Minutes of a Regular Town Board Meeting held by the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead at Town Hall, 200 Howell Avenue, Riverhead, New York, on Tuesday, November 16, 2004, at 7:00 p.m.

Supervisor Cardinale called the meeting to order.

Supervisor Cardinale: "-- here to honor Richie Podlas. Sit down, relax for one moment. We'll just get the Pledge of Allegiance stated and then we'll go down into the well of the room and we'll hand out the Employee of the Quarter.

So Pete Danowski who is sitting there doing nothing, would you lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance?"

(At this time, the Pledge of Allegiance was recited, led by Peter Danowski, Esq.)

Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you."

Peter Danowski: "You're quite welcome."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. Can I have the Labor/Management Committee and Richie Podlas and his colleagues all come up and his family?"

I would like together with the Town Board here with me and together with the Labor/Management Committee, to honor Richie for his service and perhaps before I read this proclamation very well stated, you can tell us how it came to- the Labor/Committee chose Richie to be Employee of the Quarter, third quarter. I know he had a lot of competition I'm sure, but can you tell us how you made the decision and a little bit about Richie."

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(Unidentified) "Labor/Management does an Employee of the Quarter and the employee gets nominated by his superior or a superior in the town for their outstanding work. And Richie was nominated by (inaudible) and his nomination was outstanding (inaudible)."

Supervisor Cardinale: (Inaudible) "I would like to read the proclamation and then let Leroy (inaudible)."

(At this time, Supervisor Cardinale read the proclamation)

Leroy Barnes: "Thank you Labor/Management (inaudible). I just want to let you know that employees that don't know Richie, we call him (inaudible), because his last name's Podlas. And- Building Department in 1997 the first thing that my friend back there, Jack Hansen, told me to do was hire somebody you trust, and hire somebody that knows the trade, that's been in the trade. And I didn't have to think twice. I hired Richie Podlas and I don't look back.

I recruited him, he was a little reluctant at first, he's still a little reluctant. (Inaudible). Thank you, Richie."

Barbara Grattan: "That concludes Correspondence."

Supervisor Cardinale: "And there are no public hearings
scheduled for this evening so we're storing them all up for you for
next- on December 7th I think.

Are there any Reports that the Board would like to deliver or
announcements? If so, great. If not, we can not have the public
hearings as we usually do, we can move into comment on any of the
resolutions we're going to consider at the Board meeting tonight.
Then we'll pass the resolutions or not as appropriate and then we'll
take comment on general subject matter.

The resolutions- I think there are 57 of them, are available if
anybody wants to see them. If you'd like to comment, come right up.
Was there a sheet out there with people who may have signed on?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have one I brought in. I don't know- in
fact, Dawn, take this out just in case because I have a- good, thank
you."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Is that the only sheet that- "

Barbara Grattan: "Yes, that was the only sheet and that was-
Mr. Schulman was on it."

Supervisor Cardinale: "For general comment. Okay. Anybody
for resolution comment? If there's another sheet, bring it in, John.
Yes, come right up whoever raised their hand. Joan, did you have a
comment?"

Joan Griffin: "Good evening ladies and gentlemen of the Board.
My name's Joan Griffin from Baiting Hollow. First I'd like to thank
Councilman Ed Densieski for helping me with the program I'm doing,
Tabs for Tots. These tabs are the pull tops from the top of soda,

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beverage cans, whatever. He donated or collected somehow or another 70 pounds in I believe three or four months. So I'd like to applaud him for that. And these were brought to Stony Brook Hospital today for a donation to them for their program, the transplant team does that."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Are these like on soda cans and beer cans?"

Joan Griffin: "Soda cans, beer cans, juice, beverage, any beverage can."

Supervisor Cardinale: (Inaudible)

Councilman Densieski: "That was just one weekend."

Barbara Grattan: "Joan?"

Joan Griffin: "Yeah?"

Barbara Grattan: "Joan, that's not what Mr. Densieski said that they came from. They came from his boat."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. Yeah, well (inaudible), whatever, but anyway I think it's Resolution #1059 about the budget."

Councilman Densieski: "Joan, can I ask you a question about that first?"

Joan Griffin: "Sure."

Councilman Densieski: "Is Rivehead on top now? Because I know there were some other towns that were- "

Joan Griffin: "I don't know. I could call Linda at the transplant team because our town in the 18 months I'm doing it, thanks to you, we got up to 668 pounds today, which is about a fifth of a child. It takes 3,000 pounds of tabs or 4.8 million tabs to send one child. So-

Question for you. 1059 I think is the resolution about the budget."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yes."

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Joan Griffin: "In the paper, they said it cost \$34.98 per thousand assessed evaluation, that's part of the budget, right?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "I'm not familiar with the article, but so I'm not sure if that is accurate, but Jack Hansen I think is here. He may be able to verify. Do you have a question?"

Joan Griffin: "What does that 38.94 include? Is it the school tax, the town tax, the- everything else in between tax?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "I don't know because I don't know the article that was alluding to. I do know that the- what they do is they indicate the tax on a typical \$50,000 assessment. Jack, do you recognize that number, the 34.98?"

Jack Hansen: "I would estimate that is probably strictly the town-wide taxes, not schools. Schools are a lot higher."

Supervisor Cardinale: "It would certainly- yeah, if they're talking about the town budget, it would include only the town tax which is approximately what- 15% of the full tax?"

Jack Hansen: "It's the town-wide tax, highway, lighting and (inaudible)."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Right. But as a percentage of what people see on their tax bill, the town tax and the highway and the street lighting is about 15%. The school tax is about 65% and the county is about another 15 and the special districts are roughly 5.

So what they were talking about, if they're talking about the town budget is that 15% factor in your tax bill."

Joan Griffin: "Okay. Because that scares me very much because my assessed valuation on the house is \$62,000."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yes."

Joan Griffin: "So 62 times \$34.98, my tax just on the town side of the bill is going up \$2,168?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "No. That's not happening. That's definitely not happening. Your town tax last year, how much tax do you pay in full?"

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Joan Griffin: "My total tax bill is \$6,500."

Supervisor Cardinale: "So your town tax is about 15% of that which is about \$1,000. Your town tax is going to go up about 5% or about \$50.00 total."

Joan Griffin: "Of that portion."

Supervisor Cardinale: "That \$1,000 in the town tax is going to go up 5% or 50 bucks."

Joan Griffin: "Okay. So now I don't have to go and get a job?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah. I don't know what that number was, but that was scaring me, too."

Joan Griffin: "It's like- that's more than my taxes on my other house."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yes."

Joan Griffin: "Um, I have comments about the budget in general and the raises for the elected officials."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yes."

Joan Griffin: "A comment was made by one of our Council people about Southampton and that the Supervisor's salary for 2004 was \$80,000 and was going up to \$92,000. That's an 11 and ½ % increase he's getting and the Council people over there, for the same time frame is going up from \$44,000 to \$52,000, again, an 18% increase is happening in Southampton. For the 2000 census of Southampton's population is more than double Riverhead. Their population is over 58,000 and ours is just barely 28,000. So maybe they can afford that kind of increase. They have a bigger tax base to work with."

In East Hampton, the Supervisor there is going from \$83,200 to \$85,900, only 3 and 1/4%. And the Council people are getting the same raise of 3 and 1/4% from \$52,000 to \$53,700. For the 1990 census in East Hampton populations's only 16,000 so it appears East Hampton is more in line with their increases.

I believe the Consumer Price Index which was mailed to me from Town Hall shows that the town elected officials have been treated very well over the years. Our elected officials in 2000 received

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just shy of 3.5% except for the Council persons, they received 14.7% the CPI was 3.1 that year.

In 2001 our elected officials received well over the 2.6. In fact, they received more than 8% and our Council persons received 19.2%. The CPI was 2.6.

In 2002, some of our elected officials received almost double the CPI which others received more than- and others received more than double and the Supervisor received 6.6. The CPI was 2.5.

In 2003, the tax receiver did not take a raise because of a campaign promise during the special elections but the other elected officials received on an average a 4% raise. The CPI that year was 3.1.

In 2004, no raises were given. In my opinion, it was because the 2003 budget was done during an election year. The CPI year to date for 2004 is 3.4.

So the budget for 2005 is looking to give 6% to cover this year and next year's raises. My pension did not go up for 10 years. My husband's salary has been frozen for the past three years. By the way, he's also a salaried employee.

In five short years the increases have been very generous. The Supervisor, \$11,000 plus. The Council people, each person \$9,500 plus. Town Clerk, over \$11,000. Town Receiver, \$8,600. The Chairperson of the Assessor's office, \$13,800. The Assessors, two of them, \$11,000 plus. The Superintendent of Highways, \$9,000 plus. Two town justices, \$11,000 plus.

The 6% this year if you add up all those people, comes out to over \$42,000 that you're looking to give to five, six, seven, eight, nine, ten, eleven, twelve, thirteen people. That's a lot of money. I can break down the raises for you if you want.

The 6% across the board for elected officials does not appear to be high at first glance. Last year there were no increases for the elected officials and I would presume it was because 9 of the 13 were running for re-election. If the CPI raises were to be given yearly, the town would not find itself in this situation of trying to make up lost increases at one time.

In my opinion, that is if you wish to get out a larger increase than the CPI, it should be for the person running the next time the

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office is up for re-election. After all, didn't each person know what the salary was for their position?

And while we're on the subject of salaries, does it seem right to give- does it seem right for the Town Board that when a new person wins the election, the person starts with the existing salary? Shouldn't there be, oh, let's just say a 10%\$ decrease? Odds are the person does not have full knowledge of the position and there would be a learning curve involved.

This does not even take into account the appointed department heads. I can only imagine what they are asking for.

The fact that our Council persons are working more than part time should be an indication that it might be time to make these elected officials full time positions with a full time salary, a starting salary, just a suggestion, say \$50,000 with the appropriate CPI increases.

We are not a part time town any longer and it is about time we get full time representation.

By the way, did you know Delta Airlines is taking a 30% cut in pay this year?

Thank you very much."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you, Joan. We appreciate your statistical statistics and insights.

Do we have anyone else that would like to comment on any resolution that's before us this evening? Okay, let's try- Sal. Sal and then Sandra."

Sal Mastropolo: "Sal Mastropolo, Calverton. Just a couple of questions. On Resolution 1040, can you explain the new vehicle acquisition? Does the town actually own ambulances or do we contract out to the ambulance services?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "We actually own the vehicles that are used by the- we own the vehicles, all vehicles."

Sal Mastropolo: "And they provide the staff?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "They provide the volunteer staff."

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Sal Mastropolo: "Okay. Thank you. Resolution 1066."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yes."

Sal Mastropolo: "Did we ever consider looking at using the schools instead of the armory? That way the money stays in the school district."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah. As recently as the work session on Monday. I'm told by Rose who is very helpful on recreation matters and is the liaison, that we'd love to but they can't provide the space for free or for money. They just can't provide the space, they don't have it."

Sal Mastropolo: "Does the school board- the school board's not willing to accommodate the town recreation department."

Supervisor Cardinale: "They're not able I think is more precise."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Right. They're not able. It's a space issue. It's not because they don't want to. It's a space issue."

Sal Mastropolo: "What kind of space do you use, the gymnasium?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "The basketball court."

Councilman Densieski: "Indoor tennis, indoor- "

Councilwoman Sanders: "Yes. Indoor- basketball, tennis."

Supervisor Cardinale: "I think what they're saying is they've got- well, that's an interesting question. I think you are going beyond the answer. Other groups are using it, right, is that the idea?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "In the schools."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yes."

Councilwoman Sanders: "Yes."

Sal Mastropolo: "Okay."

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Supervisor Cardinale: "The school teams and other groups. It would be nice if we could get on the list though of, you know, so we could use it with the other groups that use it."

Sal Mastropolo: "1067. Authorizes Town Clerk to publish advertisement for dumpster enclosures. Are we talking about the buildings to put the dumpsters in or is it something else?"

Councilman Densieski: "Yes."

Sal Mastropolo: "Okay. Because it said something, sealed bids for the purchase of dumpster enclosures. That's what was a little confusing. Purchase or construction of?"

Councilman Densieski: "Construction of."

Sal Mastropolo: "Okay. That's why I asked the question. 'Cause I'm saying to myself I thought we were going to build these buildings. Now all of a sudden we're buying dumpster enclosures."

Councilman Densieski: "No."

Sal Mastropolo: "Okay. That's it. Thank you."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you very much, Sal. Sandra."

Sandra Mott: "Hi. Sandra Lee Mott, Riverhead. On Resolution 1088 about your code of ehtics."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yes."

Sandra Mott: "I've been reading it in the papers and listening as you've discussed it periodically on cable for the rest of us to view who can't attend all of your sessions. I really do believe that full disclosure of all income sources is extremely crucial to everyone in the town. It's an important issue, especially to avoid conflict of interest. Whether there is one or isn't one, it avoids the whole stigma.

If a person has a second job, as long as it's known to the community, openly, I do not see that that's an issue. In particular I noticed that there was honing in on one particular person. I think that we should be very grateful for that person, particularly Rose Sanders, to be here. She's able to help not only the county citizenry but the local township citizenry. I think we should be raising our flags to her and saying hallelujah. There are not that

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many people who are as thorough, as conscientious, who- as responsive.

I mean I'm very grateful that she's there to respond. The other of you have on occasion when I've asked for your assistance as well but I think ethics in this day and age as we all know, I mean it should be in capital letters, CODE OF ETHICS. If you have nothing to hide, then there's no issue, okay, quite frankly.

And the sooner that that's adopted in full, the better. And I just hope that that takes place this evening. Thank you."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you very much, Sandra. Any other comment on any of the resolutions we are about to consider. If not, we will consider them and then we'll throw it open for open comment. You have a comment? Please."

Ken Barra: "I'm here tonight because I understand that the Sound Avenue property and Park Road is coming up- "

Barbara Grattan: "Would you just state your name for the record, please?"

Ken Barra: "Oh, I'm sorry. Ken Barra, Wading River."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yes, that's correct."

Ken Barra: "Okay, we'll be voting on that tonight. Well, this is a final appeal before the Board before you make the decision this evening to remind you that I have been a very big part of this community and worked with this Board and prior Boards to you and that the property in the past I have done, you know, have all been some of the nicest things that are in this town.

The other problem that I have is this is actually the second time that the town is looking to take something that was further- the property of the Country Inn for 50 rooms and then converted again on a second vote to go to 20 rooms.

And now we have a vote in November saying that this property would be staying commercial and now again three of the members of the board will be changing their vote to vote this residential. That's what I understand correctly this evening.

You know, this is, again, craziness. You're just going to be

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wasting taxpayers dollars and perhaps you might take less of a raise next year. I don't know.

Thank you for your time."

Supervisor Cardinale: "That's Resolution 1089. Yes, ma'am, would you like to comment?"

Mary Beth Vetter: "Mary Beth Vetter, Reeves Park, Riverhead. I am here as one final appeal on behalf of my community. This vote is not about one or two individuals and their relationship with anybody. We all have a good past history of what we've done in our individual communities.

This is the greatest country in the world because we are a government of the people, by the people and for the people. I believe that over the past several months, and I know we've inundated you and taken up a lot of your time with all of our letters and all of our comments but the people have spoken.

Many thousands of us, through the Last Chance Riverhead Coalition with their thousands of members, environmental and civic groups, our whole community who has come from all over Long Island to constantly appear at these meetings, we have spoken. You are our government. You are our voice. And I am giving you one final plea. Please represent all of us and take our interests into consideration when you make your vote.

Thank you."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Is there anyone else who would like to comment on- yes, Mark."

Mark Houraney: "Is this general comments or just about the resolutions?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "About the resolutions."

Mark Houraney: "I'll- okay."

Supervisor Cardinale: "As soon as we finish resolutions, it will be open for other comment. Thank you.

Okay. If there is no other comment, I will consider- we will consider the resolutions and then we'll go on to general comment. Barbara, would you begin by calling the first of them?"

One of them is that we are taking \$2.75 million from the general fund; two, we're taking a little over \$2 million out of the Burman money to pay down debt service; three, we've giving a tax increase inconsistent with the cost of living. As a matter of fact, it's about double. Four, at least four Suffolk town offerd no tax increase or a tax decrease this year.

I did a comparison graph about three weeks ago and at that point in time, Riverhead is offering the highest tax increase so I think we've got to start thinking outside the box and start looking at

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EPCAL as the place for tax relief and I think we better do it with industrial zoning.

With that, I'm going to vote yes for the Supervisor's budget."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Cardinale."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yes. I am going to vote yes. I think that what is probably most noteworthy about this budget is the discipline shown by both the budget officer Jack Hansen, myself and this Board in dealing with the budget this year.

First of all, we took less from the reserve funds, approximately \$2 million dollars from the reserve funds. Since each \$200,000 is 1% of the tax rate, had we taken the same amount we would, in fact, as Ed indicates, brought this budget down 5% instead of brought it up 5%, if we had taken the same amount from our reserve funds as we had taken last year by the previous administration.

We chose to do the responsible thing which was to let our reserve funds hold as tax stabilizing funds for the future and not pay our bills with our children's money. The- so I'm proud of that.

I'm also proud that it's interesting about this, you know, adding back in, the budget came to this Board with 5.5% tax rate increase. The Board had significant impact of several hundreds of thousands of dollars where they moved money, where they felt appropriate with three votes and which I concurred in in most instances. The rate came out the same, 5.5 at the end of the day which means when we added we cut. And I think that was very responsible and disciplined.

So the failure to use the reserve funds of \$2 million dollars that was used previously, the reduction of that, and the discipline of this Board when they wanted changes from my budget. They got the changes, but they also-- they also showed me where we were going to make the cuts to allow the expenditures, I commend. And I vote yes."

With all of these people against it, why would you possibly vote for it? So I thought about that. I thought it was a good question and I'm going to try to answer that question.

First of all, with regards to the Planning Board. I believe that the Planning Board believed they were going to create a walkable community there. Two. There exists a commercial node there now where Mr. Vilacci's (phonetic) auto repair business is, Mr. Terry's restaurant and the stores. There are never going to be residential or agriculture, there are always going to be commercial.

As far as EMB and Mr. Barra, I think the town should work out a better site plan with Mr. Barra, possibly downsizing it and buffering it to the existing community and make it a much more rural and less commercial looking project. Maybe something that looks like the back of JR's Steakhouse, that's a nice little community village back there.

But the fact of the matter is, Mr. Barra was led down the primrose path. Let's look at some of the facts. Mr. Barra bought the land after the master plan was adopted, consistent with the old and the new zoning. He went through the Planning Department, the Engineering Review, the ARB, etc., paying the town over \$17,000 in town fees. Can you imagine yourself paying a million dollars for a piece of property correctly zoned, about \$100,000 that you laid out of your pocket of hard earned money for architectural and engineering and even Riverhead town happily received almost \$20,000 in fees and then at the very end of the process, after everybody had their hand out and the town at the request of the local community changes the zone?

That's no way to run the government. In my opinion, it's un-American. This is not Soviet Russia. This is America. People have constitutional rights.

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It is my belief that changing this zone will lead to more unneeded taxpayer funded litigation. It would have been very easy for me to come here and vote for this change. The community members would have clapped and I could have felt warm and fuzzy for a few minutes. And Mr. Barra would still be paying interest on his million dollar loan and the town still- would still be fighting a possible losing court battle.

To my friends and neighbors who disagree with me, I'm sorry and I understand. This job is tough and these are tough decisions. They require political courage to make based upon the law and rights that are not always popular.

With that said, I vote no."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Cardinale."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah. I am pleased to at least have recalled this so that Ed could correct the vote. It is a difficult decision. I think where the-- if we read carefully the resolution you'll understand the reasoning of this Board, looking at the generic environmental impact statement, looking at what the master plan said about this area.

It is unfortunate. However, we've been considering this master plan for four years, more than four years. It's actually almost six years. Initially there was a recommendation to do exactly what we're doing tonight. Then there was an alteration of that. There was no change at any time in the generic environmental impact statement which indicated, and this I found very convincing. The generic environmental impact statement clearly, clearly and consistently, and always, supported the comprehensive plan's recommendation to rezone the area for residential use rather than commercial.

Specifically, as we cited in the resolution, the generic environmental impact statement, that document that cost us so much time and money, states the proposed action would eliminate commercial zoning in Wading River east and Roanoke here, and replace it with residential or agricultural zoning consistent with the surrounding land uses and zoning. Under the future base line, the development of these existing inappropriately located districts would create adverse effects as described in Chapter 6 of the plan.

What convinces me to vote yes with no ill will and, in fact, some concern and regret for Mr. Barra's plight, is that the GEIS was

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consistently calling for residential zoning.

And I leave with this comment. I practice law in this town for a long time. During the period between 1998, '97 actually when the master plan was started, the study, and we're going to be completing in 2004, the end of 2004, the zoning, implementing it, you have to worry about-- my clients and every client had to worry about two kinds of zoning, the zoning that was in effect and the zoning that was contemplated by the master plan. And if you didn't read the generic impact statement, if you did read it and I'm sure they did, they knew there was a risk here. Because the generic environmental impact statement always said what I just read.

And I, therefore, vote yes.

Okay, I think we have all the resolutions passed except to pay the bills. Can we consider that?"

Councilwoman Sanders: "So moved."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay, moved to pay the bills."

Councilman Densieski: "Seconded."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Seconded to pay the bills."

The Vote: "Bartunek, yes; Sanders, yes; Blass, yes; Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes. The bills are paid."

Supervisor Cardinale: "That concludes the Resolutions. We are open for general comment on any matter within the purview of the Board. Mark, you were up here, come on up again."

Mark Houraney: "Thank you, Mr. Supervisor. I'm just trying to understand the zoning that you are passing with the master plan, Barbara, you're the Chairwoman from what I understand of it?"

Councilwoman Blass: "No, sir. I'm not the Chairwoman. I'm on the implementation committee."

Mark Houraney: "Okay. I'm just- I just found some articles and it seems the Last Chance Coalition and Calverton Civic and Pine Barrens had input on the master plan. Did they meet with you and discuss the master plan at all?"

Councilwoman Blass: "There were open meetings in this room."

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Mark Houraney: "Were they here? Was the Pine Barrens and representatives of the Pine Barrens like this article says and Calverton Civic here?"

Councilwoman Blass: "There were meetings of what was known as an implementation committee that was formed after the adoption of the plan- "

Mark Houraney: "Right."

Councilwoman Blass: "-- this Town Board put together an implementation committee on which a variety of groups were represented and the implementation committee met publicly with Councilman Bartunek in this room. Yes."

Mark Houraney: "Okay. So- but my question is, I'm just trying to find out, was the Pine Barrens representatives and Calverton Civic, were they part of it?"

Councilwoman Blass: "Yes, they were. Yes."

Mark Houraney: "Okay. The reason I ask that is because in front of me I have the IRS reports that the Pine Barrens files with the Attorney General. Let me read to you question number one on the IRS report.

During the year, has the organization attempted to influence national, state or local legislation including any attempt to influence public opinion on legislation matter or referendums? The answer is no. And the reason that is is because the Calverton Civic organization is a 501 C3 and so is the Long Island Pine Barrens, non-profit organization. As 501 C3's, let me give you a general statement of the 501 C3 IRS rule. In general, no organization may qualify for Section 501 C3 if a substantial part of its activities is attempting to influence legislation. Okay?

So basically what I'm telling the Board right now is all the influence that the Calverton Civic and Long Island Pine Barrens has put on this town over the years is improper, including the master plan. And I ask the town to stop voting on everything, to investigate this matter, because it's been improperly influenced by two organizations that are non-profits, that are not allowed to influence this town. Okay? And I think it's a very serious matter.

Here it is right here, the tax form is filed with the IRS and the Attorney General and they answered no to the question of did you influence any legislation? Okay? So I would ask that all of you

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take note of this, look into this and find out before you pass any more zoning, master plan or anything, about this improper influence that I think has been put on this town. Thank you."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you, Mark. Yes. Oh, yeah, I want to- oh, Sandra, did you want to speak again? I didn't know that. But if you do, that's the only one that is on the list that hasn't spoken. Bill Schulman indicated he would be speaking to us individually, Mark just spoke, so come on up. And then we'll take any comment from the floor."

Sandra Mott: "Sandra Mott, Riverhead. First of all, I'm going to comment on that last gentleman's remarks. I always found the Pine Barrens speakers, members, the Civic Association members as information resource people. Now if you want to read that as influencing you, so be it, it depends- it's like statistics. What do you want to prove?"

As far as I am concerned, I can't go to all the meetings. I don't have the time; I don't have the ability. They do. And when they come up here and they represent viewpoints and information, I'm very glad that they do. Because I can't. I consider them information sources and if they're not for profit, good. They're some of the few that actually deserve to be not for profit. Of course, we have other people that have other directives and needs and directives, but that's their concern. That's an aside as to what else I was going to say, but it might lead into the next comment.

People are complaining about rezoning and master plan and so on and so forth. We have been living with special permit- a special permit situation that happened as you all know, the Glenwood quote unquote extension, since last year. Not only have we been living with the filth in the air, the destruction of habitat, the confusion. We've also been blocking what everyone feels that we don't want to be (inaudible) circumstance where we block people's votes. Guess what? You could not get into the voting booth at Glenwood Village recreation hall on Election Day because the road was ripped up.

People who live in Foxwood, I think it's Oak Ridge, the little community across the way, as well as with- internally within Glenwood, could not get to vote. Now if you want to worry about something, that's something you need to worry about. We could not- I happened to walk around the block, that's a different story. People could not get through from Route 58 to the rec hall, which is the main path into the community, because it was ripped to shreds. There was blockage, there was no signage.

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I called Phil early unfortunately to advise him because I couldn't find Butch Langhorne's phone number."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Right. I got it."

Sandra Mott: "Okay. I called the Board- I went to vote and I found out that they had called into the Board. To make a long story short, when I called the Board a half an hour later, they said we never heard of that. Then I called them two and a half hours and I said, what are you going to do about the signage? There is no signage. Send a sheriff, send someone. Send both parties' representatives there to direct the traffic in. They made some makeshift signs that people couldn't see.

So when you talk about Communist China, or Communist Russia, you didn't have to go any farther than Glenwood Village. Do you hear what I am saying? This is blockage of people's right to vote. They knew this was going to happen. It should have been prevented. Whoever has the wherewithal. That rec hall is not the appropriate location for a voting center. It should go back to the high school because when they refurbished Glenwood's rec hall, that's where we went. And you can coordinate buses to and fro, car pools to and fro for the people who are- don't want to drive, can't drive, whatever. Something must be done and we can't be going through this for the next election.

The road is still ripped up now. It's actually not safe. You cannot get in and out onto Route 58 because of the holes and the dirt and the filth. You cannot get in and out. No one can get in and out. I don't understand that that was part of the site plan, you know, decision making. If it was, what happened? It's dangerous. God forbid you have a heart attack, the easiest access is Route 58. Coming in through Mill Road, it's very dangerous and roundabout. Someone needs to investigate this."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Sandra, what are they tearing the road up for?"

Sandra Mott: "The road up? To put in the sewage for the extension."

Supervisor Cardinale: "For the sewer extension?"

Sandra Mott: "Right through the main entry point from 58 through Glenwood to the rec hall and then you make a right down

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towards (inaudible) and then into their new extension."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Do you know how long that's going- the situation is going to- "

Sandra Mott: "Who knows? We didn't get any notification. It just happened. Nobody tells us anything. So somebody needs to investigate this. This is a fire, this is a safety, this is a health issue. In addition to the voting which has come and gone."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Bruce- yeah, thank you for bringing that to my attention. I'm looking for my sewer district or my water district- "

Sandra Mott: "The gentlemen have been there. I have seen them with their trucks checking out I guess the connections and so on. But I'm certain that that's their category. They don't go beyond their parameters as to, you know, what they're there for. They have been there. But the roads are completely ripped up. It's all dirt. If it rains heavily, forget about it. You really have to find some determination as to how one lane can be provided for us, re-tarred, temporarily, for us to gain access to 58."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Well, I'm surprised actually that the owners of the Glenwood haven't been screaming to put a stop to it or to correct the situation."

Sandra Mott: "I have no idea."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Not just the people who are- live there. I mean the- "

Sandra Mott: "I know."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Have you heard anything?"

Sandra Mott: "I don't know anything more than what we have been living with and this has been going on for a few weeks."

Supervisor Cardinale: "We'll look into it. I was looking at the Board. Nobody on the Board and I guess the town-- have you heard anything, Dawn? Nobody on the Board or the Town Attorney has heard and I heard your message in regard to that day but I wasn't aware that it's a continuing problem."

Sandra Mott: "Yes. It is continuous."

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Supervisor Cardinale: "Right."

Sandra Mott: "And we don't know how long it's going to be."

Supervisor Cardinale: "I will look into it and if you call my office tomorrow we'll have an answer as to how long this is supposed to last."

Sandra Mott: "Okay. If Sheila, someone can give me a buzz, I'd appreciate it."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay."

Sandra Mott: "I'd like to make just another comment. I'm sorry to take other people's time but I've been reading in the paper about this bomb that they're planning to put out in the middle of the Long Island Sound called a gas transfer location. You've got to be kidding. I mean you have got to be kidding. I certainly hope that the Pine Barrens and the Civic Associations and everybody else this other man doesn't like will be screaming at the top of their lungs because that's outrageous."

We not only have Millstone in Connecticut and Shoreham and Brookhaven National Lab and Plum Island, now we're going to have a bomb in the middle of the Long Island Sound that you just spent millions of dollars investigating why the fish are dying and the lobster are dying and so forth. This is a terrorism target with a big fat X on it before they even build it. It's as big as the Queen Mary I read."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Right."

Sandra Mott: "And it's the first one. Well, gee whiz, they get to make all the mistakes on us. Aren't we lucky? You know, every time I read the paper I'm even more amazed, I don't know why after 11 years, there's no way off the island. I'm going to say the same thing I said about the Millstone business when the national-that group from the radiation people came to- "

Councilman Densieski: (Inaudible)

Sandra Mott: "No, no, no. It was the national- Nuclear Regulatory. Thank you so much. I'm at a loss for words, I'm so thrilled that this thing is coming. We have no way off. The environmental impact obviously- you don't have to do an environmental impact to know that that's not a good idea. Put it near Washington,

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D.C. If they want to blow something up, move it south. We don't need it.

And I don't care about the fact that people don't have enough- I have not heard the word conservation in years. How about turning down the thermostat, turning off some of the lights, make a conscientious effort to control your use. We do not need that and I'm hope you're going to be firmly against it.

And my other basic concern is that, you know what my other basic concern is, so I'm not going to bring it up. I hope that it's going to be brought up on the work session sooner than later. Is that true?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yes, yes."

Sandra Mott: "Do we know when that's going to be so I can make by presence in the background. You already know my position. I support Rose 150,000 percent. That's the best location that I- I couldn't agree more with that location because even the location north of Agway that I had suggested on Osborne was still isolated. This is centrally located, this is the best location possible, accessible for all, not only for placement and adoption but for people who volunteer. You truly must recognize that to be the best location. Property owned by the town, building owned by the town, refurbishment not only by the town but I guarantee a lot of people will be willing to help you as well. And the cost should be better.

The dog pound up there as we all know is not safe. I mean can you imagine being up there in the bitter days over the past few days? I don't care how clean it is, it's out of sight and out of mind. It's near a dump and Crown, etc., etc., etc. The long and the short of it is God bless Rose for pushing this. And if you want me to help, you know where I am.

But I really need you to do something about our safety and I appreciate that very much. Thank you."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you, Sandra. Comment from any other member of the audience whether they've indicated or not. Bernadette, you wish to speak, and then Joan."

Bernadette Vooras: "Bernadette Vooras, Reeves Park, Riverhead. Three things. First, would the town consider in the coming year for 2005 trying to bring in some solar projects because not only will we have perhaps- it was referred to a moment as a bomb, the gas, but we

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will have windmills to the south. I don't see that in a hurricane, but the one thing that really is very valuable is solar. And this town has too many open spaces and it could be small projects and it could be a wondrous thing that we could use because you can sell back a lot of electricity."

Councilman Densieski: "Bernadette, could I answer you on that?"

Bernadette Vooras: "Yes."

Councilman Densieski: "We have a proposal in now for the town from a group called Community Energy and their offering all the town departments or a portion thereof, can buy energy off the grid that is created from wind power. It's slightly more, not a lot more, but every stitch of that power is created by wind turbines from upstate New York and it goes onto the grid."

Bernadette Vooras: "Oh, upstate New York."

Councilman Densieski: "So the town attorney has a contract we're reviewing so we are looking at that possibility."

Bernadette Vooras: "Super. Super. Because that's one thing I'd like the town to also lead in, this idea of the future, okay. Renewable energy would be great."

Second, I'd like to know if the Town Board can do anything for those folks that I've been reading about, the Walgreens I believe is going to- has bought the property and there are 10 individual- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Eleven."

Bernadette Vooras: "-- eleven and I believe they're mostly older folks that have been there many, many years. I know that the- I was told by someone older than myself in the village that the park that is adjacent to Home Depot was once in the way of the expressway exit and the state came in and somehow found some land for that and that's why they are where they are today. And could we pursue- could you pursue somehow just giving them a helping hand because if I were in that situation, I would be fit to be tied, you know. I understand with the homes- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Right."

Bernadette Vooras: "-- you know, the age of them and so forth

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but if anything can be done by the town to help them in any way, I think it would be a proper thing."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah, Bernadette, we're aware of the situation. I've spoken with some of the people involved. Barbara Blass and I have spoken with council for Walgreen. Walgreen council has indicated a willingness to participate in solving the problem that has been created with this location."

Bernadette Vooras: "Right."

Supervisor Cardinale: "I'm hopeful that we can do something to help and we're trying. So- and I think Walgreen is going to contribute to that effort. They've indicated an inclination to do that."

Bernadette Vooras: "Excellent. Wonderful. That's a great thing."

Councilwoman Blass: "They've actually agreed to sit down with some of the individuals."

Bernadette Vooras: "That's great. I'm very happy to see that. I kind of thought that perhaps I would hear something in that regard from you. I've grown accustomed to your hard work."

And last but not least, my favorite picture for this town. I've been looking at that baby for 25 years now and that's where I started my comment and now 25 years later I have a wonderful relief that not only will we have that picture but there will be some more houses in it, but it's appropriate and I appreciate each and every vote. You are all entitled to your own consciences and I agree with that.

This still is America though I have my doubts sometimes. But I thank you. I really believe in that master plan having read it so many times. I look to the future of this wonderful town. No one will put us down as they have in the past. They've always looked down on Riverhead, at least from what I've heard. But in keeping the residential where it belongs and the beautiful scenic areas to the north and even in town, there are many scenic- but they're little places. The great expanse on the north part. I am so grateful to you and many of us are grateful to you for doing this because we spent all the money but you still could have said no.

Somewhere in there you have seen the bigger picture, the biggest picture, and I commend you and I thank you very much."

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Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you. Thank you. Do we have our next comment, please? You, sir. Yes, sir."

Bob Dicerio: "Bob Dicerio (phonetic), 130 Vineyard Way, Aquebogue. On October 5th, I presented the Board with some paperwork and some pictures of the flooding problem in my development."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah, it's right across- "

Bob Dicerio: "And I would like to know what if anything has been discussed. I have not been contacted. I spoke to your assistant."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Right."

Bob Dicerio: "He was going to talk to Miss Thomas and Miss Thomas has not- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. I'm glad you came back. You're right across the street from North Fork Woods in those- in the area of Church Lane- "

Bob Dicerio: "Yeah, across the street."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Church Lane, right?"

Bob Dicerio: "Vineyard Way, Church Lane. Vineyard Way off of Church Lane."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Off of Church- I know where you- I know the development."

Bob Dicerio: "Right."

Supervisor Cardinale: "That was a complicated situation. It was discussed briefly with the town attorney who is not here but is here, she's outside."

Bob Dicerio: "Right."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Is John Stefans in the room? John, could you have him speak with Dawn before she comes back in now? He can give her- she knew a good deal about ongoing litigation related to his problem and she was supposed to reach you and advise you concerning this."

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Bob Dicerio: "Okay."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. So if you could find- she just stepped out, probably take two or three minutes and you'll get the answers you need."

Bob Dicerio: "Okay."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you. Joan."

Joan Griffin: "Good evening, Joan Griffin, Baiting Hollow. First, I'd like to thank the Town Board for acting so quickly to my letter of October 5th about repaving the east end of Youngs Avenue from the reclamation project to Osborne Avenue. The road was a total disaster and thanks to the five of you, your efforts, it's a safe area gain."

I understand Middle Road and Twomey Avenue last year and earlier this year were worked on by LIPA and that they put up a bond to do the work, that they were laying gas pipe or whatever in there and the bond was returned without the road being reconditioned."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah."

Councilman Densieski: "I can probably- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "I'm aware of the situation and so, too, is Ed. Ed, why don't you take it?"

Councilman Densieski: "The bond was for the work they did in the middle. They were not going to repave the entire road, only the part they tore up. Whether that was a good deal or not, I don't know. But Mark is preparing to at least put the base coat down probably any day, if not within the next week or two."

Joan Griffin: "Okay. And- "

Councilman Densieski: "Before the asphalt plants close down for the year."

Joan Griffin: "-- okay, thank you. And, the signs, the town has been working on codes about signs."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yes."

Joan Griffin: "On Middle Road, there's a sign- Middle Road is basically a residential road and there's a sign for a restaurant"

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there on the back of a pickup truck that has no plates on it, but it's on its own property. Is that legal? It's been there for a year and a half, two years."

Supervisor Cardinale: "The- on Middle Road, yeah."

Joan Griffin: "On Middle Road."

Supervisor Cardinale: "No. Off premises signs have to have a special permit, right? And I'm sure there isn't one there. Furthermore, the real question is will it- will it be legal under the new sign code which will be passed December 7th. We are set to pass it. We took the public comment as you know for that and the farmstand and we've been- this code committee has been so busy with the master plan zoning and the- "

(At this time, the CD ended and Dorothy O'Hare spoke thanking the Town Board for all their effort. Spoke on commercial zoning, not on Sound Avenue. The CD continued with George Schmelzer speaking)

George Schmelzer: "-- last week where the lumber yard used to be between Union Avenue and Osborne Avenue, it's about a full two acres there and the fire department owns it for a couple years or more."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Right."

George Schmelzer: "I don't know, maybe, it's very strange. Maybe the Goodalles gave it to them for a gift. I don't know. Anyway if we don't find a spot for a food store, downtown will never come back. Why should people from- they have to go to 58 to buy food. Why should they come down a mile to Main Street to shop when they can shop right next to the food store on 58? Really. And that's the way it goes.

So and we need some more taxpayers around. I hope they don't- I don't know why they continue to want the (inaudible) duck farm to be a park. We've got plenty of parks around. Who's going to pay all these taxes if the (inaudible) duck farm was available for high priced houses, they'd more than pay their way. Even if they had kids, really. And there you go.

And I wish if you have apartments in downtown, where are they going to be? There's a patch of woods next to the Moose Club would be good for that. And really."

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Supervisor Cardinale: "Apartments?"

George Schmelzer: "Yeah. Yeah."

Supervisor Cardinale: "We are looking for to develop apartments in the downtown area."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah. You've got to think of a food store first otherwise downtown will never come back."

Supervisor Cardinale: "I assume you do not shop at the gourmet food store on Main Street?"

George Schmelzer: "Where?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "They do have a food store. It's not a bad one but it's not really like, you know, King Kullen or anything."

George Schmelzer: "Well, King Kullen, they're going to stay where they are. We don't need a food store with all the extras and everything. Just plain food. No drug store, no farm supply, no-just plain store. And that would do the job. There's almost no place to put it except where the lumber yard used to be. So that's about it."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Rose says it's a very nice gourmet food store. You should try it. Says they have nice things in there. I've never been there recently at least. They have another- they have an organic food store, too. You could get gourmet food and organic food on Main Street."

Councilwoman Sanders: "The Green Earth Grocery."

Supervisor Cardinale: "The Green Earth Grocery and gourmet food store."

George Schmelzer: "To me all food is organic. When I went to school, gasoline was considered organic."

Supervisor Cardinale: "I haven't tried any of that recently."

George Schmelzer: "I haven't either. But it's either mineral or organic. Now they stretched the meaning of the word."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah."

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George Schmelzer: "And I don't know- the fish used to be organic, fish and crabs and clams because they fed on the duck wastes. Now you put that type of waste on the ground, it makes your crops grow better."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Really? As fascinating as this is, I don't want to keep you."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah. I found it used to make the grass grow so I put some on my head. That's why my hair grows so good, see."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yes, I see. We've got a record going here for meetings. I don't see anybody up behind you so you are the last- oh, we've got one more. Come on up. Come on up, Sandra."

George Schmelzer: "Okay, if I forgot something- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you. Come see me anytime."

George Schmelzer: "All right. Good enough."

Supervisor Cardinale: "My door is always open, George. Yes, Sandra."

Sandra Mott: "I was just wondering, what's going to happen with that parcel where they ripped out all the trees and bushes and so on and for forth, as we all know, illegally on a Sunday. And I hope that they're not just putting little plants in. That they're going to be forced to put mature plants, mature trees."

Supervisor Cardinale: "We were talking about that at the work session. It is in litigation right now. Dawn is handling it for our office. Farmer Larry is right in front of you here."

Sandra Mott: "I know. I see him."

Supervisor Cardinale: "So I don't want to say anything that will what is it, give away our strategy."

Sandra Mott: "Jeopardize."

Supervisor Cardinale: "It is in litigation. And we were discussing it at the work session today with regard to a mediation plan which we will be demanding. We would like to see blue spruce, 30 or 40 feet high along Glenwood's."

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Sandra Mott: "Well I think something needs to be done because quite frankly that was like the topper, and somebody needs to investigate what's in that soil because we were tasting like if it had metal, nickel in your mouth. There's some kind of contaminants in that soil and I'm going to guess that it probably got dumped from the race track over the many years that it was there or what was in the gasoline. Remember my story about protecting us from the Glenwood extension.

And, by the way, when is that protected barrier going up between the race track and Glenwood that was supposed to be put up, that fencing? That should have been put up a long time ago. Some sort of barrier to protect us from the sound and the filth and the debris. And not only us, but also those people who are going to buy those very big la-di-dah homes."

Supervisor Cardinale: "I am unaware of that but maybe the (inaudible)."

Sandra Mott: "There was supposed to be something protecting us."

Supervisor Cardinale: "A sound barrier?"

Sandra Mott: "A wall."

Councilwoman Sanders: "It was part of the site plan. Wasn't it?"

Sandra Mott: "Yes. That's what I thought but I don't see it yet."

Councilman Densieski: "No."

Councilwoman Sanders: "It wasn't on the site plan?"

Councilman Densieski: "No."

Sandra Mott: "Oh really. How come? You don't care about the voters of the 500 units over there?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "I am deeply (inaudible)."

Councilman Densieski: "I just said it wasn't on there."

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Councilwoman Blass: "I will go back and check to see- "

Sandra Mott: "Could you do that?"

Councilwoman Blass: "-- absolutely."

Sandra Mott: "Because something needs to be done now that this- now that this horror has taken place and as tall as the trees get, it's still not going to block the stench and the noise."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah."

Sandra Mott: "And as well as the view for some of the individuals. These are people's homes. They can't afford the \$500,000 ones on the golf courses."

Supervisor Cardinale: "I have two notes that I will check. One is that work in front of Glenwood and- "

Sandra Mott: "Please. Actually in Glenwood. It was in Glenwood."

Supervisor Cardinale: "-- also- within Glenwood that's blocking the entrance."

Sandra Mott: "It's the whole road."

Supervisor Cardinale: "The whole road."

Sandra Mott: "The whole road, Phil, from 58 all the way down to the rec hall and all the way into the extension."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah. And the second question is on the site plan, for what am I looking when I look tomorrow."

Sandra Mott: "I want you to see if there is- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Glenwood site plan."

Sandra Mott: "-- the extension."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Glenwood extension site plan, John."

Sandra Mott: "To see why there was not any protected- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "I want to know if there was any buffer required."

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Councilman Densieski: "There's a 70% buffer of natural trees."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. We want to know if the buffer required is- "

Sandra Mott: "No, it was- he only got it because- to save 70%."

Supervisor Cardinale: "-- is in place as required by the site plan."

Sandra Mott: "Thirty percent build on and I hope that that's being closely monitored as well that there's not any more blockage because you drive big heavy equipment in there again, running back and forth. I would appreciate that."

Supervisor Cardinale: "And the other question was to verify what they're doing and how long they're going to be doing it in front of Glenwood."

Sandra Mott: "Thank you."

Supervisor Cardinale: "If you call John, he's let you know tomorrow the answers."

Sandra Mott: "Okay, thanks very much."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you. If there is no other comment, we're going to end the meeting and thank you for your attendance and come back and see us on Thursday at 10:00 for the work session."
