PUBLIC HEARINGS

Councilman Dunleavy: “It’s 2:20 we have a public hearing at 2:05 p.m. A public hearing will be held on the question of the increase and improvement of the facilities of the Riverhead Water District Wellhead Treatment for Perchlorate Removal Plant No. 16. Do we have anybody here who would like to speak on this?”

John Collins: “Good afternoon. My name is John Collins from H2M here representing Riverhead Water. Mark couldn’t make it today so me and Tom Kruger in the back are here to answer any questions and to give you a brief description of the project.

This Resolution is just asking the Board’s approval to increase the funding on the project. Bids came in a little bit higher than we anticipated so what we are asking for is to increase the fund to seven hundred forty thousand one hundred sixteen dollars.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Ok, very good. Does anyone else want to speak on this project? If not thank you very much.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “I have a question if I can.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Ok, one question.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “When you decided the location where you were going to be putting the well was there a test well done?”

John Collins: “Yes.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “Did the test well indicate that there was perchlorate in the water?”

John Collins: “Yes.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “What was the level of perchlorate when the initial testing was done prior to the well installation?”

John Collins: “Approximately nine parts.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “Nine parts per billion?”

John Collins: “Per billion.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “Ok and then after; so you decided to go ahead and then put the well in anyway even with the nine parts per billion. Isn’t the allowable limit eighteen parts per billion?”

John Collins: “That’s correct.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “Ok. So when you, the original bid specs and the motor for the well, was that at fourteen hundred gallons per minute?”

John Collins: “Thirteen eighty; one thousand three hundred eighty.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “One thousand three hundred and eight gallons per minute.”

John Collins: “Eighty.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “Eighty, so fourteen hundred and then, who decided that you were going to put a bigger motor in to increase that pumping from thirteen hundred and eighty to twenty-one hundred gallons per minute?”

John Collins: “We actually never put a bigger motor in. Just the characteristics of the well allowed more water to come out. We did get an approval to pump up to twenty-one hundred

gallons a minute but we never did any improvements to go to that level. We can with the existing motor go up to about sixteen hundred gallons a minute and that's pretty much the max of what we do."

Councilwoman Giglio: "Ok so who approved you to go to twenty-one hundred gallons per minute?"

John Collins: "The DEC."

Councilwoman Giglio: "The DEC. Did you give the Town a notification letter indicating that by increasing the gallons per minute we could be drawing more of the perchlorate into the water?"

John Collins: "No, as part of the DEC's report, no. We had perchlorate in the well about nine and we did not know, nobody knew that you would increase it by pumping it."

Councilwoman Giglio: "Ok so drawing at a larger rate, faster rate and pumping, increasing the gallons per minute, there was no telling it would increase the perchlorate to where we would be close to exceeding the maximum parts per billion allowed?"

John Collins: "No, that wasn't predicted."

Councilwoman Giglio: "It wasn't predicted. Ok so there was never a notification from H2M to the Town or from the DEC to you saying that by increasing the gallons per minute that it would?"

John Collins: "Not that I'm aware of."

Councilwoman Giglio: "Ok, alright. So after the well was installed what were the parts per billion detected of the perchlorate in the well?"

John Collins: "Up to about 2010 it was nine to ten parts. Up to 2012 it was nine to ten parts per billion. Recent, in 2013 the highest sampling they saw was fourteen point five parts per billion."

Councilwoman Giglio: "Ok, so from 2010 to 2012 were you drawing at fourteen hundred gallons per minute or was it always drawing at twenty-one hundred gallons per minute?"

John Collins: "They started; they increased the pumpage from about thirteen eighty to sixteen hundred in 2012, 2013."

Councilwoman Giglio: "Ok and that was based on the DEC saying that it was permitted to do that?"

John Collins: "That is correct."

Councilwoman Giglio: "Ok, that's all. I don't have any other questions."

Councilman Dunleavy: “I have one question though. I’m trying to clarify something. The increase in the perchlorate wasn’t that caused by increasing the pumping per minute? Is that true to the best of your knowledge?”

John Collins: “I think there’s some validity to that statement that increased pumpage leads to increased perchlorate and vice versa. If you were to decrease that pumpage would you see a drop? It’s possible you would see a slight drop in the perchlorate however I wouldn’t believe that you would drop below the nine or ten parts that we saw originally.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Would it increase as much as it did increase?”

Councilwoman Giglio: “If you kept it at the thirteen hundred and eighty gallons per minute instead of jumping up to the twenty-one hundred gallons per minute do you think that it would have stayed at nine parts per billion?”

John Collins: “It may have and it may have increased. Ground water is a funny thing. It’s hard to predict.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Thank you.”

Councilman Wooten: “I think it’s safe to say that these improvement that we want to do there are new regulations coming out from the DEC concerning certain levels and I think they’re going to lower that along with a lot of other things but this expenditure which is just another couple of hundred thousand the levels of perchlorate would be nil. Is that our goal?”

John Collins: “After treatment the levels of perchlorate are zero.”

Councilman Wooten: “And that’s where we want to wind up?”

John Collins: “Yes Sir.”

Councilman Wooten: “And that’ really where we want to go.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Thank you. Anyone else want to speak? I will close the public hearing on this now. Thank you.”

Public Hearing Closed at 2:27 p.m.

Councilman Dunleavy: “And now I would like to close, to make a motion to close the Town Board meeting and open the Community Development meeting.”

Councilman Wooten: “I’ll second.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Vote on closing and opening.”

The Vote: Giglio, yes; Gabrielsen, yes; Wooten, yes; Dunleavy, yes. The CDA meeting is now opened.”

COMMENTS ON RESOLUTIONS

Councilman Dunleavy: “Do we have anybody who wants to talk on Resolutions please step up?”

Sal Mastropaolo: Sal Mastropaolo, Calverton.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Alright Sal.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Resolution 201. The number in the last *where as* and the number in the *now therefore be it resolved* are different so one of them’s right and one of them’s wrong; the twenty-six twenty-eight forty-four and the twenty-six fifty forty-four.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Bill, which one’s correct?”

William Rothaar: “I’ll check and get back to you.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Ok.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Resolution 203. The *now therefore be it resolved* says transfer the residual funds but it doesn’t say how much the residual funds are.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “That’s another Bill question.”

William Rothaar: “Yes, that’s because there’s an outstanding bill that we have and the engineer (inaudible) so we didn’t want (inaudible). The project is closed (inaudible) a year’s up so we’ll wait to see what that last bill is. It’s just a matter of putting a number down.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Bill can you step over to the microphone so the audience can hear you and just give that explanation please?”

William Rothaar: “There’s one unpaid bill in this project that we’re not sure. We disagree with the engineer so we’re working out that number to see if we owe that to one of the contractors. That’s just going to change the number that’s left over to put back into reserves.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Ok, thank you.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Resolution 210. Is this a new position, an additional position?”

Councilman Dunleavy: “What’s happening here and you’ll see we have a Code change in this package going to a public hearing that the Fire Department’s giving up their fee for false alarms and they’re donating it to the towns so we can hire a Fire Prevention Investigator which is a lesser salary than a Fire Marshall so actually their false alarm fees are going to be paying for this and it’s not coming out of the General Fund for the taxpayers.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Thank you, Resolution 252. There’s no *resolve* that the fee was waived.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “You want to know why the fee was waived?”

Sal Mastropaolo: “No I said there was no *resolve* that the fee was waived. Usually there’s a *whereas* and a *resolve*.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “It’s in the *whereas*, the fourth *whereas*, the fifth *whereas* down. Oh but you’re saying it’s not *resolved*.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Right.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Ok we’ll put it in there. This is another entity so that’s why it’s going to be waived. We’ll add that in, ok?”

Sal Mastropaolo: “253. 253 there’s no mention whatsoever of any kind of *whereas* or resolution relative to the sale and service of alcoholic beverages. Should there be particularly since it’s?”

Councilman Dunleavy: “I don’t know if they’re going; there should be. If they’re going to sell alcoholic beverages there should. We’re trying to corral them now so there should be a corral but we have to.”

Jill Lewis: “It’s in there.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Oh it’s in there.”

Jill Lewis: “Yeah after *therefore now be it resolved*, the very next paragraph. It provides to include a food concession, craft sales, music and the sale and service of alcoholic beverages.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Ok, 254. There’s no *resolve* that the fee was paid.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “You got that? Ok, the fourth *whereas*; first page, fourth *whereas*.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “Yeah but there’s also police fees that have to get paid and I believe you have a check you’re just waiting for the dollar amount for the police fees. Jill were you able to get a dollar amount for him?”

Jill Lewis: (Inaudible)

Councilwoman Giglio: “Ok.”

Salvatore Mastropaolo: “No the point I’m making on 254 is there’s usually a *whereas* that addresses the Chapter 90 application fee and there’s usually *resolved* and this one doesn’t have it and I just don’t know for sure whether there has to be for consistency.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Well it says here *whereas the application of Chapter 90 application fee has been paid for this event.*”

Jill Lewis: “And if you look at the prior resolution, Chapter 90 Resolution 253 you’ll notice that the practice has been to include in the preamble *whereas* clauses that the application has been paid.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “OK, so you’re saying that satisfies?”

Jill Lewis: “Correct,”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Ok. John I take it from your comment before about that, that fire prevention that 256 doesn’t need replacing then. That’s why you stripped, deleted the entire section on alarm systems.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Yeah, right.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Ok and you go to the back of the package there’s two or three Resolutions that have no numbers.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “They’re going to be brought up from the floor.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Ok, that’s it.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “That’s reference to the water. Ok, thank you Sal. Before you speak, Bill this gentleman has a check to give you but he doesn’t have an amount. Do you have an amount for the police department for the festival on Sunday? Can you speak to him after the meeting?”

William Rothaar: “I’ll speak to him after the meeting.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Ok, very good.”

Andy Kalamarno: “Andy Kalamarno, Babylon, New York. I’m talking about Resolution 254; the application of Starfish Productions for the North Fork Horseradish Festival on Sunday April 19th. We have advertised a start time of eleven a.m. and it was brought to our attention that the village would prefer a one p.m. start time so it doesn’t conflict with the church’s noon Mass. Once we found out about that we took steps to resolve that issue. We’ve hired security that we will post by the church with signs “church parking only”. We have, we’re hiring or paying for

Riverhead police, we just don't know what the amount is but we have the check and the reason for the eleven o'clock start was last year we had over, people come out to the festival, we had twenty-six percent of the people come from western Suffolk, sixteen percent come from Nassau and seven percent come from New York City so usually people stay two hours at our festival and then we surveyed them after that and they either go out to a local restaurant, they go visit a winery or they go to a farm stand so that's why we did the eleven o'clock so in order to bring more business to the Town and typically we don't get busy until after one o'clock after Mass anyway so it's very slow in the morning."

Councilman Dunleavy: "Now there's one more question about the alcohol beverage."

Andy Kalamarno: "Oh, yes. Long Island Brewery always opens at one p.m. on Sundays and that's what time we're going to be serving Long Island Brewery's beer, at one o'clock so we'll be at the same time as when they normally open their tasting room."

Councilwoman Giglio: "And as per our discussion before the meeting this afternoon you indicated that you would have security guards with signs saying "church parking only."

Andy Kalamarno: "Yes, I did mention that."

Councilwoman Giglio: "Ok, good."

Andy Kalamarno: "Any other questions?"

Councilman Wooten: "My concern was of course the church but I realize that you're going to restrict your parking to Long Island Brewery vendors and to the south of Polish Hall, not the north side."

Andy Kalamarno: "That is correct."

Councilman Dunleavy: "George do you have anything?"

Councilman Gabrielsen: "Don't we have a twelve o'clock start on private events?"

Councilman Dunleavy: "I don't know I would have to look that up. I don't know."

Councilwoman Giglio: "No, when we walk for Alzheimer and everything."

Councilman Dunleavy: "All sports programs start before one p.m."

Councilman Gabrielsen: "That's nonprofit, this is a nonprofit."

Councilman Dunleavy: "I have to look that up. Ok."

Councilman Gabrielsen: "There may be an outside chance that we may limit that, you know start to twelve."

Councilwoman Giglio: “Anne Marie is there?”

Anne Marie Prudenti: (Inaudible) I’m going to have to look that up.”

Councilman Gabrielsen: “I’m just concerned.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “We may have a Code that you can’t start before a certain time so Anne Marie’s going to look that up.”

Andy Kalamarno: “Ok, I wasn’t aware of that.”

Councilman Gabrielsen: “I’m kind of concerned myself about the church, the services, the disruption of it with all that, alcohol or not the confusion around it I think is something we typically looked at one o’clock as being. It’s kind of a standard in respect to them.”

Andy Kalamarno: “That’s right, what time?”

Councilman Gabrielsen: “You can control it all you want but there’s going to be cars that’ll flood that area looking to park at the church. I think the services start as late as twelve or twelve-thirty.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Twelve o’clock. Last Mass is at twelve o’clock.”

Councilman Gabrielsen: “And that would end at twelve-thirty.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “A quarter to one, it’ll end at a quarter to one.”

Councilman Wooten: “I did reach out to Father Robert and asked him about the service. Twelve o’clock Mass is historically not the largest.

Councilman Gabrielsen: “So would twelve o’clock as a compromise, would that work for you?”

Andy Kalamarno: “We advertised at eleven but that’s fine. Like I said we did it at eleven so that we could bring more business into the Town of Riverhead and the average stay is two hours so that would be one o’clock. We figured people would be able to go to the restaurants and since most of, a lot of the people are coming from western Suffolk and Nassau County they’re going to make a day of it and that’s why we did it at that time.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Ok, thank you.”

Andy Kalamarno: “Thank you very much.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “And I’ve asked the Supervisor and the Deputy Supervisor in the future when Chapter 90 applications come in that we discuss them at work session when they come

in so that we can see if there's things that we want to put in the application before they even have to get started with advertising and submitting all their insurances and everything so I think that if the Board agrees with that we'll discuss that at work session and change that procedure."

Councilman Wooten: "I know the Town Clerk is very good about giving every Chapter 90."

Councilwoman Giglio: "Yeah but we should sit down and discuss it as a Board."

Councilman Gabrielsen: "Yeah you just can't."

Councilwoman Giglio: "If the Polish Hall is having an event that day for the Knights of Columbus I believe where they're going to be going into the church at one-thirty in the afternoon but and then coming back at three o'clock for an event at Polish Hall I did speak with the President of Polish Hall who said he didn't have a problem with the Horseradish Festival going on but he's got a hundred and twenty people coming to the Knights of Columbus at one o'clock, one-thirty in the afternoon so as long as the security guards stay in front of Polish Hall and let everybody know that it's private property and that they shouldn't be parking there."

Andy Kalamarno: "Not a problem at all. Thank you."

Councilman Dunleavy: "Thank you. Sal?"

Sal Mastropaolo: "Yeah I have one other question. On 245 giving the way the public hearing went I expect we're going to have problems with this. I just want to make sure that the remediate and secure includes closing that structure against the elements?"

Councilman Dunleavy: "Well we hope that we take it down before a third bad storm."

Sal Mastropaolo: "Yeah but I mean you're going to be taking down just the cupula."

Councilwoman Giglio: "Well it has to go out for bid."

Councilman Dunleavy: "It has to."

Councilwoman Giglio: "According to our Town Engineer it has to go out to bid. We have to get an architect to actually design the enclosure so that once it comes off and then we have to put it out for bid for contractors."

Councilman Dunleavy: "And then we have to cover it."

Sal Mastropaolo: "That's my questions. I just want to eliminate future lawsuits. So remediate and secure includes closing it up."

Councilman Dunleavy: "Yes, we can't leave it open."

Sal Mastropaolo: “Alright thank you.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Anyone else have anything they want to speak of about Resolutions? If not we’ll call Resolutions.”
