Police Chief Grodski informed the Board that the bid prices as compared to County prices are considerably higher - the Dodge vehicle is \$200 more and the Plymouth Vehicle is approximately \$300 more, and recommended that both bids be rejected and that purchase be made through County Bids.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

7:00 P. M. - Mrs. and Mrs. Michael W. LoBiondo and son Michael LoBiondo appeared before the Board and made application to use the old Mercy School Building on Roanoke Avenue for a Home for the Aged (ambulatory).

The building is suitable as it is next to a hospital and near a medical building. There is adequate room for recreation.

The LoBiondos are competent and knowledgeable in running such a home, having had three years of experience in this business.

Aged people would be taken from all over Suffolk County.

Would place from 30 to 35 people in this facility. All will be ambulatory.

Cost \$130.00 per month.

During hearing it was brought out that the LoBiondos have a facility at Smithtown, Farmingville and in Baiting Hollow, Sound Avenue, across the street from Bernies.

Town Board entered into discussion on the latter facility and learned that no permit has been obtained for its operation.

Mr. Abe Findberg, Contractor, also spoke.

The matter was referred to the Town Attorney.

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EXECUTIVE SESSION continued:

7:20 P. M. Mr. Gordon Ahlers, appeared before the Board requesting Special Permit to use the old Dolega Residence on West Main Street, Riverhead, as a Family Home Proprietary.

There would be only four (4) women housed in this facility. Meals and recreation facilities would be provided.

The matter was tabled for further study by the Town Board.

7:35 P. M. Terrance A. Krisman, Student at Stony Brook College, advised the Board that there are many interesting programs and projects in the Marine Resources and the Urban Science Centers in Stony Brook College and suggested that inasmuch as the students at the College have Master Degree Projects to work on, that the Town Board should avail itself of this free service.

Mr. Krisman was asked to submit list of projects and names of people to be contacted.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES

Supervisor Leonard asked if anyone wished to be heard at this time.

John P. Riesdorff spoke to the Board about the Town of Brookhaven's tree and stump burning operation at Manorville and asked why the Town of Riverhead can't do the same.

Mr. Riesdorff was told by the Board that the blowers on the machine used for this operation cost \$100,000 each and four men are needed to run such machine.

Mr. Riesdorff also spoke on the trees being planted in the village and said he has been advised by many people that the trees that have been planted are the "wrong" type of trees and suggested someone knowledgable be consulted before any more trees are planted.

Judge Costello said that permission should first be obtained from the Board before any more trees are planted.

Mr. Riesdorff said there is a serious aspect involved - there are all kinds of pipe lines in the ground, water, gas, telephone cables and sewer and whoever is planting these trees should first contact the utilities to learn where the pipes are.

Councilman Grodski asked who is going to take care of these trees.

Councilman Young stated we have moneys in the Budget to take care of these trees.

Mrs. Richard Carey pointed out that there were trees and shrubbery planted in the Parking District area on First Street - a lot of money was spent and the trees and shrubbery have all died.

Councilman Young: "As administrators (Town Board) of the Town, it is our responsibility to take care of the trees - if we don't have enough funds we should make a mental note to put more money in the budget next year. "

Mr. Riesdorff asked if all the trees that were planted have been donated.

Councilman Young: "Yes, there was \$300 donated for these trees. They are Pin Oaks, and I spoke to four large nursery operators about them and they all agreed that this is the best "street" tree. "

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Alex E. Horton, Supt. of Highways, informed the Board that the trees are being planted in the locations of the former trees.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Mr. Horton reported that two years have passed and he has not received a settlement on the damaged truck.

Town Attorney Francis J. Yakoboski stated that the Insurance Company is offering the precise amount as was estimated by Tryac to repair the truck, and added that the Insurance Company is however, resurrecting its files on this claim.

Mr. Horton said the estimated amount for repairs was given as \$5000 and the amount which the Insurance Company settled for was only \$2000.

The Town Board asked Mr. Horton what he was doing to correct the drainage problem at Little Bay, Wading River.

After discussion, Mr. Horton was authorized by the Board to hire Robert Kart, Engineer to prepare plans for the solution of this drainage problem.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Police Chief Grodski submitted the following proposal from T. H. Cheshire & Son, Inc., Electrical Contractors, for the installing of underground service re: Police Department Air conditioner - for L. I. Lighting Company connection:

"Installing new 400 amp 3 phase underground service. Circuit Breaker Main and Circuit Breaker Panel 4 inch conduit through brick wall under sidewalk for Long Island Lighting Company connection. \$1375.00."

Town Attorney cited Section 103 (Advertising for bids, etc.,) of the General Municipal Law, and rendered opinion that it will not be necessary to let out the aforesaid installation project for bids.

Supervisor Leonard recessed the meeting to hold a Public Hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:00 P. M.

Town Clerk submitted affidavits of posting and publishing Public Notice Calling Public Hearing on Petition of King Kullen Grocery Co., Inc., for change of zone on property located on Route 58, Riverhead, from Residence "C" to Business "C". The affidavits were filed.

Town Clerk read the following communication from the Riverhead Planning Board:

"The following resolution was duly adopted by the Town of Riverhead Planning Board at a regular meeting held on May 10, 1972:

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead referred to this Board the petition of King Kullen Grocery Co., Inc., for a change in zoning use district from Residence C to Business C of a parcel of land located at Roanoke Avenue and Country Road 58, Riverhead, New York, and

WHEREAS, John J. Munzel, attorney for petitioner, appeared before this Board and explained petitioner's reasons for the request, and

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:00 P. M. continued:

WHEREAS, this Board finds that Business C District extends south from County Road 58 to a depth of 300 feet, and petitioner's property extends an additional 100 feet into Residence C District, which has been a nonconforming business use since the adoption of the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Riverhead, and

WHEREAS, this Board believes the intent of the Ordinance and Map was to follow property lines along the southerly line of this property and the residential lots adjoining for the district line,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the petition of King Kullen Grocery Co., Inc., for change in zoning use district to Business C to include all of petitioner's property which is 400 feet south from County Road 58, on the westerly corner of Roanoke Avenue, Riverhead, New York, be granted, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead. " (End).

Supervisor Leonard declared the Hearing open and asked if anyone wished to be heard.

John J. Munzel, Esq., representing King Kullen Grocery, Inc., appeared before the Board and said:

"It is my dubious distinction to have the least significant zone change application in the history of the Town of Riverhead.

The property runs approximately 450ft. - 400 ft. deep - the first 300 feet of which are zoned Business "C", and the rear 100 ft. are zoned Residential "C". The zoning line goes almost directly in the middle of the King Kullen Building. The building is about to go under contract on sale to a new owner who plans a commercial venture and will make changes - and in order that everything be proper, the application is made that the zone change be granted so that the entire parcel would now be Business "C".

Mr. Albert: "What type of business is going in there?"

Mr. Munzel: "Harrow's Swimming Pools is going to put a retail outlet in there. "

No one else wishing to be heard and no further communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Leonard declared the Hearing closed at 8:07 P. M., and re-opened the meeting.

PERSONAL APPEARANCE

Mr. Betty Henninger, Wading River, spoke to the Board on the drainage problem at Little Bay.

She asked the Board to do something about correcting this situation at the very earliest possible time, as the water is stagnant and smells. The owner would like to put up three houses but is prevented from doing so because of the water flowing over the property.

Mr. Horton advised Mrs. Henninger that the Board has authorized him to hire Robert Kart to prepare plans for a catch basin in the Little Bay property and from there lead a pipe line out to Sunset Blvd.

COMMUNICATIONS

Long Island Lighting Company, dated 5/2/72, submitting survey for improved street lighting on Parkway Street, within the Riverhead Lighting District by removing ten (10) 1000 Lumen Mercury Vapor fixtures and installing thirteen (13) 7600 Lumen Mercury Vapor fixtures at an annual cost of \$467.40. Filed.

Louis Nungesser, dated 5/5/72, asking why we can't have a ramp in Riverhead village - stating there is an ideal location for one in the rear of George Autenreith's property which is fully developed, paved, etc., - there are no cars using this part of the parking field at the river edge - there is a slight road decline and it could easily be made into a ramp at not too much expense to the Town. Filed.

Copies to Town Board. Town Board will take matter under consideration.

Wading River Chamber of Commerce, Inc., dated 5/3/72, calling attention to problem existing on roadway-North Country Road from the old Parker Road to the intersection of North Wading River Road - the high curb and the ramp driveways have caused many accidents, cars skid off the ramps and have to be lifted out of the trench that runs along each curb. Filed.

Referred to Supt. of Highways.

Van Rensselaer Skidmore Post #2476, dated 5/10/72, extending invitation to Town Board to participate in the Memorial Day Parade on May 29th, 1972 at 9 A. M., and asking if one of the Town Fathers could supply a car for the official party. Filed.

Copies to Town Board.

Perry Wiesen, dated 5/12/72, urging the Town Board to pass a law such as enacted in the Town of Southampton which would force a landowner to keep his property clean. Further stating that two empty lots both west and east of the hospital are in a deplorable state and volunteering to do what ever he can to assist in making the County Seat neater and cleaner. Filed.

Robert L. Tormey, Social Studies Chairman, Riverhead High School, dated 5/15/72, thanking the Town Board for indicating a willingness to hold a future meeting at the School. Stating further that it is now late in the school year and respectfully requesting that this event be scheduled in the Fall, when they may look forward to hosting Riverhead's leaders at the new facility. Filed.

Town of Brookhaven, dated 5/15/72, submitting Notice of Public Hearing on amendment to Code of the Town of Brookhaven. Filed.

Copies to Building Department and Town Attorney.

Charles R. Cuddy, Esq., dated 5/16/72, relating to Zoning Change Application of Messrs. Hubbard and Collura. Stating he has consulted with Mr. Dominy to present his position as to the use of Indian Island Park by horses located on the above property. Mr. Dominy has requested a written proposal so that it may be reviewed by members of his staff as well as the Town Attorney. Mr. Dominy will then advise as to what particular use or uses the applicant may make of the County Park. Requesting determination by the Town Board on this application be adjourned for 30 days in order that there be sufficient time for Mr. Dominy to review the proposal. Filed.

No action taken by the Town Board on this request.

Supervisor Leonard recessed the meeting to hold a Public Hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:15 P. M.

Calling No. 26 of the Town of Riverhead, relating to Sections 204A (2), 204C and 204E, and 204F.
Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting Public Notice Public Hearing in connection with proposed amendments to Zoning Ordinance

The affidavits were filed.

Thereupon Supervisor Leonard declared the Hearing open and asked if anyone wished to be heard.

Town Attorney Francis J. Yakaboski explained the reason for the proposed amendments as follows:

"This amendment to the Zoning Ordinance takes out of the Agricultural Use Zone as a Special Permit Use - multiple family dwelling and garden apartments and apartment uses. "

Mrs. Richard Carey: "Who is requesting this?"

Town Attorney: "It was initiated by Councilman Grodski. "

Mrs. Carey: "Why?"

Town Attorney: "Pending completion of the Master Plan study for use of agricultural areas in the Town - the Board does not wish the agricultural areas which are our open areas at this time, - to become occupied with multiple residence and garden apartment type usages until we decide what use will be made of our open areas, and there will probably be other zone changes proposed by the Board. "

David Caulfield: "If some one were to make application now would they still be able to get permits or are all permits suspended?"

Town Attorney: "It is not suspended - the Ordinance is changed - it is amended to take out of the Special Permit uses within the Agricultural Use Zone - multiple family, garden apartment and apartment uses. It is not a suspension. By the way in a recent court decision in the Town of Ramapo, the Town suspended all developing for a generation and it was upheld by the Courts. "

No one else wishing to be heard and no communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Leonard declared the Hearing closed at 8:30 P. M. , and reopened the meeting.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Industrial Commission

Supervisor Leonard announced that letters have been mailed to people asking if they will be willing to serve.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS continued:Request for Clerk Hire-Assessors:

Supervisor Leonard announced that the Civil Service List has been canvassed with no success, and the Assessors are stressing need for help.

Judge Costello suggested that the replacement for Harry Fleischman be held up - if there is a need for temporary help for Susan's job, he has no objections to filling it - that Councilman Young and Grodski have some computerized service that will figure out everything.

Councilman Young: "I will contact these people. "

Supervisor Leonard: "In the meantime, what do you suggest for help for the Assessor's Office?"

Judge Costello: "But you have Harry - the job that you are replacing is for Harry and Harry is there - you need someone for Susan - but Harry I suspect is still doing his job. "

Thomas McKay, Assessor: "We need help there real bad. Harry is behind in his work because all these new houses are going up in Wading River - he is also behind in deeds and without Susan there, he has to take care of all the Senior Citizen and Veteran Exemptions. He is behind about two months. "

Judge Costello: "What you need then, Mr. McKay is someone to fill Susan's job?"

Mr. McKay: "We need someone to start learning to take over Harry's job. "

Judge Costello: "But he is not going to retire until March of next year. "

Mr. McKay: "February next year and it will take more than two weeks in order to learn Harry's work. "

Judge Costello: "That's such a difficult job - maybe we should get the computer in. "

Mr. McKay: "We need somebody real bad. We are staying off the road 2-1/2 days a week to do the book work. No other Assessors in Suffolk County do this. "

Judge Costello: "Let's get somebody in there in Susan's job. It will have to be a temporary girl in there as she is on a six month's leave of absence. There wasn't a posting made for Susan's job - there was a posting made for Senior Clerk - for Harry's job and I imagine the rest of the Board doesn't want to replace him now for next February. "

Supervisor Leonard: "The main reason for replacing Harry now is so that the new Clerk can learn Harry's job and will be able to take over when he quits. "

RE: COMPLAINT OF RUBIN ARNOLD (letter read last meeting)

Judge Costello reported that Mr. Arnold had called him making complaint about some glass spread all over the area, and asked Police Chief Grodski if anything has been done about this.

Police Chief Grodski said he received no complaint about glass.

Judge Costello said he would appreciate it if this matter would be investigated.

Police Chief Grodski: "Does Mr. Arnold know this glass came from Esposito's?"

Judge Costello: "I don't know - this is what he tells me - what do we tell him to do?"

Police Chief Grodski: "Mr. Arnold has been told to write to the State Liquor Authority and to complain to the local ABC Board, but instead he bought himself a Police Monitor and listens to the Police calls."

Judge Costello: "Don't you think it is worthy of an investigation and report?"

Police Chief Grodski: "He admits the Police were there - there is nothing we can do - he is interested in a noise ordinance."

Judge Costello: "The letter was written to me for the Town Board and I as a Police Commissioner suggest to you, Sir, that you investigate the complaint - this is all I say."

Police Chief Grodski: "It has been investigated. There is nothing we can do. There is no ordinance to enforce."

Judge Costello: "Will you give us that in writing, please?"

Supervisor Leonard recessed the meeting to hold a Public Hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:45 P. M.

Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting Public Notice on ORDER PROVIDING FOR PUBLIC HEARING RELATIVE TO EXTENSION AND CONSOLIDATION OF THE LIGHTING DISTRICT BOUNDARIES.

The affidavits were filed.

Thereupon Supervisor Leonard declared the Hearing open and asked if anyone wished to be heard.

Town Attorney Francis J. Yakaboski made the following comments:

"Basically what the proposal is, Mr. Supervisor as you know, is to consolidate the various existing lighting districts in the Township and to extend them and rename them the "Riverhead Lighting District", so as to create one lighting district encompassing the entire Town of Riverhead."

Mrs. Richard Carey: "Does this mean we will have to pay even though we don't have lights?"

Town Attorney: "If you are within the Town and own assessable real property, yes."

Mrs. Carey: "Why is this being done?"

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:45 P. M. -Continued:

Judge Costello: "As Chairman of the Lighting Committee, we had this come up last year. As you know now you are taxed for arterial lighting - there are some people in the Town of Riverhead who like lights and some who don't like lights. In lighting up the Village of Riverhead we have eliminated to a negligible degree the pilferage, etc. Harry Fleischman tells me that the cost of this one huge consolidated district encompassing the whole Town will be 1.9 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. Not only that but the extension of taxes in the various districts has been burdensome."

Mrs. Carey: "How much more will be added to the Lighting District?"

Councilman Young: "One thing I hope we can do is to light up some of the dangerous curves in Town and stop some of these accidents."

Judge Costello: "This means we can light up any lane, any dangerous curve which we have been unable to do because it was not within a lighting district. I am trying now with Mr. Strong to get some lights on Route 58 - and I am for lighting up all of the highways."

Town Attorney: "This does not mean that any one who wants a street light is going to get a street light - the Town Board is not going to light up a street every 40 or 50 feet. Lights will still be processed on application and the Town Board will make individual determination in connection with each application based on street safety and incidents of crime, etc."

Mrs. Carey: "What percentage of the Town is already lighted?"

Judge Costello: "Don't have any idea."

Mr. Terrance Krisman asked how the residents can get lights.

Judge Costello: "Write to me or Miss Block".

Mr. Frank Polacek: "Will there be a published notice or some public hearing in the case of where an individual may want a light but no one else in the area wants a light?"

Judge Costello: "The agenda being published now - the whole Town would know about it. What we are trying to do now on arterial lighting is to get the County to pay for lights on County Roads."

Mr. Krisman: "Would it be possible to put a bulletin on a pole when the Town decides to put a light there so the people will know a light is coming in?"

Mr. John P. Riesdorff: "It's against the law to put signs up on poles."

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:45 P. M. -Continued:

Mr. Edward R. Munson: "Is there any thought towards an anticipated budget much as you do for curbs and gutters?"

Judge Costello: "That could very well be, your expenditure now runs between \$70,000 or \$80,000."

Mr. Polacek: "The Public Service Commission of New York State has a program, Phase 1 - that all new subdivisions have to have buried cables for electricity and for telephone. There will be no poles. This is regardless of whether the Planning Board adopts a resolution to enforce such a thing. The cost of lights will be higher in the future."

Judge Costello: "Every application that we have had so far we were questioning the developer on whether or not we would accept the streets with or without lights, and everyone said, "with lights", so the costs of these lights would be borne by the developer. The Federal Bureau of Statistics has come forth with a summary that lighted highways are less killers of people on highways, and they are going to subsidize every village and town throughout the United States in an effort that we can light up our arterial lights."

No one else wishing to be heard and no communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Leonard declared the Hearing closed at 9:00 P. M. and reopened the meeting.

RESOLUTIONS

Town Justice Costello offered the following resolution which was seconded by Town Justice Leonard.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Supervisor be and is hereby authorized to enter into a written contract with T. H. Town Justice Leonard offered the following resolution which was seconded by Town Justice Costello.

BE IT RESOLVED, That Police Chief Stephen J. Grodski be and is hereby authorized to apply for a Federal Grant through the Suffolk County Traffic Safety Board for the following local projects: (1) Traffic Enforcement Assistance Project, PART 1, which includes the purchase, training and usage of a BREATHALYZER, and (2) Traffic Enforcement Assistance Project, PART II, which includes the purchase, training and usage of a TR-6 TRAFFIC UNIT for a period of one year.

The vote, Councilman Young, Yes, Councilman Grodski, Yes, Town Justice Leonard, Yes, Town Justice Costello, Yes, and Supervisor Leonard, Yes.

The resolution was thereupon declared duly adopted.

Before the roll call vote was taken on the above resolution, Police Chief Grodski offered the following information:

This resolution is only the authority to make application for one year and after that it can be increased or decreased.

\$750. will be paid for the use of the Breathalyzer.

\$1848. will be paid for the use of the Radar - all the training - all the court time of Sergeants and Chief - all men who are trained to use this will be compensated through this Grant.

The cost of the two projects will be \$2590. We will receive a Grant of \$14,050. We will have all of these men trained and the Town stands to make \$4000 to \$5000. Each project runs concurrently a year apiece.

Seven Sergeants will work the Breathalyzer. Their salaries are chargeable to the Federal Grant - \$8.00 per hour when they attend school - all fringe benefits are tabulated and put into the application.

Radar will need two men per Squad. However, the radar is a one-man operation.

No additional men will be hired to work these projects. It is all based on the current table of personnel.

Every Township in Eastern Suffolk County is enjoying this Grant and have already received the training and the money.

There being no further business on motion and vote, the meeting adjourned at 9:35 P. M., to meet on Tuesday, June 6th, 1972 at 10:30 A. M.
