhaps in the future it should be raised across the board. Everybody at 7% or 6% or whatever it is or lowered if it goes the other way."

Bill Nohejl: "It never goes lower."

Councilman Menendez: "There may be a big bust. You don't know."

Bill Nohejl: "Well this is what I don't want to see bust."

Councilman Menendez: "That's right. You're worried about \$8,000."

Bill Nohejl: "No. I'm not worried. No that isn't just what I'm worried about."

Councilman Menendez: "You're not worried about the big increase on 50 policemen."

Bill Nohejl: "This is what I'm going to come to, because what I hear around Town, well those SOB's can get more and say well I'm equal to the next guy in East Hampton or Southampton. I'm as equal to the guy in Nassau County. This is where the thing starts. This is what I'm trying to bring up."

Supervisor Smith: "I've got a simple answer to that one. I run for election every two years. I'll give the population the vote on those salaries every two years. That is even."

Bill Nohejl: "Say that again?"

Supervisor Smith: "You want to vote on all municipal salaries?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Bill Nohejl: "No this isn't what I'm trying to get at but this is what is being said behind the back. If this guy wants to come up to the other guy's level, we want to come up to the other guy's level too."

Supervisor Smith: "I'll settle with police today. At the same ration that my salary represents to John Klein's salary."

Bill Nohejl: "Now you're taking to different categories."

Councilman Young: "Aren't the police doing the same thing taking two different categories and they want to do the same as John Klein's cops? As the County Cops? Allen's saying he'll take his salary in comparison to John Klein, who is the head of the County. Now a County Policeman — we are saying we will give the same percentage to our policemen as Allen is compared to John V.N. Klein's salary."

Bill Nohejl: "Well then John Klein can go to Carey and keep right on going."

Supervisor Smith: "Well take a Sergeant on the Suffolk County Police Force and we'll compare the same ratio as my salary represents to his and that's what Mr. Grossman can have next year."

Bill Nohejl: "I'm not sticking up for Police. I'm bringing out an example."

Supervisor Smith: "Bill, Mr. Grossman will not take that cut in pay."

Bill Nohejl: "I'm not saying he should. Now there's one other thing I think I've gotten enough on the Board Members. Now Mr. Smith, people come up here and congratulate you on a lot of things that I feel as though the whole Board Members are responsible for and when the time comes to take a kick in the butt, I think the Members should take it too, not just the Supervisor. Now you are coming up for a raise too, I understand that will be two in two years?"

Supervisor Smith: "It's been considered yes."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Bill Nohejl: "I know the feeling between the Town Board Members. It's easier to get a raise if the Supervisor gets a raise, we'll follow suit."

Supervisor Smith: "I have not made up my mind what's going to happen with reference to me."

Councilman Regula: "No, Mr. Nohejl, I'll have to say on the Supervisor's raise, even though I voted against the raise for the Councilmen. I probably was instrumental to any of the other Board Members recommend that he get the extra money. I've worked with him for ten months and he's said many times we work together quite well, but I know the job he's trying to do and I know the time he's putting in and regardless of what he has other than his own salary, I feel he deserves the \$28,000."

Councilman Lobmardi: "And Bill, Mr. Regula has been on the Board a year and I feel maybe that's why he's refused the raise. When the time comes that he's on three or four or five years, he will not refuse."

Councilman Young: "Bill too, he's not going to get the raise the others of us are going to get the raise and we're not going to give it to him."

Bill Nohejl: "You're not giving it up?"

Councilman Young: "No. He doesn't get any."

Supervisor Smith: "All right. We discussed the merits of it Bill. I can sit down with you. It's sort of a diary. I keep a diary. My diary today when I get done, I'll go in and diary everything I did through the day. And if you're really interested, I'll show you my per hour rate."

Bill Nohejl: "I'll show you mine. But it's still not answering me whether the Board Members are going to get the raise or not."

Supervisor Smith: "We will settle with CSEA, we will settle with PBA and we will publish as we do every year when we set salaries of the first resolution of the year what we're going to do."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Lombardi: "Bill I was going to refuse my raise, but since you came up, I think I'm going to take it."

Supervisor Smith: "You talked him into it."

Bill Nohejl: "You don't have long to go here John, the way you're going, you better take it."

Councilman Lombardi: "You convinced me."

Supervisor Smith: "The evening would not be complete without Bill, who got his sumped clean. Is there anyone else?"

Shirley Smith, Calverton: "I'm remiss in not knowing where the budget stands, but can you answer me as to how you treated my request of October 25 for someone qualified to take care of arbitrary needs in the Town?"

Supervisor Smith: "We did not include it. We have included in contractual expenses to hire someone such as John Guy to both prune and feed the trees. Pruning will occur soon. The feeding will occur in the spring. We will again have our summer bulls. They are included in the budget to run the vacuum cleaner, etc., down street."

Shirley Smith: "Well I respectfully implore you, all of you on the Town Board to consider on the hiring of anyone or be it John Guy, who's an old buddy of mine, is qualified and competent to plant landscape material. I'm not sure, but I stand to be corrected on this that he knows how to deal with each type of material that we have in the Town. I have an offer for you of someone who runs a nursery, raises the material and sells it and if you will just request of them what to do with these materials and we could get together with John and have some instruction so there is no more destruction of materials as is visible outside this Town Hall Building."

Supervisor Smith: "Yes. Outside the Town Hall Building you have to find Mr. Shefchick and beat him over the head. I have told him over. Good help is hard to find these days."

By amending Section 108-56. Signs., subsection L, to read in its amended form as follows:

"L. Any sign not included in Subsection J above but violative of any section of this charter, wherever located, shall become an unlawful structure on January 20, 1979, and shall thereupon be removed."

By amending Section 108-56. Applicability of Article., to read in its amended form as follows:

"This article shall be applicable to land zoned for residential purposes in the Town of Riverhead and which is in Residence A, B, and C District, or Agricultural A District under this chapter."

6. If any expenditures were made for capital improvements to your sign, the dates and amounts thereof.
7. If any expenditures were made for repairs to or maintenance of your sign, the dates and amounts thereof.

8. If you receive income from advertisers who place advertisements on your sign, the amount of such income in each year from the date of construction to the present.
9. The amount you have paid the owner of the property on which the sign is erected for the right to locate your sign thereon - specify for each year.

WHEREAS, It should be noted that the location under consideration is upon the same parcel of land, but east of the location which was the subject of a public hearing on March 21, 1978, and

WHEREAS, Another Public Hearing was held on November 8, 1978 at 8:15 P.M., wherein all persons wanting to be heard were heard, and

WHEREAS, Said application showing the original location was referred to the Planning Board,

NOW, THEREFORE, The Town Board does find as follows:

1. The proposed use is on Route 58 along with surrounding property is zoned either Business C (Neighborhood Business) and Business B (Shopping Center).
2. This use will not substantially impair the reasonable and orderly development of other neighborhood properties.
3. This use will provide a tax advantage to the Town.

4. In the foreseeable future Route 58 at the Roanoke intersection will be improved to alleviate potential traffic congestion.

5. The health, safety, and welfare of the Town will not be substantially affected by this proposed use.

6. There is another drive-in, other restaurants, and other similar business establishments in the vicinity of the proposed use.

7. The proposed use will be in harmony with the general purposes and intent of the Town's Zoning Ordinance and Master Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby

RESOLVED, That the application of Joseph V. Bartasi on behalf of Longwood Realty, Inc., for a special permit for a drive-in restaurant be granted subject to the following conditions:

1. That prior to the beginning of this use on said site, the applicant submit a detailed site plan to the Town Board for approval, and comply with any modifications made thereon or pursuant thereto by the Town Board, including ingress and egress to that parcel for this use.

2. That said applicant comply with all pertinent sections of the Riverhead Code, as directed and approved by the Building and Zoning Administrator.

3. That the permission of all other governmental entities required be obtained.

4. That this permit be granted for a period of three years at which time it will be reviewed by the Town Board for renewal.

5. That this special permit shall remain subject to the jurisdiction of the Town Board, and upon request, the applicant shall make such changes as are required by the Town Board by amendment thereto.

Before the vote, Supervisor Smith stated: "And so we're clear on that three-year provision, again gentlemen, it means he must build within the three years and if he builds within conformity to the site plan and to the resolution, he has a right from that point on, to use the property as the proposed use."

Joseph Bartasi inaudible.

Supervisor Smith: "The purpose is no left turns. Maybe we could get some signs up there in a hurry."

Joseph Bartasi inaudible.

Supervisor Smith: "But the purpose of what we said there was no left turn. That application remains the subject to the Town Board jurisdiction and if Mr. Lombardi and Mr. Menendez who live within 100 feet of your proposed use witness left turns at those two locations, you're going to be doing something there."

Joseph Bartasi inaudible.

Supervisor Smith: "If the complaint is true, you better anticipate it."
