Supervisor Kozakiewicz called the meeting to order at 7:03 p.m.

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Let the record reflect the time of 7:03 p.m. I call this meeting to order. Does anybody want to lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance? Young lady, young man? Right in the front row? Come on, why don't you come up and lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance? No?"

(The Pledge of Allegiance was recited, led by William Kasperovich)

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. All right. Is there a motion to approve the minutes of the Town Board meeting of May 7th and the Special Board meeting of May 16, 2002?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "So moved."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved by Councilperson Sanders. Seconded by Councilperson Lull. Vote, please."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The minutes are approved."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Now, just to get you confused, we'll go down below and we've got a presentation- a proclamation to make.

Felecia, are you going to come up?

In May of every year, the Riverhead Community Awareness program holds their Say No To Drugs march. It's on Say No To Drugs Day. We have some of our students here with us today to commemorate this event. It is my pleasure to present to Felecia a proclamation which will be dated for the date of the event which is the 31st of May. So anybody watching who wants to participate, who wants to be there, who wants to be part of this day that's been going on for how many years now? Seventeenth annual march, you are welcome to be present. Do you want to say a few words? Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Felecia has asked me if she could borrow the Town Board meeting room to put some of their posters and some of their drawings, and I said by all means you can, I think by Friday?"

Felecia: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I hope we have some of them up so you can see what some of our young men and women have done. So we welcome that and we look forward to seeing their drawings. Thank you."

We're ready for our meeting. We've got to look through our Agenda. Barbara, Reports, please."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Barbara. Applications."

Barbara Grattan: "That concludes Applications."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Barbara. Any- no, no correspondence?"

Barbara Grattan: "Nobody loves us."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Committee Reports?"

Councilman Densieski: "Just a reminder, Mr. Supervisor, that Saturday, June 8th, is the Second Annual Riverhead Festival and Boat Show. There's going to be all kinds of boats for sale, all kinds of

family fun. And, naturally, admission is free. There's also going to be a 5K run along the river that starts at 9:00 a.m. and it promises to be as it was last year, another great day for downtown Riverhead."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Any other Committee reports?"

Councilman Lull: "From the- oh, I'm sorry."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Go right ahead."

Councilman Lull: "From the Traffic Committee, you might notice that all four public hearings tonight are all on traffic studies, traffic speed zones, signs and so forth. And we have a couple of resolutions on the same thing. We're moving forward to try to bring our traffic signals, signs and speed zones up to par."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Any other Committee reports?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "Yes. I would just like to report that the Recreation Advisory Committee met last week and we discussed the success of the grand opening of the skate park. I believe there were, that day, 300 registrants, so there was a good time had by many and all and from what I understand, they continue to use it on a daily basis, so they're very happy with the project and the participation thus far."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anybody else?"

Councilwoman Blass: "Just a reminder, Mr. Supervisor, that the scoping hearing on the draft or the generic environmental impact statement that's going to be prepared in conjunction with the master plan, that hearing is taking place Wednesday, May 29th at 3:00 in this room."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Councilwoman Blass: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Also, I just wanted to make one comment and it's with respect to one of the reports that was on tonight's agenda, the 2001 Drinking Water Report. This is a report that's provided by Riverhead Water District. It's done in compliance with the federal and state regulations. In the next couple of days, you'll be getting in the mail, those of you who are customers of the Riverhead Water District, this report, which is a four page report

provided by the Riverhead Water District, which provides some information about the testing that's done at the facilities for various chemicals and the- it's called the Table of Detected Parameters. It also has some information about the water district, water conservation measures and some interesting data. So you'll be receiving this if you are a water district customer.

Saying that, the time being 7:10 p.m., Barbara, would you read the affidavits of publishing and posting for tonight's first public hearing?"

Public Hearing opened 7:10 p.m.

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York on May 22, 2002, at 7:05 p.m. regarding the considered proposed local law to amend Chapter 101 entitled Vehicles and Traffic. Section 101-3 Stop and Yield Intersections; railroad crossings; parking fields."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And in particular, this is a hearing to discuss the placement of a stop sign at Siegal Avenue and its entrance from the south at the intersection with Charles Street.

Is there anybody who would like to address the Board, either for or against the proposed change to Chapter 101? Bill."

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich. I live on 15th Street in Wading River. It's about 15 miles away from this intersection and somebody would say, well, what's he being concerned about this intersection when he lives 15 miles away? Well, whether you live on the east end of the township or the west end of the township, to me it's all the same. This is home to the people that live in the township.

And we are being pockmarked in this township by stop signs and it's my suspicion, I say because I haven't had time to go into this in fine detail, that these stop signs which once they're placed, stay there for the rest of our lives and we have no way to know what condition or what situation that this stop sign is supposed to overcome. We have no idea to what the conditions around this intersection are.

And who in the township is so learned about highway or traffic movement that they could say well, a stop sign will solve the problem.

Nobody knows what the problem is except a few handful of people and they are not road designers. They might know- and have some knowledge of the vehicular law and the town laws, but what is a legal requirement, what is reasonable condition, what is optimum condition, what is the favorable condition. There's no way to know whether anybody ever gave this a lot of thought.

And in none of these do I see that- I'm talking this way as the first one because I'll be here repeating it for each one."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I was going to suggest that if that's the way you felt, we'd make your comments a part of the record with respect to each stop sign proposal tonight."

William Kasperovich: "Well, each stop sign has a different- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Are you saying that you are opposed to this one based upon your review of it? I understand you are questioning the background data. Are you in favor of it or against it?"

William Kasperovich: "Please let me finish. In places that the sign becomes obliterated by parking of another vehicle or by greenery or by what have you, you see a sign- stop sign ahead. There's a warning that there's a stop sign ahead. I see none of that spelled out or considered here. And every year these signs should be- oh, the other item, each stop sign has a marking on the lane of the traffic that it applies to. Now, if there's no line on the pavement, it means you stop by the sign. But if conditions warrant that this is not the optimum position to stop, then put a line on the street.

But these resolutions don't address this. So these things that come along with this approval of this resolution, is not spelled out and there's no way to know who is responsible with the follow up.

Now this is an annual cost to the township. Every stop sign you put up, costs the town money every year for the rest of our lives. And in good conscience we can't ignore this. If there's good enough reason to put one up, there's good enough reason to check it out every year. And it shouldn't have to be that citizens have to complain that they can't see the sign. This should be done as a matter of procedure in the township."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't mean to be disrespectful and, please, don't take my interruption as such. We're dealing with the

question of whether this stop sign and change to the code is a good idea or bad idea. Your questions really deal with the maintenance, the upkeep, and procedures that happen in general with respect to stop signs and how they should be maintained. It's really getting a little bit afield from the question which we are here for today, which is does it make sense to place this stop sign at this location or- "

William Kasperovich: "All right."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "-- or does it not make sense."

William Kasperovich: "Can you tell me from this description, where this sign is going to be put?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I can tell you that we're going to provide for- and to answer your question, I think what you're asking for is not addressed in the legislation. I think what you are asking for is how its mechanically done and that's the subject of what the Highway Department does once the legislation is put in effect.

What we're doing here today is to consider the amendment to the code so that if the sign is placed and if an individual fails to stop either at the sign or at the line as determined by the Highway Department, and they are cited by a police officer, one of who is in the room today, there is a codification on the books so that when that individual is brought to court for a violation of the Vehicle and Traffic Law, that is failure to stop at a stop sign, one of the things that has to be established through a court of law is that the stop sign is visible, and that the stop sign was legally posted, meaning that it's the right height, it meets the Vehicle and Traffic Law standards, and it was enacted pursuant to a valid act of the appropriate agency that adopts legislation.

You're asking questions that I think really don't get addressed in the town code because that's not the place for them to get addressed. Your comments are well taken but to be honest, your issue, the failure to maintain, the failure to provide visibility, as you know, those are liability issues and those are defenses to an individual who is cited with a violation of that provision of the law in a court of law. If you can't see a stop sign because it is failed to be maintained, and you fail to stop, you have a defense to that action. If you failed to see it because we fail to maintain it, then we're at risk and potentially liable for failing to do so.

But that is not what we're talking about today. Today we're

talking about the question of establishing a stop between- at this intersection for traffic that's entering from the south. That's what we're dealing with today."

Councilman Lull: "And, Bill, in answer to your question, specific question, this is a "T" intersection in Millbrook Gables. The request from the patrons down there was for three stop signs at the "T" intersection. Any request is visited by all three members of the Highway Committee. That's myself, the Superintendent of Highways and the Chief of Police. It was determined that the three signs were the incorrect use of stop signs and instead this is the stop sign that is on the single road of the "T", leaving the other- the straight through road as a right of way. Each one is dealt in that way and dealt with that kind of discussion and we meet on a regular basis."

William Kasperovich: "Well, I have no bone to pick with you and the Highway Superintendent or the Chief of Police, he being newly appointed, I don't know him or his policies or attitude. But you do not say here so maybe it could be read, exactly where this signpost is going to be. You leave it for somebody else. You put the responsibility onto an unknown factor. And that unknown factor has been-- is being repeated over the years and I thought it was high time that we put a stop to it."

Councilman Lull: "By the way, I totally agree with you, that for a number of years this- "

William Kasperovich: "-- if you don't know where the demarcation of a right of way is or where a building line is or where there is a control line, there's no in God's earth can you tell where the legal position of that line should be."

Councilman Lull: "That information is all available in the Highway Department. My question for you- my comment for you- "

William Kasperovich: "It's available in the Highway Department, says who? I go there and I don't find anything."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. Kasperovich, Mr. Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich: "I don't find it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich: "-- don't tell me- someplace else. I come

here to the elected officials to expect them to do these things correctly, properly and legally so it's for the benefit of the people that live here."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And I think if you had listened to my explanation, my explanation that we- "

William Kasperovich: "Your explanation is passing the buck to somebody else."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, sir, it's not. No, it's not. No, it's not."

William Kasperovich: "Yes, it is."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Fine."

William Kasperovich: "There should be- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Are you opposed to the placement of the stop sign at the intersection?"

William Kasperovich: "As described in this illegal resolution."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, sir. Anybody else who would like to address the Board? Nobody else, declare the public hearing closed, the time being 7:24 p.m."

Public Hearing closed: 7:24 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 7:24 p.m.

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The time still being 7:24 p.m., Barbara, would you read the affidavit of publishing and posting for the second public hearing."

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, on May 22, 2002, at 7:10 p.m. regarding the considered proposed local law to amend Chapter 101 entitled Vehicles & Traffic. Section 101-3 Stop & Yield Intersections; railroad crossings; parking fields. The intersection is Dogwood Lane running north and south, stop sign on Dogwood Lane running east and west, and the entrance from the west."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I know that you've indicated a desire to speak on this one as well, Mr. Kasperovich, so."

William Kasperovich: "Yes. William Kasperovich. I'm now speaking on the public hearing which was proposed- designated to post and publish resolution 490. Now, you have an intersection of two streets of the same name. How is anybody that unless they live close by and use this intersection, are going to know exactly what this is involved? Two streets with the same name intersect, then one of the streets is misnamed or improperly named or should be changed. No two streets should have the same name. When you dial 911 and you then list a street, there's only one street in the township. Now, here we have- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Actually, this one I agree with you on. There does seem to be some confusion with where this stop sign is, so I'd like to see a chart of it myself."

Councilman Lull: "Bob, Dogwood Lane goes like this. It comes in from the side and makes an intersection."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Oh, I see, it makes a "T" intersection. Okay."

Councilman Densieski: "So it is the same road."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "In Wading River."

Councilman Densieski: "Right."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Councilman Densieski: "It's a fairly dangerous intersection."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich from Wading River. I live on 15th Street and I have a vague idea and a fairly decent idea of what this Dogwood Lane looks like and how it runs. And it needs some control. And this control doesn't satisfy what I would consider a safe indication.

Now, so that the rest of the township would know, I did see whether there was anything on the bulletin board in the Town Clerk's Office which, by the way, I don't consider a posting in the manner

that this board is kept. This is not a legal posting. When you have to climb halfway over the counter to get close enough to read, this is not proper posting.

Now, most of the time people don't search this out but since I thought, well, this is my home ground, I should know what they're talking about and I go to the Assessor's Office to look at the tax map and find this street, I say, well, nobody else but somebody doing what I'm doing is going to know what this is about.

This puts this public hearing as improper and illegal. Since you're not notifying, you're not spelling out, you're not indicating, this is not a public hearing.

Now, in all these stop signs that have been posted, it's, to me, a quick, shoddy way of getting by a problem. Not looking at the area and conditions as to what should really be done with this. It's an easy way out to plunk a stop sign but at the same time for each sign we put up there, we put a fraction of time of a police officer on patrol to put surveillance on these road designations. And we don't have that many policemen that they could put proper care over stopping points to effect any serious concern by people that ignore stop signs. And there is no way for anybody to put somebody who flagrantly and dangerously use these corners without concern to the stop sign, there no way to get any corrective measures except right here. And right here- "

Councilman Densieski: "Mr. Supervisor, with all due respect, does this have anything to do with the public hearing?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think he's trying to argue that there's another way and that the stop signs are not the proper mechanism. Is that what you're asking us to consider, some other options to the placement of stop signs and what would those be?"

William Kasperovich: "Well, I don't see any qualified learned individuals reviewing the situation and conditions."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, as explained in the last hearing, there is- "

William Kasperovich: "This is the only- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "If I may, Mr. Kasperovich. As explained in the last hearing, we get requests for the placement of

stop signs. The individuals come to the town and say there's a dangerous situation that people are getting injured, maimed, hurt because there's an inability to control the traffic flow at an intersection. They come to us, they petition us, they ask us to look at it.

We have an ad hoc committee which consists of the Police Chief, Councilman Lull, and the Highway Superintendent, and they look at it from their various backgrounds, the Police Chief being one who brings the law enforcement aspect into it, whether it's a mechanism which is proper for law enforcement and a way to control vehicular traffic. And what is the objective that's trying to be accomplished by the mechanism that's being sought here today or any other time.

Is a stop sign the right answer? Is a stop sign being used here to control another problem which should be done some other way? I think what you've heard is that based upon the ad hoc committee, they go out and look and they've made a determination. That in their wisdom, collective judgment, the three of them, this is the proper thing to do.

We're now holding a public hearing to hear whether this intersection, again, not generalities, not discussion about what should be done from a general perspective, makes sense, whether it's a good idea to put a stop sign up, or whether it's a bad idea to put a stop sign up."

William Kasperovich: "And if each of these three men say, oh, what the hell is the difference? We'll just put one up. They can't be bothered further- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "What their decision making was is not the question today. The question is- the question is we're hearing from the public. We are here to hear from the public to understand is this is a good idea or a bad idea. The question of how they rendered their collective judgment is not the issue of attack here. We're not attacking the people who looked at this and came to the conclusion that this was the right answer. They've made that decision and to attack because they decided to punt, I think is unfair.

The question here is from your perspective, all of you out there, does it make sense with this particular intersection, Dogwood Lane, which, as I understand now kind of loops around and that's why it's one road, one name, and how it intersects, does it make sense to put a control point with a stop sign as you enter from the west onto those

roads? That's the subject matter. That narrow question. Does it make sense? Should we change the code to reflect that?"

William Kasperovich: "I cannot personally accuse any of the three men of being delinquent in their duties but what I've seen in the placement of stop signs in many places is because whoever designated the spot didn't know what they were doing or they put the line on the pavement in incorrect relationship to the signpost."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I understand that, Mr. Kasperovich, but, again,-- "

William Kasperovich: "Now, I get up and talk to the Town Board about this, you throw me out of here after the six minutes has past, and say well- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I have another individual who would like to address us, so."

William Kasperovich: "This is a public hearing. You- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. Kasperovich- "

William Kasperovich: "-- cannot put your nonsense of five minutes- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I am not- listen, we started at 7:10. We've done two hearings, we're not concluded. Two divided by five, 10, 15, 20, 25 minutes- "

William Kasperovich: "This is a public hearing."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "You've been up there 25 minutes, Mr. Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich: "This public hearing is illegal."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We disagree. Thank you."

William Kasperovich: "I (inaudible) of what is indicated, what has been exposed to the public and the manner with which the Chairman of- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "You have made your point."

William Kasperovich: "-- of the Town Board is responding."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Mr. Kasperovich. Yes."

Unidentified (From the Audience: "My question was merely is there a time limit?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "On public hearings, we do not have a time limit. No. Anybody else who would like to address the Board? If not, declare the public hearing closed, the time of 7:35 p.m."

Public Hearing closed: 7:35 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 7:35 p.m.

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The time still being 7:35 p.m., Barbara, would you read the affidavits of publishing and posting for the last- I mean the next public hearing. I guess I'm jumping a little bit."

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York on May 22, 2002, at 7:10 p.m. regarding the considered proposed local law to amend Chapter 101 entitled Vehicles & Traffic. Section 101-8 Weight Limits."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm going to pass this onto Councilman Lull to explain a little bit about this particular hearing, the proposal and how it originated."

Councilman Lull: "Out of the Traffic Committee, this is one of several things that have been talked about in this particular area. This traffic limit sign, the 10,000 pound limit sign, is a sign that is used- has been used in various places to forbid passage over bridges that are not sound for anything larger than that or through neighborhoods where there is-- a large truck would cause problems.

In this particular case, this is a weight limit on Youngs Avenue. It runs from Twomey Avenue on the west to just west of the Crown Recycling facility on the east. What it is intended to do is to keep away from Youngs Avenue and from the people who live on Youngs Avenue any trucks which are coming to or leaving Crown Sanitation and at this point it's important because any trucks that are coming from or leaving the town landfill which is in the process of reclamation and

there are many large trucks.

That's the reason for this. It's a weight limit to keep weight trucks- five ton trucks, over five ton trucks, off Youngs Avenue."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Councilman Lull. Anybody who would like to address the Board? Steve Haizlip."

Councilman Lull: "By the way, in this as in all of these situations, local deliveries are excluded."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. You know that fits right in with my letter of comment which the secondary roads were put in years and years ago to divide up the community so that the farmers could get down to where potatoes sales house and go back. But then over the years, they put a little thin coat of macadam on it and when it comes warm weather, spring like with rain and so forth, these trucks going over it, heavy trucks, they just push it down, finally it comes up, you've got holes and they've got to be repaired.

So you've got two choices. With today's progress and the building that's going on and these remote locations where these secondary roads are, either you've got to make the roads thicker and heavier or you've got to do what you're doing now and, hopefully, it will work. You should see, well, I guess you've already made a visit on Youngs Avenue when you get up close to Crown, it is wicked with patches on patches and it's just tearing them up. So I'm in favor of this."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Bill Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich from Wading River. I direct this to the Town Attorney in that no person shall operate a motor vehicle of a total weight of greater than 10,000 pounds. This wordage can be read from where I see it and as I talk to different truckmen as they see it, that it could be interpreted as an empty truck or it could be interpreted as a loaded truck. But now the intent I believe here is for a load of- a loaded truck which would be a gross weight."

Councilman Lull: "Gross vehicle weight, right. Gross vehicle weight is right, yes."

William Kasperovich: "So the wordage here is not good. And after this is passed, I certainly would expect that we borrow from the

State a weight device and check- "

Councilman Densieski: "It goes by gross vehicle weight, Bill."

William Kasperovich: "Pardon?"

Councilman Densieski: "The police department enforces by gross vehicle weight. It's stamped right on your registration. That's how they enforce it. You know, if your registration says over 10,000 pounds, you'd be subject to a fine."

William Kasperovich: "You've never been in a truck where the State pulls you over and measures the load on your wheels?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's for a different reason."

Councilman Densieski: "If you're over 10,000 on your gross vehicle weight, you'd be subject to a ticket."

William Kasperovich: "But how- and how do they determine how much is on-"

Councilman Densieski: "Because it's stamped- it's right on your registration sticker, Bill. The GVW, gross vehicle weight, is stamped right on your registration."

William Kasperovich: "But what's in the truck? How much load is in the truck?"

Councilman Densieski: "Makes no difference. It's gross vehicle. That means all the weight combined."

William Kasperovich: "I beg to differ with you. It does make a difference, whether you're putting on bulk- "

Councilman Densieski: "No, sir."

William Kasperovich: "-- or pig iron or- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't mean to interrupt. I think that what we're getting into is different enforcement issues. When the state police go out and weigh vehicles, they're weighing to see whether their loads exceed their registration allowances on axles in total load. So what they're doing is they're taking a vehicle, what they have a permit to operate on over the state highways and then see

whether that particular operator has loaded his vehicle in excess of his approved state permits, taxing authority, whatever. They check for tax approval permits to run over the highways, what their loading restrictions are, whether there's any other safety equipment violations on those vehicles. It's a pretty thorough inspection that's done by the state police division.

This is a little bit of a different issue. We're looking to limit and say that if your registration exceeds that allowance, you can't go down that street. It's not a question of how you have your vehicle loaded; it's a question of whether your vehicle is one that exceeds the weight restrictions."

William Kasperovich: "All right."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's a little bit of a different issue."

William Kasperovich: "Tell me how the weight of the vehicle loaded is determined."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "On a- which is not this issue. That is the issue that the state police are enforcing when they go to determine if a vehicle has been loaded in excess of their approved registration and what they're allowed to operate on on the State's.

This issue is one of limiting vehicles that have a gross weight of more than five tons. If they exceed that, they can't go on it."

William Kasperovich: "Well, who is to determine that they exceed it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "They pull the registration."

Councilman Densieski: "The factory puts on a GVW on the registration. It doesn't matter if the truck is empty or full, Bill."

Dawn Thomas: (Inaudible)

William Kasperovich: "It's not an unusual or strange situation to have truckers overload their vehicle. This is not something that is exceptional or rarely done and on side streets or small streets, this- they may- the chances of getting away with it, they will try to do it especially if it's a one shot thing. At the same time- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. Kasperovich, setting aside those issues which I know we may have some trouble getting through those, do you find the concept, the idea of establishing legislation so that vehicles in excess of five tons will be restricted from using that portion of Youngs Avenue an issue that you would be in favor of or opposed to?"

William Kasperovich: "I'm in favor of it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Thank you."

William Kasperovich: "I would like also to bring to light that some way, some designation should be shown that if you overload your vehicle you are not going to get by this street."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Thank you. Anybody else who would like to address the Board? George Schmelzer. This is going to be the night."

Councilman Densieski: "Bob, what weighs more? A pound of lead or a pound of feathers?"

George Schmelzer: "Do I understand you correctly that from the east this doesn't apply on Youngs Avenue? Only from the west?"

Councilman Lull: "No, George. It applies to the part of Youngs Avenue from Twomey Avenue to Crown in both directions. In other words, there will be a sign- "

George Schmelzer: "No. You don't understand what I mean."

Councilman Lull: "Okay, sorry."

George Schmelzer: "You can come in from Osborn Avenue?"

Councilman Lull: "You can come in from Osborn Avenue as far as the landfill and as far as Crown. You can't go past there."

George Schmelzer: "So you'll be increasing traffic on Osborn Avenue."

Councilman Lull: "Yes."

George Schmelzer: "What's this done? To appease the people that move in so you can get them to vote for you or something?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think the stated purpose was set forth earlier that this roadway was a secondary roadway and it's not withstanding the traffic and the heavy vehicles that are going back and forth."

George Schmelzer: "Well, the town put the dump there themselves 70 years ago and it's up to them to keep the road up. If the road was no good, why did they put it there for? It's not your fault. You were not even born then but-- "

Councilman Densieski: "It's still his fault."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's still my fault as Councilman Densieski pointed out."

George Schmelzer: "It's not your fault at all, but if there's a dump there, it should be available from both sides, I'd think. And when a truck many trucks ago had to do business there, they wouldn't weigh more than 5,000 pounds empty. I don't think it makes sense-- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "So you're opposed to it?"

George Schmelzer: "Well, I don't care one way or the other but to me it doesn't make sense. I don't live there, see, but I think you're trying to appease some of these people that moved in from the city."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, George. Anybody else who would like to address the Board?"

George Schmelzer: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Either for or against? No? I declare the hearing closed, the time of 7:46 p.m. having arrived."

Public Hearing closed: 7:46 p.m.

Public Hearing opened: 7:46 p.m.

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And the time still being 7:46, let's go to the last public hearing."

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting

for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York on May 22, 2002, at 7:15 p.m. regarding the considered proposed local law to amend Chapter 101 entitled Vehicles & Traffic. Article IV - Traffic Control Signals- Section 101-9 Installation and Maintenance."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "This one specifically is calling out for, in addition to that section to provide for a crosswalk in front of the skatepark in order to allow pedestrian traffic from the opposite side of the street over to the skatepark.

I think that what we've heard tonight and I'm going to ask maybe the Board to consider maybe when we do these public notices, we do a diagram of a chart, too. Maybe it might help when we deal with this in the future that there be a chart drafted that we add to our depiction of the public hearing. So I've heard the comments and I think it's something that probably deserves attention and certainly something that we can do. I know a lot of other areas when they propose a stop sign or a yield sign or any improvements to an intersection, they will actually draw the intersection, depict it, and show where the signs are to be placed. So the point is well taken.

With this respective hearing, the placement of a new crosswalk or the addition of a new crosswalk, is there anyone who would like to address the Board either for or against? I almost didn't want to ask, but I know that I have to do that. Mr. Kasperovich.

Gentleman in the rear. Are you students, public civic? The taper. Individual taping. You are students? Are you learning anything today? I figured while we're waiting, I'd take a little break. You don't have to stop. I mean, you're here from what school? Okay. Okay. That's what I was afraid of."

William Kasperovich: "Can't put my finger on the resolution that called this public hearing but to my understanding this is to care for the pedestrian traffic that's generated by the recreation facility- "

Councilman Lull: "From Stotzky Park."

William Kasperovich: "Stotzky Park. I think this is a good example to ponder on that when we have a project come up in the township that the impact on the area. This is the kind of thing that should have a big sign on it that this is- will be required. Because we are talking about \$60 to \$70,000. We're not talking about \$6 or

\$7,000. We're talking about an appreciable amount of money and for this money it should be exactly placed or the optimum position placed and the optimum concern for things.

Now, granted we can see in the next couple of weeks if the weather permits just how much traffic we are going to have and the pedestrian traffic. Because as the word gets around and everybody is planning to use it and such, but now this to me is something that came up when it should have come up with the project. This is the impact on the area. And I do think that in the interim we should put a device or a police officer or somebody in authority to direct the pedestrian traffic. Certainly, we should start to mark and direct how the traffic should move to cross the street. And until there is such improvement and the traffic control can be installed, there should be a temporary measure so that we don't have to have statistics to justify this spending of \$60,000. We don't want any statistics. We want the kids to come there and leave there safely and we should- we should be so indicated that we do care and we do take care so that if we can't get the mechanism tomorrow, we can certainly get a man tomorrow and somebody should be in control until this is installed. Thank you."

Councilman Lull: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Anybody else who would like to address the Board? Steve Haizlip."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip from Calverton. Maybe I'm not too clear on this light project. If you're speaking of Pulaski Street- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We are."

Steve Haizlip: "-- going southeast, because it goes on a bias like, is there ample room for cars to be parking on that side on the road and then get out and then walk over to the skatepark?"

Councilman Lull: "No. There's not, Steve. There is parking that people will use on weekends in Riverhead Building Supply property. Certainly people use it without asking for it. But there will be people- there is- there will be times when people stop and drop off their kids to go to the skatepark. They don't have- parents do not have to go with them. There will be people dropping them to go to- not just the skatepark but to the Little League fields and so forth.

There also is a community not too far from there with a significant number of kids and that community- they can walk there easily. This is going to depend upon- when this gets done, will depend upon how quickly the Superintendent of Highways can get a sidewalk from JT Blvd. up to the skatepark to the rise. So it's going to be put on the rise so it is obviously very clear from both directions."

Steve Haizlip: "Thank you for the information."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anybody else who would like to address either for or against? Nobody moving or motioning to do so, close the public hearing, the time of 7:55 p.m. having arrived."

Public Hearing closed: 7:55 p.m.

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "As I mentioned last meeting, this Board will be utilizing a new procedure next meeting wherein we'll allow for discussion resolutions first at this point in time and then open it up for general discussion. I made that comment last meeting before we began. I'll make it this meeting as well just so that anybody watching who couldn't be with us today are aware that the procedure will change. That will be at the June 4, 2002 meeting.

I have some cards; I'll go to them first. Ann Miloski."

Ann Miloski: "My name is Ann Miloski from the Greater Calverton Civic Association and I'm here today to read a letter from the Association and would like to have it put into the record.

Supervisor Kozakiewicz, Councilwomen and Councilmen. The Greater Calverton Civic Association would like to go on record opposing any motorized racing in Calverton. We have an obligation to increase our tax base, create jobs that will support a family, and enhance our quality of life.

A racetrack would become a tax burden to our community because of increased police and emergency services. It would not bring the high paying full time jobs needed in our area. It will prevent the introduction of many desirable businesses that would be welcomed in our area.

The amount of traffic generated by racing events would seriously

impact our roads. Since the Calverton National Veterans Cemetery is located directly across the road from the former Grumman site, funerals and visits will be severely affected by traffic and noise. This is the largest veterans cemetery in the United States. Would a racetrack be placed anywhere near Arlington?

Towns across Long Island have eliminated racetracks from their communities. Bridgehampton, Manorville, Freeport, Islip and soon Westhampton all have all closed. Why would we welcome this activity?

A racing complex will discourage compatible economic growth, cause massive traffic delays, contribute to air and noise pollution, decrease our property values, and diminish our quality of life. The Calverton Civic Association supports sustainable economic development that will enhance our community and we hope that our Town Board members will help us keep our quality of life. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Rolph Kestling."

Rolph Kestling: "Rolph Kestling, Wading River. On Resolution 545, Cablevision. Now, I understand we had the resolution 1071 which was sort of a drop dead resolution and you keep extending it, it's been extended for years. Now I see you have a date of July 17th. If you haven't come to an agreement on the 17th, Cablevision will no longer pay for the videotaping. But what's Riverhead going to do? You just say what Cablevision is going to do. What's Riverhead- when the date comes and you can't come to an agreement, they stop paying for the Cablevision, you tell them- is anyone going to tell them to drop dead?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I can speak for myself. I don't like Cablevision any more than you like Cablevision or any more than anybody else likes Cablevision. We have had some very good discussions with them in the last two to three weeks, month. Quite frankly, the Town Attorney- not the Town Attorney, the attorney we have retained down in Florida has been told in clear and succinct language, either we get this done or we go to court. That's it."

We had some very small issues that had separated us. We may not be able to resolve them by July 17th. I'm not going to tell you that we may be able to get by them. There's some significant differences of opinion between us and Cablevision. And we've heard you. We've heard the other people loud and clear. If we can get past those differences then we will present an agreement for the public to review. And you can tell us what you think about it. If we can't

even get at that point, I, for one, would say that's it, we've tried, and it's done."

Rolph Kestling: "A lot of us feel like that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I know."

Rolph Kestling: (Inaudible)

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Exactly. Exactly."

Rolph Kestling: "I mean- at least in that resolution, you're not rescinding that 1079?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, no. No, no, no. And even though we're agreeing to this, I think the sentiment still remains the same that as far as the taping, we feel they should tape, and if they fail to do so, that's just another indication."

Rolph Kestling: "You know there's many other ways to get at television, I mean, you can harass the hell out of their Optimum trucks that go up and down the street. I mean it's possible. You know, my brother-in-law was a State Trooper and he said there wasn't one vehicle you couldn't stop on the road where he wouldn't find something wrong with it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, we don't engage in selective enforcement with our police department. We don't do that."

Rolph Kestling: "Okay. Maybe on the 17th I'll be back again."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Rolph Kestling: "With another- thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. George Schmelzer. George Schmelzer, he's actually the next one. So while he's stepping up, you can sneak by."

George Schmelzer: "These resolutions, you should explain them better. That resolution about Youngs Avenue didn't mention Youngs Avenue."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Actually the notice did but anyway."

George Schmelzer: "Really, really."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "As I pointed out, I think the comments we received today are well taken. We should like I've seen other entities do, the State or anybody else when they're either doing a taking or when they're enacting new legislation, identify the street, identify by the intersection and show, hopefully, in a chart form, without further confusing it what we're trying to do."

George Schmelzer: "Some town trucks weigh 5,000 pounds empty. Are you going to allow them there?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No vehicle will be allowed to the west."

George Schmelzer: "Even the town highway truck that weighs 5,000 can't go there- "

Councilman Lull: "Unless they're working on- "

George Schmelzer: "That makes a lot of sense."

Councilman Lull: "Unless they're working on the street."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We- the public hearing is closed by the way. But anyway I think if they have to do work there, they'll be able to go there. Yes."

George Schmelzer: "I think you're making more- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think that's logical."

George Schmelzer: "I think you're making more trouble than good."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Well, that public hearing is closed."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, I know it is. Anyway, what are you doing about this Southampton criticizing Riverhead on the school tax?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, let me say one thing, first and foremost. I got a copy of the minutes on the meeting they held up in ORPS, the Office of Real Property Services, and in those minutes there was a little bit of a dialogue between Mr. Johnson, I think his name

is, and Legislator Thiele, where during that- those minutes, the question was put to Mr. Thiele whether he spoke to officials and these are pretty close to the words, officials from the Town of Riverhead. And the comment back was yes, they support the segment equalization rate being proposed by the Town of Southampton.

I called Mr. Thiele's office about a week or so ago. I said to Legislator Thiele who I had a chance to speak to, who did you speak to from the Town of Riverhead? He said that can't be right. I said, well the minutes and the record reflect that you said that. We believe, as you know from the last time we talked about this which was two meetings ago, that the- this should be an issue that we're going to fight for the Riverhead taxpayer. They pay 19% of the taxes presently; they have 19% of the school age children enrolled. And I know that we've talked about changing school lines, we've talked about changing boundaries, and if the Southampton officials feel as strongly about this issue as they do, they should look at that. That will be suggested or they should look at a way that the appraised value is fair for all parties, not for one party."

George Schmelzer: "Well, that letter was sent to- the department upstate should have had more substance in it. There was almost no substance in it. It should have been tougher."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I have (inaudible) the critics now, huh?"

George Schmelzer: "Well, I went to the school board- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I put it on record that we are opposed to it. I put it on record that we are not in favor of it. I put it on the record that if it's going to impact us we want a chance to be heard."

George Schmelzer: "Well, that letter wasn't too clear. You know it wasn't. Anyway Thiele didn't go to the school meeting last- school board meeting last week, neither did LaValle, our weasel. Neither did you. But the Southampton people there were in force. When one of them spoke, the rest of them chimed in with voice. That was okay. Then when I got up, I asked Mr. Duffy, I said the sheet I picked up in the hallway says they pay 19% of the taxes. What percent of the student body do they have? He said about 20%. I said what are they kicking about? They should pay equal to the percentage of the student body. They should pay equal amount to the budget. And from Southampton, nobody said a word. Some of them started to leave and

Villella, he's on the school board, he agreed with me. He said when he lived in Southampton they were laughing at Riverhead because Riverhead was subsidizing their schools. This has been going on for years.

A few years back, I spoke to Mr. Carlson there. It cost us almost a half a million dollars extra taxes to support Southampton and Brookhaven. Right now, Brookhaven has 8% of the kids; they pay 2% of the taxes. What's the matter with this town? It is really the town of Riverhead-less.

Gee, and they- if they don't- should tell them straight out. Either you pay the equal amount or make your own school. Take the whole damn land over there, hook it onto Hampton Days, make their own school district. They've got a school there already, give them the damn school and let them go on their own. You've got to get tough and stop this.

This Town Board has said in the past, said it's up to the school board. What's it a ping pong game? Their job is to educate the kids. It's your job to do the taxes. Or correct it. And I mean that. I think you know it, too. It's nothing personal, but you represent the town. You're stuck with it, see."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, George."

George Schmelzer: "Anything else? You want to reply to it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I've heard you and I think that the idea of either them redrawing the school lines or getting a consensus- because that's just not our decision. You understand that it has to be both town agreeing to it and the state legislation to do it. You understand that?"

George Schmelzer: "Well, the past history has been stupid here. In Calverton- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I didn't ask you to comment on the past history. I asked you, do you understand the process? Yes or no?"

George Schmelzer: "I don't know."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

George Schmelzer: "Do you understand it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I understand that we have to agree, Southampton has to agree, and it has to be done at the state level. There has to be a number of bodies that agree to the change. If any one doesn't, the change does not occur."

George Schmelzer: "Why don't you propose that in writing to them?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. Schmelzer, I have various ways we can address this. I am working on it as we speak and I expect to have a letter out to Legislator Thiele and Senator LaValle- with a cc to Senator LaValle, very short, suggesting ways to remedy this constant battle between Southampton and Riverhead with respect to the school district boundaries."

George Schmelzer: "We've heard nothing from you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, sir, that's your opinion. Thank you."

George Schmelzer: "Well- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I did respond to the comments to the ORPS. I wrote a letter to ORPS to put in our defense. I did respond. I addressed Mr. Thiele's comments to ORPS. I put him to the task of why he made a comment about the officials of Riverhead. While you may not be sitting in the chair there all day there with me, making these comments, I have, in fact, addressed Legislator Thiele and the comments that were made by Southampton."

George Schmelzer: "Did you write a letter? Did you write a letter?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I did both. I called him and wrote a letter?"

George Schmelzer: "Well, make the letter public so we can read it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think we can do better and I think that we can either pass a sense resolution of this Board or we can hold a press conference or do more. And that's what I intend to do."

George Schmelzer: "Nothing's been done for several years on that. It's like a ping pong game. Really. Get tough with them. And tell them to make their own district. The hell with them. They've got a school there. It's been going on- I remember when Stark was Supervisor, I told him about it. They didn't do anything. Vinny didn't do anything. Now it's the same story now, nothing."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, George."

George Schmelzer: "Please do something."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Steve Haizlip."

George Schmelzer: "Get tough with them."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Steve Haizlip."

George Schmelzer: "My name ain't Haizlip."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Five minutes are up. I'm calling Steve Haizlip up. Thank you."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah. Well everybody five minutes, huh."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm going to try."

George Schmelzer: "You- you- everybody will try or just- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm going to make the best effort."

George Schmelzer: "Or do you mean selectively you'll try?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, sir."

George Schmelzer: "Okay."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. I seen in the front the reports that- and also there's a resolution here, I believe it's 542 or something, about quick lube maintenance at the water department. Is this by any chance engaging Jiffy Lube to come and lubricate the vehicles at the water department?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay, that's good enough. I just wanted to

make sure that they hadn't engaged Jiffy Lube and Quick Lube. That takes care of that.

My next subject here is the blood drive, the Golden Donor blood drive is going to take place May 28, 8:30 to 2:00 at the Best Western, formerly Ramada Inn. And I am hoping that all the town work force and personnel will be as good to us as they did to you.

Now, Edwards Avenue is a very busy traveled road. It's the road that links up East Hampton, Southampton. Now, we're supposed to have some intelligent, capable engineers on these roadways, especially the state. They have taken Edwards Avenue, just a ways up from the Village Inn and they have cut the macadam away and left a sharp step, not blended, not tapered, a sharp step and it's roughly two and a half to three inches, just observing it as you go. But the one thing that it's doing, especially in my pickup truck, it is shaking all the way up through the windshield, the cab, everything. And they are leaving it there like that.

Now, I spoke to Mark and asked him, did he do it? And he said, no. The state is doing it. So I guess what they're up to is that when they pave that road, so that they can stretch out and get rid of those dips in there. But the macadam will fit any contour, it should have at least been tapered. And they didn't. And this is an example of the state when they made Edwards Avenue wider, they went down by the railroad track and put a drain up on the bank and then when the rains came it all came down in the low spot by the lumber yard. I had to get a hold of Charlie Bloss and tell him to put in a drain and connect it to the state drain. You know? And then when you write to Mr. Brodman (phonetic) he treats you as an outcast and you don't get no answer back from him.

Now, you appropriated \$70,000 on Resolution 198 to get that light at Sound Avenue and I get calls and- from one of the trustees in the Civic Association, and when is that light going to go in there? It was my- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "They were up there this week to start the process. It's going to take I am told about three weeks from that point to finish to be done."

Steve Haizlip: "Well, I inquired this morning to someone that lived there and they said all they've seen is somebody pull up in a car and get out and look around and leave."

Now, I've got something here I want to ask you. I don't know if you're going to think more of me or less of me. I hope you don't think less of me. Is it true that Doug Stark was able to get those 80 mobile homes in there because there was a technicality that he wasn't building, he's erecting?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "If you're talking about Glenwood- "

Steve Haizlip: "Yeah."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The reason that the process went along is because the moratorium law provided for an exclusion of a 70/30 plan, a plan that showed 70% of the land being left available for open space, and 30% of the land being built upon. That's the reason that application was allowed to proceed forward."

Steve Haizlip: "Let me follow this. If you've got 100 acres, so to make up 70%, would you have to leave 70 acres open?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Correct."

Steve Haizlip: "And then build on 30?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Correct."

Steve Haizlip: "And that was in the moratorium?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yup."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Kasper- Bill Kasperovich. Actually, so there's no dispute, I was going to ask Bill to allow me to recognize that the time was 8:17 p.m. Bill, if you agree with that? He doesn't want to agree what the time is. Okay, it's 8:18."

William Kasperovich: "Well, if you want to continue with your Gestapo tactics- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's not my Gestapo tactics. This is a procedure that's been put in place by the Town Board and with the exception of very few individuals, most people have been respective of the five minute rule."

William Kasperovich: "Most people don't get up here to talk

about the serious matters that affect their lives and property as I do. And my time is just as valuable as theirs."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And they agree to the five minute rule."

William Kasperovich: "More so than you people. You ran a resolution here, 556, authorizes Supervisor to request the state for speed zone change. And all you can make out of this is that numerous residents along Pulaski Street. Otherwise, it is playground, parks, adult care center around Stotzky Park. This is not a description of the needs on Pulaski Street. There are areas on Pulaski Street that are absolutely in dire need of speed control and there are other areas that are open. Now, this would be to indicate that all of Pulaski Street might be involved, but there's nothing to say.

Now, if this takes me five days to express to you, I'll take those five days."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Unfortunately, Mr. Kasperovich, I will ask you to- "

William Kasperovich: "Some 30 years ago, a man- a mason by craftsman, by the name of Angelo was unfortunate to have one eye damaged in an accident, was crossing Pulaski Street in where the stores are. And he didn't happen to turn his head fast enough to see the car coming the other way. And it killed him. Now, at 30 miles an hour, you cover about 150 feet in 1/10 of a second. That's hardly enough time to move your head from one side to the other.

Now, where these stores are, where the church is, now where the recreation area is, when cars are parked on both sides of the street, cars approaching each other in opposite directions, have very little room to get by each other. And 30 miles an hour doesn't do the trick in that section of Pulaski Street. When you go through where both sides of the street have parked cars, you have to watch that you can get by the car that's coming at you. It's tight. Certainly too tight for 30 miles an hour.

This is another example where a wide brush is used but the specific details are not paid attention to.

Resolution 553, the cost of the Riverhead Town Code book. I could see the concern of raising from 275 to 350 but there's one problem with these books. That as pages change or get added year

after year, a person owning a book doesn't have information or pages with which to keep his book up to date."

Barbara Grattan: "You can get updates."

Councilwoman Sanders: "You get updates."

William Kasperovich: "And so I say if a book is sold, it should be sold with the stipulation that every page that is changed or added would be sent to the buyer."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. Kasperovich, I have- "

William Kasperovich: "You could put a cost on it or you could not put a cost on it."

Councilman Lull: "We do."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We do have a cost on it and do allow individuals who subscribe and obtain the code book to get updates. There is a yearly annual fee for updates that you can receive and then it's your obligation to put in the book to make sure the code book is up to date. And five minutes have been reached."

I am going to ask that we go to the next speaker, please. I don't have any more cards, but I'll- is there anybody who would like to address the Board tonight? Mrs. Lindstrom."

Kathy Lindstrom: "Kathy Lindstrom, Baiting Hollow. I have a question on Resolution 542. Is this at the Grumman site?"

Councilman Lull: "No. That building, no matter what it's named, that building is the building where UPS used to be, the post office used to be. It's a long building- "

Councilman Densieski: "Just past Milligan's gas station."

Councilman Lull: "Just past Milligan's. Right. On the south side of the road."

Kathy Lindstrom: "All right."

Councilman Densieski: "Deceiving, the name of it is a little deceiving."

Kathy Lindstrom: "Yes. Yes. Is this hanging outside in the hall?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes, it is."

Councilman Densieski: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes, it is."

Kathy Lindstrom: "All right. Okay, thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yup, thank you. Anybody else who would like to address the Board? Hal Lindstrom."

Hal Lindstrom: "Hal Lindstrom, Riverhead. Just recently I visited the new Home Depot. I just want to say it's quite an improvement on some of the Home Depots that I've seen in the past. I like the landscaping they're doing there. The way the store is located. I also noted- noticed coming out of the store, there was a lot of debris right in front as you come out as far as a lot of cigarette butts and papers and anything like that. Are they required to put receptacles out in front of the store there?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think our site plan requires the placement of trash receptacles. Yes. I think it does."

Hal Lindstrom: "Okay, because- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Every site plan approval has the same language in it that trash receptacles be placed around the store entrance."

Councilman Lull: "Not just that, Hal, but- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "But not out by the street."

Hal Lindstrom: "No. Right directly as you come out of the doors."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Councilman Lull: "This particular shopping center will also have for each of its stores, each of the stores will have hose bibs on the front so that they can wash down the front. It's the only, I believe it's the only shopping center in our town that will enforce

that."

Hal Lindstrom: "Right. But they will have receptacles- "

Councilman Lull: "Yes."

Hal Lindstrom: "--in front of the store as you walk out. Okay, thank you."

Councilwoman Blass: "Actually, there's- they are standard covenants, 4 and 5, of our site plan approval. They're actually listed, receptacles of a decorative design."

Hal Lindstrom: "Oh, okay, thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I have a couple last minute cards. Terry Hulse."

Terry Hulse: "Terry Hulse, 64 River Avenue, Riverhead. Born and raised in Riverhead and moved away and saw the rest of the world and saw and came back in the mid '80's and realized that the east end of Long Island is probably one of the most lovely places in the world. Peconic Bay is really a jewel of the east end and it's been recognized as a federal estuary and it's definitely been bulkheaded and under attack and we all remember the brown tide and the things that have been seriously impacted.

This also happens to be my place where I come to vote but the vote you'll take tonight is probably one of the most critical ones that will ever take place in this room. You have the opportunity to preserve open space in the town of Riverhead. It's a step that you can take now. You don't have to wait for the next generation or another town to make the move and acquire open space that can definitely impact the Peconic estuary and ultimately the ecology of the whole east end.

And I'm definitely in favor of the town of Riverhead going in with Suffolk County and purchasing open space in addition to farmland. And I know the parcels that are under consideration are key to the health of the Peconic estuary.

You know, I've worked for years in the environmental field and this is absolutely critical. And I want to thank the Town Board for bringing this to a vote and taking the right steps and doing the right actions. So thank you very much."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Councilman Densieski: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Lee Eskin."

Lee Eskin: "Yes, hi, good evening. Very pleased to see that steps are going to be taken to purchase this land or looked into to purchase this land and it's just a very important thing for all concerned in the area. The fact that you can hear us speak is just really marvelous. So thank you very much."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Marsha Kolasky."

Marsha Kolasky: "Hi. My name is Marsha Kolasky. I live on Riverside Drive. I also want to add my kudos to all of you for going in with the county to possibly, hopefully, will purchase property that I also agree with, is very sensitive, is part of a magical part of Riverhead where of the five towns, I somehow think we sort of get dumped on and I think that that river is one of the jewels and the head of the river which is what we're called, should really be maintained. You have a very big responsibility. You have a chance to really, not only to hear the people, but to take a look at that piece of property and to really understand what would happen. And it's a responsibility for your children and your grandchildren. So thank you very much. I appreciate it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Councilman Densieski: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Eve Kaplan."

Eve Kaplan: "Good evening. I'd like to, on behalf of the North Fork Environmental Council, and our members in Riverhead, I would also like to commend the Board on your swift and decisive action to move forward with protecting this extremely important piece of property, the River Club property, which is as you probably know now, the largest undeveloped piece of property on Riverhead's Peconic Bay, a largely undisturbed woodland and some kettlehole ponds as well. So good job and I hope that we will see similar support for protecting the largest undeveloped piece on Long Island Sound in Riverhead which is the Key Span property. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anybody else who would like to address

the Board? I saw a hand shoot up. That was quick."

Kendall Kelly: "My name is Kendall Kelly and I live on Riverside Drive and I came tonight to express my gratitude and hope that his joint investment between the county and the town will save that area of Riverside Drive. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Anybody else who would like to address- George, you've had a chance to speak tonight. A hand in the back, Joan Griffin."

Joan Griffin: "Good evening, Joan Griffin, Baiting Hollow. I'd just like to give an update on two ongoing projects that the Calverton Civic Association is involved in. To date, we have collected 114 cell phones to donate to the E-911 program at the police department. And also 44 pairs of glasses that are donated to the Long Island Council of Churches for people that can't afford glasses. These glasses are-- prescriptions are read and then donated to people that can't afford the glasses. 'So I'd just like to give that update."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Joan Griffin: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anybody else who would like to address the Board? George- anybody else? Anyone who hasn't had a chance to address- yes, sir."

Joseph Lennartz: "Hi. My name is Joseph Lennartz. I live in Baiting Hollow. And I wasn't- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Spell your name, please."

Joseph Lennartz: "Joseph Lennartz."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I know you've been here before but- L-E-N-N- "

Joseph Lennartz: "Yes. A-R-T-Z."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's what I thought. Okay."

Joseph Lennartz: "Okay. Not to beat a dead horse- not to beat a horse to death, but- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "But you will."

Joseph Lennartz: "No, no. I am opposed to the Crown Sanitation- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's not kicking anymore. Let's hit a couple more times."

Joseph Lennartz: "I'm opposed to the Crown Sanitation change in the zoning. But my question is that, I think last meeting we- you were supposed to have hired a consultant."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Joseph Lennartz: "I was wondering what was happening with that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, what has happened, I signed the proposal, the proposal then went out to the consultant. They'll now look at the draft environmental impact statement, provide comments. As it turned out, an FEIS was filed by Crown prior to the comments so they will- may need to address a new FEIS that will address additional comments from the consultants. They didn't wait for us. But the bottom line is we're going to wait for the comments from our consultant and not accept their FEIS until we hear back from our consultant."

Joseph Lennartz: "And do we have a date on that?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No. Because it's subject to him getting through all the document, providing his critique, providing what he believes it failed to address, and then that is passed along to Crown."

Joseph Lennartz: "Thank you very much."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right? Thank you. Yes, hand in the back. Is that Ann- you spoke, Ann. I want somebody who hasn't had a chance to address us yet. Yes, Michelle Stark. I mean Michelle Hulse. Yes."

Michelle Stark-Hulse: "It's hyphenated. It's okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's okay? I'm not in trouble?"

Michelle Stark-Hulse: "It's okay. Good evening. I'm Michelle Stark-Hulse, Riverhead. I want to add my kudos to the Board and thank them so much for taking action on Riverside Drive. I had written Bob a letter several weeks prior and he responded saying that he had gotten it and steps were taking- were being taken towards this issue and things have been. So I want to say thanks so much to everybody and all their effort and I hope that the land is eventually preserved and we appreciate it very much on Riverside Drive. Thanks."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anybody else who hasn't had a chance to address us? Yes?"

Elaine Cardillo: "Hi. I'm Elaine Cardillo. I'm also from Riverside Drive and I just want to thank you again for considering the purchase of this property. It's very important to us. I live across the street from the woodlands that are part of this purchase and in the spring time, in- around March 21st or so is when the frogs come out in the little pond that's over there. And we call them peepers. My kids call them peepers and we hear them and they always start the same time every year and it's always the first sign of spring for us. And I would hate to see that go away and I would hate my children to see that go away, so it's just such a wonderful thing and my kids love the area that they live in and I would love to see it preserved. So thank you for considering it."

Councilman Densieski: "Were those peepers on time this year?"

Elaine Cardillo: "They were."

Councilman Densieski: "They were?"

Elaine Cardillo: "Actually they were early. We had that warm weather."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Anybody else who hasn't had a chance to address us who would like to speak? All right, I think there was a request by the Board to take a break, a recess. Is that- five minutes. Five minutes? Okay. Why don't we say the time being 8:36, we'll come back at 8:45. Okay."

Recess: 8:36 p.m.

Meeting reopened: 8:46 p.m.

8:46 p.m., call the meeting back to order. And what I'm going to do is break from the regular meeting and convene the CDA portion."

Meeting adjourned: 8:46 p.m.

Meeting reconvened: 8:47 p.m.

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Barbara, we reconvene the Town Board portion, the time being- I'm getting a glare off the clock. Is that 8:47 okay."

Resolution #518

Councilman Densieski: "Sets the fees for usage of recreation facilities. So moved."

Councilwoman Sanders: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #519

Councilman Lull: "519 supports the acquisition of property through the Partnership of the Town of Riverhead and the County of Suffolk. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "Yes. And as Town Board members we probably all have our priorities, whether it be the (inaudible) Duck Farm or the Hubbard Duck Farm or other parcels of open space. This is my personal number one location to preserve. I hope we can do this in partnership with the County so we can save half the money. But I think this piece of all pieces should be preserved. I'm sorry."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Councilman Densieski: "I believe this should be the number one

piece and we should do whatever we have to do because of the Peconic River and because of the importance of the estuary program there. So I'm going to vote yes and support this."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I also vote yes. I know that in some of the very initial discussions with respect to this parcel, the individual who's proposing the complex has certainly indicated a willingness to consider an offer. I hope that when we get that offer we don't get into an issue of whether we paid too much but, you know, hopefully, we'll get to that bridge at least and we can deal with it then. Yes."

Barbara Grattan: "The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #520

Councilwoman Blass: "This resolution establishes or adopts a budget with respect to the Kulesa Water Extension #73. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. Resolution is adopted."

Resolution #521

Councilwoman Sanders: "It's a budget adoption for an emergency generator at water plant #9. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. Resolution is adopted."

Resolution #522

Councilwoman Sanders: "Budget adoption, again, for 2002 water plant #12 improvements. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. Resolution is adopted."

Resolution #523

Councilman Densieski: "Highway Department budget adjustment. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "And I'll second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull."

Councilman Lull: "How come we had money left over from snow removal?"

Barbara Grattan: "I wonder why."

Councilman Densieski: "That's it?"

Councilman Lull: "Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz, yes. Resolution is adopted."

Resolution #524

Councilman Densieski: "Authorizes the Town Clerk to publish and post public notice for a local law to amend Chapter 108 entitled Zoning of the Riverhead Town Code. So moved."

Councilwoman Sanders: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. Resolution is adopted."

Resolution #525

Councilman Densieski: "Authorizes Town Clerk to publish and

post public notice for a local law to repeal and replace Article XXVI entitled Site Plan Review of the Riverhead town code. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes. And I'd just note that this one as well as the prior one are scheduled for public hearings on June 4th."

Barbara Grattan: "Okay, the resolution is adopted."

Resolution #526

Councilman Densieski: "Allows the erection of off premises signs for Sky Dive Long Island. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded. Discussion?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "Discussion. Being that I just, the fact that we are allowing, I feel that we are opening the door to have ads and advertisements on our property just might cause some problems down the road. So that I vote no."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Councilman Lull: "Appoints a student intern in the Accounting Department. So moved. Jennifer Velys, sorry. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #528

Councilman Lull: "And this appoints Melanie Fraine as a student intern in the Accounting Department. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "Yeah, we're short a personnel in the Accounting Department, so I'll vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It should be pointed out this is a yearly thing and they do the inventory for us so that they make sure we have all our assets that we had last year. Yes."

Barbara Grattan: "The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #529

Councilman Lull: "This appoints a summer intern in the Engineering Department. That's Jill Sollazzo. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #530

Councilman Lull: "Appoints Mandy Brown as a Historic & Cultural Resource Intern in Engineering Department. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #531

Councilwoman Sanders: "Appoints waterfront personnel for 2002 to the Recreation Department. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Comment. I have two children who work for the town and have worked as lifeguards and other capacities for the last three or four years. And although I applaud and support the performance from all the individuals listed here, I don't wish to leave myself vulnerable to any criticism or any problems somewhere down the road, so with that, I abstain."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #532, 533, 534

Councilwoman Sanders: "Ratifies appointment of a part time Recreation aide to the Riverhead Recreation Department. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

Councilwoman Blass: "Discussion."

The Vote: "Sanders."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Discussion."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Discussion."

Councilwoman Blass: "Mr. Supervisor, I think we have to delete the- in the second line to and including December 31st, 2002 because these are not seasonal individuals. These are part time individuals that are being hired for the skatepark and their appointment would have to be ratified again in January and they are not- it was not our intention to hire them up to and including only December. So I did discuss this--"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm not- "

Councilwoman Blass: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "-- I understand what you are saying. Are you saying that just make them effective May 10th- "

Councilwoman Blass: "May 10th."

Councilman Lull: "May 10th."

Councilwoman Blass: "As part time."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And not have an expiration date."

Councilwoman Blass: "That's correct because they're not seasonal employees. They're just part time recreation aides."

Councilman Lull: "Just part time."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I understand that. We probably will be doing a new- I think the thought here if I will, and I'm not sure if this was run by- usually we do our- the first meeting of the year which is the organizational meeting and usually we do that stuff then, too. We probably could reappoint at that time but I guess there's no harm."

Councilwoman Blass: "I spoke with Ms. Vandenthorn (phonetic)."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. And she suggested this be stipulated?"

Councilwoman Blass: "With Jack Hansen, Ed's good friend, and- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "So delete it. Is that- "

Councilwoman Blass: "It was suggested that that's the appropriate thing to do."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Councilwoman Blass: "On this one as well as the next one, same situation."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. So why don't we- "

Councilwoman Blass: "I'm sorry, not the next one."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "-- make a motion to delete- "

Councilwoman Blass: "The phrase to and including December 31, 2002."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Councilwoman Blass: "On the next two resolutions."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Two. Okay. Any other discussion?"

Councilwoman Blass: "None."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Vote as amended."

Barbara Grattan: "Okay, Blass is to amend. Is there a second?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, is there a second to amend?"

Councilman Densieski: "Second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay, any- vote on the amendment. I was going to say all in favor just to make it move quicker. But all in favor of that amendment?"

Councilwoman Blass: "There you go."

Councilman Lull: "Can I move that we vote on that amendment for both?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That would be even better yet. Motion to amend."

Councilwoman Sanders: "It's all three, I believe."

Barbara Grattan: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We are taking more time doing this than if we just took them up. But that's all right. Yes. So we're going to move the next three which would be- there's a motion to move 532, 533, 534 which are hiring part time recreation aides, Jonathan Gillen, Kimberly Walters, Jon Cunniff. Councilwoman Sanders: "Correct."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Is there a second to move it in bulk?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Vote, please."

Barbara Grattan: "Who introduced it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Jim."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolutions are all adopted."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Appoints summer personnel 2002 to the Recreation Department. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #536

Councilwoman Sanders: "Amends Resolution 1097, in essence is a change in the rate of pay for a volleyball official. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "And I'll second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #537

Councilman Densieski: "Appoints George Spero a recreation aide to the Riverhead Recreation Department. So moved."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Is there a second? Is this the same issue, delete that language?"

Councilwoman Blass: "Actually, there are two issues."

Councilwoman Sanders: "There are two issues."

Councilwoman Blass: "With this one. I will second it and then ask for discussion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Moved and seconded. Discussion."

Councilwoman Blass: "I'm not certain that the issue of December 31st pertains to this particular person because it is not clear that he is being hired for the skatepark or for- it's not a part time position. I'm not sure if it's considered a seasonal position. There was no information that was provided with respect to that.

I do have information, however, that, or I think it's the hourly rate of \$9.00 per hour should be changed to 7 in order to be consistent with the other first time recreation aides that we have appointed this year. The \$9.00 per hour rate was for the recreation leaders that we appointed thus far. The aides have all been hired at the rate of \$7- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And this person has not worked for us before?"

Councilwoman Blass: "This person has not worked for us before."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We've verified that?"

Councilwoman Blass: "Yes, we did."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. So you are making a motion to amend it to 7?"

Councilwoman Blass: "That's correct. But I really am uncertain about the December 31st on this issue, in this case."

Councilman Lull: "In this particular case, let's just pass it as the way it is and we can amend this one later but let's get it passed so we can hire him on the job."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "So it's 7- "

Councilwoman Blass: "With the \$7.00."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes. All right. Okay."

Councilwoman Blass: "And second-- I second that."

Barbara Grattan: "Who seconded it?"

Councilwoman Blass: "I do."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. So we're just changing the rate of pay to reflect what you believe- what we believe the correct pay should be. Okay. \$7.00."

Councilwoman Blass: "That was verified with the Superintendent. Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. All right. So vote as amended."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "This guy must have typed up his own resolution and gave himself a raise. I'll vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #538

Councilman Lull: "Appoints Tracy Stark the Empire Development Zone Coordinator to promote industrial development at EPCAL. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded with a correction, Mr. Supervisor."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

Councilwoman Blass: "Again. I think in light of the fact that we are considering expanding the Empire Development Zone outside of the EPCAL site, it may be more appropriate to just leave the first line of this resolution as the title and to delete to promote

industrial development at EPCAL because that would sort of put her in a corner and maybe limit her scope of responsibilities, if you will. Similarly, the first Whereas clause perhaps could be changed to say industrial development in the town of Riverhead to be consistent with the third wherein you do- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, if you're going to be exact in light of the fact that there's some discussion to extend the empire zones to the other side of the river, to the Gabreski property, then we might as well delete all that reference. Just appoints Empire Development Zone Coordinator."

Councilwoman Blass: "Okay. That would even be--"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "If that's the concern. I think that as a practical matter, if the zone changes, presently it's linked with EPCAL. The present conditions are EPCAL and that's it. And the zone amendment has not left the zone administrative board yet, then it has to be acted upon by the state so it may be some time before that takes place. So if we're concerned about the future, that would be something, but I don't think this necessarily would limit the duties of the person. This is just indicating what the present hiring conditions are and what they're being asked to do but if the Board feels collectively that it makes sense, delete it."

Councilwoman Blass: "Well at least make it internally consistent. When we refer to the development in Calverton, in Calverton, and then in the town of Riverhead. So if we're going to leave it with those two in there, then we should change the third one just so that we're consistent."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Fine. So, let's- is- there's an amendment. What is the specific amendment so that we can make it clear for the record? What's being deleted?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "The title of the resolution would just be appoint-- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The title is being deleted to be just the first line."

Councilwoman Sanders: "That's correct."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "So from to promote industrial development at EPCAL- "

Councilwoman Sanders: "Is removed."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "--is being deleted."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There's a motion to delete and then in the first Whereas from at the Calverton Empire Development Zone. Is that what we're talking about?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Barbara Grattan: "And it's going to be deleted?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's being deleted. So, okay. Is there a motion to make those deletions?"

(Some inaudible discussion among the Board members)

Councilman Lull: "In that first Whereas clause, I think it really should say to promote industrial development within- "

Councilwoman Blass: "The Empire Development Zone."

Councilman Lull: "The Empire Development Zone. In other words, just taking out the word Calverton. Because it does- that is the job, within the Empire Development Zone."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Councilwoman Blass: "And that would follow through in the first Resolve clause, line one, two, three, four, five. To promote industrial development for the Economic Development Zone within or just within the Economic Development Zone and remove in the town of Riverhead. Right?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. So it's been- there's been a motion to amend. Is there a second to amend?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Vote on the amendments."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, that was just on the amendments. Now vote on the resolution as amended. I hate to do it twice, but there was a lot that was done- "

Councilman Densieski: "No, it's important. Let's do it two or three times."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. No, stop. Let's go because we're going to be here all night if we keep doing this. Go ahead."

Barbara Grattan: "Okay. Now who's going to introduce- is that what happens?"

Councilman Lull: "I'll do it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's got to be introduced with the changes now because there was a number of amendments that had to be made."

Barbara Grattan: "All right. Lull. Who seconded it?"

Councilwoman Blass: "I'm seconding."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded with the amendments. Okay?"

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes, thank you."

Barbara Grattan: "The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #539

Councilman Lull: "539 approves the special permit petition of TC58, Incorporated (formerly Felice Enterprises). This is for the construction of an 89 room motel facility on Route 58. So moved."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Is there a second?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Discussion. There is an insert that we received- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Councilwoman Sanders: "To be included?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Does everybody have it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Everyone has it."

Councilwoman Sanders: "All of you have it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yup. So we understand that that's what we're moving."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Vote, please."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass."

Councilwoman Blass: "I had participated in the review of this special permit at the Planning Board and our recommendation to this Town Board was unanimous with several conditions. Since most of those conditions referenced the special permit application and they are not necessarily included, or they're not included in this approval resolution but become part of a future site plan application, I think it was wise at the time we made the original recommendation to address those matters here at the special permit level and not wait for some anticipated agreement between neighboring properties referencing slopes and other things.

In the event that those future agreements are not met or not consummated we have no fall back position for things like addressing the finding that we make that the regrading of the slope areas require construction of a high retaining wall and further impact the visual

quality of Route 58. That particular finding is addressed by a future agreement in a site plan and in the event that the neighboring property owner may not want to have a motel next to him, he may not be inclined to agree to that in which case we now have a situation that we've already stated as a fact would have a negative visual impact on Route 58 and we have no way of mitigating that.

Similarly we talk about this regrading of the slope as being necessary in order to ensure that we have adequate landscaping and that's contained in our finding of fact- I'm sorry, our first Resolve, that says that no site plan should be approved prior to this agreement with the neighboring owner, such that we would obviate the need for retaining of a sloped area and it would also provide for appropriate landscaped areas. Again, if we are relying upon some future agreement to get landscaped areas- future site plan approval is what I'm really addressing, to get appropriate landscaped areas that should be addressed at the special permit level, I think we are leaving ourselves vulnerable.

I am going to be consistent with my original vote on this in that I would have approved it with the conditions as depicted in the Planning Board resolution but since they are not there, I'm voting no."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "Well, I'm going- I like to be consistent, too, but this time I don't think I can. I believe I've been pro Route 58 development. I believe that Home Depot, Serota, Lowes, some of the car dealerships and some of the other uses that I've voted yes for on Route 58 are expanding the tax base and I think we were able to control all those. If you look at Home Depot, that's going to be beautiful (inaudible). I think we've taken projects and brought the level of landscaping and design and architecture up quite a bit from what it's been. I believe that's what our tax base comes from and God knows we need help.

But putting 89 units and all that parking on 2.3 acres is not going to be pretty. I can guarantee it. I don't care what kind of architecture they use or what kind of micro-plants they are going to put in there to have a certain amount of bushes. It's not going to work. It's going to be an 89 unit motel on 2.3 acres. You've going to have a sea of pavement and I'm sorry that I'm going to have to vote the way I do because we are in desperate need of quality motel and hotel rooms and bed and breakfast rooms in this town. But this is

inadequate as far as landscaping and other things, I'm sorry to say.

But I am not anit-Route 58. Clearly, I'm the opposite. But with those items mentioned, I'm going to have to vote no."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull."

Councilman Lull: "I'm not crazy about this one either, although I think we are covered as far as the site plan approval is concerned, the fact that they can't even come to us for site plan approval until the agreements are secured. However, my personal feelings about it are irrelevant to this situation. Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I was just going to say simply yes but in light of all the comment I think I want to give some brief explanation. We're talking about the special permit and not the site plan. Therefore, the site plan issues are issues that are addressed later, not now. We're dealing with the special permit, a special permit that was referred to the Suffolk County Planning Commission which received a local determination.

As pointed out by Councilwoman Blass, this also received an approval with conditions from our own Planning Board. And given the fact that the zoning allows this use as a special permit, given the fact that the record shows approvals from our own Planning Board and a local determination from the Suffolk County Planning Commission, not to mention the fact that there's time periods set forth which we've gone past. With respect to our review of this special permit application, I agree with Jim. My personal feelings do not enter into this. My position as a Town Board member and as the Supervisor is to vote according to what I'm being elected to do and that is to judge it on the special permit criteria set forth in the town law and the state law, therefore, I vote yes."

Barbara Grattan: "The resolution is adopted."

Councilwoman Blass: "I would just like to say I think it's inappropriate to state that the Planning Board voted to recommend approval- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "With conditions."

Councilwoman Blass: "-- without- and those conditions are not--"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "With conditions."

Councilwoman Blass: "That's correct, and those conditions- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "With conditions."

Councilwoman Blass: "-- are not in this resolution. So they would not have voted to approve it without those conditions and those conditions are not in this resolution."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "This is not a personal attack. I'm just saying that there was- "

Councilwoman Blass: "I'm not taking it as a personal attack."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Discussion- I had a chance to discuss, you had a chance to discuss."

Councilwoman Blass: "Yes, I did, sir."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "This is not point, counterpoint."

Barbara Grattan: "Resolution- "

Resolution #540

Councilman Densieski: "Accepts final scope of issues and SEQRA review of special permit petition of Route 58 Riverhead LLC (Riverhead Marquee Plaza). So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #541

Councilman Densieski: "Approves amended site plan of Apple Honda. So moved."

Councilwoman Sanders: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #542

Councilman Densieski: "Approves amended site plan of Aircraft Warehousing, Inc., units 1 and units 2. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #543

Councilwoman Blass: "This resolution approves the change of the name of one of our consultants and the fee schedule. It is for the town's utility consultant, Strategic Power Energy Services, Inc. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Second."

Councilman Densieski: "Discussion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded. Discussion."

Councilman Densieski: "Yes. I just- I'm noticing the principal's hourly rate here. Is that above our normal fees that we allow people to charge us or- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm not sure if we've established a limit for consultants on the outside."

Councilman Densieski: "Okay. I know I think there was an increase."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "What's that? Only lawyers. Only lawyers we limit to \$150 an hour."

Councilman Densieski: "Yeah. That's because you can't trust them. Just kidding. Okay, thank you, Mr. Supervisor."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "I think I offended Dawn."

Dawn Thomas: "No. No offense."

Councilman Densieski: "Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think she was wishing she got \$150 an hour. Yes."

Barbara Grattan: "The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #544

Councilman Lull: "Authorizes the Town Clerk to publish and post a public notice to consider a local law to amend Chapter 108 entitled Zoning of the Riverhead Town Code, zoning that is in this case in the Business B District. So moved."

Councilwoman Sanders: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "Considering the fact that I have a building down there, I think I'm going to abstain."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull."

Councilman Lull: "And the hearing is scheduled for June 4th. Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #545

Councilman Densieski: "Extends time to take action regarding the Cablevision franchise agreement. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders."

Councilwoman Sanders: "My initial reaction- comment, I'm sorry. My initial reaction on this was similar to yours but not to impede the progress and certainly not to undermine the efforts that have been made thus far to move this process along, I'm going to vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Blass."

Councilwoman Blass: "I have not been involved in any of the negotiations and really am not familiar with the extent of the progress other than what is reported in this resolution, but I was approached by former Councilman Pruzinowski who is a member of the committee and he said, Barbara, trust me on this one, we are really making progress and this resolution is a good one. So I do trust him and in light of that, I am voting yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "I'm glad that Barbara trust Vic and I hope that you trust Bob and I also because we were in on those meetings. And, yes, the meetings are coming along good so I'm going to vote yes on this."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull."

Councilman Lull: "And I'll vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #546

Councilman Lull: "Authorizes the Town Supervisor to execute a change order for Iron Pier Beach plumbing construction. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull."

Councilman Lull: "Yes. Just to mention to everybody we get a chance to do this about once every two weeks because we- something else comes up about some of these projects that are ongoing. This

project if you've been up there is very near to completion. It is within a few days of being completed for the most part and it will be ready to open very soon. Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #547

Councilwoman Sanders: "Sorry. Authorizes Town Supervisor to execute change order for Grangebél Park bulkhead replacement project. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "Mr. Supervisor, I was expecting another resolution for the carving of the pilings and the extra fill material from Park and Rec fees. Will that be on the next meeting or- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "What I am asking to be done because as pointed out by Jim, we see these change orders coming in pretty rapidly and when we start out with a project we have a budgeted amount, we have a funded amount, and in those instances where we have a bond, we have a bond authorization. And all too often we come right to the edge or sometimes we even trickle over and rather than do that, I want to have a meeting with the engineer to make sure that he's had a chance to look at the original contract amounts, compare them with all the change orders and make sure that we're not there yet. So, it will be on providing that we haven't got to the point where we've invaded or gone past that number. So the answer is yes, with that contingency."

Councilman Densieski: "With that said, I'll vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull,"

Councilman Lull: "With that said, I'll just simply tell you that if we don't find it there, we'll find it someplace else. And this project should be- as it sits right now, should be done by the end of the June at which point we're ready to apply for another grant to finish the upland section. Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #548

Councilman Lull: "Authorizes the Supervisor to submit a grant application for financial assistance to the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation pursuant to Title 9 of the Environmental Protection Act of 1993 and Title 3 of the 1996 Clean Water/Clean Air Bond Act for project known as the Calverton Enterprise Park Recreation Improvement Project and Recommitment of Matching Funds. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #549

Councilwoman Sanders: "Authorizes and endorses submission of grant application to the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull."

Councilman Lull: "Yes. This is money to stabilize the bluff for Reeves Beach."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Reeves Beach."

Councilman Lull: "Reeves Beach, sorry."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #550

Councilman Densieski: "Authorizes the Supervisor to execute an

agreement with Thomas Conoscenti & Associates, Inc. in connection with the assessing the need to establish additional industrial zoning at Enterprise Park at Calverton. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Discussion. I have a- the title of this and I don't know if you want to get into that, but I would just like to eliminate a lot of that in connection with the assessing of the need to establish. Why can't we just say authorizes the Supervisor to execute an agreement with Associates to assess the need and impacts of establishing industrial- additional industrial zoning at Enterprise Park Calverton."

Councilwoman Blass: "I would have- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I guess the point I want to make first and foremost is the- it's really the agreement and the body of the resolution that's the important thing. The title is sort of there to let the public know what it is we're voting on. I mean if we wanted to be really succinct and clear with the title we would just say authorize the Supervisor to execute agreement with Thomas Conoscenti. But I think we have been asked to try and explain more in the title."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Unless there's- "

Councilwoman Blass: "I have a further comment, if I could. When the original acreage was determined, the original industrial zone I should say, the amount of acreage was suggested by HR&A who did the redevelopment plan at Calverton. It wasn't a number that they pulled out of the sky or pulled out of a hat. It was based upon an anticipated need that the community could absorb for industrial use over a period of time.

And as this Board was considering possibly increasing the industrial zoning at Calverton which would have automatically put us into a supplemental impact statement, the suggestion came that we should do it the way it was done before in that we determine what the extent of the need is, basically looking for a demand analysis. How

much industrial land exists now in the region, what has the absorption rate been over a period of time, and that would help us to determine whether we should be rezoning for additional space or additional industrial zoning at Calverton and perhaps maybe where- how much of it and where it should be located on the site. That's why this was very specific to a needs analysis, a needs assessment, a demand analysis, whatever you want to call it. But it's based upon an anticipated absorption of industrial property in a community.

Impacts are something that are to be addressed at a later time under a SEQRA review. We are hiring this individual just to- per the agreement that was before us."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Any other discussion? If not, vote, please."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes."

Barbara Grattan: "You're not changing the title?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "No."

Councilman Densieski: "There's no reason."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm- is there a reason to? I mean, if there's a feeling that it's got to be-- but I think it's really there for clarification to the public. It's the body of the resolution that we need to be careful with."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Blass, yes; Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "I disagree with some of what's written in the HR&A study. Our own broker, the broker of the year, one of the largest real estate firms, has told us that he recommends that we expand industrial property there. The west end has none left. Brookhaven is drying up very rapidly. Southold, Southampton, East Hampton, Shelter Island, they're not going to build industrial parks. Let's build a tax base here, let's get the jobs here."

We have about 1,500 acres of recreational property and if you compare the jobs created and the taxes created with industrial property versus recreational, industrial far outweighs it tax base-wise and job salary-wise.

This is a waste, an absolute waste of \$10,000 but if this is the

only tool that we can use to convince the Board to do it, I'll vote yes for it."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull."

Councilman Lull: "I think it's less important to convince the Board that it's to be done but to give the Board a justification for the next step following. Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I thought we were going to have a real calm meeting tonight without a lot of controversy and sparks. So much for that. The HR&H study was- whether we personally agree or not, is one thing. I think that it was done with certain goals in mind, certain identified principles, one of which was tax base, one of which was job creation, one of which was quality of life. I think there was a fourth but right now I'm losing it so I can't remember what that fourth component was.

But the- this issue came to us by the RDC as a recommendation from the RDC that they felt there was a change in the way industrial growth was taking place, the way industrial properties were shrinking more rapidly than perhaps the HR&A study envisioned when it was one I think it was '95, '96."

Councilwoman Blass: "Late '90's."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Um, and based upon the change in circumstances that sometimes occurs, they asked us or they suggested to us, the decision being ours, that we may want to take a reexamination at this issue. And we discussed it and this was agreed that we look at the needs, whether there is the burgeoning industrial demand that would support the change of zoning and would look at it in conjunction with the HR&A study. I think it will be a useful tool. I look forward to Mr. Conoscenti's report and I vote yes."

Barbara Grattan: "That resolution is adopted."

Resolution #551

Councilman Lull: "We just voted on tool number one. This is tool number two. Authorizes the Supervisor to execute an agreement with Landauer Realty Group, Inc. to conduct a full appraisal of Enterprise Park at Calverton. So moved."

Councilwoman Sanders: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "What number are we on, Jim?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "551."

Councilman Densieski: "Okay. Yup."

Barbara Grattan: "Would that be a yes?"

Councilman Densieski: "This is for the- 551."

Councilman Lull: "This is 551. You've got the wrong one as 551. Take this."

Councilman Densieski: "It's the other 551."

Barbara Grattan: "It was replaced."

Councilman Densieski: "Okay. Okay."

Barbara Grattan: "Gina maybe didn't replace you."

Councilman Densieski: "Okay. It's quite all right. I'm just going to read it real quick. Yes. I'm going to vote yes after all that reading."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #552

Councilwoman Blass: "This resolution authorizes the Supervisor to execute an addendum to contract between Town of Riverhead and the Riverhead Business Improvement District Management Association with reference to the staffing of the Riverhead train station. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "Speaking of tools, this is another tool to improve the downtown, the Railroad Avenue areas, and I think it's great that there's going to be action and respectable people in the train station. I'll vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #553

Councilman Lull: "Authorizes the Town Clerk to increase the fee of Riverhead Town Code Books. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #554

Councilwoman Blass: "This resolution approves the application of Allen Edmonds Shoe Store at Tanger for a tent sale. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #555

Councilman Densieski: "Approves Chapter 90 application of Radio Shack located in Riverhead. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #556

Councilman Lull: "Authorizes the Supervisor to request the state for a speed zone change. As pointed out to you, this is on Pulaski Street. We have- we are requesting through the forum, the state forum, for the speed zone on Pulaski Street to be reduced to 30 miles per hour the entire length of Pulaski Street. Apropos of comments earlier about reducing it less than that, 30 miles an hour is all the state allows us to reduce speed, unless it's a school zone. So 30 is the minimum that we can reduce it, but we would like to reduce it the whole way to 30 miles an hour. So this requests the Supervisor to ask for that speed zone change. So moved."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It was corrected. It was corrected."

Barbara Grattan: "It's been corrected."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "But it didn't make it in your packet."

Barbara Grattan: "So Sanders is going to abstain?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I thought it was something else, okay. That's bad enough. Okay."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes."

Councilman Densieski: "Good for you, Rose."

Barbara Grattan: "The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #557

Councilwoman Sanders: "Authorizes the Town Clerk to post and publish help wanted ad for an engineering intern. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "We haven't had a lot of luck trying to find one of these interns. Maybe we should say please or something on here. Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #558

Councilwoman Blass: "This resolution authorizes the Town Clerk to publish and post a help wanted ad for Jr. Civil Engineer trainee. So moved."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Jim?"

Councilman Lull: "Second, sorry."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Comment. Can we correct that?"

Councilwoman Blass: "On the second page."

Councilwoman Sanders: "On the second page that deadline, questions marks?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think that was supposed to be exclamation points."

Councilwoman Sanders: "That didn't go out that way, did it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No."

Councilwoman Blass: "I don't think so."

Barbara Grattan: "It hasn't gone out anywhere yet."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It hasn't gone out."

Barbara Grattan: "If you adopt this resolution tonight, it will go out tomorrow."

Councilwoman Sanders: "All right. So- "

Councilwoman Blass: "I think they were looking for a deadline, is that--"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Councilwoman Sanders: "What is that?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "So I think we usually do about a month. I- I- let's talk to Kenny and we'll put it in there. All right? Any other discussion? Vote?"

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass."

Councilwoman Blass: "Yes, with the please."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. Resolution is adopted."

Councilman Densieski: "Authorizes the Town Clerk to post and publish a notice to bidders for East End Arts Council site handicap accessibility modifications. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders."

Councilman Densieski: "Discussion. Mr. Supervisor, we didn't have a lot of time to go over some of these Water District things in work session. Have you gone over it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "These are the ones that we had the public hearings on."

Councilman Densieski: "Okay. Thank you, sir."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Any other discussion? Any other discussion? Vote."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. Resolution is adopted."

Resolution #561

Councilman Densieski: "Me again? Awards bid for granular activated carbon replacement at Plant No. 12 Riverhead Water District. So moved."

Councilwoman Sanders: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #562

Councilwoman Sanders: "Authorizes Town Clerk to readvertise for bids for the Riverhead Water District repainting of Pulaski Street tank. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "I'll second that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull."

Councilman Lull: "Yes. Just point out that this also is a rejecting of the bid that we received. Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #563

Councilwoman Sanders: "Authorizes the Town Clerk to post and publish a notice to bidders for a standby power generator installation Police Department and Town Hall. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "Yeah. We're going to post that in the official newspaper of the town of Riverhead who is not here again tonight. Yes."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #565

Councilwoman Sanders: "Rejects bids for corrosion control chemical and authorizes the Town Clerk to publish and post notice to bidders. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #566

Councilman Lull: "Awards bid for well and pumping emergency service for the Riverhead Water District. So moved."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Is there a second?"

Councilwoman Blass: "Yes. I'm sorry."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded. That's okay."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes;

Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #567

Councilwoman Blass: "This resolution awards the bid for quick lube maintenance at the Riverhead Water District. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #568

Councilwoman Sanders: "Order establishing Extension 70 to the Riverhead Water District Mid Road Properties. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. Resolution is adopted."

Resolution #569

Councilman Lull: "I'm getting there. We have these huge ones. Here we go. Order establishing Extension 1 to the Riverhead Water District Country Trails Subdivision. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes."

Councilman Lull: "I'm sorry. This is not extension 1. I'm sorry."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "71."

Councilman Lull: "It's extension 71. Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #570

Councilman Densieski: "Is an order establishing Extension 72 to the Riverhead Water District for Reeves Farms. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #571

Councilman Densieski: "Is an order establishing Extension 74 to the Riverhead Water District Wiana Realty - Riverhead Bay Motors. So moved."

Councilwoman Blass: "And seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #572

Councilwoman Blass: "This resolution approves Riverhead Centre LLC's petition to amend their special permit. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded. Discussion."

Councilwoman Blass: "Discussion. Just quickly. Dawn, did that amended section- or did that amended section get added that we talked about."

Dawn Thomas: (Inaudible)

Councilwoman Blass: "I see it in the- it's in the first- second Resolve."

Dawn Thomas: "I don't know why I don't have that. (Inaudible) I'm missing the page, that's why. Yes, let me see yours."

Councilwoman Blass: "I just wanted to make sure it wasn't in the original."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Oh, okay, yes. Yes. Yup."

Councilwoman Blass: "It was a late edition, if you will."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right."

Barbara Grattan: "Is everybody ready to vote?"

Councilwoman Blass: "I moved that and seconded. Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Vote, please. Yes."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Dawn Thomsas: "You know what? I've got to make one quick amendment to it, sorry."

Councilman Densieski: "Oh, boy. Now, you did it."

Dawn Thomas: "Thirteenth Whereas clause- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "So we're on page two?"

Dawn Thomas: "Page two, the third one from the bottom where it says April 19, 2002, it should be May 16, 2002. I'm sorry."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Well, I think we've got to just make that amendment. We can return to that. It's highly irregular. We had the vote already but let's go back to 572. There should be one change in the Whereas. It should say the letter dated April 25, 2002 remains the same. Is that correct? From the Planning Commission? Okay. All right. With that amendment- "

Barbara Grattan: "So the only change is going to be April 19, 2002 to May 16, 2002?"

Councilman Lull: "That's the only change?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Councilman Lull: "Mr. Supervisor, I move we rescind #572 and replace it with #572 with the appropriate changes."

Barbara Grattan: "No. I think somebody should just amend it."

Councilman Lull: "You can't amend it. It's closed."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's closed."

Councilman Densieski: "I'll second Jim's motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We voted on it. Okay."

Barbara Grattan: "Okay. So you're going to rescind the Resolution?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "572."

Councilman Lull: "572. And replace it with a new resolution with the same number. Okay?"

Barbara Grattan: "572, that's Lull and then- dead, dead."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Vote?"

The Vote: "Sanders, yes."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Yes, as amended."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Blass."

Councilwoman Blass: "Yes, as amended."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes."

Barbara Grattan: "Okay. So now we're going to do Resolution #572 as amended."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We did all in one. Okay."

Resolution #573

Barbara Grattan: "Resolution #573, pay bills."

Councilman Lull: "So moved."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Is there a second?"

Councilwoman Blass: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

Barbara Grattan: "Blass?"

Councilwoman Blass: "Yes."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. Resolution is adopted."

Barbara Grattan: "Do we have another one off the floor?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right. All right. Why don't you just explain this one a little bit, Dawn for those who are still here?"

Dawn Thomas: "This resolution rescinds in part- the title is Rescinds in part Resolution #1009 of 2001 and ratifies the site plan approval granted to Riverhead Fire District training facility.

Back in 2001 if anybody recalls we had approved or the Board had approved a site plan application for the Riverhead Fire District training facility to be located on Northville Turnpike. Subsequent to that resolution being adopted, we reviewed the code and found that there is a section in Chapter 108 of our zoning code, specifically Section 108-54 which allows the town to- or allows municipal buildings to be located in any zoning district within the town provided that they meet site plan requirements.

At the time that we adopted the previous resolution we had done what they call a Monroe County analysis which basically the Town Board analyzed whether the Fire District as a separate municipal entity was entitled to autonomy and not being subject to our zoning code. And we did that analysis and we did determine, in fact or the Board determined, in fact, that it was exempt from our zoning code. And then subsequently we recognized this section 108-54 basically confirms that.

So and in addition if anybody recalls, we were - there was an

Article 78 proceeding brought challenging that previous resolution based on that Monroe County analysis.

What this resolution does is rescinds the part of the resolution that we previously adopted or the Board previously adopted relating to that Monroe County analysis where we said that the Fire District was autonomous and now we are recognizing that section of the code which allows the Fire District to place a municipal building in that zoning which I believe is Agricultural A zoning."

Councilwoman Blass: "Ag A zoning. Yes."

Dawn Thomas: "And ratifies the site plan approval that we did adopt at that time. And this should resolve our litigation and let the Fire District continue with the construction of that facility at that site. With the same site plan restrictions that were adopted at that time. If anybody follows that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. I- "

Councilman Densieski: "I'm more confused now."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Is there a motion?"

Councilman Lull: "I'll move 574."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right, second, anybody?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded. Vote, please."

The Vote: "Sanders, yes; Blass."

Councilwoman Blass: "I'm very much in support of having the litigation go away but we had a very strong position on this and not knowing specifically what the site plan conditions were that the previous Board approved, I feel like I have to abstain on this resolution."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Densieski, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "For the reasons described by the Town Attorney and the fact that it appears that our own zoning, 108-54, has identified the fact that municipal buildings would be able to be

located in all zoning districts subject to site plan review, I vote yes."

Barbara Grattan: "That resolution is adopted."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Any other business?"

Councilman Densieski: "Motion to adjourn."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Good evening. Oh, Ann, we never got your comment out there. In case anybody wants to attend tomorrow, SEEDS, 6 to 9- 6:30."

Councilwoman Blass: "6:30 at the gatehouse."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's at the gatehouse at Grumman. This is SEEDS which is the Sustainable East End Development Strategies which is part of this regional transportation study. And so anybody who wants to participate- participate, ooh, it's been a long evening, and be present and watch firsthand what the SEEDS strategies is doing and accomplishing, you're invited to attend. That's at the gatehouse."

Councilwoman Blass: "That's correct."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Tomorrow evening, May 23, 2002, 6:30 p.m. Thank you."

Councilwoman Blass: "That's correct."

Meeting adjourned: 9:45 p.m.
