UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Supervisor Janoski: "Under unfinished business we have a special permit application from River Center Associates which is still pending action by the Town Board.

A special permit application of Halandia Associates for multiple housing in the Town is awaiting the Planning Board action.

I would open the meeting at this time to anyone who wishes to be heard? Patrick, before you speak, could I meet you up here?"

Pat Perrella, 420 East Main Street; "Mr. Supervisor, Members of the Town Board, I would just like to voice my disappointment with the Town's apparent inability to come to grips with the situation of 414 East Main Street. The conditions there which are deplorable continue to proliferate. There — two days ago, the window in my truck was shot out. I mean this was done by kids — kids with pellet guns from over there. I get continuous garbage thrown into my yard.

Approximately a month and a half ago, I turned over to the police, hypodermic syringes and drug paraphernalia that was put into my yard or thrown into my yard. Purses, that evidently resulted in shoplifting and thrown into our yards over there and every weekend you can expect the bottles and everything else to go over.

Now this is just the winter months. Summer months that's when the problem really breaks out. And I just wanted to let you know that the neighbors over there, we're still fed up and waiting for you to do something about it."

Supervisor Janoski: "Pat, you probably are aware that Mrs. Richards, who I think is here, called last week concerning the garbage. And I did contact Dr. Harris of the Suffolk County Department of Health asking that he send an inspector which he has done. The inspector was there yesterday and I guess Mrs. Richards cleaned up. Are you Mrs. Richards?"

Mrs. Richards from the audience: "Yes I thought (the rest was inaudible).

Supervisor Janoski: "Mrs. Richards why don't you just wait so you can come up here and be on the record?"

Mrs. Richards from the audience was inaudible.

Supervisor Janoski: "No I had a call from Dr. Harris, said that an inspector was there yesterday. And he doesn't say that he talked to you. It doesn't indicate that here. Now what

the Health Department is saying is that it is a police matter. In the absence of the garbage being there and when I talked with Mrs. Richards on the phone, I said one of the things in this situation is that you have to catch somebody in the act or perpetrating or whatever it happens to be.

Now, the Health Department says to me here, that they will keep an eye on the place for violations and anything more than that it doesn't seem like much we can do."

Pat Perrella: "There was a couple other things that I understood that the Town and various other individuals were working on it and I haven't heard anything about it. Students from Suffolk Community College and Ambulance Service, I hear a lot of plans and that seems to be it. It seems to die out. And do you have anything for this."

Supervisor Janoski: "We are in court — ordinance 1-80 which you recognize as being dragged out by the owner. The other things that we've looked at and we have looked at for perhaps three things, just have not worked out.

Now Mrs. Richards, before you start in, I will say that the Health Department says that they found some newspapers, few papers in your yard."

Mrs. Richards: "Beer cans don't count, wine bottles."

Supervisor Janoski: "Were they there yesterday?"

Mrs. Richards: "They were seen by the six people that live in that house yesterday, I must say that. And I got a call from Mr. Riggio this morning that did not say that he'd been there. I heard of windshield surveillance, but this is a telephone surveillance. There was a telephone call to my house yesterday. But there was nobody who presented themselves to the door. He said he would call back today. I mean Mr. Riggio is the man I spoke to this morning and he said where do I live, he obviously had not been there."

Supervisor Janoski: "I will call . . ."

Mrs. Richards: "The diapers were seen by Officer Miller on Friday with me. So I mean there's no doubt that that can't be proven."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "I will get in touch with Dr. Harris after this meeting and see what we can arrange. Now you say you have photographs?"

Mrs. Richards: "No I didn't — no photographs. But I can get them. But this place is a criminal nuisance. There's no two ways about it, as far as I'm concerned and I suggest going that you investigate ways of closing it down as such. And also that you station a policeman there full-time — full-time surveillance in that court yard and around the block. Because I think this has been in office and I know you've tried but when people can't use their yard and we've given up the back yard five years ago, but when my daughter can't go out in the front yard because you don't know what will happen waiting for a friend to pick her up. I mean we are being prosecuted. We really are by the criminal element. There has to be another way to go after this. Go after the health violations with what you're doing in court. That's great with that law. But there ought to be a lot of laws.

There ought to be a law that — there ought to be that somebody that the police can go over and find out who lives in what apartment. That there's somebody checking on that place and there isn't. I — you know I spoke to you Friday afternoon. I have had a lot of recommendations, call the Supervisor, call the Building Inspector, call the Town Justices, call the Health Department. They're either not in or they tell you to call somebody else. One of the detectives suggested that I go over and find out who was throwing the garbage out. I said that I felt that I was a little terrorized after I had a young man go through our yard, flip into the window there, mutter something about being chased. I mean really we've had people with shotguns going through our yard. I don't feel that's my job. I think the police ought to have a very good idea of who's living over there. And maybe you have to pass a law that when you have so many people living in an apartment complex that there has to be onground, maybe the landlord would have to live there. That would be a suggestion. The owner, the primary owner should live there.

You can't just say oh somebody back there knows who's here or something like that. I think there has to be some law that will say we want to know who lives in these apartments. Any place else you can find out who lives where. And that they are responsible, they will answer the phone when the police want to know what's going on. I don't blame the police for not wanting to go in there either. But you can't — we'll take a full-time policeman. And I believe a great deal of your crime in this town is perpetrated right there. It reminds me of that place in the Wild West, "The Hole in the Wall", where they can go through the hole in the wall and they were safe from all posses and the rest. And that's what we have over there, "The Hole in the Wall."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Prusinowski: "We're very aware of 414 East Main Street. We would like it to go away. One of the main problems we have in the system. You have the Department of Social Services. I'm watching the time, Joe, who supports this type of operation with money. If the landlord were to be cut off, the people, he would not be able to pay his first mortgage and he will probably abandon the property. We have met with the Department of Social Services and discussed this problem and all I can tell you, that we have our Building Department working on it and we would like to do something there. And, unfortunately, the laws that were created to protect the majority do a very good job of insulating the minority who abuse the majority and without getting too specific because we're in litigation that's about all we can say. It's a frustrating situation."

Mrs. Richards: "Have you thought of suing social services?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Well Gregory, do you want to turn into a legislator after you finish with your — Greg Blass has introduced legislation dealing with a place for social service clients in the various Townships and perhaps after the public hearing he will address himself to that. I — we can take this up, later on, but at twenty-five passed the hour, I have to have the public hearing."

Mrs. Richards: "Well I think we should, I think that you have to come up with more than one solution. And I'm very serious about it asking for full-time police protection."

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay."

Supervisor Janoski recessed the meeting to hold a public hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING - 2:25 P.M.

County Department Of Planning - Requesting additional information and recommendations of Town Planning Board. Filed.

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone present representing . . ."

Gregory Blass, 313 West Main Street, Riverhead; "I represent Mr. Warren Laws and Mr. Thor Pettersen who are the applicants for the special permit. We have appeared before the Planning Board as the clerk has stated and we met with approval of that Board that the application is for the operation of a machine shop on a portion of premises at 656 West Main Street which is the present site of the Long Island Ice & Coal Company. The question of the premises sought to be used is 1500 square feet. It will be operated solely by these two individuals who are present in the hearing room today for any questions that the Town Board or members of the public may have."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Greg. Is there anyone who wishes to speak to this issue?"

No one else wishing to be heard and no further communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Janoski declared the hearing closed at 2:27 P.M.

Supervisor Janoski: "The next public hearing is scheduled for 2:35 P.M. would you like to stand up again and talk about social services. I now recognize Legislator Blass."

Legislator Gregory Blass: "On the point of the pre-rental inspection, I have been working very closely with the Town Board in Riverhead, with the Town Attorney here with the Commissioner of the Department of Social Services as well as the Health Department and some members of the Human Services Committee of the Legislature, members of the Buildings Department of this Town as well as the Town of Islip and, of course, members of the Department of Social Services staff. And I will say that a final draft has been submitted to the Clerk of the Legislature which will provide for an establishment of what we can call housing stock. And what this will be is a list of

approved housing that meets minimal standards of the sanitary health and buildings code of the various municipalities.

The Health Commissioner will inspect the premises before the properties are placed on that list. The towns will be given the opportunity to also inspect them and it is my expectation that the Towns will take advantage of the opportunity and make the inspection. This list will be available not only for the Department of Social Services recipients housing, but it will be available for anyone in the county who wants to use it. So we are not setting aside a specific class of people. But there is a requirement in this legislation that the Department of Social Services will not place people in housing unless it is from that housing stock or that housing list or again that housing list will be a list of housing that meets those minimum standards and we look forward to very close cooperations with the various towns in order to put that list together. That's what kind of legislation we've introduced and I can tell you at this stage the legislature is in the process of re-organizing.

So we really don't know yet, number one what committee it will go to and number two, whether they'll even be a Human Services Committee, but I can say it's in the hopper. The pre-rental inspection law is moving now. When this happens the places such as that mentioned in your meeting just prior to the public hearing will be required to be on that list and thus will be required to meet those standards before County Social Services recipients will be placed there by the department."

Superivsor Janoski: "Could you tell when there would be a public hearing on this."

Greg Blass: "It should be after the committee votes on it and discharges it from committee and submits it to the legislature that should be within I imagine by the end of January or beginning of February — middle of February."

Supervisor Janoski: "I had a conversation with the person who we might suspect might become the presiding officer of the Legislature and it's my opinion that he is not very supportive of this particular piece of legislation. So that it behooves all of us to appear at that public hearing when it takes place."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Joe could I just ask one question?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Sure."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Prusinowski: "Greg, so in other words, to put in plain English so the neighbors can understand it, why this is important, because now it is very difficult for us to get in there legally and inspect those housing conditions. And what the Social Service Department tells me, it's very legally tough to stop the checks. And what this would do if they don't cooperate with this law or if they meet the letter of the law, Social Services will not put people in there and will not mail these landlords checks. Is that correct? Basically the essence of the law."

Greg Blass: "That's right."

Councilman Prusinowski: "And that's the crux of the problem. Well we have no control on it. They keep getting these checks and they keep throwing us out."

Greg Blass: "The law would have to have been written very carefully."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Oh, I know that."

Greg Blass: "Allegations being made of all sorts. But if it doesn't qualify for being placed on the list, the housing is not housable for recipients of social services grants to go there — to live there."

Supervisor Janoski: "Greg, how many of our sister townships, if you'll forgive that designation, have passed resolutions supporting your piece of legislation?"

Greg Blass: "I've requested resolutions from all ten towns. I've received resolutions, of course, from this Town of Riverhead, from the Town of Babylon, from the Town of Islip, and I have been given letters of support from the Supervisors. Most of the Supervisors. I don't have it all memorized, as to which ones, but actual formal resolutions have been submitted by three or four Towns. That I can recall now."

Supervisor Janoski: "The Board of — I'm sorry the Association of Supervisors passed a resolution . . ."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Greg Blass: "As an Association, that also occurred. But the Town Board resolution, we've only had three or four, but I — we had only support and I've had no reservations expressed by any Township in Suffolk County for such Legislation. As soon as, in fact, what I'll do is — I wasn't prepared to go into this today, therefore, I am sorry I didn't have it with me, but I will give you a copy of the bill today. I'll get it to you either today, this afternoon, or tomorrow."

Councilman Lombardi: "Greg, what happens to places that are not up to standard, that people are living in right now? Will they be closed? Will money stop being given to them?"

Greg Blass: "Those places that do not meet standards, will not, under this law, will not be allowed to house department of social services of the county recipients. So those places will be taken, those people will not be able to stay there unless the place brings their conditions up to standards. If they don't meet the standards, they're not on the list, if they're not on the list of approved housing recipients."

Councilman Lombardi: "Will our inspectors, building inspectors have anything to do with checking these homes?"

Greg Blass: "Yes Sir."

Councilman Lombardi: "Definitely."

Greg Blass: "In the law, it gives them the opportunity to do so."

Councilman Lombardi: "It doesn't come to an agreement with them. What happens there, Social Service still stick them in there."

Greg Blass: "The way the law is written, if it doesn't meet the municipal standards, the Health Department was given the opportunity to refute that, but unless there's an agreement, it will be placed on the list."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "There's two mechanisms that work. One, the townships, municipalities don't have jurisdictions for health matters which is why the Health Department must make that inspection, of course, the Township has the Building Code jurisdiction and that was the purpose for including the two."

Greg Blass: "This is intended not to close housing down, but to bring housing up to standard because as of now and I don't have any hesitation to say this — Suffolk County is subsidizing substandard housing in many, not all, but many instances. And this law is intended to address that. So if Landlords who have tenants who are social service recipients have a choice of either losing their tenants or improving and bringing up the housing to minimum standards. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski recessed the meeting to hold a public hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING - 2:35 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a Public Hearing to be held on Tuesday, December 30, 1980 at 2:35 P.M. at Town Hall to hear all interested persons regarding the proposed extension of the special permit granted to Broad Cove, Inc., in 1975.

The affidavits were ordered to be placed on file.

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone here representing Board Cove, Inc."

Anthony T. Conforti, 739 East Main Street, Riverhead; "Good afternoon, Mr. Supervisor, Members of the Board, I represent Broad Cove. I'd just like to say very briefly that the matter of Broad Cove application was reviewed in great detail in the years 1974 and prior by the Planning Board. It was given approval at that time and since that time, we had come in before this Board and requested various extensions. We are at a point right now where we are just about to nail down our financing to build the project. And since it is such a large project, our financier would like to see us have approximately four years

PUBLIC HEARING - continuedAnthony T. Conforti continues:

with which to work because we have to, aside from your approval, garner specific environmental approvals according to the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act. So we consider that from this date, it will take us approximately four years to build this project, therefore, we are making this request for an extension now."

Supervisor Janoski: "Any member of the Town Board have any questions?"

Councilman Menendez: "How long was the other extension that you had? Was that two years?"

Anthony T. Conforti: "We were requesting an extension of September of 1979, like a two-year extension. That extension would expire September of 1981. What we are looking for is three years beyond that."

Councilman Menendez: "Excuse me, I remember in 1974 it was explained in detail, at that time there was no objection to proceeding with that thing. The permit then was for two years."

Anthony T. Conforti: "Five years initially and then we had a two year extension."

Councilman Menendez: "In 1979 you had a two-year extension."

Anthony T. Conforti: "That's correct."

Councilman Menendez: "And now you want four more years?"

Anthony T. Conforti: "Three more years beyond the present permit will then expire by its terms, until September, 1981. They're looking three years beyond that. And the reason we are making the application now rather than when it expires is because we're trying to solidify our financing and that is a condition."

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Councilman Menendez: "Under the present financing trouble, you may need all of that time."

Anthony T. Conforti: "We hope not."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Tony. Is there anyone else present who wishes to address themselves to this issue? No?"

No one else wishing to be heard and no communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Janoski declared the hearing closed at 2:38 P.M.

Supervisor Janoski: "Before going to the resolutions, would you like to take up this question of 414? I would open up the meeting for comment if you want to at this time, before we did the resolutions?"

Maureen Perrella, 420 East Main Street, Riverhead; "What I'd like to ask, is that earlier this month I understand the Riverhead Town Board passed a resolution that would request that the housing advisors be returned to the East End. For some reason Commissioner Kirby deemed it necessary to put them all back in Hauppauge again. Has the Town Board had any response from social services commissioner on this matter?"

Supervisor Janoski: "None at all."

Maureen Perrella: "Nothing at all. Okay, thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Which, if you've read in the paper and I'm sure you have we think it was a bit of punishment on the part of social services for the action that we're talking as far as requiring the inspections for social service housing. The whole question which has been taken up also by the County Comptroller. The amounts of money that are spent for such housing it seems to me to be a punitive action. Mrs. Richards?"

Elizabeth Richards, 123 Ostrander Avenue, Riverhead; "I keep coming back to this criminal problem. I wonder about

do you have any idea how many calls our Police Department get a year, or how many visits to this place. I mean, Maureen, has sheets. I mean we all read the police news right? And 414 is in there, continually. I mean it's never missed a week.

Lately, I noticed we just have East Main Street, but I would just surmise that they've been told not to give the street address. I don't know why the street address isn't in there. But I wonder if there isn't some way that you couldn't investigate closing this place as a criminal nuisance coming in on that. I know one lawsuit isn't really enough. I mean that's been dragged out almost a year now. And that's what happens. Everything gets dragged out. I mean Greg Blass is steamed, for law is fine, but as you pointed out, there's going to be some problems with them. And it's been going on. My children have grown up since this started. It's their life that's involved. I sort of wonder, if Mrs. ___ the lady, the one who had the fat poured on the roses, she said what about us? You know what about the people who live here. Don't we have any rights to a quality of life, living in this Town. I mean we've given up our back yards, that's just ___ we can't have it. But can't we do something for the people here. I mean we're law abiding."

Supervisor Janoski: "Certainly the Town Board would take any avenue that again was legal."

Elizabeth Richards: "Well there's Crossroads place, did you read about the Crossroads welfare motel that was closed down because of criminal nuisance? Well I guess because the criminal complaints from the place and I would request that our Town Attorney follow up on this. In Patchogue, I have a newspaper clipping that I can give him."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well I talked to the, I had a guy come into my office about "Crossroads" and I called the guy in "Crossroads and "Crossroads" is not closed down. The story that was in Newsday alleged, they had a big dispute going on in the Village of Patchogue between social services and few politicians about who was placing what. They got about fourteen tenants there. They had reduced the number. According to him, he still has about fourteen families living in that place. Because I read the article in Newsday and followed ___ just curiosity and somebody came to my desk and said here's the guy who owns it so I called him up. And he claims that he has reduced the number and he still has about fourteen families left.

Just getting back to one other point you mentioned, you cannot ___ and I lost the thought (tape ended) (tape began)

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedCouncilman Prusinowski continues:

what's going on there you wouldn't have it. When you don't have an income and you cannot pay your mortgage payment, you either lose the house or you sell it. And that is the problem. This guy gets checks from the Department of Social Services and he cashes them. He pays the first mortgage. That's how he's there. If he didn't get the income, unless he — even though he probably has a lot of money, he wouldn't be in it. It does not pay for him to do it. Anyone of the landlords in the Town who rent to social services, if they didn't get the checks and they were subsidized and it wasn't such a fantastic livelihood, they wouldn't do it. And that's the problem."

Elizabeth Richards: "Well that's why I think you should make the landlord responsible for his tenants. That he has to show some responsibility."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well that's why we have a local law that applies to all landlords in the Town with three or more apartments and we're in court right now."

Elizabeth Richards: "On the health inspections."

Councilman Prusinowski: "On the inspections — we have a local law that we passed back in February to address this problem and we're in litigation right now."

Elizabeth Richards: "Well what about a law that . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Before we go any further with this we are in litigation on this particular matter and I'm becoming afraid that something is going to be said that would jeopardize that litigation. So if we could, let's dispense with this talk of 1-80. Please understand Mrs. Richards . . ."

Elizabeth Richards: "Oh no. I'm just saying that there ought to be other laws as well and practically one . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "You cannot deprive no matter who it is, due process."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Elizabeth Richards: "I don't say that you would be depriving them."

Supervisor Janoski: "What I'm saying is sure it would be great if we could pass a law and make this particular situation go away, but we can't."

Elizabeth Richards: "Well my experience this past week, when I get shunted around from one department to another and the only way a detective told me that I could get — to sign a complaint is to find out who did it. Now really, why isn't the Town Board responsible for what goes on on his property. And there is no contacting the landlord unless he has pulled up in his car from Delaware so I don't quite understand it. The man's from Dix Hills but his car is licensed from Delaware. I don't know why. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you ma'am. If no one else wishes to speak, we will take up the resolutions."


