Supervisor Janoski continues of the State and the Planning Board.

I would at this time, open the meeting to anyone who wishes to address the Town Board? Bill."

Bill Nohejl: "Yes I would like to."

Supervisor Janoski: "I recognize Bill Nohejl. We'll get you next Mr. Kasperovich."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "I wish to congratulate the people who ran the Riverhead Fair. I think it was exceptionally good. And I think that the people of Riverhead should take notice that a bigger place is going to be needed in the future. You know I'm bucking for the fair grounds."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes I realize that."

Bill Nohejl: "I came in about 2:00 and parking was backed up way way back. It's a good thing it was a Sunday. If larger facilities arranged, I think we could have a Saturday and a Sunday affair because I think it's becoming more and more popular. Two things were missing at the fair. A peanut vendor with his whistle, also an organ grinder with the monkey. I believe those two things would help this fair."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Mr. Supervisor, Bill we ask you as a member of the Riverhead Country Fair Committee to come to the meetings one of the problems of holding the fair two days and I can sympathize with the Polish Town Civic Association, because I've been on the committee since the inception of the fair, getting volunteers to work for two days. As you know, it's all volunteer effort and if you do have some suggestions for next year, we meet once a month, I think on Thursday at the Tax Receiver's Office and we invite you to come down and give us some recommendations."

Bill Nohejl: "Gladly. All right. It doesn't have to be a two day affair. I'm quite sure that eventually we're going to outgrow the area."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I agree. This year we had a tremendous crowd. The weather was good. Everything was right."

Bill Nohejl: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill. It's nice to hear some good comments.

I would recognize anyone else who would like to address the Town Board? Mr. Kasperovich, did you want to address the Town Board?"

William Kasperovich, 15th Street, Wading River (Wildwood Acres); "This area has identical streets approximately 1,200 feet long numbering from 15th street to 20th street which starts at Hulse Landing Road and terminates at a dead end some very short distance west of Hulse Avenue. On August the 5th, I stood here on this spot and informed this Town Board about the infringement onto a public right-of-way and the creation of a road hazard on 16th street some two hundred feet of Hulse Avenue by one Mr. Thomas F. Morrison Development Corporation, located at 20 Dolphin Way here in Riverhead. After considerable search and inquiring by me, especially the last four days, I have not been able to find any evidence of any act or actions taken by the Town Board or by any people working in behalf of the Town of Riverhead, that is, excluding the Police Department to correct this condition or to modify the procedures that allow this condition to come about. It was my intention to present to you in the near future my views and recommendation on this type of situation after completing the studies that I have underway with the various boards and committees.

My activity came to an abrupt change last Friday at about 5:00 and it became necessary for me to speak here and now because of some temporary signs that read "slow", or "go slow" in letters about ten or twelve inches high, yellow in color upon boards, plywood, linoleum, a piece of tin from a coca cola sign and so forth which were put up for the protection of the road and people during maintenance and repair of the road. This was on 15th street where I live. Because of this, the Riverhead Police told me that they would apply the entire New York State Vehicular Code to my street plus some penal codes about these signs. And when I say Riverhead Police, I'm referring to Chief Palmer and other officers. This alarmed me to no end. I said "horse budgie". Are the laws different for 15th street than they are for 16th street. Are temporary signs to protect, covered by different laws than those for permanent obstacles and hazards.

And worst of all, is the Town Board interpreting the law differently than the Riverhead Police. Or God help us, is somebody reading the laws and other people don't know about it. This is a glaring difference between police coverage and Town Hall coverage of the streets in my neighborhood. I use the word coverage in an all inclusive sense. I use the word difference

in this way. The legal status or the relative posture of the streets toward applicable laws of the state is the responsibility of the Town Board, you gentlemen. This difference should not exist. It is your moral and sworn duty as elected officials to see that it does not exist. And so I stand here and give you these words and pray for divine wisdom that you overcome this, because when a man in a blue uniform does things that are different than the administrative people that we elect, then we are taking a step in the wrong direction which we know in history has lead us to disaster. Thank you gentlemen."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mr. Kasperovich. Is there anyone else present?"

Supervisor Janoski: "I would like to direct that Mr. Smith's request that all comments directed towards Barney's and the statement be submitted by October 31, 1980. Is there anyone else present who wishes to be heard on the subject of Barney's Trailer Park? Mr. Kasperovich?"

William Kasperovich: "Are you people going to take a recess? I guess not, so I can't get to see the plans and

PUBLIC HEARING - continuedWilliam Kasperovich continues:

the papers. It's hard to follow such a fine presentation such as Mr. Smith made. But where the flowers bloom the finest, I look for the strongest application of manure. In plain language, we have a mobile park owner with some farmland along side him that he has an option to buy. He doesn't own it. He hasn't put any money into it. There's no water there. It's questionable about the sewage. There are finely made mobile homes, but then there are also finely built homes. There are places in Riverhead to expand, to put up homes and houses and our sewer facilities haven't come to 100% capacity. All these things in favor of extending a mobile park is just putting a new one adjacent to an old one. And that's what it boils down to.

Now we all know from the news media that the environmental people in the county are getting more difficult and more rigid and they are trying to get more regulations that will prevent this sort of thing and to have this presented to you people and to the public without any comment by the Planning Commission, who are actually the forerunners to you people — forerunners, people that are sitting there that were depending on you to look after our township. We have no comment from them. I happen to have sat through that session and nothing was concluded and nothing was defined from the Planning Commission.

So these people who have been appointed to be there in the forefront for preliminary work have not accomplished anything cause they have offered nothing. So to me all this fine talk boils down to a new mobile park. It was brought up in the Planning Commission talk that — and all I know is what I heard that night, that there are parks that have permission to expand so many units. There are unfilled areas where people can legally expand their mobile parks. They have not come to where they cannot expand and they have been given permission.

I thought this was a significant point and I certainly wouldn't expect Mr. Smith to introduce it or put it forth. But we haven't run out of mobile park spaces that we have already allowed that are not filled and this is a strong point. This will be a cesspool area regardless of what you talk about, a cesspool is a cesspool. Study for whether they could get enough water or what we have to do to our water system to get water in that direction where we have priority that we need in other areas. All this, Mr. Smith asks to be resolved in ten days. You've got enough here to study for a month with all the work that you have piled up and involvements to stop and seriously consider this. And I for one, make no bones about it for what little I know about it, but I heard then and tonight without it being able to get into the papers, let it put on the table, I say no, emphatically 'no'."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mr. Kasperovich. Is there anyone else present who wishes to address themselves to

Supervisor Janoski continues:
this issue? Bill, state your name and address?"

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "Just looking at this map of one hundred units on twenty-five acres, how does this compare to Thurms?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Allen, do you want to answer that?"

Allen Smith: "These lots will be the largest mobile home lots in the Town. They will be bigger than Thurms. The lot area of each of these will be bigger and if it's of interest to the Board, that was stated by Mr. Howard Young as I say in the Environmental Impact Statement, will prepare the final submission, will come to you and if you would like it as part of this hearing, we'll reduce that statement to a letter and have it on file with this particular application.

With reference to the concern of Mr. Kasperovich relative to the number of vacant mobile home lots in the Town of Riverhead, there are one hundred as of the count of this afternoon, by the Building Department and of those one hundred vacant lots, fifty of them are a mobile home sub-division of George Schmelzer, which in case you don't know, it lies between River Road and the Long Island Expressway immediately north of George's house. I invite anybody to go up there and take a look. It's a vacant lot. It's never been developed. So in reality, what you have, although there are approved one hundred vacant lot units, there are fifty in reality."

Bill Nohejl: "I would like to ask another question. It was stated, the property is adjacent. According to this, it's not adjacent. How would the water come from Mill Road into the new development? I can see there's maybe about seven hundred, eight hundred feet separating the two parcels on the right-of-way. That particular piece of property although described as a right-of-way, for some of the surrounding parcels, that piece is ownership in the corporate owner from whom we have title so it would come up that right-of-way, or come up that strip more accurately."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anything further on your mind Bill? Is there anyone else present who wishes to address themselves to this issue?"

No one else wishing to be heard and no further communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Janoski declared the hearing closed at 8:43 P.M.

Supervisor Janoski recessed the meeting for fifteen minutes after which the meeting resumed.

Councilman Prusinowski made a motion to take resolution #553 off the table which was seconded by Councilman Menendez.

The vote, Prusinowski, Yes, Regula, Yes, Lombardi, No, Menendez, Yes, and Janoski, Yes.

The resolution was thereupon declared duly adopted.

Irene J. Pendzick: "This is on the actual motion to file suit regarding accuracy of census count."

#553 TOWN OF RIVERHEAD JOINS FILED SUIT REGARDING ACCURACY OF CENSUS COUNT

Councilman Prusinowski offered the following resolution which was seconded by Councilman Menendez.

WHEREAS, the Attorney General of the State of New York has filed suit in Federal Court on behalf of the Governor and the State of New York against United States Census officials to remedy the severe problems encountered by New York State in connection with the 1980 census, this case being designated as Carey Vs. Klutznick, 80 Civ. 4550 (HFW), and

WHEREAS, the Town of Riverhead believes the population figure of the census bureau does not reflect the actual population of the town, and

WHEREAS, an accurate population count is essential to the Town of Riverhead as it determines dollar amounts of state and federal revenue aid, not only presently, but for ten years into the future,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town of Riverhead desires to be included in the case, Carey VS. Klutznick in order to obtain relief, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that Robert Abrams, Attorney General of the State of New York is hereby requested to include the Town of Riverhead in the described litigation.

The vote, Prusinowski; "The State of New York is currently going to court in this case claiming that New York State, certain municipalities around the State have been undercounted by the census bureau. There are a lot of east end officials who believe this dramatically hurt Peconic County's chances. That's one dispute. Secondly, if you've been undercounted in your population you have the potential of losing some revenue sharing

money or state aid since they use the census figure of ten years ago to calculate your area according to your population. In the Town of Riverhead, we're only a hundred or so short either way. But two problems and I had a very ho hum attitude about this until tonight. I went home and I saw a report on Channel 2 and I don't believe everything I see on tv all the time.

However, there is no dispute that there have been problems with this census bureau. Not so much political as it must be a mammoth task to count everybody in the United States. I, for one, never received a census form. We took an informal survey at work, and there were several people in the office who didn't receive census forms. This will just include us in the litigation which is sponsored by the State of New York. One of the concerns that I had was, will it cost the the Town any money in legal fees? It will not. Will it cost us, all as taxpayers, to recount and to have a recanvassing? Yes it will. However in seeing the report tonight on Channel 2 News convinced me and they're going to follow up tomorrow night with a concluding statement that there are problems with it and I happen to agree with the Governor of the State of New York because he got on there tonight and he wants to have it recounted. I vote Yes."

Councilman Regula: "Well last week the Board discussed this and I was under the impression there was no formal vote. I was under the impression that we were against this. But tonight as most everyone understands that I was surprised with this because I missed where ever it came up this afternoon after our regular executive sessions and I'm not sure how it's going to affect Riverhead so I feel at this time, I'm not sure one way or the other, so I'll Abstain."

Councilman Lombardi: "I got to a few words to say. The actual count or close to it is about one hundred forty-six short in the Town of Riverhead and they're not sure of that. This is from the County Planning Commission. Now I'm looking at the Long Island Lighting Company says we have 22,000 people in the Town of Riverhead. I'm just taking this as a figure and when they figure this, they're not figuring the people that are living in New York that are recorded in — say New York City and the Town of Riverhead does not have 22,000 people. By the way, the census — the way they want to have the census have it is that we're supposed to have 22,000 people. We cannot count these people that live in New York City. These people live in New York City and that's where they are recorded. And with us being one hundred forty-six short, we'll say it's going to cost us more money. Say the Governor or the Attorney wins. If they're

RESOLUTIONS - continuedCouncilman Lombardi continues:

going to have a canvass, of all this, all over again, it's going to cost the taxpayer plenty of money to rehire all these people to re-do this canvassing. I cannot see the expense. I vote No."

Councilman Menendez: "Well I got to get into the act, too. Last week when we discussed this, the Board was against it because it was a matter of the Town of Riverhead having to pay for the litigation or at least joining into it with other towns in that matter. And we didn't feel we had any money to throw around for extra litigation. I don't perceive this suggestion as having any political boogie men or any political chicanery going on and it might just result in the Town of Riverhead being able to get more grant money. Now it's not going to cost us one red cent for litigation. And the State of New York is going to go ahead with it whether we say so or not. And I think we should join in cause we might, we just might make a few bucks on this. So I vote Yes."

Supervisor Janoski: "I might as well say something, too. At a meeting which took place last week, with the Supervisors of the five eastern towns and a representative from the Town of Brookhaven, with Assemblyman Behan and his staff, it was pointed out that there was a clear indication that there had been many irregularities in the conducting of the 1980 census. Stories too numerous to mention were told about some of the circumstances which lead us to believe that we, not only Riverhead, but the entire east end and the Town of Brookhaven have been undercounted. It is also pointed out that each person that is missed represents up to \$200 a year in revenue which if forthcoming from the federal government and also the state aid is based on the population count. So that I believe that is in the best interest of the Town of Riverhead to join in the pending suit so that should it be won, that a recanvassing of the Town of Riverhead should take place and so that an accurate figure would be forthcoming. I vote Yes."

The resolution was thereupon declared duly adopted.

#554 APPROVES SITE PLAN FOR WAREHOUSE OF WILLIAM TINTLE
Councilman Regula offered the following resolution
 which was seconded by Councilman Prusinowski.

WHEREAS, all structures to be erected in commercial zones are now subject to site plan review, and

WHEREAS, a site plan entitled "Proposed Warehouse Building", drawn by Vincent S. Sotis, dated October 15, 1980, has been submitted to the Town Board for review, and

WHEREAS, said site plan has been reviewed by this

Town Board and is on record with the Town Clerk,
NOW, THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that the aforesaid site plan is approved,
subject to any restrictions, requirements, and/or limitations

The vote, Prusinowski, Yes, Regula, Yes, Lombardi, Yes,
Menendez, Yes, and Janoski, Yes.

The resolution was thereupon declared duly adopted.

Councilman Prusinowski then stated: "Joe, just one
other point about the census that I was thinking about. This
is our tax money, whether it's state taxes, federal taxes, and
if they spend five hundred million dollars or a billion dollars
to take a census count in the country, I want to make sure I got
my monies worth. It just dawned on me. We talk about the federal
money or the state aid, goes to Washington and federal revenue
sharing brings it back to local municipalities that's the tax
dollars that we're all paying."

Supervisor Janoski: "Bill Nohejl has made a special
request that he be allowed to wrap up this meeting, so that I
open, and Jessie wants — I open this meeting to comment from
the floor and recognize Jessie."

Jessie Tomlinson, Wading River; "I wouldn't want to
take Bill Nohejl's spot away from him.

I would like to point out that tonight has been a first
in the Town of Riverhead, in my history, anyway. We are now seeing
government by tv. Vic goes home, and sees a show on Channel 2.
I don't think the other gentlemen saw it, but he's all gung ho for
a vote about the census and all of a sudden it's approved.

I also understand that there was a meeting last week
that the Supervisor attended, but I don't think you other gentle-
ment attended, did you?"

Unidentified voice from the Town Board "No."

Jessie Tomlinson: "Well, I think it's a shame to act
on a resolution that may not have far reaching implications, but
then again it may on such short notice. You did say that you
discussed it last week with the idea that there would not be a
vote taken. Now you all know if this suit finally gets to final
ligitation and it is approved, that you're going to spend a lot
of money to re-hire all the people who have just completed the
job that some people say has not been done properly.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedJessie Tomlinson continues:

Now the County Executive, Peter Cohalan, Lee Koppelman from the Suffolk County Planning Commission have both stated that they are satisfied with the results in Suffolk County. Now New York City is another problem. But generally I don't think we mix in with the problems of New York City because we can't solve them. So I would just like to point out, that in the future votes of this kind, should really wait a week or two till more discussion can be made or maybe everyone has had the chance to see the same tv program. Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Jessie, my vote wasn't based solely on Channel 2's report on the census. I've talked to John Behan and we have reporters at the paper and this has been in discussion ever since the census figures came out three months ago. So if anybody has been following the news for three months, you know that the big discussion has been that we've been undercounted on the east end. Mainly because the proponents of Peconic County were hoping that the 1980 census would show enough population under the existing statute to form Peconic County. They were disappointed. The resolution not drawn up by me tonight and as I stated it was discussed briefly this afternoon, it was discussed partly last week, some of the objections we had were the legal fees and that was the main objection, but not by all the members. Everybody had their own objections about it so I just would like to point that out to you."

Councilman Regula: "Vic, I have to say it wasn't discussed this afternoon in front of me."

Councilman Prusinowski: "No it was later on in the hall we were talking about it. You're right."

Supervisor Janoski: "Bill it's your turn."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "The other night I had the occasion to bring someone to the hospital. And for a person, I know the Town. But for a person not knowing the Town, I feel as though there's no markers stating which way to a hospital. Years ago, on Roanoke Avenue and Sound, used to be a wooden sign 'hospital'. No more there. That's a very important place. Now you go to other towns and you'll see a big "H" as you're progressing along, hospital. You don't even have a hospital zone listed here on the roads. I know it's county road. With the cooperation of the Town and County, there could be signs put there, hospital."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedBill Nohejl continues:

Now down here the corner of Peconic and Main Street, you have a sign Town Hall. This would be appropriate a hospital."

Irene J. Pendzick: "There is a sign that says, hospital."

Bill Nohejl: "There is there. But up here when you get near the hospital, there's no signs. I stand to be corrected if there is. Not even the hospital, unless you see emergency out patient entrance shows that's a hospital. It doesn't have a sign up there, Central Suffolk Hospital. I bring this to your attention that I believe something like this could save a life or . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "I think you're right Bill. As a matter of fact, that was in discussion last week that there should be one at the end of the expressway leading into 58 an "H", a state sign."

Bill Nohejl: "Right. I believe it should be clearly marked.

And also — being that Jessie is here and she is a member of the Planning Board, I remember months ago there was a discussion here about ACOUZ. You remember ACOUZ about the buffer zone around Grumman. Has there been any plans submitted by the Navy or the governmental agencies to the Town regarding this. Maybe Jessie can answer. I would like to be aware of it if it does come through because I feel as though — it covers a lot of people who own property in that area that might be covered by this ACOUZ zone."

Supervisor Janoski: "Could I ask Bill, do you stand in favor of an ACOUZ zone?"

Bill Nohejl: "Not if it's on my property."

Councilman Regula: "Well that means you don't favor it."

Bill Nohejl: "No. Because I am — if you covered someone's development rights to pay for it just don't put a restriction on that property after the person has bought it."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedBill Nohejl continues:

Each person is entitled to the use of that property which he paid — shall I say he's paying the right to pay taxes and things of that type. He actually doesn't own it."

Councilman Regula: "Was that person there before Grumman?"

Bill Nohejl: "It doesn't matter if he bought the property with Grumman there or not there. It doesn't make any difference. He bought that property and if there is no restrictions on that property when he bought it and the restrictions is put on after he bought that property, the man should be compensated for it. Regardless of Grumman or who."

Councilman Regula: "Well we have Kennedy Airport also which is. . ."

Bill Nohejl: "I understand. I understand that. But the idea is you got — if you are not involved, you don't own property next to it. If you were there, you would have a different feeling."

Councilman Regula: "I'm sure."

Bill Nohejl: "That's the same thing. You buy your house. After you buy your house, you say well I paid \$30,000 for my house and maybe when I want to sell it, it's worth \$50,000. But in the meantime, someone comes and says look, you can't sell that house. You want to retire. You want to move to Florida. And you can't sell that house or you can't sell in the war. You can't sell it for \$30,000. How would you feel?"

Councilman Regula: "Well I think mainly ACOUZ, they don't want many many people in any one area of that certain tract of land if they feel it is unsafe in case of an accident."

Bill Nohejl: "I agree with you one hundred per cent."

Councilman Regula: "But I don't think they're talking about individual homes or businesses."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Bill Nohejl: "But if my property is zoned farming, and it also has a residential zone to it. And if I'm entitled to one acre zoning. . ."

Councilman Regula: "Well ACOUZ wouldn't . . ."

Bill Nohejl: "Down here on Wading River-Manor Road there, there was a development wanting to go in there and they said no because it's in the flight pattern. Do you remember that? You turned down that developer, the Town Board did. Maybe some of you gentlemen were on it. Right? I feel as though the man has a right to his property and if that . . ."

Councilman Menendez: "The only objection there, Bill, is the property was left over from back — World War I little tiny plots."

Bill Nohejl: "I understand. But I'm talking about today's zoning."

Councilman Menendez: "I don't think that would go as far as your place anyhow."

Bill Nohejl: "It doesn't make any difference Doc. You got to take into consideration if you own the property, if the people of the Town Board own that property or anybody owned that property. Government agency is coming in and saying you can't do something after you actually do have the right to it and they say you can't do it and if the property you bought for three thousand and now it's worth one thousand, there's got to be some compensation. You just don't say well we're going to put a circle there. You can't do anything with it."

Councilman Menendez: "Well why don't you wait to see what actually happens and then maybe . . ."

Bill Nohejl: "That's why I ask about this ACOUZ, it if has come and if my property's in there you're sure as hell going to hear about it. Thank you gentlemen."


